The next regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's Board of Education was held on September 19, 2002, in the City of Santa Monica's Council Chambers, 1685 Main Street, Santa Monica. Following Roll Call, at 5:00 PM, at the District's Administrative Offices, 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, the Board moved to Closed Session, for reasons listed in Section III, below. The Board reconvened in Open Session at 7:06 PM in the Council Chambers of the City of Santa Monica, 1685 Main Street, Santa Monica, California.

Moises Castillo, Santa Monica High School - Representative Castillo reported that the high school had held a recognition ceremony on September 11. There will also be a Welcome Back Rally, September 20, and back-to-school night September 24. Approximately 290 students are currently taking the California High School exit exam in either Math or Language Arts. There are 27 new teachers and seven new administrators at Samohi – everyone is receiving good reports! Finally, Mr. Castillo indicated that the ASB had appointed an academic representative to work closely with district and/or site personnel to give the student perspective on closing the achievement gap.

Christine Hoff, Malibu High School - Representative Hoff reported that Malibu High School had also had a 9/11 ceremony at which two trees were planted in the quad, having been dedicated to the honors of 9/11 heros. The ceremony was a good example of resurgent student unity and pride. Back-to-school nights are Tuesday and Thursday, September 24 and 26. The school hosted a league Volleyball meet. Finally, construction is nearing completion and everyone is ecstatic.

Mr. Deasy concurred with President Brownley's prior welcome to Board Member Jordan, stating that his presence had been missed as had his unique perspective and constructive comments. Mr. Jordan stated that he was relieved to be back and thanked the Board for its on-going support and good will. He also publicly thanked the PTA for its gift a gorgeous and huge orchid plant; quipped Dr. Jordan, "... we now have a new family member."

Mr. Deasy indicated that the District and SMMCTA had hoped to ratify the bargaining unit's contract at this evening's meeting but, regrettably, Los Angeles County Office of Education had not yet returned it with their approval. safeguard the rights of students, and insure

appropriate cooperation with law enforcement personnel

when they are questioning students.

Public Speakers:

Maria Loya, Santa Monica - representing the Mothers for Justice, addressed the Board stating that the Race and Discipline Task Force was, indeed, making excellent headway on the racial disparity challenges that are facing the district. Regrettably, she stated, that the district's intervention may have come too late. She indicated that, although this document was testament to the good work of the group, there is much work still to be done, including taking every step necessary to ensure equal enforcement of district policies. Finally, Ms. Loya state that she hoped the Board had the courage to hold administrators accountable.

Superintendent Deasy stated that these Administrative Regulations were the result of many hours of collaboration with many stakeholders; as a co-constructed guideline, it is very illustrative of the *in loco parentis* relationship the school enjoys with parents. The Superintendent stated that the District took that responsibility very seriously.

Members of the Board indicated that, although it was unusual for Administrative Regulations to come before the Board, each was grateful for the opportunity to review staff's work and to hear a brief update about the work of the Task Force.

III. PROTOCOL FOR ADMINISTRATORS WHEN LAW ENFORCEMENT PERSONNEL OUESTION STUDENTS

The principal of each school shall ensure that Board Policies and regulations related to student discipline are observed by all school staff, and that disciplinary rules are fairly and consistently enforced, without regard to race, creed, color, gender or sexual orientation.

Each time that representatives of law enforcement question a student on campus, whether they are summoned to a school campus or arrive in the course of their official duties, the principal will observe the following protocol.

Protocol For Administrators When Students Are Questioned By Law Enforcement

When a student becomes involved with law enforcement personnel, either as a suspect or a witness, in an incident that occurred outside of school, the law enforcement officer who attempts to question the student during the school day should first be requested to do so at a time when the student is not under the jurisdiction of the school. If that is not possible, the administrator must allow the law enforcement officer to discharge his/her duties on campus. However, administrators must exercise a proper standard of care, which consists of ascertaining the identity and official capacity of the law enforcement officer, the authority under which he/she acts, and the reasons for such action. (34 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 93, 95.)

In all matters involving the police, the role of the administrator is clear: he/she must act to safeguard the students' rights because of his/her in loco parentis relationship.

Whenever students may be questioned by a law enforcement officer, either as a suspect or a witness, whether the law enforcement officer arrives without notice or is summoned by school personnel, the school administrator or designee will observe the following protocol:

- 1. Complete the *Police on Campus Reporting Form*. (Board Policy 5144.1) Fax the completed form to the Pupil Services office. Retain one copy in an administrative file created specifically for these reports. Do not put copies in student files.
- 2. Except in cases of suspected child abuse, call the parents/guardians and inform them that law enforcement officers are on campus, or have been summoned to campus to question their child.
- 3. Inform the student of his/her right to have an administrator present during questioning.
- 4. Inform the student of his/her right to have their parents/guardians present at any time during questioning.
- 5. Inform the student of his/her right against selfincrimination and check for comprehension to insure that
 the student understands what that means. Students who agree
 to be questioned may change their minds during questioning,
 and request the presence of a parent/guardian. This must be
 construed as the student's desire to invoke his/her Fifth
 Amendment rights.
- 6. A student's request to have parents/guardians present must be construed as the student's desire to invoke his/her Fifth Amendment rights. (People v. Burton (1971) 6 Cal.3d 375.) A student is not required to answer questions after invoking the Fifth Amendment.

- 7. If the law enforcement officers decide that the student must be removed from campus, it is the responsibility of the administrator to take immediate steps to inform the parents/guardian regarding the release of the student to the law enforcement officers and the place to which he/she is being taken (except in cases of child abuse). (Education Code Section 48906)
- 8. If it is determined that law enforcement officers must remove a student from campus, it is the responsibility of the administrator to insist that the removal of the student is conducted in such a way that it safeguards the dignity, confidentiality and respect of the student.
- 9. Representatives of law enforcement may not have access to student records without written parent/guardian permission, subpoena or court order. Please see Pupil Services Bulletin on Confidentiality of Student Records.
- 10. Administrators who believe there has been misconduct on the part of the law enforcement officers should file a report with the appropriate law enforcement agency and the superintendent



COMMENT: This report has been especially prepared by Dr. Steven Frankel, Director of Standards Assessment and Data. Data from the longitudinal study is being used this year as part of the District's published goal to raise the level of student achievement while simultaneously bridging the achievement gap.

NOTE:

In introducing the discussion item to the Board and the general public, Superintendent Deasy made the following points:

1) the District easily could have chosen to provide very optimistic news because we are awash with good news

- 2) the choice was made to take a look at those areas in which we need to grow (areas in which we struggle) so the presentation is **grounded** in areas for growth
- 3) in order to eliminate the achievement gap while simultaneously raising achievement for all students, the formula must be

Improvement = funding + a lot of very hard work
School Improvement Plans (SIPs)will look very different
this year

- 4) initial analysis indicates that the achievement gap may not be language-based
- 5) the presentation provides not just the data but carefully thought-out recommendations relative to what we're going to DO about the (implications of the) data; the recommendations raise issues about access and equity as well as pedagogical imperatives
- 6) the district is not solely interested in testing, per se; we are interested in rigorous instruction and we are interested in the children in the classroom
- 7) the thrust of the program will be to place students in areas of varying degrees of support; the curriculum will remain the same for all students
- 8) any extensive, intensive intervention will fiscally impact the budgetary cycles for many years, starting with the 2003-04 budget
- 9) the Board will be encouraged to communicate with both the California Board of Education and the State Department of Education to persuasively call for a quickly available program of vertical equating (statewide comparison guidelines converting the SAT9 scores to the CAT 6 scores)

The Superintendent concluded by stating that he and staff have chosen to "put their beliefs out there" requesting that, if the Board shares in those beliefs strongly enough, that they send him back to the District with directions to proceed.

PUBLIC SPEAKERS:

Valette Graves Johnson, parent - as the program moves forward, please be sensitive to the stereotyping mind set that allegedly exists in some teachers; the success of the program rests with the belief (stated and implied) that all children can learn the same curriculum. It is critical.

Brian Quincy Hutchins, Santa Monica - addressed the Board regarding virtual reality and the use of classical language patterns and protocols to address achievement gaps.

Rick Gates, parent - adjusting the stated percentages of achievement so that there is true overall student improvement AND a bridging of the existing gap.

Following the presentation, the Board thanked Superintendent Deasy and Dr . Frankel for an excellent presentation. Discussion points from the Board included, but were not limited to:

1) the importance of an inclusive process in the design of the project; how will you make sure that all voices are heard?

Deasy: steps have already been taken, pending Board agreement, to convene a blue ribbon panel made of all stakeholders: parents, Ed Services staff, union reps, teachers, RAND researchers, etc., it being felt that if everyone were involved in the creation of the program, communication about it would be greatly heightened and the program, itself, would be more successful from the beginning.

- 2) does the inclusion of double periods mean the exclusion of other classes or the addition of an "A" period? Deasy: Regrettably, yes.
- 3) are there any steps to start the bridge-building in earlier grades?

 Deasy: First things first. That will be a priority, eventually. But our priority at this time is that the expectation around equity will be met so it doesn't matter when the student (s) catches up, but THAT he/she catches up.
- 4) what is the anticipated date for starting the program? Are we looking at a great deal of restructuring?

 Deasy: We are anticipating a Fall, 2003, kickoff date and, although there were be restructuring, the how's and what's have not been delineated. There will be public updates on process.
- 5) How will the stated percentages (5% and 7%) for overall and gap-bridging achievement, respectively, be adjusted to ensure that both goals are met? Also, won't it be easier for top-performing schools to meet their targets than lower performing schools

Deasy: We're working on it. We know it's not accurate but those figures (we have chosen to) represent our ideal growth.

what type of professional growth and/or other training will staff and teachers have to bridge the perceived non-academic gaps (e.g., socio-economic and racial)?

Deasy: The point (s) are well-taken. Administrators and faculty are extremely sensitive to these recurring challenges. We are developing mechanisms to ensure that professional development will include acculturation and other types of sensitivity training.

Following the discussion, the Board gave direction to the Superintendent to proceed with plan/program development with the expectation that the preliminary plan, complete with anticipated budgetary implications, would be brought before it in March, 2003.

Eliminating Tracking In The Middle School Mathematics Program

POSITION

<u>Placing middle school students</u> into accelerated and non-accelerated Mathematics classes:

- ... Contributes to disparities in Mathematics performance between Anglo and non-Anglo students:
- ... Adversely affects college admissions and career planning opportunities; and,
- ... Becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy for many students placed in non-accelerated classes.

A. Findings

- 1. The usual practice in SMMUSD elementary and middle schools is for 5th and 6th grade teachers to recommend placement of their students into accelerated and non-accelerated 6th and 7th grade Mathematics classes for the following year. (At Malibu High School, only 7th grade Mathematics students are divided up.)
- 2. The receiving Mathematics teachers ratify these decisions.
- 3. While self-nominations and parent requests are not advertised or encouraged, they are usually honored.
- 4. Teachers do not receive training or central office guidance in making these decisions.
- 5. Parents and students are not informed of the probable long-term effects of placement in the non-accelerated classes.
- 6. Uniform assessment procedures that are reliable for individual students aren't used.
- 7. Advocates of this grouping practice includes some teachers seeking to restrict the range of "abilities" in their classrooms, and some parents fearful that more inclusive grouping practices may lead to disruption and slower-paced instruction.
- 8. Thirty years of Title I research suggests that grouping strategies based on the separation of lower and higher performing students are usually racially disparate; produce marginal gains at best for both groups; and results in appreciable damage of other kinds for those placed in the lower groups.

- 9. Placements in the accelerated classes are racially disparate. Among students in the longitudinal sample who have been in SMMUSD for at least 4 years, 45-70% of Anglo and Asian students are in the accelerated classes, whereas 0-11% of Hispanic and African-American students are included.
- 10. Placement in the "regular" 6th and 7th grade Mathematics classes virtually preclude completing Geometry in the 9th grade, Calculus in the 12th grade, participating in advanced science courses, entering certain colleges or majors, and competing for some technical positions that do not require a 4-year degree.
- 11. There are two Mathematics sequences for most students.

- a. Class size reductions to 20:1 in double-period Mathematics classes and 25:1 in standard Mathematics classes.




A FIRST LOOK AT TEST SCORES 2001 - 2002







Cross-Sectional SAT-9 4-Year Trends



The Superintendent recommends the following support mechanisms

Class size reductions to 20:1 in double-period math classes and 25:1 in standard math classes.

Honors classes that include at least 30% additional content not required in the minimum CDE course of study.

A 4-year summer math camp for students who would not have been placed in the accelerated track.

Intensive training and support using the NCEE and IFL models for all math teachers.

Uniform annual review procedures to determine which kind of class will be recommended for each student for the following year (double-period, standard, honors). Students may opt to disregard recommendations and place themselves in a higher level class.



The Superintendent recommends strengthening high school math course offerings and graduation requirements

- 3 years of academic math in grades 9-12 for the classes of 2004 & 2005.
- 4 years of academic math in grades 9-12 for the classes of 2006 and beyond.
- A wider variety of 3rd and 4th year math electives, with some taught by local colleges, or via university-sponsored web sites. Offerings could include basic statistics, multivariate statistics, quantitative business analysis, probability & gaming theory, etc.
