Student Board Member Report October 2, 2003

The school year is well under way. We had back to school night this past Tuesday, and our College Fair will be next Tuesday the 7th of October. Students have settled into their classes nicely, and all the chaos that goes along with the beginning of the school year has pretty much ended.

We had our welcome rally September 19th, which I regret to say was not as successful as we had hoped. There were problems at the end of the rally due to a small group of juniors and seniors who threw bottles, tennis bottles, and pens, and refused to leave at the end of the rally. As a result the administration told the students there would be no more pep rallies. This was very upsetting because the actions of so few students had spoiled it for 3,500 others. The student body responded by creating a new plan for how to keep pep rallies fun and safe for all. This plan will go into action at our homecoming pep rally, October 24th.

The greatest problem of the moment is that we are with out a trainer. Under the third cut, the only cut that was not reinstated we lost funding for an athletic trainer. This makes it difficult to conduct interviews because we do not know how long we will be able to employ the trainer position. I truly hope the district will be able to help us in this matter, because the safety of our student athletes is at stake.

On a lighter note, we recently conducted our house representative elections, choosing two representatives for each house, and adding 12 new members to ASB. Tomorrow we will be conducting a mock California recall election, and yes we have had to put all 133 candidates on the ballot. I look forward to the result. This concludes my report.

Martha Cavigga donated \$100,00 to our art department and we are currently discussing how to use this money. We are very excited about what it will bring to the school.

CHARTER SCHOOLS

CTA believes charter schools have a role in California's education system by providing students, parents and CTA members with educational opportunities in the public school setting.

Prior to any conversion or start-up, all stakeholders must actively engage in a comprehensive dialogue about the pros and cons of charter schools. The decision by our Board of Education to convert any SMMUSD school to a charter or to endorse "outside" start-up charters should not be hurried. Compelling reasons must be evident prior to any conversion or start-up.

Districts must proceed with GREAT caution when studying dependent and independent charters. In particular, districts must ensure the ongoing fiscal stability of any charter school; the impact charter schools will have on the overall district budget, the ramifications on employees and the myriad of "unintended" consequences.

On April 7, 2003, Professor Bruce Fuller of U.C Berkeley released a study with regard to charter schools. The report found:

- Nearly 50% of charter schoolteachers are not fully certified. That compared to 9% of traditional public schools.
- 2. Charter school classrooms are 20% more crowded than traditional school classrooms.

3. 43% of charter school students are eligible for federal programs for low-income students. Only 5% of these children receive the aid.

. . . .

- 4. Charter schoolteachers are paid on average \$14,000 a year less than a traditional schoolteacher.
- 5. African American children in charter schools have a higher rate of racial isolation than do African American students in traditional public schools.
- 6. 60% of teachers in predominantly African-American charter schools lack credentials.

CTA recently reported that one charter school company received more than \$37 million from the state of California and less than half of this money was spent on instruction. As a result of CTA's findings, 40% of the budget for the Options for Youth Charter Schools was cut.

SMMCTA will continue to work "alongside" our members at SMASH as they explore the possibility of becoming a dependent charter within SMMUSD. At this time, SMMCTA has not taken an official position on the decision to convert SMASH to a dependent charter school. Our initial evaluation of the charter petition and budget indicates that there are significant economic challenges in the plan.

We urge the Board of Education to proceed cautiously in matters as significant as the creation of charter schools within SMMUSD. <u>Prior to taking such action</u>, <u>COMPELLING reasons must be evident and the fiscal sustainability of the entire district must be studied</u>.

Charter Schools

CTA believes charter schools have a role in California's education system by providing students, parents and CTA members with educational opportunities in the public school setting.

CTA believes that charter schools shall be established only

- a. Improve pupil learning.
- b. Increase learning opportunities for all pupils with special emphasis on expanded learning expenences for pupils who are identified as academically low achieving.
- Encourage the use of different and innovative teaching methods.
- d. Create new professional opportunities for teachers, including the opportunity to be responsible for the learning program at the school site.
- e. Provide parents and pupils with expanded choices in the types of educational opportunities that are available within the public school system.
- f. Hold the schools established under this part accountable for meeting measurable pupil outcomes, and provided the schools with a method to change from rule-based to performance-based accountability systems."

CTA believes that if a school district converts all its schools to charter schools, the charter petition shall include the following:

a. The employer for the purpose of Government Code Section 476115 (b) (collective bargaining) is the school district for all schools in a district-wide bargaining unit that is the same as the original bargaining unit with the same contract.

- Recognition of the CTA chapter as the exclusive certificated employee organization for purposes of collective bargaining.
- c. Acceptance of the terms and conditions of any existing collective bargaining agreement between the district and the CTA chapter as binding on the district.
- d. That the district shall comply with those statutes and regulations governing public school employers that establish and regulate tenure or a merit or civil service system in accordance with Government Code Section 47611.5 (c)

CTA believes any legislation or procedure that would allow an entire-school district to convert to charter school district status, home rule district status, or any status having similar effect shall provide for collective bargaining rights and statutory rights, protections, and requirements for district employees including credential requirements. Similarly, such legislation shall be consistent with constitutional and statutory rights of students and parents.

CTA believes legislation and regulation on charter schools, approval of individual charter schools by authorizing agencies, and overall enforcement of charter law shall be consistent with the following concepts:

- a. The granting of charters shall only be through school districts for schools within the boundaries of the school district. Satellites, branches, auxillaries or off-shoots of charter schools shall be approved as separate charter schools using approval requirements and subject to the state-wide limit on the number of charter schools.
- Appeals to the school district's denial of a petition shall be only for due process reasons.
- c. The approval of and operation of charter schools shall be free of profiteering or religious curricular content and indoctrination. A charter school shall not discriminate against a student based upon religious affiliation.
- d. The funding of charter schools shall be reasonably equivalent, or revenue neutral to regular funding of public schools.
- e. Facilities funding shall be managed by the school district in which the charter school is located. No school district general fund money shall be used for charter school facilities. Funding of charter school facilities shall not negatively impact the education program of the school district in which the charter school is located.
- f. Charter school law shall not create administrative replications of already existing education agencies such as found in school districts, county offices, and state agen-

- cies. Charter schools shalf-not be eligible for membership in Joint Powers Agreements, SELPAS or other like agencies except through their approving district.
- Y g. No charter school shall be eligible for participation in joint employer-employee health and health and welfare trusts unless the employees are represented by a CTA bargaining unit.
 - h. On-line learning charters shall provide learning opportunities consistent with state educational standards and hours of instruction, and shall provide minimum attendance requirements. Teacher-pupil ratios shall be consistent with good teaching practices and provide quality contact time between teachers and students.
- i. Teachers in charter schools shall be required to hold a Commission on Teacher Credentialing certificate, permit, or other document equivalent to that which a teacher in other public schools would be required to hold for a similar position.
- No private school shall be permitted to convert to a charter school.
- The charter school concept shall not be used by school district administration or school boards as a way to deny to employee organizations rights under the Educational Employment Relations Act.
 - Education funding laws shall protect school districts from catastrophic financial situations that might result from the formation of charter schools. Changes in a school district's financial position shall provide enough time for a district to accomplish financial adjustments without layoff s of employees.
- m. The statutory and regulatory rights and protections of employees shall be guaranteed.
 - n. Charter school evaluations by the state shall be by neutral evaluators and measure progress toward the goals of the charter school law, the goals of individual charters, compliance with charter schools laws and regualtions, academic achievement, and other educational issues.
 - o. Charter schools that buy back staff services from school districts shall reimburse the district for the actual costs of the staff and the district and charter schools shall guarantee the contractual and legal rights of such employees. An individual member shall not be permitted to waive contractual rights. Charter schools that contract for other services from a school district must receive real services at a fair martket price.
- ¥p. Authorizing entities and charter school operators shall

be free of conflicts of interest in the approval and operation of charter schools.

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- q. Charter schools shall comply with all state required accountability and testing requirements.
- Charter schools shall not be used for home schooling purposes.
- All records maintained by charter schools shall be available to the public in the same manner as those of school districts.
- The Brown Act (open meetings law) and Public Records Act shall apply to charter schools.
 - u. Charter_schools shall not charge tuition or any things of value as a requirement for attendance at the charter school. Neither shall a charter school imtimidate a student or parent when asking for voluntary contributions to the charter school. Parental involvement and voluntary service should be encouraged but shall not be a condition of enrollment.
 - Charter schools shall operate facilities consistent with the Field Act or other similar public safety standards as applied to buildings of public access similar to public schools.
 - w. Provision must be made for proper oversight of charter schools within the California Department of Education.
- Charter school authorizations and renewals shall not be for more than five years and shall be evaluated annually, including a complete evaluation by the authorizing entity upon renewal consistent with law and the educational goals as set forth in the charter, all of which shall be made available to the public.
 - y. No charter shall discriminate against a student because of race, language, color, national origin, religion, gender/gender identification, sexual orientation, disability, marital status or economic status.

Charter Schools Sponsored by local Associations or CTA:

- CTA supports the standards for a charter school as presented in the Charter Schools Act of 1992, including amendments. Charter School petitions must follow the standard of the Charter School Act.
- CTA will seek representation rights for all non-management certificated employees in public charter schools as outlined in Education Code sections 47605, 47611.5 and 47626.
- Agencies granting charters must provide a valid assessment of each school's progams to determine whether a school is meeting the objectives defined in its charter. If, after the initial term of its charter, a school has not met

- these objectives, remedial action shall be required and if not corrected, the charter should be revoked.
- 4. All stakeholders must be actively involved, directly or through elected representatives, in the creation and implementation of the charter.
- When CTA assistance is requested for an existing or proposed charter school, CTA will work with the local and will, following an assessment, determine appropriate support.
- A local Association may sponsor a charter school to become designated as a "CTA Charter School." The decision to designate a charter school shall be made by the CTA Board.
 - A. To be eligible for "CTA Charter School" status, a charter must meet the following criteria:
 - Teachers in the school must posses valid California teaching credentials.
 - The charter school must ensure equal access for students and provide for diversity in their staffing.
 - The charter school must not be a "for profit" enterprise.
 - The local Association must be actively involved in the development and management of the school.
 - Non-management certificated employees shall be covered by a collective bargaining agreement
 - B. The CTA Board shall determine what, if any, additional support may be provided to a school designated as a "CTA Charter School" in the same manner as non-Charter Schools.
 - C. CTA shall review CTA Charter Schools on a periodic basis.
 - D. Failure of a CTA Charter School to continue to meet the criteria (6A) shall result in the revocation of CTA Charter School status.

CTA will provide a collection of materials, including laws, regulations, sample charter language, charter finance information, collective bargaining information, due process information, and other helpful materials in an effort to assist its local association leaders in dealing with charter schools and members who are considering a charter school petition. This material shall be updated as needed. (CRE: 00-10; and NEG: 02-06; 00-01; 99-05; 93-06)

("Jacobs"). All terms and conditions used herein shall reflect the original language as stated in the PM Agreement or any subsequent amendments as currently approved.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth below, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the parties hereto, the Owner and Jacobs hereby amend and supplement the PM Agreement as follows:

SCOPE

This document (hereinafter as "Amendment") dated August 11, 2003, will serve as Contract Amendment Number 13.1 to the Program Management Agreement ("PM Agreement") dated August 12, 1999, and is between the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("Owner") and Jacobs Facilities, Inc. CONTRACT AMENDMENT NO. 14.1

This document (hereinafter as "Amendment") dated October 21, 2002, will serve as Contract Amendment Number 14.1 to the Program Management Agreement ("PM Agreement") dated August 12, 1999 and is between the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("Owner") and Jacobs Facilities, Inc. ("Jacobs"). This Amendment supplements Contract Amendment 14. All terms and conditions used herein shall reflect the original language as stated in the PM Agreement or any subsequent amendments as currently approved.

This will be the final Amendment to BLA 10.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements set forth below, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the parties hereto, the Owner and Jacobs hereby amend and supplement the PM Agreement as follows:

SCOPE

This Amendment incorporates changes associated with Bid Package 2A, Modernization of Franklin ES and McKinley ES including (a) changes in scope of work, as identified in the attached change order documents, issued to TG Construction and ATC Associates; and (b) return of unused Work-to-be-Determined funds and Contingency funds.

COST

Costs as stated in the current contract as amended will be modified in accordance with the attached summary resulting in a net credit to the Owner of \$74,231, which includes (a) a credit of \$59,238 for changes in scope of work; (b) a return of \$9,407 in unused funds; and (c) a net credit of \$5,586 against the PM Services Fee.

SCHEDULE

The work described herein has been performed and, therefore, impacts to schedule, if any, have been incurred. Jacobs agrees to waive any claim for extended performance and consequent impact damages provided that the Owner does not assess liquidated damages against this BLA.

This Amendment applies only after it has been fully executed by both parties.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.20

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the enhancement allocation of funds for 10 additional sections of Algebra and professional development to support the transition to 8th grade Algebra I for students at John Adams Middle School.

COMMENT: The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's vision of academic excellence and equity for all students is based on access to a rigorous, standards-based curriculum at all grade levels. The California content standards identify Algebra I as the standards-based course of studies for all eighth grade students.

For 2002-2003, 37 percent of district 8th grade students took the California Standards Test for Algebra I. Additionally, districtwide enrollment patterns indicate large disparities in the number of low-income and English Learner students who have access to Algebra I. To increase equitable access to a standards-based Algebra I curriculum, John Adams Middle School will implement an Algebra Transition Plan to accelerate student enrollment and success in Algebra I.

The John Adams Middle School Algebra Transition Plan for 2003-2004 will use a research-based double dose approach to strengthening mathematics concepts and reducing skill gaps. Ten extra sections of instructional support will be provided to identified 7th and 8th grade students. The Algebra Transition Plan also includes teacher professional development to further support student success. The anticipated costs to implement the John Adams Middle School Algebra Transition Plan are as follows:

INITIAL BARGAINING PROPOSAL FOR 2003-04 NEGOTIATIONS with the SANTA MONICA-MALIBU CLASSROOM TEACHERS ASSOCIATION

The proposal presented by the District is conceptual in nature. Specific modifications in contract language will be developed during the negotiations process. The District reserves the right to add to, subtract from, or otherwise modify this initial proposal.

The District proposes to negotiate the following articles for a successor agreement commencing 2003-04:

Article VII Summer School

C District will propose modifications to the current contract language in Article VII, subsection C., in regards to salary for summer school teachers.

Article XI Evaluation Procedures

C The District will propose modifications to the current contract language in Article XI, subsection A.3., as it relates to the redesign of Santa Monica High School and who is designated as evaluator.

Article XV Safety and Working Conditions

C The District will propose modifications to the current contract language in Article XV, subsection F., Support for mainstreamed Students, and subsection G., Support for Full-Inclusion Students, to clarify practice and procedures.

Article XVIII Peer Assistance and Review

C The District will propose modifications to the current contract language in Article XVIII, that will address the funding reduction for Peer Assistance and Review imposed by the state.

Article XX Child Development Teachers

C The District will propose modifications to the current contract language in Article XX, subsection A.4.a and b, relative to compensation for faculty meetings.

Article XXIII Salary

Article XXIV Additional Compensation
Article XXV Health and Welfare Benefits

C The proposal from the District regarding salary, compensation, and health and welfare benefits shall be contingent upon the District's revenues and expenditure commitments.

Article XXXVI Term of Agreement

C The District will propose new language which stipulates that upon expiration of the negotiated agreement, subsequent negotiations will be limited to Salary and Health and Welfare Benefits, and a limited number of reopeners.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.2

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider adopting the attached Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy.

COMMENT:

At the 10/17/02 meeting of the Board of Education, a discussion item was presented by staff on a Nutrition and Physical Activity Program Model that was to be piloted during the 2002-2003 school year. The model was developed through the process delineated in the District's application to the State of California's Nutrition and Physical Education Policy Grant Program. The primary purpose of the pilot was to provide feedback on the model that could serve as the basis for a District adopted Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy.

This model was piloted, tested and evaluated at John Muir Elementary, Webster Elementary and Lincoln Middle School during the 2002-03 school year as follows:

John Muir Elementary:

- 1. Ten week Physical Best Activity lessons for 4 classes.
- 2. Fourteen week Breakfast in the classroom for 4 classes.
- 3. Met with 4 teachers to discuss current and desired nutrition education practices.

Webster Elementary:

- 1. Ten week Physical Best Activity lessons for 3 classes
- 2. Four week nutrition lessons for 3 classes.
- 3. Met with 4 teachers to discuss current and desired nutrition education practices.
- 4. Introduced "healthier" food items to a la carte food sales.

Lincoln Middle School

- 1. Physical Best Activity lessons introduced in 9th grade P.E.
- 2. Reinstated Farmers' Market Salad Bar with support from Student Nutrition Advisory Committee.
- 3. Introduced "healthier" items in vending machines including a milk machine.

Findings:

Physical Best Activities engaged students in and increased actual playing time

- Teachers need more consistent direction from the District
 re: health and nutrition education; many prefer an outside
 educator to come into the classroom
- Health and Nutrition Education can be incorporated into the curriculum in a way that academic subjects are reinforced.
- Students will eat healthier foods such as salad bar and milk if they are offered to them.

A broad based task force of Administrators, Teachers, Parents, Community Members and Students known as the Health Reform Task Force embraced the following tenets as fundamental to the District's work in the area of the health of District students:

- 1. The nutritional and physical fitness status of children helps determine the overall quality of their health and their readiness to learn. This status is affected by the food they eat on campus and their participation in physical activity at school.
- 2. Schools play an influential role in the development of lifelong eating and physical activity habits.
- 3. Appropriate training of school district personnel in nutrition and physical activity education is essential.
- 4. It is vital for the District to create and implement an effective multi-faceted plan related to health centered programs and activities that result in environments that support improved student learning at all sites across the District.

These tenets provide the philosophical framework for the Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy. Fitgram and Health Champions Data provide the factual framework for the policy.

2002 Fitgram Assessment results for SMMUSD indicate:

- 1. Only 30% of all 5th graders in our district are considered fit by State Standards.
- 2. 33% of all 5th graders in our district fail the key test of cardiovascular health.
- 3. 25% of all 5th graders in our district are obese or dangerously overweight which is consistent with national data that has triggered concern for a nationwide obesity epidemic. At sites with the highest percentages of Latino and Afro-American students this number increases to 35%.

2002 Report to health Champions from West Ed:

- 1. Body Mass Index: an increase from 10% to 15% of girls register as having undesirable weight; 10% to 20% for boys.
- 2. Serum Cholesterol: 10% of boys and girls were classified as having high serum cholesterol levels.

In addition, School Nurses and St. John's Health Center report increased incidences of Diabetes in our student population.

Background: during the 2001-2002 school year the Board of Education authorized staff to apply for a Model School Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy Grant that was offered through the California Department of Education, Nutrition Services Division. As a result of the application SMMUSD was awarded a \$25,000 planning grant. This grant enabled the District to initiate an 18 month planning process to create significant policy changes that lead to a District Comprehensive Health Plan. The plan was to address: School Food Services, Nutrition Education and Physical Activity.

Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy October 2, 2003

A. <u>Purpose:</u>

The Board of Education recognizes that sound nutrition and optimal physical fitness correlate with learning readiness, academic achievement, decreased discipline problems and emotional well being. Life long healthy habits include the daily consumption of fruits and vegetables and daily physical fitness activities. Such habits can prevent Type 2 Diabetes, some Cancers, Cardiovascular Disease, Obesity and Osteoporosis.

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District is committed to promoting the health of its students by linking the Departments of Food and Nutrition Services with Health Services, Physical Education, and Family and Community Services.

This Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy will ensure that all students in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District will have the opportunity to receive the following:

- 3. High quality, nutritious food while in school including during classroom activities.
- 4. Nutrition education in the classroom
- 5. Standards based physical education and physical activity at all grade levels.

B. <u>Program Implementation:</u>

1. Nutritious Food/Food and Nutrition Services

Access to high quality, nutritious meals has been shown to improve eating habits and overall health status. Food and Nutrition Services will offer healthy foods for sale on all school campuses, elementary through secondary. School meals will meet the standards set by the National School Lunch Program. All food and beverages served or sold during school hours will also meet or exceed Senate Bill 19 Guidelines. See Addendum "A" for explanation of these standards and guidelines.

The SMMUSD Farmers' Market Salad Bar which is served daily in all of the our schools has received national recognition for positively impacting children's eating habits by providing fresh, seasonal, California grown, Farmers' Market produce and shall remain a reimbursable lunch option in all of our schools

2. <u>Nutrition Education</u>

Research validates that healthy eating is directly correlated with the amount of nutrition education received. It is the District's position that all students will receive:

- a. Consistent nutrition education K thru 12
- b. Nutrition education integrated into standards based curriculum using Science, Math, Language Arts, History, etc.
- c. Nutrition education will include recommendations made in the Dietary Guidelines for Americans which can be found at: http://www.usda.gov/cnpp/DietGd.pdf
- d. Nutrition behavior monitored biennially through Healthy Kids Survey.

The Board of Education authorizes that nutrition education be provided in a variety of instructional settings such as:

- a. The <u>Farmers' Market Salad Bar Program</u> which plays a valuable role in providing nutrition education via cafeteria messages, Farmers' Market tours, nutrition education offered by a Nutrition Specialist and school gardens that connect classroom gardens, nutrition education and the school salad bar.
- b. The <u>Health Champions Program</u>, a Comprehensive Health Education Program present in eight of our schools and supported by Saint John's Health Center reinforces the above nutrition messages.
- c. <u>Schools Gardens</u>: Research has shown that children are more likely to eat fruits and vegetables if they grow them. The Santa Monica High School Garden is a learning laboratory linking gardens to the science curriculum and has become a model for other school districts. SMMUSD supports the California Department of Education Mandate, "A Garden in Every School".

Teachers will be kept aware of the above programs via workshops, staff meetings and flyers and be encouraged to utilize them as much as possible.

3. <u>Standards Based Physical Education and Physical</u> Activity

The Board of Education recognizes that student academic performance, behavior and health status are compromised by physical inactivity and enhanced by physical activity. Research indicates that becoming and remaining physically active significantly reduces the risk of some cancers, Diabetes and other chronic diseases.

To increase opportunities for physical activity and fitness education in our schools the Board of Education commits to the following:

- a. All children, from pre-kindergarten through grade 12 will participate in quality, daily physical activity and/or fitness education.
- b. All schools will have certified physical education teachers and/or Physical Activity Specialists; appropriate class sizes; facilities, equipment, and supplies needed to deliver quality, daily physical education.
- c. Annually monitor and assess District physical activity/physical education programs, fitness testing performance, achievement of State physical fitness standards, and community physical activity programs at our schools.
- d. Access to school sites will be provided through community joint use agreements and partnerships with youth organizations for quality community sports and recreation programs for all young people in our communities.

4. Family and Community Partnerships

The Board of Education acknowledges that a team of community partners delivering strong, consistent messages and modeling healthy food choices and physical activity as part of a coordinated school health program increases the effectiveness of school based nutrition and fitness education.

All family groups within the district (i.e. PTA, sports booster clubs,, etc.) will be informed of this policy and receive information on healthy ways to do fundraising and offer refreshments for meetings that present a healthy message. Teachers will receive information on appropriate foods in the classroom.

A coordinated effort will be made to educate parents and care givers as to proper nutrition and physical activity to encourage modeling for students.

District Advisory committees exist for Health and Safety and Physical Activity. These groups will interface to assess adherence to this Nutrition and Physical Activity Policy. The Chairperson of the Health and Safety Committee will report annually to the School Board on compliance with this policy.

Addendum "A"

The National School Lunch Act mandates that school meals "safeguard the health and well-being of the Nation's children". Participating schools must serve lunches that are consistent with the applicable recommendations of the most recent Dietary Guidelines for Americans including: eat a variety of foods, salt and sugar in moderation, choose a diet with 30% or less of calories from fat and less than 10% of calories from saturated fat

In addition, lunches must provide, on average over each school week, at least 1/3 of the daily Recommended Dietary Allowances for proteink iron, calcium, and Vitamins A and C.

<u>California Senate Bill 19</u>

The Pupil Nutrition, Health and Achievement Act of 2001 Summary of Provisions to become operative January 1, 2004

Elementary Schools:

Food sold during breakfast and lunch must be sold as a full meal. Does not prohibit sale of fruit, non fried vegetables, legumes, beverages, dairy products or grain products if meet the following criteria:

- 1. No more than 35% calories from fat. Excludes nuts or seeds.
- 2. No more than 10% from saturated fat.
- 3. Not more than 35% of total weight shall be composed of sugar excluding fruits and vegetables.
- 4. The only beverages that may be sold to students are milk, water or juice that is at least 50% fruit juice with no added sweeteners.

Middle Schools and High Schools

Same as above but with regard to vending machines:

- 1. Carbonated beverages may not be sold from one half hour before the start of the school day until after the end of the last lunch period.
- 2. Fruit based drinks have no less than 50% fruit juice and have no added sweeteners.
- 3. Drinking water
- 4. Milk chocolate, soy, rice, etc.
- 5. Electrolyte replacement beverages have no more than 42 grams of added sweetener per 20 ounce serving. Does not include natural sugar contained within the fruit juice that is a component of the beverage.
- 6. No beverage to exceed 12 ounces per serving. Does not apply to water, milk, electrolyte replacement beverages as stated above.
