It is recommended that the Board of Education approve State funds presently available for the Community-Based English Tutoring Program. The allocation is based on the number of Limited English Proficient students in the district and will provide funds for adult English language instruction programs for parents and other members of the community who make a commitment to tutoring K-12 children with Limited English Proficiency. The funds are available immediately upon board approval.

The Board of Education must assure that five conditions of acceptance be certified, as follows:

- 1. The conditions established pursuant to California Education Code (EC) sections 300-340, and California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 5, Sections 11300-11315.5 will be met by the District in the administration of this program.
- 2. The district will use fiscal control and accounting procedures that will ensure proper disbursements and accounting of state funds paid to that agency under the program. The district will make records available for audit when requested.
- 3. Funds may be used for direct program services, community notification processes, transportation services, and background checks related to the adults participating in the tutoring program.
- 4. The district will be responsible for expending these funds to provide free or subsidized adult English-language instruction for parents or community members who have pledged to provide personal English-language tutoring to English learners kindergarten through grade twelve.
- 5. Pledge records will consist of the following information: name of school district, name of school, and the name and signature of parent or community member committed to tutor English learners. These records will be maintained for audit.
- 6. A CBET plan will be adopted by the local governing board and include elements of instruction and achievement information as described by EC Section 317. The data collected shall be used, by the governing board, to review and revise the plan as necessary, not less than once every

three years, and be made available to the state as requested.

Signature of Presiding Officer of Governing Board is required. Original Notification of Intent to Participate, Fiscal Year 2007-2008, and CBET plan are attached for review and approval.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 06-13 in recognition of Senator Alan Lowenthal for his efforts in introducing legislation to successfully ensure the funding from delinquent tax receivables to school districts participating in the Los Angeles County Joint Powers Authority.

COMMENTS: On March 1, 2007, the Board of Education adopted Resolution No. 06-11, Regarding Assignment Of Delinquent Tax Receivables To Joint Powers Authority And Future Sales Agreement (Item A.20). Under that agreement with the Joint Powers Authority (JPA), those member school districts receive an 8.5% premium of its entity's delinquent property taxes. SMMUSD will receive \$85,274.00 in 2006-07.

Subsequently, statutory changes that shifted property taxes from schools to local governments jeopardized repayment of the bonds that financed the property tax delinquencies. Senator Alan Lowenthal introduced legislation that successfully remedied this issue, benefiting the Los Angeles County school agencies that had financed their property tax delinquencies.

Adoption of this Resolution will express the district's gratitude and recognize Senator Lowenthal for his advocacy of important public education legislative issues.

RESOLUTION FOR SENATORALAN LOWENTHAL

WHEREAS, under the authority of Government Code Section 6516.6, 93 K-14 public school agencies in Los Angeles County formed a joint powers authority (JPA) to finance their share of Los Angeles County's property tax delinquencies; and

WHEREAS, schools that elected to participate in this program executed a Purchase and Sale Agreement through which they assigned their secured roll delinquent tax receivables from FY 1998-99 through FY 2003-04 to the JPA; and

WHEREAS, every school district that participated in this program received additional funding equal to 8.5% of the total amount of delinquent property tax receivables that it assigned to the JPA, which resulted in additional unrestricted income for each district; and

WHEREAS, and the program has produced additional, unrestricted income totaling more than \$31 million for public schools in Los Angeles County; and

WHEREAS, recent statutory changes that shifted property taxes from schools to local governments jeopardized repayment of the bonds that financed the property tax delinquencies; and

WHEREAS, Senator Alan Lowenthal recognized that measures needed to be taken to correct these inadvertent drafting errors and introduced legislation that successfully remedied this issue; and

WHEREAS, this correction continues to benefit the 93 school agencies in Los Angeles County that had financed their property tax delinquencies;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District thanks Senator Lowenthal for his actions resulting in enactment of SB 490 (Chapter 366, Statutes of 2006) which will benefit more than one million students throughout the County of Los Angeles and recognizes and appreciates the efforts of Senator Lowenthal in addressing this important issue.

District Advisory Committee Board of Education Annual Report 2006-2007

DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS (FORMERLY THE FINE ARTS DAC)

Chair: Cindy Rosmann

Staff Liaison: Tom Whaley

Charge:

- Serve as a vehicle for parents, community, teachers, and students to communicate with the Board of Education on matters related to all students' equitable access to and successful participation in comprehensive, sequential, standards-based PreK-12 Arts Education. A comprehensive arts education program, with the arts taught as discrete disciplines, should be an integral part of the core curriculum offered to all students at all grade levels.
- Assess our current Visual and Performing Arts programs (Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts).
- Compare the District's curriculum scheduling, staffing, instructional materials, equipment, and facilities with national and state standards and frameworks.
- Work with various agencies to explore funding to support the Visual and Performing Arts programs.

Accomplishments to date this year:

- 1. The DAC has reviewed student access to arts curriculum, scheduling, enrollment, staffing, and facilities.
- 2. The DAC has compiled a Glossary of Arts Education Organizations and Events for use by students, parents and district staff.
- 3. The DAC has developed a VAPA DAC brochure to encourage membership from a broader segment of the arts education community.
- 4. The VAPA DAC web page on the district web site has to both the glossary and the brochure.
- 5. Student Access to Standards-based VAPA Curriculum in 2006-07:
 - a. DANCE Current program: All 4th graders receive two weeks of dance instruction during P.E. JAMS has one dance class this year. At Samohi, dance instruction is offered during some P.E. classes through the SM/M Education Foundation-funded program and through the UCLA ArtsBridge program. The program has been extended to Malibu and Olympic High Schools during spring semester. There are also two after-

- school SMC "dual enrollment" ethnic dance classes at Samohi.
- b. DANCE Deficiencies: No district wide program in PreK, K, 1, 2, 3, or 5. Few classes are offered at the middle and high schools. Appropriate dance facilities are available only at Grant, McKinley, and Samohi.
- c. MUSIC Current program: General Music in grades 2 and 3; students in grades 4 and 5 can choose between Choir and Instrumental Music. Elective music classes at all middle and high schools. The SM/M Education Foundation, the Gail Dorin Foundation, and the Ella Fitzgerald Foundation fund the Dream Strings and Dream Winds programs at the four title I schools and at two middle schools.
- d. MUSIC Deficiencies: No district wide General/Vocal Music in PreK, kindergarten, or grade 1. Lack of appropriate facilities, especially at the elementary schools. Some class sizes are too large at the elementary level. Elementary teachers are traveling to 3 and 4 schools a day. Insufficient funding for transportation for secondary performing groups -- the Santa Monica Band Parent Association phoned, emailed, and wrote a letter (9/6/06) to then-CFO Winston Braham regarding this issue, but received no reply. For the Viking Marching Band and Color Guard this year, students and their parents had to raise nearly \$40,000 for transportation and over \$57,000 for additional instruction.
- e. THEATRE Current program: Drama classes are being offered at John Adams Middle School, Malibu Middle and High Schools, and Samohi. At the elementary level, the Morgan-Wixson Theater is continuing a partnership begun last year to provide opportunities for elementary students to both attend theatre performances and improve their literacy skills.
- f. THEATRE Deficiencies: No district wide elementary drama program in PreK through 5. "For credit" drama classes have not been offered at Lincoln Middle School since June 2005.
- g. VISUAL ARTS Current program: A wide range of art classes are offered at the three high schools, with fewer offerings at the middle schools. P.S. Arts (a private foundation) is providing art instruction at McKinley and Muir this year. Parents are funding various types of art instruction at Cabrillo, Webster, and some of the other elementary schools.
- h. VISUAL ARTS Deficiencies: No district wide elementary visual arts program in PreK through 5 (eliminated in 1978). In contrast, the Beverly Hills USD provides art to all K-8 students. Dedicated facilities are needed for art instruction at the elementary level. Fewer sections are being offered at the middle and high schools compared to

past years. JAMS has dropped from 1.6 art FTEs to 0.8 art FTEs. Lincoln has suffered a similar drop in art instructors, and Samohi also lost an art position and an art classroom a year ago.

Highlight(s) to date of particular note:

- 1. Partial reinstatement of district wide Elementary Music instruction by credentialed teachers (General Music in grades 2 and 3, Choir in grades 4 and 5) with ongoing funding from the state Arts Initiative. More than 3,000 students are participating.
- 2. Purchase of instructional materials, equipment, and supplies for all 4 arts disciplines, including the reinstated elementary general music and choral music programs, with one-time funding from the state Arts Initiative.
- 3. **High quality instruction -** SMMUSD was featured in a state-wide "Excellence in Arts Education" cyber conference in fall 2006. The district was represented by art teachers Amy Bouse, Marsha Johnson, and Bonnie Schwartz, and by music teachers Jeffe Huls, Terry Sakow, and Joni Swenson.
- 4. **Title I schools -** Instrumental music students receive additional instruction through the Dream Strings and Dream Winds programs. With the reinstatement of elementary general/vocal music instruction and the reinstatement of the district wide Elementary Honor Choir, more Title I students were able to participate in the Stairway of the Stars concerts this year.
- 5. Music performances In addition to winter and spring concerts at all school sites, the "2007 Celebration For The Arts" at Santa Monica Pier, and the "Stairway of the Stars" concerts at Santa Monica Civic Auditorium, student groups performed this year in New York City (at Carnegie Hall), Italy, and Greece.
- 6. Theatre performances JAMS, Malibu Middle, Malibu High, and Samohi all presented plays this year. The JAMS Theatre program was reinstated, and JAMS students performed in San Diego.
- 7. **Dance** A dance class was introduced at JAMS this year. The UCLA ArtsBridge dance program at Samohi was expanded to Malibu High and Olympic High.
- 8. Art exhibits Students from Franklin Elementary participated in the "Wall Works" program this year, and their artwork was displayed at the Santa Monica Museum of Art's "Wall Works Gallery" at Santa Monica Place in March. Artwork by students from JAMS, Lincoln, Malibu, Olympic, and Samohi was displayed at the "2007 Celebration For The Arts" at Santa Monica Pier. Exhibits of artwork by Samohi

- students at the Roberts Gallery at Samohi can be seen online at http://www.smmusd.org/art/htmls/roberts.htm.
- 9. A Theatre Manager has been hired for Barnum Hall, thanks to the efforts of Jean Sedillos, Michael Hill, and the SPACE Committee.
- 10. The U.S. Department of Education has awarded SMMUSD a 4-year SmART Schools grant. The goal is integrating the arts throughout the curriculum in the four Title I schools.
- 11. **Honors -** SMMUSD art students were honored this year in the L.A. County Music Center Spotlight Awards. District music students were selected for honor choirs, string orchestras, orchestras, and bands by the Southern California School Band and Orchestra Association, the Southern California Vocal Association, the California Orchestra Directors Association, and the California Association for Music Education. The Samohi Jazz Band placed first in the advanced division at the Western States Jazz Festival.
- 12. **Fundraising -** Jackson Browne and Venice will perform on a "For The Arts" benefit concert at Samohi on June 2nd.

Suggested direction for 2006-07:

1. CURRICULUM AND STAFFING:

- a. **Visual Arts** Begin to develop an elementary Visual Arts program modeled after the Beverly Hills USD program.
- b. Theatre Reinstate the Lincoln Middle School Drama program using a 3-tiered approach: integrate drama instruction into 6th grade Humanities/Social Studies class; offer standards-based year-long "for credit" drama classes as electives; and provide after-school programs for play/musical production.
- c. **Visual Arts** Increase Visual Arts staffing at JAMS and Lincoln.
- d. **Dance** Maintain standards-based district wide Dance instruction for 4th grade, and add one more grade level.
- e. Dance Provide a Dance class at all 3 middle schools (JAMS has a new dance class this year), or at least a two-week standards-based Dance unit for each grade level as part of the P.E. curriculum. Share district staff, provide professional development, and/or use artists-in-residence to work with credentialed teachers.
- f. Dance Offer a comprehensive Dance program at all 3 high
 schools (ballet, modern, ethnic).
- g. Dance Allow 9th graders to receive P.E. credit for Dance as they were able to do in 1989-90. Currently, high school students are required to take two years of P.E., but 9th graders cannot use dance classes for P.E. credit.
- h. **Theatre** Pilot a LAUSD-style Drama program at 2 elementary schools.

- i. VAPA at Samohi Schedule more A-period classes at Samohi for 9th and 10th graders so they can take both a music class and a foreign language class. A-period also needs to include non-honors sections of academic classes so that athletes who are not enrolled in the honors program can participate in arts classes during the regular school day.
- j. Visual Arts Add new Visual Arts electives, to be determined by faculty, at the 3 high schools. Consider alternating curriculum by year or semester.

2. FACILITIES:

DAC members and VAPA staff participated in the district wide Facilities Master Plan process. The DAC sent a questionnaire to all district VAPA teachers, and the results were given to the Our School Plan consultants last year.

- a. Appropriate facilities for Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts instruction are needed at all elementary schools. "Dedicated" arts classrooms are part of the "Arts for All" strategic plan and should be included in the Measure BB construction program.
- b. The Samohi music building needs adequate ventilation and air conditioning. (See 2/27/07 letter from the DAC to Wally Berriman.) The practice rooms in the Malibu High music building also need adequate ventilation so students are not bathed in perspiration. According to national Opportunity-to-Learn Standards for Arts Education, p.25, "Lighting and ventilation systems are designed so that rehearsal rooms have a Noise Criterion (NC) level not to exceed NC25. Rehearsal rooms, practice rooms, and instrument storage rooms maintain a year-round temperature range between 68 and 72 degrees, with humidity between 40% and 50%, and air exchange rates double that of regular classrooms."
- c. Instrument lockers are needed for the Samohi music building to store both school-owned and privately owned musical instruments. During the Prop X program, the Wenger Corporation designed a storage system specifically for the new building and for the schools' instrument inventory. Secured storage for instruments is an essential part of national and district music standards.
- d. Theatre facilities need improvements at all middle and high schools. The Theatre Operations office in Barnum Hall was designated as a Testing Room a few years ago. A Theatre Manager was recently hired, and he was assigned to use the boys' dressing room (known as the "Second Chorus Dressing Room") for his office. Since it's inappropriate for high school boys and girls to share a single dressing room, it's important that the Testing Room be moved to another location ASAP. Also, when the

- organ pipes get installed in Barnum Hall, the room where they are currently being stored, along with other materials, should revert to Barnum Hall use for storage of equipment.
- e. Visual Arts facilities need improvements at all middle and high schools. At Malibu High, there is no ventilation in the kiln room, which is a health and safety issue. Many art classrooms need more sinks and additional storage, including secured storage for hazardous materials.
- f. Dance facilities improvements are needed at 13 of 16 school sites. Of the middle and high schools, only Samohi has a dance studio. Of the elementary schools, only the Grant and McKinley auditoriums both have flooring which is appropriate for dance instruction.

Budgetary Implications:

- 1. 1.0 FTE to pilot an elementary Visual Arts program: \$70,000
- 2. 0.4 FTE to reinstate Drama at Lincoln: \$28,000
- 3. 2.0 FTE to return secondary Visual Arts staffing to former levels (1.0 FTE at Samohi and 1.0 FTE to be shared between JAMS and Lincoln): \$140,000
- 4. Add 5th grade to the current elementary Dance program: \$17,000
- 5. 1.0 FTE to pilot a district wide middle school Dance program, with JAMS and Lincoln sharing a teacher: \$70,000
- 6. Bring district Visual and Performing Arts facilities up to national and district standards with funds from Measure BB: $\underline{\text{Cost TBD}}$
- 7. Purchase the Wenger instrument storage system that was designed for the Samohi music building: \$150,000
- 8. Provide transportation funding for the Samohi Viking Marching Band and Color Guard, which represent their high school, the school district, and the City of Santa Monica at so many events each year. (Since the band expanded from 120 to 160 this year, parents had to raise \$120,000 for transportation and instruction in order for all students to participate. The Marching Band cannot compete in tournaments without a Color Guard.) \$40,000
- 9. Reinstate funding to keep Samohi's Roberts Art Gallery (the oldest art gallery in continuous existence in L.A. County) functioning. Liability insurance for professional exhibits, an operating budget, and a free period, "Plus One", or stipend for the gallery director are needed: \$15,000

CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT DAC

The charge of the Child Care and Development DAC for 2006-2007 is:

- Work with CDE, Easter Seals, SMC, and district staff to consider the transition of the full day/full year JAMS and Washington West preschool childcare contract from Easter Seals to CDS.
- Explore alternative funding sources for the Infant Family Support Program to replace funds no longer available through St Johns Hospital.
- Continue to participate in the Facilities Master Plan to ensure adequate spaces for all CDS programs.
- Work with the Special Education Department to explore the enhancement of early intervention transitions and to expand CDS preschool inclusion programs.
- Continue coordination of the CREST program with the City of Santa Monica, and enhance services for children with special needs in the after school programs.
- Create new inclusion preschool program at Lincoln Preschool in collaboration with Special Education preschool program.
- Participate in the State preschool standards process.
- Explore possibilities for expanded State funding for after school programs.
- Participate in City of Santa Monica CREST evaluation process.
- Explore with Ed Services and the Child Care Task Force the ability to enhance the district kindergarten transition process. Explore with Information Services the possibility of identifying preschool participants in the district enrollment database for future data collection.

Accomplishments to date this year:

The DAC has spent significant time working with staff to ensure a seamless transition of the John Adams preschool and one room at Washington West from the Easter Seals program to a CDS operated full-day program. CDS is in the final stages of making arrangements for the State and Santa Monica College to transition their funding for the program from Easter Seals to

SMMUSD. When this is accomplished, SMMUSD will operate full-day (10.5 hr/day) full year preschool programs at two sites. With the funding from the State and SMC, this is being accomplished without any contribution from the District's General Fund.

Because CDS historically has not had suitable or sufficient space for all of its programs, the DAC is very focused on the facilities master planning process. Members of the DAC attended all the larger workshops and worked at a more specific level with HED to ensure that the draft master plan that HED presents to the Board includes appropriate and adequate space for all CDS programs.

The Infant Toddler Center and Teen Parenting Program have begun some needed facilities work. A new parenting teacher this year has updated the curriculum for the required parenting/child development class.

Preschool enrollment is higher this year. There are waiting lists for many school sites. CREST has provided quality before and after school programs for Kgn - $3^{\rm rd}$ and middle schools (in Santa Monica) during the school year. CREST offers daily 11 hr programming for school age students during winter, spring, and summer breaks. Children with special needs are included in these programs. A new inclusion preschool program was opened at Lincoln Preschool as a collaboration between CDS and Special Education staff.

DAC members and CDS staff have been a part of the creation of proposed State standards for preschool. The standards are being evaluated throughout the State and will be incorporated into the State funding programs in the future.

Significant event organized by the CDS DAC:

DAC members and CDS staff conceived, planned, and participated in a RAND-sponsored conference discussing the benefits of quality early childhood education and the need for additional services (particularly full-day preschool programs and infant and toddler education and care) in our community. During the December 5 conference at RAND Headquarters, a researcher from RAND, Jill Cannon, reviewed approximately twenty studies that show that students realize significant academic and other benefits from their participation in early childhood education programs. Local experts then discussed the continuing need for additional resources to provide quality full-day preschool as well as infant and toddler education and care. Santa Monica City Council members, SMMUSD Board members, SMC Trustees, Santa Monica City Manger Lamont Ewell, Superintendent Dianne Talarico,

SMC President Chui Tsang, Santa Monica Police Chief Tim Jackman and many others attended the conference and engaged in a lively discussion. The participants agreed to schedule further discussions on the topic.

Suggested direction for 2007-08:

The DAC is very interested in increasing the interaction between preschool teachers and kindergarten teachers to enhance children's transition from preschool to elementary school and ensure that they enter kindergarten ready to learn. The DAC also would like to strengthen its collaboration with special education to provide more inclusionary preschool opportunities for children with special needs. In a similar vein, CDS plans to work with the City of Santa Monica to provide improved afterschool experiences for children with special needs.

One of the primary goals of CDS is to ensure that as many children as possible enter Kindergarten ready to learn. A program like the Infant Family Support Program (IFSP) that provides early literacy experiences, teaches parenting skills, focuses on non-violent parenting, and works with families to get medical care is a crucial component of reaching that goal.

The IFSP was created when a group of Santa Monica institutions decided to focus attention and funds on families with children aged 0 - 3. Through a development agreement, St John's Hospital agreed to fund community liaisons and parent educators to develop researched based parenting education accessible for all families with very young children in the community. SMMUSD agree to house the program and to hire the staff. Over the years, St John's Hospital increased the funding until it reached about \$322,000/year. Last year St John's reduced their support to \$200,000. We have just learned that St John's is cutting the funding to \$75,000 beginning June 1, 2007. The CDS DAC will be working to recover from the devastating reduction in funding by assisting staff as the program is downsized, fundraising plans are developed, and community partners are sought. In the meantime, staff layoffs will begin immediately. , CDS is looking at ways to replace monies that its Infant and Family Support Programs lost when Saint John's reduced its funding of that program.

Because early childhood education is an essential component of any meaningful attempt to close the achievement gap, the DAC hopes that, if additional community resources are committed to this goal, CDS will have access to some of them.

Budgetary Implications:

CDS programs are supported by an array of funding sources including parent fees, development agreements and grants, the federal government, the California Department of Education, LA Universal Preschool, and LACOE. CDS programs are funded almost entirely outside the district general fund. The State funds will be increased by about \$650,000 in July when CDS begins operating the full day/full year preschool programs.

The loss of funding from St John's Hospital will mean a loss of programming for families with very young children and a loss of district community liaisons that have performed invaluable service to the community. The lay-off process will have a cost that is unknown at this time.

CDS has requested an increase in funding from LACOE for the Head Start program. If the funding increase is approved, CDS will be able to provide more family support for children who need extra help to enter Kindergarten healthy and ready to be successful learners.

The Future

The CDS DAC is actively working to enhance all District and City child development programs.

It is further recommended that the notice of the time, date, and place of the hearing be posted twice in the Santa Monica Daily Press and the Malibu Surfside News with said advertisement commencing at least 15 days prior to the date of the hearing.

It is further recommended that on that date, the Board of Education adopt a resolution to levy the tax at the rate of \$116.88, plus a CPI-U increase.

COMMENT:

The original resolution proposing a Special Tax requires that prior to the levying of the special tax in any given year, the board will conduct a public hearing on the matter. Notice of the time, date, and place of the hearing has been published pursuant to Government Code Section \$6061 and posted at least twice in a newspaper of general circulation in the District in the Santa Monica Daily Press and the Malibu Surfside News; posting shall commence at least fifteen days prior to the hearing. Following said hearing, each year the board shall adopt a resolution establishing the amount of tax to be raised and the rate per parcel, not to exceed \$98.00 per parcel plus subsequent CPI-U adjustments.

The current tax rate is \$116.88. Proposition "Y" permits an annual increase based upon the annual change (from April to April) to the Consumer Price Index-All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for Los Angeles-Riverside-Orange County.

- > Continued recognition that the highest financial priority is directly related to improving student achievement.

This Agenda item includes a restatement of the budgetary information previously considered, and a recommendation for Board of Education approval of the listed budgetary solution/deficit reduction strategies.

Recognizing the Economics of Budgetary Deficits

The Revenue Side

School district revenue is primarily linked to two factors: District enrollment and State Revenue Limit Funding. For declining enrollment school districts, increases in State Revenue Limit funding (the projected/anticipated annual increases associated with a Cost-of-Living Adjustment/COLA) are rarely sufficient to offset the <u>loss of funding</u> associated with the <u>loss of students</u>.

While school districts receive revenue from multiple sources, in the case of SMMUSD, the revenue side of the budget is also particularly dependent upon:

- ➤ Parcel Taxes/Funding from the City of Santa Monica/Property Lease Income
 - Measure "S" approximately \$6,435,476 per year and set to expire on June 30, 2009
 - Measure "Y" approximately \$3,788,431 per year and set to expire on June 30, 2011
 - City of Santa Monica funding approximately \$6.5 million per year
 - Property Lease income approximately \$2.5 million per year.

The Expenditure Side

School district expenditures, including those of SMMUSD, are directly related to personnel costs (salaries and benefits), which typically account for 80% to 90% of total expenditures. The other budgetary areas include instructional supplies and materials, textbooks, contracted services and operating expenses (utilities, transportation, insurance, etc.), equipment purchases (replacement and new), etc.

As the size of a school district's budgetary deficit increases, the less likely it can be brought back into balance without a corresponding savings achieved by a reduction in personnel/personnel costs.

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Ask SSC: How Can We Best Describe the Impact of Declining Enrollment on Our District?

- **Q.** Regarding the impact on declining enrollment in our district, on our visits to legislators, their key question is: "Why do you need more when you get to use the prior year's ADA? Some responses we've provided include the following; however, do you have other suggestions that would help clarify the issue of declining enrollment?
 - Some fixed costs remain the same no matter how many students leave the district such as utilities, facilities, and maintenance
 - Enrollment does not decline in neat 30-student packages, so operational costs cannot decline as quickly as revenue declines
 - Reduction in staff, when necessary, is often the least-senior teachers. As a result, there is an increase in per-pupil operational costs
- A. The following chart illustrates a loss of 835 students and a corresponding proportional reduction in the number of teachers and a reduction in instructional materials. In this example, we use the average teacher salary and benefits as a reduction. As you know, that rarely happens; we normally lose the most junior teacher or the one we didn't hire. So the loss will be even greater. But even using the higher salaries, the reduction in teachers saved only about half of the revenue loss. Obviously, reductions are needed in all areas, but many districts are surprised by the amount that must be cut from those other areas.

So, why doesn't getting last year's ADA solve the problem? Because the one-time supplement to bring us up to last year's ADA only allows us to cover the loss until we can make staffing reductions. For illustration, let's assume our decline is just for one year and then we flatten out. Once we make those staffing reductions, we have covered only half the loss. In year two, we have made our staffing cuts, lost the ability to use the higher ADA, and still must make cuts to cover the other half of the revenue loss.

If we assume continued declines, the situation gets worse. Every year we are losing another dollar and saving only 50¢ in staffing cuts. We are always cutting the rest of the revenue loss from areas other than proportional staffing. And our teachers and other staff members are becoming more senior, and their benefits are more expensive, and we are losing economies of scale and so on.

So the reasons you cite are certainly valid and are very real considerations, but the situation is actually worse than those factors alone portray.

This amendment constitutes the following additions to the scope of work:

1.Second elongation of contract The original contract extension was for a six-week period, and approved at the June 29, 2006, Board of Education meeting. This extension actually evolved into six months, resuming with board approval at the Board of Education meeting on January 18, 2007. Per Article 9.2 of the contract, charges for Stop Work are permissible. Charges cover restart fees, additional meetings, management costs, communication and coordination beyond the original scope of work. The revised timeline for the contract covers the period of December 18, 2006, through June 2007.

The additional work reflects the following:

DETAIL

Admission

The Governing Board believes that all children should have the opportunity to receive educational services. Staff shall encourage parents/guardians to enroll all school-aged children in school.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures that provide for verification of all entrance requirements specified in law and in Board policies and regulations.

Residency

Children attending public school must attend school in the school district wherein their parent/legal guardian resides, unless explicitly authorized to attend school in another district (Education Code Section 48200, 48204). Accordingly, it is the district's policy to require valid proof of residency for all students and to be vigilant in discovering and terminating enrollment that does not comply with residency laws or meet the conditions identified in the California Education Code.

- 1. The Superintendent or designee is authorized to require the parent/legal guardians of students to provide to the district verifiable documentary evidence of residency, to execute affidavits attesting to residency, and to otherwise prove residency to the satisfaction of the district. Proof of residency shall, at a minimum, be required upon a student's initial enrollment in the district, whenever there is a change in residency, and at any time a student's residency with the district is in doubt.
- 2. Any student enrolled in the district shall immediately notify the district of any change in circumstances, which would affect their residency determination under this policy.

 Failure to do so shall result in disenrollment and disqualification from future enrollment under the Board's Inter-district Transfer Policy.

- 3. The Superintendent or designee is authorized to investigate any cases where there may be reason to believe that a student and/or parent/legal guardian does not reside with the district, has provided false information to the district with respect to residency or where there may be reason to believe that the information provided is no longer current or accurate.
- 4. <u>If the Superintendent or designee determines that a student currently enrolled in the district is not a resident of the district, the student shall be disenrolled from the district, effective the Friday of the week following the determination of nonresidency.</u>
- 5. In the event the district becomes aware of any violation of law during the course of enforcing this policy, including violation of fraud or perjury statutes, the Superintendent or designee may refer such matters to the appropriate law enforcement authorities for criminal investigation.

It is recommended that the Board of Education create a new position: Network Engineer/Computer Systems Specialist. The use of networks throughout the district has grown tremendously over the last few years. We are more dependent than ever on webbased applications such as email, grades, library, DataDirector, EETT Math programs, LACOE, student and financial systems; etc. It is no longer responsible for us to try to operate our network using part-time, outside contractors for support. With the anticipated upgrades to our networks under the Measure "BB" Bond initiative, this would be the right time to have a full-time, in-house position to manage the upgrades and configure new equipment in a consistent manner.

COMMENT: Under the direction of the Director of Information Services, this position will require network support skills and higher computer systems skills than the current Computer Equipment Specialist position. There is currently an open Telephone System/Computer Equipment Specialist position, which would be abolished once the new position was established. Therefore, there would not be an increase in FTEs for the Information Services Department, although there could be a limited additional cost depending on what salary range is established by the Personnel Commission for the new position.

COMMENT: California legislation mandates that the governing board of the school district discuss each school's Comprehensive School Safety Plan prior to approval and adoption.

Board members must discuss how the school safety plan addresses the needs of the school and pupils within that school and how the school site council considered the three essential components. These are:

- 1. Assuring each pupil a safe physical environment
- 2. Assuring each pupil a safe, respectful, accepting and emotionally nurturing environment
- 3. Providing each child resiliency skills

Board members have been provided with a written statement and an Action Plan from each school summarizing how their Comprehensive School Safety Plan addresses the needs of the school and its pupils. The Action Plan is based on the assessment of safety at their site, per Education Code 35294.2.

Board members also received a checklist for each school, which indicates the school's compliance with the mandated Comprehensive School Safety Plan components. Each completed Comprehensive School Safety Plan was reviewed by Pupil Services Coordinator, Marolyn Freedman. The Comprehensive School Safety Plan for each school is on file in Pupil Services Department for review.

Justification for increase:

The last price increase was in the 2003/04 school year. The above increases will put the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District in line with other districts in the South Bay, including Palos Verdes and Torrance, which have similar demographics.

Food costs continue to rise, as well as costs associated with fuel, paper, and supplies.

Implementation of Senate Bills 12 and 965 will limit what can be sold on our campuses, especially a la carte items.

Converting from polystyrene to a non-polystyrene product will increase our costs for disposable products by an estimated \$25,000 to \$75,000 per year (depending on the product selected or the product that is available).

Each year, staff updates the Board of Education on the Advanced Placement Program in district high schools. Students pursuing the most rigorous preparation for college enroll in Advanced Placement courses in English, mathematics, science, history/social studies, for languages, and art. Performance in these courses is measured through national examinations tied to the curriculum of each course. Scores range from 1 to 5, and students scoring a 3 or higher may receive college credit.

District performance and participation data for all participating students and relevant subgroups of students will be discussed. Additionally, enrollment in Advanced Placement courses for the academic year 2005-2006 will be discussed. This year, staff will be undertaking pre-audits of Advanced Placement science and mathematics courses in preparation for the College Board's new audit process. We will outline plans for those pre-audits as well.

In 2005, as a result of a series of workshops called Community Workshops on Gang Violence sponsored by the City of Santa Monica and Senator Sheila Khuel, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District committed to bring the nationally recognized Valued Youth Program to Santa Monica.

The Coca Cola Valued Youth Program was created in Texas by the Intercultural Development Research Association (IDRA). The program is a model cross-age tutoring program in which secondary students, particularly middle school students, who are considered at-risk of dropping out of school, tutor younger elementary school students. When students are placed in responsible roles and supported in their efforts, powerful benefits occur. CCVYP tutors stay in school, improve their literacy and thinking skills, develop-self-esteem, feel they belong in school, and enhance their class attendance.

CCVYP was put in place in the fall of 2005 for eighth graders from John Adams who served as tutors for students at Will Rogers. In the fall of 2006, the program expanded to include ninth graders at Samohi who tutor students at John Muir.

This update will report on the progress of CCVYP students from John Adams and Santa Monica High School, their impact on elementary schools, and plans for the upcoming year.

SUBTOPIC POLICY REGULATION EXHIBIT

Campus Security

DETAIL

It shall be the policy of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District to implement a digital Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) video surveillance system at selected sites throughout the district. Video cameras may be used on school buses to monitor student behavior while traveling to and from school and school activities. The Board believes that such monitoring will determisconduct and help to ensure the safety of students and staff. Students found to be in violation of the district's bus conduct rules shall be subject to discipline in accordance with district policy and regulations. At the discretion of the Superintendent or designee, school bus video recordings also may be used to resolve complaints by students and/or parents/guardians and to help employees maintain discipline.

The implementation of such a system is solely for the protection of District property and assets from theft and vandalism, and to maintain safety and discipline through deterrence and video documentation. There is no real-time monitoring. The system is not designed or intended to protect individuals from being victims of violent or property crime, or to detect other potentially illegal or undesirable activities which may occur. However, any information about illegal activities or activities in violation of District policies obtained through the video recordings may be used to assist the District or law enforcement as evidence in such cases.

District surveillance cameras will be used in areas deemed appropriate by the Superintendent of Schools, but will not be used in locations where persons have a reasonable expectation of privacy (e.g. bathrooms, locker rooms, changing rooms). Audio recordings shall not be utilized by School District officials for surveillance purposes; such prohibition does not preclude the use of audio recordings by law enforcement officials in accordance with their official duties and/or otherwise authorized by law.

Any video recording used for surveillance purposes in school buildings, school busses or on school property shall be the sole

property of the district. Video recordings will be reviewed in the event of damage or loss of property, or when there are indications that a crime has been committed or that District policies have been violated. All video recordings will be secured to avoid tampering and ensure confidentiality in accordance with applicable laws and regulations. Release of such videos will be made only as permissible pursuant to applicable law.

Appropriate signage will be posted at entrances to the school campus and on school busses notifying students, staff and the general public of the District's use of surveillance cameras. Students and staff will receive additional notification, as appropriate, regarding the use of surveillance cameras in the schools or on school busses or school grounds. Such notification may include, but is not limited to, publication in the District calendar, employee handbook and student handbook or in other District materials.

The implementation of the surveillance system shall not replace the need for ongoing vigilance of the District security personnel or school supervision. School administrators shall ensure that due diligence is observed in maintaining general campus security.

Promotion will occur regularly from grade to grade in most instances. However, when additional time is needed for skill acquisition, social-emotional maturation and/or physical development, retention may be considered as an intervention strategy. Identification of such a need should be done as early as possible, preferably before Kindergarten enrollment or in Kindergarten, First or Second Grade. This does not preclude retention at a later grade level if deemed best for the student.

Retention should be considered only after other strategies and alternatives have been deemed appropriate or unsuccessful. The plan selected for an individual student should be subject to periodic review by a school team including the parent(s) when appropriate. Consultation with parent(s) should occur with intervention strategies, alternatives and retention consideration.

The school retention decision shall be made by the Principal.

All appeals will be made to the Superintendent or his designee.

- (2) There shall be no sponsorship of a meeting by the school, the government, or its agents or employees.
- (3) When employees or agents of the school or government are present at religious meetings, they are to be there only in a non-participatory capacity.
- (4) The meeting must not materially and substantially interfere with the orderly conduct of educational activities within the school.
- (5) Nonschool persons are not to direct, conduct, control, or regularly attend activities of student groups.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.07

It is recommended that the Board of Education discuss the creation of a new Ad Hoc Advisory Committee to consider placing a new parcel tax (or other taxing mechanism) on the Spring 2008 (or future date to be determined) ballot.

Recommended Charges

The Ad Hoc Advisory Committee shall review and analyze projected district revenues and expenditures, and recommend to the Board of Education the advisability of requesting the general public to authorize a new parcel tax or modified version thereof. The committee should be established and begin its work as soon as possible and be directed to submit its recommendation(s) to the board no later than the last board meeting in September 2007.

The committee should address the following questions:

- How critical is it for the school district to initiate a parcel tax (in any form) as one of its sources of operating revenue?
- If a new parcel tax is recommended, would any portion of the rate be identified for a categorical expenditure purpose? If so, how much, or what percentage, would be identified for what purpose(s)?
- What would the rate of the new parcel tax be?
- What would the structure of the new mechanism be?

Membership

It is recommended that the committee have 10-15 members, and should be representative of:

- The business community
- The governments of the Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu
- Employee organizations
- Parent groups
- The community at large

The committee shall select its own chairperson, establish its meeting schedule and determine its information needs. The Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent of Fiscal and Business Services will facilitate the work of the committee and make arrangements for providing information and human resources as needed.

COMMENT: Board members are requested to submit names to the Superintendent's Office to be considered for nomination to this committee.
