B. SMMCTA Update – Mr. Harry Keiley

Mr. Keiley began his report by welcoming Interim Superintendent Tim Cuneo. He commented that he hoped the board and staff would be monitoring the Intensive Intervention Summer School program during these summer months. He has spoken with Dr. Matthews regarding the Alternative Credits toward Graduation policy and the impact it might have on the union's members. He believes the concurrent enrollment, dual enrollment, and online course elements should be closely monitored. In regards to the Child Abuse policy, Mr. Keiley said the union looked forward to participating with the district in ensuring student safety. To conclude his report, Mr. Keiley said the Association sends out its prayers and thoughts to the family of Mr. Joey Lutz, a SAMOHI teacher, who recently died while on vacation in Panama.

C. S.E.I.U. Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely – no report

D. PTA Council President Report – Rebecca Kennerly

Ms. Kennerly thanked the board for starting tonight's meeting on time. She welcomed Mr. Cuneo to the district. She then reported on Summer Adventure, the annual joint venture summer enrichment program with the Education Foundation. The PTA's Special Education Committee will be meeting on July 28th to elect chairs and discuss priorities and its Mission Statement. PTA site Presidents have been meeting to discuss the Equity Fund. The U.S. State Department's International Visitor Leadership Program of professional and cultural exchanges sent dignitaries to examine the role of non-profit organizations in the U.S. These dignitaries met with SMMUSD's current and past PTA Council President to share ideas. The Communications team is currently working on a strategy for the 2008-09 school year. The State PTA is deciding which legislation it will weigh in on for the next election. The Council will be working with site Presidents to set the stage for the fall semester. The entire PTA is committed to supporting district leadership, the Board of Education, teachers, and staff. Ms. Kennerly concluded her report by stating the PTA is looking forward to making the 2008-09 school year a strong one.

F. Measure "BB" Advisory Committee

Gleam Davis, Co-Chair of the Committee, explained that the presentation the board was about to see regarding the joint use opportunities with the City of Santa Monica was well received by the City Council and Planning Commission. She reported that the BB projects were staying within budget regarding soft costs. Ms. Davis said there has been a tremendous amount of community input and people are excited about moving forward with the projects.

G. Report from City of Santa Monica – Karen Ginsberg, Assistant Director of Community and Cultural Services

Ms. Ginsberg, Assistant Director of Community and Cultural Services for the City of Santa Monica, presented to the board a study of shared use opportunities between SAMOHI and the city's Civic Auditorium campus. She commented that the presentation, which can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes, has been presented to various city and district groups, including the Santa Monica City Council. Rikki Binder of R.L.Binder Architects presented the master plan for SAMOHI. She said the planned construction project received a positive response from council members. The city's consultant, Julie Eizenberg of Koning Eizenber Architecture, presented the findings and recommendations from the Shared Use Opportunities Study. She stressed that moving forward should be a joint effort between the city and school district.

Mr. Snell asked what scheduling issues made the idea of hosting classes for SAMOHI students at a separate learning space at the Civic Center not plausible. Ms. Eizenberg explained that SAMOHI's traditional class schedule length would most likely not allow enough time for students to travel to and from off-site classes and still leave instructional time. Mr. Snell then asked about locating a Small School being located at the Civic Center site. Ms.

Eizenberg remarked that given the size of the Civic Auditorium Campus (approximately 7 acres), locating an independent small school would a challenge, and that the site size and configuration better lends itself to enrichment activities for both students and adults. Mr. Mechur suggested that a humanities space at SAMOHI could serve as a cultural facility. Ms. Eizenberg replied that should be considered. Additionally, she mentioned that community members also raised ideas for considering incorporating the following types of uses on the Civic Auditorium Campus: a black box theatre, a museum, broadcasting opportunities, classes, and artists working onsite. Mr. de la Torre inquired about safety and the 4th Street crosswalk and whether a bridge had been considered. Ms. Eizenberg explained that there had been discussion regarding the merits of a bridge and the merits of an atgrade cross walk. The consultants recommend a crosswalk because it adds pedestrian activity on the street. Mr. de la Torre said he supports the idea of possible space on city property for SAMOHI intramural sports.

X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

6:00 pm

Mr. Cuneo began his report by thanking staff, especially Dr. Chou and the Pupil Services Department, for providing professional support for staff and students who have been affected by the passing of SAMOHI teacher Joey Lutz.

Mr. Cuneo then announced that the SAMOHI SAGE Team and their advisor have begun their international competition in Nigeria. They are posting updates on their blog so everyone can keep up to date on their progress. He reported that representatives from the Mandarin Chinese Language Program were honored at a dinner last night and at a meeting this morning at Lincoln Middle School. Mr. Cuneo believes learning the Chinese languages allows our students to be more competitive in a global society. He reported that he has met with the Santa Monica City Manger and Police Chief, the President of SMC, board members of different agencies, and will be meeting with the City Manger from Malibu. He said he is getting a better feel for the communities. Having already witnessed the board and staff working together to do positive things for the children, Mr. Cuneo concluded that SMMUSD is a strong school system. He is excited to be a part of the team. In regards to the Joint Use Opportunities presentation, he said it was a wonderful concept for the City of Santa Monica to work with the district to improve SAMOHI and create common-use spaces. Mr. Cuneo added that these activities would not be possible without a strong district staff that is committed to doing great work. He remarked that SMMUSD has an excellent senior cabinet with complementary leadership skills. Mr. de la Torre expressed his appreciation that Mr. Cuneo is hitting the ground running.

COMMENTS: Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District and Santa Monica College have a successful record of working cooperatively in many areas. Most recently, an educational collaborative between the two agencies is working to strengthen ties and open up more college opportunities for high school students.

The agencies also have a history of collaboration in the area of facilities and facility management. The Board of Education supported a previous college bond in November of 2004. At that time the District underwent a review of the unique provisions of the bond language that allowed inclusion of construction, renovation or modernization of joint use facilities. It was determined that it was appropriate to expend voter-approved funds in this way. The current renovation and upgrading of the field at John Adams Middle School is an example of these efforts.

The language of this new bond includes similar provisions, opening the door to continued discussions between the two agencies.

Mr. Don Girard, <u>Senior Director of Government Relations</u> and <u>Institutional Communications at Santa Monica College Marketing Manager</u>, will briefly address the Resolution and be available to answer questions from the Board.

Trustee Quiñones-Perez and Mr. Dennis Zane thanked the board for their support of SMC's Modernization Bond. Mr. Don Girard summarized the collaborative history of SMMUSD and SMC.

The board agreed that having SMC help fund future SMMUSD facilities would be beneficial for both institutions.

WHEREAS, Santa Monica College is among the top community colleges in the nation and has earned accreditation from the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, and

WHEREAS, a survey of Santa Monica and Malibu residents taken earlier this year shows that SMC is highly regarded and is well used by the community, with 94 percent reporting that the College is an important part of the community and 58 percent reporting that they or someone in their immediate family have attended the college, and

WHEREAS, about one-third of the graduating seniors of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District begin their freshman year of studies at Santa Monica College, and

WHEREAS, the College and the School District have established an educational collaborative to strengthen ties and open up more college opportunities for high school students, leading to new initiatives such as an expanded offering of college courses at SMC and at the high schools based on individual school site needs; a collaboration on the development and expansion of career and technical education programs, including fields such as logistics; early start pathway programs in fields such as education and early childhood education; and developing a high school transfer academy – The Young Collegians, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Santa Monica College, recognizing the need to modernize training opportunities at the college, improve sustainability, and make needed safety improvements, has voted unanimously to place the Santa Monica College Safety and Modernization Bond Measure on the November 4, 2008 ballot for consideration by the voters of the Santa Monica Community College District, and

WHEREAS, if passed, the Safety and Modernization Bond Measure will authorize Santa Monica College to issue bonds up to \$295 million to fund capital projects designed to improve the teaching of science, nursing, math, technology, media, and emerging high tech fields, and

WHEREAS, Santa Monica College proposes to use the proceeds of the bond to:

- Provide a replacement Math and new Science Wing on the main campus, as the math
 department currently operates in a temporary facility that is nearing the end of its life
 cycle and there are insufficient science lab classrooms to offer needed course sections for
 the allied health and nursing programs,
- Provide a Media and Technology-Driven Programs Complex at the Academy Campus that would replace 1950s era buildings that cannot support the modern infrastructure necessary for digital and online programs,
- Provide a new Career Opportunity and Job Training Building on the Bundy Campus to meet the training needs of SMC's Office of Workforce and Economic Development, considered one of the most successful programs in California, and to support the career training provided by city, county, and other agencies,
- Provide needed improvements to the Pico Boulevard frontage of the Main Campus, creating a more welcoming and organized face to the community, and adding a new bus shelter and bus pull-out on Pico to help reduce traffic congestion,
- Provide for community classroom and facility projects to be developed potentially as
 joint use projects with other agencies, using as an example the successful collaboration of
 the college and the school district in retrofitting the fields at John Adams Middle School,

- Provide for educational improvement and enhancement and contributing to the funding of a joint use library at Malibu High School to benefit SMC students in that area who may find it difficult to commute to Santa Monica, and to support Malibu High School students and local residents, and
- Provide for environmental performance upgrades to achieve energy or resource use
 efficiency; improve community use facilities on the main campus; complete seismic
 repairs; provide for fire safety; and provide upgrades to the electrical, security,
 telecommunications, and safety systems on the SMC campuses.

WHEREAS, all local communities are supporting or planning to support their colleges with bond programs at about the same level, including Long Beach, El Camino, and each of the nine Los Angeles community colleges, and

WHEREAS, all of the bond funds raised if this measure passes will be spent in Santa Monica and Malibu and none of this money can be taken away by the State, and

WHEREAS, the Santa Monica College Safety and Modernization Bond Measure has garnered broad community support from educators, parents, local business and leaders throughout the community,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education endorses the Santa Monica College Safety and Modernization Bond Measure on the November 4, 2008 ballot, and authorizes the campaign committee to include the District's endorsement where deemed appropriate.

SUBTOPIC POLICY REGULATION EXHIBIT

Curriculum X

DETAIL

In order to meet individual student needs and encourage all students to complete their high school education, the Board of Education desires to provide flexibility in the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law. The Board shall actively involve parents/guardians, administrators, teachers, and students in helping the district develop alternative means for students to complete the prescribed course of study required for graduation. As an alternative to completing the course requirements for high school graduation and with prior approval by the principal or designee, students may fulfill one or more of the course requirements through the following:

- 1. Practical demonstration of skills and competencies
- 2. Supervised work experience or other outside school experience up to 40 semester periods in accordance with Education Code 51760.3 and 5 CCR 1635, or other outside school experience
- 3. <u>Career technical education</u>, <u>Vocational education and/or</u>
 <u>Regional Occupational Program (ROP)</u> classes offered through our high schools <u>district</u>.
- 4. Courses offered by regional occupational centers or programs (ROP)
- 5. Interdisciplinary Study
- 6. Independent study
- 7. Credit earned at a postsecondary institution (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1630)
- 8. Private instruction in accordance with (Pursuant to 5 CCR 1631)
- 9. Credit for private school foreign language instruction in accordance with 5 CCR 1362)
- 10. Military service and training in accordance with 5 CCR 1634
- 11. Correspondence instruction from a California university or college accredited for teacher training in accordance with 5 CCR 1633 $\frac{1}{1000}$
- 12. For credit toward the district's physical education requirement, participation in district interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity

The district shall accept for credit any coursework satisfactorily completed by students while detained in a

juvenile court school or county or state-operated institution. District students who successfully complete district graduation requirements while so detained shall receive a diploma from the school they last attended. (Education Code 48645.5)

Students may receive physical education credit for participation in district interscholastic athletic programs carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours when such participation entails a comparable amount of time and physical activity.

Students using interscholastic athletics participation to fulfill physical education requirements may be graded on this participation, provided that a teacher credentialed to teach physical education supervises this participation and assigns the grade. (Reference BP 6145 Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities)

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a student has satisfactorily met course requirements through any of the above alternative means.

A. Concurrent/Dual Enrollment

Concurrent/Dual enrollment means enrollment in any non-SMMUSD course during the school year or during the summer by a regularly enrolled SMMUSD student. Concurrent/Dual enrollment is an alternative means by which students may obtain credit toward graduation while being simultaneously enrolled in both the school district and another approved educational program. Students must obtain signed pre-approval for any concurrent/dual enrollment course or program from the school principal or designee.

Concurrent/Dual enrollment may be approved for "make-up", "acceleration", and/or "enrichment" purposes.

Courses eligible for concurrent/dual enrollment include:

- 1. Any course offered by Santa Monica High School, Malibu High School, Olympic High School or the SMMUSD Adult School, either during the school year or during the summer.
- 2. Courses offered by any community college, public or private college/university
- 3. Courses offered by the UC Extension Program

Students who demonstrate that the courses they want to take are not available at their high school, may, with the pre-approval of the principal, take courses at accredited high schools other than the schools mentioned above.

Nothing in this policy is construed to permit web-based or online courses either as alternative credits toward graduation or as a course eligible for concurrent enrollment for "make ups", "acceleration" and/or "enrichment."

B. Online Courses

Online courses are delivered over the Internet or provided through a set curriculum via software. Students may participate in web-based or online courses either as alternative credits toward graduation or as a course eligible for concurrent enrollment for "make-ups", "acceleration" and/or "enrichment." Students must obtain signed pre-approval for any online course or program from the school principal or designee.

The principal shall evaluate the quality and effectiveness of online course offerings and determine which online courses shall be accepted for high school credit. The principal shall certify that the course is comparable to college-preparatory curriculum and ensures that the course and associated grades and credits are listed on the student's transcript.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine whether a student has satisfactorily met course requirements through any of the above alternative means.

DETAIL

Alternative means specified by the district for completing the prescribed course of study shall be made available to students, parents/guardians, and the public. (Education Code 51225.3)

Definitions

A semester period is one period of 40 to 60 minutes of instructional time per week throughout one semester of at least 17 weeks, or a minimum of 12 clock hours of instructional time provided during the academic year or in summer school. While the content to be covered is planned within these time frames, a student may be granted one semester period of credit even though the student spends less than the aforementioned amount of time in completing the necessary work. (5 CCR 1600)

Supervised Work Experience Education

A student shall be granted up to 40 semester periods of credit for work experience education of one or more of the following types: (Education Code 51760.3; 5 CCR 1635)

- 1. For exploratory work experience education, the student may earn 10 semester periods for each semester, with a maximum of 20 semester periods earned in two semesters.
- 2. For general work experience education, the student may earn 10 semester periods for each semester, with a maximum of 40 semester periods.
- 3. For vocational work experience education, the student may earn 10 semester periods for each semester, with a maximum of 40 semester periods.

To receive credit, the student must satisfy eligibility requirements and receive at least the minimum period of instruction or counseling pursuant to Education Code 51760.3.

(cf. 6178.1 - Work Experience Education)

College Courses

To receive high school credit for coursework completed at a community college or four-year college, the student or parent/guardian shall submit a written request and a transcript showing successful completion of the course. The course shall be one that satisfies college entrance requirements, applies toward college-level general education requirements, or is part of a vocational or career technical education course leading to a degree or certificate.

For students attending community college as special part-time students, credit shall be at a level jointly determined by the Governing Board and the community college governing board.

(Education Code 48800)

(cf. 6172 - Gifted and Talented Student Program)

Private Instruction

A student who is regularly enrolled and in attendance at a high school shall receive credit toward high school graduation for private instruction under the following conditions: (5 CCR 1631)

- 1. The instruction entails fields and subjects included in the high school's courses of study and curricula.
- 2. The student demonstrates his/her capabilities at the beginning and at the end of the period of private instruction by examinations given under the school's supervision, thereby showing that he/she has made progress in learning satisfactory to the school.

Correspondence Instruction

The district shall grant credit for correspondence instruction under the following conditions: (Education Code 51740; 5 CCR 1633)

- 1. The correspondence instruction is provided by the
 University of California, or other university or college in
 California accredited for teacher training, in subjects
 included within or related to the student's course of
 study.
- 2. The student is, for good reason, unable to take the course of study offered in the school.
- 3. The Board determines the number of semester periods to be

credited for successful completion of a particular correspondence course.

4. No more than 40 semester periods of correspondence instruction are credited to a student towards graduation.

Foreign Language Instruction

The district shall grant credit for foreign language studies successfully completed in a private school and shall apply the credit toward meeting any foreign language requirement prescribed for grades 9-12, provided that all of the following conditions are met: (Education Code 51243-51245; 5 CCR 1632)

- 1. The courses are in languages designated in Education Code 51244.
- 2. The student is regularly enrolled or applying to the district in grades 9-12.
- 3. The student or parent/guardian applies in writing for the credit, specifies the private school attended and the amount and level of credit requested, and submits a transcript or other documents from the private school showing that the student successfully completed the course.
- 4. The amount of credit sought equals at least one semester's work.
- 5. The principal or designee determines that the student's achievement is equivalent to that expected of a student of comparable ability taking the same or similar instruction in district schools. This determination shall be based upon the private school's report of a test developed by the private school in cooperation with the district or, if the private school is located outside the district, the principal or designee may use a test given by a public school or other evidence which he/she deems appropriate.

Online Course Instruction

<u>In order to provide students with online educational</u> <u>opportunities, the following are guidelines for implementation</u> of online courses:

- 1. All online courses may be offered in a blended learning model that includes both face-to-face and online delivery.
- 2. The online courses shall meet the academic rigor of the California State standards and meet the CSU/UC "a-g" requirements with the exception of a limited number of non-"g" elective courses approved by the District/School.

- 3. The Principal or designee shall ensure student-testing integrity for online classrooms and ensure the accountability of active engagement of students participating in the courses provided via the Internet.
- 4. Students participating will strictly adhere to the policies and procedures set forth by the entity offering the online courses.
- 5. The Principal or designee shall seek guidance from District staff to evaluate the quality and effectiveness of online course offerings.
- 6. Teachers/Counselors/Advisors shall be trained in the facilitation of online learning and shall participate in elearning training.
- 7. Students enrolling in the online courses shall follow the same process as concurrent enrollment at the community colleges, District's alternative educational setting, or a four-year college/university.
- 8. The high schools, in accordance with the District's policies, shall grant credits earned.
- 9. Students shall follow the guidelines established by the District including obtaining prior approval from site administration before enrolling in the program to receive credits.
- 10. No students shall be denied the opportunity of taking an online course due to financial hardship as determined by free and reduced lunch eligibility, or enrollment in home bound/home study program.

Access to technology utilized by online courses imposes certain responsibilities and obligations for both students and teachers:

- 1. The appropriate use of the online learning opportunity is both ethical and honest, and demonstrates respect for physical and intellectual property, system security protocols, course provider procedures, an individual's right to privacy and to freedom from intimidation, harassment, and unwarranted annoyance.
- 2. The students utilizing online courses shall adhere to the District's Acceptable Use Policy.
- 3. All policies relating to academic honesty, participation, and attendance shall be applied to online learning.

Student Records

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of keeping accurate, comprehensive student records as required by law. Procedures for maintaining the confidentiality of student records shall be consistent with state and federal law.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish regulations for Broad approval governing the identification, description and security of student records, as well as timely access for authorized persons. These regulations shall ensure parental rights to review, inspect and photocopy student records and shall protect the student and the student's family from invasion of privacy.

1. Custodian of Records

The Superintendent or designee shall designate a certificated employee to serve as custodian of records, with responsibility for student records at the district level. At each school, the principal or a certificated designee shall act as custodian of records for students enrolled at that school. The custodian of records shall be responsible for implementing the Board policy and administrative regulation regarding student records. (Code of Regulations, Title 5, Section 431))

Definitions

Student records are any items of information gathered within or outside the district that are directly related to an identifiable student and maintained by the district or required to be maintained by an employee in the performance of his/her duties. Any information maintained for the purpose of second-party review is considered a student record. A student record may be recorded in handwriting, print, computer media, video or audio tape, film, microfilm, microfiche, or by other means. Student records include the student's health record. (34 CFR 99.3; Education Code 49061, 49062; 5 CCR 430)

Student records do not include: (34 CFR 99.3; Education Code 49061, 49062)

- 1. Directory information
- (cf. 5125.1 Release of Directory Information)
- 2. Informal notes compiled by a school officer or employee which remain in the sole possession of the maker, are used only as a personal memory aid, and are not accessible or revealed to any other person except a substitute

Mandatory permanent student records are those records which are maintained in perpetuity and which schools have been directed to compile by state law, regulation, or administrative directive.

(5 CCR 430)

Mandatory interim student records are those records which the schools are directed to compile and maintain for stipulated periods of time and are then destroyed in accordance with state law, regulation, or administrative directive. (5 CCR 430)

Permitted student records are those records having clear importance only to the current educational process of the student. (5 CCR 430)

Access means a personal inspection and review of a record, an

accurate copy of a record or receipt of an accurate copy of a record, an oral description or communication of a record, and a request to release a copy of any record. (Education Code 49061)

Disclosure means to permit access to or the release, transfer, or other communication of personally identifiable information contained in education records, to any party, by any means including oral, written, or electronic means. (34 CFR 99.3)

Personally identifiable information includes, but is not limited to, the student's name, the name of the student's parent/guardian or other family member, the address of the student or student's family, a personal identifier such as the student's social security number or student number, and a list of personal characteristics or other information that would make the student's identity easily traceable. (34 CFR 99.3)

Adult student is a person who is or was enrolled in school and who is at least 18 years of age. (5 CCR 430)

Parent/guardian means a natural parent, an adopted parent, legal guardian, surrogate parent, or foster parent. (Education Code 49061, 56050, 56055)

School officials and employees are officials or employees whose duties and responsibilities to the district, whether routine or as a result of special circumstances, require that they have access to student records.

Custodian of records is the employee responsible for the security of student records maintained by the district and for devising procedures for assuring that access to such records is limited to authorized persons. (5 CCR 433)

A legitimate educational interest is one held by school officials or employees whose duties and responsibilities to the district, whether routine or as a result of special circumstances, require that they have access to student records.

County placing agency means the county social service department or county probation department. (Education Code 49061)

Persons Granted Access to Student Records Without Prior Written Consent

Persons, agencies, or organizations specifically granted access rights to student records pursuant to law shall have access without prior written parental consent or judicial order.

(Education Code 49076)

The following persons or agencies shall have absolute access to

- 1. Parents/guardians of students younger than age 18. (Education Code 49069) Access to student records and information shall not be denied to a parent because he/she is not the child's custodial parent. (Family Code 3025)
- 2. An adult student age 18 or older or a student under the age of

 18 who attends a postsecondary institution, in which case the
 student alone shall exercise rights related to his/her
 student records and grant consent for the release of records
 (34 CFR 99.3, 99.5)
- 3. Any person, agency, or organization authorized in compliance with a court order or lawfully issued subpoena. (Education Code 49077)

In addition, the following persons or agencies shall have access to those particular records that are relevant to the legitimate educational interest of the requester: (Education Code 49076)

- 1. Parents/guardians of a dependent student age 18 or older
- 2. Students age 16 or older or who have completed the 10th grade
- 3. School officials and employees
- 4. Members of a school attendance review board and any volunteer

 aide age 18 or older who has been investigated, selected, and
 trained by such a board to provide follow-up services to a
 referred student

(cf. 5113.1 - Truancy)

- 5. Officials and employees of other public schools or school systems where the student intends or is directed to enroll, including local, county, or state correctional facilities where educational programs leading to high school graduation are provided
- 6. Federal, state, and local officials, as needed for program audits or compliance with law
- 7. Any district attorney who is participating in or conducting a truancy mediation program or participating in the presentation of evidence in a truancy petition
- 8. A prosecuting agency for consideration against a parent/guardian for failure to comply with compulsory education laws

- 9. Any probation officer or district attorney for the purposes of conducting a criminal investigation or an investigation in regards to declaring a person a ward of the court or involving a violation of a condition of probation
- 10. Any judge or probation officer for the purpose of conducting a truancy mediation program for a student, or for purposes of presenting evidence in a truancy petition pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 681
- 11. Any county placing agency for the purpose of fulfilling educational case management responsibilities required by the juvenile court or by law pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 16010 and to assist with the school transfer or enrollment of a student
- (cf. 6173.1 Education for Foster Youth)

Foster family agencies with jurisdiction over currently enrolled or former students may access those students' records of grades and transcripts and any individualized education program (IEP) developed and maintained by the district with respect to such students. (Education Code 49069.3)

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program)

When authorized by law to assist law enforcement in investigations of suspected kidnapping, the Superintendent or designee shall provide information about the identity and location of the student as it relates to the transfer of that student's records to another public school district or California private school. The information shall be released only to designated peace officers, federal criminal investigators, and federal law enforcement officers whose names have been submitted in writing by their law enforcement agency in accordance with the procedures specified in Education Code 49076.5. (Education Code 49076.5)

The Superintendent or designee may release information from a student's records to the following: (34 CFR 99.36; Education Code 49076)

- 1. Appropriate persons in an emergency if the health and safety of the student or other persons are at stake
- 2. Accrediting associations
- 3. Under the conditions specified in Education Code 49076,
 organizations conducting studies on behalf of educational
 institutions or agencies for the purpose of developing,
 validating, or administering predictive tests, administering

- 4. Officials and employees of private schools or school systems where the student is enrolled or intends to enroll
- 5. Agencies or organizations in connection with the student's application for or receipt of financial aid

However, information permitting the personal identification of a student or his/her parents/ guardians for these purposes may be disclosed only as may be necessary to determine the eligibility of the student for financial aid, to determine the amount of financial aid, to determine the conditions which will be imposed regarding the financial aid, or to enforce the terms or conditions of the financial aid.

- 6. County elections officials for the purpose of identifying students eligible to register to vote and offering such students an opportunity to register
- (cf. 1400 Relations Between Other Governmental Agencies and the Schools)

The Superintendent or designee may release a student's immunization record information to local health departments operating countywide or regional immunization information and reminder systems and the California Department of Public Health. Prior to releasing such information, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of his/her right to refuse to share the information as well the other information specified in law. The following information may be released: (Health and Safety Code 120440)

- 1. Name of the student and the student's parent/guardian
- 2. Student's gender
- 3. Student's date and place of birth
- 4. Types and dates of immunizations received
- 5. Manufacturer and lot number of the immunization received
- 6. Adverse reaction to the immunization
- 7. Other nonmedical information necessary to establish the student's unique identity and record

Persons Granted Access to Student Records With Prior Written Consent

Persons, agencies, or organizations not afforded access rights by law may be granted access only through written permission of the parent/guardian or adult student, or by judicial order.

(Education Code 49075)

Only a parent/guardian having legal custody of the student may consent to the release of records to others. Either parent may grant consent if both parents notify the district, in writing, that such an agreement has been made. (Education Code 49061)

(cf. 5021 - Noncustodial Parents)

Any person or agency granted access is prohibited from releasing information to another person or agency without written permission from the parent/guardian or adult student.

(Education Code 49076)

Access to Records by Authorized Persons

Student records shall be maintained in a central file at the school attended by the student or, when records are maintained in different locations, a notation shall be placed in the central file indicating where other records may be found.

Parents/guardians shall be notified of the location of student records if not centrally located. (Education Code 49069; 5 CCR 433)

To inspect, review, or obtain copies of student records, authorized persons shall submit a request to the custodian of records.

Authorized persons, organizations, or agencies from outside the school whose access requires consent from the parent/guardian or adult student shall submit their request, together with any required authorization, to the Superintendent or designee or the custodian of records. (5 CCR 435)

When prior written consent is required by law, the parent/guardian shall provide a signed and dated written consent before the district discloses the student record. Such consent may be given through electronic means in those cases where it can be authenticated. The consent shall specify the records that may be disclosed, state the purpose of the disclosure, and identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure may be made. Upon request by the parent/guardian, the district shall provide him/her a copy of the records disclosed. (34 CFR 99.30)

Within five (5) business days following the date of request, a parent/guardian or other authorized person shall be granted access to inspect, review, and obtain copies of student records during regular school hours. (Education Code 49069)

Qualified certificated personnel shall be available to interpret records when requested. (Education Code 49069)

The custodian of records shall be responsible for the security of student records and shall assure that access is limited to authorized persons. (5 CCR 433)

The custodian of records or the Superintendent or designee shall prevent the alteration, damage, or loss of records during inspection. (5 CCR 435)

Prior to disclosing a record pursuant to a court order or subpoena, the Superintendent or designee shall, unless otherwise instructed by the court, give the parent/guardian or adult student at least three days' notice of the name of the requesting agency and the specific record requested if lawfully possible within the requirements of the judicial order. (34 CFR 99.31; 5 CCR 435)

When the district discloses personally identifiable information to officials of another school, school system, or postsecondary institution where the student seeks or intends to enroll, the Superintendent or designee shall make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent/guardian or adult student at his/her last known address, provide a copy of the record that was disclosed, and give him/her an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the record. (34 CFR 99.34)

Upon releasing student information to a judge or probation officer for the purpose of conducting a truancy mediation program or presenting evidence in a truancy petition, the Superintendent or designee shall inform, or provide written notification to, the student's parent/guardian within 24 hours. (Education Code 49076)

If the district is planning to release a student's immunization information to the county health department or California

Department of Public Health, the Superintendent or designee shall inform the student's parents/guardians of the following:

(Health and Safety Code 120440)

- 1. The type of information that will be shared
- 2. The name and address of the agency with which the district will share the information

- 3. That any shared information shall be treated as confidential and shall be used to share only with each other and, upon request, with health care providers, child care facilities, family child care homes, service providers for the Women, Infants and Children (WIC) food program, county welfare departments, foster care agencies, and health care plans
- 4. That the information may be used only to provide immunization service; to provide or facilitate third-party payer payments for immunizations; and/or to compile and disseminate statistical information on immunization status on groups of people, without identifying the student
- 5. That the parent/guardian has the right to examine any immunization-related information shared in this manner and to correct any errors
- 6. That the parent/guardian may refuse to allow this information to be shared

Access Log

A log shall be maintained for each student's record which lists all persons, agencies, or organizations requesting or receiving information from the records and the legitimate educational interest of the requester. (Education Code 49064)

In every instance of inspection by persons who do not have assigned educational responsibility, the custodian of records shall make an entry in the log indicating the record inspected, the name of the person granted access, the reason access was granted, and the time and circumstances of inspection. (5 CCR 435)

The log does not need to record access by: (Education Code 49064)

- 1. Parents/guardians or adult students
- 2. Students 16 years of age or older or who have completed the 10th grade
- 3. Parties obtaining district-approved directory information
- (cf. 5125.1 Release of Directory Information)
- 4. Parties who provide written parental consent, in which case the consent notice shall be filed with the record pursuant to Education Code 49075
- 5. School officials or employees who have a legitimate educational interest

The log shall be accessible only to the parent/guardian, adult student, dependent adult student, student age 16 years or older or who has completed the 10th grade, custodian of records, and certain state/federal officials. (Education Code 49064; 5 CCR 432)

Duplication of Student Records

To provide copies of any student record, the district shall charge a reasonable fee not to exceed the actual cost of furnishing the copies. No charge shall be made for providing up to two transcripts or up to two verifications of various records for any former student. No charge shall be made to locate or retrieve any student record. (Education Code 49065)

Changes to Student Records

No additions except routine updating shall be made to a student's record after high school graduation or permanent departure without prior consent of the parent/guardian or adult student. (5 CCR 437)

Only a parent/guardian having legal custody of the student or an adult student may challenge the content of a record or offer a written response to a record. (Education Code 49061)

(cf. 5125.3 - Challenging Student Records)

Retention and Destruction of Student Records

All anecdotal information and assessment reports maintained as student records shall be dated and signed by the individual who originated the data. (5 CCR 431)

The following mandatory permanent student records shall be kept indefinitely: (5 CCR 432, 437)

- 1. Legal name of student
- 2. Date and place of birth and method of verifying birth date

(cf. 5111 - Admission)

- 3. Sex of student
- 4. Name and address of parent/guardian of minor student.
 - a. Address of minor student if different from the above.
 - b. Annual verification of parent/guardian's name and address and student's residence

- (cf. 5111.1 District Residency)
- (cf. 5111.12 Residency Based on Parent/Guardian Employment)
- (cf. 5111.13 Residency for Homeless Children)
- 5. Entrance and departure date of each school year and for any summer session or other extra session
- 6. Subjects taken during each year, half-year, summer session, or quarter, and marks or credits given
- (cf. 5121 Grades/Evaluation of Student Achievement)
- 7. Verification of or exemption from required immunizations(cf. 5141.31 Immunizations)
- 8. Date of high school graduation or equivalent

Mandatory interim student records, unless forwarded to another district, shall be maintained subject to destruction during the third school year following a determination that their usefulness has ceased or the student has left the district.

These records include: (Education Code 48918, 51747; 5 CCR 432, 437, 16027)

- 1. Expulsion orders and the causes thereof
- (cf. 5144.1 Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process)
 (cf. 5144.2 Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process (Students with Disabilities))
- 2. A log identifying persons or agencies who request or receive information from the student record
- 3. Health information, including verification or waiver of the health screening for school entry
- (cf. 5141.32 Health Screening for School Entry)
- 4. Information on participation in special education programs, including required tests, case studies, authorizations, and evidence of eligibility for admission or discharge
- (cf. 6159 Individualized Education Program)
 (cf. 6164.4 Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for
 Special Education)
- 5. Language training records
- (cf. 6174 Education for English Language Learners)
- 6. Progress slips/notices required by Education Code 49066 and

- 7. Parental restrictions/stipulations regarding access to directory information
- 8. Parent/guardian or adult student rejoinders to challenged records and to disciplinary action
- 9. Parent/guardian authorization or denial of student participation in specific programs
- $\underline{10. \; \text{Results of standardized tests administered within the past}}$ three years
- (cf. 6162.51 Standardized Testing and Reporting Program)
 (cf. 6162.52 High School Exit Examination)
- 11. Written findings resulting from an evaluation conducted to determine whether it is in a student's best interest to remain in independent study
- (cf. 6158 Independent Study)

Permitted student records may be destroyed six months after the student completes or withdraws from the educational program, including: (5 CCR 432, 437)

- 1. Objective counselor/teacher ratings
- 2. Standardized test results older than three years
- 3. Routine disciplinary data(cf. 5144 Discipline)
- 4. Verified reports of relevant behavioral patterns
- 5. All disciplinary notices
- 6. Supplementary attendance records

Records shall be destroyed in a way that assures they will not be available to possible public inspection in the process of destruction. (5 CCR 437)

Transfer of Student Records

If a student transfers into this district from any other school district or a private school, the Superintendent or designee shall inform the parent/guardian of his/her rights regarding student records, including the right to review, challenge, and receive a copy of student records.

When a student transfers into this district from another, the Superintendent or designee shall request that the student's previous district provide any records, either maintained by that district in the ordinary course of business or received from a law enforcement agency, regarding acts committed by the transferring student that resulted in his/her suspension or expulsion. (Education Code 48201)

(cf. 4158/4258/4358 - Employee Security)

When a student transfers from this district to another school district or to a private school, the Superintendent or designee shall forward a copy of the student's mandatory permanent record as requested by the other district or private school. The original record or a copy shall be retained permanently by this district. If the transfer is to another California public school, the student's entire mandatory interim record shall also be forwarded. If the transfer is out of state or to a private school, the mandatory interim record may be forwarded. Permitted student records may be forwarded to any other district or private school. (5 CCR 438)

Upon receiving a request from an admitting school for a student's records, the district shall also forward any expulsion order and the causes for the expulsion. (Education Code 48918)

Upon receiving a request from a county placing agency to transfer a student in foster care out of a district school, the Superintendent or designee shall transfer the student's records to the next educational placement within two business days. (Education Code 49069.5)

All student records shall be updated before they are transferred. (5 CCR 438)Student records shall not be withheld from the requesting district because of any charges or fees owed by the student or parent/guardian. (5 CCR 438)

If the district is withholding grades, diploma, or transcripts from the student because of his/her damage or loss of school property, this information shall be sent to the requesting district along with the student's records.(cf. 5125.2 - Withholding Grades, Diploma or Transcripts)

Notification of Parents/Guardians

Upon any student's initial enrollment, and at the beginning of each year thereafter, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians and eligible students, in writing, of their rights related to student records. Insofar as practicable,

the district shall provide these notices in the student's home language and shall effectively notify parents/guardians or eligible students who are disabled. (34 CFR 99.7; Education Code 49063)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

The notice shall include: (34 CFR 99.7, 99.34; Education Code 49063)

- 1. The types of student records kept by the district and the information contained therein
- 2. The title(s) of the official(s) responsible for maintaining each type of record
- 3. The location of the log identifying those who request information from the records
- 4. District criteria for defining school officials and employees and for determining legitimate educational interest
- 5. District policies for reviewing and expunging student records
- 6. The right to inspect and review student records and the procedures for doing so
- 7. The right to challenge and the procedures for challenging the content of a student record that the parent/guardian or student believes to be inaccurate, misleading, or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights
- (cf. 5125.3 Challenging Student Records)
- 8. The cost, if any, charged for duplicating copies of records
- 9. The categories of information defined as directory information pursuant to Education Code 49073
- 10. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's records except when disclosure without consent is authorized by law
- 11. The availability of the curriculum prospectus developed pursuant to Education Code 49091.14 containing the titles, descriptions, and instructional aims of every course offered by the school
- (cf. 5020 Parent Rights and Responsibilities)

- 12. Any other rights and requirements set forth in Education Code 49060-49078, and the right of parents/guardians to file a complaint with the United States Department of Education concerning an alleged failure by the district to comply with 20 USC 1232g

DETAIL

Child Abuse Prevention

The Governing Board recognizes the district's responsibility to educate administrators, staff and students about the dangers of child abuse so that they will acquire the skills and techniques needed to identify unsafe situations and to react appropriately and promptly. The Governing Board also recognizes the district's responsibility to provide and maintain a safe physical environment that will minimize unsafe situations for children.

The district's instructional program shall include ageappropriate and culturally and linguistically sensitive child abuse prevention curriculum. This curriculum shall explain students' right to live free of abuse, inform them of available support resources, and teach them how to obtain help and disclose incidents of abuse. The curriculum also shall include training in self-protection techniques. Students who are new to the District will receive an orientation which will include this curriculum.

The Superintendent or designee shall seek to incorporate community resources into the district's child abuse prevention programs. To the extent feasible, the Superintendent or designee shall use these community resources to provide parents/guardians with instruction in parenting skills and child abuse prevention.

Child Abuse Reporting

The Board recognizes that child abuse has severe consequences and that the district has a responsibility to protect students by facilitating the prompt reporting of known and suspected incidents of child abuse. With concern for the total well-being of each student, the Board of Education directs the employees of

the District to report known or suspected incidences of child abuse in accordance with state law and Administrative Regulations. District employees shall cooperate with the child protective agencies responsible for reporting, investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse. The Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement regulations for identifying and reporting child abuse. establish procedures for the identification and reporting of such incidents in accordance with law.

Employees who are mandated reporters, as defined by law and administrative regulation, are obligated to report all known, suspected, or alleged incidents of child abuse and neglect.

Mandated reporters shall not investigate any suspected incidents but rather shall cooperate with agencies responsible for investigating and prosecuting cases of child abuse and neglect.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training regarding the reporting duties of mandated reporters.

By no later than October 31st of each year, the Superintendent shall inform the public via an Information Item in the Board of Education agenda the numbers of child abuse reports and the number involving District employees for the previous school year. The Superintendent shall also inform the public that the training for all mandated reporters has been provided. In the event that training is not provided to mandated reporters, the Superintendent shall report to the California Department of Education and the public the reasons that such training has not been provided.

I. EFFECTIVE DATE: November 14, 1988

II. AUTHORITY

Board of Education Policy 5141.4

III. PROCEDURES

A. Reportable Cases Under Child Abuse Reporting Law

1. Sections 11166 of the California Penal Code mandates the reporting to designated authorities of cases of suspected or known child abuse . A report, both by telephone and in writing, is required of any certificated school employee who in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment has knowledge of or observes a child who can reasonably be suspected of having been a victim of child abuse.

2. For the purposes of this law, the following definitions apply:

a. "Child" means a person under the age of 18. Emancipation does not alter the responsibility for reporting abuse of a minor under the California Penal Code.

b. "Child abuse" means:

<u>Definitions</u>

Child abuse or neglect includes the following:

- 1. \underline{A} physical injury or \underline{death} inflicted by other than accidental means on a child by another person
- 2. Sexual <u>abuse of a child, including sexual</u> assault/molestation and/or sexual exploitation, of a child; as defined in Penal Code 11165.1

- 3. Neglect of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.2
- 4. Willful harming or injuring of a child or the endangering of the person or health of a child as defined in Penal Code 11165.3

 3) Any act or omission proscribed by Section 273a (willful cruelty or punishment of a child) or 273d (corporal punishment or injury) of the California Penal Code;
- 5. Unlawful corporal punishment or injury as defined in Penal Code 11165.4

Child abuse or neglect does not include:

- 1. A mutual affray between minors (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 2. An injury caused by reasonable and necessary force used by a peace officer acting within the course and scope of his/her employment (Penal Code 11165.6)
- 3. An injury resulting from the exercise by a teacher, assistant principal, principal, or other certificated employee of the same degree of physical control over a student that a parent/guardian would be privileged to exercise, not exceeding the amount of physical control reasonably necessary to maintain order, protect property, protect the health and safety of students, or maintain proper and appropriate conditions conducive to learning (Education Code 44807)
- 4. An injury caused by a school employee's use of force that is reasonable and necessary to quell a disturbance threatening physical injury to persons or damage to property, to protect himself/herself, or to obtain weapons or other dangerous objects within the control of the student (Education Code 49001)
- 5. Physical pain or discomfort caused by athletic competition or other such recreational activity voluntarily engaged in by the student (Education Code 49001)

Mandated reporters include, but are not limited to, teachers; instructional aides; teacher's aides or assistants; classified employees; certificated pupil personnel employees; administrative officers or supervisors of child attendance; administrators and employees of a licensed day care facility; Head Start teachers; district police or security officers; licensed nurses or health care providers; and administrators, presenters, and counselors of a child abuse prevention program (Penal Code 1165.7)

Reasonable suspicion means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Reportable Offenses

A mandated reporter shall make a report using the procedures provided whenever, in his/her professional capacity or within the scope of his/her employment, he/she has knowledge of or observes a child whom the mandated reporter knows or reasonably suspects has been the victim of child abuse or neglect. (Penal Code 11166)

Any mandated reporter who has knowledge of or who reasonably suspects that a child is suffering serious emotional damage or is at a substantial risk of suffering serious emotional damage, based on evidence of severe anxiety, depression, withdrawal, or untoward aggressive behavior toward self or others, may make a report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166.05)

Any person shall notify a peace officer if he/she reasonably believes that he/she has observed the commission of a murder, rape, or lewd or lascivious act by use of force, violence, duress, menace, or fear of immediate and unlawful bodily injury, where the victim is a child under age 14. (Penal Code 152.3, 288)

Responsibility for Reporting

The reporting duties of mandated reporters are individual and cannot be delegated to another person. (Penal Code 11166)

When two or more mandated reporters jointly have initial reported knowledge of a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect, each reporter must file a report or they must file the report jointly. If filing jointly, all mandated reporters must have their name on the form. the report may be made by a member of the team selected by mutual agreement and a single report may be made and signed by the selected member of the reporting team. Any member who has knowledge that the member designated to report has failed to do so shall thereafter make the report. (Penal Code 11166)

No supervisor or administrator shall impede or inhibit a mandated reporter from making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

Any person not identified as a mandated reporter who has knowledge of or observes a child whom he/she knows or reasonably suspects has been a victim of child abuse or neglect may report the known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Reporting Procedures

1. Initial Telephone Report

Within 24 hours of knowing or observing suspected child abuse or neglect, a mandated reporter shall make an initial report by telephone to any police department (excluding a school district

police/security department), sheriff's department, county probation department if designated by the county to receive such reports, or county welfare department. (Penal Code 11166 When possible, the telephone call should be made before the end of the school day during which the information was obtained.

When the initial telephone report is made, the mandated reporter shall note the name of the official contacted, the date and time contacted, and any instructions or advice received.

2. Written Report

Within 36 hours of knowing or observing the information concerning the incident, the mandated reporter shall then prepare and either send, fax, or electronically submit to the appropriate agency a written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572). (Penal Code 11166, 11168)

Mandated reporters may obtain copies of the Department of Justice form from either the district or the appropriate agency.

Reports of suspected child abuse or neglect shall include, if known: (Penal Code 11167)

- a. The name, business address, and telephone number of the person making the report and the capacity that makes the person a mandated reporter
- b. The child's name and address, present location and, where applicable, school, grade, and class
- c. The names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the child's parents/guardians
- d. The information that gave rise to the reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect and the source(s) of that information
- e. The name, address, telephone number, and other relevant personal information about the person(s) who might have abused or neglected the child

The mandated reporter shall make a report even if some of this information is not known or is uncertain to him/her. (Penal Code 11167)

Information relevant to the incident of child abuse or neglect

may also be given to an investigator from an agency that is investigating the case. (Penal Code 11167)

3. Internal Reporting

a. Internal Reporting of Alleged Child Abuse Regarding Non-SMMUSD Employees

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect to an appropriate agency are required, to notify the principal or designee immediately after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency.

The principal so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

After completion of the written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572), and after providing that form to the appropriate agency, the mandated reporter shall provide that form to the principal school nurse or designee. The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to the principal and may remove his/her name from the form. (Penal Code 11166)

The principal or designee shall attach the follow-up report to the Confidential Incident Report Form, which shall be provided to the Superintendent.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of suspected child abuse regarding employees to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive child abuse in its schools. All complaints and allegations of child abuse shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

b. Internal Reporting of Alleged Child Abuse Regarding SMMUSD Employees or Volunteers

Employees reporting child abuse or neglect allegations against an SMMUSD employee or volunteer to an appropriate agency are required to notify the principal or designee immediately after the initial telephone report to the appropriate agency. When so notified, the principal shall inform the Superintendent or

designee with the Confidential Incident Report Form.

The principal or designee so notified shall provide the mandated reporter with any assistance necessary to ensure that reporting procedures are carried out in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. At the mandated reporter's request, the principal may assist in completing and filing the necessary forms.

After completion of the written follow-up report, which includes a completed Department of Justice form (SS 8572), and after providing that form to the appropriate agency, the mandated reporter shall provide that form to the principal or designee. The mandated reporter shall not be required to disclose his/her identity to the principal and may remove his/her name from the form. (Penal Code 11166)

The principal or designee shall attach the follow-up report to the Confidential Incident Report Form, which shall be provided to the Superintendent.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of suspected child abuse regarding employees to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive child abuse in its schools. All complaints and allegations of child abuse shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action.

No student shall not be required or asked to meet with the employee or volunteer who has allegedly abused that student. If the employee or volunteer suspected of sexual misconduct is a district employee or volunteer, then during the course of the investigation, he/she shall discontinue contact with students.

Reporting the information to an employer, supervisor, principal, school counselor, co-worker, or other person shall not be a substitute for making a mandated report to the appropriate agency. (Penal Code 11166)

Training

Training of mandated reporters shall include child abuse and neglect identification and mandated reporting. (Penal Code 11165.7)

Training shall also include guidance in the appropriate discipline of students, physical contact with students, and maintenance of ethical relationships with students to avoid actions that may be misinterpreted as child abuse.

Victim Interviews

Whenever a representative of a government agency investigating suspected child abuse or neglect or the state Department of Social Services deems it necessary, a suspected victim may be interviewed during school hours, on school premises, concerning a report of suspected child abuse or neglect that occurred within the child's home or out-of-home care facility. The child shall be given the choice of being interviewed in private or in the presence of any adult district employee or volunteer aide selected by the child. (Penal Code 11174.3)

A staff member or volunteer aide selected by a child may decline to be present at the interview. If the selected person accepts, the principal or designee shall inform him/her of the following requirements: (Penal Code 11174.3)

- a. The purpose of the selected person's presence at the interview is to lend support to the child and enable him/her to be as comfortable as possible.
- b. The selected person shall not participate in the interview.

 c. The selected person shall not discuss the facts or circumstances of the case with the child.
- d. The selected person is subject to the confidentiality requirements of the Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act, a violation of which is punishable as specified in Penal Code 11167.5.

If a staff member agrees to be present, the interview shall be held at a time during school hours when it does not involve an expense to the school. (Penal Code 11174.3)

Release of Child to Peace Officer

When a child is released to a peace officer and taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse or neglect, the Superintendent or designee and/or principal shall not notify the parent/guardian, but rather shall provide the peace officer with the address and telephone number of the child's parent/guardian. It is the responsibility of the peace officer or agent to notify the parent/guardian of the situation. (Education Code 48906)

Peace officers shall be asked to sign an appropriate release or acceptance of responsibility form.

Parent/Guardian Complaints Regarding Suspected Child Abuse

Upon request, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians with a copy of the district's administrative regulation that describes how to report suspected child abuse occurring at a school site to appropriate agencies. For parents/guardians whose primary language is other than English, such procedures shall be in their primary language and, when communicating orally regarding those procedures, an interpreter shall be provided.

To file a complaint against a district employee or other person suspected of child abuse or neglect at a school site, parents/guardians may file a report by telephone, in person, or in writing with any appropriate agency identified above under "Reporting Procedures." If a parent/guardian makes a complaint about an employee to any other employee, the employee receiving the information shall notify the parent/guardian of procedures for filing a complaint with the appropriate agency. The employee also is obligated pursuant to Penal Code 11166 to file a report himself/herself using the procedures described above for mandated reporters.

In addition, if the child is enrolled in special education, a separate complaint may be filed with the California Department of Education pursuant to 5 CCR 4650.

Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide to all new employees who are mandated reporters a statement that informs them of their status as mandated reporters, of their reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166, and of their confidentiality rights under Penal Code 11167. The district shall also provide these new employees with a copy of Penal Code 11165.7, 11166, and 11167. (Penal Code 11165.7, 11166.5)

Before beginning employment, employees shall sign the statement indicating that they have knowledge of the reporting obligations under Penal Code 11166 and that they will comply with those provisions. The signed statements shall be retained by the Superintendent or designee. (Penal Code 11166.5)

Employees who work with dependent adults shall be notified of legal responsibilities and reporting procedures pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 15630-15637.

The Superintendent or designee shall also notify all employees that:

- 1. A mandated reporter who reports a known or suspected instance of child abuse or neglect shall not be held civilly or criminally liable for making a report and this immunity shall apply even if the mandated reporter acquired the knowledge or reasonable suspicion of child abuse or neglect outside of his/her professional capacity or outside the scope of his/her employment. Any other person making a report shall not incur civil or criminal liability unless it can be proven that he/she knowingly made a false report or made a report with reckless disregard of the truth or falsity of the report. (Penal Code 11172)
- 2. If a mandated reporter fails to report an incident of known or reasonably suspected child abuse or neglect, he/she may be

- guilty of a crime punishable by a fine and/or imprisonment. (Penal Code 11166)
- 3. No employee shall be subject to any sanction by the district for making a report. (Penal Code 11166)

- 4) Neglect of a child
- (a) Severe neglect (situations where any person having care or custody of a child willfully causes or permits the child to be in a situation that the child's health is endangered.
- (b) General neglect (negligent failure of a person having the care or custody of a child to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, or supervision where no physical injury to the child has occurred).
- c. "Reasonable suspicion" means that it is objectively reasonable for a person to entertain such a suspicion, based upon facts that could cause a reasonable person in a like position, drawing when appropriate on his/her training and experience, to suspect child abuse.
- B. Procedures for Reporting Child Abuse
- 1. Suspected instances of child abuse are to be reported to the school nurse. He/she is the contact person at each school site. The nurse will assume responsibility for completing the Suspected Child Abuse Report (11166PC) form, secure the initials of the school principal on this form and contact the Santa Monica Police Department (458 8943) or Malibu Sheriff's Department (456-6652, ext. 235).
- 2. In the absence of the school nurse, the contact person at each site is the school principal.
- 3. The identity of all persons who report known or suspected child abuse is confidential as indicated in Penal Code Section 11167 subdivision (c).

Public Comments:

- Craig Hamilton, Claudia Landis, Lee Jones, Marina Riajendia, and Ken Haker, members of the community, addressed the board regarding the district's response to the SEDAC End-of-Year Report. Mr. Cuneo remarked to the board that these are examples of issues the Special Education Design Team could address. He said he would be meeting with the Claros consulting group that worked with San Ramon Valley USD, bringing a list of next steps back to the board in September, and examining the composition of the Design Team and its charges. He clarified for Ms. Leon-Vazquez that the Special Education Parent Handbook was being reviewed by staff. Mr. Cuneo added that the district's legal team would need to review the handbook as well. He concluded by saying that he would review the district's response to the SEDAC's End-of-Year report and bring back a modified response if necessary.
- Pat Nolan, a member of the community, addressed the board regarding the district's response to the Health & Safety DAC End-of-Year Report.

District Response to the Childcare and Development District Advisory Committee End of the Year Annual Report July 2008

The CDS DAC presented five items of focus for the 2008-09 school year:

Continue work to increase the number of full time preschool children served. Open a new full day classroom at Washington West in September 2008.

Staff concurs with this plan and will work with facilities staff and with State Licensing to prepare the new classroom at Washington West.

Implement a database enrollment system.

The Head Start database, CRIS, is now in use. Staff will work with Information Services to identify the options for a database system that will include all CDS student programs.

Use the summer months to create special transition programs to prepare 4 yr olds for kindergarten. Involve families in the transition activities. Enroll kindergarten children whose families want childcare as early as possible to assist in their transition to kindergarten before and after school programs. Staff concurs with this plan and will plan to have a program for transitioning preschool children next summer. LA Universal Preschool has cut their funding levels causing a delay in implementation of the planned summer program. CDS staff will determine costs for a summer program without LAUP funding for next year.

Work with Ed Services to provide opportunities for CDS and kindergarten teachers to interact and cross train.

CDS is working with Ed Services to bring preschool and kindergarten teachers together to discuss options for transitioning. A professional development activity brought nearly 50 preschool teachers and assistants together with Center X and district kindergarten trainers during the last week in June 08 to discuss kindergarten standards and math.

Continue to work with site facility planning committees at each CDS site.

CDS staff will work closely with Prop BB architects to ensure appropriate planning for the needs of preschool and after school programming.

Additional item from the CDS DAC

Work with the Special Education DAC to establish communication between the DACs and to participate in planning for Special Education preschool and CDS preschool programs to enhance inclusion opportunities. Staff concurs with this plan.

District Response to the Visual and Performing Arts District Advisory Committee End of the Year Annual Report July 2008

The board would like to extend its thanks and gratitude for the on-going work of the District Advisory Committee on the Visual and Performing Arts. The thought and attention committee members put into the written report and presentation on May 1, 2008, is yet another indication of your continued support for and dedication to arts education in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. The board and senior leadership are very proud of the numerous accomplishments and accolades achieved by the students and teachers in our Visual and Performing Arts classes.

We recognize that many of the highlights referred to in the report are the result of the combined efforts of district staff, parent and community members, and committee members and are reflective of previous years' committee recommendations.

The board has reinstated the elementary music teacher position to ensure the success of our elementary music program for all students in grades 3, 4, and 5.

In regard to facilities concerns, Tom Whaley will visit the Malibu High School art room and band room with the principal and assess what can be done to improve the ventilation in the visual art kiln room as well as the music practice rooms. In addition, the Samohi orchestra parents association has purchased new lockers for the orchestra room. The elementary music's use of school facilities should be improved this year by splitting the original one time slot for all 4th and 5th graders into two separate time slots. This will allow 4th and 5th graders access to appropriate spaces like the auditorium, MPR, library and other large spaces to lessen the use of classrooms for instruction.

The current definition of dance as PE is "one in which students use music and dance for exercise and recreation." And the teacher must be credentialed in PE in order for students to receive PE credits. In addition, the state is reviewing the development of a Dance credential. Samohi is currently interviewing candidates to teach three ROP funded dance classes for the Fall of 2008. This plan would be offered to all 10th - 12th graders and will hopefully grow in the future to five periods of dance at Samohi due to two more potential classes in dance being offered through the dual enrollment program with Santa Monica College.

Due to declining enrollment and the resulting budget constraints, recommendations for additional staffing cannot be met at this time. The committee's recommendations, however, will be considered as we look for additional funding from either categorical or foundation grants.

Again, we thank the committee for its fine work and continued efforts on behalf of our students and staff.

District Response to the Special Education District Advisory Committee End of the Year Annual Report July 2008

The District Special Education Administrative staff recognizes and appreciates the achievements of the Special Education District Advisory Committee (SEDAC). In their year-end report, the SEDAC identified accomplishments and highlights of their work during the 2007-2008 school year. Additionally, the SEDAC provided two recommendations regarding the direction for the 2008 - 2009 school year. The response from the District Special Education Administrative staff to these recommendations is as follows:

- 1. Update the SEDAC Strategic Plan for use by the District The District Special Education Administrative staff agrees that the SEDAC Strategic Plan should be reviewed. It is fact that a majority of the plan has already been implemented. However, much of the remaining information, particularly dealing with the area of autism, is out-dated. It is the recommendation of the District Special Education Administrative staff that any unimplemented portions of the plan be reviewed and updated by District staff and a committee of SEDAC members. Following this, it is recommended that any rewritten sections of the Special Education Strategic Plan be incorporated into the District's overall Strategic Plan.
- 2. Assist the Superintendent in implementing her goals, especially as they pertain to autism programs and RtI The District Special Education Administrative staff agrees that the SEDAC members play an important role in supporting the forward movement of the District. It is the recommendation of the District Special Education Administrative staff that the SEDAC, in collaboration with District staff, continue to support programs and policies as identified by the new Superintendent during the 2008-2009 school year.

District Response to the Community Health and Safety District Advisory Committee End of the Year Annual Report July 2008

DAC-Community Health and Safety Recommendation #1
Continue to monitor Wellness Policy compliance and other health & safety issues pertinent to students.

Staff will continue to work with administration and staff to support them in compliance with Wellness Policy and other health and safety issues pertinent to students.

DAC-Community Health and Safety Recommendation #2
High School traffic and congestion is a concern. DAC recommends a holistic approach including physical design through Prop BB campus modification and a proposed "Safe Routes to School" program to encourage environmentally-conscious modes of transport.

District staff has been working closely with Proposition BB committee on issues related to physical design and traffic and pedestrian safety at each school. This also includes studying the open outdoor space vehicular, bike and pedestrian circulation leading to great campus security at Samohi and Malibu High. District staff will continue to work with Proposition BB committee, Santa Monica Police Department and staff at high schools on school traffic congestion and safe school routes.

DAC-Community Health and Safety Recommendation #3 Work collaboratively w PTA Council on Emergency Preparedness.

Staff will continue to work with district staff, PTA Council and community partners on Emergency Preparedness. A Health and Safety DAC member will attend PTA Council meetings and a PTA Council member will attend Health and Safety DAC meetings in order to enhance collaboration on emergency preparedness.

District Response to the English Learners Advisory Committee End of the Year Annual Report July 2008

Continue to offer high quality English Language Development secondary (ELD) at the secondary level:

The achievement level of SMMUSD's Reclassified Fluent English proficient students as measured by performance on standardized measures such as CST and CAHSEE has historically been remarkable. Parents and staff feel that this directly attributable to the comprehensive services that English Learners receive in district programs. A fundamental component of these services are ELD classes that are targeted, utilize high quality materials and instructional methodologies, and sequentially provide for the linguistic needs of students acquiring English. There is a need to continue to provide the current scope, sequence and structure of District ELD programs.

Staff Response:

The English Learner Coordinator will continue to work with the secondary site ELD Coordinator and Principal to determine the ELD classes needed for the following school year. This will assure that we are in compliance and students are receiving appropriate support in their acquisition of the English Language.

2) <u>Continue offering Sheltered content classes at the secondary level:</u>

Sheltered content classes provide grade level academic instruction that gives English Learners access to the core curriculum while teaching English vocabulary and English grammatical structures. Secondary sites need to evaluate the need of providing their ELs with access in the various content areas and create sheltered classes offerings according to the identified need. Currently offered at JAMS and Samohi.

Staff Response:

The EL Coordinator will continue to work with the secondary site ELD Coordinator and Principal to determine the Sheltered Content classes needed for the following school year. These classes are required in order to be in compliance and to provide English Learners with access to the core curriculum.

3) Continue appropriate placement of English Learners:
The district's design for delivering services to ELs requires that ELs be grouped in classrooms according to their English proficiency levels. Grouping ELs of no more than 2 contiguous English proficiency levels facilitates the

delivery of appropriate instructional services in the elementary classrooms.

Staff Response:

EL Coordinator will work with principals regarding the appropriate grouping/placement for elementary ELs. The site ELD Coach will work directly with site staff to configure classes in a manner that helps accelerate the ELs' acquisition of English and access to the core curriculum.

4) Continue ELD summer school and intervention classes:
Summer and intervention programs are seen as one of the best ways to support student learning. They especially give ELs the opportunity to receive additional support needed in their acquisition of English and accessing the core curriculum which leads to academic achievement.

Staff Response:

EL Coordinator will work with the Summer School Administrative staff to ensure that ELs who need intervention support and summer school classes are identified, informed and enrolled in these programs.
