A. Student Board Member Reports

Student Board Member Kim reported that Freshman Camp will be on August 24. Incoming freshmen will fill out a questionnaire, participate in orientation, and receive information regarding Samohi and clubs. Welcome Spirit Week will be September 14-19. Themed days include Twin Day, Jersey Day, Animal Day, Superhero Day, and Blue & Gold Day. Students will participate in a Welcome Rally in September 11. During the rally, representatives from ASB, sport teams, and the teaching staff will welcome the students. On the first day of school, ASB members will be wearing shirts that say, "ASK ME!" so that new students know who they can go to for answers. On their birthdays, teachers will receive cards and notes from students to let them know how much they are appreciated. On September 25, there will be a leadership training session called Coach On and Off the Court for ASB students. Summer school graduation was held on August 6.

6:55 pm X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

Superintendent Cuneo remarked on this difficult time of mourning due to the passing of Irma Lyons, Principal of Will Rogers Learning Community. He said he was grateful to the community for coming together. He thanked Dr. Chou, Ms. Harris, and Mr. Harris for helping with the logistics and issues in preparing

to deal with this tragedy. He also thanked the site's PTA and Assistant Principal Mary Anna Novek for helping to organize the community reception that honored what Ms. Lyons had stood for. Regarding hiring a new permanent principal for the site, Mr. Cuneo said that as of yesterday, the district had received thirty-nine applications. Dr. Matthews and the HR staff are diligently looking for an educator with STEM experience in order to continue the site's STEM focus. Applications will be screened during the second week of September. A panel of administrators, parents, and staff will then hold a first round of interviews. The top three applicants will then interview with the Superintendent and senior staff. In the mean time, Jerry Harris will continue as Interim Principal to assist in the opening of school. Mr. Harris was at the site last spring and is a highly experienced educator. Ms. Freedman has helped to establish counseling resources now and for when students return to camps in September. Will Rogers parents will be receiving a letter with information about how to help children deal with death and loss.

Mr. Cuneo reported on another loss in the community. Council Member Bobby Shriver's mother passed away. Eucine Shriver was a staunch advocate for children with disabilities. A letter of condolence was sent on behalf of the Board of Education.

Dr. Sara Woolverton is the district's new Director of Special Education. She is actively involved in working through issues and is committed to carrying on the work of the Special Education group and its recommendations. Dr. Woolverton will be focusing on the programmatic component of Special Education. She has planned a retreat with the coordinators and all of special education staff.

As of July 22, all of the Series B general obligation bonds for Measure BB have been purchased. Mr. Cuneo thanked Ms. Maez and Mr. Mechur for their assistance in New York during the bond rating meeting. In regards to the Measure R parcel tax, the district will be collecting \$10.3 million (after subtracting approximately \$958,000 from senior exemptions).

Mr. Cuneo said everyone should be proud of the district's performance on the STAR tests. He thanked the students and the dedication of a committed, professional staff. The results show a steady, consistent increase in student achievement. SMMUSD outperformed L.A. County and the state averages. ACT scores were released this morning; again, SMMUSD out-performed the state. Mr. Cuneo reported that he met with new teachers today during orientation. He expressed the district's commitment to standards and high expectations of all students.

There are many exciting professional development activities going on right now, including the new teacher academy, the SMART Board Academy, and retreats for the administrative team. Administrators will be learning about recent changes in policies and special education.

Enrollment projections show most of the district's schools are at capacity, but this won't be confirmed until students are in the seats. Starting with the first day of the new semester, district staff will closely monitor enrollment and staffing to ensure staffing levels are correct.

Mr. Cuneo concluded his report by announcing the district's technology consultant is collaborating with the city's consultants to determine how Board of Education meetings can be broadcast live via webcasting.

COMMENT: <u>History:</u> The Board of Education directed staff to proceed with the Measure BB Technology Implementation Plan for both the Data Center and site infrastructure during the Board of Education meeting of April 17, 2008, based on discussion and presentation of the Implementation Plan on April 16, 2008 to the Board of Education. This bid included core and edge switches, WAN and internet routing equipment upgrades, hardware to support wireless networking and VOIP (Voice over IP systems), but did not include classroom technology.

Classroom technology standards were presented to the Board of Education by the District's technology consultant, Darryl Vidal on April 16, 2008 during a special Board workshop.

The Board of Education approved five (5) secondary school demonstration classrooms in the fall of 2007 and an evaluation of these rooms was presented to the Board of Education during its Board meeting of July 24, 2008.

The Board of Education approved funding for twenty (20) elementary demonstration classrooms during its board meeting of May 21, 2009. These installations will be used as a basis for the evaluation of the equipment and its integration with instructional technology at the elementary classrooms level.

Next Steps

Based on the evaluation of the equipment in all demonstration classrooms both secondary and elementary level, District staff will then be able to proceed with standards for all classrooms throughout the District.

It is recommended that the Board of Education appoint up to 25 35 citizens to examine the feasibility of an emergency and temporary parcel tax to offset all or a portion of the budget deficit due to the State budget crisis. In addition the committee is to explore the potential of a capitol bond measure to modernize the district's schools.

The Committee charge:

- The committee will be charged with the following goals:
 - o Report to the Board of Education in two phases: 1) with a recommendation regarding the feasibility of an emergency and temporary parcel tax and 2) future capitol improvement bond measure to modernize the district's schools.
 - Work with a polling firm to craft questions for community input.
 - Work with the Chief Financial Officer to delineate the steps necessary to place a parcel tax and/or bond measure on a future ballot or special election and retain the necessary counsel for each step of the process.
 - The Phase I report, regarding the feasibility of an emergency and temporary parcel tax, should be made no later than the December 10, 2009, board meeting. The Phase II report, regarding the feasibility of a capitol improvement bond measure, should be made no later than the March 4, 2010, board meeting.
- The committee would be authorized to expend up to \$50,000 to poll the electorate.

A press release was distributed on July 17, 2009, announcing that applications to be on the committee were available on the district website. Completed applications were due to the Superintendent's Office no later than August 11, 2009. Los Angeles County Plan for Expelled Pupils (Education Code Section 48926)

Introduction

The Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts within the county, have developed the following county-wide plan for providing educational services to expelled pupils within the county pursuant to California Education Code, Section 48926. In addressing the needs of all expelled pupils, the county-wide plan shall:

- enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils;
- · identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils;
- identify strategies for filling those gaps in services; and,
- identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their required rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

To address the needs of expelled pupils, a number of alternative education programs have been developed by local school districts and the Los Angeles County Office of Education to provide continuing educational opportunities.

Section 48916.1 provides that at the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board shall ensure that an education program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Any educational program provided pursuant to this section may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.

To address the needs of expelled pupils, a number of alternative education programs have been developed by local school districts and the Los Angeles County Office of Education to provide continuing educational opportunities.

Profile

The Division of Student Support Services (SSS) serves school districts and LACOE programs, and provides technical assistance in the areas of student discipline, pupil records, custody of minors, education for homeless children and youth, compulsory attendance and truancy reduction, counseling and guidance, dental disease prevention, health services, gang prevention and intervention, school violence reduction, safe school planning, and emergency response and crisis intervention. SSS is responsible for handling expulsion appeals to the county board of education of students expelled from the school districts, and providing support for students, parents, and school districts who are participating in the expulsion appeal process.

Educational Alternatives for Expelled Pupils

School districts located within Los Angeles County provide a number of options for expelled pupils, depending on the specific violation of Sections 48900, 48900.2, 48900.3, 48900.4 and 48900.7 of the California Education Code. The alternative education program to which an expelled pupil may be assigned is preceded by a decision of the local governing board which may provide for one of the following expulsion orders which describes the students' educational placement:

- Suspended enforcement of the expulsion order with placement on the same school campus [EC § 48917 (a)];
- Suspended enforcement of the expulsion order with placement on a different school campus within the district or an alternative program such as opportunity or continuation school programs [EC § 48917(a)];
- Expulsion with a referral to a District Community Day School program, if available [EC § 48660]; or,
- 4. Expulsion with a referral to a county community school or other appropriate program operated by the Los Angeles County Office of Education [EC § 1981(c)].

A pupil who is expelled for violation for an act listed in subdivision (c) of EC § 48915 (mandatory expulsion section), shall be assigned to a program of study that meets all of the following conditions:

- (1) Is appropriately prepared to accommodate pupils who exhibit discipline problems.
- (2) Is not provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school.
- (3) Is not housed at the school site attended by the pupil at the time of suspension.

At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Any education program provided may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.

District Operated Programs

The range of alternative programs currently offered by school districts throughout Los Angeles County includes the following options:

- · Community Day Schools;
- · Independent Study (offered in conjunction with a classroom option);
- · Opportunity School/Class;
- · Continuation High School;
- · Adult Education Programs; and,
- · Special Education.

If a school district is unable to provide a suitable program or if the expelled pupil fails to meet the term and conditions of his or her rehabilitation plan or if the student continues to pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board, the district may refer the expelled pupil to the Los Angeles County Office of Education for possible placement in a program operated by the Division of Alternative Education (DAE).

County Operated Programs

The Los Angeles County Office of Education currently provides a variety of alternative education programs that are designed to help pupils:

- · take a renewed interest in school and learning;
- attend school consistently; and,
- · set and attain academic and career goals.

Specifically, these programs are designed to serve:

- · Students who are having trouble at home or school;
- · Expecting and Parenting Teens;
- · Homeless and Foster Children and Youth;
- Students who are on probation or students who need to work full-time to support themselves and/or their families; and,
- Students who have been expelled and for whom a district operated education program is not available.

Programs designed to serve the above identified pupil populations include those operated by the LACOE Division of Alternative Education (DAE) include:

- · Community Day Schools;
- Independent Study (operated in conjunction with a classroom option);
- California School Age Families Education Program (Cal-SAFE);
- · Partnership Programs

As previously stated, at the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an educational program is provided for the pupil subject to the expulsion order. For districts that may be unable to provide pupils who commit serious behavior violations with an alternative program that meets the restrictive requirements of California Education Code Section 48915 (d) (see appendix), selected county programs may provide viable options.

It is anticipated that the majority of expelled pupils who are referred to the county office for placement in an alternative program will be assigned to a *community day school program*. Community day schools operated by the county are designed to provide interventions for elementary school pupils (primarily in grades 4, 5 and 6); middle school pupils, grades 7 and 8; and high school pupils in grades 9 through 12.

Educational Service Gaps and Strategies to Address Service Gaps

Section 48926 of the California Education Code provides that each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980: ... shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. One of the required elements of the plan is to identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps.

To address this element and identify additional service needs to expelled pupils, a survey of all school districts in Los Angeles County was conducted (see appendix: AB 922 District Questionnaire).

As a result of that survey, the following service gaps were identified, including a discussion of each issue along with a proposed strategy:

Service Gap No. 1 - Education Programs for Expelled Special Education Students

Discussion: Fifteen school districts expressed a need for more Special Education alternatives for expelled students, including Emotionally Disturbed (ED), Resource Specialist Program (RSP) and Special Day Class (SDC - 3 districts expressed a need). Four districts are interested in bus transportation for Special Education students to LACOE programs.

Proposed Strategy: Expelled Special Education students from the school districts could be served by LACOE Special Education programs, depending on the goals and objectives of the Individualized Education Plan (IEP), and whether LACOE has services to meet their needs. Districts can send the usual Referral for Services for Expelled Students to LACOE (See Appendix), and also request that LACOE staff participate in the transition IEP meeting. Although ED students are more difficult to serve, other students, RSP or SDC, might be able to be served.

Service Gap No. 2 - Additional Programs for Grades K-8

Discussion: Of the 75 school districts that responded to the survey, 20 requested additional LACOE alternative programs, or assistance in organizing consortiums of school district programs. Six districts felt that there were not enough students to support a single district program, and were interested in a possible consortium, including Alhambra, Bassett, Burbank, Castaic, Newhall, and Pomona. Eight districts were interested in more K-6 programs. Two districts requested grades 6-8 programs, six wanted more K-6 programs, two wanted 9-12 programs, one a 7-8 program, one a 5-8 program, one a 5-6 program, and one a K-8 site specifically serving the Azusa, Covina, Charter Oak, and West Covina school districts region. Three districts expressed a need for bus transportation to LACOE programs

Proposed Strategy: The referral of expelled students in grade 6 to LACOE programs occur infrequently, and grades 5 and lower rarely takes place. The LACOE Elementary Academy of the South Bay Community Day School remains the only LACOE classroom alternative in the county for grades K-6, and additional programs may be prohibitive due to insufficient numbers of expelled students. The Division of Alternative Education (DAE) has experienced recent closures of community day school programs, limiting the possibility of expanded programs. DAE will explore the possibility of programs that would serve grades 7-9, to prevent the enrollment of middle school students with older high school students. Districts can consider also consider forming consortiums, for the purpose of sharing alternative programs. The Division of Student Support Services (SSS) holds regular regional meetings with school district Child Welfare and Attendance (CWA) and Student Support Services personnel, and could assist in organizing consortiums. The Los Angeles County School Attendance Review Board (SARB), also administered by SSS, could also assist, since many districts are already working together in consortiums

for SARB. Students in grades 6-8 can also be served using LACOE or district independent study programs, with students meeting with a teacher three to five times per week.

Other School District Comments

School districts commented that LACOE programs have been an asset and support to their students, in particular the Elementary Academy, Santa Clarita Academy, Boys Republic, and Jonas Salk Community Day Schools. Although some commented on a delay in enrollment of expelled students, others felt that communication with DAE staff has improved, including regular face-to-face meetings with the Regional Director.

Alternative Placements for Pupils who Fail to Meet the Terms and Conditions of their Rehabilitation Plan or who Pose a Danger to Others

California Education Code, Section 48926 requires the county-wide plan to further identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

In Los Angeles County, expelled pupils who are unsuccessful in a district operated community day school and/or who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils may be referred to a county community day school or other appropriate alternative program operated by the county office of education.

Options for students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan may, in select cases, include referral and placement in a juvenile hall setting or juvenile camp or in select cases, a transfer to a program operated by an adjacent county office of education.

Currently, the Los Angeles County Office of Education does not have any formal agreements with adjacent county offices of education.

Contract for Alternative Services

To further address the requirements of Section 48926 of the California Education Code, and to ensure that an educational program is provided for all expelled pupils, referred to and accepted by the County, the Division of Alternative Education (DAE) will enter into a contract with each participating school district to identify agreed-to responsibilities for serving expelled pupils, including those served in both regular and special education programs. A plan to address any identified service gaps will be included in the contract.

Appendix

California Education Code Section 48915 (d)

- (d) The governing board shall order a pupil expelled upon finding that the pupil committed an act listed in subdivision (c), and shall refer that pupil to a program of study that meets all of the following conditions:
 - (1) Is appropriately prepared to accommodate pupils who exhibit discipline problems.
- (2) Is not provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school.
 - (3) Is not housed at the school site attended by the pupil at the time of suspension.

California Education Code Section 48915 (f)

(f) The governing board shall refer a pupil who has been expelled pursuant to subdivision (b) or (e) to a program of study which meets all of the conditions specified in subdivision (d).

Notwithstanding this subdivision, with respect to a pupil expelled pursuant to subdivision (e), if the county superintendent of schools certifies that an alternative program of study is not available at a site away from a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or an elementary school, and that the only option for placement is at another comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or another elementary school, the pupil may be referred to a program of study that is provided at a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at an elementary school.

California Education Code Section 48915.01

If the governing board of a school district has established a community day school pursuant to Section 48661 on the same site as a comprehensive middle, junior, or senior high school, or at any elementary school, the governing board does not have to meet the condition in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d) of Section 48915 when the board, pursuant to subdivision (f) of Section 48915, refers a pupil to a program of study and that program of study is at the community day school. All the other conditions of subdivision (d) of Section 48915 are applicable to the referral as required by subdivision (f) of Section 48915.

California Education Code Section 48916.1

- (a) At the time an expulsion of a pupil is ordered, the governing board of the school district shall ensure that an education program is provided to the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order for the period of the expulsion. Except for pupils expelled pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 48915, the governing board of a school district is required to implement the provisions of this section only to the extent funds are appropriated for this purpose in the annual Budget Act or other legislation, or both.
- (b) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (a) may be operated by the school district, the county superintendent of schools, or a consortium of districts or in joint agreement with the county superintendent of schools.
- (c) Any educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) shall not be situated within or on the grounds of the school from which the pupil was expelled.
- (d) If the pupil who is subject to the expulsion order was expelled from any of kindergarten or grades 1 to 6, inclusive, the educational program provided pursuant to subdivision (b) shall not be combined or merged with educational programs offered to pupils in any of grades 7 to 12, inclusive. The district or county program is the only program required to be provided to expelled pupils as determined by the governing board of the school district.
 - (e) (1) Each school district shall maintain the following data:
 - (A) The number of pupils recommended for expulsion.
 - (B) The grounds for each recommended expulsion.
 - (C) Whether the pupil was subsequently expelled.
 - (D) Whether the expulsion order was suspended.
 - (E) The type of referral made after the expulsion.
 - (F) The disposition of the pupil after the end of the period of expulsion.
- (2) The Superintendent may require a school district to report this data as part of the coordinated compliance review. If a school district does not report outcome data as required by this subdivision, the Superintendent may not apportion any further money to the school district pursuant to Section 48664 until the school district is in compliance with this subdivision. Before withholding the apportionment of funds to a school district pursuant to this subdivision, the Superintendent shall give written notice to the governing board of the school district that the school district has

failed to report the data required by paragraph (1) and that the school district has 30 calendar days from the date of the written notice of noncompliance to report the requested data and thereby avoid the withholding of the apportionment of funds.

(f) If the county superintendent of schools is unable for any reason to serve the expelled pupils of a school district within the county, the governing board of that school district may enter into an agreement with a county superintendent of schools in another county to provide education services for the district's expelled pupils.

California Education Code Section 48926

Each county superintendent of schools in counties that operate community schools pursuant to Section 1980, in conjunction with superintendents of the school districts within the county, shall develop a plan for providing education services to all expelled pupils in that county. The plan shall be adopted by the governing board of each school district within the county and by the county board of education.

The plan shall enumerate existing educational alternatives for expelled pupils, identify gaps in educational services to expelled pupils, and strategies for filling those service gaps. The plan shall also identify alternative placements for pupils who are expelled and placed in district community day school programs, but who fail to meet the terms and conditions of their rehabilitation plan or who pose a danger to other district pupils, as determined by the governing board.

Each county superintendent of schools, in conjunction with the superintendents of the school districts, shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction the county plan for providing educational services to all expelled pupils in the county no later than June 30, 1997, and shall submit a triennial update to the plan to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, including the outcome data pursuant to Section 48916.1, on June 30th thereafter.

Introduction

The survey was provided to all school district superintendents, with additional copies provided to the director of pupil personnel services, supervisor of child welfare and attendance, and director of alternative education of each of the districts. Of the 80 districts receiving the survey, 74 completed the survey.

Current Educational Alternatives Available

Community Day Schools

Districts use both their own community day school (CDS) and LACOE CDS programs as placements for expelled students. District CDS programs cannot be located on or adjacent to a K-12 educational program.

- Twenty nine out of eighty districts reported that they operate a district CDS, fourteen for grades 7-8, three K-6, two K-8, one 5-8, and one 6-8. Twenty four district programs were grades 9-12.
- The following LACOE CDS programs are used by districts (number of times reported by each district in parentheses): Boys Republic, Monrovia (3), Pico Rivera Bermudez (3), Elementary CDS South Bay (7), Downey (1), Eastern Whittier Franklin (4), Compton Hope (1), Hawthorne Jonas Salk (5), Pomona Academic Arts (1), Redondo Beach Riviera (3), Santa Clarita Academy (1), Compton Tri Community (1), Not named (26) = 56 responses

Opportunity Programs

Some districts operate opportunity programs, minimum day programs housed on K-12 sites, as an alternative for expelled students.

• District Opportunity Programs: grades K-8 (1), 4-6 (1), 7-8(9), 9-12 (9) = 20 responses

Continuation High Schools

Continuation high schools were used by fifteen districts for expelled students.

Special Education

One district has a Special Day Class for expelled students. Two districts refer students to LACOE Pace.

Independent Study Programs

Districts that did not have any other alternative programs referred students to their own independent study program, or a LACOE independent study program.

- LACOE Independent Study Strategy (ISS): West Covina (3), Not named (2) = 5 responses
- District ISS: 7-8 (1), K-12 or Not Named (61) = 62 responses

Other Alternative Programs

Charter schools and private schools were among other alternatives for expelled students.

• Opportunities for Learning Charter (10), Other school district (1), Opportunity transfer (2), Adult School (1), Home Teacher (4), private school (1), Ventura COE (1), Options For Youth Charter (11), SEA Charter School (16), West Covina Del Norte ROP (5), Orange County Horizons (1) = 53 responses

Have these strategies/services been successful? If not, what were the obstacles or gaps?

Forty five of the districts surveyed felt that the available alternative programs were successful most of the time.

- Two districts did not have any expulsions this past school year, one district had one
 expulsion, and three had three expulsions
- Lack of Special Education and K-8 alternative programs for expelled students were the major obstacles or gaps identified

Comments on Service Gap No. 1 - More Special Education/Emotionally Disturbed (ED)/SDC programs

Fourteen districts expressed a need for more Special Education alternatives for expelled students, including ED, Resource Specialist Program (RSP) and Special Day Class (SDC - 3 districts). Four districts are interested in bus transportation for Special Education students to LACOE programs.

Comments on Service Gap No. 2 - More K-8 Alternative Programs

Of the 75 school districts that responded to the survey, 20 requested additional LACOE alternative programs, or consortiums of school district programs.

- Six districts felt that there were not enough students to support a single district program, and were interested in a possible consortium, including Alhambra, Bassett, Burbank, Castaic, Newhall, and Pomona
- Eight districts were interested in more K-6 programs
- Two districts requested grades 6-8 programs, six wanted more K-6 programs, two wanted 9-12 programs, one a 7-8 program, one a 5-8 program, one a 5-6 program, and one a K-8 site specifically serving the Azusa, Covina, Charter Oak, and West Covina school districts region
- Three districts expressed a need for bus transportation to LACOE programs

Suggestions or strategies for filling any service gaps which limit your ability to ensure the availability of educational services for expelled students

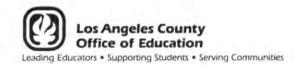
Thirteen districts were apparently satisfied with their alternative program options, and did not have any suggestions. The following were major suggestions:

- Nineteen again requested more K-8 alternative programs
- · Eight would like to see more SDC services
- · Four districts were interested in partnering with other districts or LACOE to create programs
- Two suggested using non-public schools
- Three districts would like LACOE to provide bus tokens to students attending LACOE schools
- Two districts found waiting lists to be long at LACOE programs, while five found a gap in
 enrolling students in LACOE programs in a timely manner. Five districts (3 district CDS
 programs, 2 LACOE CDS programs), thought that waiting lists were too long at CDS sites.

Alternative placements for students who fail to meet the terms and conditions of the expulsion rehabilitation plan or pose a danger to other district students as determined by the governing board

- Nineteen districts refer students to LACOE programs
- Ten districts continue to enforce the expulsion order until the student meets all terms and conditions
- · Seven refer students to independent study, while two refer students to non public schools
- Two districts amend the original expulsion order, or will re-enroll a student with conditions, similar to a suspended expulsion order

Three districts would like LACOE DAE to better communicate when they have students who
are failing, and prior to dropping the student, see if alternative placements or other means or
correction such as counseling or attendance interventions can be exhausted.

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve secondary treatment system projects for on-site wastewater at Pt. Dume and Webster Elementary Schools. Studies and investigations have been prepared to determine the scope of work and requirements for On-site Wastewater Treatment Systems (OWTS) at these two sites. A construction budget of \$580,000 is proposed for Webster. A construction budget of \$400,000 is proposed for Pt. Dume. A reduction of \$200,000 for the construction budget at Malibu Middle School and High School is recommended based on Deferred Maintenance construction including replacement of septic system number 6 tank replacement and seepage pit maintenance requirements.

COMMENTS: At the May 7, 2009, meeting of the Board of Education, funding for initial investigations of the existing systems at the Webster and Pt. Dume sites was approved. At the Board meeting at July 16, 2009, Board members expressed their concern that BB funds are proposed for this requirement. The Board directed that the item be reviewed and returned to a future Board meeting for consideration.

Based upon initial investigations and initial review with the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board (LARWQB), a secondary treatment system for the Webster site is required. A secondary treatment system for the Pt. Dume site may be required pending confirmation of initial testing and sampling of ground water quality. Some system components at each site have reached the end of their useful lifecycles and will be replaced.

The funding for these new projects is proposed to be drawn from the Program Reserves for the Measure BB Program.

The septic tanks at Pt. Dume will be replaced on an expedited basis using Deferred Maintenance funds. The construction budget for Pt. Dume has been adjusted accordingly.

School that includes a new tank as the existing tank ceiling is collapsing. Investigations showed that the septic unit at Pt. Dume Elementary School is inoperable, almost to the point of being filled to capacity, causing a potential

overflow problem. In addition, the tank ceiling is collapsing.

The district will procure the tanks independently of the labor contract in order to expedite the installation. The Xerxes tanks will be ordered through Biosolutions, a local distributor. Total labor and materials for the projects is estimated at \$350,000. Bids will be received on August 20, 2009. Staff will review and issue a Notice to Proceed (NTP) to low bidder. It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt the attached Resolution 09-07, Resolution of the Board of Education of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Regarding Its Intention to Issue Qualified School Construction Bonds.

BACKGROUND:

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) provides additional financing methods for California school districts including:

 Qualified School Construction Bonds. Tax credit bonds with an annual allocation of \$11 billion for 2009 and 2010

Tax credit bonds allow the District to enter into financings for a term of up to 16 years on an interest-free basis. Investors that purchase such bonds receive a tax credit that offsets taxable income in lieu of interest income.

DESCRIPTION/DETAILS:

With this action, the Board of Trustees authorizes the administration to submit an application to the California Department of Education seeking an allocation of QSCBs in an amount not to exceed \$25 million. If the District is granted an allocation, the QSCBs would be issued by the District as general obligation bonds or notes which have previously been authorized for issuance by the voters of the District, or as certificates of participation. *This resolution authorizes the application process only and does not authorize any additional financings*. At the time of issuance of the QSCBs, an additional issuance resolution setting forth the financing structure and parameters would need to be adopted by the Board of Trustees.

All of the proceeds received by the District from the issuance of QSCBs shall be applied for the purpose of financing (a) the construction, rehabilitation or repair of public school facilities, (b) the acquisition of land on which public school facilities will be constructed with the proceeds of the QSCBs, or (c) equipment related to the project(s) to be constructed or rehabilitated with the proceeds of the QSCBs. As required by applicable law, all laborers and mechanics employed by contractors or subcontractors on projects funded by the QSCBs shall be paid wages and fringe benefits at rates not less than those prevailing on similar projects in the locality. 100% of the proceeds of the proceeds of the QSCBs are to be used for a qualified purpose and must be spent within three years of the date of issuance of the QSCBs.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined to file an application with the California Department of Education ("CDE") for an allocation necessary to cause such Qualified School Construction Bonds to be issued:

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE SANTA MONICA-MALIBU UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, ORDER, AND DETERMINE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The District hereby directs the Superintendent and the Assistant Superintendent, Business Services to file an application with the CDE for a QSCB allocation for 2009.

SECTION 2. The reasonably expected maximum principal amount of the Bonds or COPs is \$25,000,000, \$25,000,000 of which are expected to be QSCBs.

SECTION 3. All the recitals in this resolution are true and correct and this Board of Trustees so finds, determines and represents.

Mr. de la Torre suggesting adding language about recruiting underrepresented groups to respond to RFPs and bid announcements. He suggested the district following LAUSD's model of holding bidding workshops for potential bidders.

Mr. Snell suggested that, in order to use district resources efficiently, bidding workshops and outreach to underrepresented groups be limited to contracts over a certain dollar amount.

This discussion also related to policies 3300 (Item No. D.01), 3312 (Item No. D.02), 7000 (Item No. D.03), and 3311 (moved from consent to discussion, Item No. A.27).

Business and Noninstructional Operations

BP 3300 (a)

EXPENDITURES AND PURCHASES

The Board of Education recognizes its fiduciary responsibility to oversee the prudent expenditure of district funds. In order to best serve district interests, the Superintendent or designee shall develop and maintain effective purchasing procedures that are consistent with sound financial controls and that ensure the district receives maximum value for items purchased. He/she shall ensure that records of expenditures and purchases are maintained in accordance with law.

As a means of tracking how effective district efforts are at reaching out to historically underrepresented groups and encouraging them to submit bids, the Superintendent or designee shall monitor the fairness and diversity of bids and contracts awarded to women-and minority-owned and local business by collecting related data on vendors/contractors during the bidding process.

Expending Authority

The Superintendent or designee may purchase supplies, materials, apparatus, equipment, and services up to the amounts specified in Public Contract Code 20111, beyond which a competitive bidding process is required. The Board shall not recognize obligations incurred contrary to Board policy and administrative regulations.

The Board shall review all transactions entered into by the Superintendent or designee on behalf of the Board every 60 days. (Education Code 17605)

The Superintendent or designee may authorize an expenditure which exceeds the budget classification allowance against which the expenditure is the proper charge only if an amount sufficient to cover the purchase is available in the budget for transfer by the Board.

District funds shall not be expended for the purchase of alcoholic beverages. (Education Code 32435)

Purchasing Procedures

Insofar as possible, goods and services purchased shall meet the needs of the person or department ordering them at the lowest price consistent with standard purchasing practices. Maintenance costs, replacement costs, and trade-in values shall be considered when determining the most economical purchase price. When price, fitness, and quality are equal, recycled products shall be preferred when procuring materials for use in district schools and buildings.

All purchases shall be made by formal contract or purchase order or shall be accompanied by a receipt. In order to eliminate the processing of numerous small purchase orders, the Superintendent or designee may create a "blanket" or "open" purchase order system for the purchase of minor items as needed from a vendor. He/she shall ensure that the "open" purchase order system details a maximum purchase amount, the types of items that can be purchased under this order, the individuals authorized to approve purchases, and the expiration date of the "open" order.

Business and Noninstructional Operations

BP 3312 (a)

CONTRACTS

Whenever state law invests the Board of Education with the power to enter into contracts on behalf of the district, the Board may, by a majority vote, delegate this power to the Superintendent or designee. To be valid or to constitute an enforceable obligation against the district, all contracts must be approved and/or ratified by the Board. (Education Code 17604)

All contracts between the district and outside agencies shall conform to standards required by law and shall be prepared under the direction of the Superintendent or designee.

As a means of tracking how effective district efforts are at reaching out to historically underrepresented groups and encouraging them to submit bids, the Superintendent or designee shall monitor the fairness and diversity of bids and contracts awarded to women-and minority-owned and local business by collecting related data on vendors/contractors during the bidding process.

When required by law, contracts and subcontracts made by the district for public works or for goods or services shall contain a nondiscrimination clause prohibiting discrimination by contractors or subcontractors. The nondiscrimination clause shall contain a provision requiring contractors and subcontractors to give written notice of their obligations to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreement. (Government Code 12990)

The district shall not enter into a contract that prohibits a school employee from disparaging the goods or services of the contracting party. (Education Code 35182.5)

Contracts for Non-Nutritious Foods or Beverages

Effective July 1, 2007, the district or a district school shall not enter into or renew a contract for the sale of foods that do not meet the nutritional standards specified in Education Code 49431 or 49431.2 unless the contract specifies that such sales will occur later than one-half hour after the end of the school day and/or off school premises. (Education Code 49431, 49431.2)

In accordance with the dates specified in law, the district or a district school shall not enter into or renew a contract for the sale of beverages that do not meet the nutritional standards in Education Code 49431.5 unless the contract specifies that such sales will occur later than one-half hour after the end of the school day and/or off school premises.

Before the district or a district school enters into or renews a contract that grants exclusive or nonexclusive advertising or sale of carbonated beverages, non-nutritious beverages, or nonnutritious food as defined in law, the Board shall ensure that the district has sufficient internal controls in place to protect the integrity of public funds and to ensure that funds raised as a result of the contract benefit public education. (Education Code 35182.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop the district's internal control procedures to protect the integrity of public funds. Such internal controls may include but not be limited to the following:

1. Control procedures that produce accurate and reliable financial statements and, at the same time, safeguard the assets, financial resources, and integrity of every employee responsible for handling money or property. Control systems shall be systematically evaluated and revised to keep pace with the changing responsibilities of management.

CONTRACTS (Continued)

 Procedures to ensure that district personnel do not handle cash or product at the school site. The contract shall specify that the vendor stock the machines and shall provide cash accounting, along with a check, for district proceeds directly to the control office.

In addition, the contract may specify whether contractor logos are permitted on district facilities, including but not limited to scoreboards and other equipment. If such logos are permitted, the contractor shall present the equipment to the Board as a gift. The gift may be accepted by the Board in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

The contract shall be entered into on a competitive bid basis pursuant to Public Contract Code 20111 or through the issuance of a Request for Proposal. (Education Code 35182.5)

The Board shall not enter into or renew a contract that grants exclusive or nonexclusive advertising or sale of carbonated beverages, non-nutritious beverages, or non-nutritious food until parents/guardians, students, and members of the public have had an opportunity to comment on the contract at a public hearing held during a regularly scheduled board meeting or as otherwise authorized by Education Code 35182.5. The Board shall clearly, and in a manner recognizable to the general public, identify in the agenda the contract to be discussed at the meeting. (Education Code 35182.5)

The public hearing shall include but not be limited to a discussion of the nutritional value of food and beverages sold within the district; the availability of fresh fruit, vegetables, and grains in school meals and snacks, including locally grown and organic produce; the amount of fat, sugar, and additives in the food and beverages discussed; and barriers to student participation in school breakfast and lunch programs. (Education Code 35182.5)

The contract shall be accessible to the public and may not include a confidentiality clause that would prevent the district or a district school from making any part of the contract public. (Education Code 35182.5)

Contracts for Electronic Products or Services

The Board shall not enter into a contract for electronic products or services that requires the dissemination of advertising to students, unless the Board: (Education Code 35182.5)

- 1. Enters into the contract at a noticed, public hearing of the Board.
- 2. Makes a finding that the electronic product or service is or would be an integral component of the education of students.
- 3. Makes a finding that the district cannot afford to provide the electronic product or service unless it contracts to permit dissemination of advertising to students.

CONTRACTS (Continued)

- 4. As part of the district's normal, ongoing communication to parents/guardians, provides written notice that the advertising will be used in the classroom or other learning center.
- 5. Offers parents/guardians the opportunity to request in writing that their child not be exposed to the program that contains the advertising. Any request shall be honored for the school year in which it is submitted, or longer if specified, but may be withdrawn by the parents/guardians at any time.

CONTRACTS

The Board of Education recognizes that one of its major responsibilities is to provide healthful, safe and adequate facilities that enhance the instructional program. The Board shall endeavor to make the provision of adequate school facilities a priority in the district. Because the schools serve as a focal point for the community, the Board shall also strive to ensure that district facilities fit harmoniously and attractively into their neighborhoods and have flexibility of design to meet future educational and community needs.

As a means of tracking how effective district efforts are at reaching out to historically underrepresented groups and encouraging them to submit bids, the Superintendent or designee shall monitor the fairness and diversity of bids and contracts awarded to women-and minority-owned and local business by collecting related data on vendors/contractors during the bidding process.

The Board shall strive to have a school facilities plan in place and regularly reviewed in light of the district's educational goals. In accordance with this plan, the Board shall:

- 1. Approve additions or major alterations in excess of \$10,000 to existing buildings
- 2. Determine what new buildings shall be built, when and where, and what equipment shall be purchased for them
- 3. Determine the method of financing that will be used
- 4. Select and purchase school sites for future expansion
- 5. Approve the selection of architects and structural engineers
- 6. Award contracts for design and construction
- 7. Name schools and individual buildings
- 8. Advocate school facility needs to the community

The Superintendent or designee shall:

- 1. Assess the district's short- and long-term facility needs
- 2. Direct the preparation and updating of the facilities plan
- 3. Oversee the preparation of bids and award of contracts
- 4. Supervise the implementation of the district's building program in accordance with the master plan, Board policy, and state and local requirements, including collaboration with the architect and contractor on the construction of new facilities and modernization of existing facilities
- 5. Represent the district in official governmental interactions related to the building program

It is recommended that the Board of Education review and consider support for the proposed AB 1569 for exemptions of said courses from PE.

COMMENT:

Existing law requires all pupils who are not otherwise exempt to attend courses in physical education for a total period of time of not less than 400 minutes each 10 schooldays in grades 9 - 12. The proposed legislation is sponsored by Assemblywoman Mary Salas of San Diego with co-authorship from Assemblywoman Gloria Romero of Los Angeles and Assemblywoman Fiona Ma from San Francisco. The proposed bill will exempt high school students who participate in the California Cadet Corps, cheer team or dance team, color guard or drill team, Junior Reserve Officer training Corps (JROTC), or marching band as part of the regular course of study or regular school-sponsored extracurricular activities. The bill supports the inclusion of any of the physical education content areas, as well as the appropriate credentialed teachers for these courses. It also supports the inclusion of any regular school-sponsored extracurricular activity that qualifies the exemption in the above-mentioned activities. The bill requires that the governing board of a school district that provides pupils with an exemption pursuant to this bill shall ensure that all of the courses, programs, and activities offered are in compliance with state and federal laws.

Attached are the three documents issued by Jack O'Connell, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, dated May 11, 2009, Correspondence from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing dated June 23, 2009, and the amended AB 1569 dated July 2, 2009.

This will come back for action at the September 3 board meeting.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The California Department of Education (CDE) supports high quality physical education instruction for every student. Physical education is important in the lives of our youth and is an instructional priority in our schools. It helps to combat high levels of obesity and diabetes as well as to increase the mental function and alertness of students. Research has established a connection between increased levels of physical fitness and success in learning.

The Legislature has also voiced its commitment to high quality physical education in numerous ways throughout the California *Education Code (EC)*. Recent legislation has raised several questions concerning the requirements for a physical education course of study in our schools. The purpose of this letter is to clarify key issues pertaining to physical education instructional programs.

Physical Education as a Required Course of Study

The course of study adopted by local educational agencies (LEAs) must include physical education for grades one through six (EC Section 52120[g]) and for grades seven through twelve (EC Section 51220[d]). These statutes specify that the physical education course of study must include an emphasis upon those physical activities that may be "conducive to health and vigor of body and mind."

The Legislature also specified a required number of minutes of physical education instruction. For grades one through six, an LEA is required to provide at least 200 minutes of physical education instruction in each ten schooldays (*EC* Section 33352[b][1]; *EC* Section 51210). For grades seven through twelve, the requirement is at least 400 minutes each 10 schooldays (*EC* Section 33352[b][2]; *EC* Section 51222)¹. In order to receive a high school diploma, students are required to complete two courses of physical education, unless an exemption is granted under specified circumstances (*EC* Section 51225.3; see also *EC* sections 51241–51246 regarding exemptions).

¹ Instruction in physical education in an elementary school maintaining any of grades one to eight is to be for at least 200 minutes in each 10 school days.

High-Quality Physical Education

In addition to requiring LEAs to include physical education as part of the course of study, the Legislature directed the CDE to exercise general supervision over physical education, in part through the adoption of rules and regulations as the CDE deemed necessary (*EC* Section 33352[a]). The Legislature further directed the CDE to encourage all districts, to the extent resources are available, to "provide quality physical education" that develops the knowledge, attitudes, skills, behavior, and motivation needed to be physically active and fit for life (*EC* Section 33350[c]). Consistent with the Legislature's directive, in 1977, the CDE published regulations requiring LEAs to appraise the quality of their respective high school courses of study, including the extent to which they include instruction in eight areas: (1) the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health; (2) mechanics of body movement; (3) aquatics; (4) gymnastics and tumbling; (5) individual and dual sports; (6) rhythms and dance; (7) team sports; and (8) combatives (*California Code of Regulations (CCR)*, Title 5, Section 10060).

Physical Education Standards and Frameworks

In 2002, the Legislature required the CDE to adopt model content standards in physical education (*EC* Section 60605.2). The model content standards are, according to the Legislature, to provide a framework for programs that a "school may offer in the instruction of physical education" (*EC* Section 60605.2). LEAs are not mandated to follow the standards and accompanying frameworks (*EC* Section 60605.2[b]). However, they do provide the foundation for a high quality sequential course of study for kindergarten through grade twelve. For grades nine through twelve, the frameworks encompass eight content areas for physical education as identified in the regulations adopted in 1977. The frameworks propose a course of study delivered in a series of four courses. High school courses one and two include the eight content areas specified above and provide the foundation for further high school instruction. High School Courses three and four provide students with the opportunity to explore a variety of physical activities in search of those that they can enjoy and participate in for a lifetime.

Data Collection and Reporting

In 2007, Senate Bill 601 amended *EC* Section 33352 to require CDE to collect data through the categorical program monitoring process indicating "the extent to which each school within the jurisdiction of a school district or county office of education does all of ... the following that are applicable to the school..." (*EC* Section 33352[b][1]). The data collection is as follows:

 Provides the requisite number of instructional minutes for its pupils pursuant to EC sections 51210(g), 51222, and 51223.

- Conducts physical fitness testing (PFT) pursuant to EC Section 60800² and includes the results of the PFT as a part of the school accountability report card.
- Offers a variety of physical education elective courses to those students exempted from attendance in physical education courses.
- Provides a course of study in physical education to pupils in any of grades nine to twelve, inclusive, that includes a developmentally appropriate sequence of instruction, including the effects of physical activity upon dynamic health, the mechanics of body movement, aquatics, gymnastics and tumbling, individual and dual sports, rhythms and dance, team sports, and combatives.
- Provides instruction in physical education to pupils that provides equal opportunities for participation regardless of gender.
- Provides instruction in physical education to pupils in any of grades one to twelve, by teachers who hold an appropriate teaching credential issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC).

SB 601 also required that the CDE report to the Governor and Legislature on the data collected through its compliance monitoring process.

Physical Education Credit for courses such as Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps and Drill Team

One issue that has recently been identified as a particular concern is what criteria must be used by an LEA in determining whether physical education credit may be awarded to students in grades nine through twelve. Specifically, this question has arisen in regard to physical education credit being awarded for participation in Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps, marching band, cheerleading, and drill team. In making the determination of whether to award physical education credit for any given activity or class, EC Section 51220(d) and EC Section 33352(b)(7) together require that an LEA offer a course of study in physical education for grades nine through twelve that includes instruction in the eight areas over the span of the "physical education" classes offered as part of the school's course of study. The law does not specify that every class must include instruction in all eight areas, but rather it speaks to a course of study over grades nine through twelve that includes all eight areas. It is ultimately the obligation of the LEA to determine how each particular course, as conducted in its district, supports its course of study for grades nine through twelve that includes the eight areas and substantially meets the objectives and criteria of EC Section 33352(b)(7). While it is not required that every course for which physical education course credit is given include all eight areas, an LEA is required to

structure its course offerings such that all areas are included over the course of study offered to all students.

In addition, it is important to note that *EC* Section 33352(b) requires the LEA to meet additional responsibilities should the LEA decide to award physical education credit for a particular course. These responsibilities include the provision of minimum instructional minutes, various reporting requirements, and the assignment of an appropriately credentialed teacher.

There are a variety of ways in which a teacher may meet the requirement to be "appropriately credentialed" to provide physical education instruction. Physical education is an essential component of California education and impacts the life-long learning and well-being of each student. To accomplish this, it is critical that physical education programs offer a planned and sequential instructional program that provides students with the skills, knowledge, and confidence to be physically active throughout their lifetimes. Districts should design their physical education courses to ensure that students will receive instruction in all eight content areas, consistent with the requirements identified above. I encourage all LEAs to keep this goal in mind when determining for which courses students are granted physical education credit.

SUBJECT: Credentials and Authorizations to Teach Physical Education

Summary:

One of the responsibilities of the Commission is monitoring the legal and appropriate assignment of teaching and non-teaching positions in the public schools in California. One assignment area recently under discussion is the appropriate assignment for an individual teaching a course such as marching band, drill team, cheerleading, or Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) in which the employing agency awards physical education credit to the students in these classes.

The California Department of Education (CDE) is the state agency responsible for determining credit given for a particular course and the general supervision of physical education courses, advisement for school officials, school boards, and teachers in the development and improvement of their physical education activity programs, and investigation of the work in physical education in the public schools. The CDE recently distributed a letter concerning physical education content and credit. A link to this letter may be found in the References section. The letter clarified that questions regarding the assignment of teachers should be addressed to the Commission. This Coded Correspondence will address the appropriate assignment of individuals who teach the courses noted above.

Key Provisions:

The content of the course curriculum for a course is the determining factor for assignment purposes. The appropriate credential or authorization for the assignment must align with the primary content or focus of the course.

The credential or authorization held by an individual indicates that he/she has been prepared to teach the course curriculum subject-matter content. The Commission's concern is not generally with the credit earned for the course, however, it may be a guide to determining who should teach a specific course. For determining appropriate assignment, a review of the course title and curriculum content may determine which credential or authorization is the appropriate choice.

On May 11, 2009, the CDE distributed a letter to county and district superintendents and charter school administers concerning circumstances under which a local governing board may decide to give physical education credit to JROTC, marching band, cheerleading or drill team as part of its course of study for physical education. It remains the purview of the CDE to determine whether the awarding of credit for such courses by a local governing board is appropriate. The CDE also distributed Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) concerning physical education. A link to the FAQs is in the References section.

The instructor of a course in which the curriculum content is Junior ROTC must hold the requisite credential to teach ROTC which is currently a Designated Subjects Special Subjects Teaching Credential in ROTC. In this example, the primary focus of the course content is ROTC. The same type of determination would be true for, marching band. The teacher would need a credential or authorization in the content subject area being taught which would be music for a marching band course.

If the local employing agency determines that a course has dual content areas such as both ROTC and physical education, an individual will need to hold a credential or authorization in both ROTC and physical education. See below for information concerning appropriate credentials or authorization for physical education. Information on appropriate credentials or authorization for ROTC may be found in Section I of the Commission's Administrator's Assignment Manual. A link to the Manual is provided in the References section.

Appropriate Credential or Authorization in Physical Education

If the curriculum content of a course is physical education, the following credentials and authorizations are appropriate to the assignment. Note that the assignment must be in the appropriate grade level authorized by the credential.

1) Full Credentials

Single Subject Teaching Credential in Physical Education (including internship credentials)

Standard Elementary or Secondary Teaching Credential in Physical Education (no longer initially issued but renewals are issued to holders who qualify)

Special Secondary Teaching Credential in Physical Education (no longer initially issued but renewals are issued to holders who qualify)

General Teaching Credential (no longer initially issued but renewals are issued to holders who qualify)

2) Commission-issued Supplementary and Subject Matter Authorizations may be added to a full credential. They have either a <u>limited</u> grade level or a <u>limited</u> authorization in the scope of the content of the course that may be taught.

Supplementary Authorizations: Introductory Physical Education Dance

Sports and Games (no longer initially issued but renewals are issued to holders who qualify)

Subject Matter Authorization: Dance

- Holders of General Elementary, Standard Elementary and Multiple Subject Teaching Credentials may teach physical education within a self-contained classroom or a core setting assignment.
- 4) Temporary permits in physical education are issued by the Commission that are available on the request of a local employing agency:

Single Subject Short-Term Staff Permit

Single Subject Provisional Internship Permit

Single Subject Limited Assignment Permit (must hold a full teaching credential in another subject area)

5) Lastly, current statutes and regulations recognize that there may be situations of a temporary nature in which a teacher with the appropriate credential is not available. For such staffing situations, the California Education Code outlines various local teaching assignment options. Most of these local teaching assignment options require the individual to be fully credentialed in another subject area by holding a credential based on a bachelor's degree and a teacher preparation program including student teaching. Teacher consent is required for this type of assignment.

Questions concerning how to qualify for the credentials, permits, or authorizations may be addressed to the Commission's Information Services section as found in the Contact Information section. Information on appropriate credentials, authorizations, and local teaching assignment options may be found in the Commission's Administrator's Assignment Manual.

Background:

Commission staff has been working in collaboration with the CDE on the topic of physical education credit given for specific courses and the intersection with appropriate assignment. The CDE issued a letter dated May 11, 2009, from State Superintendent Jack O'Connell addressing the issue of physical education programs, standards, frameworks, data collection and reporting, and credit. An act to amend Sections 68074 and 68075 of the Education Code, relating to student tuition. An act to amend Section 51222 of, and to add Section 51242.1 to, the Education Code, relating to physical education.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1569, as amended, Committee on Veterans Affairs Salas. Postsecondary education: tuition: veterans. Physical education.

Existing law requires all pupils who are not otherwise exempt to attend courses in physical education for a total period of time of not less than 400 minutes each 10 schooldays.

This bill would authorize the governing board of a school district to exempt any high school pupil from courses in physical education if the pupil participates in California Cadet Corps, cheer team or dance team, color guard or drill team, Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, or marching band as part of the regular course of study or regular school-sponsored extracurricular activities. The bill would specify minimum standards for the physical education substitute courses and require that a certificated employee with an appropriate credential teach the course of study. The bill also would make other technical and clarifying changes.

AB 1569 —2—

(1) Existing law establishes uniform student residency requirements for purposes of ascertaining the amount of fees to be paid by students at public institutions of higher education in the state. Existing law entitles an undergraduate student who is a dependent of a member of the Armed Forces stationed in this state on active duty to resident classification for purposes of determining the amount of tuition and fees. Existing law entitles a graduate student, under the same circumstances, to resident classification for no more than one academic year, after which he or she is subject to the general provisions otherwise establishing student residency requirements.

Existing law allows a student dependent of a member of the Armed Forces to keep his or her resident classification until he or she has resided in the state for the minimum time necessary to become a resident in the event the member of the Armed Forces upon whom they are dependent is transferred outside of the state or retires as an active member of the Armed Forces.

Existing law also grants a member of the Armed Forces who is stationed in the state on active duty, except a member assigned for educational purposes to a state-supported institution of higher education, to resident classification for tuition purposes. A member of the Armed Forces seeking a graduate degree is entitled to resident classification for no more than 2 academic years.

Federal law prohibits a state receiving federal assistance under the Higher Education Opportunity Act from charging a higher rate for attendance at a public institution of higher education than is charged to residents of the state to a member of the Armed Forces who is on active duty for more than 30 days and whose domicile or permanent duty station is in the state, or to his or her spouse or dependent child. Existing federal law requires that the rate continue to apply so long as the member or his or her spouse or dependent child is continuously enrolled at the institution, notwithstanding a subsequent change in the permanent duty station of the member to a location outside of the state.

This bill would amend state law to conform with federal law granting a member of the Armed Forces, or his or her dependent, as provided, entitlement to resident classification for so long as he or she is continuously enrolled.

The bill would request the Regents of the University of California to establish the same residency requirements as those established by this bill for students enrolled at the University of California.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. It is the intent of the Legislature to provide school districts with the statutory authority to continue providing as substitutes for physical education those high school courses and activities that require vigorous physical activity, promote pupil and parent engagement, and foster pupil achievement across the state.

SEC. 2. Section 51222 of the Education Code is amended to read:

51222. (a) All pupils, except pupils excused or exempted pursuant to Sections 51241, 51242, and 51242.1, shall be required to attend upon the courses of in physical education for a total period of time of not less than 400 minutes each 10 schooldays. Any pupil may be excused from physical education classes during one of grades 10, 11, or 12 for not to exceed 24 elock a time period less than 24 hours in order to participate in automobile driver training. Such A pupil who is excused from physical education classes to enroll in driver training shall attend upon a minimum of 7,000 minutes of physical education instruction during such that school year.

(b) The governing board of each school district that maintains a high school and that elects to exempt pupils from required attendance in physical education courses pursuant to paragraph (1) or (2) or both of subdivision (b) of Section 51241 shall offer those exempted pupils so exempted a variety of elective physical education courses of not less than 400 minutes each 10 schooldays.

SEC. 3. Section 51242.1 is added to the Education Code, to read:

51242.1. (a) The governing board of a school district that provides the following courses or programs as part of the regular course of study or as part of the regular school-sponsored extracurricular activities may exempt any high school pupil who has completed such a course or program from courses in physical education:

- (1) California Cadet Corps.
- 35 (2) Cheer team or dance team.

- 1 (3) Color guard or drill team.
 - (4) Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps.
 - (5) Marching band.

- (b) Any course or program that qualifies high school pupils for the exemption in subdivision (a) shall include not less than 400 minutes of the physical education substitution each 10 school days, and shall support a course of study that includes any of the following physical education content areas: effects of physical activity upon dynamic health; mechanics of body movement; aquatics; gymnastics and tumbling; individual and dual sports; rhythms and dance; team sports; and combatives.
- (c) Any regular course of study for which a high school pupil receives course credit and which qualifies her or him for the exemption in subdivision (a) shall be taught by a certificated employee of the school district who holds an appropriate credential to teach that course.
- (d) Any regular school-sponsored extracurricular activity that qualifies a high school pupil for the exemption in subdivision (a) shall have a certificated employee of the school district serve as the sponsor of the activity at the schoolsite.
- (e) The governing board of a school district that provides pupils with an exemption pursuant to this section shall ensure that all of the courses, programs, and activities offered pursuant to subdivision (a) are in compliance with state and federal laws.

SECTION 1. Section 68074 of the Education Code is amended to read:

- 68074. (a) A student who is a natural or adopted child, stepchild, or spouse who is a dependent of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States stationed in this state on active duty is entitled to resident classification only for the purpose of determining the amount of tuition and fees.
- (b) If that member of the Armed Forces of the United States, whose dependent natural or adopted child, stepchild, or spouse is in attendance at an institution, (1) is thereafter transferred on military orders to a place outside this state where the member continues to serve in the armed forces of the United States, or (2) is thereafter retired as an active member of the Armed Forces of the United States, the student dependent shall not lose his or her resident classification so long as he or she remains continuously enrolled at that institution.

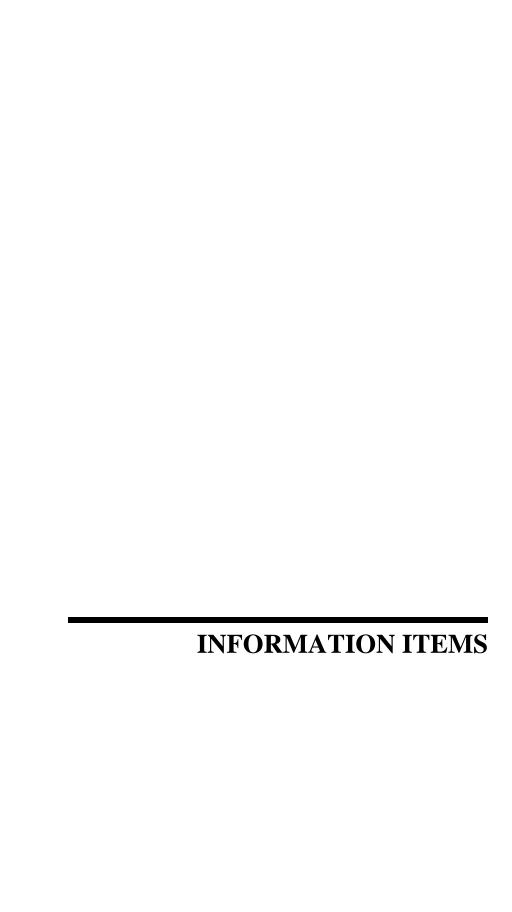
1 SEC. 2. Section 68075 of the Education Code is amended to 2 read:

68075. (a) A student who is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States stationed in this state on active duty, except a member of the Armed Forces assigned for educational purposes to a state-supported institution of higher education, is entitled to resident classification only for the purpose of determining the amount of tuition and fees:

(b) If that member of the Armed Forces of the United States who is in attendance at an institution is thereafter transferred on military orders to a place outside this state where the member continues to serve in the Armed Forces of the United States, he or she shall not lose his or her resident classification so long as he or she remains continuously enrolled at that institution.

SEC. 3. The Legislature hereby requests the Regents of the University of California to establish the same residency classifications for students enrolled at the University of California as those enacted by this act.

SEC. 4. If the Commission on State Mandates determines that this act contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement to local agencies and school districts for those costs shall be made pursuant to Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The district would like to extend its gratitude for the on-going work of the District Advisory Committee on the Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA). The thought and attention committee members put into the written report and presentation on May 1, 2009, is yet another indication of your continued support for and dedication to arts education in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. The district is very proud of the numerous accomplishments and accolades achieved by the students and teachers in our Visual and Performing Arts programs.

We recognize that many of the highlights referred to in the report are the result of the combined efforts of district staff, parents and community, and committee members and are reflective of previous years' committee recommendations. Please see the district's responses to the committee's recommendations below.

- 1. Visual and Performing Arts Coordinator The board maintained the position as an administrator, but due to the extremely difficult economy, the workdays were reduced from 220 to 200, which can continue to serve the program well.
- 2. Music In the spring, the board voted unanimously to maintain the 2 elementary music teachers for 2009-2010 school year, so that all students in grade 3 will continue to have access to a high quality music education.
- **3. AM classes** The district continues to anticipate any additional need for AM classes in Music and Art and for those teachers who are ready to teach the AM classes.
- 4. Theatre While the district understands the need for a theatre program at Lincoln and John Adams Middle Schools, the current economic climate limits the resources to fund these programs. The district will continue to find creative strategies to bring theatre classes to both schools during the school day. A new theatre director has been hired at Samohi and his assignment in the fall will include three theatre classes and two English classes that will have a theatre connection, such as a Shakespeare or history of theatre. The goal of Samohi's principal and the district is to eventually grow the program so that the theatre position would consist of five theatre classes.
- **5. Visual Arts** Unfortunately, the district is not able to provide a 4th and 5th grade visual art program due to the state's financial situation. The Visual and Performing Arts Coordinator will work with the Director of Theatre Operations to improve signage to the Roberts Art Gallery at Samohi.
- **6. Dance** The Visual and Performing Arts Coordinator has been working with the "Mad Hot Ballroom" dance program to possibly expand the program to other 5th grade classrooms at elementary sites in the district. The Coordinator and Director of Mad Hot Ballroom are currently trying to secure grant funding to support the expansion. Unfortunately, the district is unable to support any expansion of the elementary dance program at this time due to the financial situation.
- 7. Facilities The district's VAPA Coordinator has distributed a book with guidelines for Visual and Performing Arts facilities standards to each secondary school site. These guides have already been used by site principals and their VAPA staff to discuss new construction or changes to existing VAPA instructional spaces.

NONPUBLIC, NONSECTARIAN SCHOOL AND AGENCY SERVICES FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

The Board of Education may contract with state-certified nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies to provide special education services or facilities when an appropriate public education program is not available.

When entering into agreements with nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies, the Board shall consider the needs of the individual student and the recommendations of the individualized education program (IEP) team. The IEP team shall remain accountable for monitoring the progress of students placed in nonpublic, nonsectarian programs towards the goals identified in each student's IEP.

NONPUBLIC, NONSECTARIAN SCHOOL AND AGENCY SERVICES FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION

Placement and Services

Procedures specified in law shall govern the selection of appropriate nonpublic school or agency services.

Contracts with a nonpublic school or agency shall be made on forms provided by the California Department of Education and shall include an individual services agreement negotiated for each student. Individual services agreements shall be for the length of time for which nonpublic, nonsectarian school services are specified in the student's individualized education program (IEP), not to exceed one year. Changes in educational instruction, services or placement shall be made only on the basis of revisions to the student's IEP. (Education Code 56366)

The master contract shall specify the general administrative and financial agreements between the nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency and the district to provide the special education and designated instruction and services, as well as transportation specified in the student's IEP. The administrative provisions of the contract shall also include procedures for recordkeeping and documentation, and the maintenance of school records by the contracting district to ensure that appropriate high school graduation credit is received by the student. The contract may allow for partial or full-time attendance at the nonpublic, nonsectarian school. (Education Code 56366)

The master contract shall include a description of the process being utilized by the district to oversee and evaluate placements in nonpublic, nonsectarian schools. This description shall include a method for evaluating whether the student is making appropriate educational progress. (Education Code 56366)

The district IEP team shall annually review the IEP of a student placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency. The student's IEP and contract shall specify the review schedules. (5 CCR 3068)

When a special education student meets the district requirements for completion of prescribed course of study and adopted differential proficiency standards as designated in the student's IEP, the district which developed the IEP shall award the diploma. (5 CCR 3069)

Out-or-State Placements

Before contracting with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency outside California, the Superintendent or designee shall document the district's efforts to find an appropriate program offered by a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency within California. (Education Code 56365)

Within 15 days of any decision for an out-of-state placement, the student's IEP team shall submit to the Superintendent of Public Instruction a report with information about the services provided by the out-of-state program, the related costs, and the district's efforts to locate an appropriate public school or nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency within California. (Education Code 56365)

NONPUBLIC, NONSECTARIAN SCHOOL AND AGENCY SERVICES FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION (continued)

If the district decides to place a student with a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency outside the state, the district shall indicate the anticipated date of the student's return to a placement within California and shall document efforts during the previous year to return the student to California. (Education Code 56365)

<u>Parent Visitations to Students Placed in Residential Facilities under Provisions of</u> AB3632/Ch.26.5

Parents shall be reimbursed for visitation costs to the residential facility within the framework of the following criteria and/or as decided by the IEP team:

- 1. Parents are authorized to receive reimbursement for up to two therapeutic visits per calendar year (July 1 June 30), to the student at the residential facility. Costs to be reimbursed will include transportation and lodging. Parents will be reimbursed for transportation and lodging costs for no more than two nights and three days per visit. Reimbursement will be provided for parent(s) expenses only. Visitations have to be scheduled on weekdays (M-F) and excluding holidays that fall on weekdays.
- 2. <u>Transportation costs may be for airplane, train, or rental car expenses. If the parents elect to drive their own vehicle, reimbursement will be provided for mileage at the established LACOE Policy rate, currently 55¢ per mile effective 1/1/09.</u>
- 3. Rental cars must be selected from the Economy or Compact class, and itemized receipts must be included if reimbursement is requested for gasoline expenses, no mileage will be reimbursed if mileage is included in the rental (e.g. unlimited mileage).
- 4. Reimbursement claims for private driving mileage between the home and the residential facility site may not exceed 110% of an independent estimate of said mileage.
- 5. Request for mileage reimbursement must be accompanied by an itemized and signed travel invoice. These invoice forms may be obtained by request from the SMMUSD Special Education Office.
- 6. <u>Lodging costs will be reimbursed for no more than two nights per visitation, with a maximum reimbursement of \$75.00 per night.</u>
- 7. <u>Airport Parking fees are not to exceed \$12.00 per day; Airport Shuttle/Fly-Away</u> roundtrip costs are not to exceed \$20.00.
- 8. <u>All requests for reimbursement must be accompanied by itemized, original, dated receipts. No reimbursement will be made without such receipts. Receipts must specify the exact cost of each item for which reimbursement is requested.</u>

- 9. Requests for reimbursement must be submitted within thirty (30) days of travel.
- 10. Expenditures not eligible for reimbursement include:
 - o First Class/Business Class Airfare
 - o Travel expenses for siblings/extended family members/friends/advocates and/or other family representatives
 - o Luxury hotel accommodations
 - o <u>Luxury vehicle rentals</u>
 - o Meals
 - o Entertainment related expenses
 - o Alcoholic Beverages
 - o Snacks
 - o Tips
 - o Weekend Trips

BIDS

In order to ensure transparency and the prudent expenditure of public funds, the Board of Education shall award contracts in an objective manner and in accordance with law. District equipment, supplies, and services shall be purchased using competitive bidding when required by law or if the Board determines that it is in the best interest of the district to do so.

When the Board has determined that it is in the best interest of the district, the district may piggyback onto the contract of another public agency or corporation to lease or purchase equipment or supplies to the extent authorized by law. (Public Contract Code 20118)

Bid specifications shall be carefully designed and shall describe in detail the quality, delivery, and service required.

To assist the district in determining whether bidders are responsible, the Board may require prequalification procedures as allowed by law and specified in administrative regulation.
