#### III Recommendations:

DELAC is aware that there are budgetary limitations, however the parents want to make certain that the district continues to implement the strategies, interventions, and programs that have been successful in accelerating the achievement of our English Learners. Many of our English Learners meet the percentage of achievement required by the state in the AMAOs. However, there are a number of English Learners who do not. Therefore, there remains a need to refine our ability to provide effective service to each English Learner; particularly those who have yet to meet the state target levels of achievement.

In order to do this, DELAC views the following recommendations as fundamental to the success of their children, and in fulfillment of the charge that they have been given by the state of California as reflected in the California Educational Code urges the district to:

# 1) Continue to offer high quality English Language Development secondary (ELD) at the:

The achievement level of SMMUSD's Reclassified Fluent English proficient students as measured by performance on standardized measures such as CST and CAHSEE has historically been remarkable. Parents and staff feel that this directly attributable to the comprehensive services that English Learners receive in district programs. A fundamental component of these services are ELD classes that are targeted, utilize high quality materials and instructional methodologies, and sequentially provide for the linguistic needs of students acquiring English. There is a need to continue to provide the current scope, sequence and structure of District ELD programs.

2) Continue offering Sheltered content classes at the secondary level: Sheltered content classes provide grade level academic instruction that gives English Learners access to the core curriculum while teaching English vocabulary and English grammatical structures. Secondary sites need to evaluate the need of providing their ELs with access in the various content areas and create sheltered classes offerings according to the identified need. Currently offered at JAMS and Samohi.

- 3) Continue appropriate placement of English Learners:
  The district's design for delivering services to ELs requires that ELs be grouped in classrooms according to their English proficiency levels. Grouping ELs of no more than 2 contiguous English proficiency levels facilitates the delivery of appropriate instructional services in the elementary classrooms.
- 4) <u>Continue ELD summer school and intervention classes:</u>
  Summer and intervention programs are seen as one of the best ways to support student learning. They especially give ELs the opportunity to receive additional support needed in their acquisition of English and accessing the core curriculum which leads to academic achievement.

#### IV Budgetary Implications/Recommendation:

The district receives state and federal funds to provide supplementary support to English Learners. DELAC urges the board to use the additional funds that English Learners generate to continue implementing the recommendations outlined above.






# 8-month change in health education, PE, and wellness - elementary schools




## 8-month changes in nutrition policies elementary schools

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.22

It is recommended that the Board of Education amend the Charge for the Financial Oversight Committee, as delineated in the following document: Statement of Purpose, to remove resident taxpayer oversight committee responsibilities for the rescinded Measure S, and assign similar new responsibilities to review the district's administration of and compliance with the terms of Measure R, as approved by the voters of Malibu and Santa Monica in the February 5, 2008, Special Election.

COMMENTS: On February 5, 2008, district voters overwhelmingly approved Measure R, which consolidated and modified two parcel taxes and rescinded the prior parcel taxes approved as Measures Y and S. Measure R, like the previous Measure S, requires an Independent Citizens Oversight Committee to monitor proposed and actual parcel tax expenditures each year. It is appropriate that the Financial Oversight Committee be charged with the Measure R expenditure oversight task, as stated above, which would replace the FOC's similar responsibilities under the now-rescinded Measure S. The Charge for the Financial Oversight Committee was last updated on November 18, 2004. The only change being recommended by this action is due to the passage of the Measure R parcel tax.

#### Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE Statement of Purpose

#### I. Committee Composition

The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District shall consist of 9 members, appointed by the Board of Education. Appointments will be for three-year terms, such terms to be staggered so that one-third of the members (3) will have terms that expire in any given calendar year.

The Committee will select a chair and vice-chair, which will each serve for a one-year term.

The District's Assistant Superintendent for Fiscal & Business Services will serve as the staff liaison to the FOC, and will be assisted by other District staff as needed. District consultants may be needed to assist in the work of the FOC, depending on data and/or issues being analyzed.

Prior members of the FOC may serve at the request of the Committee as emeritus members of the FOC at the expiration of their term. Such emeritus members are advisory, non-voting members.

#### II. Criteria for Selection of Committee Members

- 1. Broad perspective
- 2. Financial and/or management and/or legal expertise/experience
- 3. Residing, employed or working within the geographic boundaries of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District
- 4. Business process orientation
- 5. Communicates clearly the information resulting from the FOC's work
- 6. Not currently serving as an elected official

In appointing members, the Board will attempt to have the composition of the FOC reflect the composition of the student population.

#### **III.** Application Process

The Board will seek applications to fill vacancies on the Committee on an annual basis. All applications received will be reviewed by the FOC, and recommendations regarding FOC members will be forwarded from the Committee to the Board. The Board appoints members to the Committee.

Applications will be considered valid for a period of one year from the date of receipt, unless withdrawn by the applicant.

All applicants will be asked to provide their professional resume, together with the application form and any other information they may deem relevant. Application forms will be available at the switchboard of the District's administrative offices, 1651 16th Street in Santa Monica, and upon request from the Superintendent's Office.

#### IV. FOC Roles and Responsibilities

- 1. Assist the District in educating the general public concerning school finance issues.
- 2. Assist the District in creating reader friendly budget information.
- 3. Review any matters potentially having a significant impact on District finances before the Board of Education takes action.
- 4. Serve as the Measure S Resident Taxpayer R Independent Citizens Oversight Committee charged with reviewing the District's administration of and compliance with the terms of the Measure, including:
  - a) Ensuring that the revenues raised by Measure  $\frac{S}{R}$  are used for the following purposes:
    - i) To restore preserve programs ands replace funds lost or reduced due to State budget cuts inadequate state funding;
    - ii) To sustain achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics for all students at all grade levels and to fulfill the District's core curriculum which includes music, arts, and athletics; and,
    - iii) To attract and retain highly qualified teachers and,
    - iv) To protect the taxpayers' investment in education and ensure District accountability by providing for resident taxpayer special citizen financial oversight and independent annual audits of revenues and expenditures.
  - b) Overseeing the District's accounting for revenues raised by Measure  $\frac{S}{R}$ , including placing Measure  $\frac{S}{R}$  revenues in a separate account;
  - c) Consulting with the District in the preparation of an Annual Plan for Measure  $\frac{\mathbf{S}}{\mathbf{R}}$  expenditures for Board action;
  - d) Reviewing the District's annual report to the Board and the Financial Oversight Committee identifying the actual amount of Measure  $\frac{S}{R}$  funds collected and expended, and how these expenditures relate to the Annual Plan approved by the Board; and,
  - e) Reviewing the District's annual independent audit of Measure  $\frac{S}{R}$  revenues and expenditures.
- 5. Provide monitoring and oversight of the City of Santa Monica joint-use agreement with the District, as per the terms of that contractual agreement.
- 6. Provide monitoring and oversight of any City of Malibu contributions to the District.
- 7. Review the District's annual audit and accompanying management letters, and submit any comments or recommendations to the Board of Education.
- 8. Review the annual budget, enrollment projections, revenue and expenditure forecasts, and the District's capital program, and submit any recommendations to the Board of Education.
- 9. Serve as liaison to other District committees regarding financial implications of proposed program or policy changes at the direction of the Board.

#### V. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>

Financial Oversight Committee members shall sign the Conflict of Interest pledge.

#### VI. FOC Meetings and Procedures

The FOC will meet regularly during the school year. The annual schedule of meetings will be determined at the first meeting of each year. Additional meetings will be scheduled as needed. FOC meetings are subject to State open meeting laws, including timely agenda posting and participation by the public.

The FOC will annually report to the Board on Measure R and other oversight activities.

At the beginning of each fiscal year the FOC will consider and select several objectives related to its purpose, which will serve as the FOC's focus during that year, subject to concurrence by the Board of Education.

The FOC may, as needed, form subcommittees to provide an opportunity for in-depth review.

The FOC may adopt other rules and procedures to govern its operations, including bylaws, subject to review and approval by the Board of Education.

## 3.1 Approval of Special Education Local Plan Area Service and Budget Plan (Nondistrict Function)

In compliance with IDEA, as amended in 2004, and California Education Code (EC) Section 56205(b)(2) and EC Section 56601(a), the Board of Education of the Administrative Unit of Tri-City SELPA will receive public input regarding the SELPA Annual Budget and Service Plan. The Tri-City SELPA member Districts are Culver City Unified School District, Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District and Beverly Hills Unified School District.

## SPECIAL EDUCATION LOCAL PLAN AREA LOCAL EDUCATION AGENCY (LEA) ASSURANCES

#### 1. FREE APPROPRIATE PUBLIC EDUCATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(1))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a free appropriate public education is available to all children residing in the LEA between the ages of three through 21 inclusive, including students with disabilities who have been suspended or expelled from school.

#### 2. FULL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(2))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all pupils with disabilities have access to educational programs, nonacademic programs, and services available to non-disabled pupils.

#### 3. CHILD FIND (20 USC § 1412 (a)(3))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all children with disabilities residing in the State, including children with disabilities who are homeless or are wards of the State and children attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities, and who are in need of special education and related services are identified, located and evaluated. A practical method is developed and implemented to determine which students with disabilities are currently receiving needed special education and related services.

## 4. INDIVIDUALIZED EDUCATION PROGRAM (IEP) AND INDIVIDUALIZED FAMILY SERVICE PLAN (IFSP) (20 USC § 1412 (a)(4))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or an Individualized Family Service Plan (IFSP) is developed, reviewed and revised for each child with a disability who requires special education and related services in order to benefit from his/her individualized education program. It shall be the policy of this LEA that a review of an IEP will be conducted on at least an annual basis to review a student's progress and make appropriate revisions.

#### 5. LEAST RESTRICTIVE ENVIRONMENT (20 USC § 1412 (a)(5))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that to the maximum extent appropriate, children with disabilities, including children in public or private institutions or other care facilities, are educated with children who are not disabled. Special class, separate schooling, or other removal of a student with disabilities from the general educational environment, occurs only when the nature or severity of the disability of the student is such that education in general classes with the use of supplemental aids and services cannot be achieved satisfactorily.

#### 6. PROCEDURAL SAFEGUARDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(6))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that children with disabilities and their parents shall be afforded all procedural safeguards throughout the provision of a free appropriate public education including the identification, evaluation, and placement process.

#### 7. EVALUATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(7))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a reassessment of a student with a disability shall be conducted at least once every three years or more frequently, if appropriate.

#### 8. CONFIDENTIALITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(8))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the confidentiality of personally identifiable data information and records maintained by the LEA relating to children with disabilities and their parents and families shall be protected pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

#### 9. PART C, TRANSITION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(9))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a transition process for a child who is participating in Early Intervention Programs (IDEA, Part C) with an IFSP is begun prior to a toddler's third birthday. The transition process shall be smooth, timely and effective for the child and family.

#### 10. PRIVATE SCHOOLS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(10))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to assure that children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled by their parents in private schools shall receive appropriate special education and related services pursuant to LEA coordinated procedures. The proportionate amount of federal funds will be allocated for the purpose of providing special education services to children with disabilities voluntarily enrolled in private school by their parents.

#### 11.LOCAL COMPLIANCE ASSURANCES (20 USC § 1412 (a)(11))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that the local plan shall be adopted by the appropriate local board(s) (district/county) and is the basis for the operation and administration of special education programs; and that the agency(ies) herein represented will meet all applicable requirements of state and federal laws and regulations, including compliance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973, Section 504 of Public Law and the provisions of the California Education Code, Part 30.

#### 12. INTERAGENCY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(12))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that interagency agreements or other mechanisms for interagency coordination are in effect to ensure services required for FAPE are provided, including the continuation of services during an interagency dispute resolution process.

#### 13. GOVERNANCE (20 USC § 1412 (a)(13))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to support and comply with the provisions of the governance bodies and any necessary administrative support to implement the Local Plan. A final determination that an LEA is not eligible for assistance under this part will not be made without first affording that LEA with reasonable notice and an opportunity for a hearing through the State Educational Agency.

#### 14. PERSONNEL QUALIFICATIONS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(14))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to ensure that personnel providing special education related services meet the highly qualified requirements as defined under federal law, including that those personnel have the content knowledge and skills to serve children with disabilities.

This policy shall not be construed to create a right of action on behalf of an individual student for the failure of a particular LEA staff person to be highly qualified or to prevent a parent from filing a State complaint with the CDE about staff qualifications.

#### 15. PERFORMANCE GOALS & INDICATORS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(15))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to comply with the requirements of the performance goals and indicators developed by the CDE and provide data as required by the CDE.

#### 16. PARTICIPATION IN ASSESSMENTS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(16))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that all students with disabilities shall participate in state and district-wide assessment programs. The IEP team determines how a student will access assessments with or without accommodations, or access alternate assessments, consistent with state standards governing such determinations.

#### 17. SUPPLEMENTATION OF STATE/FEDERAL FUNDS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(17))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide assurances that funds received from Part B of the IDEA will be expended in accordance with the applicable provisions of the IDEA; will be used to supplement and not to supplant state, local and other Federal funds those funds.

#### 18. MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT (20 USC § 1412 (a)(18))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that federal funds will not be used to reduce the level of local funds and/or combined level of local and state funds expended for the education of children with disabilities except as provided in Federal law and regulations.

#### 19. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(19))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that public hearings, adequate notice of the hearings, and an opportunity for comment available to the general public, including individuals with disabilities and parents of children with disabilities are held prior to the adoption of any policies and/or regulations needed to comply with Part B of the IDEA.

#### 20. RULE OF CONSTRUCTION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(20))

(Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)

#### 21.STATE ADVISORY PANEL (20 USC § 1412 (a)(21))

(Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)

#### 22. SUSPENSION/EXPULSION (20 USC § 1412 (a)(22))

The LEA assures that data on suspension and expulsion rates will be provided in a manner prescribed by the CDE. When indicated by data analysis, the LEA further assures that policies, procedures and practices related to the development and implementation of the IEPs will be revised.

#### 23. ACCESS TO INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS (20 USC § 1412 (a)(23))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide instructional materials to blind students or other students with print disabilities in a timely manner according to the state adopted National Instructional Materials Accessibility Standard.

## 24. OVERIDENTIFICATION AND DISPROPORTIONALITY (20 USC § 1412 (a)(24))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to prevent the inappropriate disproportionate representation by race and ethnicity of students with disabilities.

#### 25. PROHIBITION ON MANDATORY MEDICINE (20 USC § 1412 (a)(25))

It shall be the policy of this LEA to prohibit school personnel from requiring a student to obtain a prescription for a substance covered by the Controlled Substances Act as a condition of attending school or receiving a special education assessment and/or services.

#### 26. DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS (20 USC § 1411(e),(f)(1-3)

(Federal requirement for State Education Agency only)

#### 27. DATA (20 USC § 1418 a-d)

It shall be the policy of this LEA to provide data or information to the California Department of Education that may be required by regulations.

#### 28. READING LITERACY (State Board requirement, 2/99)

It shall be the policy of this LEA that in order to improve the educational results for students with disabilities, SELPA Local Plans shall include specific information to ensure that all students who require special education will participate in the California Reading Initiative.

#### 29. CHARTER SCHOOLS (E.C. 56207.5 (a-c))

It shall be the policy of this LEA that a request by a charter school to participate as a local educational agency in a special education local plan area may not be treated differently from a similar request made by a school district.

In June 2003, voters approved a qualified special property tax known as Measure S, which authorized the levying of a special per parcel tax within the boundaries of the Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu for (6) years. A significant provision of this particular Measure was the formation of a Board-appointed "resident taxpayer oversight committee to review administration of and compliance with Measure S. The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) was charged by the Board of Education with those Measure S responsibilities.

Furthermore, Measure S also required that, the FOC review the independent financial audit of all Measure S expenditures and financial activities for the immediately preceding fiscal year and review spending projections for the upcoming fiscal year. The FOC reports its findings on these matters as part of its annual report to the Board. This will be the final year for the report on Measure S as the voters approved a new parcel tax, Measure R, on February 5, 2008. This Measure combined and replaced the previous Measure S and Measure Y parcel taxes. Beginning with fiscal year 2008-09, the FOC will assume the oversight responsibilities associated with Measure R. (Action appointing the FOC as the oversight committee for Measure R is expected during the major action item portion of this Board Meeting.)

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

The Board of Education will hear highlights from a white paper prepared by the Small Schools Task Force. The presentation will be delivered by Janie Gates, Anthony Fuller, Barry Cowan, Rebel Harrison, Toby Berlin, and Harry Keiley.

Task Force members will present the rationale for recommending the creation of a small school with a Global Sustainability, Environmental Science, and Technology theme.

During the months of October 2007 through March 2008, the task force completed a study of the research, visited model small learning communities, conducted a parent survey, and heard a presentation from a small learning community expert, Mr. David Rattray.

#### Introduction

The Board has had several opportunities to discuss the development of the 2008-09 District Budget. In a workshop held on April 7, 2008, staff outlined the impact of the Governor's January Budget and made several budget reduction recommendations for the budget year. At the regular Board of Education held on May 15, 2008, staff described in detail a preliminary budget for the District. Additional budget reductions were proposed, as directed by the Board at the earlier April workshop. Staff also incorporated a very early analysis of the Governor's May Revise and made a series of suggestions for budget reinstatement. Prior to final adoption of the budget staff has prepared a revised preliminary general fund budget for Board review.

Listed below are the revised assumptions used to develop the SMMUSD budget:

#### REVENUE ASSUMPTIONS

5.66% statutory COLA for 2008-09 Revenue Limit funding

The Base Revenue Limit for Santa Monica-Malibu USD will be \$6,208.84 per ADA (2007-08 P2 ADA - 11,087). A <5.36% > deficit factor is applied to the Revenue Limit. The total Revenue Limit is \$65,779,658.

The hourly rate for Supplemental Instructional Programs are:

Grade 7-12 CASEE \$4.08/hr Grade 2-9 Retained \$3.37/hr Grade 2-6 At Risk \$2.60/hr K-12 Core \$2.33/hr

The projection of 2008-09 District Enrollment is 11,364. The current CBEDs count is 11,652, thus a potential reduction of <288> students that translates to approximately (\$1.6 M) reduction in our revenue stream.

The Lottery allocation will be \$131.50 per annual ADA, of which \$115 is for unrestricted expenditures and the remaining \$16.5 is for Proposition 20 - Mandated for Instructional Materials.

The District will participate in the K-3 Class Size Reduction Program and receive \$1,001 per pupil (\$1,071 in 2007-08).

No COLA and restored <6.5 %> cut of Special Educations Funding in May Revision. Special Education transfer from the Revenue Limit is \$1,916,348.

Special Education Mandate Settlement at \$4.52 per 1999-2000 ADA is \$52,328.

The 07-08 Mandated Reimbursement is not included in the 2008-09 budget.

The Measure "R" parcel tax at \$346 per parcel is estimated to generate \$10,296,960, after processing senior exemptions, which are anticipated to number 2,767 out of 32,527 parcels. The Measure "R" will begin in 2008-09 to replace the Measure "Y" and Measure "S".

The District will receive \$7,443,913 (including 3% prevailing COLA) of financial support from the City of Santa Monica.

The District will receive \$139,835 of Joint Use Agreement from the City of Malibu.

The combined lease revenue is \$2,642,412, which is from Double Tree Hotel, Madison Site,  $9^{\rm th}$  & Colorado and  $16^{\rm th}$  Street properties.

The Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program (IMFRP) will be funded at \$64.67 per pupil per 2008-09 CBEDS enrollment.

The Supplemental School Counseling Program will be funded at \$70 per pupil, based on the 2007-08 grades 7 to 12 enrollment.

The Arts and Music Grant will be funded at \$14.25 per enrolled K-12 pupil.

No state contribution for regular Deferred Maintenance projects. (Approximate \$500,000).

#### Health & Welfare

The premium for District-paid employee health benefits is budgeted for a 10% increase in 2009 calendar year. Cal-PERS has not announced the new rate for 2009. We will adjust these rates when the official notification is received.

The budget for the schools' formula Money allocation for supplies and other operating costs:

- K-5 \$37.75 per pupil
- 6-8 \$42.66 per pupil
- 9-12 \$63.48 per pupil

Lottery Instructional Materials funds (Proposition 20) will be used to partly fund this allocation.

Due to the participation in the State's School Facilities Modernization Program, we are currently required to budget 2% of the total General Fund (Restricted and Unrestricted) budget for the On-Going Maintenance Program.

The 2008-09 projected total retiree benefits are \$780,164.

#### TRANSFERS

The Indirect Rate will be changed from 5.29% to 6.78% in 2008-09.

\$98,000 will be transferred from the School & Library Improvement Block Grant to Special Education Transportation program and \$31,322 will be transferred from the Targeted Instructional Improvement Block Grant (TIIG) to Home-to-School Transportation.

A \$1 million transfer from Fund 21 to the Ongoing Maintenance Program (Fund 01) was approved by the Board (May 3, 2007).

A \$75,000 transfer from General Fund to the Child Development Fund is budgeted in 2008-09 for the extra costs incurred by the minimum days of elementary schools.

#### RESERVE for ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

Under the State Criteria and Standards, the District budget should reflect a 3% reserve of the total General Fund Budget for 2008-09, 2009-10 and 2010-11.

#### DETAIL

#### Child Abuse Prevention

The Governing Board recognizes the district's responsibility to educate students about the dangers of child abuse so that they will acquire the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and to react appropriately and promptly.

The district's instructional program shall include ageappropriate and culturally sensitive child abuse prevention
curriculum. This curriculum shall explain students' right to
live free of abuse, inform them of available support resources,
and teach them how to obtain help and disclose incidents of
abuse. The curriculum also shall include training in selfprotection techniques.

The Superintendent or designee shall seek to incorporate community resources into the district's child abuse prevention programs. To the extent feasible, the Superintendent or designee shall use these community resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

#### Child Abuse Reporting

The Board recognizes that child abuse has severe consequences and that the district has a responsibility to protect students by facilitating the prompt reporting of known and suspected incidents of child abuse. With concern for the total well-being of each student, the Board of Education directs the employees of the District to report known or suspected incidences of child abuse in accordance with state law and Administrative Regulations. District employees shall cooperate with the child protective agencies responsible for reporting, investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement regulations for identifying and reporting child abuse. establish procedures for the

identification and reporting of such incidents in accordance with law.

Employees who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known or suspected incidents of child abuse and neglect.

Mandated reporters shall not investigate any suspected incidents but rather shall cooperate with agencies responsible for investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the reporting duties of mandated reporters.

In the event that training is not provided to mandated reporters, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the California Department of Education the reasons that such training is not provided.

SUBJECT: Child Abuse and Neglect (Reporting Procedures)

ISSUED BY: Director Pupil/Administrative Services

I. EFFECTIVE DATE: November 14, 1988

II. AUTHORITY

Board of Education Policy 5141.4

III. PROCEDURES

A. Reportable Cases Under Child Abuse Reporting Law

1. Sections 11166 of the California Penal Code mandates the reporting to designated authorities of cases of suspected or known child abuse. A report, both by telephone and in writing, is required of any certificated school employee who in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment has knowledge of or observes a child who can reasonably be suspected of having been a victim of child abuse.

2. For the purposes of this law, the following definitions apply:

a. "Child" means a person under the age of 18. Emancipation does not alter the responsibility for reporting abuse of a minor under the California Penal Code.

b. "Child abuse" means:

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following:

1. A physical injury or death inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person

- 2. Sexual <u>abuse of a child, including sexual</u> assault<del>/molestation and/</del>or sexual exploitation, <del>of a child; as defined in Penal Code 11165.1</del>
- 3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2
- 4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3
- 3) Any act or omission proscribed by Section 273a (willful cruelty or punishment of a child) or 273d (corporal punishment or injury) of the California Penal Code;
- 5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

- 1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of his/her employment (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, assistant principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
- 4. An injury caused by a school employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, to protect himself/herself, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student (Education Code 49001)
- 5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by the student (Education Code 49001)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; administrators and employees of a licensed day care facility; Head Start teachers; district police or security officers; licensed nurse or health care provider; and administrators,

presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program
(Penal Code 1165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

#### Reportable Offenses

A mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided whenever, in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment, he/she has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166.05)

Any person shall notify a peace officer if he/she reasonably believes that he/she has observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury, where the victim is a child under age 14. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

#### Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom he/she knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report

the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

#### Reporting Procedures

#### 1. Initial Telephone Report

Within 24 hours of knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a school district police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11166) Please call the LA County Child Protection Hot Line first.

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

#### 2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall then prepare and either send, fax, or electronically submit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

Mandated reporters may obtain copies of the Department of Justice form from either the district or the appropriate agency.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians

d. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information e. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to him/her. (Penal Code 11167)

Information relevant to the incident of child abuse or neglect may also be given to an investigator from an agency that is investigating the case. (Penal Code 11167)

#### 3. Internal Reporting

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are required, to notify the principal as soon as possible after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency.

When so notified, the principal shall inform the Superintendent or designee.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to the principal. (Penal Code 11166)

He/she may provide or mail a copy of the written report to the principal or Superintendent or designee without his/her signature or name.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

#### Training

Training of mandated reporters shall include child abuse and neglect identification and mandated reporting. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Training shall also include guidance in the appropriate discipline of students, physical contact with students, and maintenance of ethical relationships with students to avoid actions that may be misinterpreted as child abuse.

#### Victim Interviews

Whenever a representative of a government agency investigating suspected child abuse or neglect or the state Department of Social Services deems it necessary, a suspected victim may be interviewed during school hours, on school premises, concerning a report of suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility. The child shall be given the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult school employee or volunteer aide selected by the child. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform him/her of the following requirements: (Penal Code 11174.3)

- a. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable him/her to be as comfortable as possible.
- b. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.c. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or
- circumstances of the case with the child.
- d. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

#### Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the Superintendent or designee and/or principal shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. It is the responsibility of the peace officer or agent to notify the parent/guardian of the situation. (Education Code 48906)

Peace officers shall be asked to sign an appropriate release or acceptance of responsibility form.

Parent/Guardian Complaints Regarding Suspected Child Abuse

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with a copy of the district's administrative regulation that describes how to report suspected child abuse occurring at a school site to appropriate agencies. For

parents/guardians whose primary language is other than English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a district employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect at a school site, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee also is obligated pursuant to Penal Code 11166 to file a report himself/herself using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 4650.

#### Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, of their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and of their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. The district shall also provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, employees shall sign the statement indicating that they have knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and that they will comply with those provisions. The signed statements shall be retained by the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The Superintendent or designee shall also notify all employees that:

1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of his/her professional capacity or outside the scope of his/her employment. Any other person making a report shall not incur

- civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)
- 2. If a mandated reporter fails to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)
- 3. No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the district for making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

- 4) Neglect of a child
- (a) Severe neglect (situations where any person having care or custody of a child willfully causes or permits the child to be in a situation that the child's health is endangered.
- (b) General neglect (negligent failure of a person having the care or custody of a child to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, or supervision where no physical injury to the child has occurred).
- c. "Reasonable suspicion" means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain such a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse.
- B. Procedures for Reporting Child Abuse
- 1. Suspected instances of child abuse are to be reported to the school nurse. He/she is the contact person at each school site. The nurse will assume responsibility for completing the Suspected Child Abuse Report (11166PC) form, secure the initials of the school principal on this form and contact the Santa Monica Police Department (458-8943) or Malibu Sheriff's Department (456-6652, ext. 235).
- 2. In the absence of the school nurse, the contact person at each site is the school principal.
- 3. The identity of all persons who report known or suspected child abuse is confidential as indicated in Penal Code Section 11167 subdivision (c).

#### INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the following tentative timeline for the search for a new permanent superintendent for SMMUSD. The timeline has been developed with three goals in mind: (1) beginning recruitment of potential candidates early enough to ensure that top candidates have not committed to other districts that are conducting searches; (2) allowing sufficient time for each stage in the process, from issuing the request for proposals from search firms to the interviews and site visits with finalist candidates; and (3) ensuring that the Board members elected in November 2008 take full part in the most important stages of the process, including reviewing candidates with the search firm, interviews, and site visits.

#### Tentative Timeline:
