The program for students identified as Gifted and Talented (GATE) begins in 4th grade and includes about 50 students. Webster serves a predominantly middle to upper middle class community and enjoys a high level of parent involvement and community support.

Webster is distinguished by a highly professional staff of talented, creative teachers, tremendous parent involvement and support, and a highly supportive community in which our school enjoys a very positive reputation. Our students' test scores rank in the top 10% in California, with an API of 949. Webster has been recognized by the State of California as a "Service Learning Leader School" and as a "California Distinguished School."

Children experience an exciting, stimulating curriculum that begins with high academic expectations. Webster students learn to connect their school experiences to the real world through field trips, community service projects, and guest speakers. Regular art, music, gardening, and technology lessons enrich every child's education. Character education is woven throughout the instructional program. 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III. School Climate

School Safety Plan (School Year 2010-11)

This section provides information about the school's comprehensive safety plan.

Staff reviews the school's safety plan annually. Students are supervised by school staff at all times while on the Webster campus. School grounds are open thirty minutes before school begins. Traffic, parking, and drop-off procedures have been developed in consultation with local law enforcement and the Webster PTA. Parent volunteers direct traffic and assist students as they are dropped off by parents. During the school day, all recesses are supervised by teachers and other school staff.

Parents and guardians must sign students out of the office if they are picking them up during the school day. Physical education teachers, office staff, and teachers receive training in various areas related to student safety, including First Aid and CPR. After school, all students are required to be enrolled in supervised programs if they remain at school, such as child care, homework club, and school sponsored enrichment classes. During the school day there is no unauthorized access to the school campus. All visitors must enter through the main office, sign in, and get a visitor's badge to be worn while on campus. Students are only released to parents or their designees.

IV. School Facilities

School Facility Conditions

This section provides information about the condition of the school's grounds, buildings, and restrooms, and a description of any planned or recently completed facility improvements.

Webster school was built in 1949. Two major reconstruction projects in the past 20 years have resulted in all new plumbing, heating, electrical, and roofing systems. Major improvements in seismic safety and accessibility are in place. All classrooms, the office, and the library are connected to the internet through a high speed internet connection and there is wireless access to the network throughout the school. The most recent taxpayer-funded reconstruction project, Proposition BB, has provided a significantly upgraded technology infrastructure and a completely new fire alarm system. A new library was completed in 2001. The playground includes two grass play fields and a recently constructed play structure. Students are regularly expected to assist school and District staff in keeping the grounds free of litter. Gardens and murals make the campus an especially beautiful and welcoming learning environment. The physical plant is well-maintained and is in well-functioning condition. Each of our 13 classroom teachers has a dedicated classroom. Every classroom has an interactive SmartBoard, an Elmo document camera, and a group of five to eight desktop or laptop computers for the teacher and students to use. Our new library is beautiful and spacious. Our computer lab provides 34 iMac desktop computers, all on line. There is a classroom provided for our after school child care program so no regular classrooms have to be shared for this purpose. There are many outside garden areas and patios regularly used for small group activities and special projects and events. Our cafeteria/auditorium was recently remodeled with a new stage curtain, sound system, and lighting.

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Planned Improvements (School Year 2011-2012)

The district continues to keep its Deferred Maintenance fund open, however flexibility provided by the State has allowed us to use balances in this fund to relieve the General Fund, due to shortages in State funding. This flexibility was used during the 2010-11 fiscal year and is expected to be used in 2011-12. The district did not transfer any of the fund balance back to the General Fund, but has not made new contributions in the past two years. The balances in the Deferred Maintenance fund are still being used on approved maintenance projects. The district is carefully deciding which projects to move forward, as we do not expect to contribute additional funds from the district or receive new state Deferred Maintenance any time soon.

All students at Webster have access to state-approved and district adopted textbooks and instructional materials in all core academic areas. The district follows the state guidelines and cycles for textbook adoptions with new science materials purchased and implemented in the 2007-08 school year and new math texts in 2008-09. With the textbook adoption process frozen, due to budget constraints at the state level, the district is currently in the process of refreshing the English Language Arts curriculum, using the existing texts. All students, including English Learners, have their own copy of textbooks, except in the case where "Big Books" are used for the entire classroom at the early primary level. Textbooks and instructional materials are recommended for Board approval through a comprehensive process by a district-wide committee of teachers and administrators. Members of the public are invited to review recommended materials and make comments prior to Board approval.

Webster allocates the majority of the Tier III funds it receives from the State of California to provide a special reading teacher to support struggling students in grades 1st-3rd. Webster's share of the Equity Fund is also used for this purpose. A portion of Tier III funding is used to provide staff development and to purchase books for the library. Another Tier III allocation funds our GATE program. This program includes a Math Club, the Jr. Great Books program, and advanced technology classes for identified 4th and 5th grade students. The Webster PTA provides instructional aides for every teacher, supplemental funding for classroom instructional materials, field trips, and programs in the areas of art, music, gardening, and technology.

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IX. Student Performance

Standardized Testing and Reporting Program

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The CSTs show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and ten through eleven. The CAPA includes ELA, mathematics, and science in grades two through eleven, and for science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations. The CMA includes ELA and mathematics for grades three through eight and science in grade five and is an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations. Student scores are reported as performance levels. 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XI. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

Professional Development

This section provides information on how teachers and staff are trained for instructional improvement.

All teachers and staff in SMMUSD participate in ongoing professional development through banked time, a total of 90 minutes of meeting and professional development time each week at each site. Areas of district-wide focus for teacher and administrator professional development include implementation of curriculum guides and other areas that are determined by a review of summative and formative data from all school sites and the collection of input from teachers and administrators. Among the primary focus areas for professional development in SMMUSD are the following:

- * Developing Instructional Leadership Teams and Professional Learning Communities through Lesson Link, Academic Preferences and Learning Walks
- * Literacy and Mathematics – standards-based curriculum and instructional delivery
- * Using data to improve classroom instruction
- * Culturally relevant and responsive pedagogy
- * Supporting students with special needs
- * Differentiated instruction for all students, including English learners
- * Technology integration

A variety of methodologies are used to provide professional development, including coaching and mentoring. SMMUSD provides coaching through several programs such as BTSA, National Boards, literacy and ELD coaching, Instructional Leadership Teams, and such specialized programs as Cotsen Fellows and EETT Mentor/Coaches. Additionally, professional development occurs through workshop series during banked time and/or after school opportunities.

Each August, all teachers new to Santa Monica-Malibu are invited to participate in Teacher Academy, a professional development and orientation to district wide curriculum and instructional initiatives. All eligible new teachers are encouraged to participate in BTSA. Teachers interested in applying for National Board Certification may participate in the process and can elect to be supported by teachers who have already achieved National Board Certification.

At Webster, the major school professional development focus is in the area of problem solving in mathematics through the use of Cognitively Guided Instruction.

Teachers at each grade level plan lessons together, observe one another teaching common lessons, and periodically review their students' work together. Every Webster's teacher now has a SmartBoard and Elmo document camera and they have received consistent in-service training in their use.
