MISSION STATEMENT

Malibu High School strives to be a collaborative community that respects individuals, teaches critical thinking, fosters a passion for learning and sets high expectations for all. Malibu High School is a grade 6-12 middle and high school. In 1996, Malibu High School celebrated the graduation of its first senior class. It is the top performing high school in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District and is the only public high school in Malibu. Students excel academically, as athletes, in the arts and in serving their community. The Shark, symbol of Malibu High School, is a fitting image for a school that grew out of the ceaseless determination, tenacity and concerted efforts of a dedicated group of Malibu parents and community members.

Student Body

There are 1,000 students enrolled in Malibu High School for the 2017-2018 academic year. The high school includes grades 9-12 and totals 617 students. The current senior class totals 151 students. While most of the students come from the Malibu community, others come from Santa Monica, Los Angeles and Oxnard to attend the school, where about 9% of the students attend with out-of-district permits. Approximately 84% of the students are Caucasian, 10% Latino, 2% African American, 4% Asian/Pacific Islander. Approximately 14% of the students are on the Free/Reduced Lunch program.

Faculty

The staff is comprised of 54 teachers, 3 administrators, 4 counselors, 1 school psychologist, 1 librarian and 1 school nurse. Three members of the faculty have doctorate degrees. Five teachers have earned the prestigious National Board Certification for teaching excellence.

Community

Located off the Pacific Ocean, Malibu High is the center of a community that commits time and resources to the success of the school. Malibu High has exceptional partnerships with the City of Malibu, the Malibu Foundation for Youth and Families, Pepperdine University, Malibu Chamber of Commerce and the Malibu Special Education Foundation. There is a Boys and Girls Club on campus that provides after school and youth development programs. The Shark Fund is the school's nonprofit umbrella fundraising organization, providing financial support to the PTSA, Athletic Booster Club, Arts Angels and specific capital campaigns.

Accreditation and Recognition

Malibu High School is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) for a six-year term. In 2003, Malibu High was recognized as a California Distinguished School. The school received a U.S. News & World Report Gold Medal Award for being ranked in the top 2.6% of high schools nationwide. Malibu High was also ranked 175th on the Newsweek Challenge Index, indicating that an extraordinarily high percentage of the students are taking Advanced Placement classes. It is also ranked in the top tier of California "10" Schools, which means that the school's test scores are in the highest 10% of the state.

Grading and Rank

The **grade point average is unweighted** as no extra points are given for Advanced Placement or Honors courses. The GPA is determined by computing all grades, except for physical education, teacher assistant duties and special education. A cumulative grade point average is computed using a 4-point scale (A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, F=0; plus and minus grades are neutral). If a course is repeated, the grades are averaged.

In compliance with district policy, **class rank is not computed**, but a GPA percentage range is provided for colleges to determine approximate ranking.

Please be aware that due to the small size of Malibu High School and the wide offering of advanced level courses, many students face scheduling conflicts and are not able to enroll in all of the advanced courses they wish

Academic Program

The academic year is divided into two semesters of approximately 20 weeks. A school day is comprised of 6 classes. In addition to the following requirements, some students take courses for dual high school and college credit at nearby Pepperdine University and local community colleges. All high school students demonstrate their continuing commitment to others by completing 20 hours of community service a year.
