#### IV. BOARD OF EDUCATION – COMMENDATIONS / RECOGNITIONS (10)

• Malibu High School (10)

Principal Mark Kelly reported that Malibu High School is a dynamic and thriving school community with diverse experiences. He recognized MHS teachers in the audience and thanked them for attending the meeting. He then announced recent school activities. Yesterday, 140 sixth graders returned from Astro Camp. On Tuesday, the seventh graders took the STAR Writing Assessment. Next Thursday and Friday, students who are in the strings program will have the opportunity to play at the Disney Music Concert Hall in downtown L.A. Students are writing speeches for the Malibu optimist club.

Next week, marine biology students will conduct field work during a whale watching trip to Santa Barbara. The vocal and instrumental music students will be joining forces for the Fauré Requiem.

The campus is hosting a special assembly today and tomorrow for tenth, eleventh, and twelfth graders called "Every Fifteen Minutes." The assembly is an educational program that simulates the consequences of drinking and driving. After witnessing the assembly, Dr. Kelly wrote a letter expressing how deeply impacted he was by the program's message; the letter will be sent out to MHS parents. He said the students were respectful and moved by what they saw. He than thanked the parents who have dedicated their time during the last year to put this program together, especially PTA President Sandy Thacker.

On March 16<sup>th</sup>, MHS will be hosting a Distinguished School visit after submitting an application in December. Dr. Kelly said the school feels honored to be a part of a select group of schools to earn a validation visit.

World Issues, a new class is being offered at MHS this year, is an elective for eleventh and twelfth graders. 105 students signed up for the course. Junior India Oxenberg explained her experience in the World Issues class. Students discuss politics, elections, pre-emptive war, religions of the world, racism, and genocide. The course takes students through open-minded journey. Everyone in the class is very respectful of not only each other, but world cultures as well. The teacher has helped them use all the resources around them to explain some of the things that are difficult to comprehend. Students feel empowered in the class and they learn to combine their opinions with facts. There is a focus on viewing oneself as a member of a larger, more global community. The students study countries and individual cultures. India then read a poem she wrote to describe her experience of the class. Mr. Jacobs, the course creator and teacher, was recognized in the audience.

# A. Student Board Member Reports

#### Jaime Black – Santa Monica High School (3)

Student Board Member Black reported that tomorrow is Club Day on campus, during which the different clubs sell a variety of food to raise money. The Shack fundraiser for the senior class was held on March 3; it was also Karaoke night. On March 12-13 will be the Racial Harmony event, which is a two-day retreat during which students come together to discuss stereotypes and how to resolve racism at SAMOHI. The Jean Drive for OPCC will continue through March 114. The boys' soccer and basketball teams both had great seasons. CAHSEE testing will be held on March 17-18. On March 9, the "SAMOHI: Today and Tomorrow" will be held, showcasing SAMOHI for next 100 years.

#### Roya Sahafi – Malibu High School (3)

Student Board Member Sahafi reported that the girls' water polo team lost last week in the final CIF game. Girls' soccer made it to the quarter finals, but lost in penalty shoot-outs. ASB is planning for Pajama Day on March 20<sup>th</sup>, and a professional hypnotist is scheduled to come for entertainment on Friday the 13<sup>th</sup>. Friday the 13<sup>th</sup> will also see report cards going home. The sixth graders just returned from Astro Camp. A bilingual meeting was held today at Juan Cabrillo ES. The orchestra class will be performing at the Walt Disney Concert Hall tomorrow. Malibu High School spirit week is next week. The marine biology class will be traveling to the Santa Barbara Harbor for whale watching. Mr. Allen invited and encouraged the student board members to comment on items that they feel directly impact their sites or students in general. Student Board Member Enriquez reported that Captain Wendall Shirley, one of three Captains with SMPD, came and spoke to the school's Criminal Justice Class about police procedures and citizens' rights. Ms. Enriquezs commented on the close relationship between SMPD and Olympic High School. Yesterday, Olympic HS graduate Jennifer Estrada came and spoke to the Criminal Justice class. She is not only the Manager of SMPD's facility, but also a role model for students. Students found her presentation entertaining and informative.

Tommy Beans, a juvenile probationary officer and long time partner and supporter of Olympic HS, spoke to the students about how probation can change young people's lives in a positive direction.

Director Laurel Schmidt spoke to school staff about cyber bullying and bullying in general. The staff will share the information with the students.

Merrill Heiler of SMC came and spoke to students about the new and growing field of logistics, which is the planning, managing, and implementation of moving things. Students learned that this field is one of the fastest growing in today's job market.

Youth Dialogue, which is part of the Unity Resource Festival, will be held on March 8 at Virginia Ave. Park from 1:00-2:00pm. Ms. Enriquez announced that she was on planning committee for the event and invited board members to attend.

Ms. Kennerly thanked the board for holding a budget workshop yesterday. She said she noticed the extraordinary contributions to the district that come from parents. She added that in this current budget, \$28 million comes from outside sources, in great part spear-headed by an associated parent movement. \$7.44 million comes from direct contributions from the PTAs.

Ms. Kennerly reported that at their last meeting the PTA Council adopted its four main priorities: 1) achievement for all, with particular emphasis on closing the achievement gap and reading/literacy intervention; 2) climate and culture: don't lose site of the whole child; 3) budgetary issues: hoping to engage in the process with the district to separate out what fundamentals the district should be funding; 4) communication efforts.

There are two workshops coming up in May: the Special Education Spring Forum and the Parent Leadership Workshop on inclusion.

# 7:24 pm E. Financial Oversight Committee (5)

Ms. Torres thanked the board, Superintendent, staff, and Ms. Maez for a terrific workshop last night. She said it laid out a clear road map and context for action during an especially difficult year for districts across California. She then reviewed some of the FOC's perspective on important themes from last night's meeting: 1) In a difficult and fluid economic environment, the FOC is concerned the state's financial picture will continue to worsen. State revenues will continue to deteriorate into 2010; 2) The district may need to cut well more than \$4 million for the 2009-10 school year. Cutting more now means cutting significantly less in future years; 3) Creating a prioritized cut list. Seek flexibility that will allow the district to respond to economic changes; 4) Maintain an economic reserve; 5) the FOC would like to come back with suggestions for revenue enhancements. The FOC recognizes that a great deal is at stake in district right now. She thanked the community for last night's comments and would like to hold more budget workshops this spring.

- 2. The District will use fiscal control and accounting procedures that will ensure proper disbursements and accounting of state funds paid to that agency under the program. The District will make records available for audit when requested.
- 3. Funds may be used for direct program services, community notification processes, transportation services, and background checks related to the adults participating in the tutoring program.
- 4. The District will be responsible for expending these funds to provide free or subsidized adult English-language instruction for parents or community members who have pledged to provide personal English-language tutoring to English learners kindergarten through grade twelve.
- 5. Pledge records will consist of the following information: name of school district, name of school, and the name and signature of parent or community member committed to tutor English learners. These records will be maintained for audit.

6. A Community-Based English Tutoring (CBET) plan will be adopted by the local governing board and include elements of instruction and achievement information as described by EC Section 317. The data collected shall be used, by the governing board, to review and revise the plan as necessary, not less than once every three years, and be made available to the state as requested.

Signature of Presiding Officer of Governing Board is required. Original Notification of Intent to Participate, Fiscal Year 2009-2010, and CBET plan are attached for review and approval.

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.16

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the 2008-09 First Interim Report and the corresponding budget adjustments.

COMMENTS: Education Code (EC) Sections §35035 (g), §42130, and §42131 require the governing board of each local educational agency (LEA) to certify at least twice a year as to the LEA's ability to meets its financial obligations for the remainder for that fiscal year and for the subsequent two fiscal years.

The 2008-09 Budget was adopted by the Board of Education on June 26, 2008, and was approved by the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE). The Board adopted the 2008-09 1<sup>st</sup> Interim Report on December 11, 2008, and it was approved by the LACOE.

Since the adoption of the 1<sup>st</sup> Interim Report, changing conditions have necessitated adjusting the District budget. All of the expenditure and revenue changes previously approved by the Board or proposed for approval at this time are individually identified in the Second Interim Report (January 31, 2009), which is included as a part of this document.

The Second Interim Report was developed based on the following Revenue and Expenditure Assumptions.

#### **REVENUE ASSUMPTIONS:**

- 1. State Revenue Limit projection is based on a 5.66% COLA for 2007-08 (\$329 per ADA = 5.60% for SMMUSD). And the Deficit Factor is <9.685%>. The net decrease in Revenue Limit funding is <\$3,443,062>.
- 2. The Base Revenue Limit for Santa Monica-Malibu will be \$62,445,378, per 2007-08 P-2 ADA (11,064).
- 3. The Lottery allocation is currently estimated to be \$121  $($137 \text{ in } 1^{\text{st}} \text{ Interim})$  per annual ADA. Of this amount, \$11.50 is allocated for instructional materials.

- 4. The District will participate in the State's Class Size Reduction Program for Grades K-3 and will receive \$1,071 per pupil for Grades K-3.
- 5. No budget for Mandated Costs Reimbursement in 2008-09.
- 6. Special Education transfer from the Revenue Limit for ADA generated by Special Education students is \$1,927,129. Special Education Settlement at \$4.52 per 1999-00 ADA is \$52,328. The Special Education estimated funding for AB 602 is \$6,592,724, and the estimated federal funding is \$2,434,339.
- 7. Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program will be funded at \$69 per pupil (October 2007 CBEDS -11,571).
- 8. The local Parcel Tax for Measure R at \$346 per parcel is estimated to generate \$10,300,420, after processing senior exemptions, which are anticipated to number 2,757 out of 32,527 parcels. The Measure R parcel tax began in 2008-09 and replaced the previous Measure Y and Measure S parcel taxes.
- 9. The District will receive \$7,943,913 of financial support from the City of Santa Monica.
- 10. The District will receive \$135,000 of Joint Use Agreement funding from the City of Malibu.
- 11. The combined lease revenue is \$2.64 million, which is from the Doubletree Hotel, Madison Site,  $9^{\rm th}$  & Colorado and  $16^{\rm th}$  Street properties.
- 12. There is \$800,000 estimated interest revenue for the Unrestricted General Fund.
- 13. The District will receive \$16.8 per pupil for the Arts and Music Block Grant.
- 14. The District will receive \$69 per 2007-08 CBEDS grade 7-12 for Supplemental School Counseling.

### EXPENDITURE ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1. Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Changes post 1st Interim:
  - 1.0 FTE increase speech assistant for Special Education
  - 1.575 FTE increase one-on-one instructional aide for Special Education

# 2. Salary:

No projections of salary increases are included, except the step and column increases for Certificated and Classified employees.

- 3. Statutory Benefits:
  - 8.25 % STRS employer contribution rate
  - 6.20% OASDI contribution rate
  - 1.45% Medicare contribution
  - 0.30% SUI contribution
  - 2.00% Workers' Compensation contribution rate
  - 9.428% PERS employer Contribution rate
  - 3.592% PERS Reduction
- 4. Effective 1/1/2009, the premium rates for District-paid employee medical are increased as follows:
  - Blue Shield (HMO) 5.18%
  - Kaiser Permanente 8%

# TRANSFERS

- 1. Due to our participation in the State's School Facilities Modernization Program, we are currently required to budget 3% (\$3,857,302) of the total General Fund budget for the Ongoing Maintenance Program.
- 2. A contribution of \$500,000 to the Deferred Maintenance Fund (Fund 14) has been budgeted, representing the estimated District match.
- 3. A transfer of \$1,000,000 from Fund 21 to the Ongoing Maintenance Program (Fund 01) is budgeted.
- 4. A contribution of \$75,000 to the Child Development Fund (Fund 12) has been budgeted for the extra costs incurred by the minimum days of elementary schools.
- 5. A contribution of \$1,000,000 to the Post-Employment Benefits Fund (Fund 20) has been budgeted to reserve for the implementation of GASB 45.

### ASSUMPTIONS USED FOR MULTIYEAR PROJECTION:

It should be noted that the development of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Interim Report was completed prior to the adoption of the State budget on February 19<sup>th</sup>. Estimates for Revenue Limit and other State programs reflect projections known at the time the report was prepared. They can be considered worst case scenarios and will be adjusted to reflect actual State budget adoption as the District continues with its own budget development. Also, it should be noted and emphasized that any potential changes to the current or future budgets are all subject to Board approval.

They are presented at this time as a demonstration of possible reduction plans as we move forward into 2009-10.

The District is using the following assumptions to prepare the multiyear projection in the  $2^{nd}$  Interim Report:

- The projected enrollment does not change for next three years.
- A significant factor in Multiyear projections is the impact of the State budget. Revenue limit projections reflect a statutory COLA of 5.02%, and .5% in 2009-10 and 2010-11, with a 16.1699% deficit applied to both year.
- The ratio of K-3 Class Size Reduction (CSR) will increase from 20:1 to 23:1.
- The projection reflects the District use of the local flexibility to transfer the partial categorical programs' fund balance to the Unrestricted General Fund in 2009-10 and 2010-11.

# RESERVE FOR ECONOMIC UNCERTAINTIES

The District budget reflects a 3% + \$2M reserve of the total General Fund budget for 2008-09.

The Following pages include a General Fund - Revenue Summary and a General Fund Expenditure Summary, as well as individual summaries for major Funds and a Multi-Year Projection for the Unrestricted General Fund. The following documents are included as Attachment A: 2008-09 Second Interim Budget Assumptions and the complete SACS Report.

Ms. Maez explained that the numbers in the Second Interim Report are as of January 31, 2009, and were prepared based on the Governor's current year and 2009-10 budget recommendations. Changes from the newly-adopted state budget have not been incorporated into this report. All SMMUSD budget projections, as of last night's workshop, now reflect the state budget.

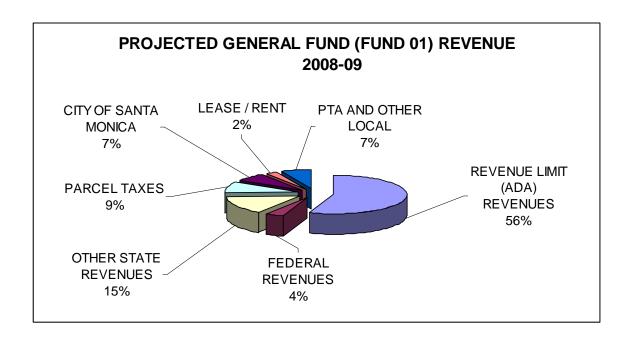

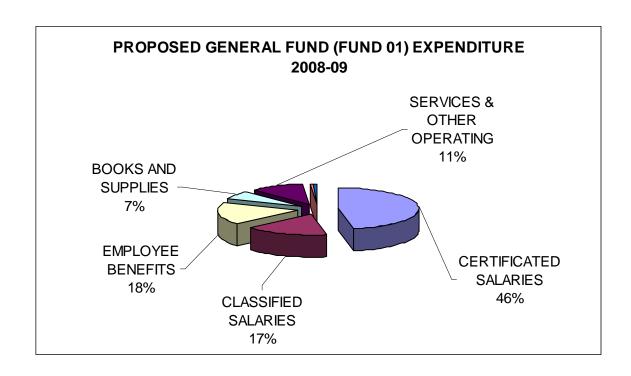

WHEREAS American women of every race, class, and ethnic background have made historic contributions to the growth and strength of our nation in countless recorded and unrecorded ways;

WHEREAS American women have played, and continue to play, a critical economic, cultural, and social role in every sphere of the life of the nation by constituting a significant portion of the labor force working inside and outside of the home;

WHEREAS American women have played a unique role throughout the history of the nation by providing the majority of the volunteer labor force of the nation;

WHEREAS American women were particularly important in the establishment of early charitable, philanthropic, and cultural institutions in our nation;

WHEREAS American women of every race, class, and ethnic background served as early leaders in the forefront of every major progressive social change movement; and

WHEREAS American women have been leaders, not only in securing their own rights of suffrage and equal opportunity, but also in the abolitionist movement, the emancipation movement, the industrial labor movement, the civil rights movement, and other movements, especially the peace movement, which create a more fair and just society for all:

This special meeting was held on 3/4/09. This item is now returning for board consideration.

• Christian Birch, Claudia Landis, Kevin McKewin, Susan Hartley, Anne Ernst, Cindy Rosmann, Zina Josephs, Paul Fernandez, Susan Justin, and Harry Keiley addressed the board regarding this item.

Mr. Snell suggested holding a special meeting early next week to discuss alternative cuts. Dr. Escarce said he could not support this item. Mr. de la Torre, Ms. Leon-Vazquez, and Mr. Allen said they would approve only the intervention counseling cut. Ms. Leon-Vazquez suggested examining alternative cuts. Ms. Pye expressed her opinion that these cuts do not reflect the district's core values. Mr. Mechur commended staff for their hard work in putting together budget recommendations. Dr. Matthews explained that an intervention counselor resigned, and so a reduction in 1.0 FTE would simply be a cost savings without a layoff.

Mr. de la Torre MOVED to approve the item with the removal of the nursing and music teacher cuts. Ms. Pye SECONDED.

### RESOLUTION NO. 08-25

### DETERMINATION OF SENIORITY AMONG CERTIFICATED EMPLOYEES WITH THE SAME SENIORITY DATE ("TIE-BREAKER RESOLUTION")

- whereas, pursuant to Education Code Section 44955, the Board is required, as between employees who first rendered paid service to the District on the same date, to determine the order of termination solely on the basis of the needs of the District and its students; and
- WHEREAS, Education Code Section 44955 requires that upon the request of any employee whose order of termination is determined as stated above, the Board of Education shall furnish in writing no later than five days prior to the commencement of the hearing held in accordance with Section 44949, a statement of the specific criteria used in determining the order of termination and the application of the criteria in ranking each employee to the other employees in the group.

### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as follows:

- 1. That this Board determines that the needs of the District and the students of this District are best served by resolving seniority ties within the meaning of Education Code Section 44955, subdivision (b)(third paragraph) and Section 44846, by applying the criteria set forth in paragraphs 4 through 15 below:
- 2. That as between employees who first rendered paid service to the district in a probationary position on the same date, the order of termination of said employees shall be determined by reference to the criteria which follow and the application thereof to each employee;
- 3. That the criteria set forth in paragraphs 4 through 15 below are listed in priority order and each criterion shall be used only if the preceding criteria do not delineate the order of termination;
- 4. As between certificated employees possessing the same seniority date, the employee who is highly qualified within the meaning of the No Child Left Behind Act wins the tiebreaker over an employee who is not highly qualified within the meaning of the No Child Left Behind Act;
- 5. Assuming that the preceding paragraphs do not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, the certificated employee holding currently valid and properly filed BCLAD/BCC, or equivalent, wins the tie-breaker;
- 6. Assuming that the preceding paragraphs do not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, the employee who possesses a currently valid and properly filed CLAD, or equivalent, wins the tie-breaker;

- 7. Assuming that the preceding paragraphs do not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, the certificated employee having on file with the District a National Board Certificate wins the tie-breaker;
- 8. Assuming that the preceding paragraphs do not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, the certificated employee holding a clear credential wins over those holding a less permanent credential such as a preliminary credential;
- 9. Assuming that the preceding paragraphs do not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then employees possessing multiple authorizations and supplemental authorization on credentials will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order than certificated employees having only multiple authorizations (ranked by number of authorizations). Similarly, certificated employees possessing multiple authorizations on credentials will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order than certificated employees having only single authorization credentials and multiple supplemental authorizations. Similarly, certificated employees possessing single authorization credentials and multiple supplemental authorizations will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order than certificated employees having only a single authorization and single supplemental authorization. Similarly, certificated employees possessing a single authorization and single supplemental authorization will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order than certificated employees having only a single authorization on credentials;
- 10. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then employees only possessing a preliminary credential will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order than employees possessing lesser credentials, including but not limited to, a provisional credential/certificate such as an intern credential, emergency permit; Short-Term Staffing Permit ("STSP"), Provisional Internship Permit ("PIP"), Special Temporary Certificate ("STC") or State-Issued Waiver;
- 11. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then the certificated employee holding the highest current step placement on the salary schedule will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order;
- 12. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then employees with the earliest original hire date within this District will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order;
- 13. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then employees with a Phd./Ed.D/J.D. from an accredited institution of higher education will be regarded as having

greater seniority for the purposes of determining seniority order than employees possessing a Masters degree from an accredited institution of higher education;

- 14. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then the employee with the earliest date of conferral of a Masters degree from an accredited institution of higher education will be regarded as having greater seniority for purposes of determining seniority order;
- 15. Assuming that the preceding paragraph does not resolve all ties between employees having the same seniority date, then the employee with the highest undergraduate grade point average will be regarded as having greater seniority for the purposes of determining seniority order.

Such criteria shall be applied to rank the order of individuals for purposes of layoff and reemployment, subject to exceptions allowed by law;

### RECOMMENDATION NO. A.36

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve a budget increase of \$5,888,000 \$1,610,000 to provide additional scope for parking, traffic, safety, on-site wastewater treatment system, and other required improvements to the Measure BB Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements project, for a total construction budget of \$36,263,000 \$31,985,000.

Historically, traffic and parking has been a challenge for both the school and local community at the Malibu campus since the high school was added in the 1990s. Concerns regarding student, staff and community safety have been discussed by many groups in several settings over the past years. Most recently, the topic has been reviewed in a series of Community Outreach meetings. Staff and consultants have been working with city representatives, school personnel, traffic engineers and others. A plan has been developed that now addresses a long term problem.

Additionally, t The State of California Water Quality Control Board requires permits for the operation of on-site wastewater treatment systems. During the course of our extensive preliminary investigations of the site septic systems, it has become apparent that major modifications to the on site wastewater systems are necessary.

COMMENT:

At the Board meeting of February 5, the status of the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements Project was presented under Discussion Item No.D.01. The athletic facilities improvements for the project including field lighting were discussed. Athletic facility improvements are an "Add Alternate" for the project. This means the design for these facilities is proceeding; however the bid and award of construction contracts for add-alternate scopes would be suspended until it was certain adequate funds remain in the program, after core program requirements have been successfully bid and awarded. Following is a summary of Add Alternates for athletic facilities and the Malibu campus:

At the Board meeting of February 5, extensive public comment was received on the project with considerable emphasis placed upon the character and operating plans for the proposed athletic field lighting. A public workshop on March 2, 2009 is scheduled at Malibu High School Library to present a new updated operating plan for educational purposes only.

After careful review of the various options available, it is now recommended that the District proceed with the completion of design, environmental analysis and California Coastal Commission amendment application for the athletic field lights with the following self-imposed conditions:

- 1. The proposed operating plan for the field lighting will be limited to educational purposes only. The operating plan will accommodate all Title 9 requirements.
- 2. Any future proposals by the City of Malibu or other third party users would require a separate CEQA evaluation and Coastal Development Permit amendment directly to the Coastal Commission as a separate project as defined by CEQA and other statutes. The District will not be a proponent for uses beyond educational purposes and will not be a Lead Agency as defined by CEQA for any such proposed project/activity.
- 3. The field lighting design will take into account all best practices including proper illumination of the playing field surfaces, avoidance of glare and light spill, all required environmental analysis including review for consistency with the Coastal Act provisions and the governing amendment process.
- 4. The District will return to the Board with a defined operating plan that has been thoroughly reviewed with the public and school community. The plan will include specific mitigations to limit the operation of the lights including number of nights operation, number of hours of operation, operational controls and other such requirements that may be appropriate to develop a thorough and manageable mitigation monitoring program for the operation of the field lighting consistent with educational requirements.

Alternatively, the Board may choose to suspend further design and consultant support to the field lighting portion of the scope of work. However, staff does not support this position because it would inhibit the goal of providing complete athletic facilities to support the goal of a comprehensive high school program at the Malibu campus including provisions to meet all Title 9 requirements.

The budget allocation for the project is not effected by this action since it is an Add Alternate scope in the Measure BB program budget.

A presentation will accompany this agenda item.

Upon approval of the agenda, the board agreed to defer action on this item until a future meeting, but did request that staff make their presentation and public comments be heard.

Ms. Maez suggested creating a small working group (approximately 6-10 people) to discuss the field operational plan, number of nights for use of field lighting, and what oversight of use might look like. The board directed Ms. Maez to form this working group. Mr. Tomeoni explained that a revised board item would come back at the March 19, 2009, meeting, and that the working group's product would come forward at the May 7, 2009, meeting.

Overriding all other considerations the SMMCTA urges the SMMUSD Board to consider how budget cuts and reductions will impact classrooms and children, in particular, our students of greatest need.

We believe that strategic and thoughtful action can help blunt the impact of the crisis. Missteps and phony bravado will exacerbate the problem.

Our top priority must always be our students and the quality of education we provide them. These challenging times provide us with an opportunity to closely examine our limited resources, how we allocate them and how we ensure our expenditures align with our values.

Therefore ask yourself; will the budget decisions you make this year reflect a commitment to closing the achievement gap while increasing achievement for all?

We know the current economic crisis (global) and the recently adopted state budget place significant downward pressure on the district budget.

We know that despite the current level of reserves and unprecedented local funding, SMMUSD will need to make spending reductions for 2009-2010 and 2010-2011. We know reductions will not be easy and we know they impact all areas of the organization.

But it's important to acknowledge that the economy will recover.

Second, the Education Coalition is fighting to restore the funding schools are owed under Prop. 98. Also, the state budget agreement includes an initiative that will go on the May 19th ballot, which if passed, would pay back approximately \$9 billion of the funds schools are owed, starting in 2011-12.

Third, State Categorical Funding is now divided into (3) Tiers and includes flexibility. Specifically, governing boards have new and ultimate flexibility with categorical programs, which are in Tier 3. This helps the SMMUSD budget.

Fourth, the Federal Stimulus Plan will increase education funding. The 2009-10 budget will include additional federal funding in the areas of IDEA and Title One, in SMMUSD's case; we believe these dollars could exceed more than one million dollars positive over the next two years.

Finally, the Obama administration will significantly increase federal education funding.

SMMCTA have addressed this budget crisis with a cooperative and collaborative approach, determined to guarantee to students and parents that SMMUSD schools will continue to provide the education they should get.

### These Budget Principals have guided our SMMCTA approach

- 1. Cuts need to occur furthest from the classroom and students.
- 2. Cuts should begin with freezing all outside consultant contracts paid for by General Fund Unrestricted Dollars. (01 account)
- 3. Cuts need to begin at the top of the organization/central office, prior to any cuts at school

- sites and classrooms.
- 4. Cuts need to be prioritized and planned over multiple years.
- 5. Budget choices and decisions should reflect our core values.
- 6. Reductions in teachers should occur thru natural attrition, including retirements.
- 7. Any increase in class sizes should have a "sunset" date.

### **SMMUSD Budget Trends**

- 1. Student enrollment has decreased by approximately 10%.
- 2. Since 2002-03, the number of teachers has decreased by
- 3. approximately 7%.
- 4. Certificated teachers have decreased from (680) to (632) FTE's.
- 5. Administrators have increased by approximately 8%.
- 6. The number of administrators (includes all certificated/classified) has increased from (94) in 2005-06 to (101) in 2008-09.
- 7. From 2002-03 thru 2008-09, the line item for teacher salaries has increased by 12%.
- 8. From 2002-03 thru 2008-09, the line item for administrative salaries has increased by 33%.
- 9. The 5000 Account, including consultants, has increased by 20%.

### **Possible Cost Saving Actions**

- $\overline{1}$ . Reduce or freeze the use of outside consultants paid for with Unrestricted -01 funds.
- 2. Reduce or reassign the number of central office and site administrators.
- 3. Any increase in class sizes should be temporary and include a "sunset" date and k-3 should not exceed more than 22 to 1.
- 4. Reduce line item for Special Education.
- 5. Restructure SAMOHI.
- 6. Examine all categorical programs Now Divided into Three Tiers and evaluate all programs, in particular Tier 3 Categorical Programs.
- 7. Adopt an enrollment policy for elective classes at the secondary level.
- 8. Reduce line item for travel by 50%.
- 9. Reduce the line item for communications by 50%.
- 10. Close the district for two to four weeks during the months of July and August.
- 11. Increase student permits by no more than 200.
- 12. Offer a meaningful Early Retirement Incentive in 2009, 2010 and 2011.
- 13. Temporarily reduce the amount now in the GASB 45 account by a minimum of \$500,000. The current level of \$2.7 million represents more than 4x the amount necessary to pay the 2008-09 GASB obligations.
- 14. Furloughs should be studied and if necessary, implemented for 2009-10 and 2010 and 2011. (Certificated furloughs would need to be negotiated)
- 15. Freeze salaries for all employees earning more than \$100,000 annually.
- 16. Suspend the use of district paid cell phones.
- 17. Suspend car allowances.
- 18. Eliminate district generated testing and decentralize all Professional Development to school site(s).
- 19. Implement an immediate hiring freeze.
- 20. Convene a meeting with the Unions to explore other cost saving measures, which would need to be negotiated.
  - Your projected reserves for 2009 are more than \$14m.
  - Your projected reserves for 2010 are estimated to be 8%.
  - Your projected reserves for 2011 are estimated to be 3.5%.

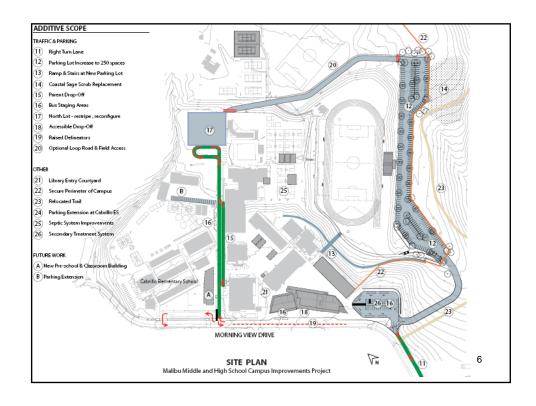

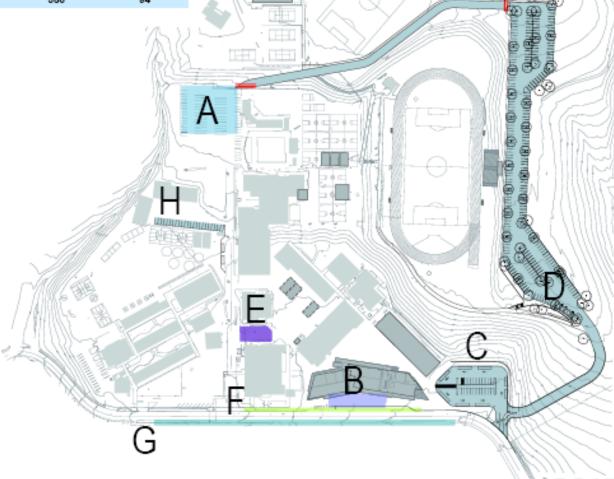

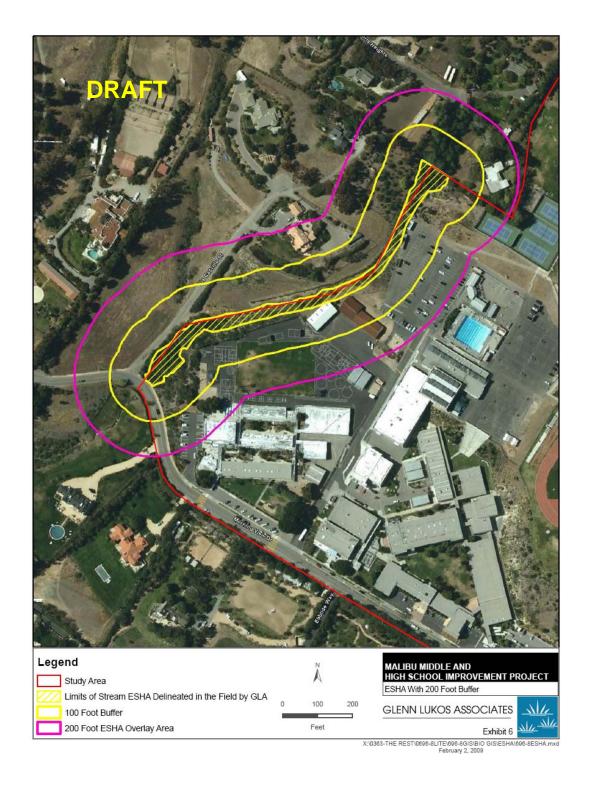
### PARKING TABULATION

## Next Steps: Traffic, Parking and Safety

- Consultation with City concerning ESHA setbacks, development restrictions
- On-site design charrette with Site Building Committee, traffic engineers, architects
- Include Cabrillo site in overall study
- Develop and refine recommendations, options, alternatives and cost estimates
- Return to BB Advisory and Board with proposed scope and budget recommendations

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# On Site Wastewater Systems

- Permits required; State Regional Water Quality Control Board has sole jurisdiction
- 10 separate systems identified 4 for Cabrillo, 6 for secondary school site
- Some immediate precautions needed
- · Some near term repairs required
- Monitoring wells to be installed, ground water sampling and reporting required
- Key milestone: Form 200s submitted to Waterboard – target: May

# On Site Wastewater Treatment Recommended Improvements

- Replace existing septic system tanks with new tanks
- Reconfigurations required with new building and modernization
- New secondary treatment system
  - Collect effluent from septic tanks and pipe to new treatment system
  - Pump treated effluent to seepage pits
- Considering treatment of backwash from swimming pool
- Allowances: to be refined in next steps

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# Reviewed with Budget Subcommittee on 2/24

- Detailed design and operations of the traffic and parking configurations
  - Identify all operation concerns such as late night return of students from sporting events
  - Security and site management
  - Transitions during construction
- Funding source: lower construction escalation rate than originally budgeted

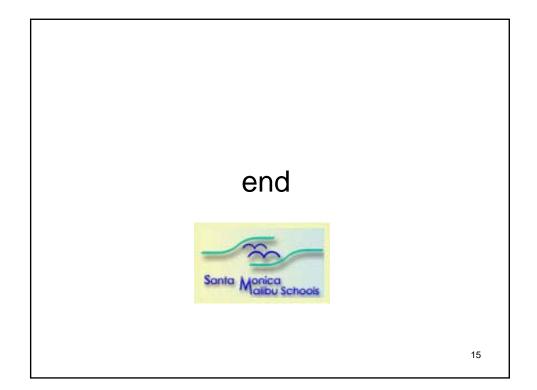

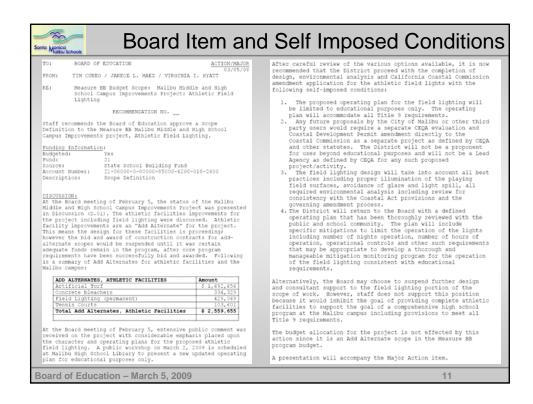

### **Self Imposed Conditions**

2. Any future proposals by the City of Malibu or other third party users would require a separate CEQA evaluation and Coastal Development Permit amendment directly to the Coastal Commission as a separate project as defined by CEQA and other statutes. The District will not be a proponent for uses beyond educational purposes and will not be a Lead Agency as defined by CEQA for any such proposed project/activity.

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### Self Imposed Conditions

3. The field lighting design will take into account all best practices including proper illumination of the playing field surfaces, avoidance of glare and light spill, all required environmental analysis including review for consistency with the Coastal Act provisions and the governing amendment process.

### **Self Imposed Conditions**

4. The District will return to the Board with a defined operating plan that has been thoroughly reviewed with the public and school community. The plan will include specific mitigations to limit the operation of the lights including number of nights operation, number of hours of operation, operational controls and other such requirements that may be appropriate to develop a thorough and manageable mitigation monitoring program for the operation of the field lighting consistent with educational requirements.

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## Summary: Community Workshop

- Field lighting is not acceptable because it will negatively impact night sky in the Malibu Park neighborhood.
- Field lighting was not included in Measure BB Bond Language and is not consistent with intent of the bond program
- Disagreement with need for expanded educational use of the field
- District is not trusted to follow the rules

# Summary: Community Workshop

- For those that accept need for lighting, additional education use of field, the range of nights for site use is from 5 to 20. Others suggest less than currently proposed in current draft operating plan.
- Suggestions for improved supervision
  - Posted signage of rules for use of athletic facilities
  - Rules should be binding and require approval from Malibu Park Community
- Suggestions for next steps
  - Form a committee
  - A plan must be made with community participation before permit application is submitted to Coastal Commission
