A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, March 5, 2015, in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m. in the Board Conference Room at the District Offices. 1. Alaleh Mokhtari – Santa Monica High School (5)

Student Board Member Mokhtari reported that M House held an ice cream sandwich social on February 20. The Black Student Union held its annual Apollo Night, in which students performed. ASB held auditions for the spring rally, which will emphasize student performances and interactive games. The ASB Executive Board for 2015-16 will be: Dean Chien as President, Alex Spanos as Vice President, Evan Hiltunen as Treasurer, Brandon Hall Pascascio as Secretary, and Mirai My as Student Board Member. ASB is holding the annual Stussy Sale on March 7. Sophomore Steering is hosting a Rosti fundraiser on March 23-25. Spirit Week will be March 16-20, with daily themes of Pajama Day, Career Day, Tropical Day, Twin Day, and colors by grade levels. The UCLA blood drive will be on March 23. There will be a dodgeball competition on March 24-27 during lunch. I House will be hosting a Spring Fling lunch event on March 24, which will feature tasty desserts and a bounce slide. Open House is on March 10 at Samohi. Both boys' and girls' basketball had an amazing season, but will not continue on to CIF. Girls' soccer lost during CIF semi-finals. Venice Arts classes are now underway every Thursday during periods 4-6. Law students from UCLA speak to the Criminal Justice class and the OCLC every Wednesday. Students read their works at the Streetcraft LA event and made it onto the cover of the Santa Monica Daily Press. Mr. Fuller les students in stargazing using a telescope donated by the Ed Foundation. On February 20, The Santa Monica Junior Chamber of Commerce honored OCLC teacher Cynthia McGregory at their 86th Annual Installation dinner. The Rotary Club donated \$2,750 for the school's gym class. On February 24, a guest speaker shared with students the evolution on how humans communicate. Students in Ms. Liaw's English class are learning how to conduct the warm-up for the class period. UCLA will be holding four reproductive workshops on gender and sexuality, healthy relationships, communication and consent, and pregnancy prevention.

B. SMMCTA Update – Ms. Sarah Braff (5)

Ms. Braff reported that she attended literacy coach training, PD leaders training, math learning walks, and IBB training. She congratulated the ROP Virtual Enterprise Business Team, which won first place in the Virtual Enterprise International Long Beach Trade Show and was happy to see the Farm to Preschool grant on tonight's consent calendar. Ms. Braff expressed her concern about the plan for a preschool teaching position and about the coming of spring and summer with rising temperatures in the classrooms. She suggested Measure ES funds be used to install A/C at all sites. She also suggested the district consider using the FCMAT calculator when developing the budget.

C. SEIU Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely (5)

Ms. Cartee-McNeely reported that SEIU Leadership Elections are underway for the next three years. The negotiation team has met to caucus in preparation to sunshine for the 2015/16 school year. The union will be meeting with district leadership to examine Salary Survey data prior to negotiations. SEIU continues its work in the Labor Management Teams (LMTs) with Operations & Facilities, and we are meeting next Thursday to finalize the plan for summer cleaning. Through LMTs, the union has been able to resolve multiple issues through thoughtful, positive and substantive conversations, thus avoiding the filing of grievances. The union looks forward to engaging the Special Education LMT to discuss transfers and training for unit members. Ms. Cartee-McNeely acknowledges that March is National Women's History Month; she called attention to all the important contributions of women throughout history.

D. PTA Council – Ms. Rochelle Fanali (5)

Ms. Fanali reported that the PTA Council supported the CA State PTA Smarts program here in SMMUSD. The council voted to unanimously support the district's efforts to encourage every family to vaccinate their children. The council also voted to become an official sponsor of the SMMEF Pier Party event in April. PTA Units are working closely with SMMEF, including Malibu PTA leaders, who will be promoting a wine tasting event as a fundraiser for SMMEF.

Ms. Fanali introduced Jon Kean, Lincoln Middle School PTSA President., who said PTA has been working closely with the principal to fulfill thet pTA goal: to create better outcomes for students. He explained the programs PTA is involved in at LMS.

The JAMS PTSA is working to educate parents, get window shades for the classrooms, and host a volunteer event tomorrow. The PTA just finished a SMMEF drive, increasing parent participation from 19% to 25%. There will be a beautification event this weekend.

IX. SENIOR STAFF REPORTS (20 minutes)

A. Asst. Supt., Educational Services – Dr. Terry Deloria (5)

Dr. Deloria presented information on recent Ed Services activities. Her presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

B. Asst. Supt., Human Resources - Dr. Mark Kelly (5)

Dr. Kelly thanked SMMCTA for hosting the IBB training this week. He introduced Julie Rusk from the City of Santa Monica, who shared information on the city's RFP for Human Services Grant Program. The RFP opens tomorrow.

C. Assoc. Supt., Business & Fiscal Services/CFO - Ms. Janece Maez (5)

Ms. Maez mentioned that there is a consent item regarding the Measure ES allocation in this agenda. Heery International, in their research in preparing the district for moving forward with Measure ES, have discovered that there is already a great deal of space programming that has been done for Samohi. Therefore, staff will be bringing forward a contract for R. L. Binder, the architect who designed the campus's new Science and Technology Building to begin space programming for first academic project on the Samohi campus. Regarding Project Labor Agreements (PLAs), which had been brought up at previous meetings, Ms. Maez replied that this is a new concept for SMMUSD, so staff will need to seek advice of experts who have done PLAs before. There will be an item on the April agenda to allow staff to engage with a consultant to assist the district in moving forward with a PLA.

D. Superintendent – Ms. Sandra Lyon (5)

Ms. Lyon reported that Dr. Janie gates coordinated Rotary Reads yesterday at the sites. The superintendent and Ms. Maez will be attending the LACOE board meeting Tuesday to lobby the Board of Supervisors and LACOE Board of Education regarding a step-down approach to ROP funding from the county. She encouraged board members to write to our LACOE board member. Ms. Lyon reported that Ms. Mayoral spent her first year as Samohi's principal investigating conflicts that had occurred on campus, and this year reinstated Restorative Justice. As part of the program, 100 students will spend two weekends at Building Bridges camp, where they will become mentors and trainers for their peers. They will learn about effective communication skills, the impact of social identities, and their own personal responsibility and leadership roles. Ms. Lyon remarked that most people associate Restorative Justice with discipline, but it also aims to create a safe campus climate. All staff at Samohi have been trained in Restorative Justice, and LCAP funds have been designated to support this work.

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda (the following rules apply to both general public comments as well as comments about a specific agenda item). The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during Public Comments, except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. Individual members of the public who submit a public speaking card prior to the Board hearing an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed three (3) minutes to address the Board on each agenda or

nonagenda item, depending on the number of speakers. If there are ten or more speakers on an agenda or nonagenda item, the Board shall limit the allowed time to two (2) minutes per speaker. Individual speakers who submit a public speaking card after the Board begins to hear an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed one (1) minute to address the Board. A public speaker may yield his/her time to another speaker, but must be present when his/her name is called. The donor would then give up his/her opportunity to speak. The public speaker who receives the donated minutes shall speak for no more than four (4) minutes maximum. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add. Individuals represented by a common point of view may be asked to select one individual to speak for the group. The president may, at his/her discretion, allow five (5) minutes for those who are serving as a spokesperson for a group or organization. The Board may limit the total time for public input on each item to thirty (30) minutes. If the number of persons wishing to address the Board of Education exceeds the time limit, additional time will be provided in **Section XVI. CONTINUATION OF PUBLIC COMMENTS.**

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT AND WISE AND HEALTHY AGING

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is made and entered into the 6th day of March, 2015, between SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT ("SMMUSD") and WISE and Healthy Aging ("WISE"), a non-profit organization.

WHEREAS, Certified Nurse Assistants ("CNA") and Home Health Aides ("HHA") provide long term care to the elderly and disabled in skilled nursing facilities and home settings;

WHEREAS, WISE has established a comprehensive program and curriculum for Career and Technical Education ("CTE") for CNAs and HHAs ("CNA program"). Persons who successfully complete the CNA program facilitated by WISE qualify to take the State Certification Exam to become a Certified Nurse Assistant or Home Health Aide.

WHEREAS, the SMMUSD desires to implement the CNA program.

WHEREAS, WISE desires to work with the SMMUSD to maximize the student benefit of the CNA program.

IT IS, THEREFORE, AGREED BY AND BETWEEN THE SMMUSD AND WISE THAT:

- 1. **TERM OF THE AGREEMENT**. The term of the MOU is March 6, 2015 through June 30, 2015. This MOU may be extended by written agreement between SMMUSD and WISE.
- 2. **TERMINATION**. SMMUSD or WISE may terminate this MOU upon provision of thirty-day (30 day) written notice to the other party. However, at the sole discretion of SMMUSD, all programs and services shall continue through the conclusion of the term/semester as not to disrupt student participation.
- 3. **MATERIALS, SCHOLARSHIPS, CLINICAL HOURS**. WISE will provide all materials, full scholarships to high school students enrolled in SMMUSD, and clinical hours at the Veterans Affairs and Fireside Convalescent Homes located in Los Angeles County.
- 4. **TEACHER**. The SMMUSD shall provide a credentialed CTE teacher to deliver classroom instruction to student participants. The CTE teacher shall supervise SMMUSD students during clinical hours at the Veterans Affairs and Fireside Convalescent Homes.
- 5. **EXPENSES AND/OR COST TO THE DISTRICT**. There will be no cost to the SMMUSD or any student who enrolls and participates in the CNA program. WISE shall reimburse the SMMUSD for any and all costs incurred by the SMMUSD associated with the CNA program, including, but not limited to all associated employment costs. The SMMUSD shall provide WISE with monthly invoices for all expenses and/or costs associated with the CNA

program. Payment is due within 30 days of the invoice date. Failure to provide timely payment will result in a ten percent (10%) late fee assessment.

6. **FINGERPRINTING REQUIREMENTS**. If any WISE employee, or anyone providing services for WISE under this MOU, including employees of the Veterans Affairs and Fireside Convalescent Homes, has more than limited contact with SMMUSD students, as solely determined by SMMUSD, said individual shall be required to submit for fingerprinting and clearance by the Department of Justice pursuant to SMMUSD's routine employment fingerprinting requirement, before performing any service pursuant to the MOU or coming into contact with SMMUSD students.

7. HOLD HARMLESS CLAUSE.

- (a) <u>SMMUSD Indemnity</u>: SMMUSD agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless WISE, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers from every claim, demand, or liability, which may be made by reason of any injury to person or property sustained by reason of SMMUSD's willful or negligent actions related to the condition of the SMMUSD property.
- (b) <u>WISE Indemnity</u>: WISE agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless SMMUSD, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorney fees arising out of the performance of the work described herein, caused in whole or in part by any negligent act or omission of WISE, any subcontractor, including, but not limited to, Veterans Affairs and Fireside Convalescent Homes, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, except where caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of SMMUSD.
- 8. **INSURANCE**. WISE shall procure and maintain for the duration of this MOU, insurance with an insurer or insurers qualified to do business in the State of California against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder. The aforementioned insurance shall include coverage for:
 - (a) Worker's Compensation in accordance with the laws of the State of California in the amount of at least \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and disease.
 - (b) Comprehensive general liability and auto liability with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit, bodily injury and property damage liability per occurrence, and \$2,000,000 in aggregate,
 - (c) Comprehensive general liability with limits of not less than \$1,000,00 combined single limit, bodily injury and property damage liability per occurrence, and \$2,000,000 in aggregate.
 - (d) Each policy named above shall name the District and its officers agents and employees as additional insureds and shall further state that such policy is primary and any policy held by the District is excess and contributory.

- (e)WISE shall also establish that the Veterans Affairs and Fireside Convalescent Homes maintain insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the CNA program, in the types and amounts stated above.

The increase shown above reflects an increase of twenty (20) additional classrooms for SBAC testing that were not included in the original proposals. The cost includes Chromebooks, Elitebooks, carts, software, licenses, and White Glove professional services which includes asset tagging, imaging, warranties and installation services.

School district governing boards have the authority to "piggyback" on another public agency's bid per public contract code section 20118 and 20652 when it is determined to be in the "best interest of the district". It is often advantageous for district to utilize piggyback bids when contract items are identical to the district's specifications. Using piggyback contracts saves time and money, and they often provide lower prices than a single jurisdiction would be able to obtain.

The Board of Education approved the budget for Measure ES-2 Technology purchases during the Board meeting of October 16, 2014 (Item A.23). Previous agenda items for HP equipment were approved during the Board of Education meetings on 11/06/14 (Item A.10), 11/20/14 (Item A.10) and 01/15/15 (Item A.09). This purchase will utilize a portion of the SBAC allocations.

RE: ALLOCATION OF MEASURE ES BOND FUNDS

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.12

On February 19, 2015 the Board discussed staff's recommendation regarding the allocation and distribution of Measure ES funds. A complete background of the history on Measure ES can be found in the agenda packet (Discussion item D.03) on that date. After hearing from many community members supporting the recommendation and following a robust discussion of the Board, staff is bringing back the allocation for approval.

Allocation Recommendation

From the early conversations regarding Measure ES, the language incorporated into Board resolution authorizing the election and previous Board actions, it is clear there are several distinct components to the allocation of Measure ES funds. Those components include the previous Board allocation for the Technology portion of Measure ES; the language of the resolution that indicates that at least 20% of the net proceeds shall be spent at school sites in the Malibu community; and that a significant portion of the funds should be allocated to Santa Monica High School based upon the facility needs at that site. Other considerations for the allocation of funds include: previously designed changes at elementary sites, the shortfall of funds in Measure BB, and newly identified issues.

Technology Allocation

At the October 16, 2014 Board of Education meeting, an allocation of \$34,431,359 was approved for the first phase of funding of technology projects. The recommendation was brought to the Board by the District Technology Team (DTT) that included: infrastructure, SBAC devices, 21st century classroom components, library upgrades, expanded computer labs, and staff development. Expenditures from this allocation are well underway and regular updates by Assistant Superintendent, Terry Deloria have been made to the Board.

Malibu 20%

The language of the bond resolution clearly identified an amount, no less than 20% of net bond proceeds, to be established for Malibu specific projects. This amount is \$77,000,000. A Facility Advisory Committee – Malibu is to be established from a broad representation of Malibu residents to make recommendations for expenditures from this allocation.

Samohi

Santa Monica High School has clearly been identified as the site with the greatest and most significant needs in the district. While Measure BB has provided an exceptional new facility with the Innovation Building, the other needs on the campus continue. During a time when the District believed that the Redevelopment Agency of the City of Santa Monica would be able to provide funding for new and upgraded athletic facilities, a campus plan was developed that outlined improvements and new facilities over time. It essentially was a "master plan" for developing Samohi. Additionally, the staff of Measure BB developed another planning document that should be reviewed for the information it can provide. Both documents provide a plan for the campus that includes a number of projects that are staged to allow continued operation of the site while construction is underway. The build-out of any plan for Samohi will take from ten to fifteen years at a minimum, to complete. Costs estimates for individual projects at the time of these plans ranged from \$50 to \$100 million in 2012 dollars. Current estimates,

including all project costs will be significantly higher. Staff is recommending that the Board consider an allocation of <u>a minimum of</u> \$180 million towards improvements at Samohi. The initial steps should be to engage a consultant to update and determine a comprehensive campus plan for the site. After approval of the plan, recommendations and specific projects can be considered.

Other (Unallocated)

At this time, staff is recommending that the Board leave any remaining balance as unallocated. Staff has identified three (3) primary areas that will need to be considered before specific allocations are made. Those include the following:

- 1. Measure BB shortfall Staff is preparing for Board review and approval of an update to the Measure BB program. A majority of the projects in the program are either completed or well into the construction phase. Some projects; however, are not at that point in the process. For a number of reasons that will be detailed in the future Board item, it is apparent that the amount of funds currently in the program balance will not be sufficient to complete the expected projects. Staff will be outlining the size of the shortfall (which is anticipated to be nearly \$30 million); explaining the loss of RDA funding; and describing how unexpected delays and other difficulties have caused this overrun. Staff will be asking the Board to consider funding this shortfall with Measure ES funds.
- 2. Elementary campuses During the Measure BB process, schematic designs were completed for elementary campuses throughout the District. There is an expectation that those plans would be considered at the time future bond funds were available. To honor the work done during the Measure BB process, those plans should be reviewed and analyzed to determine if they are still in line with the District's comprehensive facility plan.
- 3. Emerging Considerations As staff review and consider the current status of our facility needs, there are several new concerns that have been identified. Those concerns include, but are not limited to, facility issues related to environmental concerns; issues related to heat and indoor air quality; demographic issues related to shifting enrollment patterns throughout the district; and programmatic issues related to such things as Pre-Kindergarten (PreK), Transitional Kindergarten (TK) and a Special Education Day Treatment Center for Special Education students, and parking and drop-off and pick-up.

To summarize, staff is asking the Board to approve the initial allocation for Measure ES as outlined in the chart that follows and direct staff to continue the process to establish the Facility Advisory Committees for both Malibu and Santa Monica; engage a consultant to begin the updating of the Samohi campus plan; and continue the work with Heery International on the recruitment of a Bond Program Manager.

Mr. de la Torre suggested adding, "and parking and drop-off and pick-up," to the Emerging Considerations unallocated funds. Mr. Mechur and Mr. Foster suggested that the board authorize staff to begin working with R. L. Binder immediately, bringing the contract back for ratification at a future meeting. The board agreed to all of these suggestions.

SCHOOL-BASED PROGRAM COORDINATION

In order to best serve students with special needs and students participating in designated educational programs, the Board of Education encourages school-based program coordination as a means for achieving flexibility in the use of the categorical funds received by each school. The Board believes that resources acquired to assist students in one program often can benefit other students without in any way depriving the originally targeted group.

A school site council shall be established at each school to consider whether or not it wishes the school to participate in school-based program coordination. All interested persons shall have an opportunity to meet in public to establish the site council. (Education Code 52852.5)

The school site council of any participating school shall develop, for approval by the Board, a school plan that addresses the components specified in Education Code 52853. This plan shall be incorporated into the school's single plan for student achievement required for the state's consolidated application process. (Education Code 52853, 64001)

Evaluation of each participating school's educational program shall include an assessment of the school's effectiveness in meeting the needs of each student population originally targeted by the categorical programs.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends this updating this policy to reflect new law (AB 97), which redirects funding for the California School Age Families Education (Cal-SAFE) program into the LCFF and thereby eliminates the mandate for program participants to adopt related policy. The material related to pregnancy prevention will also be deleted, since the issue is appropriately addressed in other policies. In addition, the policy will be revised to (1) require the use of uniform complaint procedures for complaints regarding discrimination on the basis of a student's marital, pregnancy, or parental status; (2) add material on program evaluation; (3) reflect new U.S. Department of Education Guidance regarding reasonable accommodations to enable pregnant and parenting students to access the educational program; and (4) reflect federal regulations addressing the circumstances under which a student may be required to obtain medical certification in order to participate in a program or activity.

> The regulation will be deleted, since funding for the Cal-SAFE program was redirected into the LCFF pursuant to new law (AB 97).

MARRIED / PREGNANT / PARENTING STUDENTS

The Board of Education recognizes that early marriage, pregnancy or parenting may disrupt a student's education and increase the chance of a student dropping out of school. The Board therefore desires to provide instruction and services designed to assist in pregnancy prevention. The Board also desires to support male and female expectant and parenting students to attain strong academic and parenting skills and to promote the healthy development of their children.

The district shall not discriminate against any student on the basis of the student's marital status, pregnancy, childbirth, false pregnancy, termination of pregnancy, or related recovery.

Married, expectant and parenting students shall have the same educational and extracurricular opportunities as all students. Participation in special programs or schools shall be voluntary. Any education program or activity, including any class or extracurricular activity, that is offered separately to such students shall be comparable to that offered to other district students. A student's participation in such programs shall be voluntary.

Any complaint of discrimination on the basis of pregnancy or marital or parental status shall be addressed through the district's uniform complaint procedures in accordance with 5 CCR 4600-4687 and BP/AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures.

For school-related purposes, married students under the age of 18 are emancipated minors and have all the rights and privileges of students who are 18, even if the marriage has been dissolved. (Family Code 7002)

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board regarding the effectiveness of district strategies to support married, pregnant, and parenting students, which may include data on participation rates in district programs and services, academic achievement, school attendance, graduation rate, and/or student feedback on district programs and services.

Expectant and Parenting Students

The Board is committed to providing to expectant and parenting students and their children a comprehensive, continuous, community-linked program that reflects the cultural and linguistic diversity of the community.

Pregnant and parenting students shall retain the right to participate in any comprehensive school or educational alternative program. The classroom setting shall be the preferred instructional strategy unless an alternative is necessary to meet the needs of the student and/or his/her child.

When necessary, the district shall provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant and parenting students to enable them to access the educational program. A pregnant student shall have access to any services available to other students with temporary disabilities or medical conditions. A lactating student shall have access to a private location, other than a restroom, to breastfeed or express milk for her infant child.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with the County Superintendent of Schools and other community agencies and organizations to ensure that appropriate educational and related support services are available to meet the needs of expectant and parenting students their children.

Expectant and parenting students retain the right to participate in any comprehensive school or educational alternative programs. School placement and instructional strategies for participating students shall be based on the needs and learning styles of individual students. The classroom setting shall be the preferred instructional strategy unless an alternative is necessary to meet the needs of the individual student and/or child. (Education Code 54745)

In addition to providing a quality education program for expectant and parenting students, the district's program shall provide parenting education and life skills instruction, special school nutrition supplements for pregnant and lactating students, and a child care and development program on or near the school site for the children of enrolled students. The district's program may provide other support services authorized by Education Code 54746 as necessary to meet the needs of students and their children. (Education Code 54745)

To the extent feasible, educational and related support services shall be provided, either through the district or in collaboration with community agencies and organizations, to meet the needs of pregnant and parenting students and their children. Such services may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Child care and development services for the children of parenting students on or near school site(s) during the school day and during school-sponsored activities
- 2. Parenting education and life skills instruction
- 3. Academic and personal counseling
- 4. Supplemental instruction to assist students in achieving grade-level academic standards and progressing toward graduation

As appropriate, teachers, administrators, and/or other personnel who work with pregnant and parenting students shall receive related professional development.

Pregnant or parenting students may be excused for absences related to confidential medical appointments in accordance with BP/AR 5113 - Absences and Excuses.

The Superintendent or designee shall grant a student a leave of absence due to pregnancy, childbirth, false pregnancy, termination of pregnancy, and related recovery for as long as it is deemed medically necessary by her physician. At the conclusion of the leave, the student shall be reinstated to the status she held when the leave began.

A pregnant or parenting student also may request exemption from attendance because of a related physical or mental condition or because of personal services that must be rendered to a dependent

Pregnancy Prevention Program

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that age-appropriate, culturally sensitive and community-sensitive instruction and services are available to assist in the prevention of pregnancy among minors. The district's program shall be based on strategies that have proven effective in reducing the incidence of pregnancy among school-age youth. Instruction shall be consistent with the district's family life/sex education curriculum.

Instruction BP 6142.91

READING / LANGUAGE ARTS INSTRUCTION

The Board of Education recognizes that reading and other language arts constitute the basic foundation for learning in other areas of study. Students should develop an appreciation for literature and for reading as a means to acquire knowledge. They also should develop oral and written language skills that enable them to effectively communicate with others.

The Board desires to offer a comprehensive, balanced reading/language arts program that ensures all students have the skills necessary to read fluently and for meaning. The program shall integrate reading, writing, speaking, and listening activities in order to build effective communication skills.

For each grade level, the Board shall adopt academic standards in reading, speaking, and writing, including spelling and grammar that meet or exceed state standards. The district's program also shall be aligned with the state framework for reading/language arts instruction. that meet or exceed Common Core State Standards in the following strands:

- Reading: Foundational skills, text complexity and analysis, and the growth of comprehension
- 2. Writing: Text types, responding to reading, production and distribution of writings, and research
- 3. Speaking and listening: Oral language development, comprehension, flexible communication, and collaboration
- 4. Language: Conventions, effective use, knowledge of language, and vocabulary

Teachers are encouraged to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying abilities of more advanced readers.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' developing literacy, and the ability to draw from a variety of instructional strategies and materials.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district's reading/language arts program offers sufficient access to <u>standards-aligned</u> textbooks and other instructional materials. <u>The program shall provide instructional materials</u> of varying levels of difficulty, including fiction and nonfiction works, so that students are continually reading at an appropriate level. In addition, technology should be available to support all areas of literacy.

Teachers are expected to use a variety of instructional strategies to accommodate the needs of beginning readers and the varying abilities of more advanced readers. The program shall provide ongoing diagnosis of students' skills and, as needed, may provide supplementary instruction during the school day and/or outside the regular school session to assist students who are experiencing difficulty learning to read.

The Superintendent or designee shall make available professional development opportunities that are designed to provide instructional staff with knowledge about how students develop language skills, the ability to analyze students' literacy levels, and mastery of a variety of

instructional strategies and materials.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly provide the Board with data from state and district reading assessments and program evaluations to enable the Board to monitor program effectiveness.

Grades K-3

The goal of the district's early literacy program shall be to ensure that students are able to read fluently and at grade level by the end of third grade. To reach this goal, the Superintendent or designee shall design a balanced and comprehensive reading/language arts program with the following components:

- 1. Explicit skill development for beginning readers that includes phonemic awareness, phonics and decoding skills, and sufficient practice and repetition of these skills
- 2. A strong literature, language, and comprehension program that includes a balance of oral and written language
- 3. Ongoing diagnosis of students' skills
- 4. An early intervention program that provides assistance to students at risk of reading failure

Grades 4-12

The Board recognizes that reading/language arts instruction is an integral component of the curriculum at all grade levels. Continuous progress in fluency and comprehension shall be the goal of reading/language arts instruction in grades 4-12.

The program in these grades shall promote reading for subject matter comprehension, developing understanding of progressively more advanced reading material, analyzing and discussing a variety of reading materials, increasing the frequency of reading, developing more complex writing skills with attention to composition and vocabulary, and developing other communications skills.

When students in these grades do not have fully developed reading/language arts skills, the Superintendent or designee shall make resources available to assist them in reaching a reading level sufficient to meet the demands of grade-level material. Staff at all grade levels and in every subject shall take responsibility for supporting and expanding students' literacy skills.

Supplementary Reading Instruction for Grades K-4

When state funding is available, the Board may offer students in grades K-4 increased instructional opportunities before or after school and/or outside the regular school session to assist those students who are experiencing difficulty learning to read and to increase the reading skills and reading enjoyment of all students.

MATHEMATICS INSTRUCTION

The Board of Education desires to offer a rigorous mathematics program that provides a strong foundation in basic mathematical skills and prepares students to apply mathematics in real life. progressively develops the knowledge and skills students will need to succeed in college and career. The district's mathematics program shall be designed to teach mathematical concepts in the context of real-world situations and to help students gain a strong conceptual understanding, a high degree of procedural skill and fluency, and ability to apply mathematics to solve problems.

For each grade level, the Board shall adopt academic standards for mathematics that meet or exceed the Common Core State Standards. The Superintendent or designee shall develop or select curricula that are aligned with these standards and the state curriculum framework.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop grade-level curricula that offer a balanced instructional program, including but not limited to:

- Basic mathematical skills: quantification, basic facts, sorting and classification, and computational skills including addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, squares and square roots
- Conceptual understanding: knowledge and application of facts and definitions, identification of principles, understanding of relationships among mathematical concepts, recognition and application of signs, symbols and terms
- 3. Problem solving: use of mathematical concepts, skills, tools and reasoning strategies to formulate and solve problems in a variety of situations

The mathematics program shall develop such knowledge and skills in the subject areas of numbers, measurement, geometry, functions, statistics and probability, logic, algebra and discrete mathematics. Students should know, understand and demonstrate concepts through their application to classroom and real-life situations.

The district's mathematics program shall address the following standards for mathematical practices which are the basis for mathematics instruction and learning:

- Overarching habits of mind of a productive mathematical thinker: Making sense of problems and persevering in solving them; attending to precision
- Reasoning and explaining: Reasoning abstractly and quantitatively; constructing viable arguments and critiquing the reasoning of others
- 3. Modeling and using tools: Modeling with mathematics; using appropriate tools strategically
- 4. Seeing structure and generalizing: Looking for and making use of structure; looking for and expressing regularity in repeated reasoning

In addition, the program shall be aligned with grade-level standards for mathematics content.

For grades K-8, content shall address, at appropriate grade levels, counting and cardinality, operations and algebraic thinking, number and operations in base ten, fractions, measurement

and data, geometry, ratios and proportional relationships, functions, expression and equations, the number system, and statistics and probability. Students shall learn the concepts and skills that prepare them for the rigor of higher mathematics.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all students have many opportunities to take the full range of mathematics course options.

For higher mathematics, the district shall offer a pathway of courses through which students shall be taught concepts that address number and quantity, algebra, functions, modeling, geometry, trigonometry, calculus, and statistics and probability.

The Board shall establish specific content and performance standards in mathematical skills, concepts and problem-solving ability for each grade level. Students at risk of failing to meet performance standards shall receive additional assistance and intervention.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that certificated staff have opportunities to participate in professional development activities designed to increase their knowledge and skills in effective mathematics teaching practices.

<u>The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that</u> students shall have access to sufficient instructional materials, including manipulatives and technology, to support a balanced mathematics program.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with data from state and district mathematics assessments and program evaluations to enable the Board to monitor program effectiveness.

COMMENTS: Education Code (*EC*) Sections §35035 (g), §42130, and §42131 require the governing board of each local educational agency (*LEA*) to certify at least twice a year as to the LEA's ability to meets its financial obligations for the remainder for that fiscal year and for the subsequent two fiscal years.

The 2014-15 First Interim Budget was adopted by the Board of Education on December 11, 2014 and was approved by the Los Angeles County Office of Education *(LACOE)*.

This 2nd Interim Report reflects changing conditions that have necessitated adjusting the District budget. All of the expenditure and revenue changes previously approved by the Board at the meeting of February 19, 2015 are identified in the Second Interim Report which is included as a part of this document.

The Second Interim Report was developed based on the following Revenue and Expenditure Assumptions.

REVENUE ASSUMPTIONS

The District is using the State Adopted Budget for 2014-15 budget projection, and using the Governor's proposed budget in January 2015 to develop the 2015-16 and 2016-17 budgets. OTHER PROGRAMS

Educational Protection Act (EPA)

After passage of Proposition 30, the Schools and Local Public Safety Protection Act of 2012, the District received funds through a new Education Protection Account to help stabilize school budgets and restore educational opportunities that were decimated by revenue shortfalls brought by the Recession. 



Any school participating in school-based program coordination shall not be required to meet any state laws or regulations for any coordinated program listed above, except as specifically provided under the School-Based Program Coordination Act. (Education Code 52851)

DELETION OF AR 5146 - MARRIED / PREGNANT / PARENTING STUDENTS RE:

INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.03

This is to inform the Board of Education that AR 5146 – Married/Pregnant/Parenting Students has been deleted.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends this updating this policy to reflect new law (AB 97), which redirects funding for the California School Age Families Education (Cal-SAFE) program into the LCFF and thereby eliminates the mandate for program participants to adopt related policy. The material related to pregnancy prevention will also be deleted, since the issue is appropriately addressed in other policies. In addition, the policy will be revised to (1) require the use of uniform complaint procedures for complaints regarding discrimination on the basis of a student's marital, pregnancy, or parental status; (2) add material on program evaluation; (3) reflect new U.S. Department of Education Guidance regarding reasonable accommodations to enable pregnant and parenting students to access the educational program; and (4) reflect federal regulations addressing the circumstances under which a student may be required to obtain medical certification in order to participate in a program or activity.

> The regulation will be deleted, since funding for the Cal-SAFE program was redirected into the LCFF pursuant to new law (AB 97).

MARRIED / PREGNANT / PARENTING STUDENTS

The Superintendent or designee may grant a student a leave of absence due to pregnancy, childbirth or abortion for as long as it is deemed medically necessary. At the conclusion of the leave, the student shall be reinstated to the status she held when the leave began. (34 CFR 106.40)

A pregnant or parenting student also may request exemption from attendance because of a physical or mental condition or because of personal services that must be rendered to a dependent. (Education Code 48410)

Cal-SAFE Program

A male or female student shall be eligible to enroll in the district's California School Age Families Education (Cal-SAFE) program if he/she: (Education Code 54747, 56026)

- 1. Is an expectant parent, custodial parent, or noncustodial parent taking an active role in the care and supervision of the child
- 2. Has not earned a high school diploma or its equivalent
- Meets one of the following additional conditions:
 - a. Is age 18 years of age or younger.
 - b. Is age 19 and has been continuously enrolled in the program since before his/her 19th birthday. Such a student may be enrolled in the program for one additional semester.
 - c. The student is below age 22 and has an active individualized education plan.

Students shall be enrolled in the program on an open-entry and open-exit basis. (Education Code 54745)

A student shall not be denied initial or continuous enrollment because of having had multiple pregnancies, more than one child, or a change in eligibility status from expectant to parenting. (Education Code 54747)

No fees shall be charged to students or their families for services provided through the district's Cal-SAFE program. (Education Code 54745)

The Superintendent or designee shall complete an intake procedure regarding each student upon entry into the program, and periodically thereafter as necessary, to determine appropriate levels and types of services to be provided. (Education Code 54746)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide staff development and conduct community outreach in order to establish a positive learning environment and supportive school policies. (Education Code 54745)

The Superintendent or designee shall participate in the development of the county service coordination plan for providing educational and related support services to expectant and parenting teens and their children. He/she also shall participate in data collection and evaluation of the program. (Education Code 54744, 54745)

This is to inform the Board of Education that AR 5148.1 – Child Care Services for Parenting Students has been deleted.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends this regulation be deleted, since new law (AB 97) redirects funding for the Cal-SAFE program into the LCFF.

Students AR 5148.1

CHILD CARE SERVICES FOR PARENTING STUDENTS

Cal-SAFE Program

The district shall provide child care and development services on or near the school site for the children of teen parents enrolled in the district's California School Age Families Education (Cal-SAFE) program. Such services shall be available whenever enrolled teen parents are participating in a school-approved activity during or outside the school day. (Education Code 54743, 54746)

Participation in the child care and development services shall be voluntary. (Education Code 54746)

No fees shall be assessed for child care and development services provided through the Cal-SAFE program. (Education Code 54745)

Children of teen parents shall be eligible for enrollment from birth to age five years or until they enroll in kindergarten, whichever occurs first, as long as the teen parent is enrolled in the district's Cal-SAFE program. If the teen parent is enrolled in a summer school program or a school program operating more than 180 days, eligibility shall be determined by the parent's hours of enrollment and only for those hours necessary to further the completion of the parent's educational program. (Education Code 54746, 54749)

Before a child is enrolled in the program or allowed on the school campus, he/she shall have a health evaluation form signed by a physician or the physician's designee. Health screening and immunizations shall not be required when the child's parent/guardian annually files a written request pursuant to Education Code 49451 or Health and Safety Code 120365. (Education Code 54746)

The Superintendent or designee shall complete an intake procedure regarding each child upon entry into the program, and periodically as needed thereafter, and shall maintain a developmental profile for each child in order to design a program that meets the child's developmental needs. (Education Code 54746)

Child care and development services shall operate pursuant to applicable sections of Education Code 8200-8498, the Child Care and Development Services Act, and shall meet the health and safety requirements of 22 CCR 101151-10123.92 and 101351-101439.1. (Education Code 54746)

The child care site shall be available as a laboratory for parenting or related courses, with priority given to teen parents enrolled in the district's Cal-SAFE program. (Education Code 54746)
