Activities to support parent involvement must also be included. Services must be supplementary and may include additional support staff, such as specialist teachers, counselors, and instructional aides. Services may also include before/after school intersession classes, instructional materials, equipment, technology, professional development and conferences. Each school's School Site Council is required to provide input and recommend to the Board for approval the planned program activities and budgets as part of the Single Plan for Student Achievement. RE: COURSE APPROVAL - OLYMPIC HIGH SCHOOL

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.07

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the granting of elective credits for the following four courses to be offered at Olympic High School.

Comments: Olympic High School staff have developed the proposed classes to enhance the current course offerings available to students. Each of these classes addresses the development of specific knowledge, skills and attitudes to engage students and prepare them for graduation and beyond. The courses are elective in nature, and therefore, their credits will count towards graduation units. They will not fulfill any of the district-adopted graduation requirements, or required courses for admission to California's public universities ("a-g requirements").

COURSE: Success Skills NUMBER OF CREDITS: 5 Duration: One Semester DEPARTMENT: English and Math COURSE OBJECTIVES/GOALS: Participating students will:

- Learn basic English Language Arts and math skills;
- Demonstrate the ability to produce a well-written paper addressing a topic provided by the instructor;
- Demonstrate the ability to perform satisfactorily on the subtests of the California High School Exit Exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/OVERVIEW: This course is designed for students who have not passed the CAHSEE. Participating students will learn and acquire the skills needed to pass the English/ Language Arts and math subtests of the exam. The scope of the English Language Arts skills covered in this course includes: word analysis, comprehension, literary response, writing strategies, and writing conventions and applications. Basic skills in the mathematical strands of number sense, statistics, data analysis and probability, measurement and geometry, algebra and functions, and math reasoning are also covered in this course. Using CAHSEE prep textbooks and materials, students will be coached by English and math teachers to ensure mastery of skills and enhanced ability to pass the exit exam.

COURSE: Yoga NUMBER OF CREDITS: 5 Duration: One Semester DEPARTMENT: Physical Education COURSE OBJECTIVES/GOALS: Participating students will:

- Learn the history of yoga from a cultural context, as well as in contemporary society;
- Demonstrate the ability to engage in yoga poses, stretches, and postures.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/OVERVIEW: This course is designed for students with or without previous knowledge of yoga. It focuses on the discipline of yoga as a vehicle for health and physical fitness. In the course, students will learn about yoga as a form of exercise, as they engage in, and learn the various poses and stretches. The scope and sequence of the course has been developed to build students' physical strength and mental focus.

COURSE: Jewelry NUMBER OF CREDITS: 5 Duration: One Semester DEPARTMENT: Art COURSE OBJECTIVES/GOALS: Participating students will:

- Learn the history of beads and beading from a cultural context as well as in contemporary society;
- Demonstrate the ability to identify stones used in jewelry making;
- Demonstrate the ability to string, knot, and wire wrap in jewelry making;
- Demonstrate the ability to design and complete earring, necklace, bracelet, and bookmark projects.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/OVERVIEW: This course is designed for students with or without previous knowledge or experience with beading or in jewelry production. Students will learn the history of beads and beading, and will learn the skills needed to complete several projects. The course will address the creative and design talents of participating students.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.35

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 08-10 - Commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

This resolution is to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, which is officially observed this year on January 12, 2009. Attached is the resolution.

Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education

Resolution No. 08-10 Commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

Whereas, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was born in 1929 in Atlanta Georgia;

Whereas, the young Martin Luther King attended segregated public schools and graduated from high school at age 15;

Whereas, Dr. King received his B.A. degree from Morehouse College in Georgia, the alma mater of both his father and grandfather and earned his B.D. from Crozer Theological Seminary. Later, in 1955, he received a Ph.D. from Boston University;

Whereas, Dr. King was committed to equal rights for African-Americans in this country from an early age and was an active member of the NAACP;

Whereas, Dr. King led the boycott of Montgomery's segregated buses for over a year after Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat in a bus in 1955, and eventually, the Supreme Court outlawed discrimination in public transportation and Dr. King emerged a prominent leader of the civil rights movement;

Whereas, Dr. King began organizing protest demonstrations and marches in such cities as Birmingham, Alabama, St. Augustine, Florida and Selma, Alabama. The marches were for the right to vote, desegregation, labor rights and other basic civil rights.

Whereas, between 1957 and 1968, Dr. King canvassed the country and appeared more than 2500 times to speak in protest against injustices toward his race;

Whereas, Dr. King wrote five books and numerous articles drawing on his experience as a preacher to galvanize and inspire an audience. Dr. King was arrested and jailed on several occasions;

Whereas, on August 28, 1963, Dr. King led the great march in Washington, DC, that culminated with his famous "I Have a Dream" speech at the Lincoln Memorial. More than a quarter million people of all ethnicities attended the event.

Whereas, at the height of Dr. King's influence, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 were passed.

Whereas, Dr. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, at the age of 35.

Whereas, Dr. King continued his work to attack discrimination in other parts of the North and broadened his criticism against the Vietnam War;

Whereas, Dr. King advocated for government compensatory program seeking restitution of wages lost to slavery which in turn, demanded aid for the poorest communities and sought an economic bill of rights that provided for massive government job programs to reconstruct society;

Whereas, Dr. King continued to participate in the movement by supporting black city workers striking for higher wages and better treatment in Memphis, Tennessee where he was assassinated;

Whereas, in 1986, Congress established the Martin Luther King Day as a United States holiday and in 1994, King Day of Service was built on the teachings of nonviolence and social justice to promote community service. The aim is to make the holiday a day ON, where people of all ages and backgrounds come together to improve lives, bridge social barriers, and move our nation closer to the "Beloved Community" that Dr. King envisioned.

Therefore, let it be resolved, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District celebrates the life and legacy of a man who brought hope and healing to America. We commemorate the timeless values he taught us through his example - the values of courage, truth, justice, compassion, dignity, humility and service that so radiantly defined Dr. King's character and empowered his leadership. On this holiday, we commemorate the universal, unconditional love, forgiveness and nonviolence that empowered his revolutionary spirit, and speaks to the best of who we are as human beings.

Staff recommends the Board of Education receive the attached Santa Monica High School Siting Study by R. L. Binder FAIA Architecture and Planning.

Staff further recommends that the Board direct District staff to continue discussions with the City of Santa Monica and City Redevelopment Agency staff about shared-use opportunities and financing strategies for long-term redevelopment of the Santa Monica High School campus, based on Concept A-Final Build Out.

DISCUSSION:

At its January 17 and February 4, 2008 meetings, the Board approved the preparation of the Siting Study by R. L. Binder to develop potential short-term and 20-year term design concepts for the Santa Monica High School (Samohi) campus to meet its functional and programmatic needs, expand opportunities for shared public use of its facilities and develop linkages between the campus and the Civic Auditorium Campus to the southwest.

The Samohi Measure BB Site Committee discussed two concepts and three intermediate phases under development during preparation of the Siting Study that were presented by R.L. Binder at its May 7, 2008, meeting. The Committee unanimously recommended further exploration of Concept A-Final Build Out. (See three attached renderings.)

Concept A-Final Build Out envisions a long-term phased redevelopment of Samohi that provides for the Michigan Avenue alignment (the Michigan Commons) opening from East to West allowing Samohi campus use during school hours and public use including bicycle and pedestrian paths in the afternoons, evenings, and on the weekends with a secured campus north and south of the Commons. Included also is the development of three primary campus quads: An Art Plaza, Science and Tech Quad, and "Main Street," as well as smaller outdoor gathering spaces along the Michigan Avenue Commons.

Additional Concept phases may include relocating the gyms and natatorium under a new soccer field to the north and east, which would open the renovated Greek Theatre to the west and provide a vista to the History Building sited on the top of the campus hill to the entire community, redefine the nature of Pico Blvd. and 4th Street and strengthen and enliven the connection to the Civic Auditorium Campus. The fields would be open to public view and access.

The relocated gyms and pool would front a realigned and redesigned 6th Street allowing easy identification and access for students and the community alike. Subterranean parking under a new football stadium could be entered from Olympic Blvd. and pedestrians would exit the parking lot directly onto the Michigan Commons - with ready access to the fields, Barnum Hall and the landscaped promenade that traverses the campus providing ease of movement and clear wayfinding throughout the campus and to the Civic Auditorium Campus west of 4th Street.

At its July 23, 2008, Santa Monica City Council meeting, R. L. Binder presented Concept A-Final Build Out, to much enthusiasm. Concept A, Final Build Out was also presented to the Board at its July 24, 2008, meeting. As discussed, this concept for Samohi provides a number of opportunities for significant new public use of the Samohi campus.

The Board of Education initially directed staff to work with the City of Santa Monica staff to request funding from the Redevelopment Agency at its June 26, 2008, meeting.

- Produce revisions to the Special Education Parent handbook in collaboration with District staff based on feedback from community members. An Ad Hoc committee will be assembled of members who served on the Parent Handbook Committee. (Measurement: In accordance with Board policy this information will be included in reports to the Board of Education at mid-year and at the end of the school year.)
- Create and maintain a facilitated parent support group. (Measurement: In accordance with Board policy this information will be included in reports to the Board of Education at mid-year and at the end of the school year.)
- Work independently or with the PTA Special Education Committee to recommend and sponsor speakers of interest to

the special education community. An Ad Hoc Committee will be formed to accomplish this work. (Measurement: In accordance with Board policy this information will be included in reports to the Board of Education at mid-year and at the end of the school year.)

• Work with the Childcare DAC to establish communication between the DACs and to participate in planning for Special Education preschool and CDS preschool and CREST programs to enhance inclusion opportunities. An Ad Hoc Committee will be formed to liaison with the Childcare DAC. (Measurement: In accordance with Board policy this information will be included in reports to the Board of Education at mid-year and at the end of the school year.)

COMMENT: The School Accountability Report Cards (SARC) are mandated by California law and fulfill a reporting requirement of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001. Each school's SARC must contain specific, discrete pieces of information mandated by the State of California, including test score results, demographic information, descriptions of professional development, and information about elements of Williams compliance (such as sufficiency of textbooks and information about building maintenance). School districts must post a School Accountability Report Card for each school in the district from the prior year (07-08) by February 1st of the end of the current school year (08-09). Once approved, SARCs are posted on our website and visited regularly by the public.

RE: EARLY DECLARATION RETIREMENT INCENTIVE

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.41

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve an early declaration retirement incentive.

COMMENT: As the District plans for the 2009-10 school year, staff is highly aware of budget reductions that may occur when the State of California revises the existing budget and creates the 2009-10 budget. As approximately 90% of the SMMUSD budget is personnel costs, it is clear that any reductions from the state may result in reductions in staffing. It is also clear that because of California Education Code and our employee agreements, any reductions in staff must be announced well in advance.

> Every year, the District experiences a number of retirements. It will be very helpful for staff to know about any retirements in advance, as we can minimize the impact that any possible staff reductions will have on our employees. To that end, staff is recommending an early declaration incentive to any employee, certificated or classified, who signs an irrevocable letter of retirement, effective the last day of employment for the 2008-09 school year. This letter must be received no later than February 6, 2009. If the irrevocable letter of retirement is received by February 6, 2009, the District will make a payment of \$1,000, prorated on the percentage of fulltime employment.

> To be eligible, a retiree must have at least 10 years of salaried District employment, and be at least 55 years old by June 30, 2009. The Human Resources Department will have the form available for interested employees. The Human Resources Department will provide this information to all employees. All forms must be received by the Human Resources Department no later than 4:00PM on Friday, February 6, 2009.

This is NOT an early retirement incentive. Early retirement incentives usually provide a much larger financial package which attempts to encourage employees to retire earlier than they may have planned. This is an early declaration incentive. It is intended for employees who have already decided to retire, but instead of waiting to put in the paperwork, they submit that paperwork early enough for the District to be able to plan more effectively.

RE: HEALTH SERVICES ANNUAL REPORT, UPDATE ON HEALTH CURRICULUM AND STUDENTS SEEN BY THE VENICE FAMILY CLINIC

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

This is a presentation of the Health Services Annual Report, which includes the number of student visits to the school site health offices, types of health conditions that are seen, number of different types of health screenings performed, Special Education assessments performed and meetings attended, along with reports filed and medications given. The different community agency referrals are listed. Diseases and medical conditions present in our student population, how they are monitored, and the treatment needed are discussed. Also included is the professional development completed by health services staff and health education projects that staff and students have undertaken.

In order to address whether or not mandated HIV/AIDS education is being provided in middle and high schools, a committee was formed to work with Educational Services to plan how to best deliver this health education to students and ensure its implementation. An eight-session planned curriculum for each Freshman Seminar class is in place this year and is being taught be one of the school nurses. The curriculum addresses HIV/AIDS and Drug Abuse.

The Venice Family Clinic sees students at SAMOHI two mornings per week. They see fifty to seventy students per month. These are students without health insurance. Dr. Loeza will discuss the diseases and health concerns that are seen by clinic staff. FROM: TIM CUNEO / MICHAEL D. MATTHEWS

RE: ENROLLMENT PROJECTIONS REPORT - DECISIONINSITE

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

The Board of Education continues to authorize a detailed study of enrollment projections by DecisionInsite, a private company specializing in this area. The Board will hear a presentation on enrollment projections for the 2009-10 school year, which are based not only on enrollment in prior years, but on outside factors related to census data.

Last year's projections were highly accurate. Only Santa Monica High School's projection was significantly different than their actual enrollment. Accuracy in enrollment projections is critical for accurate budget forecasting, so this information is of utmost importance to the district's budget. Staff will be using the projection data for staffing allocations for the 2009-2010 school year, and is in the process of sharing the enrollment projections and initial staffing recommendations with schools.

A final report, written by the DescisionInsite company, is available in the Superintendent's Office. District staff and representatives from DecisionInsite will be available for questions and discussion at the meeting.

RE: REVIEW POLICY 3511.1 - INTEGRATED WASTE MANAGEMENT

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.03

It is requested that the Board of Education review and discuss Board Policy 3511.1 - Integrated Waste Management in preparation for action at their next regularly scheduled meeting. While the District has a variety of waste management or recycling efforts in place there is no written policy statement directing staff. The attached new policy, as recommended by CSBA, is being presented for Board consideration and comments. CSBA also provides an Administrative Regulation for districts to consider. A copy of the regulation is attached for the Boards information.

COMMENT: California school districts dispose of large amounts of waste (approximately 763,817 tons per year). These wastes represent a significant loss of natural resources and school district funds, as well as a potential threat to student/staff health and the environment. To be responsible stewards of environmental quality, school districts should review processes and operations, and even curriculum choices. They should evaluate the economic, educational, and environmental benefits of implementing an effective waste reduction program.

Incorporating waste reduction as part of the school district's overall way of doing business can provide a number of important benefits:

- Reduced disposal costs.
- Improved worker safety.
- Reduced long-term liability.
- Increased efficiency of school operations.
- Decreased associated purchasing costs.

School district waste reduction programs also foster student achievement by transforming the school environment into a laboratory for learning and providing numerous opportunities for investigation through environment-based education.

The California Integrated Waste Management Act requires that all California cities and counties reduce solid waste generation by 50 percent. School districts can play a critical role in a city or county's ability to realize this goal. As a result, a school district's host city or county is a natural partner in the evaluation of the existing waste management infrastructure and the development of a comprehensive district wide waste reduction program. The Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District is fortunate to be located within communities that actively and aggressively promote and support recycling efforts.

During the staff report on this item the focus will be recycling efforts at the District Office. Staff will describe currents practices and report on how recycling efforts might be improved. Additionally, staff will present a brief description of what is occurring at individual school sites.

DETAIL

The Governing Board believes that the conservation of water, energy and other natural resources as well as the protection of the environment are essential to the health and well-being of the community. The Superintendent or designee shall develop an integrated waste management program to reduce waste, conserve natural resources and protect the environment.

The program shall include specific strategies designed to help the district reduce waste generation and improve efficiency in using natural resources in all areas of its operations.

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with city, county and state agencies in developing and implementing the district's integrated waste management program.

The Superintendent or designee shall make every effort to identify funding opportunities for the district's integrated waste management program including applying for available grants or other cost-reducing incentives.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide appropriate training opportunities to students and staff regarding the benefits and methods of conserving natural resources and protecting the environment.

INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01

The purpose of this item is to update the Board of Education regarding the progress of the Special Education Collaborative Working Group, which was appointed by Superintendent Tim Cuneo, convened in November 2008, and will work through February 2009.

Report of Progress to Date:

Three meetings have been held with the fourth one scheduled for January 14, 2009.

- **Third Meeting Developed a list of prioritized recommendations:** By the end of this meeting we were able to:
 - Hold a lengthy discussion as to the process for the work
 - Review the prioritized lists and the rationale for each recommendations made by each pair (nine pairs of one parent and one SMMUSD staff member collaborated
 - Integrate the offerings to identify key ideas
 - Assign "homework" to work in self-selected groups of 4-5 on identifying the critical success factors for each recommendation
 - As is our practice, reflect together on the meeting and the work ahead

Working Title	Rationale & Strategies
Hire the Best Fast	Rationale: (<i>tbd: is SMMUSD turnover on par with other districts? more problematic for some positions</i>) Teaching staff is the core of our SE offerings. The labor market is competitive. In particular, there is a need to streamline the hiring of classroom aides.
Keep and Develop the Best	 Rationale: Turnover is costly (replacement, training and orientation) and disrupts relationships (students, families and classrooms) and the educational process. Strategies: Providing staff with ongoing development and training, tapping internal experts to train others (SE and GE teachers), working to bring services in house will benefit staff satisfaction and cost reduction. Creating a positive and professional work environment where teachers feel valued and respected is foundational.
Establish a Policy of Inclusion	 Rationale: When SE education is an integral part of the total educational system, then students and families and SE staff are also treated as an integral part of the education community. Strategies: This paradigm shift depends on both policy mandate from the top, as well as site leadership to create a welcoming and inclusive local environment. It requires training General Education Teachers to follow specified accommodation and modifications and expanding the availability of collaborative classrooms beyond the pre-school level. It is also enabled by and programs like Circle of Friendship, Parent Resource Network and the outreach of local PTA's. Some districts have hired Inclusion Facilitators to support classroom teachers.

The following chart is the **PRELIMINARY** Priority Setting of the identified key areas to date given to each group as homework:

Strengthen Early Identification and Assessment	 Rationale: A systematic approach to early intervention for students showing signs of risk for academic failure and/or behavioral problems and working with families of younger children can prevent more serious problems, and mobilize resources and support for students, teachers, and families. It builds capacity, good will and can avert more costly and contentious situations. Strategies: RtI is under development. Build on pockets of excellence in district schools. Continue to strengthen the efforts at the pre-school level, both at district sites and independent schools.
Working Title: Build Robust Technology Infrastructure	 Rationale: Communication from SE Department to sites, from Schools to parents, across SE staff is fragmented, unreliable, and archaic. SMMUSD needs a 21st Century Communication Platform. Investment in technology and systems is vital to cultivating a culture of collaboration and transparency and accountability. Strategies: phone broadcasts; email; website with information about district policy, program offerings, resources. Surveys to gauge satisfaction, emerging needs, etc.; standards and accountability Hot Button: why can't/won't the District identify the resources and programs available?
Working Title: Assure that IEP Process follows the letter and spirit of the Law	 Rationale: There has been improvement and there are pockets of excellence, but the IEP process needs to be consistently administered across all sites. A perception of transparency and an experience of respect and collaboration will contribute to the building of trust. Once the plan is completed, parents want to know that services are being delivered. Attention must also be paid to ensuring a smooth transition between classes and grade levels. Strategies: This will require consistent and transparent policies, protocols, and practices. Local and district roles, decision-making authority and accountability should be clarified. The perspective of parents and of teachers should be invited and respected.

DETAIL

Criteria for Residency

A student shall be deemed to have complied with district residency requirements if he/she meets any of the following criteria:

- 1. The student resides with his/her parent/guardian within district boundaries. In the case of divorced parents, the student would attend school is the district of the parent who has primary physical custody. If the parents have 50/50 co-custody and one parent lives within the Santa Monica Malibu School District, the student may be enrolled in SMMUSD. (Education Code <u>48200</u>) (cf. <u>5111.13</u> Residency for Homeless Children)
 - (cf. 6173 Education for Homeless Children)
- 2. The student is placed within district boundaries in a regularly established licensed children's institution, a licensed foster home, or a family home pursuant to a court-ordered commitment or placement. (Education Code 48204) (cf. 6173.1 Education for Foster Youth)
- 3. The student has been admitted through the district's interdistrict attendance program. (Education Code <u>48204</u>) (cf. 5117 Interdistrict Attendance)
- 4. The student is an emancipated minor residing within district boundaries. (Education Code 48204)
- 5. The student lives with a caregiving adult within district boundaries. (Education Code 48204)
- 6. The student resides in a state hospital located within district boundaries. (Education Code 48204)
- 7. The student is confined to a hospital or other residential health facility within district boundaries for treatment of a temporary disability. (Education Code <u>48207</u>) (cf. <u>6183</u> - Home and Hospital Instruction)

District residency is not required for enrollment in a regional occupational center or program if there are openings in the program or class. (Education Code 52317)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually notify parents/guardians of all existing attendance options available

in the district, including, but not limited to, all options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance.

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

Proof of Residency

Prior to admission in district schools, students shall provide proof of residency.

(cf. 5111 - Admission)

The Superintendent or designee shall annually verify the student's residency and retain a copy of the documents or written statements offered as verification in the student's mandatory permanent record. (5 CCR 432)

Pursuant to Education Code $\underline{48204}$, a student shall be deemed a resident of the district if the student lives with a caregiving adult within district boundaries. Family Code $\underline{6552}$ provides an affidavit which authorizes a caregiver 18 years of age or older to enroll a minor in school and requires the caregiver's attestation that the student lives in his/her home. If the student stops living with the caregiver, Family Code $\underline{6550}$ requires the caregiver to so notify the school.

Upon enrollment of a student residing in the home of a caregiving adult within district boundaries, the caregiving adult shall execute, under penalty of perjury, the affidavit specified in Family Code 6552.

(cf. 5141 - Health Care and Emergencies)

Valid proof of residency may be established by documentation including, but not limited to, a combination of the following:

- 1. Picture Identification with local address
- 2. Utility service payment receipts
- Business mail such as: bank statement, credit card statement, correspondence from doctor, dentist, health care provider, insurance broker.
- 4. Income or property tax payment receipts
- 5. An affidavit of residency completed by a resident with whom the family is living.

A California Department of Education Legal Advisory, dated March 3, 1995, recommended that districts address circumstances in which the district has a reasonable belief that parents/guardians have provided false or unreliable evidence of residency.

If any district employee reasonably believes that the parent/guardian of a student has provided false or unreliable evidence of residency, the Superintendent or designee shall make reasonable efforts to determine that the student meets legal residency requirements. The investigation of residence may include: written request to parents to provide adequate, current documentation establishing residence, interview with the student, observation of student's residence, door-knock to establish that student is in residence.

Safe at Home Program

Government Code 6205-6211 authorize the Secretary of State to provide victims of domestic violence or stalking with a substitute address to use in place of their residence, work, or school address in all public records. SB 1062 (Ch. 639, Statutes of 2006) amended Government Code 6205.5 and 6206 to also include victims of sexual assault in this program. Under this program, the Secretary of State receives any mail sent to the substitute address and forwards it to the program participant's confidential address. Pursuant to Government Code 6207, the district must accept and use an address designated by the Secretary of State as a participant's substitute address. An August 27, 1999, letter from the Secretary of State clarifies that the substitute address should be used for all communication and correspondence with program participants. The participant will present a laminated identification card containing his/her substitute address and a four-digit authorization number. The district may verify the enrollment of a student in the program by contacting the Safe At Home program.

Program participants have been advised by the Secretary of State to provide administrators with their actual residence location only for school emergency purposes and to establish eligibility for residency.

When a student or parent/guardian participating in the Safe at Home program requests that the district use the substitute address designated by the Secretary of State, the Superintendent or designee may request the actual residence address for the purpose of establishing residency within district boundaries. The Superintendent or designee shall not include the actual address in the student's file or any other public record and shall instead use the substitute address for all future communications and correspondence. (Government Code 6206, 6207) (cf. 3580 - District Records)

(cf. 5125 - Student Records)

Denial or Revocation of Enrollment

If the Superintendent or designee, upon investigation, determines that a student's enrollment or attempted enrollment is based on false evidence of residency, he/she shall revoke the student's enrollment. Before any such revocation, the parent/guardian shall be sent written notice that the school has credible evidence that the student is not a resident of the district. The letter will indicate that the parent has the right, within ten days to provide adequate proof of residence to their child's school of attendance. If the parent/guardian fails to provide satisfactory evidence of residence, the student's enrollment shall be revoked on the Friday following the confirmation of non-residence.

INFORMATION ITEM NO. 1.05

On July 24, 2008, the Board of Education approved revisions to Board Policy 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting. The Administrative Regulation (AR) that accompanied the Board Policy accidentally included paragraphs that do not belong in the AR.

Attached is the corrected Administrative Regulation. The paragraphs that are to be deleted have been crossed out. Because Administrative Regulations do not require board action, this item is included in the agenda as information.

DETAIL

Definitions

Child abuse or neglect includes the following:

- 1. A physical injury or death inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person
- 2. Sexual abuse of a child, including sexual assault or sexual exploitation
- 3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2
- 4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3
- 5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

- 1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of his/her employment (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, assistant principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
- 4. An injury caused by a school employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, to protect himself/herself, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student (Education Code 49001)
- 5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by the student (Education Code 49001)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; administrators and employees of a licensed day care facility; Head Start teachers; district police or security officers; licensed nurses or health care providers; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program (Penal Code 1165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

A mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided whenever, in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment, he/she has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166.05)

Any person shall notify a peace officer if he/she reasonably believes that he/she has observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury, where the victim is a child under age 14. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have initial reported knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, each reporter must file a report or they must file the report jointly. If filing jointly, all mandated reporters must have their name on the form. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom he/she knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Within 24 hours of knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a school district police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11166) When possible, the telephone call should be made before the end of the school day during which the information was obtained.

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall then prepare and either send, fax, or electronically submit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

Mandated reporters may obtain copies of the Department of Justice form from either the district or the appropriate agency.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians

- d. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information
- e. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to him/her. (Penal Code 11167)

Information relevant to the incident of child abuse or neglect may also be given to an investigator from an agency that is investigating the case. (Penal Code 11167)

- 3. Internal Reporting
 - a. Internal Reporting of Alleged Child Abuse Regarding Non-SMMUSD Employees

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are required, to notify the principal or designee immediately after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

After completion of the written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572), and after providing that form to the appropriate agency, the mandated reporter shall provide that form to the school nurse or designee. The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity and may remove his/her name from the form. (Penal Code 11166)

The principal or designee shall attach the follow up report to the Confidential Incident Report Form, which shall be provided to the Superintendent.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of suspected child abuse regarding employees to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive child abuse in its schools. All complaints and allegations of child abuse shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action. Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

b. Internal Reporting of Alleged Child Abuse Regarding SMMUSD Employees or Volunteers

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect allegations against an SMMUSD employee or volunteer to an appropriate agency are required to notify the principal or designee immediately after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the principal shall inform the Superintendent or designee with the Confidential Incident Report Form.

The principal or designee so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

After completion of the written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572), and after providing that form to the appropriate agency, the mandated reporter shall provide that form to the principal or designee. The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to the principal and may remove his/her name from the form. (Penal Code 11166)

The principal or designee shall attach the follow-up report to the Confidential Incident Report Form, which shall be provided to the Superintendent.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of suspected child abuse regarding employees to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive child abuse in its schools. All complaints and allegations of child abuse shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action.

No student shall not be required or asked to meet with the employee or volunteer who has allegedly abused that student. If the employee or volunteer suspected of sexual misconduct is a district employee or volunteer, then during the course of the investigation, he/she shall discontinue contact with students.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

Training of mandated reporters shall include child abuse and neglect identification and mandated reporting. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Training shall also include guidance in the appropriate discipline of students, physical contact with students, and maintenance of ethical relationships with students to avoid actions that may be misinterpreted as child abuse.

Victim Interviews

Whenever a representative of a government agency investigating suspected child abuse or neglect or the state Department of Social Services deems it necessary, a suspected victim may be interviewed during school hours, on school premises, concerning a report of suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility. The child shall be given the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult district employee or volunteer aide selected by the child. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform him/her of the following requirements: (Penal Code 11174.3)

- a. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable him/her to be as comfortable as possible.
- b. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.
- c. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child.
- d. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the Superintendent or designee and/or principal shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. It is the responsibility of the peace officer or agent to notify the parent/guardian of the situation. (Education Code 48906) Peace officers shall be asked to sign an appropriate release or acceptance of responsibility form.

Parent/Guardian Complaints Regarding Suspected Child Abuse

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with a copy of the district's administrative regulation that describes how to report suspected child abuse occurring at a school site to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is other than English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a district employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect at a school site, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee also is obligated pursuant to Penal Code 11166 to file a report himself/herself using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 4650.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, of their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and of their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. The district shall also provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, employees shall sign the statement indicating that they have knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and that they will comply with those provisions. The signed statements shall be retained by the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The Superintendent or designee shall also notify all employees that:

- 1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of his/her professional capacity or outside the scope of his/her employment. Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)
- If a mandated reporter fails to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she may be guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)
- 3. No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the district for making a report. (Penal Code 11166)
