# May 1, 2008

A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, May 1, 2008, in the in the Malibu City Council Chambers: 23815 Stuart Ranch Road, Malibu, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:24 p.m. in the upstairs Conference Room at the Malibu City Council Chambers, 23815 Stuart Ranch Road, Malibu, CA. At 4:31 p.m. the Board of Education moved to Closed Session regarding the items listed below. The public meeting reconvened at 6:10 p.m. in the Council Chambers.

# IV. BOARD OF EDUCATION – COMMENDATIONS / RECOGNITIONS

• Juan Cabrillo Elementary School

Superintendent Talarico welcomed and introduced Mr. Barry Yates, Principal of Cabrillo Elementary School. She showed the school brochure that the school had created. She thanked Mr. Yates for his leadership; she said that he always makes her feel welcome when she visits. She promised to visit the campus before the end of the school year.

Principal Yates spoke about the tireless fundraising efforts of the PTA, which have funded the Art Cottage, science lab, computer lab, the installation of twelve SMART Boards, and a new shade structure. He brought a copy of a DVD for each board member highlighting Rock the Pod, Cabrillo's annual direct fundraising event. Principal Yates reported that it has been a smooth year so far with everyone working together. The school, PTA, and parents are collaborating and everyone is united on the school's vision to stay focused on student achievement. The school is proud to celebrate its diverse group of students. Mr. Yates reported on the school's recycling efforts and No Trash

Underlined Items are from the Addendum Wednesdays, in which each student brings his/her lunch in a reusable container. The school is expanding knowledge about the environment at every grade level. Students themselves are responsible for recycling; one grade is using the money earned from recycling to fund the annual Sacramento trip. The school's efforts are paying off – the number of bags of trash after lunch has been reduced from eight to two. This year, students helped replenish the food bank supplies for Santa Monica; students raised almost one ton of food goods. The school's teachers have partnered with Pt. Dume for professional development. Cabrillo now has a traffic supervisor paid with help from the City of Malibu. The presence of this supervisor has improved student safety. The school is continuing with its required training program for all parents who help in the classroom. The Nurse's Health Club has been focusing on hand washing; students made posters and are in charge of monitoring bathrooms for paper towels and soap.

*Mr.* Yates commended his staff for focusing on state standards and holding the same high expectations of achievement for all students. He expects this focus and hard work to be reflected in test scores. The science labs are focusing on incorporating the state standards into the curriculum. There is now a science club during lunchtime. The GATE students put together the Cabrillo Breeze newspaper. Laurel Thorne, a Cabrillo  $2^{nd}$  grade teacher, was honored by the Malibu Optimist Club for her dedication to excellent education. The campus used Equity Fund money to pay for teachers to teach enrichment classes at 7:15am for students who are underachieving in language arts and math. The fifth grade class raised money for its annual Wolfe Camp trip by holding movie matinees every three weeks. The money raised also supports Pennies for Peace to support children in Afghanistan. Mr. Yates proudly reported that enrollment has increased this year. He thanked district staff members who have provided guidance and encouragement, including Superintendent Talarico, Deputy Superintendent Tim Walker, Assistant Superintendent Mike Matthews, Director Ruth Valadez, and Coordinator Maxine Glazer. He said that there is a true team effort in the district. He invited everyone to visit Juan Cabrillo, and mentioned that this Sunday would be the Fiesta Cabrillo.

Mr. Mechur said he appreciates everything Mr. Yates does for the students, school, and community. Ms. Pye asked how Kindergarten Round Up was this year. Mr. Yates reported that approximately forty families showed up, which is about ten or twelve families more than usual.

• WorkAbility Honor Roll Recipient – Pacific Coast Greens, owner Mike Osterman Superintendent Talarico introduced Sioux Heiler, a Special Education teacher in the district and editor of the WorkAbility Newsletter. She then introduced Mr. Mike Osterman, owner of Pacific Coast Greens (a natural food market in Malibu), who was nominated by Amy McKenzie for his collaboration with the WorkAbility program. She thanked him for embracing the district's children, and said that he was an incredible model for companies in Malibu and Santa Monica. Mr. Osterman said that he was grateful to have the opportunity to work with the students. He said it is gratifying to watch the students grow from the beginning of the program to hiring them permanently and moving on to higher education. Sioux Heiler then explained the WorkAbility I program for everyone and handed out the Fall and Spring newsletter. She thanked the Special Education staff. Mr. de la Torre thanked Pacific Coast Greens for partnering with our students.

# A. Student Board Member Reports

Alec Richker - Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Richker reported on SAMOHI activities prior to spring break, including CASHEE testing, a Measure "BB" meeting, and the final grade period. Currently, the campus is seeing state testing for all grade levels (except the seniors), AP tests, and more CAHSEE testing. *The school placed third in the National Ocean Sciences Bowl in Alaska.* The SAMOHI Students for the Advancement of Global Entrepreneurship (SAGE) team placed third in California, and are headed to Nationals for the third year in a row. Freshman Orientation was held on April 19<sup>th</sup>, the orchestra concert was on Monday, the choir performance was on Tuesday, prom will be held on May  $17^{th}$ , and the senior art show is May  $20^{th}$ . The Racial Harmony project was held last weekend, the Project Safe Zone was held the weekend before, and Multicultural Week is all next week. The boys' track team won Ocean League, CIF playoffs start next week for Spring, and the end of the grading period is this Friday. The school's jazz band performed on the pier last week. Today was "commit day," in which seniors made decisions on where they would attend college. Earth Day saw various environment-related activities on the pier; Mr. Richker made an appearance as the Plastic Bag Monster to bring awareness to the harm plastic bags can cause the environment. The Superintendent wished Alec and all the other students good luck on all their tests in May. She said that the teachers and parents have prepared the students well. Mr. de la Torre asked Alec where he was going to college. Mr. Richker replied that he had decided to attend Middlebury College in Vermont.

Kristen Lambert - Malibu High School (sat at dais)

Student Board Member Lambert reported that a Masque was held on April 16<sup>th</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup>, and 18<sup>th</sup> to fund this year's prom, which will be held on May 16<sup>th</sup> at the Ritz Carlton. The Gay/Straight Alliance will be holding a Day of Silence on May 2<sup>nd</sup>. The 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Exit Interviews are scheduled for

May 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup>. Elections for ASB officers are coming up. The boys' golf team placed second in the league. Open House will be May 22<sup>nd</sup>. AP exams are approaching and STAR testing is occurring all this week. Ms. Lambert then addressed the problem of student parking on campus, including restricting those who enter the parking lot, encouraging carpooling, and finding ways to reduce the number of cars on campus.

# X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Superintendent Talarico announced that SAMOHI's Marine Biology and Science class, lead by teacher Mr. Kay, is working with the Algalita Marine Research Foundation to build a raft made of plastic bottles that will travel from Santa Monica to Hawaii in an effort to raise awareness of the harm plastic bottles can have on the environment. Mr. Kay's students were interviewed by NBC 4. Ms. Talarico reported that Mr. Shane McLoud's appointment to the Personnel Commission had been approved by the State Superintendent's Office. She then updated the board regarding the Joint Use Agreement with the City of Santa Monica: district staff is diligently working on the details of preliminary response to the Special Education audit report. A committee, working under the leadership of the Superintendent, will work on ways to improve the culture of inclusion. Letters are being sent to parents who have requested that confidentiality clauses be included in their settlement agreements following the Board of Education's moratorium on confidentiality clauses last June. The Superintendent finished her report by announcing that over 120 fourth and fifth grade students from Edison Language Academy had the opportunity to tour UCLA and speak with faculty and graduate students. Edison's administration is hoping to make it an annual trip and to include USC in the tour. They are also looking to organize a seminar for parents regarding strategies for saving money for college.

- 4. The District will be responsible for expending these funds to provide free or subsidized adult English-language instruction for parents or community members who have pledged to provide personal English-language tutoring to English learners kindergarten through grade twelve.
- 5. Pledge records will consist of the following information: name of school district, name of school, and the name and signature of parent or community member committed to tutor English learners. These records will be maintained for audit.

6. A CBET plan will be adopted by the local governing board and include elements of instruction and achievement information as described by EC Section 317. The data collected shall be used, by the governing board, to review and revise the plan as necessary, not less than once every three years, and be made available to the state as requested.

## Board of Education Annual Report 2007-2008

#### Child Development Services DAC

#### Chair: Gleam Davis Staff Liaison: Judy Abdo Charge:

Input on State Preschool Standards

The California Department of Education is using a collaborative approach to creating standards for preschool programs. CDS DAC members have been involved in creating standards, in responding to the draft standards, and in communicating with statewide early childhood leaders about recommendations for changing the draft standards. CDS staff will continue to monitor progress on the draft standards and will participate in the process to amend the current draft standards.

- Improve kindergarten transition CDS staff will work with members of the Santa Monica Child Care and Development Task Force as well as district staff and parents to enhance the transition from preschool to kindergarten.
- Increase inclusion

CDS staff looks forward to working with the new Special Education Preschool Coordinator as we continue the five inclusion classrooms already operating as collaboratives involving both CDS and Special Education instructional staff. Depending on the need, there may be an opportunity to add more inclusion classrooms during the school year. Staff will work to enhance after school inclusion.

• <u>Assist Infant Family Support Program</u> With reduced funding for the Infant Family Support Program, CDS staff and City of Santa Monica staff will work together to redesign parenting programs for families with children 0-5. Additional funding options will be explored.

#### Accomplishments this year 2007-08:

- <u>Preschool Standards (now called Foundations)</u> Staff attended informational and feedback meetings, and wrote a letter to the State requesting changes to create foundations that reflect consistency and respect for individual developmental progress.
- Improve Kindergarten transition

Two DAC meetings have focused on kindergarten transition issues. DAC members suggest kindergarten information should go to preschool parents earlier in the school year, a summer program for children who will be in kindergarten in the fall, clear information distributed to parents about expectations of kindergarten teachers.

CDS preschool teachers and assistants will be offered a week of training the last week of June 2008. Transition to kindergarten will be one of the topics. If funding permits, one or more kindergarten teachers may be invited to attend.

DAC members and the CDS Director led a discussion at the Santa Monica Early Education and Childcare Task Force regarding transition from preschool to kindergarten within the district and with private preschools and the district kindergarten.

#### • Increase inclusion programs

Improved communication between the CDS Preschool managers and the Special Ed Preschool Coordinator has resulted in children's needs addressed earlier and more consistently. The inclusion class at Lincoln Preschool is operating smoothly this year.

The Special Education audit report suggests some enhancement of the inclusion/collaborative preschool classrooms. CDS staff and Special Education staff have begun discussing next year's design for inclusion classes at Pine, McKinley, and Lincoln Preschools. We will explore the possibility of increasing options for preschool children. Currently, there are 5 inclusion classrooms serving preschool children in our district.

#### • Assist Infant Family Support Program

With the assistance of DAC members, CDS staff, and the City of Santa Monica, new programs are being developed at Virginia Avenue Park for parents of very young children. SMC, St Johns, and Venice Family Service are offering parenting classes or groups at Virginia Avenue Park. The Bilingual Community Liaisons who worked for IFSP are now on the Head Start staff and are working with families of young children, including families they'd worked with previously at Virginia Avenue Park.

DAC members and CDS staff have met several times with City of Santa Monica staff, agency directors, Childcare Task Force members, and other Lifelong Learning advocates to work on coordination of existing programs for 0 - 3 yrs and to identify gaps in community services for families with very young children. RAND has taken a leadership role in bringing stakeholders together to reinvigorate the earlier investment in families with young children. Representatives of the DAC and Childcare Task Force testified at the City of Santa Monica budget priority meetings and advocated for increased attention to 0 - 3 programs.

CDS has written a proposal to Saint John's Hospital asking for funds to expand outreach and referral for parents of young children by presenting information to staffs at the libraries, parks, and other community workers who may be helpful to families who need to know more about services and activities in our community.

#### Highlight(s) to date of particular note:

CDS began operating the full day preschool childcare program at John Adams Preschool and Washington West in July 2007. The Adams Preschool was renovated and refurnished with equipment and materials for children aged 2 - 5. The center has been fully enrolled since September.

DAC members and CDS staff attended the West Coast Economic Forum on Early Childhood Investment at the Milken Foundation. Corporate and Foundation leaders are working together to focus on 0-5 to ensure an educated workforce in the future.

CDS received a commitment of \$50,000 from the Steps To Excellence Program to train classroom assistants in observation and assessment in preschool programs. Participants were paid to attend the class and received SMC credit. STEP will be visiting each CDS preschool site to rate their preschool programs.

CDS has been audited by the State Department of Education, LA Universal Preschool, and Federal Head Start during the year.

CDS leads and supervisors have participated in the facilities planning processes at nearly every school in the district where the department operates programs.

A new Health Advisory Committee has been formed to work with preschool supervisors on health issues.

#### Suggested direction for 2008-09:

Continue work to increase the number of full time preschool children served. Open a new full day classroom at Washington West in September 2008.

Implement a database enrollment system.

Use the summer months to create special transition programs to prepare 4 yr olds for kindergarten. Involve families in the transition activities. Enroll kindergarten children whose families want childcare as early as possible to assist in their transition to kindergarten before and after school programs.

Work with Ed Services to provide opportunities for CDS and kindergarten teachers to interact and cross train.

Continue to work with site facility planning committees at each CDS site.

#### Budgetary Implications:

The CDS enrollment database will be an additional cost within the CDS budget.

Ms. Pye asked for a cost estimate regarding a pilot for Preschool-Kindergarten transition. Ms. Abdo said that she would provide the board with that information.

Ms. Leon-Vazquez inquired about parent involvement. Ms. Abdo replied that Head Start allows district staff to expand increased parent involvement to all preschool sites.

Ms. Abdo explained that there are many bilingual staff members in the preschools. The staff is also very adept at recognizing students who may need more specialized education services. Ms. Pye asked about early intervention strategies. Ms. Abdo explained that Head Start requires standard developmental tests for all Head Start students.

Ms. Abdo said that she hoped to soon have a database staff member funded by Head Start - to analyze student achievement data for students who have moved on to district elementary schools.

#### DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS (FORMERLY THE FINE ARTS DAC)

#### Chair: Cindy Rosmann Staff Liaison: Tom Whaley Charges:

- Serve as a vehicle for parents, community, teachers, and students to communicate with the Board of Education on matters related to all students' equitable access to and successful participation in comprehensive, sequential, standards-based PreK-12 Arts Education. A comprehensive arts education program, with the arts taught as discrete disciplines, should be an integral part of the core curriculum offered to all students at all grade levels.
- Assess our current Visual and Performing Arts programs (Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts).
- Compare the District's curriculum, scheduling, staffing, instructional materials, equipment, and facilities with national and state standards and frameworks.
- Work with various agencies to explore funding to support the Visual and Performing Arts programs.

#### DAC Accomplishments to date this year:

- The DAC has updated its Glossary of Arts Education Organizations and Events for use by students, parents and district staff. It's posted at http://www.smmusd.org/vapa/pdf/DACVAPAGlossary07.pdf
- 2. The new DAC brochure, designed to encourage membership from a broader segment of the arts education community, is posted at http://www.smmusd.org/VAPA/DAC.html.
- 3. The DAC has compiled a list of district music students participating this year in honor groups at the local, state, and national level.
- 4. DAC members and VAPA staff participated in the district wide Facilities Master Plan process. The DAC then sent a "VAPA Facilities Needs Survey" to all district VAPA teachers. The results were collated and given to the "Our School Plan" consultants in Spring 2006, and then to the Prop BB Oversight Committee in Fall 2007.
- 5. The DAC suggested an instrument donation program, which Tom Whaley developed into the "Play It Forward" program. (http://www.smmusd.org/vapa/pdf/InstrumentDonation.pdf)
- 6. The DAC has reviewed student access to Standards-based VAPA curriculum in 2007-08, and here is a summary:
  - a. DANCE Current program: All 4<sup>th</sup> graders receive two weeks of dance instruction during P.E. JAMS has one dance class this year. At Samohi, two dance classes are offered through the P.E. department, enhanced by once-a-week instruction by Robert Gilliam, through a SM/M Education Foundation-funded program, and that program has been extended to Malibu High and Olympic High. The UCLA ArtsBridge partnership program has moved to Olympic High. There are also two after-school SMC "dual enrollment" ethnic dance classes at Samohi. SmART Schools is offering professional development and sample lessons to classroom teachers in Title I schools to incorporate dance into the curriculum.

- b. DANCE Deficiencies: No district wide program in PreK, K, 1, 2, 3, or 5. Few classes are offered at the middle and high schools. Appropriate dance facilities are available only at Grant, McKinley, and Samohi.
- c. MUSIC Current program: General Music in grade 3; students in grades 4 and 5 can choose between Choir and Instrumental Music (strings and winds). Elective music classes at all middle and high schools. The SM/M Education Foundation, the Gail Dorin Foundation, and the Ella Fitzgerald Foundation fund the Dream Strings and Dream Winds programs at the four Title I schools and at two middle schools.
- d. MUSIC Deficiencies: No district wide General/Vocal Music in PreK, kindergarten, or grade 1 and 2. Lack of dedicated appropriate facilities, especially at the elementary schools. Some class sizes are too large at the elementary level for the spaces available. Insufficient funding for transportation for secondary performing groups -- the Santa Monica Band Parents Association phoned, emailed, and wrote a letter (9/6/06) to then-CFO Winston Braham regarding this issue, but received no reply. For the Viking Marching Band and Color Guard this year, students and their parents had to raise nearly \$40,000 for transportation and over \$57,000 for additional instruction (Color Guard and percussion). SCSBOA provides adjudication at the regional events these groups travel to, which are assessment tools for the program. Thus, SCSBOA serves a similar function for the marching bands as CIF does for the sports teams.
- e. THEATRE Current program: Drama classes are being offered at John Adams Middle School, Malibu Middle and High Schools, and Samohi. At the elementary level, the Morgan-Wixson Theater is continuing a partnership begun last year to provide opportunities for elementary students to both attend theatre performances and improve their literacy skills. One of the plays presented this year was "The Hundred Dresses," which focused on the theme of the "in" crowd and fashion teasing. The Santa Monica Playhouse has received a grant from the City of Santa Monica to support its Schools' Theater Field Trip program for the Spring and Fall of 2008. One thousand SMMUSD students will participate in interactive professional musical productions, pre-show theatre arts preparation, post-show talk-backs and language arts workshops, and hands-on behind-the-scenes lighting, costuming, and make-up experiences.
- f. THEATRE Deficiencies: No district wide elementary drama program in PreK through 5. "For credit" drama classes have not been offered at Lincoln Middle School since June 2005; only an afterschool non-credit program remains.
- g. VISUAL ARTS Current program: A wide range of art classes are offered at the three high schools, with fewer offerings at the middle schools. P.S. Arts (a private foundation) is providing K-5 art instruction at McKinley and Muir this year. Parents are funding K-5 year-long art instruction at Cabrillo, Pt. Dume, and Webster.
- h. VISUAL ARTS Deficiencies: No district wide elementary visual arts program in PreK through 5 (eliminated in 1978). In contrast, the Beverly Hills USD provides art to all K-8 students by a credentialed art teacher. Dedicated facilities are needed for art instruction at the elementary level. Fewer sections are being

offered at the middle and high schools compared to past years. JAMS has dropped from 1.6 art FTEs to 1.0 art FTE. Lincoln has suffered a similar drop in art instructors, and no longer offers semester-long classes, such as Advanced Art, only Exploratory. Samohi also lost an art instructor and an art classroom two years ago. The Roberts Art Gallery manager needs a stipend to support the teacher in organizing, setting up, publicizing, and taking down exhibits. (<u>http://www.samohi.smmusd.org/roberts/</u>)

### Highlight(s) to date of particular note:

- Partial reinstatement of district wide Elementary Music instruction by credentialed teachers (General Music in grade 3, choir, winds and strings for ALL students in grades 4 and 5) with ongoing funding from the state Arts Initiative. More than 2,300 students are participating. The SM/M Education Foundation is funding recorders for all 3<sup>rd</sup> graders so they no longer have to purchase their own instruments.
- 2. Title I schools Instrumental music students receive additional instruction through the Dream Strings and Dream Winds programs. With the reinstatement of Elementary General Music/Choral Music instruction, the reinstatement of the district wide Elementary Honor Choir, and the introduction of the Elementary Honor Band and Orchestra, more Title I students were able to participate in the "Stairway of the Stars" concerts this year.
- 3. Purchase of instructional materials, equipment, and supplies continues for all 4 arts disciplines (Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts), including the reinstated Elementary General Music and Choral Music programs, with one-time funding from the state Arts Initiative.
- 4. High quality instruction Joni Swenson was a finalist for the Los Angeles Music Center Bravo Awards this year, and Samohi was named a "GRAMMY Signature School" for its outstanding education programs. On May 20 at Barnum Hall, SMMUSD will host a conference entitled "Open the Doors to Arts Education," sponsored by the California County Superintendents Educational Services Association (CCSESA) Statewide Arts Initiative and 11 County Arts Lead, and the Los Angeles County Office of Education.
- 5. Music In addition students participating in winter and spring concerts at all school sites, student groups performed at the "Stairway of the Stars" concerts on March 6 and 7, and at the "2008 Celebration For The Arts" at Santa Monica Pier in April. Fifty SMMUSD sutdents participated in GRAMMY Career Day at USC again this year. Student trumpet players were offered a free trumpet clinic in December with Malcom McNab, whose playing can be heard in the movies Jaws, E.T., Indiana Jones, Jurassic Park, and Dances with Wolves. The Samohi orchestra program partnerhip with the L.A. Philharmonic continued this year, including a free concert at Samohi by the Sibelius Academy Symphony Orchestra from Finland in October. Over spring break, the Samohi Symphony traveled to Salzburg, Vienna, and Prague to perform, attend a rehearsal and concert by the Berlin Philharmonic, participate in world class clinics, and be part of the Dvorak Festival. The Samohi Madrigal Ensemble performed at Disney Hall on April 18. Earlier in the month, the Samohi Chorale, Madrigal Ensemble, and Chamber Singers all received Gold awards at the Heritage Music Festival in San Francisco. The Chamber Choir also took overall top chorus award, and all three choirs recived the

"Spirit of San Francisco" award, given to the groups which best represent themselves, their community, their state, and quality music education. The Samohi Viking Marching Band has been invited to perform in London on New Year's Day 2009.

- 6. Theatre Malibu Middle, Malibu High, and Samohi have all presented plays this year, including "Willie Wonka," "Little Women," and "Bye Bye Birdie."
- 7. Dance A dance class was introduced at JAMS this year, with students performing at two well-received school wide assemblies on February 15. The Robert Gilliam dance program, funded at Samohi by the SM/M Education Foundation, was expanded to Malibu High and Olympic High this year.
- 8. Art exhibits District students participated again this year in the Santa Monica Museum of Art's "Wall Works" program. 250 students from Franklin, Grant, McKinley, Muir, Rogers, Roosevelt, and Lincoln Middle Schools collaborated with the BLIK wall graphics company (www.whatisblik.com), and the exhibition opened at Bergamot Station in March. Artwork by students from JAMS, Lincoln, Malibu, Olympic, and Samohi was displayed at the "2008 Celebration For The Arts" at Santa Monica Pier in April. The Roberts Art Gallery at Samohi was included in the "Pico Art Walk/Pico Artists at Work" again this year. Roberts Gallery exhibits included "WPA Landscapes" in September, "Day of the Dead" in October, "Bonnie Sue Schwartz" in January, "Black History Art" in February, "TRAPA" (AP Art) in April, and the "Senior Art Show" (opening May 20<sup>th</sup>). Past exhibits can be seen online at http://www.samohi.smmusd.org/roberts/exhibits.html
- 9. Barnum Hall The Barnum Hall Theatre Manager, Carey Upton, has been named Director of Theater Operations and Facility Permits, thanks to the efforts of Jean Sedillos, Michael Hill, and the SPACE Committee. The school district is profiting from a new revenue stream, due to the work of Carey Upton.
- 10. SmART Schools The U.S. Department of Education awarded SMMUSD a 4-year SmART Schools grant. The goal is integrating the arts throughout the curriculum in the four Title I schools. This is the second year of the grant, and classroom teachers from the four Title 1 schools participated in a successful "Summer Institute" training week with artists in August, 2007. Artists are working with classroom teachers this year (2007-08). A recent miniinstitute brought more classroom teachers into the program, and additional professional development is being offered this year on March 6 and 7, on May 29 and 30, and at a summer institute in August.
- 11. Honors Two Samohi visual arts students were honored last year in the L.A. County Music Center Spotlight Awards. The Samohi Jazz Band placed first last year in the advanced division at the Western States Jazz Festival. A large number of district music students have been selected again this year for local, statewide, and national honor choirs, orchestras, and bands by the Southern California Vocal Association (4 students), the Southern California School Band and Orchestra Association (11 students), the American Choral Directors Association (18 students), the California Band Directors Association (27 students), and the California Orchestra students were selected for the prestigious American String Teachers Association/National School Orchestra Association

"National High School Honor Orchestra": Ben Bartelt, Bobby Birstock, and Davey Martinez.

- 12. Expanding class offerings Dr. Pedroza and Tom Whaley have been working closely with Dr. Susan Jain at UCLA and with Santa Monica College to identify instructors and to develop course outlines that satisfy college requirements in order to start a Gospel choir and a Mariachi ensemble as dual enrollment classes at Samohi in Fall 2008.
- 13. Facilities A working HVAC system (with the emphasis on the air conditioning!) was finally installed in the Samohi music building this year.
- 14. Fundraising The "For The Arts" Art Auction raised \$75,000 this year. Another "For The Arts" benefit concert with Jackson Browne and Venice is scheduled for May 31<sup>st</sup> at Barnum Hall.
- 15. Equipment The new "Play It Forward" program encourages families to donate musical instruments their children have outgrown, or no longer use, to the school district. See details at: www.smmusd.org/vapa/pdf/InstrumentDonation.pdf
- 16. Integrating the arts into the curriculum The SM/M Education Foundation funded a pilot program this year at Grant Elementary called "Rock the Classroom." It brought professional musicians into the classroom to teach "Literacy through Music," using music and songwriting to complement the literacy curriculum.

#### Suggested direction for 2008-09:

- DAC Charge Revise the VAPA DAC charge to reflect Mr. de la Torre's suggestion, during the March 13<sup>th</sup> Board of Education meeting, to add the phrase "focus on multicultural programming" to charge #2.
- 2. CURRICULUM, STAFFING, and SCHEDULING
  - a. Music Following the 9-year "Arts for All" plan, adopted unanimously by the Board of Education in 2005, maintain the districtwide elementary music program, which currently serves grade 3, 4, and 5, and forms the foundation of the district's entire music program, acknowledged to be among the finest in the state and the nation. Recommended budget cuts of 1.0 FTE in the elementary music staff for 2008-09 may result in going back to the "pull-out" program for instrumental music in grades 4 and 5 and eliminating the general music and choir program. This is especially troubling since voters were told repeatedly during the recent Measure R campaign that the parcel taxes funded the elementary music program, and that it would be protected if Measure R passed. As of September 2006, ALL  $3^{rd}$ ,  $4^{th}$ , and  $5^{th}$  grade students were finally receiving instruction from credentialed music teachers for the first time since 1983. Music teachers have been traveling to 3 schools a day to make the current "music block" schedule work, working under less-than-ideal conditions. The trade-off has been that ALL students have received sequential, high quality instruction and the classroom teachers have no longer had to deal with the "pull-out" schedules, when groups of students were leaving the classroom every 40 minutes for music classes.
  - b. Visual Arts Following the "Arts for All" 9-year strategic plan, adopted by the Board of Education, implement a district-wide Elementary Visual Arts program with credentialed art teachers, patterned after the Beverly Hills Unified School District model and starting with the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grades.

- **c. Dance** Maintain standards-based district wide Dance instruction for 4<sup>th</sup> grade, and add 5<sup>th</sup> grade.
- d. Dance Provide a Dance class at all 3 middle schools (JAMS has a new dance class this year), or at minimum a two-week standardsbased Dance unit for each grade level as part of the P.E. curriculum. Share district staff, provide professional development, and/or use artists-in-residence to work with credentialed teachers.
- e. Dance Offer a comprehensive Dance program at all 3 high schools (ballet, modern, ethnic). Work on strengthening the relationship with UCLA, per Ms. Leon-Vazquez's suggestion during the March 13<sup>th</sup> Board of Education meeting.
- f. Theatre Reinstate the Lincoln Middle School Drama program using a 3-tiered approach: integrate drama instruction into 6<sup>th</sup> grade Humanities/Social Studies class; offer standards-based year-long "for credit" drama classes as electives; and provide after-school programs for play/musical production.
- **g. Visual Arts** Ensure appropriate class offerings at JAMS and Lincoln for all levels of experience.
- h. VAPA class offerings at Samohi Schedule more A-period classes at Samohi for 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> graders so they can take both a music class and a foreign language class. A-period also needs to include non-honors sections of academic classes so that athletes who are not enrolled in the honors program can participate in arts classes during the regular school day.
- i. Music Provide transportation funding for the Samohi Viking Marching Band and Color Guard, which represent their high school, the school district and the City of Santa Monica at so many events each year. The parents have to raise tens of thousands of dollars each year to pay for transportation and instruction in order for all students to participate; the Marching Band cannot compete in tournaments without a Color Guard.

#### 3. FACILITIES

- a. Appropriate facilities for Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts instruction are needed at all elementary schools. "Dedicated" arts classrooms are part of the "Arts for All" strategic plan and should be included in the Prop BB construction program.
- b. The practice rooms in the Malibu High music building also need adequate ventilation so students are not bathed in perspiration. According to national Opportunity-to-Learn Standards for Arts Education, p.25, "Lighting and ventilation systems are designed so that rehearsal rooms have a Noise Criterion (NC) level not to exceed NC25. Rehearsal rooms, practice rooms, and instrument storage rooms maintain a year-round temperature range between 68 and 72 degrees, with humidity between 40% and 50%, and air exchange rates double that of regular classrooms."
- c. Visual Arts facilities need improvements at all middle and high schools. At Malibu High, there is no ventilation in the kiln room, which is a health and safety issue. Follow up on Ms. Pye's request to staff during the March 13th Board of Education meeting to determine the cost to fix the ventilation system. Many art classrooms need more sinks and additional storage, including storage for three-dimensional artwork and secured storage for hazardous materials.
- d. Instrument lockers are needed for the Samohi orchestra room to store both school-owned and privately owned musical instruments.

During the Prop X program, the Wenger Corporation designed a storage system specifically for the new building and for the schools' instrument inventory. Secured storage for instruments is an essential part of national and district music standards. Secured storage is especially important since this room, along with Barnum Hall, is rented to outside groups.

- e. Theatre facilities need improvements at all middle and high schools. When the organ pipes are re-installed in Barnum Hall, the room where they are currently being stored, along with other materials, should revert to Barnum Hall use for additional office space.
- f. Dance facilities improvements are needed at 13 of 16 school sites. Of the middle and high schools, only Samohi has a dance studio. Of the elementary schools, only the Grant and McKinley auditoriums have flooring that is appropriate for dance instruction.

- f. 0.2 FTE to reinstate a "for credit" Drama class at Lincoln: \$14,000
- g. 0.4 FTE to increase Visual Arts class offerings at JAMS and Lincoln: \$28,000
- h. Scheduling more A-period classes at Samohi: Cost TBD
- i. Provide transportation funding for the Samohi Viking Marching Band and Color Guard: \$40,000

#### 2. FACILITIES

- a. Bring district Visual and Performing Arts facilities up to district and national standards with funds from Prop BB: <u>Cost</u> TBD
- b. Purchase the Wenger instrument storage system that was designed for the Samohi orchestra room: \$30-40,000

It is recommended that the board adopt the Local Education Agency (LEA) Plan for July 1, 2008 - June 30, 2013.

- COMMENT: As part of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, every five years, school districts must develop and file a Local Education Agency (LEA) plan with the state. The state of California has adopted five performance goals that spearhead improvement efforts to achieve the goals of NCLB:
  - All students will reach high standards, at a minimum attaining proficiency or better in reading and mathematics, by 2013-2014.
  - All limited English proficient students will become proficient in English and reach high academic standards, at a minimum attaining proficiency or better in reading/language arts and mathematics.
  - 3. By 2005-2006, all students will be taught by highly qualified teachers.
  - 4. All students will be educated in learning environments that are safe, drug-free and conducive to learning.
  - 5. All students will graduate from high school.

LEA plans must address these five goals and describe the educational services for all students that can be used to guide implementation of federal and statefunded programs, the allocation of resources, and reporting requirements. The plan is updated annually, following a review of demographics, STAR student achievement data results, Academic Performance Index (API), and meeting Annual Yearly Progress (AYP) and other related data sources. The LEA plan, along with the Consolidated Application, individual school site's Single Plan for Student Achievement, School Accountability Report Cards, and the Categorical Program Monitoring (CPM) process serve as the district's accountability tools for compliance with state and federal regulations.

It is recommended that the Board of Education begin implementation of an indoor air quality program, under the guidance of the EPA's IAQ "Tools for Schools" Program and begin with two site surveys to create baseline data for the program with Environmental Mold Services in an amount not to exceed \$20,000.

COMMENTS: District staff received a grant to attend the EPA's "Tools for Schools" seminar in Washington, DC, last fall. As part of the commitment for attending the seminar, it was understood that the district would implement an indoor air quality program in the district. Program implementation has many steps and will take several years to fully implement.

<u>History:</u> Approximately 20% of the U.S. population, nearly 56 million people, spends its days in our elementary and secondary schools. In 1999, the National Center for Education Statistics of the Department of Education reported that approximately one in five U.S. public schools had unsatisfactory indoor air quality (IAQ). In addition, ventilation, which impacts IAQ, was reported as unsatisfactory in approximately one in four public schools. Students are particularly at risk for health problems such as asthma and allergies, which have been linked to indoor pollutants commonly found in schools. Diseases like asthma are also becoming increasingly common in school-age children. Because the health and comfort of students and staff are among the many factors that affect attendance and contribute to learning and performance in the classroom, IAQ issues simply cannot be ignored.

Schools that fail to respond promptly and effectively to poor IAQ may experience increased individual short-term health problems, such as fatigue and nausea, as well as long-term health problems, such as asthma.

Poor IAQ may even lead to liability claims and lawsuits that can damage a school's reputation. Additionally, schools that do not

catch their IAQ problems in their early stages may end up needing costly repairs. This point is particularly important since the average public school is forty-two years old and buildings begin rapid deterioration after forty years, if not properly maintained. The IAQ Tools for Schools Program provides a low-cost solution to prevent high costs from delayed repairs and the dilapidation of school buildings.

<u>First Steps:</u> Staff is recommending that two sites be surveyed for IAQ performance. The two identified sites are Will Rogers Elementary and Muir/SMASH Elementary Schools. Once reports are completed, it is recommended that both an IAQ Coordinator be identified and an IAQ team be established, comprised of district staff, Health and Safety DAC members, school nurses, and others to review the reports and determine next steps to implement the program.

Staff recommends that <u>Environmental Mold Services</u> be retained to survey the first initial sites for testing and implementation of the "Tools for Schools" Program. A walk through of each school will be done, to include CO2 monitoring, visual inspection, airflow pathways, and mold or moisture trouble-shooting. Microbial sampling, non-viable air samples, and thermal imaging will be performed in every room. Environmental Mold Services has proposed a fee of \$350 per classroom, or a total of \$10,000 per school, for a total fee of \$20,000 for the two sites. Once the base line is established, an RFP will go out to survey all fourteen remaining facilities and implement a districtwide program.

Based on findings, priorities will be established for each site into long-term and short-term solutions. Many IAQ hazards can be remediated by simply educating the school staff and changing the current habits of the school occupants.

The implementation of design standards through the Measure "BB" Program will take into consideration EPA standards for indoor air quality issues, as will the CHPS standards.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

It is recommended that the Board of Education revise Board Policy 3290 - Acceptance of Gifts as outlined below and as reflected in the attached pages.

COMMENT: The Board of Education directed the Equity Fund Oversight Committee to draft a set of revisions that would address issues related to implementation of the Equity Fund, which is described in BP 3290 - Acceptance of Gift.

The committee is recommending the following revisions:

- Change the name from "Equity Fund" to "Achievement Fund" to more accurately reflect its purpose.
- The plan for the use of Equity Funds will be included in each school's Single Plan, rather than being submitted as a separate document.
- Since the Equity Funds that are distributed to schools represent a major academic intervention effort, the Equity Fund plans, evaluation, and distribution of funds will be overseen by the Education Services Division of SMMUSD in conjunction with Fiscal Services.
- The Education Services Division of the SMMUSD will convene meetings of the Equity Fund Oversight Committee for the purposes of reviewing progress and addressing any barriers to implementation of the policy or participation by schools.

The proposed language has been inserted in the Board Policy (BP), which is attached.

Dr. Escarce said he believed "Equity Fund" better reflects the aspiration and motivation of the policy. Mr. Snell and Ms. Leon-Vazquez agreed. Mr. de la Torre suggested "Equity and Achievement Fund" as a possible new name.

The board agreed to the changes to involve the Education Services Department, considering a majority of the sites use the allocated funds for intervention programs. They agreed to use current year CBEDS when calculating the Equity Fund Distribution Chart to prevent a delay in funds for the next year.

Dr. Escarce suggested that the PTAs spread the word regarding programs being funded by the Equity Fund. He also requested a biannual update from staff regarding compliance from the school sites for contributing to the Equity Fund, including booster clubs. This item will come back for approval at a future board meeting.

#### DETAIL

Philosophy

The Board of Education acknowledges that education is a fundamental right. Every child has a right to an education that will prepare him or her to be a skilled and productive member of our society. The goal of the Board of Education is to provide equitable and high quality educational opportunities for all students in Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

The Board recognizes that the needs of students require various learning opportunities, and it is the responsibility of the board to identify and remove barriers that contribute to gaps in achievement for different groups of students. It is the intent of the Board that gifts accepted by the District provide equitable access to educational opportunities to meet the needs of all students. The board recognizes the community's desire to participate in promoting excellence in our schools through fundraising and gifts. While greatly appreciating acceptable donations, the Board discourages any gifts which may directly or indirectly impair its commitment to providing equal educational opportunities for all district students.

The Board recognizes that there are differences among various communities in their ability to contribute additional funds for programs and services at their local schools, and these differences perpetuate inequalities in educational opportunities from one district school to another. Therefore, the Board may not accept gifts by individuals, groups or organizations to specific schools intended to replace personnel, programs or services cut by the Board in the process of budget reduction, unless sufficient funds are received to restore those programs, services or personnel at all sites from which they were cut.

To achieve a greater level of equalization, the Board will establish an Equity\_Fund, which will be administered by an external organization of the Boards choosing Achievement Fund, which will be administered by the Education Services Department in conjunction with Fiscal Services. Contributions to this fund and distributions from this fund will be made in accordance with Administrative Regulations 3290. The purpose of the Equity Achievement Fund grants will be to improve the achievement of ALL students while simultaneously closing the achievement gap by mitigating the effects of the unequalized enrichment of schools.

Before accepting a gift, the Board shall consider whether the gift:

- 1. Has a purpose consistent with the district's vision and philosophy.
- 2. Begins a program which the Board would be unable to continue when the donated funds are exhausted.
- 3. Entails undesirable or excessive costs.
- 4. Implies endorsement of any business or product.

The Board shall carefully evaluate any conditions or restrictions imposed by the donor in light of district philosophy and operations. If the Board feels the district will be unable to fully satisfy the donor's conditions, the gift shall not be accepted.

Gift books and instructional materials shall be accepted only if they meet regular district criteria. All gifts, grants and bequests shall become district property. At the Superintendent or designee's discretion, a gift may be used at a particular school.

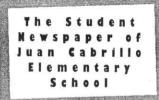

"Same card, same card" was the shout that rang out unanimously among the kids attending the 2007-2008 school year's annual bingo night Friday February 8<sup>th</sup>.

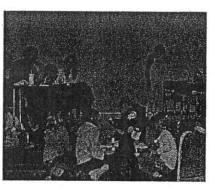

CB: How many years has Mr. Yates attended Kindergarten Roundup? PR: According to him, 38 years.

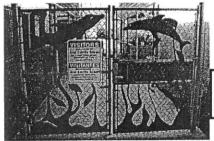
CB: What is the number of kids who attend K-roundup and then enroll in kindergarten at Cabrillo?

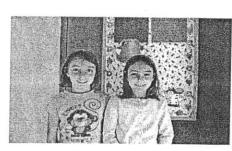
ing. <u>Stevie Wonder</u> also surprised the audience by appearing and leading the audience in a Barrack Obama for President sing along.

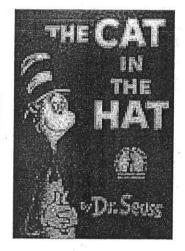
# Stairway to The Stars By Jena Weinberger

### SMMCTA Harry Keiley Presentation to the Board of Education May 16, 2008

In all the years that I have been employed in our district, including the years I've served as Association president, the recent past has been the most challenging and troubling of times for me professionally and for many of the members I represent, specifically, our great Special Education teachers.

As a teacher, I think we have an obligation and responsibility to model appropriate behavior for the students we serve, especially when we disagree. Needless to say, there has been much disagreement lately, especially at public Board meetings following the release of the Lou Barber Report.

Unfortunately, the disagreements have not focused on policies and programs but on people and personalities. Some of the comments have been outrageous and should not be tolerated.

In the past two weeks I've had the opportunity to speak and meet with many of our Special Education teachers. Sadly, many of them perceive the recent criticism of Special Education practices as attacks against them. As a result, the morale of Special Education teachers is low and their frustration levels are high. How can this be good for our employees and the students they serve?

Special Education teachers have one of the most challenging and stressful jobs in our schools. During the past decade the demands placed on Special Ed teachers has only grown. Teachers express frustrations about the lack of resources and programs. They express their frustrations about the length and confrontational nature of a small percentage of their IEP meetings, especially, those involving "advocates and/or attorneys". Who are the advocates for our teachers in these adversarial meetings?

As a High School Teacher I know that I may have great success with an overwhelming majority of my students and families, 149 of 150, but (1) student can make my life and work unbearable. The same can be said for our Special Ed teachers.

Far too many of our Special Ed teachers have expressed their complete frustration and disappointment in the way that they are treated and spoken to in IEP meetings.

Let me be clear.... the overwhelming majority of IEP meetings are successful and result in teachers feeling as thou they are part of a team. It's the small percentage, the exceptions that cause Special Ed teachers the most distress.

Teachers describe some advocates as verbally attacking them....as intimidating them....as speaking to them in an unprofessional and disrespectful tone. <u>This is unacceptable and should never be tolerated!</u>

To be a successful Special Ed teacher takes a great deal of talent, patience, creativity, understanding, compassion, professional training and support from others. We need to use this time to look ahead, together, to find ways that we can better understand the work of these great educators and find ways to support them. In doing so, we will be able to retain our exceptional teaching staff, which in turn, will benefit our students.

SMMCTA will be forming a sub committee to identify the challenges faced by our Special Ed teachers and more importantly, to name specific actions we can all take to support their work in the classroom.

A good place to begin our work is here tonight, by acknowledging the many success stories in our Special Ed program and to put an end to the inappropriate and misguided criticism of our teachers.

# California's Current Reality

Too few children arrive at school ready to learn. Our expectations for students in kindergarten continue to increase, enhancing the disadvantages of children who begin school without the necessary skills that quality preschools can provide. Many children living in poverty reach 1st grade two years behind their peers — though they are only 6 years old. Only 50 to 60 percent of eligible 4-year-old children are served in some form of child care or preschool program. And even as current programs support some of our children from low-income families, affordability poses a barrier to effective preschool for many children whose families come from all income levels.

Although the educational programs we provide to our youngest children stand distinct from our public school system, early childhood education (ECE) programs easily rival the K–12 system for complexity and irrationality. University of California, Berkeley, researchers have characterized California's current ECE offerings as consisting of "disparate funding streams, regulations, and family eligibility requirements." The educational quality of these programs is mixed, and we do not have the data or analytical capacity to know how well they are preparing young children for kindergarten success. Too few teachers receive sufficient preparation, and programs are aligned insufficiently with K–12, and with kindergarten in particular, to ensure that what children are learning in preschool is preparing them to be successful in kindergarten.

## Recommendations

A culture that puts students first should start with its youngest students. Research and common sense show that waiting until kindergarten or 1st grade to begin educating our children is educationally foolish and fiscally unwise. Accordingly, although it was outside the scope of our Committee's initial charge, we recommend that the state adopt a series of inter-related changes to strengthen preschool and kindergarten services. Placing students at the center means ensuring that all youngsters get off to a strong start; research shows quality preschool programs improve student readiness for school, yield higher academic achievement, reduce special education placements, and produce such downstream benefits as higher earnings, reduced reliance on social services, and reduced crime.

#### Adopt a Comprehensive Early Childhood Package

California should provide every child with quality preschool opportunities to ensure that they begin school ready to undertake the challenges of kindergarten and the primary grades. We should ensure that these programs have standards that ensure all children have an equal opportunity to learn, and that teachers will have the knowledge and skills to address a range of student needs and ensure effective learning. Specifically:

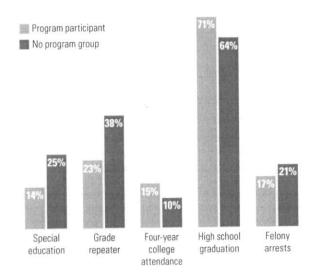
- Move toward universal preschool in phases. The state should set a goal of universal access to preschool, but first: (1) expand access to subsidized preschool to all low-income students (those eligible for a free/reduced lunch) over a five-year period, and (2) target universal access to communities with high concentrations of low-income students.
- Continue mixed-delivery system for preschool, but utilize consistent standards and funding. The current mixed-delivery system includes public and private providers of preschool and child care that are funded from a variety of sources (federal, state, and local) and are subject to different program requirements and standards. While preserving this diversity, the state needs to begin moving all providers toward a set of high-quality standards by establishing preschool learning standards (such as the preschool foundations currently being developed by the California Department of Education); developing one set of regulations for all providers,

regardless of funding source; and transitioning to a single financing structure under which all providers would receive the same rate for the preschool portion of their programs, regardless of funding source.

#### The Benefits of Quality Preschool

The Chicago Child-Parent Centers conducted a preschool experiment starting in 1985. The program provided half-day preschool to economically disadvantaged students in specific neighborhoods in Chicago and tracked those students, as well as matched students from neighborhoods not receiving preschool. The students participating in the preschool program have had higher educational outcomes, including higher standardized test scores, higher graduation and college attendance rates, and fewer placements in special education. In addition, the participants were less likely to have repeated a grade, been incarcerated, or committed a felony. These outcomes show the potential benefits from quality preschool.

- Make strategic investments in preschool quality. Although the quality of the current subsidized preschool programs has not been measured, it is likely that many or even most of them do not meet the high-quality threshold that yields the kinds of benefits discussed above. To get a return on the state's current investment and achieve the expansion proposed by the Committee, the state will need to invest in preschool staff training; standardize training requirements to make courses transferable; and use data to monitor provider performance and to provide information to parents.
- Measure and provide incentives to promote preschool quality. To help families make better choices and create incentives to improve quality, the state should phase in over three years a standardsbased rating system that provides a quality rating for each preschool serving publicly subsidized students. To help finance investments in improved quality (including higher salaries for better trained staff), the state should provide increased funding to centers receiving consistently higher ratings.
- Expand full-day kindergarten. Provide incentive grants, including start-up and facility support, to districts serving disadvantaged students to support their transition to full-day kindergarten. Participation by California students in full-day kindergarten is estimated at approximately 30 percent, compared to approximately 60 percent nationally.
- Delay the age at which children enter kindergarten. Over a period of three years, shift the birth date by which children become eligible to start kindergarten from December 2 (one of the nation's latest) to September 1. This will help ensure that children are more mature and ready to benefit from school; and yield approximately \$700 million per year in savings for roughly 13 years (the period during which the smaller cohorts will move through the system). The state can use these savings to expand preschool and/or full-day kindergarten offerings.

The technical report discusses these recommendations in more depth, along with their underlying rationales and implementation processes.



# What You Should Expect To See

If implemented successfully as part of our proposed systemic reform, these changes should help improve student performance by:

- Ensuring that all students have a strong, early start.
- Ensuring that all service providers meet high-quality standards while preserving the system's diversity of programs.
- Providing preschool staff with training to improve their effectiveness.
- Measuring results so that parents and policymakers have the information they need to make sound decisions.
- Offering incentives to promote continued improvements in program quality.
- Expanding full-day kindergarten to more disadvantaged students.
- Ensuring that students are mature enough to begin kindergarten.
