A meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, August 18, 2005 at the Santa Monica City Council Chambers, 1685 Main Street, Santa Monica, CA. VIII PUBLIC COMMENTS

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda. All speakers are limited to three (3) minutes. When there is a large number of speakers, the Board may reduce the allotted time to two(2) minutes per speaker. The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during "VIII, Public Comments" except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. This Public Comment section is limited to 20 minutes.

- Margarita Gonzalez, Marlene Herrera and Orlando Rojas addressed the Board of Education in support of the Community Liaisons positions currently held by Teri Viramontes and Pam Allen at Santa Monica High School. They also stated that many students are not succeeding and they felt that the Community Liaisons currently employed are best equipped to assist the students and families. Ms. Gonzalez and Ms. Herrera also expressed their desire that a particular room scheduled to be used for the special education program be used as a Parent Center.
- Yuri Brown addressed the Board of Education about concerns she had with regard to her son's teacher at Lincoln and grades that she felt were inappropriate. Parent claims that son completed work, but that the teacher lost the assignments and assigned a zero grade to the student. Dr. Deasy indicated that he would meet with the parent.

X COMMUNICATIONS

B. SMMCTA Report - Mr. Harry Keiley

Mr. Keiley opened his report by referring the Board of Education to the California Teachers' Association (CTA) Website for details on the recent lawsuit filed against the Governor by CTA to uphold Proposition 98.

The Board of Education, management, SEIU and public were invited to a kickoff on Sunday at SMMCTA Headquarters, 1508 18th Street in Santa Monica from 1-4 p.m. for the Western Democratic Coalition who will be working with the Democratic Clubs to oppose the Governor's Special Election in November.

Lastly, Mr. Keiley mentioned that he read an article by Bob Herbert in the New York Times that reminded readers that we are a nation at war. Harry stated that the article put in perspective how the war has an impact on the district. He encouraged everyone to read the article if one has the opportunity.

C. S.E.I.U. Report - Ms. Keryl Cartee

Ms. Cartee filed the following written report: **SEIU International** has taken the lead in changing the way unions do business. It is no secret that SEIU International (President Andy Stern) made headlines when he challenged the AFL-CIO with accountability in the way unions do business and the services they provide to union paying members. With a dwindling percentage from 33% to 8% of union households (in the US) over the past 35 years, Mr. Stern recognized that something drastic was needed to save working families and their jobs.

- 1. **SEIU International** has pulled out of the AFL-CIO and established a new alliance of unions called, CHANGE TO WIN COLLATION.
- 2. At the time of this report, **SEIU Local 660** has not officially endorsed the lawsuit filed by CTA against Governor Schwarzenegger. However, SEIU Local 660 has acknowledged the lawsuit and unofficially supports it.
- 3. **SEIU Local 660** has been fighting to keep hospitals from closing and being contracted out. The fight is intense and the proposed "Medicaid Reforms" for California's 1115 Waiver puts us all at risk. Those most at risk are the elderly, children and families without health care.
- 4. **SEIU Local 660** is actively campaigning against the Governor's Special Election agenda. SEIU Local 660 is canvassing all of Los Angeles County to defeat Prop. 75. We have captioned Prop. 75 as "**The Initiative to Silence Our Voices.**" As a follow up to that, the same energy to defeat Prop. 76, captioned as "**The Power Grab Initiative**"
- 5. **SEIU Local 660** has expanded its meeting locations to better serve its members throughout Los Angeles County.
- 6. **SEIU Local 660** would like to remind all union members and community members to contribute to the Richard Bartolomeo Scholarship Fund for the 2005/06 school year. Contributions can be made through the Education Foundation.

X SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

• Overview - STAR Testing Results - PowerPoint Presentation

Dr. Deasy and Dr. Muncey presented data on the district's performance on the California Standardized Test in English Language Arts across all grades and the Math STAR test results through middle school as compared with Los Angeles County . Dr. Deasy commented that staff is very pleased with our student performance and noted many areas where the district's mission of raising achievement for all students while simultaneously closing the achievement gap is occurring. A copy of the Powerpoint presentation is attached to these minutes.

• Opening of School - Update

Dr. Deasy noted that with few exceptions, the district is ready to open school on September 7. All Certificated positions will be filled. There are a number of classified positions to fill due in part to the absence of a director in the Personnel Commission and the reorganization in the Personnel offices. A check of facilities indicates that the majority of work will be completed at the sites by the opening of school or shortly thereafter. Dr. Deasy concluded that at this time there are no barriers to the opening of school.

PR.1 Virginia Avenue Project - Report (this item moved forward)

Leigh Curran, Artistic Director of the Virginia Avenue Project, addressed the Board of Education about the work of the project in the Santa Monica Community. "The Virginia Avenue Project is a free, after-school program that uses the performing arts in conjunction with one-on-one mentoring to help at-risk kids discover their full potential." As stated in its flyer, "Project kids and their families live primarily in Santa Monica's Pico Corridor, a low income Latino and African American community, and many Project kids attend Title 1 schools that serve that area. One hundred percent of Project kids graduate from high school; 90% go on to college; and 85% are the first in their family to do so.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 05-01 for the issuance and sale of Refunding Bonds.

COMMENTS: The District issued General Obligation Bonds in 1999 (\$38,000,034) and 2001 (\$3,995,000) to construct needed facilities. Given the current market environment, which has witnessed historically low interest rates for tax-exempt bonds, the District may be able to take advantage of market changes to refund its outstanding bonds and provide savings to the taxpayers. Many other districts have been able to refund their bonds and lower local tax rates, and doing so represents prudent stewardship on the part of the Board.

Because of market volatility, it is not possible to determine in advance when will be the best time to sell refunding bonds. Therefore, it is prudent for the Board to direct staff to take steps now that will put the District in a position to enter the market. This will give the staff and financing team the necessary flexibility to act on short notice to take advantage of daily interest rate market changes.

This resolution takes the first step by approving the legal documents listed below, directing the District's financing team to monitor the market and periodically update staff regarding a refunding opportunity, and directing staff and the financing team to prepare the preliminary Official Statement describing the refunding bonds and their security, which will be brought before the Board for approval at a future regular or a special meeting.

Financing Documents approved by the resolution are:

- 1. Bond Purchase Contract;
- 2. Paying Agent Agreement;
- 3. Escrow Agreement;
- 4. Continuing Disclosure Certificate;
- 5. Legal Services Agreement.

The complete detail of these investment banking documents, which were prepared by an outside Bond Counsel, Orrick Herrington & Sutcliffe, LLP, and an Investment Banking Firm, Piper Jaffray & Company, have been submitted under separate cover to the Board of Education and are available for public review in the Office of the Superintendent.

This action is in line with the previously approved District Investment Policy.

DETAIL

The Food and Nutrition Services Policy for feeding students who come to the cafeteria without money is as follows:

- C Students who are new or who require District assistance are to be fed a full meal for the first three days and marked as paid on the daily sales worksheet
- C Parents who prepay will receive a written notice when the number of meals available reaches 5 (five), or cash equivalent (\$13.75). Only one notice will be sent as a reminder. The notice will be sent by the school office.
- C Students will be allowed to owe for only three consecutive complete meals, a value not to exceed \$8.25 for the 2005/06 school year.
- C If a child comes through the serving line without money, the Cafeteria Lead will issue a notice to the School Office. The School Office will send this notice to the parent.
- C If a child does not have money and has exceeded his/her three meal credit, a partial meal will be offered to the student. The partial meal will be a nutritionally adequate meal consisting of a cheese sandwich and nonfat milk. A written reminder notice will be sent home with the child on the first day when a partial meal is served. The notice will be sent by the school office.
- C A Negative Balance Report will be printed on a weekly basis and sent to the school office. The school office staff will send a letter or contact all parents on the list. The school office staff will remind parents of the balance due and the fact that their child may be receiving a partial meal.
- C Meal credits and cash balances may be transferred between household members only.

Unless otherwise agreed upon with the school office or school PTA, parents are solely responsible for ensuring that their child's account is active and not negative status.

There is no credit or partial meal service for secondary students.

DISCUSSION ITEM D.1

During the 2004-2005 school year, teachers in grades 1- 5 in all elementary schools in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District piloted a common, standards-based report card. The elementary principals and a committee of elementary teachers tracked the implementation of this report card and offered suggestions for how to strengthen the reporting categories on the report card and communication with parents. Parents, too, offered input through a survey about the strengths and weaknesses of the particular categories on the standards-based report card. Simultaneously, a committee of kindergarten teachers readied the kindergarten version of the standards-based report card for use in the 2005-2006 school year.

One change that both teachers and administrators agreed with concerned the timing of the standards-based report cards. The report cards provide a wealth of data about how each student in performing on key ("power") standards that we all (teachers, elementary principals, and central office staff) believe are best reported on at the midpoint and end of the year. Since there is a long tradition of elementary conferencing with parents in November, a reporting format focused on adjustment to the grade level and discussion of formative and summative assessment data is in development. For the 2005-2006 academic year, then, there will be two reporting periods for the standards-based report card (January 27, 2006 and June 26, 2006) and a November informational conference.

The Community Day School is scheduled to open in the Laurel Room at Memorial Park on September 7, 2005. Representatives from the City of Santa Monica and the Police Department have been meeting with District staff throughout the summer to prepare for the opening of the new school. We expect to open with a small student body (fewer than 10) and grow very little during this first year. Overall, the Community Day School will serve a maximum of 30 students at this site. Staff for the small school have been hired. Laurel Schmidt went with teachers to a week-long professional development about design-based learning (a standards-based and project-based curriculum) and staff are working on units for use with their students. We anticipate a wonderful start of the school year there.

The Santa Monica-Malibu Independent Study School is scheduled to open at Malibu High School on September 7, 2005. We will hold an informational meeting for parents next week and begin enrolling students during the week of August 29, 2005. We anticipate this will also be a small school, serving grades 6-12. We are currently working out the staffing arrangements and have applied for the relevant permissions and administrative number from the California Department of Education.

DETAIL

The Governing Board recognizes that agencies at all levels of government share its concern and responsibility for the health, safety and welfare of youth. The Superintendent or designee shall initiate and maintain good working relationships with representatives of these agencies in order to help district schools and students make use of the resources which governmental agencies can provide.

The district may enter into agreements with other agencies which involve the exchange of funds or reciprocal services. Such agreements shall be approved by the Board and executed in writing.

Elections/Voter Registration

If a city or county elections official specifically requests the use of a school building as a polling place, the Board shall allow its use for such purpose. The Board may authorize the use of school buildings as polling places on any election day, and may also authorize the use of school buildings, without cost, for the storage of voting machines and other vote-tabulating devices. If school sessions will continue, the Board shall identify to elections officials the specific areas of the school buildings not occupied by school activities that will be allowed for use as polling places. (Elections Code 12283)

When a school is used as a polling place, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the elections official a site with an adequate amount of space that will allow the precinct board to perform its duties in a manner that will not impede, interfere or interrupt the normal process of voting, and shall make a telephone line for Internet access available for use by local elections officials if so requested. He/she shall make a reasonable effort to ensure that the site is accessible to disabled persons. (Elections Code 12283)

To encourage students to participate in the elections process when they are eligible, the Superintendent or designee may distribute to high school seniors voter registration forms provided by the Secretary of State. He/she shall determine the most effective means of distributing the forms, which may include but not be limited to distributing forms at the start of the school year, with orientation materials, at central locations, and/or with graduation materials.

DETAIL

The Governing Board recognizes that the Board is the unit of authority over the district and that a Board member has no individual authority. Board members shall hold the education of students above any partisan principle, group interest, or personal interest.

Unless agreed to by the Board as a whole, individual members of the Board shall not exercise any administrative responsibility with respect to the schools or command the services of any school employee. Individual Board members shall submit requests for information to the Superintendent. Board members shall refer Board-related correspondence to the Superintendent for forwarding to the Board or for placement on the Board's agenda, as appropriate.

A board member whose child is attending a district school should be aware of his/her role as a Board member when interacting with district employees. Because his/her position as a Board member may inhibit the performance of school personnel, the Board member should inform the Superintendent or designee before volunteering in his/her child's classroom.

Board members and persons elected to the Board who have not yet assumed office are responsible for complying with the requirements of the state's open meeting laws. (Government Code 54952.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a copy of the Brown Act to each Board member and to anyone who is elected to the Board and who has not yet assumed office.

DETAIL

The Governing Board is elected by the community to provide leadership and citizen oversight of the district's schools. The Board shall work with the Superintendent to fulfill its major roles, which include:

- 1. Setting a direction for the district
- 2. Providing a basic organizational structure for the district by establishing policies
- 3. Ensuring accountability
- 4. Providing community leadership on behalf of the district and public education

To fulfill these basic responsibilities, the Board shall:

- 1. Involve the community, parents/guardians, students and staff in developing a common vision for the district focused on learning and achievement and responsive to the needs of all students
- 2. Adopt, evaluate and update policies consistent with the law and the district's vision and goals
- 3. Maintain accountability for student learning by adopting the district curriculum and monitoring student progress
- 4. Hire and support the Superintendent so that the vision, goals and policies of the district can be implemented
- 5. Conduct regular and timely evaluations of the Superintendent based on the vision, goals and performance of the district, and ensure that the Superintendent holds district personnel accountable
- 6. Adopt a fiscally responsible budget based on the district's vision and goals, and regularly monitor the fiscal health of the district

- 7. Ensure that a safe and appropriate educational environment is provided to all students
- 8. Establish a framework for the district's collective bargaining process and adopt responsible agreements
- 9. Provide community leadership on educational issues and advocate on behalf of students and public education at the local, state and federal levels
- 10. Convene as a judicial and appeals body and serve as the final decision-maker in accordance with law, Board policies and negotiated agreements

The Board is authorized to establish and finance any program or activity that is not in conflict with, inconsistent with, or preempted by law. (Education Code 35160)

The Governing Board believes that its primary responsibility is to act in the best interests of every student in the district. The Board also has major commitments to parents/guardians, all members of the community, employees, the state of California, laws pertaining to public education, and established policies of the district. To maximize Board effectiveness and public confidence in district governance, Board members are expected to govern responsibly and hold themselves to the highest standards of ethical conduct.

The Board expects its members to work with each other and the Superintendent to ensure that a high-quality education is provided to each student. Each individual Board member shall:

- 1. Keep learning and achievement for all students as the primary focus
- 2. Value, support and advocate for public education
- 3. Recognize and respect differences of perspective and style on the Board and among staff, students, parents and the community
- 4. Act with dignity, and understand the implications of demeanor and behavior
- 5. Keep confidential matters confidential
- 6. Participate in professional development and commit the time and energy necessary to be an informed and effective leader
- 7. Understand the distinctions between Board and staff roles, and refrain from performing management functions that are the responsibility of the Superintendent and staff
- 8. Understand that authority rests with the Board as a whole and not with individuals

Board members also shall assume collective responsibility for building unity and creating a positive organizational culture. To operate effectively, the Board shall have a unity of purpose and:

- 1. Keep the district focused on learning and achievement for all students
- 2. Communicate a common vision
- 3. Operate openly, with trust and integrity
- 4. Govern in a dignified and professional manner, treating everyone with civility and respect
- 5. Govern within Board-adopted policies and procedures
- 6. Take collective responsibility for the Board's performance
- 7. Periodically evaluate its own effectiveness
- 8. Ensure opportunities for the diverse range of views in the community to inform Board deliberations.

The policy changes and revisions contained in chart above were made in collaboration with a California School Board Association policy consultant.

DETAIL

The Governing Board encourages parents/guardians and interested members of the community to visit the schools and view the educational program.

X

To ensure minimum interruption of the instructional program, the Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures which facilitate visits during regular school days. Visits during school hours should be first arranged with the teacher and principal or designee. If a conference is desired, an appointment should be set with the teacher during noninstructional time.

To ensure the safety of students and staff and avoid potential disruptions, all visitors shall register immediately upon entering any school building or grounds when school is in session.

For purposes of school safety and security, the principal or designee may design a visible means of identification for visitors while on school premises.

No electronic listening or recording device may be used by students or visitors in a classroom without the teacher and principal's permission. (Education Code 51512)

DETAIL

The Superintendent or designee shall post at every entrance to each school and school grounds a notice setting forth visitor registration requirements, hours during which registration is required, the registration location, the route to take to that location, and the penalties for violation of registration requirements. (Penal Code 627.6)

Unless otherwise directed by the principal or designee, a staff member shall accompany visitors while they are on school grounds.

Registration Procedure

In order to register, visitors shall, upon request, furnish the principal or designee with the following information: (Penal Code 627.3)

- 1. His/her name, address and occupation
- 2. His/her age, if less than 21
- 3. His/her purpose for entering school grounds
- 4. Proof of identity
- 5. Other information consistent with the provisions of law

Denial of Registration

1. The principal or designee may refuse to register any outsider if he/she reasonably concludes that the outsider's presence or acts would disrupt the school, students, or employees; would result in damage to property; or would result in the distribution or use of a controlled substance. Outsiders do not include students, parents/guardians, a governing board member or district employees, representative of an employee organization, elected public officials, or publisher, editor, reporter, or other person connected with or employed by a newspaper, magazine, other periodical, radio station or television station. (Penal Code 627.1.)

The principal or designee or school security officer may revoke an outsider's registration if he/she has a reasonable basis for concluding that the outsider's presence on school grounds would interfere or is interfering with the peaceful conduct of school activities or would disrupt or is disrupting the school, students or staff. (Penal Code 627.4)

(cf. 3515.2 - Disruptions)

2. The principal or designee may request that an outsider who has failed to register, or whose registration privileges have been denied or revoked, promptly leave school grounds. When an outsider is directed to leave, the principal or designee shall inform the outsider that if he/she reenters the school within seven days he/she will be guilty of a misdemeanor subject to a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 627.7)

Appeal Procedure

Any person who is denied registration or whose registration is revoked may appeal to the Superintendent or principal by submitting, within five days after the person's departure from school, a written request for a hearing. This request must state why he/she believes the denial or revocation was improper and must provide an address to which the hearing notice may be sent. Upon receipt of the request for a hearing, the Superintendent or principal shall promptly mail a notice of the hearing to the person requesting it. A hearing before the Superintendent or principal shall be held within seven days after receipt of the request. (Penal Code 627.5)

DETAIL

The Governing Board is committed to keeping the schools free from disruptions and to keeping unauthorized persons from entering school grounds. The Superintendent or designee shall provide for the prompt removal from school premises of any individual who disrupts or threatens to disrupt normal school operations, threatens the health and safety of students or staff, or causes property damage.

District and school site safety plans shall specify action to be taken, including specific staff responsibilities, when an individual is causing a disruption. School staff shall be trained to recognize when an individual has committed acts that constitute a disruption in violation of Board policy.

DETAIL

The Governing Board recognizes that all school staff must be prepared to cope with campus disturbances and to minimize the risks they entail. Staff should be especially sensitive to conditions that foster racial conflict, student protests, or gang intimidation and confrontations.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish at each school a disturbance response plan for curbing disruptions which create disorder and may lead to riots, violence or vandalism at school or school-sponsored events.

The Superintendent or designee shall consult with law enforcement authorities to plan for police support during school disruptions. Each school's disturbance response plan shall address the role of law enforcement. When a disturbance directly threatens students or staff, the Superintendent or designee has the authority to call in law enforcement personnel for assistance and may dismiss school.

Students who participate in disturbances may be subject to disciplinary action.

DETAIL

All school staff shall respond to campus disturbances in accordance with the school's Comprehensive School Safety Plan (Section: Civil Unrest & Intruders). Response plans shall describe:

- 1. The means which will be used to signal an emergency situation and maintain communication among staff and with the Superintendent or designee.
- 2. Each staff member's specific duties during a disturbance.
- 3. Procedures for ensuring the safety of students and staff.
- 4. Conditions, as prearranged with law enforcement authorities, under which the principal or designee shall:
 - a. Inform the police.
 - b. Secure police assistance.
 - c. Give the police responsibility for a specific crisis situation.
- 5. Procedures for the orderly dismissal of school when authorized by the principal or designee.

All media inquiries during crisis situations shall be routed to the Superintendent or designee.

Extension of Class Period

During any disturbance in which additional students might become involved while changing classes, the principal or designee may notify all staff that the present class period will be extended until further notice. Upon receiving this notification:

- 1. Teachers shall ensure that all students in their charge remain in one location under their supervision.
- 2. Teachers shall ask any students who are in the halls to return to their classes at once.

Prohibited Activities

1. Disturbing the Peace:

It is a misdemeanor to intentionally cause or attempt to cause a riot by engaging in conduct which urges a riot or urges others to act forcefully or violently, or to burn or destroy property under circumstances which produce a clear, present, and immediate danger of such acts occurring. (Penal Code 404.6)

Anyone who, in a public place, fights, challenges another to fight, or uses offensive words likely to provoke a fight is guilty of a misdemeanor. (Penal Code 415)

2. Disruption of School Operations:

Students shall be subject to disciplinary action for any exercise of free expression which so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on school premises or the violation of lawful school regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the school, such as may occur when students:

- a. Organize or participate in unauthorized assemblies on school premises.
- b. Participate in sit-ins or stand-ins which deny students or employees normal

to school premises.

3. Refusal to Disperse:

Persons who assemble for the purpose of disturbing the public peace or committing any unlawful act are severally guilty of a misdemeanor if they do not disperse when desired or commanded to do so by a public officer. (Penal Code 416)

Persons who remain present at the place of any riot, rout or unlawful assembly after being lawfully warned to disperse are guilty of a misdemeanor. (Penal Code 409)

4. Boycotts

Students participating in any protest that involves nonattendance at school or at a school activity where attendance is required shall be identified as truant, regardless of any parental approval of their act.

Welfare x

DETAIL

The Governing Board believes that free inquiry and exchange of ideas are essential parts of a democratic education. The Board respects students' rights to express ideas and opinions, take stands on issues, and support causes, even when such speech is controversial or unpopular.

On-Campus Expression

Students shall have the right to exercise freedom of speech <u>and of the press including</u>, <u>but not limited to</u>, the use of <u>bulletin boards</u>; the distribution of printed materials <u>or petitions</u>; the wearing of buttons, badges and other insignia; <u>and the right of expression in official publications</u>. (Education Code 48907)

Student expression on district or school Internet web sites and on-line media shall generally be afforded the same protections as print media.

Students' freedom of expression shall be limited only as allowed by law in order to maintain an orderly school environment and to protect the rights, health and safety of all members of the school community.

Students are prohibited from making any expressions or distributing or posting any materials that are obscene, libelous or slanderous. Students also are prohibited from making any expressions that so incite students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on school premises, the violation of school rules, or substantial disruption of the school's orderly operation. (Education Code 48907)

The use of "fighting words" or epithets is prohibited if the speech is abusive and insulting rather than a communication of ideas, and the speech is used in an abusive manner in a situation that presents an actual danger that it will cause a breach of the peace.

School officials shall not engage in prior restraint of material prepared for official school publications except insofar as the content of the material violates the law. (Education Code 48907)

The Superintendent or designee shall not discipline any high school student solely on the basis of speech or other communication that would be constitutionally protected when engaged in outside of school, but may impose discipline for harassment, threats or intimidation unless constitutionally protected. (Education Code 48950)

Off-Campus Expression

Off-campus student expression, including but not limited to student expression on off-campus Internet web sites, is generally constitutionally protected but shall be subject to discipline when such expression poses a direct threat to the safety of students or school personnel.

Conduct by a student outside of class which for any reason materially disrupts classwork or involves substantial disorder or invasion of the rights of others is not protected by the constitutional guarantee of free speech.

DETAIL

The Governing Board affirms the right of every student to be protected from hate-motivated behavior. It is the intent of the Board to promote harmonious relationships that enable students to gain a true understanding of the civil rights and social responsibilities of people in our society. Behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of his/her race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, gender, sexual orientation, physical/mental attributes, religious beliefs or practices shall not be tolerated.

Any student who feels that he/she is a victim of hate-motivated behavior shall immediately contact the principal or designee. If the student believes that the situation has not been remedied by the principal or designee, he/she may file a complaint in accordance with district complaint procedures.

Staff who receive notice of hate-motivated behavior or personally observe such behavior shall notify the principal, Superintendent or designee, and law enforcement, as appropriate. Students demonstrating hate-motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

In addition, the district shall provide counseling and appropriate sensitivity training and diversity education for students exhibiting hate-motivated behavior. The district shall also provide counseling, guidance and support, as necessary, to those students who are the victims of hate-motivated behavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff receive appropriate training to recognize hate-motivated behavior and methods for handling such behavior in appropriate ways.

The district shall provide age-appropriate instruction to help promote understanding of and respect for human rights.

At the beginning of each school year, students and staff shall receive a copy of the district's policy on hate-motivated behavior.

DETAIL

The Board of Education desires to provide orderly and caring learning environments in which all students feed comfortable, share the responsibility for maintaining a positive school climate and take pride in their school and their achievements.

The district shall encourage attitudes and behaviors that promote mutual respect and harmonious relations. The schools shall promote nonviolent conflict resolution techniques and provide students opportunities to voice their concerns about school policies and practices. The Superintendent or designee may initiate student courts, campus beautification projects, buddy systems, vandalism prevention campaigns and other programs in which students may identify and solve problems that affect their school.

The schools shall actively discourage any comments or gestures which are obscene or which denigrate others on account of gender, race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, sexual orientation, handicap or disadvantage. Students shall be subject to disciplinary procedures for bullying other students or for using insults, slurs, or fighting words which may disrupt school activities.

The curriculum and counseling programs shall foster positive racial and ethnic identity, help students understand diverse cultures, teach them to think critically about racial bias and show them how to deal with discriminatory behavior in appropriate ways. The Board encourages the use of cooperative learning strategies in the classroom in order to foster positive social interactions among students.

School staff shall encourage and reward success and achievement, participation in community projects and positive student conduct.

DETAIL

To foster intercultural understanding, communication and respect in an increasingly diverse society, curriculum and instruction at all grade levels shall reflect the perspective and experiences of various cultural, ethnic, racial and social groups. The Governing Board desires that multicultural education be integrated across the curriculum into as many subjects as possible rather than providing isolated lessons on different cultures.

The district's comprehensive multicultural education program shall recognize the contributions of different groups of people to the history, life and culture of the local community, California, the United States and other nations. It may include but not be limited to instruction about the languages, cultural characteristics, significant events and individuals, and social, political and economic conditions of various ethnic groups.

While recognizing the unique aspects of different cultures and peoples, multicultural education shall also emphasize commonalities and challenge the stereotypes and biases that inhibit intergroup understanding. Multicultural education also shall be designed to contribute to the personal development of students through greater self-understanding, positive self-concept and pride in one's ethnic identity.

Budget Development x

DETAIL

The Superintendent/designee is authorized to approve conference attendance and necessary expenses for an employee to perform services for the district within the limits of the adopted budget and with the following limitations:

- A. Out-of-state travel and travel for which the estimated cost will exceed \$1000 shall be authorized by the Board of Education. All other conferences must be processed on Purchase Orders.
- B. The Superintendent/designee shall approve employee, Board member or non-employee expense claims in accordance with this policy.
- C. Prior approval for employee travel shall be authorized by the Superintendent/ designee. Travel includes attendance at workshops, seminars, conventions, conferences and other meetings of interest to the District.
- D. Expenses cannot be incurred under the term "representatives of the Board of Education" for the following:
- 1. Public officials
- 2. District auditors
- 3. Any person who may be involved in providing funds to the District
- 4. Family members of Board and employees
- 5. Building contractors or similar persons or firms
- 6. Consultants
- DE. Personnel Commission members and their staff are authorized to attend only those conferences and meetings that have been approved in the Personnel Commission Budget.
- EF. Authorized Expenditures
 - 1. MEALS <u>and INCIDENTALS</u> The maximum <u>per diem</u> allowance for meals <u>and incidentals</u> shall be the rate established by the U.S. General Services Administration (GSA). For conferences that end before 12:00 noon the maximum shall be 75% of the established rate.

A banquet breakfast, luncheon or dinner, which is an official part of a conference program and for which there is a prescribed fee, may exceed the daily meal allowance and shall be paid at actual cost with conference fees.

2. LODGING - Lodging shall not exceed the rate for single occupancy <u>and shall not exceed the established U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) rates. If the GSA rate is not available, rate should be no higher than what is reasonable and equally comparable to the conference location as determined by Business Services. The GSA rates are available at:</u>

Hotels that accept the GSA rates may be found at http://www.hotelsfplf.com/fpl/st5.htm or by contacting Fiscal Services. Lodging is not authorized for one-day conferences that are scheduled within 100 miles from the district.

3. TRANSPORTATION – If the same type of conference is offered in various locations, attendance shall be at the conference closest to the employee's home or work location. Economy, standard, tourist or similar coach airfare rates are allowed including necessary taxi and shuttle service fees. The option for use of a private vehicle is allowed except that the District shall make reimbursement for transportation resulting in the least cost to the District.

Employees who receive a monthly mileage allotment will only be reimbursed for use of private vehicle OUTSIDE OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY.

- 4. REGISTRATION Registration fees are authorized.
- 5. CONFERENCE FEES Conference fees for specific events are authorized except those that are essentially entertainment or non-business.
- 6. TELEPHONE <u>and INTERNET ACCESS</u> Telephone or <u>hotel internet access</u> or telegram expenses are authorized for school business only <u>and shall not to exceed \$10.00</u> per day.

FG. Reimbursement Guidelines

- 1. Reimbursement shall be based upon actual and necessary costs <u>not to exceed amounts</u> <u>set forth in this policy</u>.
- 2. When travel is authorized and costs are incurred, the claimant shall be required to prepare a Request for Absence on District Business form which details all expenditures incurred. This form shall be filed with the management level supervisor within 15 working days after return from travel and submitted to the Office of Fiscal Services for processing.

- 3. Receipts or as proof of payment shall be submitted for the following expenditures:
 - a. Air fare/train fare
 - b. Lodging
 - c. Registration
 - d. Conference fees
 - e. Car rentals
 - f. Taxi/shuttle service
 - g. Telephone and internet access (school business only)
 - h. Parking fees
 - i. Meals (itemized receipts required)

GH. Advances

- 1. A travel advance may be requested on the Request for Absence on District Business form not to exceed 70% of the total estimated expenses excluding those expenses prepaid by the district. A travel advance will not be disbursed to an employee who has neglected to file a claim covering a prior trip or advance.
- 2. If a travel advance exceeds actual cost, the claimant shall file a Request for Absence on District Business form showing amounts expended and reimburse the district for the excess amount within 15 days after the return from the trip.
- H. These rates shall apply to all district authorized contractors, subcontractors and consultants per their contracts.





First Overview of 2004-2005 Achievement Data



CST ELA Achievement by Grade Level - Districtwide













English Learners CST ELA Achievement - District Wide






Elementary CST ELA Achievement SMM-County Comparison






Middle School CST ELA Achievement - SMM and LACO Comparison






High School CST ELA Achievement - SMM and County Comparisons






ELA STAR Test Results for Latino students, 2004-2005






ELA STAR Test Results for White Students, 2004-2005





ELA STAR Test Results for Special Education students, 2004-2005






CST Math Achievement by Grade Level - Districtwide






CST Math Achievement by Grade Level 02 and 05


Economically Disadvantaged CST Math Achievement by Grade Level - Districtwide


Elementary CST Math Achievement - SMM-Country Comparison

Middle School CST Math Achievement -**SMM** and County Comparison






Summary of Eighth Grade Mathematics

- Over 600 of the approximately 1000 8th graders in the district took the algebra CST. Fifty percent of them scored at the proficient or advanced levels.
- 72 8th graders took the geometry CST. Ninety-six percent of them scored at the proficient or advanced levels.
- Over 300 8th graders took the general mathematics CST. Just over 20 percent scored at the proficient or advanced levels.
- More than half of the 8th grade students who are economically disadvantaged took the algebra CST. Of those 122 students, 39% scored at the proficient or advanced level.




MATH STAR Results for Latino Students, 2004-2005






MATH STAR Results for African American Students, 2004-2005






MATH STAR Results for White Students, 2004-2005

RESOLUTION NO. 05-01

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF REFUNDING BONDS AND APPROVING FORMS OF DOCUMENTS AND ACTIONS OF OFFICERS OF THE DISTRICT NECESSARY IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, this Board of Education (the "Board") of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District of the County of Los Angeles, California (herein called the "District"), has heretofore issued or caused to be issued its "Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District General Obligation Bonds (Election of 1998) Series 1999" (the "1999 Bonds") in the original principal amount of \$38,000,034, of which \$24,870,034 remains outstanding, and its "Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District General Obligation Bonds (Election of 1998) Series 2001" (the "2001 Bonds") in the original principal amount of \$3,995,000, of which \$3,750,000 remains outstanding, for authorized school purposes;

WHEREAS, this Board has determined, and does hereby declare, that it is necessary and desirable and that the prudent management of the fiscal affairs of the District requires that all or a portion of the 1999 Bonds and the 2001 Bonds now be refunded (such bonds to be refunded being referred to herein as the "Prior Bonds");

WHEREAS, pursuant to Articles 9 and 11 of Chapter 3 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the California Government Code and other applicable law, and pursuant to the resolutions providing for the issuance of the Prior Bonds, the District is authorized to issue refunding bonds (the "Refunding Bonds") to refund all or a portion of the District's outstanding bonds, and to sell its Refunding Bonds at public sale or on a negotiated sale basis;

WHEREAS, this Board has determined that because of the need for flexibility in timing the sale of the Refunding Bonds in order to achieve maximum interest cost savings, it is desirable to sell the Refunding Bonds on a negotiated sale basis to Piper Jaffray & Co. pursuant to a bond purchase contract (the "Bond Purchase Contract");

WHEREAS, the Superintendent of Schools of the County of Los Angeles has jurisdiction over the District;

WHEREAS, this Board acknowledges that the issuance of Refunding Bonds to refinance any of the Prior Bonds more than 90 days in advance of the date of redemption thereof shall preclude any advance refunding of the portion of the Refunding Bonds issued for such purpose;

WHEREAS, the District will appoint a Paying Agent (herein called the "Paying Agent") with respect to the Refunding Bonds, and an Escrow Agent (the "Escrow Agent") with respect to the Prior Bonds;

WHEREAS, the District proposes to execute and deliver an Escrow Agreement to the Escrow Agent directing the creation of an escrow fund for deposit of proceeds of sale of the Refunding Bonds for the purpose of paying and redeeming the Prior Bonds;

WHEREAS, there have been submitted and are on file with the Secretary of this Board of Education proposed forms of a Bond Purchase Contract, a Paying Agent Agreement, an Escrow Agreement, and a Continuing Disclosure Certificate, all with respect to the Refunding Bonds proposed to be issued and sold, and the Superintendent of the District has examined and approved each document and has recommended that this Board direct the completion, where appropriate, and the execution of such documents and the consummation of such financing;

WHEREAS, this Board desires that the Treasurer-Tax Collector of the County of Los Angeles should collect a tax on all taxable property within the District sufficient to provide for payment of the Refunding Bonds, and intends by the adoption of this Resolution to notify the Board of Supervisors, the Auditor-Controller, the Treasurer-Tax Collector, and other officials of the County of Los Angeles, that they should take such actions as shall be necessary to provide for the levy and collection of such a tax and payment of the Refunding Bonds and such portion, if any, of the 1999 Bonds or 2001 Bonds as shall remain outstanding following the issuance of the Refunding Bonds;

WHEREAS, it will be necessary for the Board to employ bond counsel and disclosure counsel and to incur costs and expenses in preparing the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the Refunding Bonds; and

WHEREAS, there has been submitted to this Board and is on file with the Superintendent a proposed form of agreement for bond counsel services in connection with the Refunding Bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Education of Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District does hereby RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER, as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. All of the above recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. Authorization of Refunding Bonds and of Redemption of Prior Bonds; Application of Proceeds of Sale. The Board hereby authorizes the sale and issuance of a series of refunding bonds of the District and the designation of said bonds as the "Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District 2005 General Obligation Refunding Bonds" (herein called the "Refunding Bonds") in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$19,000,000, which amount shall be finally determined by the Superintendent of the District, the Assistant Superintendent Fiscal, Business Services & Chief Financial Officer of the District, or such other officer of the District designated for the purpose (each, an "Authorized District Representative"), in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 hereof and with the general laws of the State of California.

Proceeds from the sale of the Refunding Bonds are hereby authorized to be applied only as permitted by Article 9 of Chapter 3 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code, including to acquire escrow securities or otherwise to pay or provide for payment of the principal of the Prior Bonds upon redemption thereof; to pay all expenses incident to the calling, retiring or paying of the Prior Bonds and to the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, including: charges of the Paying Agent in connection with the issuance and payment of the Refunding Bonds; charges of the Escrow Agent in connection with the redemption of the Prior Bonds; interest upon the Prior Bonds from the date of sale of the Refunding Bonds to the maturity or earlier redemption date of the Prior Bonds; any premium payable upon the redemption of the Prior Bonds; and the costs of any bond insurance or other credit enhancement with respect to the Refunding Bonds. The Board hereby further determines that all interest or other gain derived from the investment of proceeds of the Refunding Bonds may be applied to pay such costs of issuance of the Refunding Bonds.

Section 3. Terms of Refunding Bonds. The maximum annual interest rate on the Refunding Bonds shall be 12%, payable as described in the Paying Agent Agreement referred to in Section 4 hereof. The Refunding Bonds shall mature on a date or dates, in such of the years, beginning no earlier than August 1, 2006 and concluding no later than August 1, 2025, as shall be specified in the Bond Purchase Contract described in Section 6 hereof. No Refunding Bonds shall have principal maturing on more than one principal maturity date; however it shall not be necessary that a portion of the principal mature in each year.

The Refunding Bonds may be issued as current interest Refunding Bonds or capital appreciation Refunding Bonds as the Authorized District Representative shall determine upon the sale of such bonds. The current interest Refunding Bonds may mature in the same year or years as the capital appreciation Refunding Bonds, without limitation. The aggregate principal amount of the Refunding Bonds issued as both current interest Refunding Bonds and as capital appreciation Refunding Bonds shall not exceed \$19,000,000.

The aggregate principal amount of the current interest Refunding Bonds, the date thereof, the maturity dates, principal amounts and annual rates of interest of each maturity thereof, the initial and semiannual interest payment dates thereof, and the terms of optional and mandatory sinking fund redemption thereof, and the aggregate principal amount of the capital appreciation Refunding Bonds, the date thereof, the initial principal amounts, maturity dates and maturity values of each maturity thereof, the initial and semiannual interest compounding dates thereof, and the terms of optional and mandatory sinking fund redemption thereof, shall be as specified in the Bond Purchase Contract.

Section 4. Paying Agent Agreement. The form of instrument entitled "Paying Agent Agreement," tentatively dated as of August 1, 2005, by and between the District and a Paying Agent to be appointed by the District, in substantially the form on file with the Secretary of the Board, is hereby approved and authorized. The Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to file a copy of said form of instrument with the minutes of this meeting, and the Authorized District Representative is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver an instrument in substantially said form, completed with terms as shall be agreed to by the Authorized District Representative in accordance with this Resolution, and with such other changes therein as the

Authorized District Representative may require or approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

Section 5. Escrow Agreement. The form of instrument entitled "Escrow Agreement," tentatively dated as of August 1, 2005, by and between the District and an Escrow Agent to be appointed by the District, in substantially the form on file with the Secretary of the Board, is hereby approved and authorized. The Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to file a copy of said form of instrument with the minutes of this meeting, and the Authorized District Representative is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver an instrument in substantially said form, completed with terms as shall be agreed to by the Authorized District Representative in accordance with this Resolution, and with such other changes therein as the Authorized District Representative may require or approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

Section 6. Bond Purchase Contract; Sale of Refunding Bonds. The form of proposed Bond Purchase Contract is hereby approved and adopted as the contract for purchase and sale of the Refunding Bonds in substantially the form on file with the Secretary of the Board, and the Authorized District Representative is hereby authorized and directed to continue to consult with the underwriter and to monitor market interest rates, and, when in the judgment of the Authorized District Representative, such rates provide reasonable and beneficial advantage to the District's taxpayers, to execute and deliver the Bond Purchase Contract in substantially the form hereby approved, completed with terms as the Authorized District Representative shall have agreed to in accordance with this Resolution, and with such other changes therein as the Authorized District Representative may require or approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof; provided, that (i) net taxpayer savings shall be at least \$500,000; (ii) the total net interest cost to maturity on the Refunding Bonds plus the principal amount of the Refunding Bonds shall be less than the total net interest cost to maturity on the Prior Bonds plus the principal amount of the Prior Bonds; (iii) the stated interest rate on the Refunding Bonds shall not exceed 12% per year; (iv) the underwriter's discount shall not exceed 1.0% of the principal amount of the Refunding Bonds; and (v) the Refunding Bonds shall otherwise conform to the limitations specified herein and imposed by the general laws of the State.

Section 7. Request for Necessary County Actions. (a) The Board of Supervisors, the Auditor-Controller, the Treasurer-Tax Collector, and other officials of the County, are hereby requested to take and authorize such actions as may be necessary pursuant to law to provide for the levy and collection of a property tax on all taxable property of the District sufficient to provide for payment of all principal of, redemption premium, if any, and interest on the Refunding Bonds as the same shall become due and payable and to apply moneys in the District's Interest and Sinking Fund as necessary to the payment of the Refunding Bonds, pursuant to the Paying Agent Agreement, and to the payment of any 1999 Bonds or 2001 Bonds which are to remain outstanding, pursuant to the resolution under which such bonds were issued. The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to deliver certified copies of this Resolution to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County, the Auditor-Controller of the County, and the Treasurer-Tax Collector of the County. The Board hereby agrees to reimburse the County for any costs associated with the levy and collection of said tax, upon such documentation of said costs as the District shall reasonably request.

- (b) The Board of Supervisors, the Auditor-Controller, the Treasurer-Tax Collector, and other officials of the County, are hereby requested to take and authorize such actions as may be necessary, upon, but only upon, the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, to discontinue the levy of property taxes on all taxable property of the District for the payment of the Prior Bonds, pursuant to Section 53561 of the California Government Code.
- Section 8. Notice of Redemption of Prior Bonds. The Escrow Agent is hereby authorized and directed to give notice of redemption of the Prior Bonds to be redeemed, as set forth in the Escrow Agreement, pursuant to the terms of the resolution of the County Board of Supervisors authorizing the issuance thereof and pursuant to the terms of the Escrow Agreement, at the direction and request of the Authorized District Representative.
- Section 9. Continuing Disclosure. The form of instrument entitled, "Continuing Disclosure Certificate," in substantially the form on file with the Secretary of the Board, is hereby approved and authorized. The Secretary of the Board is hereby directed to file a copy of said form of instrument with the minutes of this meeting, and the Authorized District Representative is hereby authorized and directed on behalf of the District to execute and deliver such Continuing Disclosure Certificate in substantially said form, with such changes thereto as deemed necessary in order to permit the original purchaser of the Refunding Bonds to comply with the requirements of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12. The District hereby covenants and agrees that it will comply with and carry out all of the provisions of such Continuing Disclosure Certificate.
- Sutcliffe LLP is hereby appointed bond counsel to the District in connection with the Refunding Bonds, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the proposed form of agreement for bond counsel services on file with the Superintendent. The Authorized District Representative is hereby authorized and directed to execute said agreement with Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP, with such modifications and conditions as shall be acceptable to the Authorized District Representative, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by such execution.
- Section 11. Authorization of Further Actions. (a) Bond counsel and the appropriate District officials are hereby authorized and directed to continue to prepare the necessary legal documents to accomplish said financing and the other transactions authorized herein, and to take any and all necessary actions in connection therewith.
- (b) The officers and employees of the District are hereby authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things which they may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the transactions herein authorized, and otherwise to carry out, give effect to and comply with the terms and intent of this Resolution. The President of the Board, the Superintendent of the District, the Assistant Superintendent Fiscal, Business Services & Chief Financial Officer of the District, the Clerk or Secretary of the Board, and the other officers and employees of the District are hereby authorized and directed to provide for the purchase of escrow securities, to execute and deliver any and all notices, certificates and representations, including signature certificates, no-litigation certificates, tax certificates, certificates relating to continuing disclosure obligations, notices to the California Debt and Investment Advisory
