A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, October 16, 2008, in the Santa Monica City Council Chambers: 1685 Main Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 4:15 p.m. in the Board Conference Room at the District Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. At 4:16 p.m., the Board of Education moved to Closed Session regarding the items listed below. The public meeting reconvened at 5:39 p.m. in the Santa Monica City Council Chambers.

IV. BOARD OF EDUCATION – COMMENDATIONS / RECOGNITIONS (10)

• Lincoln Middle School (10)

Superintendent Cuneo introduced Lincoln Principal Suzanne Webb. Ms. Webb walked the board members through a day at Lincoln Middle School, illustrating the dynamic, dedicated teachers and energetic students. She expressed her gratitude to district office staff for helping to ensure the opening of school was successful. She showed photos of Lincoln staff and highlighted their role at the campus. The teachers reflect on how to improve programs; they are dedicated to what is best for the students. Ms. Webb summarized the themes of each grade level. She mentioned that Mr. Schwartz, one of Lincoln's teachers, received the Lance Armstrong LIVESTRONG award during the summer. The library, which is open before and after school, offers drop-in tutoring services. Ms. Webb reported that the classified staff helps to ensure that Lincoln is a great place for students to learn. The theme for classified staff is Safety, Security, and Sanitation. Lincoln's music program boasts amazing music teachers and students, who often take an AM class in order to allow for music class in their schedules. Electives at Lincoln include music, art, and yearbook/journalism. AVID is a new elective at Lincoln. During the fall semester, AVID will be an elective, and will hopefully become an official program in the spring that will feed into SAMOHI's AVID program. Classroom experiences include students using accountable talk during discussions, students debriefing with teachers follow a test to determine what the teacher can do better to present the information and what the students can do to make sure they get a better grade. Parent volunteers help make sure the campus remains safe.

Ms. Webb introduced her PTA President, Lynn Leavitt. Ms. Leavitt summarized some of the efforts that the PTA supports at Lincoln, including a commitment to parent volunteers, a back-to-school picnic, technology in the classroom, and after school and enrichment programs. She reported that the school production of A Midsummer's Nightmare will be held on November 14th and 15th. There will also be a Chance to Dance, which is a dance program for students in Special Education. In an effort to "go green," *Lincoln's Halloween carnival went green by eliminating plastic prizes. The* campus is also working with the Maintenance and Grounds department to plant sustainable trees. The PTA partners with Lincoln departments to host evenings for families, the most recent of which was Math Night. The PTA also brings speakers to the campus who are experts on student safety. The Lincoln PTA is proud of its contributions to Equity Fund and what those funds bring back to Lincoln. Sixth grade teachers have been collaborating with fifth grade teachers at Lincoln's feeder schools in order to help ensure a smooth transition for incoming sixth graders.

Student Board Member Enriquez asked is the new trees being planted were local. Ms Leavitt assured her that they were both local and sustainable. Ms. Pye inquired about new student orientation. Ms. Leavitt explained that starting in June, students from Lincoln's feeder elementary schools visit the *campus.* There are parent and student orientation meetings, activities during the summer, and then students receive their class assignments and have an opportunity to meet teachers and other students. She added that Lincoln works with the SAMOHI PTSA in order to help guide the eighth graders into SAMOHI. Mr. de la Torre asked how Lincoln's CYO (College Youth *Opportunity*) program was different from AVID. Ms. Webb explained that because Lincoln did not have AVID last year, CYO was established. Those students who are in CYO are now being targeted for the AVID program. Mr. de la Torre then inquired about School Yard Productions. Ms. Webb explained that the program was started by two eighth grade teachers who became mentors to at-risk students. As part of the program, students run their own DJ company; they DJ dances on campus and develop their own dance moves. School Year Productions engages the students and gives them an avenue to connect to school. Mr. Snell asked how the increase in reading specialists has impacted the school. Ms. Lovett thanked the board for approving this additional allocation and said that increasing reading skills in the elementary grades has a huge impact on student success in middle school. *Ms.* Webb said that Lincoln has two sections dedicated to struggling readers, including the Reader Buddy program, in which students read out loud to a peer. Mr. Snell suggested having high school students tutor Lincoln students.

Jaime Black – Santa Monica High School (3)

Student Board Member Black reported that a college fair was held on October 14th in the Santa Monica Civic Center. Representatives from various colleges presented to students. The senior class panorama photograph was taken yesterday. She said the process was quick and fun. The senior class held a car wash fund raiser on October 11^{th} . The Jewish Student Alliance held a falafel eating contest on October 7th. Ms. Black informed the board that every Tuesday morning the Student House of *Representatives, lead by the Speaker of the House, updates students of* activities that will be occurring on campus. This week is called Issues Week, in which students have the opportunity to vote on subjects of interest for the campus, such as bathrooms, parking, and events. Freshmen, sophomores, and juniors are scheduled to take the PSAT this Saturday. The Homecoming Dance is also this Saturday. Next week is *Spirit Week, in which each day will hold a different theme and provide* students the opportunity to dress up related to that theme. Themes include Superhero Day, Nerd Day, Dress like the Opposite Sex Day, Peace Day, and Blue and Gold Day. The Homecoming game and pep rally will be held on October 24th. 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Roya Sahafi – Malibu High School (3)

Student Board Member Sahafi reported that lat Friday the Latinos Unidos club held a movie event during which they showed Walkout. The club sold Mexican food that was prepared by the club members. The proceeds caised will help to sponsor their upcoming field trip.

This past Tuesday, the school held four magazine drive assemblies. Ms. Sahafi said that she attended each assembly, and that students seemed excited to sell the magazines. The first turn-in due date is this Friday. Students who have four orders receive an ice cream party.

Tenth and eleventh graders took the PSATs.

Malibu Cares, a kid-powered non-profit organization created to promote community activism, will have a booth to sell baked goods and clothing. The group will also be getting petition signatures.

sis Enriquez – Olympic High School (3) Student Board Member Enriquez reported that Marolyn Freedman, Director of Student Health and Safety, came to the campus to discuss new safety plans aimed at helping to keep the campus safe. Ms. Freedman informed them that there is on specific profile for a school shooter. The key to school safety is prevention, preparation, and response.

Najitie, a Nigerian drummer in a band called Afrobeat, came and played with the Olympic drum class. He does workshops at various schools throughout Southern California. Ms. Enriquez said that the man has soul, and that you could tell that he had a very different life experience from people living in first-world countries.

Teachers met with Measure BB contractors regarding proposed updates to the campus facilities. Ms. Enriquez said that she is excited to see what new resources are planned for future students. She thanked the voters of Santa Monica for helping to make this happen.

Roxanne Janette from Venice Arts is excited to return to campus. Venice Arts if a community-based organization that provides art outreach to local schools. Roxanne will be starting her fourth digital photograph class for students next week.

Santa Monica Deputy City Attorney, Terry White, visited the Criminal Justice class twice this week. He discussed the process of search and seizure and explained students' rights on and off campus.

The Olympic High School Student Council conducted a survey of students and staff to determine preferences for the upcoming general election. Results of the survey will be published in a future school newsletter, which will be issued prior to the election on November 4th. Ms. Enriquez said that Student Council was pleased with the enthusiastic response and interest shown by the students.

6:27 pm B. SMMCTA Update – Mr. Harry Keiley (5)

Mr. Keiley began his report by commenting on the elementary standardsbased report card that was adopted several years ago in an attempt to adopt uniformity. Recently, Dr. Chou and Ms. Harris have worked with SMMCTA and a great deal of progress has been made toward simplifying the report card and making it a more effective assessment. Last week when he attended a faculty meeting at Lincoln, he saw a great exchange between faculty members. He stressed the importance of school culture. Mr. Keiley reported that SMMUSD and SMMCTA are getting ready to enter into negotiations. He said the goals are to build on past successes, be respectful of teachers, and be fiscally responsible. He remarked that the current economic status is affecting both the district and union members. Mr. Keiley concluded his report by stating that SMMCTA supports Presidential Candidate Barack Obama.

D. PTA Council – Rebecca Kennerly (5)

Ms. Kennerly introduced Judith Meister, Chair of the PTA Special Education Committee. Ms. Meister explained that the purpose of the Special Education Committee was to bring people together and provide a place for them to listen to each other and discuss what needs to be done to more forward. She thanked the parents who have been working SEDAC for helping to lay the framework for this committee. The Fall Forum will be held on November 15th. The focus of the Forum is to introduce the parent handbook, hear a message from keynote speaker Todd Gary, and break out into sessions by school level to go through the parent handbook, hear presentations by district staff, teachers, and parents. Wendy Parise from SMC will then address the group. Ms. Meister then explained that the Special Education Parent Resource Network will be a parent-to-parent network designed to provide information and support at each site. The Network will first be established at a couple of the schools, and then eventually roll out to the other sites. Ms. Meister said she was glad to see the board would be receiving an update on the Special Education Collaborative during tonight's meeting. She stressed the need to focus on policy as the Working Group proceeds. She reported that the SEDAC passed a motion at their last meeting requesting that the Director of Special Education not be part of the Working Group membership. Ms. Leon-Vazquez, who has been the board liaison to SEDAC for a couple years, was glad to see the parent handbook coming along.

X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

Superintendent Cuneo thanked the Education Foundation and board members for a lovely reception on Monday evening. He said that the event not only provided him the opportunity to reconnect with people he had already met, but also to meet new community members.

Mr. Cuneo gave an update on the Special Education program. Parents whose children are in the Special Education have been coming forward to share their thoughts regarding the program. The Parent Handbook is in its final stages of reivisons and will be going to the translator and printer soon. Mr. Cuneo thanked the group of staff members and parents who worked very hard putting this document together. The handbook will act as a guide for parents whose children are in the Special Education program. The Parent Resource Netwrok will begin at five of the schools. The campuses are currently examining ways to adapt the information that the Claros Group has provided in order to best meet the needs of our studnets. Rollout of the Parent Resource Network across the entire district will occur over a period of time.

On Octboer 30th at 9:00am, Will Rogers Learning Community and Edison Language Academy will be receiving a CA Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program grant as part of their efforts to serve healthy snacks and lunches.

The policy regarding homework will be brought forward for board review at a future meeting. Staff will be eliciting feedback from teachers and parents. Dr. Escarce requested to see a receive a copy of the homwork policy in this week's board packet.

Mr. Cuneo remarked that the district's student information system is antequated. The district has started evaluating vendors and products that best meet the needs of our teachers and parents. The goal is to have an integrated student information system. The evaluation will be brought back to the board after the first of the year.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.19

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve an addition of .9375 FTEs to add one Child Development Teacher (4 hours) and one Children Center Assistant (3.5 hours). This will allow the creation of a new classroom for the School-Age program at the Rogers CDS site. There is a large list of children waiting to be enrolled in the program, and the state contract requires that Child Development Services respond to community needs when possible.

FUNDING NOTE: The 2008-2009 Child Development Services budget will be adjusted \$32,090.50 for salary and benefits. This cost will be covered by parent fees and state allocations (State Contract CCTR).

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Monica Simon from Child Development Services explained that this year's CREST program has increased by three classrooms. At the beginning of the school year, there were 150 children on the waitlist. Extra FTEs help to incorporate more children from the waitlist into the CREST program.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.22

In May 2000, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) filed a lawsuit against the State of California claiming that the state had failed in its duty to provide students with equal educational opportunity. That lawsuit, known ad Williams v. State of California, was settled in August 2004. SMMUSD has engaged in several accountability measures in order to comply with the Williams lawsuit settlement. Among the measures is the requirement to inventory all Board of Education-adopted core materials, including: English, Mathematics, Social Studies, Science, Foreign Languages, Health, and laboratory science materials for high school students.

Assembly Bill 831, Chapter 118, Statutes of 2005, took effect July 25, 2005. AB 831 modified the annual public hearing requirement in Education Code (EC) Section 60119 and modified the expenditure requirements related to Williams instructional materials funds. Under EC Section 60119, the governing board of every local educational agency (LEA) that receives state instructional materials funds must hold an annual public hearing before the end of the eighth week from the first day pupils attend school for that year. At the public hearing, the governing board must make a determination as to whether each pupil in each school has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials, or both, that are aligned to the content standards and are consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum framework adopted by the State Board of Education in reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science. In addition, the definition of sufficiency now provides that each pupil, including each English learner, must have a standards-aligned textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home.

She said she would check with Malibu High School's library specialist to determine why the shipment is late. Mr. Mechur asked what happens in the interim. Dr. Matthews explained that sometimes a missing book is not the primary book for the class. Teachers may be using worksheets until the textbooks arrive.

Mr. de la Torre inquired about "mapping curriculum" at Olympic High School. Dr. Bradford explained that because students come to Olympic and leave throughout year, teachers map out the content standards and use smaller instructional units to allow students to catch up while they attend Olympic.

3 students have insufficient textbooks in the area of English Language Arts; 17 students have insufficient textbooks in the area of math; 154 students have insufficient textbooks in the area of science; 92 students have insufficient textbooks in the area of health. All insufficient texts are on order.

Santa Monica High School:

4 students have insufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials in the following areas of study: Foreign Language. Additional texts have been ordered.

WHEREAS, sufficient laboratory science equipment was provided for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive, and;

WHEREAS, the insufficient textbooks or instructional materials listed above were not provided for the following reasons:

Franklin: Increased enrollment and the opening of a new kindergarten classroom necesitated the ordering of an additional science kindergarten kit.

Malibu High School: Lost textbooks and changes in course enrollments necessitated the ordering of additional textbooks to meet the sufficiency requirements for Earth Science, Environmental Science, Health, Grade 7 English, and Algebra Readiness.

Santa Monica High School: Lost textbooks and changes in course enrollments necessitated the ordering of additional textbooks to meet sufficient requirements in Latin.

WHEREAS, for the 2008-2009 school year, the principals have verified that students at their schools have been provided with sufficient textbooks and instructional materials consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum framework and that any insufficiencies have been addressed by ordering additional texts as needed;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that actions have been taken to ensure that all students have sufficient textbooks or instructional materials in all subjects consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made.

The local governing board of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District hereby certifies that as of this date, each pupil in the district, in kindergarten through grade twelve, has been provided with a standards-aligned textbook or basic instructional materials in each of the following areas:

- History/social science
- Mathematics
- Reading/language arts
- Science

For students in K-8, the instructional materials were purchased from an approved standards-aligned state adoption list as required by *CCR*, *Title 5*, Section 9531.

For students in grades, 9-12, the instructional materials were adopted by the local governing board following district review of the materials and their alignment with state content standards as required by *CCR*, *Title* 5, Section 9531.

Certification was approved by the local governing board at a public meeting held on October 16, 2008.

The State Board of Education adopted new standards-aligned instructional materials for K-8 in Mathematics on November 8, 2007. The local governing board of Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District/County Office of Education has provided each pupil with a standards-aligned textbook or basic instructional materials from this adopted list by September 2, 2008, which is the start of the first school term that is not later than 24 months following the state adoption of these materials.

The local governing board certifies that it has provided each pupil in grades 9-12 in English, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Foreign Language, and Health classes with a standardsaligned textbook or basic instructional materials from this adopted list by September 2, 2008, which is the start of the first school term that is no later than 24 months following the local adoption of these materials. THERFORE, it is resolved that for the 2008-2009 school year, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District has provided each pupil with sufficient textbooks or instructional materials aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the content and cycles of the curriculum frameworks as specified in Education Code section 60119.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

The Superintendent and staff will report on the progress of the Special Education Collaborative to date, its goals and principles. The report will also address the opportunity for community input regarding the draft criteria for the selection of the Special Education Working Group membership, their roles and responsibilities, and the proposed timeline for Working Group applications. Supporting documents are attached.

NOTE: This report was also presented in Malibu on October 2, 2008.

Public Comments:

• Lee Jones, Debra Shepherd, Meredith Hight, and Steve Barnett, members of the community, addressed the board regarding the Special Education Collaborative and the Working group.

Mr. Cuneo clarified that the Director of Special Ed would not be part of the selection process for Working Group membership. Mr. Mechur reiterated that a board member would not be included in the Working Group.

Dr. Escarce emphasized the importance of the selection process being transparent, the group consisting of a broad representation of the community, the meeting schedule being flexible, and the district spreading the word about applications.

Ms. Leon-Vazquez suggested that half of the group should be parents. She remarked that outreach has already started to the ELAC and community liaisons. Mr. de la Torre supported the idea that at least half of the group be made up of parents.

Mr. Mechur commented that insisting on specific percentages of the group's membership limits the selection committee's ability to ensure a broad community representation. Ms. Pye agreed with this statement. Mr. Cuneo added that the district would not know who is interested in applying until the applications are turned in.

Mr. Snell reminded the public that this process takes time, but things are moving in the right direction.

SMMUSD Special Education Collaborative "Working Collaboratively for 21st Century Special Education Students"

Presented at the Board of Education Meetings October 2 and October 16, 2008

Goals of the Collaborative:

- **1.** Make recommendations to the Superintendent that will strengthen the quality and climate of Special Education throughout the district
- 2. Clarify roles and decision making authority as well as inclusive and respectful processes for Special Education
- 3. Develop a collaborative approach for addressing issues of change

Guiding Principles

The intent of this effort is to both strengthen the quality and climate of Special Education <u>and</u> to establish a precedent and a prototype for how the district addresses issues. We want to design and build the *social architecture*, the agreed upon structures and the inclusive and respectful processes that will support educational professionals and the communities they serve to deliberate productively on behalf of what is best for all students.

To be successful, we will have to do the following:

- articulate clear boundaries and decision rights
- agree to explicit rules of engagement
- use a smaller representative working group along with broad community engagement
- design a well-organized, interactive process
- communicate often to all stakeholders about process, progress, and outcomes
- assure that the process is fair and transparent
- build capacity for productively addressing difficult issues
- assure sustainability by identifying the leadership, accountability, and resources for follow through

This will be a fast-tracked process so that recommendations can be incorporated into the next budget cycle. The set of strategic priorities, once approved by the Board, will require ongoing leadership, capacity building, and monitoring.

Project Structure and Roles

The Superintendent:

- appoints the Working Group and receives its recommendations
- keeps the Board and the school community apprised of the progress on a regular basis
- is a member of the Sponsor Group

The Sponsor Group

The Superintendent, CAO, Director of Special Education, and Project Leader will serve as the Sponsor Group for the Special Education Collaborative. The Sponsor Group is part architect, part advisor, and part champion. Over the life of the collaborative, sponsoring work will have four aspects:

- Ensure that the initial expectations are clear, the resources available, and the support sufficient
- Advise and participate as the Working Group requires
- Be informed of the Working Group's deliberations and recommendations
- Translate recommendations into work plans, providing leadership and resources for implementation

Project Lead

The SMMUSD Project Lead will:

- Partner with Claros Group to provide context, plan, and lead the Working Group meetings
- Inspire the Working Group to full constructive participation
- Assure ongoing communication with community stakeholders
- Manage the project timeline and deliverables.

Martha Durán-Contreras is designated as the Project Lead. Her membership in the Sponsor Group will assure consistent communication and guidance. The Project Lead is responsible for assuring frequent communication that keeps all stakeholders informed, efficient use of SMMUSD and consulting resources, and capacity building to support the transformation.

Working Group

The Working Group will convene in November 2008 and work through February 2009, at a minimum. The charge of this group is to review, integrate, and prioritize Special Education goals, strategies, and deliverables currently embedded in disparate documents, including the Barber Report and earlier strategic planning documents. The Working Group will submit recommendations to the Superintendent, who will share these recommendations with the Board in February 2009.

Working Group Participant Roles and Responsibilities:

- Commit up to twenty hours per month for three months to meetings, collecting input, and communicating with key constituents
- Follow the rules of engagement developed by the group
- Actively participate in all deliberations
- Facilitate two-way communication with important stakeholder groups
- Attend all scheduled meetings

Claros Group

This effort will be supported by Laura Peck of the Claros Group and her associates. They provide expertise in organizational assessment and re-modeling and helping organizations navigate change. Ms. Peck will work closely with Martha Durán-Contreras to design and facilitate the project flow as well as the team meetings.

WORKING GROUP

Composition

This work group will have sixteen members, drawn equally from the District and the community.

District members may include principals, psychologists, SDC teachers, RSP, coordinators, speech and language specialists, instructional aides, general education teachers.

Community members may include CREST, Board of Education members, SE parents, GE parents, community members at large.

Others may be invited in as needed, for example, Human Resources, Finance, IT, or legal counsel.

Criteria for Membership Selection

- Represent diversity and a diverse viewpoints <u>and</u> able to consider the good of all
- Have a history of active participation <u>and</u> be willing and ready to have new conversations
- Credible in eyes of peers
- Represent balance of perspectives, grade levels, and school sites
- Willing to hear and respect all perspectives
- Committed to participating in robust communication between the working group and local sites, job-alikes, and the parent community
- Demonstrated leadership skills
- Voluntary service, committed to meeting a minimum of 20 hours/month for four months
- Overlapping membership with key stakeholder groups, including involvement in planning efforts and the Barber report

Selection Process

The Superintendent in consultation with the Sponsor Group develops the criteria for membership of the Working Group.

The Superintendent will give an update on the progress of the Special Education Collaborative as a discussion item at the next two consecutive Board of Education meetings on Oct. 2^{nd} in Malibu and Oct 16^{th} in Santa Monica. This gives an opportunity for community input regarding the criteria. People can also send their written input to Martha Durán-Contreras (duran-contreras@smmusd.org) no later than the 17^{th} of October.

The Sponsor Group will incorporate community feedback regarding criteria and finalize the application for the Working Group. Applications will be available October 20 and due October 30. Applications will be available at the reception desk at the District Office or can be requested from Martha Durán-Contreras, Project Lead, either by phone (310) 450-8338, ext. 282 or by email at duran-contreras@smmusd.org.

In early November, the Superintendent will convene a Selection Committee composed of the Sponsor Group and chairs (or their representatives) from the SEDAC and the PTA-Special Education Committee. The Selection Committee will review the applications for diversity and parity and recommend membership to the Superintendent by November 7th.

The Superintendent will review the recommendations and appoint members to the Working Group in time for the first meeting of the Special Education Collaborative.

RE: 2008 INTENSIVE INTERVENTION SUMMER SCHOOL UPDATE

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

Intensive Intervention Summer School (IISS) for students exiting grades 2 through 12 was held from late June through August 2008.

This presentation will report on the professional development, and implemented curriculum for English Language Arts and Mathematics. Results from students' pre- and post-tests administered during the summer school program, along with longitudinal performance on CSTs for 2007 IISS students will be shared. In addition, a summary of survey data from parents, students and teachers will be presented.

IISS data, a cost analysis of the program, as well as reflections and considerations from the elementary, middle and, high school IISS administrators will provide the basis for discussion of the 2008 IISS program and implications for future development and improvement of the IISS program for 2009.

Public Comments:

• Harry Keiley, SMMCTA President, addressed the board regarding IISS and class sizes.

Dr. Bradford, Dr. Samarge-Powell, and Ms. Serratore thanked the Educational Services staff, school site staff, and IISS parents who helped make IISS a success. (The presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.)

The board requested to see the IISS budget with smaller class sizes incorporated. Ms. Leon-Vazquez suggested the district examine hiring a grant writer in order to find additional funds for IISS.

Mr. Snell asked how we, as a community, are making it a priority to engage the children and their parents. He suggested collaborating with parents to develop strategies for engaging student participation in IISS. He requested to see cohort data broken out by gender.

RE: ADOPT POLICY 5022 - STUDENT AND FAMILY PRIVACY RIGHTS

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Board Policy 5022 - Student and Family Privacy Rights. This policy is required in order to conduct the California Healthy Kids Survey.

COMMENTS: In compliance with the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, CDS now requires that all districts receiving Title IV funds must administer the *California Healthy Kids Survey (CHKS)* biennially to assess needs and demonstrate accountability. The *California Healthy Kids Survey* is a comprehensive, self-report youth survey for grades 5, 7, 9 and 11. It assesses all major areas of health-related risk behavior and resilience, with an emphasis on preventing substance use and violence and on promoting positive youth development and well-being.

> Districts are required to adopt a policy on privacy rights that explicitly addresses the consent process. Before any student can take the survey, both parents and students have to be thoroughly informed about the survey following standard guidelines for the protection of human subjects and given the opportunity to decline survey participation.

This policy and the accompanying Administrative regulations meet the requirements set forth by the California Department of Education (CDE) for the administration of the California Healthy Kids Survey.

DETAIL

The Governing Board believes that personal information concerning district students and their families should be kept private in accordance with the law, including the provisions outlined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

Collection of Personal Information

The board recognizes that in compliance with the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, districts receiving Title IV funds must administer the California Healthy Kids Survey biennially. Guidelines for parent consent to participate in the survey are outlined in the Administrative Regulations for this policy.

The Board prohibits district staff from administering or distributing to students survey instruments that are designed for the purpose of collecting personal information for marketing or for selling that information.

DETAIL

Definition

Personal information means individually identifiable information including a student's or parent/guardian's first and last name, a home or other physical address (including street name and the name of the city or town), a telephone number, or a social security identification number. (20 USC 1232h)

Surveys Requesting Information about Beliefs and Practices A student's parent/guardian shall provide prior written consent before the student participates in a survey containing one or more of the following items: (20 USC 1232h; Education Code 51513)

- Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or his/her family.
- Mental or psychological problems of the student or his/her family.
- 3. Sexual behavior or attitudes or personal beliefs and practices in family life or morality.
- 4. Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating or demeaning behavior.
- 5. Critical appraisals of other individuals with whom students have close family relationships.
- 6. Legally recognized privileged or analogous relationships, such as those of lawyers, physicians or ministers.
- 7. Religious practices, affiliations or beliefs of the student or his/her parent/guardian.
- 8. Income, except to the extent that income is required to be disclosed by law for participation in a program or for receiving financial assistance under such a program.

If a student participates in a survey regarding information about beliefs and practices as identified above, school officials and staff members shall not request or disclose the student's identity.

Notwithstanding the above requirements, the district may administer to students in grades 7-12, anonymous, voluntary, and confidential research and evaluation tools to measure student health risks and behaviors, including tests and surveys about the student's attitudes or practices related to sex as long as parents/guardians are provided written notice and given an opportunity to request that their child not participate. (Education Code 51938)

Exceptions to Collection of Personal Information

Any district restriction regarding collection of personal information shall not apply to the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information collected from students for the purpose of developing, evaluating or providing educational products or services for, or to, students or educational institutions, such as the following: (20 USC 1232h)

- 1. College or other postsecondary education recruitment or military recruitment.
- 2. Book clubs, magazines, and programs providing access to low-cost literary products.
- 3. Curriculum and instructional materials used by elementary and secondary schools.
- 4. Tests and assessments to provide cognitive, evaluative, diagnostic, clinical, aptitude, or achievement information about students (or to generate other statistically useful data for the purpose of securing such tests and assessments) and the subsequent analysis and public release of the aggregate data from such tests and assessments.
- 5. The sale by students of products or services to raise funds for school-related or education-related activities.
- 6. Student recognition programs.

Parent/Guardian Access to Surveys and Instructional Materials Before school staff administers a survey or evaluation containing personal information as identified above or distributes an instrument to a student for the purpose of collecting personal information, the student's parent/guardian may: (20 USC 1232h; Education Code 51938)

 Upon request, inspect that survey or instrument before it is administered or distributed to his/her child or any instructional material used as part of his/her child's educational curriculum.

Within a reasonable period of time of receiving a request, the principal or designee shall permit a parent/guardian to view a survey, instrument or instructional material.

2. Refuse to allow his/her child to participate in the activity.

Students whose parents/guardians exercise this option shall not be penalized by the district. (20 USC 1232h)

Health Examinations

No school official or staff member shall subject a student to a non-emergency, invasive physical examination as a condition for school attendance, except as permitted or required under California law. (20 USC 1232h)

Invasive physical examination means any medical examination that involves the exposure of private body parts or any act during such examination that includes incision, insertion or injection into the body, but does not include a properly authorized hearing, vision or scoliosis screening. (20 USC 1232h)

Notifications

At the beginning of the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of: (20 USC 1232h)

- 1. The district's policy regarding student privacy.
- 2. The process to opt their children out of participation in any activity described in this policy and administrative regulation.
- 3. The specific or approximate dates during the school year when the following activities are scheduled:
 - a. Survey requesting personal information
 - b. Physical exams or screenings

RE: REVISE BOARD POLICY 5141.7 - SEIZURE DISORDERS-USE OF APPARATUS, SWIMMING, AND SHOP EQUIPMENT

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education revise BP 5141.7 Seizure Disorder, to allow students with seizure disorders to participate in activities that involve swimming, apparatus or shop equipment if they have written clearance from their physicians.

COMMENTS: Students were formerly required to be seizure-free for one to two years in order participate in activities that involved swimming, apparatus or shop equipment. School health officials are recommending that participation should be determined by the student's personal physician. The student would be required to obtain clearance annually and submit a letter at the beginning of each school year to provide up-to-date information to the health staff on the student's condition.

Attached is the revised policy with the new language underlined. The text to be removed has been stricken.

DETAIL

The policy of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District regarding seizure disorders (epilepsy) is as follows:

- 1. A student Students with seizure disorder must have been seizure free for one year to use apparatus in physical education classes (even though on medication.)
- 2. A student must have been seizure free for two years to swim or use shop equipment:
 - (a) Elementary children with a seizer disorder may take part in a swimming program providing the parent accompanies the child to each session and providing that the parent assists the instructor in watching the child.
 - (b) Letters from the student's physician and parent, giving consent to the use of shop equipment, or participation in the swimming activity are required.

Students with seizure disorder must present a letter from their physician and parent/guardian to the school nurse or principal at the beginning of each school year that specifically gives consent for the student's participation in swimming, use of shop equipment or playground apparatus.

• In accordance with State and/or Federal regulations, the Bilingual Advisory Committee is charged with collecting, reviewing, and analyzing data and collecting public opinion concerning issues related to Bilingual students and their achievement on the California State standards in English, Math, Science, and Social Studies, as well as, their mastery of English. The Board will review the committee's findings in its annual report.

CHILD CARE and DEVELOPMENT

The charge to the Child Care and Development DAC shall be:

- Continue work to increase the number of full time preschool children served. Open a new full day classroom at Washington West in September 2008.
- Implement a database enrollment system.
- Use the summer months to create special transition programs to prepare 4-year-olds for kindergarten. Involve families in the transition activities. Enroll kindergarten children whose families want childcare as early as possible to assist in their transition to kindergarten before and after school programs.
- Work with Ed Services to provide opportunities for CDS preschool and CREST teachers and kindergarten teachers to interact and cross train.
- Continue to work with site facility planning committees at each CDS site.
- Work with the Special Education DAC to establish communication between the DACs and to participate in planning for Special Education preschool and CDS preschool and CREST programs to enhance inclusion opportunities.

COMMUNITY HEALTH and SAFETY

The charge of the Community Health and Safety DAC shall be:

- Assist, inform, and support the board on issues related to student health, wellness, and safety.
- Monitor contemporary issues in health and safety that have a direct impact on school age children.
- Encourage developmentally appropriate health and physical education in all schools.
- Identify community resources to enhance health and safety in schools.
- Identify community resources to provide supplemental mental health supports for children and families.
- Review the literature and best practices associated with healthy eating, delivery of student meals and student consumption of meals aimed at the reduction of childhood obesity and establishing healthy life-long eating habits to support its work.

VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS

The charge of the Visual and Performing Arts DAC shall be:

- Serve as a vehicle for parents, community, teachers, and students to communicate with the Board of Education on matters related to all students' equitable access to and successful participation in comprehensive, sequential, standards-based PreK-12 Arts Education. A comprehensive arts education program, with the arts taught as discrete disciplines, should be an integral part of the core curriculum offered to all students at all grade levels.
- Assess our current Visual and Performing Arts programs (Dance, Music, Theatre, and Visual Arts).
- Compare the District's curriculum scheduling, staffing, instructional materials, equipment, and facilities with national and state standards and frameworks.

• Work with various agencies to explore funding to support the Visual and Performing Arts programs.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Special Education DAC will be discussing its draft charges at its meeting on October 14, after which those recommended draft charges will come forward for board discussion at a future board meeting.

The Staff liaison is charged with the review of Policy and Administrative Regulation 1220. They are expected to determine adherence to general guidelines with respect to roles, functions, responsibilities, membership, election, and terms of office, meetings, and operations. A report detailing compliance will be filed with the Chief Academic Officer no later than November 1, 2008. Accompanying the report will be a calendar of meetings of which there will be no less than five (5) scheduled during this academic year.

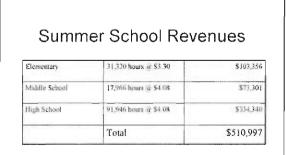
High School Administrator Reflections

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

In June 2003, voters approved a qualified special property tax known as Measure S, which authorized the levying of a special per parcel tax within the boundaries of the Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu for (6) years. A significant provision of this particular Measure was the formation of a Board-appointed "resident taxpayer oversight committee to review administration of and compliance with Measure S. The Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) was charged by the Board of Education with those Measure S responsibilities.

Furthermore, Measure S also required that, the FOC review the independent financial audit of all Measure S expenditures and financial activities for the immediately preceding fiscal year and review spending projections for the upcoming fiscal year. The FOC reports its findings on these matters as part of its annual report to the Board. This will be the final year for the report on Measure S as the voters approved a new parcel tax, Measure R, on February 5, 2008. This Measure combined and replaced the previous Measure S and Measure Y parcel taxes. Beginning with fiscal year 2008-09, the FOC will assume the oversight responsibilities associated with Measure R. (Action appointing the FOC as the oversight committee for Measure R is expected during the major action item portion of this Board Meeting.)

Therefore, in compliance with the foregoing, the Board of Education will convene a joint session with the Financial Oversight Committee on June 5, 2008 at 7:00 p.m. for the purpose of addressing the following items:

- I. Report from the FOC as presented by Chair Paul Silvern
 - A. Introduction
 - B. Summary of FOC Activities During FY 2007-08
 - C. Report on Measure S Expenditures
 - D. Views on the Proposed 2008-09 District Budget
 - E. Proposed FOC Focus for FY 2008-09
- II. Discussion between the Board of Education and the FOC

Public Comments:

• Gleam Davis, a member of the community, voiced her support for the FOC suggestions.

CFO Jan Maez introduced the FOC members. Chair Paul Silvern summarized the FOC report, which can be found at the end of these minutes under Attachments.

Dr. Escarce said he disagreed with the FOC's phrase "persistent deficit spending." He said that during this budget crisis, the district is having to make large budget cuts, and should draw on the reserve funds to support programs that are valuable to students. Ms. Maez suggested that the district might want to evaluate its budgeting practices and that the FOC could assist in that process. Mr. de la Torre proposed SMMUSD examine best practices for budget planning in other districts. Dr. Wisnicki suggested the district could receive budget planning and deficit spending advice from a group like FCMAT. She expressed her confidence in the district's financial health. Ms. Hoffman said the district has a reserve due, in part, to measures such as aggressive hiring freezes and approving interdistrict permits. Mr. Silvern warned against including large, one-time funding sources in the budget planning process, considering they can be unreliable from year to year. Ms. Leon-Vazquez commented that a school district needs to find a balance between the needs of the children and teachers with fiscal responsibility. Mr. Snell suggested examining existing models to gradually reduce budget deficits. He and Mr. Mechur welcomed FOC involvement regarding cost reductions in Special Education, while maintaining programs. Ms. Pye asked for more analysis addressing where the district is historically regarding carryover, managing student attendance, and a deliberate approach to spending reserves. Ms. Hoffman suggested the district not use one-time money to fund ongoing programs. Mr. de la Torre suggested the idea of a model to incentivize teachers who teach in places of greatest need. Mr. Silvern clarified for Mr. de la Torre that he has never opposed future raises for labor groups, but has expressed concern regarding the percentage of an increase.

The board unanimously supported having the FOC review the district budget prior to the onset of labor negotiations. The board also agreed to the FOC assisting in developing a financial model for the Special Education program.

Presentation to the Board of Education by the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Financial Oversight Committee Paul J. Silvern, Chair June 5, 2008

Good evening Members of the Board of Education. On behalf of your Financial Oversight Committee (FOC), we welcome this opportunity to review the FOC's work during the past year and to offer our observations about certain District financial matters.

Introduction

The Financial Oversight Committee, now in its seventh year of operation, is a ninemember committee of professional and community members appointed by the Board to provide you and District management with advice and counsel on a variety of financial matters. According to the charge you gave us our responsibilities include:

- Reviewing and commenting on the District's annual financial audit, the interim financial reports to the Los Angeles County Office of Education, the proposed annual budget and annual enrollment projections;
- Assisting in the development of a long-term financial plan for the District;
- Reviewing issues that could have a significant impact on District finances before the Board makes decisions about them, including proposed labor settlements;
- Serving as the Taxpa yer Oversight Committee charged with reviewing the District's administration of and compliance with the terms of Measure S, the 2003 parcel tax approved by District voters in June 2003 (and, pending Board action, an equivalent new responsibility for the replacement Measure R);
- Monitoring and advising about the funding agreements between the District and the City
 of Santa Monica and the City of Malibu; and
- Assisting the District to educate the general public about school finance issues.

We believe that the District is on a relatively firm financial footing as it approaches the adoption of its budget for FY 2008-09, but there are, as usual, many significant financial challenges that the Board will need to confront. On the positive side, the District has received independent confirmation from municipal bond rating agencies that its general financial condition is improving. In October, the District received an upgraded rating for the Measure "BB" facilities bonds from Moodys Investors Service. Even more impressively, in April 2008, Standard & Poor's upgraded its rating on all District debt instruments by two notches, to AA from A+. In doing so, Standard & Poor's highlighted voter approval of Measure "R," the District's funding contract with the City of Santa Monica, growth in its unreserved fund balance, and the general strength of the Santa Monica, Malibu and general Los Angeles metro area economies.

On the other hand, the State's \$15 billion (and growing) budget deficit, and the protracted debate that is likely to occur this summer between the Governor and the Legislature about how to close the liscal gap, raise significant concerns about the fate of funding for K-12 education in California. More specific to the District, the Los Angeles County Office of Education continues to raise concerns about the District's deficit financing practices, funding of labor settlements by drawing down reserves, the expiring term of the contract with the City of Santa Monica, and the budgetary impacts of the continuing decline in student enrollment.

Against that general backdrop, the topics we want to discuss with you tonight include the following:

- A brief summary of FOC's activities during FY 2007-08;
- 2. Our report on audited Measure's expenditures during FY 2006-07, which is our final report on this subject due to the replacement of this parcel tax with Measure "R."
- 3. Comments about the proposed plan for use of revenues from the new Measure R parcel tax for FY 2008-09;
- 4. Comments on the current draft of the FY 2008-09 District budget; and
- 5. Recommendations on several specific District financial issues.

FOC's Activities During FY 2007-08

This year has been another busy one for the FOC, during which we accomplished the following:

- Participated in two series of interviews with candidates for the permanent CFO position, culminating in the selection of Jan Maez in September 2007;
- Met with the District's auditor to review the FY 2006-07 audit of District finances and Measure Sexpenditures;
- Reviewed the 1st and 2nd Interim Reports, the P-1 and P-2 enrollment counts. District staff projections of enrollment and Average Daily Attendance (ADA), and various proposed budget transfers;
- Reviewed, discussed and provided comments to the Board on a variety of other financial matters, including three labor settlements and their associated AB 1200 analyses; the Barber & Associates Report on the District's Special Education program; and the new DecisionInsite enrollment forecast.
- Monitored the implementation of the Measure "BB" facilities bond program, including participation of a subcommittee that advises the CFO and Program Manager on the overall financial strategy for the program; and

 Reviewed and discussed the initial draft of the District's FY 2008-09 budget, including plans for expenditures from Measure "R" revenues;

In addition, several of our members were actively involved in recommending a strategy to replace the two previous parcel taxes (Measures "S" and "Y") and the successful campaign for Measure "R."

The FOC's work this year benefited from a productive working relationship with the Superintendent, former Interim CFO Dr. Steve Hodgson, new CFO Jan Maez, the District's outstanding fiscal staff, and other senior District staff. Once again, we want to acknowledge Dawn Smithfield, in particular, who provides administrative support to the FOC and who continues to handle the parcel tax senior exemption program with unusual diligence and tact.

We were again very fortunate to have active participation in our meetings by our Board liaisons, Maria Leon-Vazquez and Kelly Pye, who provided valuable insights about Board policy. Other members of the Board also attended our monthly meetings from time to time. Although our meetings this year did not attract quite as many members of the public and press as last year, public knowledge about our work was enhanced by regular posting of our agendas and minutes on the Board's Web site.

Measure "S" Expenditures

The Quality Public Education Preservation Act of 2003, more commonly known as Measure "S," was the parcel tax approved by District voters in June 2003. Measure "S" imposed a \$225 tax on each parcel of land in Santa Monica and Malibu within the District's boundaries, with exemptions for qualifying seniors. The tax was rescinded in February 2008 as part of voter approval of Measure "R." As such this is the FOC's final report on Measure "S."

With a total of about 32,400 property parcels in the District, and after deductions for the estimated number of senior exemptions and tax payment delinquencies, Measure "S" generated about \$6.5 million annually for the District. Under the terms of Measure "S" these funds were to be used to:

- · Restore/replace programs cut due to State funding reductions;
- Sustain student achievement and fulfill the District's core curriculum, including music, arts and athletics; and
- Provide independent expenditure accountability.

The Board assigned the independent expenditure accountability role to the FOC. Each year we reviewed the proposed annual expenditure plan for the following year, and reviewed the actual, audited expenditures from the prior year, all in terms of their consistency with the Measure's purposes.

thasmuch as Measure "S" has now been rescinded, our final review is limited to actual Measure "S" expenditures for last year (i.e., FY 2006-07). The District's auditor concluded that actual expenditures were consistent with the Board's adopted expenditure plan that was included in the FY 2006-07 budget, both as to dollar amounts and distribution by category. That spending plan included the allocations shown in Table 1.

Accurate tracking of these expenditures was made possible by assigning them the specific account code number 91221. There were no audit exceptions or recommendations from the auditor for changes to Measure "S" accounting procedures or practices. Thus, the Board and public can be assured that, once again, last year's expenditures were consistent with what the expenditure purposes that District voters approved in 2003. Proposed expenditures from Measure "S" for this year (i.e., FY 2007-08) were reviewed by FOC last June and included in the adopted budget.

Two issues with respect to administration of Measure "S" arose in FY 2007-08. First, the Board agreed to waive the parcel tax on those properties that sustained 50 percent or greater damage to property as a result of the winter fires in Malibu. The number of such cases was expected to be small. Second, a communication error between the District and the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office caused some seniors who were eligible for the Measure "S" exemption to be incorrectly charged for the parcel tax. The District promptly made refunds to property owners as warranted. Again, the number of parcels involved was very small.

Table 2 provides an historical overview of actual Measure "S" expenditures since the FOC has been reviewing them. It shows that since FY 2004-05, Measure "S" provided a total of about \$19.8 million to support District classroom programs (not including unaudited expenditures in FY 2007-08), including class-size reduction, music and the arts, physical education and the library program. This enabled the District to provide the kinds of high-quality programming that District voters expect, but for which there is insufficient State funding.

Proposed Measure "R" Expenditures for FY 2008-09

In anticipation of Board action to assign the FOC with independent oversight responsibilities under Measure "R," the FOC also reviewed the District staff's plan for expenditures of those revenues next year.

Measure "R" is a replacement parcel tax for the previous Measure "Y" and Measure "S" parcel taxes, which were rescinded with the adoption of Measure "R." The Measure "R" tax amount is \$346 per parcel th is year. Like the previous Measure "Y" (but not Measure "S"), it will be adjusted in future years for inflation by the change in the local Consumer Price Index. Like Measure "S" (but not Measure "Y"), it provides an exemption for qualifying seniors, but has no sunset date.

Revenues from Measure "R" are to be used for the following purposes:

- To preserve program s ands replace funds lost or reduced due to inadequate state funding;
- To sustain achievement in reading, writing, and mathematics for all students at all grade levels and to fulfill the District's core curriculum which includes music. arts, and athletics;
- · To attract and retain, highly qualified teachers; and
- To protect the taxpayers' investment in education and ensure District accountability by providing for special citizen financial oversight and independent annual audits of revenues and expenditures.

Measure "R" also requires that funds be deposited into a separate account, that a "citizen financial oversight committee" review District administration of and compliance with Measure "R," provides for public review of the expenditure plan, and requires an annual audit of expenditures.

The proposed Measure "R" expenditure plan for FY 2008-09 totals \$10.3 million and is shown on the following page. It funds 71.3 FTE teacher positions at all grade levels, and provides \$1.1 million for the Art & Music Program, about \$580,000 for the Physical Education Program, \$1.3 million for the Library Program, about \$1.0 million for technology expenditures, and \$66,000 for administrative costs, including the annual audit. This expenditure plan was reviewed by the FOC at its regular meeting on June 3, 2008. The plan is very similar to the expenditure priorities applied to Measure "S" revenues, but also adds expenditures for technology management. This appropriately supports the technology capital investment being made through he Measure "BB" bond program. The FOC concludes that the expenditure plan is consistent with the stated purposes of Measure "R," and recommends that the Board approve it.

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Proposed FY 2008-09 District Budget

The general financial context for considering the District's FY 2008-09 budget is unusually uncertain. As noted above, the \$15 billion State deficit, and the budget debate that will take place this summer, forces all California school districts to plan for next year without a complete understanding about State revenues and program requirements. Although the Governor's May Revision of the proposed State budget retracted some of the more draconian cuts that were initially proposed in January, guidance from the Los Angeles County Office of education is to expect no growth in Revenue Limit funding and zero Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) funding for next year, assume reductions in some categorical program revenues, to shy away from using some of the cost reduction options discussed in the May Revision because they are simply poor financial practice (e.g., reducing the Reserve for Economic Uncertainty and the Routine Restricted Maintenance sel-aside), and to be very cautious about assuming any COLAs for the next couple of years. Whether the Legislature will accept the Governor's latest proposals, including the State lottery securitization strategy that is central to the financing plan, or move in the direction recommended by the Legislative Analyst's Office which is more favorable to K-12. education funding, or pursue some completely different approach, is all very much in question. It will undoubtedly be a long, hot summer of budget negotiations in Sacramento.

Nevertheless, the District must adopt its budget by the end of this month. The FOC's ability to provide comment to the Board on the proposed budget is aided by the excellent work of Ms. Maez and the fiscal staff, who work diligently to keep up with ever-changing circumstance in Sacramento, and the fact that the Board continued its recent practice of discussing the draft budget at several Board meetings and special workshops. This is a significant improvement in the budget preparation process.

The FOC applauds the District staff's continuing effort to analyze staffing ratios and the Board's support for making the staffing reductions that are needed to correspond with the continued decline in student enrollment, most of which is related to Board policy to limit out-of-District permits. And, in light of the negative revenue impacts from declining enrollment and State funding uncertainty, we also support the Board's decision to addadditional student permits for next year.

We remain very concerned, however, about the projected scale and growth of the operating deficit in the Unrestricted General Fund, which is the District's primary operating account. The three-year projection shows a deficit of about -\$2.6 million next fiscal year and a cumulative total deficit over the three-year projection period of -\$4.7 million. This is at odds with the Board's very first adopted budgeting principle, which is to maintain balance between current and future year income and expenditures so as to ensure the long-term financial integrity of the District. The Los Angeles County Office of Education has routinely cautioned the District about the need to reduce its projected operating deficit. As we noted in our report last year, new research by School Services of California shows that persistent deficit spending may be a better indicator of future fiscal difficulty than an inability to meet the minimum three percent reserve benchmark. We urge the staff and Board to continue searching for ways to reduce costs, increase revenues, or both, including the identified, but not fully quantified "budgetary solution strategies" list initiated last year.

The deficit is, in part, a result of generous labor settlements approved this year with all three of the District's bargaining units, but without any commensurate reductions in expenditures or identification of new on-going revenues. Insteact, the operating deficit is financed by drawing down reserves. While the proposed budget indicates that the District will be able to fund the minimum required three percent reserve for economic uncertainties throughout the projection period, there will be steady erosion of the unallocated fund balance at a rate that is between \$2 million and \$3 million each year. In addition to being poor financial practice, this trend threatens to undermine one of the key reasons that Standard & Poor's upgraded its rating on District debt instruments.

Further, it should also be remembered that the proposed District budget is a best case scenario. It assumes, for example, <u>m</u> additional cost increases resulting from future labor negotiations with any of the District's bargaining units over the next three years, and assumes renewal of the City-District contract, which is far from a certainty for many reasons. The Board will need to be vigilant about maintaining District reserves, controlling costs and aggressively searching for new revenues in order for the District to remain financially sound.

Although we are mindful of the time pressure that staff faces each year in preparing the budget, we want to reiterate several suggestions about the budget process that have not yet been acted on:

- Budget to Meet Specific District Objectives. We continue to recommend that the budget be
 presented in the context of the educational and management objectives and priorities for the
 coming year. We believe that doing so will assist the Board to better align expenditure
 decisions with its planning objectives, and provide more clarity to the public.
- Show Information on All Funds. We continue to recommend that the budget presentation include a summary of all District funds, and not just the Unrestricted General Fund. While the General Fund, including both its unrestricted and restricted funds is clearly the most significant component of the total budget, we believe the Board and public should see a more complete picture of the District's total budget.
- Improve Public Communication. Finally, we once again recommend that the budget
 presentation make better use of graphics to help explain the proposed District budget. School
 district finance in California is particularly complicated and difficult for the average citizen
 to grasp. Although the school- and program-based budgets have been useful, the agenda
 reports to the Board do not explain the budget structure as clearly as it could. We should be
 using every opportunity to educate voters and the public in general about the condition of
 District finances.

Specific Recommendations for Future Action

In our joint meeting with the Board last year, we made six specific recommendations for your consideration. We are pleased to report that progress has been made on four of them:

• Redouble Efforts to Identify and Select a Highly Qualified CFO. We urged the District to continue its search for a highly-qualified CFO, a search made more difficult by the controversy surrounding Mr. Braham's resignation. Some of our members participated in

two rounds of selection interviews and we were pleased with the selection of Jan Maezlast September. The FOC has had a very good working relationship with Jan in the intervening months.

- Reconcile Conflicting Enrollment Forecasts. Because the short-term enrollment
 projection prepared for the District by FCMAT in 2007 was at serious odds with the more
 optimistic projection prepared for the draft Facilities Master Plan, and because the
 District's financial and facilities strategies depend heavily on an accurate picture of future
 enrollment changes, we urged more careful attention to this matter. The District
 commissioned a new enrollment forecast from DecisionInsite, which confirmed
 FCMAT's concerns about continuing future enrollment declines. Although we have
 some reservations about certain aspects of this new forecast, we believe it provides a
 better basis for District financial and program planning.
- Initiate a Financial Evaluation of the Special Education Strategy: We have consistently recommended that the District initiate a complete evaluation of the plan that was put in place a few years ago to slow the rate of increase in the costs of Special Education. The recently completed B arber & Associates Report sheds important new light on the historical pattern of program revenue and costs and that will assist the District to achieve a better balance between service delivery and the cost of services.
- Minimum Analysis Required for Future Labor Negotiations. We recommended that, at minimum, the Board require staff or other experts to prepare multi-year financial projections for a range of settlement scenarios using either the AB1200 process and/or FCMAT's Budget Explorer software to project financial impacts before reaching a tentative agreement. Although the FOC is not privy to exactly what information is provided to District regotiators and union representatives, Jan Maez reports to us that multi-year scenarios are being considered.

On the other hand, not much progress was made on the other two FOC recommendations:

- Plan to Eliminate the Operating Deficit Within Five Years. We recommended that the Board set this objective and fashion its budget strategy around it. Instead, the District continues to spend more than it receives in revenue, and balances its books by drawing down reserves. This is an unsustainable practice and should be ended in a planned manner.
- Strengthen the "Accountability" Provisions in the City-District Agreement. Finally, we
 recommended that the "accountability" provision in the Master Facilities Use Agreement
 between the City and the District should be strengthened. No progress was made on this
 issue. In light flevents during this school year, movement on this issue will be essential
 to win renewal other City-District contract.

For FY 2008-09, the FOC proposes to focus on the following two issues, in addition to the other responsibilities assigned by the Board:

- Explore an Appropriate FOC Role in District Financial Condition Evaluation Prior to the Commencement of Labor Negotiations. Salaries and benefits now account for 91 percent of the Unrestricted General Fund. Thus, settlements with the bargaining units are among the most significant financial decisions the Board makes each year. Yet the FOC plays no role in this process until after settlements have been reached. As FOC Vice Chair Cynthia Torres has observed, this is financial "hindsight," not "oversight." The FOC believes there is a constructive role it can play in developing neutral analytic information that will assist the parties in their deliberations without interfering with the Board's responsibilities or the rules that govern the collective bargaining process. We propose that the Board, District staff and FOC consult with experts in the field to identify options for constructive roles that the FOC can play to inform the front end of this process.
- Assist in the Development of a Financial Management Plan for Special Education. As noted above, the Barber & Associates Report shed important new light on the costs and revenues associated with the District's Special Education program. Consistent with the direction articulated by Superintendent Talarico in mid-March, the FOC proposes to play a constructive role in helping to develop a financial management plan for Special Education. This may involve, for example, working with District staff and any outside consultant retained by the District to develop a work plan and schedule for this task so that it is coordinated with the development of the program plan, developing quarterly program revenue and expenditure reporting that can serve as both a useful information and management tool, and continuing to clarifying the overall picture of Special Education revenues and costs.
