A. Student Board Member Reports

Jaime Black – Santa Monica High School (3)

Student Board Member Black reported that the first day of school, which began on September 2nd, was very successful. The cost of yearbooks is now \$75 per book. Seniors wishing to park in the senior parking lot must submit their name for the lottery by this Friday, as the drawing will occur on Tuesday. Registration for Delians, SAMOHI's honors society, is taking place for seniors, juniors, and sophomores this month. Back to School Night will be held September 23rd. This afternoon, SAMOHI held a carnival in memory of Joey Lutz, an English teacher at SAMOHI who passed away this summer while on vacation in Costa Rica. There will be a campus-wide clean up September 8th-12th. ASB is currently discussing new ways to recycle on campus, the upcoming welcome back rally, and ASB gear.

Roya Sahafi – Malibu High School (3)

Student Board Member Shafi reported that a luncheon was held for all site administration on Aug 29th. The first day of school was extremely organized this year, allowing everyone to arrive to first period on time. There will be a welcome event for new MHS students on September 3rd. Make up picture day will be held on September 5th. Sept 12th will be the first day of 8th grade dialogue, a forum in which students discuss serious topics with their peers. Fall sports practices started this week. The first football scrimmage will be held this Saturday.

Isis Enriquez – Olympic High School (3) – no report

B. SMMCTA Update – Mr. Harry Keiley (5)

SMMCTA Vice President, Ms. Braff, began her report by requesting that everyone take a moment to celebrate the good news of increased student achievement scores. She said that teachers have been working very hard, and it shows in the test scores. Teachers are, however, still concerned about the achievement gaps; interventions need to occur often. In regards to the district budget, Ms. Braff remarked that the district needs to maintain a competitive benefits package to recruit and keep highly qualified teachers. Early indicators demonstrate an increase in enrollment for this school year. SMMCTA is interested how many of these students are returning from private institutions. SMMCTA is pleased that the district will be working with a consultant group for the Special Education program. She wondered how the success will be measured. The union is hoping to have the Standards Based Report Cards those out to principals and teachers by the end of this month. *Mr. de la Torre remarked that a report regarding student achievement would* be presented later this evening. He thanked all the teachers for their efforts in raising student achievement.

C. S.E.I.U. Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely (5) – no report

D. PTA Council – Rebecca Kennerly (5)

Ms. Kennerly remarked that she was excited to have started the new school year. All of the PTAs are working hard for this new year. She is pleased with the new leadership in the district, and thanked Mr. Cuneo for helping to make the beginning of the school year smooth.

X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

Superintendent Cuneo reported that the opening of the school year was smooth, thanks to the management team, teachers, and support staff. The districtwide Welcome Back Breakfast, which was held on August 28^{th} , went very well and provided a wonderful opportunity for people to come together and connect with each other. He emphasized to the breakfast attendees that we are a unified school district, and that activities will be held throughout the year to continue to unify ourselves as a K-12 district.

Mr. Cuneo said that he recently met with the staff from CDS and Food and Nutrition Services. He commended them for their dedication to the students. He also found it impressive how many district employees attended school in SMMUSD and have returned as adults to serve the students. Such commitment allows for stability in the schools and communities. Having visited every campus in the district at least twice, Mr. Cuneo has watched the interactions among staff, students, and parents. He concluded that each group provides a great benefit to each of the school sites.

Professional development and training occurred for district staff regarding the two board policies that were recently approved: sexual harassment relating to students and mandated reporting. Mr. Cuneo reported that he had met with Santa Monica City Council Members not only to get to know them, but also to better understand the relationship between the district and the city. He looks forward to continuing the strong partnership between the two entities.

Next week, the district will be distributing the back to school issue of its multi-page newspaper publication. Mr. Cuneo said that the purpose of the publication will be to update the community on district issues, including a vignette from each school site, a welcome back message from him, a Measure BB update, and a highlight of the PTAs great efforts. The district has been working closely with the Santa Monica Daily Press to produce this publication. This coming Sunday, the PTA Presidents will be having a barbeque. Mr. Cuneo said that he and his wife would be attending. Back to School Nights begin this month at the various sites. Board members and senior leadership team members will be attending these activities. The SAMOHI marching band has been invited to participate in the New Years day parade in London, England. Mr. Cuneo said that he would be meeting with the coordinators of this trip to ensure its success. Mr. Cuneo mentioned that his administrative assistant. Sarah Wahrenbrock, was student teaching this semester at SAMOHI, and that Student Board Member Black was one of her students. Ms. Wahrenbrock participated in the SMART Board Academy and other professional development activities over the summer. Mr. Cuneo observed how this is just one example of the great professional growth opportunities that exist in SMMUSD.

Board President de la Torre announced that the grand opening for the new location of the Pico Youth and Family Center would be held on September 13th from 3-6pm at 715 Pico Blvd. He invited the board and members of the community to attend.

Mr. Cuneo summarized the timeline (p.38 of this agenda). He hopes to have the report from Claros by January, and a board study session with recommendations shortly thereafter. Mr. Cuneo explained that while contracting with the Claros Group supports long-term strategies, the district is also addressing short-term goals, such as reviewing the IEP process, staff training, and developing an assessment to evaluate IEP meetings in order to gather feedback for staff.

Mr. Cuneo explained that those individuals who helped in hiring Lou Barber & Assoc. would be invited to participate in the district's small group. This small group will act as a communication link to the larger community and its stakeholders. The roles and expectations of this group will be clearly defined. Martha Duran-Contreras will be the staff member assigned to the group. Mr. Cuneo hopes to have this small group, the membership of which will be appointed by the Superintendent, formed by the end of this month. He clarified for Dr. Escarce that there would be a second contract with Claros following Phase I, depending on the scope of work. Mr. Cuneo clarified that the written document deliverables mentioned on p.38 will be completed by the Claros Group after they have interviewed a variety of community stakeholders.

Overall Scope of Work

The focus of our engagement will be to support SMMUSD district staff, school-site staff and parents to achieve breakthroughs in Special Education on par with the excellent performance of other programs across the district.

Our approach is to making improvement in the quality and climate of Special Education to establish both a precedent and a prototype for how the district takes on challenging issues. Organizing principles would include:


- Articulate clear boundaries and decision rights.
- Use a smaller representative working group along with broad stakeholder engagement (staff, parents, Board, etc.)
- Use a well-organized interactive process that draws on the wisdom and creativity of all participants.
- Communicate often to all stakeholders about process, progress and outcomes.
- Build momentum and credibility with early wins.
- Build capacity for productively addressing difficult issues.

It is envisioned a 6-10 month process beginning with planning and start up, and including the engagement of key constituents. A multi-stakeholder group would be charged with specific tasks, culminating in a set of recommendations to the Superintendent, which, when approved by the Board would require ongoing implementation, capacity building, and reinforcement. Your preliminary thinking is that the group would be asked to review, integrate and prioritize Special Education goals, strategies and deliverables which are currently embedded in disparate documents.

Illustrative Timeline

A <u>draft</u> timeline for the completion of the overall work is shown below. Specific dates will depend upon the complexity of the work group charter, the availability and vacation schedules of the work group, and the scheduling of opportunities for community stakeholder engagement.



We have agreed to an initial phase (**Development and Start-up**) that would allow for on-theground assessment and collaborative strategy development with District Leadership. It is important that our approach reflect the change that you want to see in the district, i.e., model inclusive collaboration, transparent processes and decisions, and explicit and fair process.

Phase I Development and Start-up: Strategy and Project Design Activities (including 2-3 days on site)

- 1. Identify and interview individuals (individuals and small groups) whose perspective and contribution will be critical to the success of any undertaking. Individual responses will be held confidential while overarching themes will inform the project parameters.
- 2. Map out an overall scope of work that defines the desired outcomes, the measures of success, and a high-level work plan with timeframes, and clarifies all roles and responsibilities.
- 3. Agree on a written charter for a multi-stakeholder group: purpose, leadership, membership, deliverables, timeframe and resources.
- 4. Decide on the composition of a sponsor group, the working group, and identify the internal project leader who will partner with the Claros Group.
- 5. Develop a communications document, answering "why this; why now?" The document will be used to initiate conversations with the various individuals and groups we will need to engage throughout the project.

The deliverables from this phase of work include:

- A mutually agreed upon scope of work
- Defined project structure and roles
- Written group charter
- A communications document

Working Assumptions about Project Structure and Roles

The Superintendent and CAO (others TBD) will serve as the sponsor group for the project. As the sponsor group you will:

- Provide oversight and guidance to our work
- Ensure that we engage the right people at the right time
- Develop the charge to the working group team
- Receive and decide upon any recommendations from the working group
- Lead implementation of change

The designated SMMUSD Project Lead will:

- Be our primary point of contact
- Ensure that we understand the contextual aspects of the work
- Inspire the design team to full constructive participation
- Collaborate with and support the consulting team as we design key meetings, prepare
 materials to support informed deliberations, engage both the design team and the
 stakeholders, and manage the project timeline and deliverables.

A representative working group will be chartered to develop recommendations to the Superintendent. This work group will be fewer than 20 people and will be comprised of some members of the Special Education DAC, as well as other key individuals.

SMMSD will provide clerical and administrative support to the effort, including scheduling and logistics for all necessary meetings.

Investment Costs

Fees are \$10,000 not including expenses (primarily travel and hospitality) which will be billed as accrued. This is based on an estimate of 2-3 on-site days, all preparation, documentation, and follow up, and travel time. Caroline McCall will continue to contribute, but I will be the primary consultant and will be responsible for the work of the first phase. I will bring in other consultants at specific points during the project based on the project scope we define. SMMUSD will be invoiced after the receipt of Phase I deliverables and payment is due within 30 days.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.20

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 08-07 that makes the following environmental findings required by the California Department of Education ("CDE") before approving of the expansion and reconstruction of the Edison Language Academy:

- Based upon the Phase I, the Proposed School Site is not a current or former waste disposal or solid waste disposal site; and
- 2. Based upon the Phase I, the Proposed School Site is not a hazardous substance release site identified by the Department of Toxic Substances Control in a current list adopted pursuant to Section 25356 for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 of Division 20 of the *Health* and Safety Code; and
- 3. Based upon the Pipeline Analysis, the area within 1,500 feet of the Proposed School Site and the Proposed School Site do not contain one or more pipelines, situated underground or aboveground, that carries hazardous substances, extremely hazardous materials, or hazardous wastes, unless the pipeline is a natural gas line which is used only to supply natural gas to that school or neighborhood or other nearby schools and no pipelines within 1,500 feet of, or at, the Proposed School Site pose a safety hazard determined by a risk analysis study conducted per CDE criteria; and
- 4. The Proposed School Site is within 500 feet of the edge of the closest traffic lane of a freeway or other busy traffic corridor as defined in *Education Code Section* 17213(d)(9) and *Public Resources Code* Section 21151.8(c)(9); and
- 5. Based upon PCR's written notice to and consultation with administering agencies and the South Coast Air Quality Management District, PCR identified 18 hazardous air emitting facilities specified in Education Code Section 17213 or Public Resources Code Section 21151.8 ("Facilities") and analyzed the air emissions from these Facilities in the HRA. Based upon PCR's analyses reported in the HRA, the health risks from these Facilities and Interstate I-10 do not and will not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who

would attend or be employed at the Proposed School Site; and

6. Based upon PCR's analysis pursuant to paragraph two of Health and Safety Code Section 44360(b) and PCR's air dispersion modeling presented in the HRA, the air quality at the Proposed School Site is such that neither short-term nor long-term exposure poses significant health risks to the pupils and staff of the Edison Language Academy.

DISCUSSION:

The District is seeking CDE's approval for the possible expansion and reconstruction of the Edison Language Academy. The expansion being considered consists of two abutting parcels: 2508 Virginia Avenue, Santa Monica, California 90404 (APN: 4274-005-032) and 2512 Virginia Avenue, Santa Monica, California 90404 (APN: 4274-005-033)(collectively with the existing school site, the "Proposed School Site").

As part of the application for CDE's approval, the Board of Education must evaluate and make certain findings concerning environmental hazards and the exposure of pupils and staff to hazardous air emissions from potential sources that are within ¼ mile of the Proposed School Site and when the Proposed School Site is within 500 feet of a qualified freeway.

The District engaged LFR, Inc. ("LFR") to prepare a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment ("Phase I") of the Proposed School Site to ascertain whether any environmental concerns exist thereon. As reported in the Phase I, LFR determined that the Proposed School Site is not a former waste disposal site and is not a hazardous substance release site. The Executive Summary of the Phase I will be available at the district office and at the board meeting. The complete Phase I is on file with staff and is available for review.

Another CDE required finding is that there are no pipelines at or within 1,500 feet of the Proposed School Site that are hazardous or a safety hazard. The District engaged LFR to prepare the requisite Pipeline Risk Analysis ("Pipeline Analysis"). As reported in the Pipeline Analysis, LFR determined that no such pipelines exist at or within 1,500 feet of the Proposed School Site. The Complete Pipeline Analysis is on file with staff and is available for review.

Additionally, the District engaged PCR Services Corporation ("PCR") to prepare the requisite air quality Health Risk Assessment ("HRA"). The following eighteen (18) facilities were identified by PCR, in consultation with administering agencies and the South Coast Air Quality Management District, as hazardous air emitting facilities that are within ¼ mile of the Proposed School Site ("Facilities"):

Most of these Facilities are along Pico Boulevard and on the north side of Interstate-10 (I-10). Further, the I-10 freeway is within 500 feet of Edison. None of the Facilities are directly adjacent to the Proposed School Site. Figure 1 of the HRA depicts the locations of these Facilities.

PCR analyzed the air emissions from each of these Facilities and the I-10 and determined that the air quality within ¼ mile of the Proposed School Site is acceptable for the pupils and staff. The details of PCR's analyses and results are set forth in its "Air Quality Health Risk Assessment, Edison Language Academy," dated August 25, 2008. The HRA's Executive Summary is attached for convenience. The complete HRA is on file with staff and is available for review.

WHEREAS, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District") seeks to obtain the California Department of Education's ("CDE") approval to acquire two abutting parcels: 2508 Virginia Avenue, Santa Monica, California 90404, APN: 4274-005-032 and 2512 Virginia Avenue, Santa Monica, California 90404, APN: 4274-005-033, which are under consideration for the potential expansion and reconstruction of the Edison Language Academy (collectively, the "Proposed School Site"); and

WHEREAS, CDE requires the submission of certain District adopted environmental findings before the CDE will approve the Proposed School Site; and

WHEREAS, the District engaged LFR, Inc. ("LFR") to prepare a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment ("Phase I") of the Proposed School Site to ascertain whether any environmental concerns exist upon the Proposed School Site. LFR completed the Phase I, which is entitled, "Phase I Environmental Site Assessment, Edison Elementary School at 2425 Kansas Avenue and Two Residential Properties at 2508 and 2512 Virginia Avenue, Santa Monica, California," dated August 29, 2008 and incorporated herein as though set forth in full. The Phase I determined, among other things, that the Proposed School Site is not a former waste disposal site and is not a hazardous substance release site; and

WHEREAS, the District engaged LFR to prepare an analysis of pipelines at or within 1,500 feet of the Proposed School Site. LFR completed the analysis, which is entitled, "Revised Stage 2 Pipeline Risk Analysis," dated August 28, 2008 ("Pipeline Analysis"), and incorporated herein as though set forth in full. The Pipeline Analysis reports there are no such pipelines that pose a safety hazard as determined by a risk analysis study conducted per CDE criteria; and

WHEREAS, the District engaged PCR Services Corporation ("PCR") to prepare the requisite air quality Health Risk Assessment ("HRA") since the proposed site is within ¼ mile of potential hazardous air emission sources and within 500 feet of a qualified freeway, Interstate I-10. PCR completed the HRA, which is entitled, "Air Quality Health Risk Assessment, Edison Language Academy," dated August 25, 2008 and incorporated herewith as though set forth in full. In the HRA, PCR identified 18 hazardous air emitting facilities that are within ¼ mile of the proposed site ("Facilities"). PCR reported in the HRA that considering the emissions from these Facilities along with those from Interstate 10, the air quality at the Proposed School Site is such that neither short-term nor long-term exposure poses significant health risks to its pupils and staff.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education hereby finds as follows:

- Based upon the Phase I, the Proposed School Site is not a current or former waste disposal or solid waste disposal site; and
- 2. Based upon the Phase I, the Proposed School Site is not a hazardous substance release site identified by the Department of Toxic Substances Control in a current list adopted pursuant to Section 25356 for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code; and
- 3. Based upon the Pipeline Analysis, the area within 1,500 feet of the Proposed School Site and the Proposed School Site do not contain one or more pipelines, situated underground or aboveground, that carries hazardous substances, extremely hazardous materials, or hazardous wastes, unless the pipeline is a natural gas line which is used only to supply natural gas to that school or neighborhood or other nearby schools and no pipelines within 1,500 feet of, or at, the Proposed School Site pose a safety hazard determined by a risk analysis study conducted per CDE criteria; and
- 4. The Proposed School Site is within 500 feet of the edge of the closest traffic lane of a freeway or other busy traffic corridor as defined in *Education Code Section* 17213(d)(9) and *Public Resources Code* Section 21151.8(c)(9); and
- 5. Based upon PCR's written notice to and consultation with administering agencies and the South Coast Air Quality Management District, PCR identified 18 hazardous air emitting facilities specified in *Education Code* Section 17213 or *Public Resources Code* Section 21151.8 ("Facilities") and analyzed the air emissions from these Facilities in the HRA. Based upon PCR's analyses reported in the HRA, the health risks from these Facilities and Interstate I-10 do not and will not constitute an actual or potential endangerment of public health to persons who would attend or be employed at the Proposed School Site; and

6. Based upon PCR's analysis pursuant to paragraph two of Health and Safety Code Section 44360(b) and PCR's air dispersion modeling presented in the HRA, the air quality at the Proposed School Site is such that neither short-term nor long-term exposure poses significant health risks to the pupils and staff of the Edison Language Academy.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District is considering the possible acquisition of 0.594 acres of land adjacent to the northeast corner of the Edison Language Academy to allow for a minor expansion of the school. The school and acquisition site are located in the City of Santa Monica. As required by both the State Public Resources Code and Education Code, approval of an environmental impact report or negative declaration for a project involving the purchase of new land is prohibited unless a formal Health Risk Assessment (HRA) is conducted that includes all stationary sources within ¼ mile (1,320 feet) of the proposed project boundary. These regulations also require analysis of health risks associated with mobile source emissions for proposed school sites located in proximity to a freeway or busy traffic corridor.

PCR Services Corporation (PCR) performed a HRA to evaluate potential carcinogenic and non-carcinogenic risks to students and staff resulting from exposure to localized sources of toxic air contaminants (TACs). PCR considered emissions from both stationary and mobile TAC sources within ¼ mile of the proposed school site as required by law. A search of publicly available sources, such as the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD), and a PCR site reconnaissance identified 18 stationary TAC emitting sources within this radius, along with emissions from vehicles traveling on the Interstate-10 (I-10) freeway and associated ramps. The number of vehicles and ratio of heavy duty diesel trucks gathered from California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) traffic data to accurately model local conditions of the freeway. Pursuant to Senate Bill 352 (SB352), a criteria pollutant analysis for mobile sources is required when a freeway is located within 500 feet of a school site or busy traffic corridor. Given the proximity of the I-10 freeway to the Edison Language Academy (175 feet), a criteria pollutant analysis was conducted.

This HRA was performed in accordance with guidelines established by California's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA). The criteria pollutant analyses involve short-term (1-, 8-, or 24-hour averaging times) thresholds, which are protective of health for all sensitive populations (students, employees, etc.). The emissions modeled present a typical scenario for acute exposure. Health assessments were performed separately for students and employees, with appropriate exposure parameters such as body mass, breathing rate, and exposure duration selected in accordance with standard practice. The cancer risk threshold of 10 in one million (1.0 E-05) is applicable to both receptor types.

For carcinogenic exposures, the estimation of risk totaled 1.6E-06 (1.6 in one million) for adults, and 7.6E-07 (0.76 in one million) for students exercising, and 6.6E-07 (0.66 in one million) for students at rest, both of which are below the applicable significance threshold of 10 in one

million. For non-carcinogenic effects, the maximum hazard index was identified for the respiratory system toxicological endpoint as 2.6E-02, 3.7E-02, and 3.2E-02, for adults, students exercising, and students at rest respectively. The hazard indices identified for each toxicological endpoint totaled less than one for both students and staff as shown in Table 7 on page 19. Therefore, chronic non-carcinogenic hazards were predicted to be within acceptable limits.

For criteria pollutants the assessment revealed that emissions generated from the adjacent freeway would not exceed the applicable significance thresholds. As such, maximum predicted concentrations are within acceptable limits and that the air quality at the Edison Language Academy site is such that neither short-term nor long-term exposure poses significant health risks to students and staff.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

LFR Inc. (LFR) performed a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) of Edison Elementary School located at 2425 Kansas Avenue and two single-family residences located at 2508 and 2512 Virginia Avenue in the City of Santa Monica, County of Los Angeles, California ("the Site"; Figure 1). The single-family residences are proposed to be incorporated into the school campus during renovation activities.

This Phase I ESA has been conducted in accordance with the current version of the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) Standard Practice for Environmental Site Assessments, Phase I Environmental Site Assessment Process (E-1527-05). The purpose of the Phase I ESA is to allow the user to complete an "all appropriate inquiry" (AAI) under the AAI Rule promulgated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) to satisfy requirements to qualify for the "landowner liability protections" (LLPs) limitations on Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) liability, if applicable. The objective of the Phase I ESA is to identify recognized environmental conditions (RECs) in connection with the Site pursuant to the processes prescribed in the ASTM E-1527-05 guidelines and the AAI Rule.

On Site

Based on a review of historical topographic maps, Sanborn Fire Insurance Maps, and aerial photographs of the site vicinity, the Site was undeveloped at least as early as 1900. The Site is depicted as improved with a residence in the 1928 aerial photograph and as improved with school buildings and residences in the 1956 aerial photograph. The Site has been used as a school campus since the early 1950s and for residential purposes since the mid 1920s. The Site is currently occupied by Edison Elementary School and two single-family residences.

The Site consists of three parcels totaling approximately 5.49 acres, and is improved with two single-family residences and Edison Elementary School. Currently, the parcels developed with single-family residences are not part of Edison Elementary School but are being considered for expansion during renovation activities. Edison Elementary School is located at 2425 Kansas Avenue, and the single-family residences are located at 2508 and 2512 Virginia Avenue.

Edison Elementary School Campus

On the day of LFR's site inspection, LFR observed permanent classrooms, portable classrooms, administration buildings, and a cafeteria on the Edison Elementary School campus. The onsite buildings occupy the majority of the Site and total approximately 44,034 square feet. The northwest and north portions of the campus are developed with a playground that includes basketball courts, toys, and a grass field. Proposed construction on the school campus includes a new 470-student kindergarten through

fifth grade school on the northeast and northwest portions of the Site, demolition of the old school and portables, and construction of a new playfield and playground in place of the current school buildings.

LFR observed small quantities of household cleaners stored in the maintenance room onsite. A pad-mounted electrical transformer is located at the southeast end of the campus, adjacent to the parking lot located at the east end of the Site. Overhead power lines were observed adjacent to and southeast of the campus along Kansas Avenue.

2508 Virginia Avenue

The property at 2508 Virginia Avenue is developed with a single-family residence. An associated garage is located on the northern portion of the property. The original construction date of the onsite residence is reportedly 1938; an addition, including a master suite and garage, was added to the residence in the mid 1960s. Both the residence and garage have stucco exteriors and asphalt-composite shingle roofing.

A small area of oil-stained soil measuring approximately 2 inches by 2 inches was observed adjacent to the southeast end of the concrete driveway. The oil stain reportedly resulted from a broken down car that was parked in the area for several years.

The remnants of an incinerator were observed on the southwest portion of the 2508 Virginia Avenue property. The remnants consisted of bricks and mortar and looked similar to a chimney. Reportedly, the incinerator has not been used in approximately 50 years. Concrete abuts the front side (opening) of the incinerator. No ash was observed in the incinerator or in the area surrounding the incinerator.

2512 Virginia Avenue

The property at 2512 Virginia Avenue includes a single-family residence and two aluminum storage sheds. The residence is located on the northern portion of the property, and the aluminum storage sheds are located on the eastern portion of the property. The remainder of the property is covered with landscaping including grass, trees, and flowering shrubs. Gravel walkways were observed throughout the property.

The original construction date of the residence is reportedly 1922. The exterior of the residence consists of asphalt-composite shingle siding and roofing. Building materials on the interior of the residence consist of plaster walls, carpeting, and vinyl floor tiles.

A small wooden storage cabinet was observed on the northeast portion of the property adjacent to the east side of the residence. LFR observed household cleaning products, anti-freeze for automobiles, and 1-quart containers of furniture varnish stored in the cabinet. No leaks or stains were observed in connection with any of the products stored in the cabinet.

Based on the construction dates (1920s, 1930s, and 1950s) for the structures located throughout the Edison Elementary School campus and on the two adjacent properties, it is possible that asbestos-containing materials (ACMs), termiticides, and/or lead-based paint (LBP) are present in the site buildings or within the footprint of the former on-site structures.

Local Agency Research

LFR reviewed information for the Site at Santa Monica City Hall. The earliest permits found for the single-family residences with the addresses of 2508 and 2512 Virginia Avenue were dated 1948. Additional permits for various electrical and plumbing improvements at these addresses were issued in 1953, 1956, and 1981. In 1963 a permit was filed for construction of an addition to the single-family residence at 2508 Virginia Avenue. Various electrical and plumbing permits for Edison Elementary School were issued from 1950 through 2001.

LFR contacted the Santa Monica Division of Environmental Programs (SMEP), the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Los Angeles Region (RWQCB), the Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), and the Los Angeles County Department of Environmental Health, Public Health Investigations (PHI) for information regarding the Site; however, none of these agencies had records on file for the Site addresses.

Regulatory Database Listings

There is one listing for the subject addresses. Edison Elementary is listed at the Site on the FINDS database. The FINDS database is a pointer to other databases with more complete information, and does not include any information. However, the Site address is not listed on any of the remaining databases researched. The FINDS listing is possibly associated with an asbestos abatement that occurred at the Site in the 1990s.

Off Site

The Site is bound to the northwest by Virginia Avenue, followed by residences; to the northeast and southwest by residences; and to the southeast by Kansas Avenue, followed by residences.

Based on a review of historical aerial photographs and topographic maps, the adjoining properties were depicted as undeveloped land on a 1900 topographic map, and were mainly agricultural land (row crops and orchards) and residences from the 1920s until the 1950s. In the 1950s, the area was developed mostly with residential properties. Development of commercial properties in areas near the Site began as early as the late 1920s (to the north) although significant commercial construction did not take off in the vicinity until the 1960s. Highway 10 was constructed sometime after 1956 and before

1965. A former City Dump and other industrial facilities are located north-northwest of the Santa Monica Freeway.

According to the City Directory Abstract compiled by Environmental Data Resources, Inc. (EDR), neighboring properties have been used for private residential purposes since approximately 1920. In addition to residences, commercial properties were listed in the city directory beginning in 1940.

An environmental database report prepared by EDR was reviewed for local, state, and federal listings for properties within the site vicinity. Regulatory database lists were reviewed for cases pertaining to leaking underground and aboveground storage tanks, hazardous waste sites, and abandoned sites within the specified radii of standards established by the ASTM.

No off-site facilities were found to represent an environmental concern to the Site based on listing type (i.e., no documented releases) or, if a release was documented, based on distance from the Site and location cross- or downgradient from the Site relative to the groundwater flow direction.

Opinion

On Site

No evidence of specific on-site releases was identified during this Phase I ESA. However, LFR identified the following Site and school features from past activities that may have the potential to impact the subject property:

- Based on the original date of construction for the site buildings, the potential exists for LBP, termiticides, and/or ACMs to be present at the Site. It should be noted, however, that Edison Elementary School was part of an asbestos abatement program conducted in the 1990s.
- Although not related to a specific release, a pad-mounted electrical transformer is located near the southeastern school campus boundary, approximately 140 feet southwest of the eastern corner of the school campus.
- A small area of oil-stained soil, measuring approximately 2 inches by 2 inches, was observed at 2508Virginia Avenue. The oil-stained soil is considered a *de minimis* condition.
- The remnants of an incinerator were observed on the southwest portion of the 2508 Virginia Avenue property. Reportedly, the incinerator has not been used in approximately 50 years. No ash was observed in the incinerator or in the area surrounding the incinerator, and as such these remnants are considered a *de minimis* condition.

Off Site

A review of agency database information provided by EDR indicated there are no off-site facilities that are likely to represent an environmental concern to the Site.

Conclusions and Recommendations

LFR has performed a Phase I ESA of the Site in conformance with the scope and limitations of ASTM Practice E-1527-05. Any exceptions to or deviations from this practice are described in Section 1.4 of this report. The findings and conclusions provided herein are based on information obtained from the site reconnaissance and agency review of the subject property and surrounding areas.

Based on the results of this Phase I ESA report, and per California Department of Education (CDE) requirements related to findings:

- The Site is not a current or former hazardous waste disposal or solid waste disposal site, and
- The Site is not a hazardous substance release site identified by the DTSC in a current list adopted pursuant to Section 25356 for removal or remedial action pursuant to Chapter 6.8 of Division 20 of the Health and Safety Code.

This Phase I ESA has identified several RECs or other conditions that would appear to require additional investigation prior to the Site being approved for school use:

- Due to the presence of present and former structures on the Site, DTSC will likely require sampling for lead and termiticides in soil. DTSC typically requires lead sampling anytime a structure that was constructed prior to the ban of LBP in the late 1970s/early 1980s is present at a site and pesticide sampling anytime a structure that was constructed prior to the ban of organochlorine pesticides in the late 1970s/early 1980s is present at a site.
- At the time of the above sampling, an additional sample should be collected from the small area of oil-stained soil observed at 2508 Virginia Avenue. This soil sample should be analyzed for total petroleum hydrocarbons with carbon chain distinction in order to address the *de minimis* condition.
- At the time of the above sampling, it is recommended that two borings be augered in the vicinity of the incinerator remnants observed at 2508 Virginia Avenue to determine if any ash is present in the soil from the ground surface to a depth of approximately 2 feet below ground surface. If ash is encountered, the sample should be submitted to a laboratory for analysis of dioxins. If ash is not encountered, no analysis is recommended.

• A pad-mounted electric transformer is located near the southeastern border of the Site. Although no leaks or stains were observed around the transformer, DTSC will likely require soil sampling in the vicinity of this feature to evaluate the potential for polychlorinated biphenyls.

LFR is currently addressing these RECs by conducting sampling as part of a Phase I Addendum, as allowed by DTSC for these REC types; the analytical results are being compiled and will be submitted under separate cover as a Phase I Addendum report. If the Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District would like to continue considering the proposed renovations at the Site, we recommend forwarding this Phase I ESA report to the DTSC along with the Addendum report that will address the results of the additional sampling. Based on the analytical results presented in the Addendum report, both reports can be submitted for review and approval of a "no further action" determination, or submitted along with a request for a scoping meeting to discuss the scope of a Preliminary Environmental Assessment at the Site.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.21

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the 2007-08 Unaudited Actual Financial Report, the resulting technical corrections to the 2007-08 Adopted Budget, and staff recommendations for the 2008-09 allocations and/or reservations.

COMMENTS: California Education Code §42100 requires the governing board of each school district to provide the county office of education (on or before September 15) a report of all revenues and expenditures for the preceding fiscal year. This report must also include any resulting corrections to the current year (2008-09) adopted budget. Although the prior fiscal year formally ended on June 30, final accounting tabulations are not generally completed by the District and the LACOE until the end of August. It is noted that all data contained in the attached report will be subject to final audit by the District's Independent Auditing firm of Nigro Nigro and White.

Report of Year-End Fund Balances for 2007-08

General Fund Ending Balance 2007-08

1) **Unrestricted Funds** - The Unrestricted General Fund ending balance (inclusive of the 3% Reserve for Economic Uncertainties, revolving cash, warehouse inventory, school site and District carryover funds, etc.) is currently estimated at \$21,020,258 or approximately \$2,878,676 higher than the estimate reported to the Board of Education on June 28, 2007 with the Adopted Budget.

The above increase is reflective of the following:

- Revenue increases of \$1,320,235 including additional interest earnings and other local income revenue, and a significant decrease <\$1,622,832> in the Local General Fund Contribution (LGFC) to the Special Education and other District programs. In regards to Special Education, the specific decrease reflects a number of certificated and classified positions that were budgeted but not filled during the fiscal year and other budgeted funds that were not spent.
- Expenditure Reductions and Carryover Funds to be re-budgeted. Overall, expenditures in the Unrestricted General Fund were \$1,558,441 less than previously estimated. This amount includes \$76,555 of school site carryover funds to be reappropriated in 2008-09 and to pay for previously approved 2007-08 purchase orders for goods and/or services which were

received after July 1, 2008, as well as budgeted funds in various categories that were not spent.

2) **Restricted Funds** - The ending balance in the Restricted General Fund was \$7,064,915. The balance for various State and Federal programs follows:

Important Considerations:

With an Undesignated Ending Balance of \$16, 930,607, which exceeds the balance estimated in June during the budget adoption by \$2.6 million, the District has the opportunity to appropriate or reverse funds on a one-time basis.

During the budgeting process and over the past several months, there have been several site program or department specific allocations that have been identified.

Those include:

- o \$50,000 for start-up funds in the STEM Academy (Science Magnet) program at Will Rogers Elementary;
- o \$7,500 for a pilot program in the SDC program at Roosevelt for a Smart Board;
- o \$132,000 to be set aside to provide planning for the Small Schools Project; and,

o \$52,500 for the purchase of a new small school bus.

In order to support ongoing improvements with District technology and to take full advantage of the infrastructure provided through the Measure BB funds, the following are allocations specific to technology:

- o \$35,000 for the purchase of laptop computers and LCD projectors to be used in Special Education IEPs;
- o \$30,000 for the purchase of hardware in support of improvement of communication through Outlook Exchange;
- o \$61,335 for the purchase of scanning equipment for each site to support the Ed Services Department; and,
- o Reserving \$1,000,000 to begin planning the conversion of the Student Information System (SIS).

The District is currently in the process of making significant changes with the delivery of Special Education services. In addition to the Smart Board at Roosevelt and the purchase of laptops and LCD projectors listed above, staff is requesting that the Board allocate funds to assist with the review process and provide staff development and legal support. The District is in the process of contracting with the Claros Group for review assistance. An allocation not-to-exceed \$60,000 should cover all costs for this project. As an estimate for staff development and legal services, staff is suggesting \$25,000 at this time. In summary, the following allocations would support the District's efforts to improved Special Education services:

- o \$7,500 for a pilot program in the SDC program at Roosevelt for a Smart Board;
- o \$35,000 for the purchase of laptop computers and LCD projectors to be used in Special Education IEPs;
- o \$60,000 for the review of Special Education; and,
- o \$25,000 for staff development/legal services.

It is also recommended that consideration be given to a transfer of \$1,000,000 to Fund 20 (*Post-Employment Benefit Fund*) to continue addressing the requirements of Governmental Accounting Standards Board (*GASB*) Rule 45 which mandates that the District project retirement benefits 30 years into the future. The District's most recent actuarial valuation places this liability in excess of \$21.2 million.

The uncertainty of the State economy, the volatility of State funding for education, the lack of a current State Budget combined with fluctuations in District enrollment and other budgetary pressures give rise to long-term fiscal concerns. When the financial landscape has this many uncertainties, minimal Reserve levels do not support fiscal responsibility. With the opportunity of available funds, staff recommends funding the Reserve for Economic Uncertainties above the minimum level of 3% minimum level at 5%, or an additional \$2.0 million in the account. The allocations and additional fund reservations are summarized in Attachment 3 to this report.

It is noted that as of the date of the preparation of this agenda item, the Legislature has not yet approved the State Budget for 2008-09.

The following board comments are in regards to fund allocations on page 52: Ms. Pye expressed her support for the Will Rogers STEM Academy. Ms. Leon-Vazquez remarked that SMC is developing a plan with Will Rogers to encourage math and science majors to become teachers. She suggested the district hire a grant writer. Dr. Escarce expressed his concern regarding the allocations for the small school planning and student information system. Dr. Wisnicki agreed, and added that she would like to see the technology department sufficiently staffed. Mr. Cuneo explained that part of the purpose of this item was to earmark funds for the line items listed on p.52. He suggested that the board approve this item with the caveat that staff will provide more details regarding the small school planning and student information system prior to those specific funds being spent. He added that the Small Schools Task Force is still having exploratory discussions regarding middle or high school options. Ms. Maez assured the board that this would not be the last re-examination of this year's budget; changes can and will be made throughout the year.

Amended Motion: To approve the item, but make the following changes to the allocations on p.52: 1) allocate \$300,000 to the Equity Fund with the understanding that the General Fund would be reimbursed once the Equity Fund has resumed and 2) hold funds earmarked for small school planning and the student information system until the board has received more information.

Dr. Escarce suggested the following modifications to the admin. reg.: p. 58, #1 should read, "...before/<u>during/</u>after school hours..." and p.59, #2: (changed language is in bold font).

Dr. Wisnicki asked how students are informed of what constitutes sexual harassment and misconduct in student-against-student instances. Dr. Matthews explained that students receive annual training about safe learning environments. Also, relevant information is provided via the student handbook, school counselors, and curriculum programs, such as Cool Tools in the elementary schools. Ms. Pye wanted to make sure that information was provided in multiple languages. Dr. Wisnicki inquired about Enforcement (p.61). Dr. Matthews clarified for her that each case is considered independently, and the district determines the level of consequences if this policy is violated. Ms. Leon-Vazquez wanted to make sure that the district collaborates with local law enforcement to inform students.

DETAIL

The Governing Board is committed to maintaining an educational environment that is free from harassment. The Board prohibits sexual harassment of students by other students, employees or other persons, at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities. The Board also prohibits retaliatory behavior or action against persons who complain, testify, assist or otherwise participate in the complaint process established pursuant to this policy and the administrative regulation.

Instruction/Information

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all district students receive age-appropriate instruction and information on sexual harassment. Such instruction and information shall include:

- 1. What acts and behavior constitute sexual harassment, including the fact that sexual harassment could occur between people of the same gender
- 2. A clear message that students do not have to endure sexual harassment
- Encouragement to report observed instances of sexual harassment, even where the victim of the harassment has not complained
- 4. Information about the person(s) to whom a report of sexual harassment should be made

Complaint Process

Any student who feels that he/she is being or has been subjected to sexual harassment shall immediately contact his/her teacher, <u>counselor</u>, administrator, or any other <u>school</u> employee. A school employee to whom a complaint is made shall, within 24 hours of receiving the complaint, report it to the principal or designee.

Any school employee who observes any incident of sexual harassment involving a student shall report this observation to the principal or designee, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

In any case of sexual harassment involving the principal or any other district employee to whom the complaint would ordinarily be made, the employee who receives the student's report or who observes the incident shall report to the nondiscrimination coordinator or the Superintendent or designee.

The principal or designee to whom a complaint of sexual harassment is reported shall immediately <u>file a report to the Superintendent</u> with the Confidential Incident Report Form. The Superintendent will determine who will investigate the complaint in accordance with administrative regulation. Where the <u>Assistant Superintendent</u> of Human Resources or designee and/or independent investigator principal or designee finds that sexual harassment occurred, he/she shall take prompt, appropriate action to end the harassment and address its effects on the victim. The principal or designee shall also advise the victim of any other remedies that may be available. The principal or designee and refer the matter to law enforcement authorities, where required.

Disciplinary Measures

Any student who engages in sexual harassment of anyone at school or at a school-sponsored or school-related activity is in violation of this policy and shall be subject to disciplinary action. For students in grades 4 through 12, disciplinary action may include suspension, opportunity transfer, and/or expulsion, provided that in imposing such discipline the entire circumstances of the incident(s) shall be taken into account.

Any employee who engages in sexual harassment or misconduct is in violation of this policy and shall be subject to disciplinary measures and shall be reported to law enforcement agencies.

Record-Keeping

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of all reported cases of sexual harassment to enable the district to monitor, address and prevent repetitive harassing behavior in its schools.

All complaints and allegations of sexual harassment shall be kept confidential except as necessary to carry out the investigation or take other subsequent necessary action. (5 CCR 4964)

By no later than October 31st of each year, the Superintendent shall inform the public via an Information Item in the Board of Education agenda regarding the number of reported student and employee sexual harassment complaints for the previous school year.

DETAIL

Prohibited sexual harassment and misconduct includes, but is not limited to, unwelcome sexual advances, unwanted requests for sexual favors or other unwanted verbal, visual or physical conduct of a sexual nature made against another person of the same or opposite gender, in the educational setting., when: Egregious examples of sexual harassment and misconduct include: (Education Code 212.5; 5 CCR 4916)

- 1. Submission to the conduct is explicitly or implicitly made a term or condition of a student's academic status or progress
- 2. Submission to or rejection of the conduct by a student is used as the basis for academic decisions affecting the student
- 3. The conduct has the purpose or effect of having a negative impact on the student's academic performance, or of creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive educational environment
- 4. Submission to or rejection of the conduct by the student is used as the basis for any decision affecting the student regarding benefits and services, honors, programs, or activities available at or through any district program or activity

Additionally, any consensual sexual relationship between an employee/volunteer and student, including students who have reached the age of consent, is prohibited.

Types of conduct which are prohibited in the district and which may constitute sexual harassment include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Unwelcome leering, sexual flirtations or propositions
- 2. Sexual slurs, epithets, threats, verbal abuse, derogatory comments or sexually degrading descriptions
- 3. Graphic verbal comments about an individual's body, or overly personal conversation
- 4. Sexual jokes, notes, stories, drawings, pictures, <u>electronic</u> <u>communication</u>, or gestures
- 5. Spreading sexual rumors, including those spread via electronic communication

- 6. Teasing or sexual remarks about students enrolled in a predominantly single-gender class
- 7. Massaging, grabbing, fondling, stroking or brushing the body
- 8. Touching an individual's body or clothes in a sexual way
- 9. Purposefully cornering or blocking normal movements with sexual intent
- 10. Displaying sexually suggestive objects
- 11. Homophobic taunts or other slurs related to sexual orientation
- 12. The conduct includes excessive or repeated touching of a student that is without a clear educational purpose.

Preventing Sexual Harassment and Misconduct

In an effort to prevent the occurrence or perception of sexual misconduct, the following precautions shall be taken by all employees:

- 1. Employees shall, whenever possible, avoid closed door meetings and before/during/after school hours activities with only one student.
- 2. <u>On any student trip away from school, there shall be a minimum</u> of two chaperones, preferably a man and a woman.

Notifications

A copy of the district's sexual harassment policy shall:

- Be included in the notifications that are sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year (Education Code 48980; 5 CCR 4917)
- Be displayed in a prominent location in the main administrative building or other area where notices of district rules, regulations, procedures and standards of conduct are posted (Education Code 231.5)
- 3. Be provided as part of any orientation program conducted for new students at the beginning of each quarter, semester or summer session (Education Code 231.5)
- 4. Appear in any school or district publication that sets forth the school's or district's comprehensive rules, regulations, procedures and standards of conduct (Education Code 231.5)
- 5. Be provided to employees and employee organizations

Investigation of Complaints at School (Site-Level Grievance Procedure)

- 1. The principal shall report a complaint to the Superintendent using the Confidential Incident Report form. Even if no complaint is filed, the principal has a duty to investigate suspected sexual harassment or misconduct.
- 2. The principal and Superintendent shall determine whether the principal, a designee, or an independent investigator will investigate the complaint. In cases of complaints filed against an employee, an independent investigator shall investigate the complaint. That person The principal or designee shall promptly investigate all complaints of sexual harassment. In so doing, he/she shall talk individually with:
 - a. The student who is complaining
 - b. The person accused of harassment
 - c. Anyone who witnessed the conduct complained of
 - d. Anyone mentioned as having related information
- <u>32</u>. The student who is complaining shall have an opportunity to describe the incident, present witnesses and other evidence of the harassment, and put his/her complaint in writing.
- 43. The principal or designee shall discuss the complaint only with the people described above. If the complaint regards occurrences for which the principal or designee has a reasonable suspicion of child abuse, the principal or designee is mandated to report to law enforcement and/or child protective agencies as per SMMUSD Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5144.4. When necessary to carry out his/her investigation or for other good reasons that apply to the particular situation, the principal or designee also may discuss the complaint with the following persons:
 - a. The Superintendent or designee
 - b. The parent/guardian of the student who complained
 - c. If the alleged harasser is a student, his/her parent/guardian
 - d. A teacher or staff member whose knowledge of the students involved may help in determining who is telling the truth
 - e. Child protective agencies responsible for investigating child abuse reports
 - f. Legal counsel for the district
- 54. The complainant shall not be required or asked to meet with the alleged harasser or person suspected of sexual misconduct. If the alleged harasser or person suspected of sexual misconduct is a district employee or volunteer, then during the course of the investigation, he/she shall discontinue contact with students. When the student who complained and the alleged harasser so agree, the principal or designee may arrange for them to resolve the complaint informally with the help of a counselor, teacher, administrator or trained mediator. The student who complained shall never be asked to work out the problem directly with the accused person unless such help is

provided and both parties agree.

- 65. In reaching a decision about the complaint, the <u>Assistant</u> Superintendent of Human Resources or designee and/or independent investigator principal or designee may take into account:
 - a. Statements made by the persons identified above
 - b. The details and consistency of each person's account
 - c. Evidence of how the complaining student reacted to the incident
 - d. Evidence of any past instances of harassment by the alleged harasser
 - e. Evidence of any past harassment complaints that were found to be untrue
- <u>76</u>. To judge the severity of the harassment, the <u>Assistant</u> <u>Superintendent of Human Resources or designee and/or</u> <u>independent investigator principal or designee</u> may take into consideration:
 - a. How the misconduct affected one or more students' education
 - b. The type, frequency and duration of the misconduct
 - c. The number of persons involved
 - d. The age and gender of the person accused of harassment
 - e. The subject(s) of harassment
 - f. The place and situation where the incident occurred
 - g. Other incidents at the school, including incidents of harassment that were not related to gender
- 87. The <u>Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee</u> and/or independent investigator principal or designee shall write a report of his/her findings, decision, and reasons for the decision and shall present this report to the student who complained and the person accused.
- <u>98</u>. The <u>Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee</u> <u>and/or independent investigator principal or designee</u> shall give the Superintendent or designee a written report of the complaint and investigation. If the principal or designee verifies that sexual harassment occurred, this report shall describe the actions taken to end the harassment, address the effects of the harassment on the student harassed, and prevent retaliation or further harassment.
- 109. Within two weeks after receiving the complaint, the principal or designee shall determine whether or not the student who complained has been further harassed. The principal or designee shall keep a record of this information and shall continue this follow-up.

Enforcement

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate actions to reinforce the district's sexual harassment policy. As needed, these

actions may include any of the following:

- 1. Removing vulgar or offending graffiti.
- 2. Providing staff inservice and student instruction or counseling.
- 3. Notifying parents/guardians of the actions taken.
- 4. Notifying child protective services.
- 5. Taking appropriate disciplinary action. In addition, the principal or designee may take disciplinary measures against any person who is found to have made a complaint of sexual harassment which he/she knew was not true.
- 6. If an employee is found to be in violation of this policy, disciplinary action shall include, at a minimum, a letter of reprimand, which shall be placed in the employee's personnel file. That letter shall not be expunged under any circumstances.

Support for Students

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate action s to provide support for students who have been subjected to sexual harassment and/or misconduct by a district employee or volunteer.

- 1. The principal or designee will make it clear to the affected student(s) and the parents or guardians that any form of retaliation or mistreatment of a student who complained will not be tolerated.
- 2. <u>In instances where there were substantiated findings that a</u> <u>student was subjected to sexual harassment/misconduct by a</u> <u>District employee or volunteer, the District will offer, and</u> <u>upon the request of the parent or guardian, will assist the</u> <u>student in receiving therapeutic intervention.</u>

Santa Monica Malibu Unified School District Board of Trustees and Superintendent Protocols

School districts are governed by boards, not by individuals. While understanding their roles, the board and superintendent work together as a "governance team." This team assumes collective responsibility for building unity and creating a positive organizational culture in order to govern effectively. To operate effectively, the board and superintendent agree:

Board Members and Superintendent will...

- 1. Keep teaching and learning as the primary focus of our work.
- 2. Support all students in their pursuit of academic achievement and personal growth

- Understand the distinctions between the Board and staff roles, and refrain from performing management functions that are the responsibility of the Superintendent and staff

- 5. Ensure the Board agendas reflect the District's Strategic Plan.
- 6. Govern in a professional manner, treating everyone with civility and respect.
- 7. Work collaboratively and take collective responsibility for the Board's performance.

- 9. Establish a district climate that supports high-quality teaching and learning and promotes successful school communities.
- 10. Work to resolve differences of opinion in a constructive manner.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

The California Standards Tests (CSTs) measure student achievement in grade level standards. They are administered to all students in grades 2-11. The California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) is given to all 10th grade students. Students must pass both the mathematics and language arts portions of this exam in order to graduate from high school with a diploma. Students who do not achieve a passing score in 10th grade may continue to take the test throughout 11th and 12th grade. Non-passers may have up to two consecutive years after the completion of their high school coursework to take and pass the CAHSEE in order to receive their diplomas.

Both the CSTs and 10th grade CAHSEE results are used to determine the district's Academic Performance Index (API), the state's accountability system for measuring student achievement.

In addition, the percentage of students who are proficient on these exams is used to determine the district's Adequate Yearly Progress toward Annual Measurable Objectives (AMOs), as part of the federal accountability requirements legislated through the No Child Left Behind Act.

Achievement data from these standardized measures, as well as district formative assessments, are used to help school and district leaders to identify program needs, prioritize professional development, and develop data-driven school improvement plans.

Multi-year trends in district-wide student achievement for CST, CAHSEE, API, and AYP will be reviewed.

Board members requested that the following issues be addressed at a follow-up workshop:

Mr. Snell: Break out data by gender.

Mr. Mechur: Examine ways to close the achievement gap.

<u>Dr. Escarce</u>: Compare secondary math courses/scores to neighboring districts. Examine the drops in high school math scores (Are we trying to teach too much material in one course? How does a district balance student needs with content standards?).

<u>Ms. Pye</u>: Ask teachers/administrators their opinions regarding secondary math. How are high expectations tied to outcomes? What is good instruction, where is it happening, how can we replicate it? She requested more detailed data regarding middle school achievement scores. Compare how groups perform on standardized tests versus performance in the classroom.

<u>Dr. Wisnicki</u>: How are assessments used to inform instruction? Match up math CST questions with their related content area standards. <u>Mr. de la Torre</u>: Is there a correlation between students who do not pass the CAHSEE and drop out rates? Survey graduates regarding their college performance. Use culturally-relevant curriculum to engage students.

DETAIL

The Governing Board recognizes the value of academic research to improve educational programs and practices. Researchers shall respect the privacy rights of students, including their right to refrain from participation in research projects in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee may authorize research projects within the district by groups or persons when such research is aligned with district goals and objectives and is likely to benefit the district without disrupting the school program.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that parents/guardians receive prior notification of any surveys or evaluations that collect personal student information and that consent is obtained in accordance with law.

- The No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 requires that districts and schools be held accountable for increasing student achievement
- NCLB sets Annual Measurable Objectives (AMOs) for the percentage of students deemed proficient in ELA and Math
- These AMOs increase so that by 2014, 100% of students are expected to reach proficiency











NCLB AYP Goal: Closing Achievement Gaps


- Annual Yearly Progress is monitored for the district as a whole
- AYP is also monitored for numerically significant groups of students.
 - 100 or more students with valid scores
 - Or 50 or more students with valid scores who make up 15% of school population
 - Reports on the Students with Disabilities group will follow later in the school year, due to error in demographic data file
- Districts must meet AMOs for all in order to meet AYP.




















AYP School Performance

- Schools must meet AYP goals for both participation and percent proficient in both ELA and Math
- In addition, they must meet these criteria for each of their numerically significant groups of students

AYP School Performance

- More diverse schools have many more criteria that they must meet for AYP.
- · Schools have from 6 criteria to 25 criteria.
- Falling short in only one of the criteria results in failure to make AYP (Sometimes referred to as NCLB's 42 ways to fail.)
- The district as a whole has 32 criteria for AYP -- all of which have been met in 2008.




- California's accountability system for student achievement
- · More complex formula than AYP
- · Includes more types of tests
 - Includes more content areas
 - Weighting of content areas
 - More points given for moving students off the floor of Far Below Basic or Below Basic up to Basic, for example
- High Schools: CSTs are included, although CAHSEE passage figures prominently in their APIs.


- Reduces schools down to a single number
- Index range is 200 1000
- · Goal is API of 800
 - Schoolwide
 - Numerically Significant Groups













API School Growth Targets

- Once schools (and groups of students within schools) reach an API of 800, their growth target is simply to maintain at or above 800.
- Schools or groups with an API of less than 800 had a growth target of at least five points this year.
- Two schools, Will Rogers and John Adams increased their API by over 30 points in 2008.
- All K 5 schools in SMMUSD are now over the 800 mark!


- API reduces schools to a single number, combining all grade levels, subject matter and a number of different assessments (CST, CAT/6, CAHSEE)
- Difficult to find real meaning in terms of improving classroom instruction and student learning
- For this reason, we look more closely at actual CST performance data


- · Overall, good long-term growth





























Secondary Math Achievement

- Keep in mind that course enrollments and test alignment have changed over the years.
- In 2007 and 2008, for example, 7th graders who were enrolled in Algebra took the end-ofcourse Algebra CST, rather than the 7th grade Math CST. Their scores are not included in the percent proficient for regular 7th grade Math.











Algebra or Essentials for Algebra?

- We have continued to work on course alignment and student placement for the best possible results for individual students, as well as composite achievement for accountability purposes.
- Recent decision-making at the state level will require Algebra for all 8th graders by 2011.
- Much work remains to be done to re-tool and refine mathematics instruction for Algebra and *all* grade levels leading up to Algebra.









Cohort Analysis


- Uses a different lens for viewing achievement

 Allows us to look at how well students are improving on their own achievement as they progress through the grades and encounter more challenging subject matter














CAHSEE Passage Rates


- Passage of the California High School Exit Exam is an important component of district and high schools' API.
- Proficiency on the CAHSEE is an important component of high schools' and district AYP.
 This exam also has "high stakes" for students. As of
- This exam also has "high stakes" for students. As of 2006, students must pass both the ELA and Math portions of the exam in order to receive a high school diploma.
- As of 2007, students with disabilities no longer received an exemption from the CAHSEE requirement.

CAHSEE

- Students who do not pass in 10th grade have several other opportunities in grades 11 and 12 to re-take the exam.
- 12th graders also have the opportunity to take the exam in July, and for up to two years following their graduation date.
- We are still awaiting the results from the July 2008 CAHSEE.
- Official 10th grade passage rates for 2008 are not yet posted, but unofficially we estimate that passage rates are up slightly to 91% in both ELA and Math!









Summary

- Steady increase in student achievement
 over time
 - More so in elementary grades than secondary
 - More so in language arts than math
 - Some evidence of narrowing achievement gaps
 - Increasing pressures for accountability through increases in AMOs that will continue to rise sharply in the coming years

Summary

- Previous focused efforts on standards-based instruction have paid off, especially in literacy.
- Increased focus now in the area of math is beginning to show some results
- Increased support and attention for groups of students, such as English learners and students with disabilities, are needed to move these groups well above rising AMO status bar
