Chris Gary, Santa Monica High School - Mr. Gary reported that

- 4) December 5 is the ASB blood drive; it is hoped that this year's level will exceed all previous year's
- 5) ASB is working diligently to raise money for various projects; the Board will be updated as events unfold

# B. School Reports - Juan Cabrillo Elementary School

Beth Pugh, Cabrillo PTA President, reported that the Cabrillo PTA is one of the most supportive parental bodies she has ever worked with; they have dedicated this year to trying to provide adequate funding for all identified projects. Of special interest this year is the funding of an additional teacher to develop the Science curriculum, run the Science labs and take care of the classroom components.

On behalf the Cabrillo parents, students and teachers, Mrs. Pugh respectfully

requested that the Board try to find funding for at least one full time PE teacher for each district elementary school.

Among the things to be sponsored by PTA this year are free "Family Nights" at the school, further development of the mentoring program with Malibu High School students, and providing needed funds to students in need for school trips, etc.

- √ State of the Schools the Superintendent reported that he was expecting an formal report from Jacobs Engineering relative to updating the work progress at all sites before mid-December. The Board and public will be notified; the Board may choose to entertain the idea of an joint meeting between itself and Jacobs to hear the report and have the opportunity to question the company's principals.
- ✓ Strategic Planning Update Mr. Deasy announced two very important Strategic Planning meetings, one in at Malibu High School Library, November 14, from 5:30 to 7:30 P.M., and the other in the Library of Muir/SMASH, November 18 from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M. The meetings will be staffed by parent volunteers and Planning Committee members who will assist community members with taking the on-line interviews (relative to the Strategic Planning process) that are currently available on the website. The object of the interviews is community outreach: by gathering information that is important to under-represented community subgroups, the Planning Committee can augment the scope of the process to be inclusive. Anyone is welcome, translation is available, as are refreshments.

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.15

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the attached Site Governance Council-approved budget for Webster Elementary School. Funds for this award are determined by the State Department of Education, with half of the award going to the Site Governance Council for school site use and the other half for bonuses for all staff assigned to the site, based on the F.T.E. calculation.

### BACKGROUND AND RATIONALE

Award "A" was approved in May of 2001 and the funds were allocated based on A.D.A. at those schools that qualified. This award, Award "B", is the second Governance Performance Award. Eligibility is based on a school meeting or exceeding its 5% growth target on the A.P.I. The growth must also meet or exceed 80% of the schools target for significant subgroups. Elementary and middle schools must have 95% of the enrolled students participating in the SAT9. High schools must have 90% of the enrolled students participating in the SAT9.

Guidelines that were used when developing the plan include:

- connecting the expenditure with School Improvement Plan;
- focusing on improving student learning;
- · looking for ways to maximize the dollars;
- keeping collective bargaining groups in mind regarding contract, salaries and working conditions, and
- concentrating on one-time expenditures, such as materials, supplies and equipment.

### COMMENT

There is a contingency amount of 20% allocated at each site by the Site Governance Council to pay for the benefits that were added to each bonus for the staff. The legislation did not allow for the State funds to pay these benefits. Therefore, the District requested that each site provide a fund to cover this payment. The practice was advised by the State.

### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.16

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 4113, Assignment. This item was previously discussed by the Board at the meetings of 10/4/01 and 10/18/01.

COMMENTS: BP 4113 (Assignment) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would replace existing BP 4113 which was adopted by the Board on November 5, 1998. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the current provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This is a revised and MANDATED policy which includes language encouraging assignment of fully qualified teachers to the <del>lowest performing</del> schools of greatest risk, and a note regarding a NEW LAW that establishes incentives for teachers with National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) certification to teach in low-performing schools for four years.

Education Code 35035 gives the Superintendent or designee the authority to assign personnel subject to Board approval.

The policy addresses the need to assign qualified teachers to the lowest performing schools of greatest risk. Education Code 44395 provides one-time \$10,000 merit awards to teachers who are employed by districts, including charter schools, and who have attained certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards. SB 1666 (Ch. 70, Statutes of 2000) amended Education Code 44395 to provide an additional \$20,000 if the teacher agrees to teach for four years in a low performing school identified as one of greatest risk, defined as one that is in the bottom half of all schools statewide based on the Academic Performance Index.

Education Code 44250-44279 addresses credential types and provides conditions under which specified teachers may be assigned outside the scope of their credentials. Among these statutes, Education Code 44258.3 allows the Board to assign the holder of a credential other than an emergency permit to teach any subjects in departmentalized classes in any of grades K-12, with the teacher's consent, provided that the Board first verifies that the teacher has adequate knowledge of each subject to be taught. If the district makes such assignments, Education Code 44258.3 mandates the Board to establish policies and procedures for verifying the adequacy of these teachers' subject knowledge; the following paragraph is provided for these districts.

Pursuant to Education Code 44258.9, the County Superintendent of Schools is responsible for monitoring teacher assignments and reporting to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC). In schools and districts likely to have misassignments based on past experience or other information, the County Superintendent must review assignment practices annually. In all other schools, he/she must review assignment practices on a four-year cycle. In counties in which there is a single school district, the CTC is responsible for monitoring teacher assignments. SMMUSD is reviewed on a four-year cycle with the next review scheduled for 2002-03.

Pursuant to Education Code 44258.9, the County Superintendent is required to notify any certificated administrator responsible for a misassignment and advise him/her to correct it within 30 calendar days. The County Superintendent is also required to notify the Superintendent of any district where five percent or more of the certificated teachers in the secondary schools are misassigned, advising him/her to correct the misassignments within 120 calendar days. Education Code 44258.9 also requires a teacher who believes he/she has been misassigned, after exhausting any local remedies, to file a written notification with the County Superintendent, who must advise the teacher as to the legality of the assignment within 15 working days.

Education Code 44258.7 allows the use of a committee to approve, in advance, the voluntary assignment of full-time teachers to teach an elective course outside their credential authorization in an area for which they have special skills or preparation. Assignments approved by such a committee can be made for any percentage of a teacher's assignment.

With respect to numbering of this policy, currently there is an existing BP 4113 on the same topic in our Board Policy Manual. When updating policy manuals, the existing BP 4113 should be discarded and replaced with this revised/updated policy version.

In order to serve the best interests of students and the educational program, the Superintendent or designee shall assign certificated personnel to positions for which their preparation, certification, experience and aptitude qualify them.

Teachers may be assigned to any school within the district in accordance with the collective bargaining agreement.

Teachers may be assigned outside the scope of their certificates or fields of study only as allowed by law and when so required in order to meet the needs of the educational program.

The Superintendent or designee may assign holders of a credential other than an emergency permit, with their consent, to teach subjects outside their credential authorization in departmentalized classes, pursuant to Education Code 44258.3. The Superintendent or designee shall develop procedures which the Board of Education shall use to verify the subject matter knowledge of the teacher before any such assignment is made. These procedures shall be developed with the assistance of subject matter specialists and shall be submitted to the Board for approval.

The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board on the legality of teacher assignments.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a committee on assignments which may grant approval for the voluntary assignment of full-time teachers to teach an elective course outside their credential authorization in an area for which they have special skills or preparation.

COMMENTS: BP 4111 (Recruitment and Selection) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's ongoing work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This policy has been updated by CSBA to reflect a NEW LAW providing incentive grants to districts to recruit and retain credentialed teachers in schools that are ranked at the bottom half of the state's Academic Performance Index.

This policy reflects the purposes of the Teacher Recruitment Incentive Program established by Education Code 44735, added by SB 1666 (Ch. 70, Statutes of 2000). Under this program, districts may apply for incentive grants to attract and retain credentialed teachers in schools ranking in the bottom half of the Academic Performance Index. Funds may be used at the discretion of the district for the purpose of reducing the number of teachers with emergency permits. Possible incentives listed in Education Code 44735 are included in the policy.

SB 1666 also added Education Code 44751 to establish six regional teacher recruitment centers across the state. With a focus on recruiting teachers to

low-performing schools of greatest need, the centers will, among other duties, provide information and counseling to prospective teachers, screen and distribute applications of prospective teachers to participating schools, and schedule interviews between candidates and school administrators.

### **Recruitment And Selection**

<u>The Board of Education believes that Because</u> an important factor in student achievement is the quality of the teaching staff. The Board of Education <u>therefore intends</u> desires to employ the most highly qualified and appropriate person available for each open position.

The Superintendent or designee shall recruit candidates for open positions based on an assessment of the district's needs for specific skills, knowledge and abilities. He/she shall develop job descriptions that accurately describe all essential and marginal functions and duties of each position, and shall disseminate job announcements to ensure a wide range of candidates.

The Superintendent or designee may provide incentives to recruit credentialed teachers to teach in any district school ranked in the bottom half of the state Academic Performance Index. Such incentives may include, but are not limited to, signing bonuses, improved work conditions, teacher compensation or housing subsidies.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop selection procedures that identify the best possible candidate for each position based on screening processes, interviews, observations, and recommendations from previous employers.

No inquiry shall be made with regard to the age, gender, race, ethnicity, religion, national origin, medical condition, disability or sexual orientation of a person seeking employment. During job interviews, applicants may be asked to describe or demonstrate how they will be able to perform the duties of the job.

District employment practices shall not discriminate against legal noncitizen residents. Inquiries to assure employment eligibility shall be made in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

For each position, the Superintendent or designee shall present to the Board, one candidate who meets all qualifications established by law and the Board of Education for the position. No person shall be employed by the Board without the recommendation or endorsement of the Superintendent or designee.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 3550, Food Service/Child Nutrition Program. This item was previously discussed at the Board meetings of 10/4/01 and 10/18/01.

COMMENTS: BP 3550 (Food Service/Child Nutrition Program) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's ongoing work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

This revised policy clarifies that the district's food service program is required to satisfy all legal requirements, including nutritional standards and dietary guidelines. The policy also contains updated legal citations and deletes references to out-dated State Board of Education policy.

Pursuant to 7 CFR 210.12, districts participating in the National School Lunch Program are encouraged to promote activities to involve students and parents/guardians in the program. The following optional paragraph reflects this intent and should be revised to reflect district practice.

In order to qualify for reimbursements under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, districts must comply with the nutritional standards specified in 7 CFR 210.10 and 220.8. The following paragraph is for use by districts participating in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs.

"Offer versus Serve" is an option which allows students to decline a certain number of meal items which they do not intend to consume while still allowing the meal to

qualify for reimbursement under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. Pursuant to 7 CFR 210.10 and 220.8, this option applies to high school students. At the Board's discretion, this option may be extended to students in all grades to the extent permitted by law.

This policy complies with CSBA guidelines in terms of numbering. However, the SMMUSD Board Policy Manual already has a BP 3550 on the record whose numbering is not in compliance with CSBA. The current BP 3550 will be manually renumbered as BP 3321. The new BP 3550 will then be inserted immediately after BP 3541.2 and immediately before BP 3553.

#### Food Service/Child Nutrition Program

The Board of Education recognizes that students need adequate, nourishing food in order to grow, learn and maintain good health. To reinforce the district's nutrition education program, foods available on school premises shall be:

- 1. Carefully selected so as to contribute to students' nutritional well-being and the prevention of disease
- 2. Prepared in ways which will appeal to students, retain nutritive quality and foster healthful eating habits
- 3. Served in age-appropriate quantities and at reasonable prices

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the meals offered by the district's food service program meet all legal requirements for participation in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies designed to encourage the participation of students and parents/guardians in the selection of foods of good nutritional quality for school menus. Parents/guardians are encouraged to support the district's nutrition education efforts by considering nutritional quality when selecting any snacks which they may donate for occasional class parties.

To the extent permitted under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, students in all grades shall be allowed to decline a certain number of meal items which they do not intend to consume.

COMMENTS: BP 3551 (Food Services Operation/Cafeteria Fund) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would be new to our District policy manual. The attached policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

> This is a MANDATED policy which contain new notes and text regarding the serving of meals to adults other than employees and Board members who are on campus during meal times. Revised option also clarifies that reimbursement for wages and benefits paid from the general fund may not exceed actual costs incurred.

> Education Code 38082 authorizes the cafeteria to sell food only to students, district employees, Board members and employees of the fund or association maintaining the cafeteria. Districts that wish to provide meals to other persons are mandated to adopt a resolution authorizing the provision of meals to other persons. In Management Bulletin No. 00-111, the California Department of Education addresses the issue of serving of meals provided under the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs to persons other than those specified in Education Code 38082. recommends that the Board's policy or resolution specify the circumstances under which those other persons will be served and the means by which the district will ensure that costs of meals are not subsidized by federal or state reimbursements.

Pursuant to Education Code 45103.5, districts may contract with food service management companies only for consulting services for a period of one year. Such companies are not allowed to manage or operate food service programs on behalf of a district. However, it appears permissible under Education Code 45103.5 for a district to enter into a franchise agreement under which a school operates the food service as a fast food company franchise, paying the private company for training, recipes and the use of its logos. The food would be prepared at the school, and the franchise agreement would be subject to the competitive bidding requirements of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs, as would the purchase of food products.

With respect to placement of this item in the Board Policy Manual, this policy will be inserted after BP 3550 and before BP 3553.

#### Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund

The Board of Education intends that, insofar as possible, school food services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. Upon recommendation of the Superintendent or designee, the Board shall review and approve meal prices. Program financial reports shall be presented regularly to the Board.

Meals may be offered to employees and Board members as a matter of convenience. Since these meals may include federally donated food commodities, their price shall be set in accordance with state and federal guidelines.

Meals may be served to adults other than employees and Board members who are on campus during meal times for a legitimate purpose, such as serving as a classroom volunteer. Since these meals may include federally donated food commodities, their price shall be set in accordance with state and federal guidelines.

#### A. Cafeteria Fund

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a cafeteria fund independent of the district's general fund.

The wages, salaries and benefits of food service employees shall be paid from the cafeteria fund. (Education Code 38103)

To increase cost effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall centralize and direct the purchasing of food and supplies, the planning of menus, and the auditing of all food service accounts for the district.

#### B. Contracts with Outside Providers

With Board approval, the district may enter into a contract for management consulting services related to food service on a year-to-year basis.

With Board approval, the district may enter into a contract with a private company that enables a school to operate a franchise offering fast food items for sale to students. The franchise agreement and food purchases shall be subject to the competitive bidding requirements of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 3580, District Records. This policy has been discussed by the Board at the meetings of 10/04/01 and 10/18/01.

COMMENTS: BP 3580 (District Records) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's on-going work to establish, revise and update Board policies. This particular policy, if adopted, would replace existing BP 3589 (attached) which was adopted in October, 1988. The updated policy is recommended by the California School Board's Association (CSBA) as meeting the provisions of all new laws and regulations. The CSBA recommended policy was last updated in March, 2001.

CSBA updated this Policy to reflect NEW LAW which authorizes the participation of victims of stalking in the Secretary of State's confidential address program.

Although 5 CCR 16022 authorizes districts to store permanent records only on microfilm, Education Code 35254, as amended by AB 1600 (Ch. 646, Statutes of 1999), now authorizes electronic district records. It is likely that Title 5 regulations will be amended to reflect this new law.

Government Code 6207 provides that, when creating a public record, the district must not include actual residences of students, parents/guardians or employees who have been victims of domestic violence when a substitute address is designated through the Secretary of State's Safe At Home Program (formerly known as the California Confidential Address Program (Cal CAP)). As amended by SB 1318 (Ch. 562, Statutes of 2000), victims of stalking may also participate in this program pursuant to Government Code 6205.5.

Districts are required to accept the program participation card issued by the Secretary of State and Substitute a P.O. Box address as the participant's real address. According to the Secretary of State, a participant's confidential, actual address may only be used to establish district eligibility and for school emergency purposes. Pursuant to Government Code 6207, a participant's confidential, actual address is not a public record and should not be made available to anyone under any circumstances.

With respect to numbering of Board policies, this updated version of BP 3580 conforms to CSBA numbering guidelines and is intended to replace the current version of BP 3580 which is in the Board Policy Manual.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 3511, Energy and Water Conservation. This item was previously discussed by the Board at the meetings of 10/4/01 and 10/18/01.

COMMENTS: BP 3511 (Energy and Water Conservation) is being recommended for adoption as part of the Board's ongoing work to establish, revise and update Board policies.

This policy was first introduced on CSBA's web site in February 2001. The Policy was revised to reflect recommendations by the California Department of Education designed to help districts deal with power outages and to conserve energy. The Policy contains language regarding the development of an energy efficiency program and emergency action plan.

In the event that instructional time is lost as a result of an energy crisis, districts may request credit for the loss of ADA as detailed in the California Department of Education's Management Advisory 90-01.

The California Energy Commission administers the Bright Schools Program pursuant to Public Resources Code 25410-25421. This program offers specific services to help districts become more energy efficient by providing design and implementation assistance, conducting energy audit and feasibility studies, providing equipment bid specifications, assisting with installation and helping to secure loans for energy-related maintenance. In addition, CSBA administers the Smart Power Program which provides an independent evaluation of energy suppliers' for school districts and county office of education.

#### **Energy and Water Conservation**

The Board of Education is committed to reducing the district's demand for electricity and water in order to help conserve natural resources and to save money to support other district needs. To that end, the Board shall establish goals to help reduce the district's energy and water consumption.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish an energy efficiency program which shall include specific strategies designed to help the district use energy more efficiently and to help ensure that funds intended for student learning are not diverted to cover energy costs.

As part of the energy efficiency program, the Superintendent or designee shall develop an emergency action plan to address actions to be taken in the event of power outages in schools, both during and after school operations. The action plan shall also address the role of staff, students and parents/guardians in helping to conserve resources and other activities to help the district meet energy reduction goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall analyze the effect of a utility rate increase on the district's budget. He/she shall develop and implement any necessary contingency plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly inspect district facilities and operations and make recommendations for maintenance and capital expenditures which may help the district reach its energy and water conservation goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall make every effort to identify funding opportunities and cost-reducing incentive programs to help the district achieve its conservation goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall <u>make an annual periodically</u> report to the Board on the district's progress in meeting energy and water use reduction goals.



DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D. 1

This report addresses the interpretation of the District API results.

#### Background Information

The API is the centerpiece of the statewide accountability system in California public education. The Public School Accountability Act (PSAA) of 1999 requires that the California Department of Education (CDE) annually calculate APIs for California Public Schools and publish rankings based on those APIs. The PSAA also requires the establishment of a minimum annual API growth target for each school that has not met the statewide API performance target of 800 or above.

#### Process

A school that meets API growth targets may be eligible for awards under the following programs:

- 1. The Governor's Performance Award Program
- 2. The Certificated Staff Performance Incentive Act

#### Time line

- 1. The State Board of Education (SBE) approved a methodology for calculating the 1999 API on a scale of 200-1000 on November 9, 2000.
- 2. SBE established a five-percent annual API growth target November 9, 2001 (State Target=800, School Score=720, to reach 800 you need to score 80 more points, therefore each year the 5% is based on the difference of the State Target of 800 and the School Score. For this example it would be 800-720=80 thus, 5% of 80=4)
- 3. Results for 2000-2001 school year were reported October 2001
- 4. The anticipated allocation date for API Funds is December/January 2001-02.

#### MEETING NOTE:

Ms. Reilly, Mr. Cannell and Mr. Dahl delivered a PowerPoint presentation, hard copies of which were distributed and are now attached hereto and made a part hereof of these original Minutes.

#### MEETING NOTE:

The Board thanked the presenters. Dr. Escarce noted that he was particularly pleased to see hard data relative to one of the Board's main interests, using data to improve instruction. Superintendent Deasy stated that administrative staff was currently discussing how best to use the referenced subgroups to assist with garnering meaningful longitudinal data, it being clear that certain subgroups were not demonstrating test scores that were indicative of district-wide student success. The Superintendent pledged that the work to ensure success for all students while simultaneously improving overall academic achievement would go forward

Board member Gottfried requested information relative to the district's legal responsibilities in terms of promoting school site councils, suggesting that, if necessary, a new Board Policy be prepared for Board approval/ratification. A short staff report will be provided in the future.

## Growth Report

These Explanatory Notes are designed to assist educators and other interested parties in interpreting the 2000-2001 Academic Performance Index (API) Growth Report. The Explanatory Notes provide details about calculating the Academic Performance Index (API) and API growth targets. The Notes also explain the criteria that were applied to determine whether or not schools met their growth targets and whether or not they were eligible for the school awards programs.

#### The Public Schools Accountability Act

The API is the centerpiece of the statewide accountability system in California public education. The Public Schools Accountability Act (PSAA) of 1999 (Chapter 3, Statutes of 1999, as amended by Chapter 695, Statutes of 2000), requires that the California Department of Education (CDE) annually calculate APIs for California public schools, including charter schools, and publish school rankings based on these APIs. The PSAA also requires the establishment of a minimum five-percent annual API growth target for each school as well as an overall statewide API performance target for all schools. A school that meets API growth targets may be eligible for awards under the following programs:

- · The Governor's Performance Award Program
- · The Certificated Staff Performance Incentive Act (Chapter 52, Statutes of 1999)

If a school fails to meet its annual growth target and its API score ranks in the bottom half state



wide, it will be identified for the Immediate Intervention / Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP).

On November 9, 1999, the State Board of Education (SBE):

- approved a methodology for calculating the 1999 API on a scale of 200 to 1000
- defined the five-percent annual API growth target
- established an interim statewide API performance target of 800

These actions cleared the way for the publication of the 1999 API Base Report. This report, which was released in January 2000, included each school's 1999 Base API, its statewide API rank by type of school (elementary, middle, and high), and API rank when compared to schools with similar background characteristics, as defined by the PSAA, and APIs for each numerically significant ethnic and socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup. It also set API growth targets for each school for the upcoming year.

The 1999-2000 API Growth Report was released in October 2000. It reported whether or not each school had met its 1999-2000 growth targets and whether or not the school was awards eligible.

c. Presentation

Each annual API reporting cycle includes two reports: a base report, which appears after the first of the calendar year, and a growth report, which appears after school starts in the fall. This pair of reports is based on APIs calculated in exactly the same fashion with the same indicators but using test results from two different years.

Eventually, the API will incorporate a number of different indicators; however, since 1999 to the present the API has consisted solely of results from the Stanford 9 norm-referenced assessment that is administered in conjunction with the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program. In January 2002 the API will be expanded to include some results from the California Standards Tests. Other required indicators will be added as they become available in the future.

#### Students Included in the API

The term "valid Stanford 9 test scores" as it appears in various API reports is synonymous with the number of students with Stanford 9 test results contributing to a school's API. In determining which test results should be included in the API, the CDE employed the same pupil exclusion rules used in calculating school-level STAR results that appear on the Internet at <a href="http://istar.cde.ca.gov">http://istar.cde.ca.gov</a>.

- 1. A pupil record was excluded if the Stanford 9 test administration accommodation for the pupil was more than one grade out of level (e.g., a sixth grader tested lower than 5<sup>th</sup> grade or higher than 7<sup>th</sup> grade).
- 2. A pupil record was excluded if any of the following seven test administration accommodations were marked "yes" for all Stanford 9 content areas:
- a. Braille
- b. Timing/Scheduling

- d. Response
- e. Test read aloud
- f. Directions translated
- g. Bilingual dictionary
- 3. A particular content area of a record was excluded if the percentile rank for that content area was not between 1 and 99.
- 4. A particular content area of a pupil record was excluded if the test administration accommodation for that content area was marked "yes" for any of the seven reasons under #2 above.

In addition, to comply with provisions of the PSAA regarding student mobility, a record is excluded if the pupil first attended the district in the current year as indicated on the STAR answer document. An exception is made for a student new to a district who has followed a normal matriculation pattern.

Certain core elements appear throughout the 2000-2001 API Growth Reports. They include:

- · STAR 2001 Percent Tested
- · 2001 API (Growth)
- · 2000 API (Base)
- · 2000-2001 Growth Target

- · Awards Eligible

#### STAR 2001 Percent Tested

This percentage is calculated by dividing the number of students tested by the nonexempt enrollment. The nonexempt enrollment is defined as the number of students enrolled in the first day of testing in the grades 2-11 minus the number of

students in those grades exempted from standardized testing due to Individualized Education Program statement, minus the number of students in those grades exempted from testing due to parent/guardian written request. The number is rounded down to the nearest whole number (e.g., 94.9=94) The STAR 2001 Apportionment Information Report is the source of these data.

#### 2001 API (Growth)

The 2001 API (Growth) summarizes a school's performance on the 2001 Stanford 9. It is calculated in exactly the same fashion as the 2000 API (Base).

#### 2000 API (Base)

The 2000 API (Base) summarizes a school's performance on the 2000 Stanford 9. It was released in January 2001. The API is on a scale of 200 to 1000. It is based on the performance of individual pupils on Stanford 9 content area tests as measured through national percentile rankings (NPRs). In some instances, APIs are also calculated for student subgroups at a school in order to ascertain whether the school meets the "comparable improvement" criterion (see page 5). For details on the calculation of the 2000 Base API, please consult the document titled Calculating the Academic Performance Index (January 2001), which is accessible through the PSAA web site at <a href="https://www.cde.ca.gov/psaa/api">www.cde.ca.gov/psaa/api</a>. (See News, Documents and Law, Reporting Cycle: 2000-2001.)

The structure of the test varies between two grade configuration segments: grades 2-8 and grades 9-11. For schools with grades in both segments, an API was calculated for each segment. The two APIs were averaged by weighting each segment API by the number of pupils with valid scores. For example, for a K-12 school, the API was the weighted average of the APIs for grades 2-8 and grades 9-11.

For a small number of schools with invalid 2000 Base APIs, the API listed is actually the 1999 Base API. In this instance, the API is footnoted appropriately.

#### 2000-2001 Growth Target

A school's 2000-2001 growth target was calculated by taking five percent of the distance between a school's 2000 Base API and the interim statewide performance target of 800. For a small number of schools with invalid 2000 Base APIs, the number listed under the 2000-2001 Growth Target is really a 1999-2001 Growth Target, which is double the 1999-2000 Growth Target. For any school with a 2000 API of 781 to 799, the annual growth target is one point. The growth target for any school with a base API of 800 or more is not listed as these schools need only to maintain an API of at least 800.

#### 2000-2001 Growth

A school's 2000-2001 growth is calculated by subtracting the school's 2000 API (Base) from its 2001 API (Growth).

#### Met Growth Target

A school met its 2000-2001 growth target if:

- · it met its school-wide growth target, and
- all numerically significant ethnic and socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroups at the school demonstrated comparable improvement.

Schools met the comparable improvement target if all numerically significant ethnic/racial and socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroups met their API subgroup targets, which in most cases is 80 percent of the school-wide 2000-2001 API growth target. For a full discussion, see the section on "Subgroups," beginning on page 5.

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#### Explanatory Notes for the 2000-2001 API Growth Report

#### Awards Eligible

Schools that met the following criteria may be eligible for the Governor's Performance Awards (GPA) Program:

- · the schools met both the school-wide API growth target and comparable improvement targets
- · the schools demonstrated a minimum growth of five points (this requirement is effective October 2001)
- · all numerically significant ethnic and socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroups at the schools demonstrated a minimum growth of four points (this requirement is effective October 2001)
- · elementary and middle schools had at least 95 percent participation rates in the 2001 Stanford 9; high schools had at least 90 percent participation rates in the 2001 Stanford 9

#### Structure of the Report

The 2000-2001 API Growth Report is composed of three parts:

- 1. County List of Schools
- 2. District List of Schools
- 3. School Report

#### Lists of Schools

These lists include all schools in a county or a district for which the CDE has calculated a 2001 API (Growth). In the county list, the schools are presented alphabetically by district and by type (elementary, middle, high, and small); in the district list, the schools are presented alphabetically by type.

Only schools included in the 2000 Base API Report appear on the lists of schools. New

schools that tested for the first time in 2001 will appear on the 2001 Base API Report, which will be released in January 2002.

Schools with nontraditional grade configurations, e.g., 7-12, have been placed into the school type according to standard criteria established by the California Department of Education. These criteria are available through: <a href="https://www.cde.ca.gov/psaa/api">www.cde.ca.gov/psaa/api</a>.

#### Schools on the Lists without APIs

A sizeable number of schools on the lists do not have APIs because they are participating in the Alternative Schools Accountability Model, which is presently under development. These include:

- Schools with fewer than 11 pupils with valid test scores in either 2000 or 2001
- Alternative schools serving nontraditional student populations

Other schools have had their 2001 growth APIs invalidated. Under regulations adopted by the SBE, this may occur for several reasons:

- adult testing irregularities have occurred at the school
- the API is not representative of the total pupil population at the school
- the school has experienced a significant demographic change in pupil population
- the rate of students who have been excused from STAR testing by parent request is equal to or greater than 10 percent (schools with rates between 10 percent and 20 percent will later be reevaluated through standard statistical tests to check the representativeness of the tested population)
- the school failed to test a significant proportion of its students in all content areas

Finally, some districts are correcting STAR demographic data with a resulting impact on

school-wide or subgroup APIs. The APIs for the affected schools will be reported in December 2001, after corrected data are received from the test publisher.

#### School Report

A *School Report* is generated for each school on the *List of Schools*. In addition to the common core elements, the *School Report* includes:

- · data on subgroups
- · school demographic characteristics

#### Subgroups

The law defines a "numerically significant ethnic or socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup" as a subgroup "that constitutes at least 15 percent of a school's total pupil population and consists of at least 30 pupils." Also, an ethnic or socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup of 100 pupils constitutes a numerically significant subgroup even if the subgroup does not constitute 15 percent of the school population. These numerical criteria (15 percent and 30 pupils, or 100 pupils) will be computed on the basis of the number of pupils with valid Stanford 9 scores for that subgroup.

The school is responsible for demonstrating comparable improvement only for those subgroups that are numerically significant in both 2000 and 2001. Ethnic/racial subgroups include the following:

- · African American not Hispanic
- · American Indian or Alaska Native
- Asian/Asian American
- Filipino/Filipino American
- Hispanic /Latino
- · Pacific Islander
- White (not of Hispanic origin)

According to the definition adopted by the SBE, the "socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup" consists of pupils who meet either one of two criteria:

1) Neither of the pupil's parents has received a high school diploma

#### OR

2) The pupil participates in the free or reduced price lunch program.

A pupil who is a member of the socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup is also a member of one of the racial/ethnic subgroups. Therefore, the total percentage of students in all numerically significant subgroups at a school may exceed 100.

To determine whether or not a numerically significant subgroup demonstrated comparable improvement, it is necessary to compute the 2000 API (Base) and the 2001 API (Growth) for each subgroup. Under the definition adopted by the State Board of Education, "comparable improvement" requires that each numerically significant subgroup must meet or exceed 80 percent of the 2000-2001 school-wide growth target. The 2000-2001 subgroup target was calculated by first multiplying the school-wide target by .8 and then rounding the product to the nearest whole number.

There were four minor exceptions to this rule:

- 1. For subgroups within schools with school-wide APIs between 781 and 799, i.e., approaching the statewide interim performance target of 800, the annual growth target was one point.
- 2. Regardless of the school-wide API, subgroups already at or above 800 had to continue to meet the statewide interim performance target of 800.

#### Explanatory Notes for the 2000-2001 API Growth Report

- 3. In schools with 2000 APIs of 800 or more, subgroups with an API of less than 800 had to make growth of at least one point.
- 4. In instances where 80 percent of the school-wide target results in a subgroup target that would exceed the distance from the subgroup API to 800, the subgroup target equalled the distance to 800.

Growth Targets and Award Eligibility

It is possible for a school to meet its school-wide and subgroup targets but fail to qualify for the GPA. As noted on page 3, a school must demonstrate a minimum of five points growth and all numerically significant subgroups at the school must demonstrate a minimum of four points' growth in order for the school to qualify for the GPA.

School Demographic Characteristics

Along with subgroup data, the *School Report* includes the demographic characteristics on which the school characteristics index for the upcoming 2001 Base API school rankings will be based. The data from which the percentages and rates are derived come from two sources:

- 1. October 2000 CBEDS data collection (information on teacher credentials, multi-track year round participation, and class size)
- 2. 2001 STAR student answer documents (information on ethnic/racial distribution, parent education level, participation in free or reduced price lunch program, school mobility, matriculation, English learners)

Regarding information taken from CBEDS:

 It is possible for one teacher to be in both the fullycredentialed and emergency-credential categories (e.g., a teacher holds a single subject emergency credential); therefore, the total of the percentages for "Fully credentialed teachers" and "Teachers with emergency credentials" may exceed 100.

- Average class sizes were derived from the enrollment data reported on the Professional Assignment Information Form (PAIF).
- "Core academic courses in departmentalized programs" reflects average class size in the following subject areas: English, Foreign Languages, Math, Science, and Social Science.

Regarding background characteristics derived from the STAR answer document:

 School mobility is the percentage of students who first attended the school in the current year. Students enrolled in the lowest grade at a school are excluded from this calculation. School mobility is used as a background characteristic only. The criterion for excluding a score from the API calculation district mobility, i.e., any student who began continuous enrollment in the district during the year tested.

The School Demographic Characteristics that appear on this report encompass students in the grades tested, i.e., 2-11. The characteristics will be used in the formation of the new similar schools comparison groups for the 2001 API (Base) Report.

Enclosed is the Association's Contract Proposal for 2001-02. In accordance with the provisions of section 3547 of the Educational Employment Relations Act, we ask that you "sunshine" our proposal at the next regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.

The condition of teacher salaries in Santa Monica Malibu and throughout California was not resolved as a result of the May 8, 2000 Action Day funding. While meaningful improvements in teacher salaries were made last year, teacher salaries remain far too low to attract and retain the best and the brightest into the profession. We must continue to build on the gains of last year and work to ensure that teacher salaries in SMMUSD are the envy of the state

During the 1990's teacher salaries, when adjusted for inflation, declined by 4% in the state of California. We cannot allow that to happen again. Teachers deserve a professional wage, one that at a minimum keeps up with the increased cost of living.

In order to achieve and maintain a competitive level, the SMMUSD Teachers' Salary Schedule must be improved. Although some cells of the SMMUSD Teachers' Salary Schedule compare favorably with other districts in the county, far too many do not.

Moreover, as noted in the 2000-01 edition of the Los Angeles County Survey of Salaries, SMMUSD ranks high in the percentage of budget spent on salaries for administrative and non-teaching personnel and not favorably for teacher salaries.

SMMCTA is interested in exploring the possibility of a multi year salary agreement.

In addition, SMMCTA will be opening several other Articles to be negotiated this year. (See page 2) We are eager to work with the District on class size, working conditions, and other professional matters during the 2001-02 Negotiations.

I look forward to scheduling dates for our upcoming negotiations.




