A. Student Board Member Reports

Christine Hoff, Malibu High School - Ms. Hoff reported on:

- 1) a "Thank you" letter to the student body from President George Bush for the muchappreciated work on UNICEF
- 2) the opening of the new gymnasium; everything appears to be done and everyone is very eager to be able to use the new, modernized facility
- 3) ASB-sponsored the blood drive was very successful
- 4) all are invited to attend the choral concert December 17th

Moises Castillo, Santa Monica High School - Mr. Castillo reported on:

- 1) a very successful blood drive more than 125 pints were given, thanks to students and staff
- 2) 100 students attended a recent meeting on racial harmony
- school administration, ASB and the City of Santa Monica are working on a plan to relieve the traffic problems related to student drop off and pick before and after school
- 4) the winter concert will be in Barnum Hall; all are invited to attend
- 5) one severe concern is the student mentoring/tutoring program: the supply clearly exceeds the supply; Mr. Castillo requested help from the Board in retraining students so at risk students could be retained;
- 6) the student council is very interested in starting a peer counseling program; Mr. Castillo requested help from the Board about this, as well

Superintendent Deasy will look into both concerns with Drs. Straus and Kelly.

- **B** SMMCTA Report Harry Keiley, SMMCTA President, welcomed new Board members while thanking retiring Board members for their energy and support. Mr. Keiley also reported on:
 - 1) the monthly PAR (Peer Assistance Review) meeting was held recently at the SMMCTA office; five teachers enrolled and the union is now seeking additional consulting teachers; the hope is that this invaluable program survives State budget reductions
 - 2) the SMMCTA Evaluation Committee is reviewing the District's current evaluation process and aligning it to State standards
 - 3) statewide, CTA members are having conversations with State officials regarding the budget; the governing body of the representative assembly is making specific recommendations for budget cuts and potential revenue enhancements; all are trusting that a common ground will be found and that common understandings can be reached regarding the affects and effects of reductions
 - 4) requested that more information be given the Board and all District staff relative to the elimination of the Insurance Office position; he asked if dollars couldn't be saved elsewhere that would keep this position
- C. <u>SEIU Report</u> Keryl Cartee, SEIU Chief Steward, also thanked departing Board members and welcomed new ones, stated that she and the classified staff members represented by Local 660, looked forward to a long and meaningful relationship. A copy of Ms. Cartee's report is attached hereto and made a part hereof these original Minutes.
- D Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation None
- E. <u>PTA Council President Report</u> Cheri Orgel, PTA Council President: stated that the PTA is really busy trying to find additional practicable ways to help offset unresolved budget reductions. The Board and Superintendent can count on the Council and all individual site units to help wherever possible PTA'ers are true team players.

X Superintendent's Report

The Superintendent and/or Assistant Superintendents may report on items not requiring action by the board but are of interest to the Board and public.

- ✓ <u>Update on the Development of the District's Gift Policy</u> following a recent community meeting, at which a large number of disparate constituent groups were present and gave input, the Superintendent and senior staff will craft a proposed new gift policy. It is anticipated that the document, which will feature language around the spirit of the new giving philosophy, will come before the Board in late February for initial discussion.
- ✓ Additional Miscellaneous Updates thanks to the diligence of the Prop X committee, Wally Berriman and his excellent staff, and dedicated, hard work all around, the District is looking forward to a rapid sequence of opening new and/or modernized facilities by the beginning of the second semester. Potentially, this includes the new

Auditorium at Malibu High School, followed shortly by the new Classroom Building; Barnum hall for rehearsal and performance use; and, the Samohi Language Arts and Music Building. The JAMS Cafeteria and Auditorium are scheduled to be open for use several weeks ahead of schedule.

The Board may expect a Major Action Item to come before it shortly concerning the recommendation reorganization of the Personnel Commission. The recommendation is envisioned as a two-step process, aimed at reducing costs and maximizing dollars.

✓ Update on the Parcel Tax Committee - Mr. Deasy reported that the first meeting of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Parcel Tax held it's first (organizational) meeting on December 9. The group elected longtime District supporter, Neil Carrey, as its Chair, with Shari Davis and David Reznick as co-chairs. Taking its charge from the Board quite seriously, the committee anticipates presenting a very formal recommendation to the Board regarding the plausibility of placing a measure for a new parcel tax on the upcoming ballot. The committee is in general agreement that the District and the communities it serves must find methods and means to buffer itself from irresponsible state fiscal policies. The Superintendent reported that the initial committee dialog was good.

Teacher Internship Programs are designed to help districts meet shortages of qualified teachers, and to attract persons into teaching who would not normally enroll in a traditional preparation program. Internships provide an alternative route to certification that allows candidate to obtain credentials while teaching in classrooms. This arrangement requires cooperative agreements between participating LEA's and IHE's.

As the Lead Sponsor in the California State University, Northridge Single Subject University Single Subject Intern program, the <u>University will provide:</u>

- a teacher education program that consists of sequenced coursework leading to a Single Subject credential;
- classroom support and on-site supervision by university faculty (a minimum of two observations each of
 four semesters and one semester of student teaching with a minimum of 5 observations.) University
 supervisors and support providers will be paid by the IHE;
- a cohort seminar that links coursework with practice and establishes a network of collegial support.

As a Co-sponsor in the California State University, Northridge Single Subject University Intern Program, the LEA will provide:

- a support provider for each intern based upon teaching expertise and ability to mentor;
- training for support providers in techniques and practices in observation, feedback, and conferencing with interns (observations and conferences for each intern, a minimum of 3 times each semester).
- inform Support Providers of the need to observe, provide feedback and conference with interns a minimum of three times each semester.

As partners, the University and the LEA will insure that:

- candidates in an internship program assume the functions that are authorized by the regular standard credential and the interns' services meet the instructional or service needs of the participating district(s);
 Reference: Education Code Sections 44454 and 44458;
- interns do not displace certificated employees;
- no intern's salary is reduced by more than 1/8th of its total to pay for supervision, and the salary of the intern shall not be less than the minimum base salary paid to a regularly certificated person. It the intern's salary is reduced, no more than eight interns may be advised by one district support provider. Entering Education Code Section 44462.

It is recommended that the Board of Education ratify Resolution Number 02-07 - Construction of Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School Additions and Applying for State Grant Funding Beyond Eligibility.

COMMENTS: The District is seeking State funding for the Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School Additions under the State School Facilities Program or future State Bond Program funds. Because the eligible number of grants for each project is not sufficient to cover the construction costs, the District needs to request additional grants to assist in the funding of 50 percent of the State's share. The District is eligible to request grant unit funding from the State for "nonclassroom" space if certain conditions are met, as follows:

- ► A plan that describes how the District has or will adequately house the pupils receiving grants beyond the capacity of the project.
- Acknowledgment that funds for the purpose of housing pupils are being diverted to an alternative use.
- Acknowledgment that the State has satisfied its obligation to house the pupils receiving grants.

The following plan is an amendment to the original plan due to State requirements on use of grants. The State only allows the District to claim additional grants using the lowest grade level eligibility available. Since the District now has eligibility at grades 7-8, this grant use plan must be amended based on grades 7-8 rather than grades 9-12 as originally requested. This plan has been developed to demonstrate how the students will be adequately housed as required by the State. Adoption of the Resolution and California Department of Education plan approval fulfills the above State requirements to apply for excess grant funding.

The application for 50 percent State funding will be processed upon receipt of the Board's Resolution and approval by the California Department of Education.

FISCAL IMPACT

Revenue generation, no additional cost to the District.

Staff recommends a ratification of <u>Resolution Number</u> <u>02-07</u>, which benefits the District to obtain additional State Grant Funding to construct the Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School additions.

Plan For Housing Pupils to Utilize Grants For Santa Monica and Malibu High School Addition Projects

The District is in the process of planning new permanent additions to Santa Monica and Malibu High Schools that include 9 and 10 classrooms, respectively, and support facilities. The District is requesting grant units to fund the project from the State School Facility Program. Because the grant units claimed is beyond the number of classrooms that would normally be designed for these projects, the State Allocation Board requires the District to develop a plan to house the remaining students that may otherwise be unhoused. Additional grants must be claimed at the lowest grade level available first before claiming grants at higher grade levels. The District has 282 eligible grants at Grades 7-8, and must utilize additional grants from this grades level before requesting grants from Grades 9-12.

The State normally recognizes a project and approves grant funding based on the number of classrooms being constructed in the project for the respective grade level. Because some of the grant unit funding would be utilized to construct facilities that are not considered "classrooms," the plan must describe how the district will adequately house the pupils receiving grants beyond the project's capacity.

The Santa Monica and Malibu School Projects are requesting 85 and 95 excess grade 7-8 grants respectively. These students will be housed through loading students at 32 per classroom. This plan creates a total of additional 95 seats per school, which is equivalent to or exceeds the excess grants requested per project.

It is the District's goal that all students will be housed in standard classrooms of no less than 900 square feet. It is also the District's goal that all high schools have permanent core facilities such as gymnasium, performing arts, media center, administration, kitchen, bathrooms, etc. In order to achieve both goals, the District's plan is to house more students per classroom than the State loading standards. This plan demonstrates how all of the students are being housed for the grants used in this project.

The following provides the data to demonstrate the accommodation of all students at the schools for which projects are requesting excess grant units:

It is recommended that the Board of Education authorize increases in District costs for field trips and home-to-school transportation (bus passes), as detailed below. These increases will become effective at the start of the second semester on January 28, 2003:

COMMENTS: The costs of field trips and home-to-school transportation have greatly increased, and an increase in transportation fees is necessary to keep up with rising costs and to cover the General Fund contribution for home-to-school transportation. Bus pass fees are established by approval of the Board of Education and have not been increased since August 10, 2000.

NOTE: The above costs are <u>per bus</u> based on transporting 60 to 80 passengers at the <u>proposed</u> rate. Blue Bus costs are higher due to their smaller capacity per bus, and Tumbleweed is a very small contractor with limited availability (rarely is more than one bus available at a time).

Home-to-School Transportation

Every student who uses Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District transportation services (rides a regular bus route) is required to obtain a bus pass. This applies to all routes to all Malibu schools: Cabrillo, Pt. Dume and Webster Elementary Schools as well as Malibu Middle/High School.

Currently, the following exemptions apply for all students, permit and non-permit alike:

- 1) Any Special Education student for whom transportation is a part of the written IEP;
- 2) A resident Malibu student attending Santa Monica High School;
- 3) A resident Santa Monica student or non-resident permit student, attending any District school for which there is existing District transportation, for voluntary desegregation purposes;
- Any student, resident or non-resident, who qualifies for the District's free lunch program under current Federal guidelines. Resident or non-resident students who qualify for reduced lunches under current Federal guidelines will pay a reduced fee; and,
- 5) Pupils of School District employees are eligible to receive reduced bus pass fees for intradistrict transportation at current Board-approved reduced fee schedule.

Proof of eligibility for free or reduced fares must be provided at the time of application for ridership.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.1

There will be a discussion about the California State Budget, how it affects the School District's Budget and what possible areas may be targeted for reduction.

AGENDA

NOTE:

The attached document, <u>The California State Budget: Where We Are and Where We're Going</u>, is available in the published agenda, but is not available in the electronic version. Copies are available for public review in the Office of the Chief Financial Officer and will be available at the meeting.

MEETING NOTE:

Superintendent Deasy prefaced the presentation of this material by stating that the Board could expect a staff report at the next Board meeting, December 19, 2002, which would elucidate staff's understanding of the impact of the State's budget reductions on the District. He anticipated that the report would explore possible fiscal consequences of a series of state and local budgetary actions, as well as ways the District could begin to deal with the projected reductions.

Questions from Board members included but were not limited to:

- Q: Malibu has a negative number; in light of this financial news, can we finish all the projects?
 - A: We will have the balance to finish all projects when the liquidated damages are finalized.
- Q: Are there viable ways for the District to reduce the "5000" accounts?
 - A: As it is anticipated that next year's cuts may be even greater than those slated for this year (through June 30, 2003) staff is looking very closely at every way we spend money including currently performing an in-house study on how we spend every dollar on every conceivable expenditure
- Q: Which programs, if any, can survive without major contributions from the Local General Fund? (LGFC's)?
 - A: That is being explored. The main object is to not panic but to find ways to insulate ourselves from future cuts

by providing additional revenue streams (to offset the cuts).

- Q: Although there is some flexibility in the realm of transferring categorical money, does it buy anything?
 - A: It's being looked at. We would assume that certain entitlements for next year may be gone, too.
- Q: Can we include the possibility of relaxing the 3% reserve requirement through 2004?
 - A: Staff is diametrically opposed to spending down the reserve in any way. Doing so would preclude the possibility of any natural disasters, manifesting a real lack of fiscal responsibility.
- Q: Is anything currently being done to offset projected reductions?
 - A: Yes. For example, we are maintaining the hiring freeze and working collaboratively with both unions regarding upcoming contract negotiations.

PUBLIC SPEAKER:

Craiq Hamilton, Santa Monica - as a member of the Financial Oversight Committee and District parent, Mr. Hamilton stressed the importance of valid communication with all staff and the communities, using the Strategic Plan to reduce and possibly deal with less money, the need to make cuts in as equitable a way as possible and the need to look carefully at the educational viability of programs prior to their being restored.

In a summation, Superintendent Deasy stated that there were two trains of action that really needed to be communicated to the communities:

- there will be a modest cut (\$3.4 million) on current year programs, through June 30, 2003; and,
- 2) it is anticipated that there will a much larger cut (\$11 million, estimated) in the local general fund through June 30, 2004.

The seriousness of these anticipated reductions is propelling the work of the Ad Hoc Committee on the Parcel Tax.

Information Items


