# THE ENERGY COALITION And THE SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

#### December 2004

This Agreement in Principle (AIP) between The Energy Coalition (Coalition) and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (SMMUSD) addresses the continuation of a promising energy efficiency partnership through the use of the Coalition's PEAK Student Energy Action program in elementary and secondary schools within the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

PEAK is a program developed by the Coalition and is provided to the SMMUSD as part of the Community Energy Partnership (Partnership), a demonstration project of a statewide model for the sustainable delivery of energy efficiency in California. The Partnership focuses energy efficiency services in discreet "energy districts," targeting traditionally underserved energy users such as low-income residents, senior citizens, and small businesses.

PEAK is at the core of the Partnership program, building awareness from the bottom-up and working to educate tomorrow's consumers about the merits and compelling reasons for wise energy management. The Community Energy Partnership is a partnership between the cities of Irvine, Santa Monica, Moreno Valley, Palm Desert, Brea, Cathedral City, Santa Clarita, Corona, and San Bernardino, managed by The Energy Coalition and supported by the ratepayers of Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas through the direction of the California Public Utilities Commission.

The Coalition, as the developer of PEAK and the architect of the Partnership, has been engaged with the cities of Santa Monica and Irvine for many years as they began defining their respective energy futures. PEAK was initially developed in the late 1970s to establish an energy efficiency ethic in elementary school students. In the past two years, the Coalition has redefined PEAK to provide an integrated curriculum and software capability that will meet SMMUSD, City, student, and family energy efficiency needs.

The Agreement in Principle meets the following goals for the 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 school years.

The Coalition will provide the PEAK Student Energy Action program at no cost for use in SMMUSD schools as part of the Community Energy Partnership during the 2004-2005 and 2005-2006 school years.

The SMMUSD will integrate the PEAK Student Energy Actions program into its elementary and secondary schools, initiating energy efficiency savings in approximately 2000 households and in the school facilities in Santa Monica.

- The SMMUSD will enable and encourage its teachers to use PEAK and specifically to teach a core lesson plan of smart energy management that will assure that the energy efficiency focus of PEAK is taught to students for use in reducing energy use in their homes and at school.
- Interested SMMUSD teachers will receive training by the Coalition on the effective use of the curriculum, software, and website.
- The Coalition will work with SMMUSD to develop and support a network of PEAK Program Coordinators in each participating school.
- The Coalition will make its proprietary curriculum and software available to all SMMUSD students participating in the PEAK Student Energy Actions program. Students will be provided PEAK software and lesson plans so that they can use PEAK at home to further energy efficiency educational benefits with their families. PEAK's website will be available to students and their families.
- The Coalition, in concert with the City of Santa Monica, Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas, will provide every student enrolled in the program with a compact fluorescent lightbulb. A fact sheet provided to each student explains the symbolism of the lightbulb for his or her family's opportunity to leverage greater savings through energy efficiency. In addition, the Coalition will explore the opportunity to provide additional compact fluorescent lightbulbs that students can sell in their communities to raise funds for their schools and specific activities approved by SMMUSD.
- By distributing flyers and by providing specific teacher resources, the Coalition will link participating families with other Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas programs and incentives and with other utility programs as necessary for electric, gas, and water efficiency opportunities in student homes.
- The Coalition will work with the SMMUSD to develop appropriate rewards and incentives for exemplary student behavior in saving energy at home and at school, potentially in concert with interested local businesses eager to support education. Teacher recognition will also be explored and potentially introduced and awarded.

As part of the Partnership demonstration project, the Coalition will also support SMMUSD in saving energy and money at schools. The Coalition will provide a range of technical services to support saving energy at school activities.

The Coalition will work with SMMUSD facilities staff and District officials to assist in developing mechanisms to determine the real energy and monetary savings from energy efficiency, specifically to help sort out the effects of rate increases and changes in building use patterns and occupancy schedules that affect baseline usage. The Coalition will advocate that a portion of the verified monetary benefits that accrue be reinvested in SMMUSD facilities for deeper levels of energy management.

The Coalition will work with SMMUSD to develop a shared-savings program such that verified energy and dollar savings are split between the school district for general purposes, specific schools for reinvestment to leverage ever-greater efficiency gains, and the maintenance staff that plays a critical role in effective building operation and thus wise energy management on campus.

While providing for complete student and family confidentiality, SMMUSD agrees that the Coalition and Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas shall have access to PEAK results in order to document benefits and to highlight the Partnership case study that will be built.

The Coalition will work with the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District and the City of Santa Monica to publicize the results of the PEAK program and its integration with existing school facility energy efficiency programs throughout the community, the City, and the State of California to propel the energy efficiency works at home and at school and to sustain the effort for years to come.

SMMUSD and the Coalition agree that during the school year of 2005-2006 they will review PEAK to determine its further use in sustaining SMMUSD's energy future.

The above represents the Agreement In Principle between The Energy Coalition and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

Re: Fiscal Outlook for 2005-2006

This memorandum serves to offer some perspective on our current fiscal status and to suggest the trends and most probable outlook for the upcoming fiscal year. We are beginning the budget preparation process for the fiscal year 2005-2006. In the next few meetings you will receive our annual certified audit, the revenue projection forecast, the enrollment forecast, and our expenditure projections and recommended budget. Our budget outlook is directly connected with the State's budget forecast. As you know the State of California has been in a serious fiscal crisis for the last three years. While there appears to be some mitigation in the outlook for the State's economic health in terms of jobs growth and revenue, it is dramatically offset by both a gaping budget shortfall for both the current fiscal year and next year. I write this memorandum following the LAO's budget analysis and first projection for the 2005-2006 fiscal year. Recent tax revenues point to a continued steady climb in State receipts. The majority of this increased revenue comes from bank and corporate taxes. However, this should not offer a sense of optimism or security with respect to the upcoming budget forecast. Bank and corporation taxes are not stable revenue sources that can support long-term program expenditures. Personal income tax revenues, which are a more stable revenue source, have increased, but not nearly to the magnitude that would provide relief or optimism from the State's ongoing deficits. In her commentary, Elizabeth Hill suggests that the State in facing "a sea of red ink" for the foreseeable future. And to complicate matters more, deficits in the years beyond 2005-2006 are large as notes become due and as a result of fundamental structural problems with the State's budget remain uncorrected.

Both the ACSA and CSBA predict that the 2005-06 budget deliberations will be equally, if not more, difficult than what we faced in the previous three years. A quick look at the legislature after Election Day bodes ill for bipartisan collaborative solutions now that all of the quick (credit card-like) fixes have been used up in the previous budget years.

With the increase in State revenues, Proposition 98 is increasing. After decreasing for the last four (4) years, Prop. 98 turned around and began a steady increase this fiscal year. For the next several years, budget analysts, like School Services of California, predict yearly increases in Prop. 98 in an overall range of 5% to 7%. For the fiscal year 2005-06 Prop. 98 should come in between 2.5 – 3 million higher than last year. Statutory COLA looks like it should be between 2.5% and 3% and enrollment growth likely between 0.75% and 1%

At *prima facie*, this is good news. The predicted increase for 2005-06 is enough to fully fund COLA, growth, pay off most (if not all) of the deficit factor, and make a sizable payment to the unpaid mandate claims per the Education Coalition's 2004-2005 budget agreement enacted in July. That agreement was **not** just a one-year deal. Under the deal that all of our representative organizations fought for and obtained, payment of the deficit factor, mandate claims and prior-year settle-up (Due To funds) have first claim on nay new Prop. 98 funds. I am sorry to say, but that is where the good news (if there actually was any) ends.

The LAO, in a surprise announcement found inside the initial fiscal forecast, called fore the non-payment of the 'Agreement' monies and suggested that Prop. 98 could be examined for potential less-than-full funding again. This is a serious situation. To fully understand the motives behind this suggested strategy, one must look at the large fiscal picture.

While Prop. 98 funds are going up but the rest of the State's revenues are in terrible condition. Of greater concern is crossing that 'line in the sand' in being able to suspend (I mean re-base) Prop.98 has been brooked once, and with the future fiscal looking more challenging than ever, it becomes easier to do this again. This will be significantly compounded by the recent passage of Props. 1A and 63. Each remove what were previous pots of money that had been used to balance budgets in the past. 1A prevents the Legislature and the Governor from using local property tax allocations to backfill Prop.98. And 63 take the taxing of upper income brackets off the table. While each had other important and good consequences, I am constructing the outcome of these in terms of Prop. 98 funding only. I believe that the budget for the 2005-06 year will probably be balanced with 2 possible scenarios: the first will be to suspend Prop.98 again, or the other will be to under-appropriate the minimum guarantee. Both situations will have a dramatically negative consequence on our (or any LEA's) ability to meet API targets, comply with NCLB and Williams, and remain solvent.

At the local level we should land this year's budget as forecasted and with some strategic cost-savings make the full reserve appropriation before the fiscal year closes. This is a critical step. We have been operating under the special provision allowed by the Legislature due to the State's fiscal crisis to allow school districts to hold a 1.5% reserve instead of the statutory 3%. We must return to the 3% before the next fiscal year begins. I hope and expect that with stringent cost savings and the work of our outstanding fiscal office we will meet this obligation without cutting next year's budget for this purpose first. The next major impact on our local budget will be our enrollment situation. Three year's ago we suspended the permit policy on taking new permits (except for the special provisions in the policy) as a way to strategically shrink our enrollment. The effect of this policy is now being felt. Our enrollment decreased this year and will again next year. As you know, for 1 year only a district may claim the previous year's ADA as a construction of its revenue limit. Next year we will post a lower ADA and thus a lower revenue limit. This means less revenue for our expenditures. We will need to navigate this situation carefully. This may require a re-examination of our permit policy suspension or other strategic budget reductions. While there are other important budget decisions ahead, each

has a set of costs and benefits attached which we will outline throughout the budget preparation process. One example being the choice (1 time only) to pay off our COPS, thus use an amount of special reserve, but reducing a yearly payout for interest and principal payments from the general fund. We will work through each of these carefully. Among other factors affecting the budget will be the new guidelines around categorical funding (the mega-item categorical). This is a result of AB 825, the block grant bill which was originally Senate bill 1510. This will consolidate over 20 programs into 6 block grants, which take effect in the 2005-06 fiscal year. Also in the upcoming budget will be the influence of GASB 45. This will require us to build an increased reserve to deal with post-employment benefits. And of course, there will be the dramatic increases in workman's compensation insurance rates expected in this year.

Of prime concern is, of course, the State picture. Given what appears to be a seriously negative forecast situation shaping up for schools, I strongly suggest (an will be directing) the our budget to be constructed without any consideration of expected (promised) growth, mandate claims reimbursement, or deficit factor payments (Due To monies) to our district from the State. This will result in a very tight and difficult budget. Furthermore, I will suggest we use the lower end of the COLA forecast for budget construction. Should any of the conditions change upon which this initial budget is built, than we will be in a position to alter our fiscal outlook and expenditure scenarios.

I, and your staff look forward to working with you as we prepare our 2005-06 budget and continue the important work of raising the achievement for all students while simultaneously closing the achievement gap.

## RECOMMENDATION NO. A.18

It is recommended that the Board of Education ratify the Tentative Agreement reached with and ratified by the Service Employees International Union (SEIU), Local 660 during the collective bargaining process. AB 1200 requires that this Agreement be sunshined to the Board of Education using our routine notification process, and that the Los Angeles County Office of Education approve the financial impact of the Agreement ten (10) days in advance of full Board approval. The AB1200 requirement has been fullfilled. The Board may now proceed with the ratfiying vote.

COMMENT: The District's negotiators and the SEIU Negotiation Team reached a Tentative Agreement which will go into effect January 1, 2004, with a one percent (1%) salary increase effective July 1, 2004, and a one percent (1%) salary increase effective February 1, 2005.

Health and welfare benefits will be maintained at current District levels, except for those employees choosing the single insured, who will no longer be able to receive Blue Cross PERS Care unless they choose to pay the differential between the Kaiser rate and the Blue Cross PERS Care rate. Those who choose a single insurance package will be able to choose Blue Cross PERS Choice at no additional cost. Open enrollment will be continued through October 28, 2004, so that SEIU employees may have time to switch insurance if necessary. During the 2004/05 school year, a joint committee including certificated and classified bargaining units and other key stakeholders will be formed to review health care options.

A Tentative Agreement has been reached on a calendar issue. Less than twelve-month employees must schedule 14 days vacation during the winter and spring recesses. Employees earning less than 14 days vacation may use

necessity days, floating holidays, or may request a District work assignment up to three days to avoid unpaid days. Exceptions to the above shall not occur without prior written approval from the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources.

It is agreed that the District will form a committee with SEIU during the 2004/05 school year to examiine the Professional Growth Program.

The Length of the Contract will be from January 1, 2004 through December 31, 2005. Contract negotiations will reopen no earlier than May 1, 2005, with reopeners of Salary, Benefits and Professional Growth.

COMMENT: Santa Monica High School has suffered continual incidents of vandalism on its' campus. In order to deter such acts, it has been determined that closed circuit camera be installed on the <a href="exterior">exterior</a> of various buildings throughout the campus. Both Requests for Proposal (RFP) met the needs of the site. AmeriTel's proposal consists of analog cameras and digital processing equipment. IES's proposal was all digital equipment, using a web based retrieval system. It was determined that the AmeritTel proposal would be more cost effective, would use existing phone lines, and would not be dependant on the internet connection if the lines were nonfunctioning. AmeriTel is currently used by the District for telephone maintenance Districtwide.

Bids were sent to five (5) contractors; three (3) attended the job walk; two (2) responded with bids:

Santa Monica High School has experienced repeated incidents of vandalism, graffiti, theft and other crimes against property and people. Site Governance Council at SAMOHI has spent four months researching the rationale behind installing security cameras on the exterior of campus buildings as deterrent to such crimes. Governance Council has <u>unanimously</u> recommended the installation of such cameras. SAMOHI requests permission from the Board of Education to implement security cameras on the exterior of campus buildings.

School administration feel strongly that the implementation of a security camera system will:

- , Act as deterrent to unwanted activities.
- , Create an increased sense of security on campus.
- , Reduce costs related to vandalism and thefts.
- Create as record of in inappropriate activity to identify and prosecute the perpetrators.

School administration is well aware of the need to protect the privacy of its population. In accordance with this belief:

This contract is for the engineering, design, truss repairs and structural reinforcement on the cafetorium building at Webster Elementary School.

During investigation of a water leak in the cafetorium roof, a low spot was identified. Upon further investigation of the attic space, several large wooden truss members were found to be split and failing. The District maintenance staff installed temporary support posts under the damaged areas. Both a professional structural engineer and a repair company were then contacted. They both determined that the temporary support was adequate for short term safety to allow continued use of the space with the understanding that a permanent repair would need to be done as soon as possible.

SPS was chosen to do the work as they can do a turn-key operation on the project, without the District awarding to individual companies. Wolf Lang Christopher, who the District has used extensively for construction design, and who sent out a structural engineer, recommended that the District use SPS, Inc. for this project as it would expedite the process.

# **DETAIL**

The Board of Education recognizes that by studying visual and performing arts, students learn to develop initiative, discipline, perceptual abilities and critical and creative thinking skills that extend to all areas of life. The Board believes that a comprehensive arts education program should be an integral part of the core curriculum offered to all students in all grades. The Board supports the need to identify resources to provide standards-based instructional materials, equipment and facilities. The Board of Education also supports the need to provide adequate and equitable funding for a high quality, standard-based **Pre** K-12 Arts Education. Scheduling of visual and performing arts instruction should be designed to insure equitable access for all students in all grades, **during the school day**.

The district's comprehensive arts education program shall include a written, sequential standards-based curriculum and assessment program in dance, music, theater and the visual arts. Students shall have the opportunity to develop academic content knowledge in the arts disciplines, continually improve artistic skills, showcase their work by creating and/or performing original works, acquire an appreciation of arts from many eras and cultures and develop an intellectual basis for making aesthetic judgments. The Board encourages all teachers to use the arts to facilitate learning in the subjects they teach. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall encourage the integration of community arts resources into the school program. Students shall have regular opportunities to attend musical, theatrical and dance performances, attend art exhibitions and work directly with visiting artists.

The Board supports a collaboration with community arts agencies and is committed to providing the necessary time, staff and financial resources in order to support school-community arts agency partnerships.

The Board acknowledges the importance of and will support ongoing professional development for teachers in arts education. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that visual and performing arts classes are taught by qualified and certificated staff. These staff members will have opportunities to become knowledgeable about curriculum developments in the arts and strategies for delivering a comprehensive arts program to students.

## RECOMMENDATION NO. A.28

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 6179 Supplemental Instruction as required by Education Codes 37252.5 and 37252.6 to support Board Policy 5123, Promotion/Acceleration/Retention.

COMMENT: This new policy is required to indicate the specific types of supplemental instructional programs that will be provided to students who are retained, recommended for retention, or do not demonstrate sufficient progress toward passing the state exit examination required for high school graduation.

EXHIBIT SUBTOPIC REGULATION POLICY

Instruction

# DETAIL

The Governing Board shall provide supplemental instructional programs to motivate and support students to overcome academic deficiencies, attain grade-level academic standards or enhance critical skills, as state funding permits.

Supplemental instructional programs shall be offered outside the regular school day. Such programs may be offered during the summer, before school, after school, on Saturday and/or during intersessions. (Education Code 37252, 37252.2, 37252.8, 37253)

The Board shall offer direct, systematic and intensive supplemental instruction for students in grades 2-9 who have been retained or recommended for retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.2)

The Board shall offer direct, systematic and intensive supplemental instruction for students in grades 7-12 who do not demonstrate "sufficient progress" toward passing the state exit examination required for high school graduation. (Education Codes 37252, 60851)

For purposes of determining students' eligibility for supplemental instruction, "sufficient progress" toward passing the high school exit examination shall be determined by students' grades and other indicators of academic achievement designated by the board including performance on district assessments and the California Standards Test.

Whenever a school receiving federal Title I funds fails to make adequate yearly progress, as defined by the State Board of Education, for three or more consecutive school years, supplemental educational services shall be provided outside the regular school day to eligible students from low-income families. Services shall be selected by parents/quardians from an approved list of service providers and shall specifically be designed to increase eligible students' achievement on state academic assessments and to assist them in attaining state academic standards. (20 USC 6316)

As state funding, facilities and staffing permit, supplemental instruction may be offered to:

- 1. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as being at risk of retention pursuant to Education Code 48070.5. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 2. Students in grades 2-6 who have been identified as having a deficiency in mathematics, reading or written expression based on the results of the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program. (Education Code 37252.8)
- 3. Students in grades K-12, including English language learners, who need or desire intensive English language and literacy instruction. (Education Codes 422-424)
- 4. As additional funding permits, students in grades K-12 who seek enrichment in mathematics, science or other core academic areas designated by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. (Education Code 37253; 5 CCR 11472)

The programs described in items 1-4 above shall be offered during summer school except when facilities constraints or other educational reasons make it not feasible to offer these programs during summer school, in which case they may be offered before school, after school, on Saturday and/or during intersessions. (Education Code 423, 53029, 53093)

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.1

Last summer, Educational Services began a comprehensive evaluation of the 2004 Intensive Intervention Summer School. This evaluation is a mixed method study that includes qualitative data collection — such as interviewing, surveying, and observing — as well as quantitative data collection — including pre— and post—testing, analysis of state and local testing and student enrollment in summer school, and analysis of the probable impact of the program on student achievement throughout the 2004-2005 academic year. The Phase One evaluation report includes a description of the elementary and middle school intensive intervention summer school programs, professional development and curriculum materials used in the programs, programmatic decisions and their consequences, and the results of stakeholder surveys conducted with parents, students, and faculty.

This evaluation is part of our efforts to strengthen support to our most at-risk students. Review of the local data and the research literature on summer school, combined with comprehensive planning that has already begun, have yielded several recommendations that will strengthen these programs. Findings and recommendations from the evaluation are included for the Board of Education's consideration. Because several of our key findings and recommendations are closely aligned with newly reported research intended to improve the efficacy of summer school (and all intervention) programming, we also provide a summary of the relevant research literature. We conclude this report with a description of ongoing planning for summer programming and an overview of what data will be discussed in the Phase Two portion of this report, which will be prepared once the 2005 STAR data are available.

During the 2003 - 2004 academic year, Santa Monica High School provided an Algebra I / Biology block of 3 periods to provide additional instructional time for 100 identified students with the greatest need for academic support. Increased instructional time during the school day is recognized as one strategy for increasing student achievement. This additional time is used to provide extended opportunities for instruction and explanation for both in-class and out-of-class assignments. Results for the first year of this innovative program yielded impressive gains in course grades and baseline data from the California Standards Test in Algebra and Biology. Effective as of the 2004-05 school year, district staff will implement a Bilingual Competency Awards Program. This program honors language achievement of graduating high school seniors. The Bilingual Competency Awards Program grants recognition based on criteria that demonstrate competency in both academic English and a second language.

Comments: An increasing number of school districts currently implement programs to encourage and recognize bilingualism in students. SMMUSD has a longstanding commitment to producing multi-lingual students, as evidenced through the support of the K-12 Spanish Dual Language Program, as well as the wide variety of classical and modern languages offered in district secondary schools. This commitment is clearly enumerated in the district's Vision Statement that states:

"As a community of learners the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District works together in a nurturing environment to help students be visionary, versatile thinkers; resourceful, life-long learners; effective, multi-lingual communicators and global citizens."

Therefore implementing a program that recognizes bilingual competency upon graduation from our high schools is very much in alignment with articulated district values. It is within this context that the SMMUSD Bilingual Competency Awards Program has been developed.
