

SBAC Budget Package Presentations

KEY POINTS FOR LISTENING AND LEARNING

- 1. Understand what *you* need to be have clarified for each program package presented. This is not a time for advocacy but rather understanding.
- 2. Focus on *how* changes in program and services will be delivered and at what level of quality to promote capacities for SMMUSD graduates.
 - a. The Superintendent, Ex. Cabinet and the Board will finalize the numbers based on the priorities SBAC agrees on.
- 3. Acknowledge that investment in personnel services has significant impact in terms of percentage of overall total costs.
 - a. Changes in personnel will be handled by the Superintendent's office and will be described in terms of effect on programs.
 - b. SBAC is not focused on specific positions
- 4. Identify areas you are most concerned about and if you understand how the data inform the presentation package.
 - a. Listen for assumptions based on data and how they have been used in package construction.
 - Examples of data may include: 1) enrollment increases or decreases, 2) current levels of funding and impact on services and program delivery, 3) clear description staffing positions *not* individual names, 4) clear explanations of differential delivery of services and programs for reasons of equity or identified need require careful explanation of how differences were determined.
 - c. Helpful information includes how program service affects numbers of students.
- 5. Recognize presenters may use other personnel in clarifying how their programs/services are configured. Understand that staff may also describe how they utilized planning committees of principals, teachers, parents, students, and/or administrators (representatives) in their processes.
- 6. "Givens" must be clarified so that the full (SBAC) group has a shared understanding.
- 7. "Benchmarking" information about comparisons to other districts is often useful; however, care is required because comparisons (i.e., transportation costs, facilities, health services, etc.) may vary by conditions and demography of any given community.
