 Kristine Keever addressed the board regarding the implementation of the district's wellness policy, especially at Webster ES. Mr. de la Torre asked staff about this issue. Dr. Escarce requested that the wellness policy be included in the Friday Packet. Seth Jacobson thanked the staff for their comments at the Point Dume Charter School petition hearing at LACOE, but said he wished the board members had attended. Dr. Escarce explained that he wrote a letter to the LACOE board expressing his opinion on the petition, but was unable to attend the meeting. Mr. Cuneo clarified the LACOE staff report will be presented on February 1 at 3:00pm, and the LACOE board will take action on February 8 at 3:00pm. He has asked the LACOE Superintendent to place those items later in the agenda so employees can attend.

Student Board Member Choo hoped everyone enjoyed their winter break and had a great New Year. Water polo, soccer, basketball, and wrestling started their league games this week. Winter guard and drum line began their competition season this week. Samohi hosted the CIF Cheerleading Championship. Samohi's varsity team placed second, while JV and Frosh/Soph placed first in their division; they will advance to the National Championship. The Jazz Band Concert was this past Monday, and trumpet player Wayne Bergeron performed. The Band Concert is tomorrow night at 7:00pm in Barnum Hall. The Spaghetti and Strings Orchestra event will be on January 29 at 7:00pm in the cafeteria. Choir's Café Samo will be on February 4 and 5 at 7:00pm in the Humanities Center.

The ASB Winter Lunch Rally is tomorrow in the Greek; there will be a door raffle, student music performances, and appreciation for all winter sports. The first ever ASB Food Truck Fundraiser will be on February 18. ASB has taken a bigger step toward altruism by becoming involved in the Soles for Souls and This is Not a Shirt programs, sponsored by Adidas. Students and faculty have the opportunity to purchase a shirt for \$20, with \$10 benefitting the school and \$10 benefitting the Haiti Relief Fund. Billy Foran – Olympic High School

Student Board Member Foran began his report by wishing everyone a happy New Year. He reported that State Superintendent Jack O'Connell has named Olympic High School a 2011 Model Continuation High School, making it one of the twenty-seven schools to receive the honor this year. The school's Academic Performance Index score has increased from 356 during the 2005-2006 school year to 657 last year. This is incredible achievement. Biology teacher Mr. Fuller, who has been growing vegetables in the school garden, is now sharing the vegetables with Chef Raymond Garcia at the Fig in the Fairmont Hotel. Twelve lucky students will be invited to tour the restaurant and eat a special dinner made just for them. The school's drama program has begun reading Shakespeare, including Mrs. Sweeny's personal favorite, Othello. On December 3, Olympic's staff participated in a training session at the UCLA Center for the Assessment and Prevention of Prodromal States. Staff learned about Pre-Schizophrenia and will hold an assembly about it next week. CBS Foreign Correspondent Terry McCarthy shared a story about the FBI capturing a young student moonlighting as a terrorist who wanted to bomb a community event in Oregon. This presentation led to an in-depth discussion amongst the students.

SMPD School Resource Officer Carlos Jaen spent three days in the school's Criminal Justice class sharing a 'Frontline' story about young adults in juvenile halls. The story was centered on three misguided youths spending time in juvenile halls.

The board congratulated Dr. Gates and Olympic High School for being recognized as one of twenty-seven Model Continuation High Schools in California.

D. PTA Council – Shari Davis (5)

Ms. Davis reported that PTA Council is working on the Buy Local Campaign, a partnership with the City of Santa Monica and the Chamber of Commerce as they promote buying from local Santa Monica retailers. They held a meeting today with the Buy Local Campaign to plan for the upcoming Expo Day on March 19, which is the same day the LA Marathon ends in Santa Monica. They explored ideas to bring the Buy Local Campaign to the parent and education community. SMMEF's Linda Gross is one of the Co-Chairs of the Buy Local Expo. Mr. Allen suggested his fellow board members think of ways they could help participate in the campaign. Mr. Mechur would like a report from the Buy Local team at the February 17 board meeting.

PTA had an excellent, well-attended meeting at Samohi on Tuesday with a focus on how to prevent students from getting involved with drug use. The meeting was a collaboration with the police department and provided parents with valuable information on how to talk to their children about drugs. Ms. Davis suggested that perhaps there could be more focus on Red Ribbon Week. Mr. Allen asked if something similar was planned for Malibu or Olympic High Schools. Ms. Davis said the PTA would discuss this on Tuesday. Mr. de la Torre asked is this was in response to a specific incident. Ms. Davis said PTA always has the safety of students foremost on the agenda. Mr. de la Torre suggested sustainable partnerships to work with youth to prevent drug use. Dr. Escarce said it would be a good idea to bring back a discussion item on programs that have been instituted and data on student suspensions, etc., to examine how those agencies could be involved at the high schools.

The PTA Council discussed the upcoming Superintendent search and requested that Ms. Davis convey the following. The council has offered

whatever support they can provide. They would like a session with the search firm during a PTA council meeting. They encouraged the board to communicate with the public about the process and when the public will have an opportunity to give input. The PTA will do its job communicating the process and progress with parents. The council is willing to send a representative to participate in the interview process, if the board chooses that format. Dr. Escarce clarified that the special meeting next week will be the first exchange between the board and Leadership Associates, not necessarily a time to take community input. Next week, the board will finalize the search timeline, including times for community input.

7:13 pm X. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

Superintendent Cuneo reported that LACOE's public hearing on the Point Dume Charter School petition was held last Tuesday. The petitioners were given ten minutes to present, and then the board heard speakers for and against. Mr. Cuneo said this was the first step in a three-part process. On February 1 at 3:00pm, the LACOE board will hear their staff's analysis of the petition. On February 8 at 3:00pm, the LACOE Superintendent will make a recommendation to the county board based on his staff's analysis. SMMUSD staff will be there to represent SMMUSD, and several board members have expressed interest in attending. If the charter petition is approved, the county becomes the Local Education Agency and would supervise the charter school. If it is denied, the petitioners can choose to appeal to the state level.

Last Tuesday at Samohi, Dr. Pedroza, members of his staff, PTSA President Debbie Mulvaney, and members of the Santa Monica Police Department met to address an increase in the use of prescription drugs among students. The staff is working closely with parents and law enforcement to help understand what is happening at the school. He thanked Dr. Pedroza, his team, and Debbie Mulvaney for their leadership.

On Saturday, January 22, from 8:00am to noon at the PDLC, the Education Foundation will be hosting its Big Idea meeting, which is part of its Strategic Planning process.

The new Governor has announced his proposed state budget for the next school year. Staff will know more about the potential impacts after we have received analysis on School Services of CA and other organizations. The initial indication is that the Governor feels K-12 education has taken substantial hits. Mr. Cuneo thanked the communities for approving Y and YY in November, which will reduce the district's deficit and make the decisions easier to manage. The district will still be deficit spending, but will not have to make the types of reductions that were made in the past.

Mr. Cuneo reminded board members that Monday is a holiday commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday. Tomorrow morning is the Westside Coalition Interfaith Breakfast at the Calvary Baptist Church.

Mr. Mechur asked if the LACOE meeting on February 1 would allow for public comment. Mr. Cuneo said it would, but he was not sure how much time. He suggested people submit their written comments to the LACOE board in case there is not enough time for all the public comments.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.05

It is recommended that the Board of Education accept a grant of \$10,000 to fund a partnership with the Los Angeles County Arts Commission and Los Angeles Music Center. SMMUSD agrees to partner with the Los Angeles Music Center's theatre teaching artists, to provide a four-hour professional development session for 25 elementary classroom teachers and five teaching artist visits to each classroom participating in the program. The district will match the grant amount provided by the Arts Commission to offer the program to more teachers and cover the expense of the professional development.

COMMENTS: The Los Angeles Music Center will provide a toolkit of techniques and processes in Theatre for all participating classroom teachers. Participating classroom teachers in grades K-5 will develop an understanding of how to apply these techniques back in the classroom with a focus on Literacy and Language Arts integration. The teachers will focus on using Theatre techniques to make stories come to life in the classroom. The Music Center will align Theatre techniques and processes to district's Language Arts goals and outcomes.

An example of content sequence of professional development in Theatre includes the following components:

- Introduction, including overview (history/ background), elements (character, conflict, setting, plot), and stage work (stage areas, projection, pronunciation/articulation)
- Character (what it is, and how to create it: shape it/ write it/ speak it)
- Movement (walk, gesture, facial expressions/ non-verbal communication)
- Setting
- Improvisation *exploring ideas*
- Storytelling retelling something already written, making it come alive
- Source material (text resources, including core literature)

RE: HEAD START COLLABORATION WITH THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY OFFICE OF EDUCATION

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.06

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the refunding application and budget for fiscal year 2011-2012 with Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) for the purpose of providing Head Start services to eligible families effective July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012. This agreement is to be executed between the Superintendent of Public Instruction, LACOE, and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District, wherein LACOE agrees to pay Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Child Development Fund an amount not to exceed 1,593,352 for the Head Start-Basic Program and \$10,282 for the Head Start Training and Technical Assistance.

COMMENT: Head Start is a federal grant program with a long history of providing comprehensive child development and support services to young children and families with incomes at or below the poverty level. The contract, operates on a minimum of 200 days, provides for the operation of ten Head Start classes – approximately 194 children in a full day setting in partnership with State Preschool funds.

Goals (2011-2012)

1. Support the school success of eligible, low-income children by providing opportunities for their families to transcend the effect of poverty.

Objectives:

- Design and implement a service delivery model for overweight children.
- Support the achievement of children identified with difficulties in learning.
- Continue training and monitor child outcomes of English Language Learners.
- Design a curriculum for frequency of math operations and cross training of effective lessons.
- Create a partnership with organizations serving Head Start eligible families to coordinate a responsive delivery of services.
- Extend and revise the collaborative partnerships in order to improve the quality of service for homeless families.
- Implement a District wide transition plan for children moving from preschool to kindergarten.
- 2. To maintain a consistent and cohesive Fiscal Services desk.

Objective:

• Cross train another staff person on Head Start record keeping and reporting procedures.

Activities to support parent involvement must also be included. Services must be supplementary and may include additional support staff, such as specialist teachers, counselors, and instructional aides. Services may also include before/after school intersession classes, instructional materials, equipment, technology, professional development and conferences. Each school's School Site Council is required to provide input and recommend to the Board for approval the planned program activities and budgets as part of the Single Plan for Student Achievement. COMMENT: This project will authorize ARB Inc. to repair damaged underground gas lines at the Muir/SMASH Schools during the winter recess.

In October 2010, a gas leak was detected at the Muir/SMASH site. RSB Plumbing was hired to patch the line in the identified location (PO#111909 for \$20,000). During the repair, it was discovered that there were gas leaks in other areas in the campus and was not isolated to only to the one area. All gas to the site has been disconnected, electric heaters were ordered for each room on the campus in November (PO 112516 to Howard Industries for \$17,286), and Food Services began to bring in hot food by utilizing hot food delivery carts.

In Mid-November an investigation began to determine the scope of the leaks. It was determined in December that the leaks encompassed the entire campus due to faulty installation at the time of construction. ASCIP has offered to help with the subrogation to collect money from the ES Bond Program construction team and to provide funds up to \$100,000 to mitigate losses due to the repairs. (This loss is not covered under the District's insurance coverage).

A payment bond and all other construction documents will be furnished for this project. Los Angeles County Department of Education has approved this project as an Emergency Project and will require unanimous approval by resolution which follows.

Duration of the project is 2-3 weeks.

EMERGENCY RESOLUTION NO. 10-17 FOR AWARDING <u>"Gas line repair Muir/SMASH schools"</u>, WITHOUT ADVERTISING.

Action taken by the members of the Board of Education of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District at a regular meeting held <u>January 13, 2011</u>.

BE IT UNANIMOUSLY RESOLVED by this Board that an emergency exists wherein certain repairs, alterations, work and improvements are necessary to permit the continuance of existing school classes, or to avoid danger to health, life or property, to wit:

This project will address the damage to the underground gas lines that are currently leaking. The site has no gas at this time for heating and cooking. Portable electric heaters have been purchased in the interim at a high cost of fuel, to provide heat to classrooms on the colder mornings. All gas cooking and food preparation has ceased in the cafeteria. The total scope of work will be determined after the contractor has completed inspection of the facility. It is anticipated that the cost will be over \$100,000 and can be completed in two weeks if the method of either sealing the pipes from the inside or sleeving the pipes and seals will work. Work can be completed during the winter break (two week window) with the trenching causing no disruption to the facility, and would allow the district to return to the more efficient gas heat. Should the issues be deemed more involved than originally anticipated, with engineering and DSA review is required, the project will be taken through proper bidding procedures.

This emergency procedure will enable the District to correct this condition by <u>January 2011 (2-3 weeks from award of contract) at Muir/SMASH Schools.</u>

The estimated cost of this job is \$100,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board makes contracts in writing on behalf of the District, without advertising for bids or inviting of bids for the performance of labor and furnishing of materials and supplies for such repairs, alterations, work and improvements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that before entering into such contracts, that the approval of the County Superintendent of Schools be secured to this resolution and to the proposed contracts.

Mr. Allen underscored the importance of attendance taking and requested the board be kept up-to-date on school compliance through a regular report. He wanted to make sure every administrator was fully aware of attendance taking requirements. Ms. Maez agreed with the seriousness of accuracy, adding that the sites now have a better understanding of attendance taking and self-auditing as a means of increasing accuracy. The district's new student information system (SIS) will involve intensive training, providing the perfect opportunity to improve consistency.

Mr. Patel asked about a penalty for previous findings at JAMS. Ms. Maez said the district had appealed to the state and hired a firm to organize JAMS's attendance taking documentation from that year. This was a lengthy process that required signatures from teachers who were at JAMS that year. The district is now ready for the district auditors to review the documentation at JAMS and determine if they can certify its accuracy. Ms. Lash commented that while the state could potentially penalize the district for the attendance-taking errors, she has never seen the state actually do so.

Mr. Mechur asked about the current attendance taking system. Ms. Maez said the district uses a computerized attendance system, complemented by a web-based system. The new SIS is slated to begin on July 1, but she was not aware if the attendance taking module is different. Mr. Cuneo said staff would provide information on what is being done to improve attendance taking in the existing system.

Ms. Leon-Vazquez asked who was in charge of SIS training. Mr. Cuneo said the consultants are running simulations in the new SIS and creating documentation and training plans, all of which can be shown to the board.

Dr. Escarce asked how many SMMUSD schools the audit firm visits each year. Ms. Lash said about a third or half, with a visit to Olympic for the past two consecutive years. Dr. Escarce stressed that in order to ensure schools are in compliance, one person should be in charge of oversight, and transition to the new SIS be included in budget planning. Mr. Allen commented that districts are funded through accurate attendance taking; cutting administrators, who oversee such operations, can lead to things falling through the cracks. Dr. Escarce agreed, adding that administrators also provide valuable classroom teacher support.

Resolution No. 10-18 Commemorating Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

Whereas, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was born in 1929 in Atlanta Georgia;

Whereas, the young Martin Luther King attended segregated public schools and graduated from high school at age 15;

Whereas, Dr. King received his B.A. degree from Morehouse College in Georgia, the alma mater of both his father and grandfather and earned his B.D. from Crozer Theological Seminary. Later, in 1955, he received a Ph.D. from Boston University;

Whereas, Dr. King was committed to equal rights for African-Americans in this country from an early age and was an active member of the NAACP;

Whereas, Dr. King led the boycott of Montgomery's segregated buses for over a year after Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat in a bus in 1955, and eventually, the Supreme Court outlawed discrimination in public transportation and Dr. King emerged a prominent leader of the civil rights movement;

Whereas, Dr. King began organizing protest demonstrations and marches in such cities as Birmingham, Alabama, St. Augustine, Florida and Selma, Alabama. The marches were for the right to vote, desegregation, labor rights and other basic civil rights.

Whereas, between 1957 and 1968, Dr. King canvassed the country and appeared more than 2500 times to speak in protest against injustices toward his race;

Whereas, Dr. King wrote five books and numerous articles drawing on his experience as a preacher to galvanize and inspire an audience. Dr. King was arrested and jailed on several occasions;

Whereas, on August 28, 1963, Dr. King led the great march in Washington, DC, that culminated with his famous "I Have a Dream" speech at the Lincoln Memorial. More than a quarter million people of all ethnicities attended the event.

Whereas, at the height of Dr. King's influence, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965 were passed.

Whereas, Dr. King was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, at the age of 35.

Whereas, Dr. King continued his work to attack discrimination in other parts of the North and broadened his criticism against the Vietnam War;

Whereas, Dr. King advocated for government compensatory program seeking restitution of wages lost to slavery which in turn, demanded aid for the poorest communities and sought an economic bill of rights that provided for massive government job programs to reconstruct society;

Whereas, Dr. King continued to participate in the movement by supporting black city workers striking for higher wages and better treatment in Memphis, Tennessee where he was assassinated;

Whereas, in 1986, Congress established the Martin Luther King Day as a United States holiday and in 1994, King Day of Service was built on the teachings of nonviolence and social justice to promote community service. The aim is to make the holiday a day ON, where people of all ages and backgrounds come together to improve lives, bridge social barriers, and move our nation closer to the "Beloved Community" that Dr. King envisioned.

Therefore, let it be resolved, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District celebrates the life and legacy of a man who brought hope and healing to America. We commemorate the timeless values he taught us through his example – the values of courage, truth, justice, compassion, dignity, humility and service that so radiantly defined Dr. King's character and empowered his leadership. On this holiday, we commemorate the universal, unconditional love, forgiveness and nonviolence that empowered his revolutionary spirit, and speaks to the best of who we are as human beings.

Board of Education Meeting MINUTES: January 13, 2011

RE: FEDERAL STUDENT PERFORMANCE ACCOUNTABILITY

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

The Board of Education has requested a presentation from staff to discuss the potential implications and requirements related to student achievement and Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) criteria under No Child Left Behind (NCLB) regulations. This discussion will include the strategies our impacted schools are utilizing to improve student achievement in order to meet federal accountability mandates.

<u>Comment</u>: The presentation will review NCLB requirements and school and District data, as well as the strategies District and site personnel have implemented to ensure impacted schools meet federal accountability mandates.

Educational Services staff and site principals will be available to answer questions and provide follow up information if necessary.

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The presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Mr. Allen requested information on how many California Title I schools are in Program Improvement (PI). He worried about the implications of a school going into PI. He and Ms. Leon-Vazquez wondered about the larger number of students in the "students with disabilities" subgroup at Will Rogers. Dr. Bradford explained that some of these students with low frequency disabilities attend Will Rogers and other sites because of specific Special Education programs at those sites. Special Education Coordinator Francis Costanzo added that under the newly revised Special Education program structure, students who had been previously placed at certain sites to address their specific needs will now be able to stay at their home schools and the distribution of students with disabilities will become more even among the sites.

Mr. de la Torre asked how parents are being involved in these goals. *Dr.* Chou and Ms. Harris outlined parent outreach through ELAC meetings, PTA efforts, and community liaisons.

Mr. Mechur said the district should share feedback with partner organizations to see how their services could also be improved for our students.

Mr. Patel suggested the district examine best practices employed in other districts. He stressed a focus on areas that will keep the district from PI by using safe harbor in the subgroups.

Ms. Lieberman wondered what would be the most coordinated approach to maximize community organization opportunities and partnerships. She asked if Rogers parents were aware of the site going into PI and what support was in place. Principal Steve Richardson thanked the board for their dedication to the success of Will Rogers. He said parents were aware that certain subgroups are struggling.

Dr. Escarce asked about the instructional strategies employed at the sites and districtwide. Dr. Bradford said the instructional strategies presented this evening are strong strategies in general; SMMUSD's focus on data-driven, targeted instruction and programs at specific sites are already in play in the district. Dr. Escarce said it is important to prepare for the possibility that the district will not be able to prevent Program Improvement if the NCLB law is not changed.

RE: INTENSIVE INTERVENTION SUMMER SCHOOL (IISS) PROGRAM: 2011-12

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

During this discussion item, staff will present three options for the 2011-12 Intensive Intervention Summer School (IISS), which the district funds from the general fund. Staff recommends Option 1, based on student need and the present budget constraints. Staff further recommends that the implementation of IISS shall be part of budget development process.

COMMENT: Attached is a chart summarizing the following:

Option 1

Option 1 is similar to the one provided during school year 2010-11. It provides credit recovery courses for high school students who failed the course and those students who have received a "D," only when space is available. The students are from Samohi, Malibu (housed at Samohi), and Olympic. This option will include ELD for EL students, World History for AVID students, and Connect for Success students (rising 9th graders – IISS eligible). This is a six-week program.

The middle school program provides Jump Start for Success (rising 6th grade – IISS eligible). This is a four-week program.

The elementary program will be offered to all elementary school students in danger of failing or retention. This is a four-week program.

The estimated cost is \$460,000 from the general fund and \$50,000 from Equity and Lottery Funds, including curriculum development, professional development, and other related student activities.

Option 2

Option 2 would provide a similar program offering as Option 1, but adds another week to the middle and elementary school programs. The proposed additional week is from teacher recommendations, which indicated that one more week would be better for the students in those two programs, considering the time required for assessment and activities.

The estimated cost is \$484,000 from the general fund and \$50,000 from Equity and Lottery Funds, including curriculum development, professional development, and other related student activities.

Option 3

Option 3 would provide the full program at all levels as the district has offered prior to last year. The estimated cost is \$514,000 from the general fund and \$50,000 from Equity and Lottery Funds.

ESY and Young Collegians

Please note the following programs will be offered regardless of which option is approved:

The Extended School Year (ESY) program for students in special education will be provided through Special Education funding for all levels.

The Young Collegians will be provided with summer coursework at Santa Monica College and support from Equity Fund.

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Mr. Allen asked about the academic advantages of Option 2. Dr. Chou explained that an extra week for the middle school program would allow for more instructional time as recommended from the teacher survey conducted at the end of IISS.

Mr. Cuneo explained staff is recommending Option 1 since it reflects the same expenditures as last year. He commented that the district believes in the investment in summer school, but because budget projections are fairly flat for 2011-12 staff recommends maintaining the same program as last year. He also mentioned that an extended summer school could negatively impact the summer maintenance schedule.

Mr. Patel asked if the district had seen an effect on student achievement with the reduced summer school program last year. Dr. Chou said the semester grades are not yet in, so it would be difficult to draw conclusions.

Ms. Lieberman supported Option 3. Mr. de la Torre agreed.

Following further discussion, Mr. Cuneo suggested Option 1, with the option of adding 7th and 8th grade as the budget picture becomes clearer. The board agreed with Mr. Cuneo's suggestion. Dr. Escarce requested data on the academic performance of 7th and 8th graders on CSTs following participation in summer school.

RE: CONSIDER REVISING BP 6158 – INDEPENDENT STUDY

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 6158 – Independent Study.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this mandated policy updated to (1) add material formerly in AR re: program participation is voluntary, (2) more directly reflect law re: minimum period of independent study for apportionment purposes as five "consecutive" school days, (3) revise material re: maximum length of assignments and the number of missed assignments that will trigger an evaluation of the student's participation, and (4) authorize student-teacher conferences by electronic means.

• BP 6158 – Independent Study

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This item was postponed to February 3, 2011.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

The Governing Board authorizes independent study as an optional alternative instructional strategy by which students in grades K 12 and adult education may reach curriculum objectives and fulfill graduation requirements. Independent study shall offer a means of individualizing the educational plan for students whose needs may be met best through study outside of the regular classroom setting. As necessary to meet student needs, independent study may be offered on a full-time basis or on a part-time basis in conjunction with part- or full-time classroom study.

<u>A student's participation in independent study shall be voluntary. Students participating in independent study shall have the right, at any time, to enter or return to the regular classroom mode of instruction. (Education Code 51747; 5 CCR 11700)</u>

Parents/guardians of students who are interested in independent study shall contact the school principal. The school principal shall approve independent study for an individual student only upon determining that the student is prepared to meet the district's requirements for independent study and is likely to succeed in independent study as well as or better than he/she would in the regular classroom.

The minimum period of time for any independent study option shall be five consecutive school days.

Additionally, the Board desires to ensure that students are also physically fit and leading active lives and wishes to provide the students with expanded opportunities for access to alternative ways of meeting the physical education requirements. Education Codes 51210 and 51210.1 mandate not less than 200 minutes each 10 school days in grades 6-8; and not less than 400 minutes each 10 school days in grades 9 – 12 (for a total of 2 years).

The district's independent study option shall be substantially equivalent in quality and quantity to classroom instruction, thus enabling students enrolled in independent study to complete the district's adopted course of study within the customary time frame. Students in independent study shall have access to the same services and resources as are available to other students in the school.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine that the prospective independent study student understands and is prepared to meet the district's requirements for independent study. Independent study entails a commitment by both the parent/guardian and the student. As the student gets older, he/she assumes a greater portion of the responsibility involved. Independent study may be offered only to students who can achieve in this program as well as or better than they would in the regular classroom.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a written independent study agreement, as prescribed by law, exists for each participating student. (Education Code 51747)

The Board recognizes that independent study may be used as an option to encourage students to remain in school. Teachers should carefully set the duration of independent study assignments, within the limits specified by the Board in order to help identify students falling behind in their work or in danger of failing or dropping out of school.

The written agreement shall specify the length of time in which each independent study assignment must be completed. Independent study assignments shall be no more than one week for all grade levels and types of program. However, when necessary based on the specific circumstances of the student's approved program, the Superintendent or designee may allow for a longer period of time between the date an assignment is made and when it is due, up to the termination date of the agreement.

To foster each student's success in independent study, the Board establishes the following maximum lengths of time which may elapse between the time an assignment is made and date by which the student must complete the assigned work shall be as follows:

1. For students in grades K - 3: 1 week

2. For students in grades 4 - 8: 2 weeks

3. For students in grades 9 – 12, continuation and adult education 3 weeks

When circumstances justify a longer time, the Superintendent or designee may extend the maximum length of an assignment to a period not to exceed eight weeks, pursuant to a written request with justification.

Supervising teachers should carefully set the duration of independent study assignments, within the limits specified above, and establish an appropriate schedule for student-teacher conferences in order to help identify students falling behind in their work or in danger of failing or dropping out of school. Except in unusual circumstances, it is expected that the supervising teacher will meet with each participating student at least once a week to discuss the student's progress.

When any student fails to complete consecutive independent study assignments, in a period of 15 school days, or misses two appointments with his/her supervising teacher without valid reasons, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct an evaluation to determine whether it is in the student's best interest to remain in independent study. Evaluation findings shall be kept in the student's permanent record.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board the number of students participating in independent study, the average daily attendance (ADA) generated for apportionment purposes, the quality of these students' work as measured by standard indicators, and the number and proportion of independent study students who graduate or successfully complete independent study.

Home-Based Independent Study

The Superintendent or designees shall encourage parents/guardians desiring to teach their children at home to have their children participate in independent study. Such participation allows continued contact and cooperation between the school system and the home-based student.

Students participating in Home-Based Independent Study shall be enrolled in the District's independent study program through their home school. Students who complete all requirements for high school graduation shall graduate from their home_school.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.08

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 6162.5 – Student Assessment.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this policy updated to address possible uses of student assessment data, including new law (SBX5 1), which authorizes the use of the California Longitudinal Pupil Achievement Data System in staff evaluations. Policy also adds material on the use of multiple measures, disaggregation of data, test validity, proper test administration, professional development, and release of the individual record of accomplishment.

STUDENT ASSESSMENT

The Board of Education believes that the primary goal of student assessments should shall be <u>used</u> to help students, parents/guardians and teachers identify individual student's academic accomplishments, progress and areas needing improvement in order to enhance teaching and learning.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are conducted for purposes of determining students' eligibility for and appropriate placement in district programs, need for supplemental instruction and eligibility for graduation.

The Board desires to use a variety of evaluation measures to reach the above-stated goal. To have validity, tests must correspond to the material that is being taught and reliably measure the extent to which students meet specified standards of achievement. <u>As appropriate, assessment results shall be disaggregated by student subgroup, classroom, grade level, or school site to allow for critical analysis of student needs.</u>

In selecting or developing a district assessment, the Superintendent or designee shall examine evidence of its reliability, its validity for the intended purpose and for various student populations, and the extent to which it corresponds to the material that is being taught.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that assessments are administered in accordance with law and the test publisher's directions and that test administration procedures are fair and equitable for all students.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide professional development to assist teachers and paraprofessionals in interpreting and using assessment data to improve student performance and the instructional program.

The effectiveness of the schools, teachers and district shall be evaluated in part on the basis of these student assessments.

When districtwide and school-level results of student assessments are published, the Superintendent or designee may provide supplementary information to assist parents/guardians and the local community in interpreting test results and evaluating school performance.

Individual Record of Accomplishment

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each student, by the end of grade 12, has an individual record of accomplishment that includes the following: (Education Code <u>60607</u>)

- 1. The results of the achievement test administered under the Standardized Testing and Reporting program pursuant to Education Code <u>60640</u>-<u>60647</u>
- 2. The results of any end-of-course examinations taken
- 3. The results of any vocational education certification examinations taken

No individual record of accomplishment shall be released to any person, other than the student's parent/guardian or a teacher, counselor, or administrator directly involved with the student, without the written consent of the student's parent/guardian, or the student if he/she is an adult or emancipated minor. The student or his/her parent/guardian may authorize the release of the record of accomplishment to a postsecondary educational institution for the purposes of credit, placement, or admission. (Education Code 60607)

INFORMATION ITEM NO. 1.02

The Professional Growth Program is designed to provide educational and training opportunities for classified employees. Details of the program are specified in Article 18 of the SEIU-SMMUSD Agreement. Our classified employees can participate in this program to acquire and refine job-related skills that can either improve their abilities in their current position or prepare them for a promotional position. Employees must demonstrate that 80% of the classes they take are related to their position or a possible promotion. The other 20% of the classes may come from training that is not directly work-related. Classified employees can earn a 5% salary increase for every ten points of credit (1 point is the equivalent of one college semester unit). A 5% increment can be earned as often as once every year. Classified employees can earn a maximum of five 5% increments, for a maximum total of a 25% salary increase. All professional growth courses are approved by the Assistant Superintendent, Human Resources. The attached Professional Growth Report is produced twice a year, and reflects the number of employees participating, the number of increments earned, and the types of courses taken.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Educational Opportunities

Educational opportunities offered through independent study may include, but are not limited to: (Education Code 51745)

- 1. Special assignments extending the content of regular courses of instruction
- 2. Individualized study in a particular area of interest or in a subject not currently available in the regular school curriculum
- 3. Individualized alternative education designed to teach the knowledge and skills of the core curriculum, <u>but not provided as an alternative curriculum</u>
- 4. Continuing and special study during travel
- 5. Volunteer community service activities that support and strengthen student achievement

In addition, when requested by the parent/guardian due to emergencies, vacation, arts or competitive performances or illness, independent study may be used on a short-term basis to ensure that the student is able to maintain academic progress in his/her regular classes. <u>Short-term independent study shall be offered more than five (5) consecutive school days and no more than twenty (20) consecutive school days</u>.

No course required for high school graduation shall be offered exclusively through independent study. (Education Code 51745)

Equivalency

The district's independent study option shall be substantially equivalent in quality and quantity to classroom instruction, thus enabling students participating in independent study to complete the district's adopted course of study within the customary time frame. Students in independent study shall have access to the same services and resources that are available to other students in the school. (5 CCR <u>11700</u>, 11701.5)

The district shall not provide independent study students and their parents/guardians with funds or items of value that are not provided for other students and their parents/guardians. (Education Code 46300.6, 51747.3)

Physical Education

In order to provide students with educational opportunities that are accessible through independent study physical education instruction, the following are the guidelines for implementation:

1. All students requesting to participate in independent study physical education opportunities must be enrolled in grades 6-12. Students in grades 1-5 will not be eligible for independent study PE.

- 2. The student and his/her parent shall complete the District application form and must obtain school administration approval prior to participation in independent study PE with a District approved contract.
- 3. The organizations or athletic coaches that provides the independent study PE instruction of the particular sport or athletic training shall be certified under the respective governing organizations.
- 4. These organizations or athletic coaches shall be provided with the state approved grade level PE content standards with the expectations that the coach/instructor will incorporate the content standards in the sports program the students are participating in the independent study PE.
- 5. The organizations or athletic coaches that provide the independent study PE instruction of the particular sport or athletic training shall submit to the school the independent study PE's course of study based on the proposed schedule including learning activities.
- 6. The participating students shall maintain a written schedule/log documenting weekly participation in the learning activities and submit it to the school administration two (2) weeks prior to the final date of school in order to receive grade and credits. The schedule/log shall include weekly dates and times of learning activities and a brief description of the activities that have been successfully completed.
- 7. The students who participate in Independent Study PE shall receive a grade of "P" for "pass" if they have completed satisfactorily the required program and fulfilled the instructional minutes requirements. The organizations or athletic coaches shall certify as such. The high schools, in accordance with the District's policies, shall grant credits earned.
- 8. Failure to comply with the District requirements regarding independent study PE shall render the student ineligible to receive any grade, credit, or recognition of participation in physical education.
- 9. The school administration shall evaluate the quality and effectiveness of the independent study PE annually at each site and recommend for continuance.

Eligibility for Independent Study

Provided that experienced certificated staff are available to effectively supervise students in independent study, the Superintendent or designee may approve the participation of a student who demonstrates the motivation, commitment, organizational skills, and academic skills necessary to work independently. A student whose academic performance is not at grade level may participate in independent stud only if the school is able to provide appropriate support, such as supplemental instruction, tutoring, counseling, ongoing diagnostic assessments, and/or differentiated materials, to enable the student to be successful. For an elementary student, the Superintendent or designee may consider the parent/guardian's level of commitment to assist the student.

Parents/guardians of students who are interested in independent study should contact the principal or designee. Approval for participation shall be based on the following criteria:

- 1. Evidence that the student will work independently to complete the program
- 2. Availability of experienced certificated staff with adequate time to effectively supervise the student

A student's participation in independent study shall be voluntary. (Education Code 51747)

Students participating in independent study must be residents of the local county or an adjacent county. Full-time independent study shall not be available to students whose district residency status is based on their parent/guardian's employment within district boundaries pursuant to Education Code 48204. (Education Code $\underline{46300.2}$, 51747.3)

A student with disabilities, as defined in Education Code 56026, shall not participate in independent study unless his/her individualized education program specifically provides for such participation. (Education Code 51745)

A temporarily disabled student shall not receive individual instruction pursuant to Education Code 48206.3 by means of independent study. (Education Code 51745)

No more than 10 percent of the students enrolled in a continuation high school or opportunity school or program, not including pregnant and parenting students who are primary caregivers for one or more of their children, shall be in independent study at any given time. (Education Code 51745)

Students age 21 or older, and students age 19 or older who have not been continuously enrolled in school since their 18th birthday, may participate in independent study only through the adult education program for the purpose of enrolling in courses required for a high school diploma by Education Code 51225.3 or by the Governing Board. (Education Code 46300.1, 46300.4)

Written Agreements

A written agreement shall be developed <u>and implemented</u> for each student participating in independent study for five or more <u>consecutive</u> school days. (Education Code 46300, 51747)

The agreement shall include general student data, including the student's name, address, grade level, birth date, school of enrollment, and program placement.

The written independent study agreement for each participating student shall include, but not be limited to, all of the following: (Education Code 51747)

- 1. The manner, frequency, time and place for submitting the student's assignments and for reporting his/her progress
- 2. The objectives and methods of study for the student's work, and the methods used to evaluate that work
- 3. The specific resources, including materials and personnel, that will be made available to the student
- 4. The Board's independent study policy describing the maximum length of time allowed between an assignment and its completion and the number of missed assignments which will trigger an evaluation of whether the student should be allowed to continue in independent study
- 5. The duration of the independent study agreement, including the beginning and ending dates for the student's participation in independent study under the agreement, with a maximum of one semester, or one-half year if the school is on a year-round calendar

- 6. A statement of the number of course credits or, for an elementary student, other measures of academic accomplishment appropriate to the agreement, to be earned by the student upon completion
- 7. A statement that independent study is an optional educational alternative in which no student may be required to participate
- 8. In the case of a <u>suspended or expelled</u> student who is referred or assigned to any school, class or program pursuant to Education Code 48915 or 48917, a statement that instruction may be provided through independent study only if the student is offered the alternative of classroom instruction

The agreement also may include a schedule for achieving objectives and completing the agreement and a schedule of conferences between the student and supervising teacher.

The curriculum and methods of study specified in the written agreement shall be consistent with Board policy, administrative regulations and procedures for curriculum and instruction. (5 CCR 11702)

Before beginning the independent study, each written agreement shall be signed and dated by the student, the parent/guardian or caregiver of the student if the student is under age 18, the certificated employee designated as responsible for the general supervision of independent study, and all persons who have direct responsibility for providing assistance to the student. (Education Code 51747; <u>5 CCR 11702</u>)

The agreement shall state that the parent/guardian's signature confirms his/her permission for the student's independent study as specified in the agreement.

Student Rights and Responsibilities

Students participating in independent study shall have the right, continuously, to enter or return to the regular classroom mode of instruction, including upon termination of the agreement.

Monitoring Student Progress

Independent study students who are late, miss scheduled conferences or do not submit assigned work on time shall not be reported as tardy or truant. However, the independent study administrator shall promptly and directly address any failure by the student to meet the terms of his/her written agreement. The following supportive strategies may be used:

- 1. A letter to the student and/or parent/guardian
- 2. A meeting between the student and the teacher and/or counselor
- 3. A meeting between the student and the independent study administrator, including the parent/guardian if appropriate
- 4. An increase in the amount of time the student works under direct supervision

When the student has missed the number of assignments specified in Board policy and the written independent study agreement as precipitating an evaluation, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct an evaluation which may result in termination of the independent study agreement and the student's return to a regular classroom or alternative instructional program.

Administration of Independent Study

Each student's independent study shall be coordinated, evaluated and carried out under the general supervision of a certificated employee. (Education Code 51747.5)

The responsibilities of the independent study administrator shall be to:

- 1. Ensure that the district's independent study option is operated in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation <u>and is substantially equal in quality and</u> <u>quantity to the classroom instruction</u>
- 2. Approve the participation of students requesting independent study
- 2. Obtain and maintain current information and skills required for the operation of an independent study program that meets established standards for the district's educational programs
- 3. Facilitate the completion of written independent study agreements
- 4. Approve all credits earned through independent study and forward the information to the appropriate staff so that the information becomes part of the student's record
- 5. Authorize the selection of staff to be assigned to supervise independent study
- 6. Supervise any staff assigned to independent study functions who are not regularly supervised by another administrator
- 7. Complete or coordinate the preparation of all necessary records and reports
- 8. Establish and maintain in a systematic manner all records required by law, Board policy and administrative regulation
- 9. Monitor student participation in independent study so that the district stays within prescribed limits and income to the district is maximized
- 10. Develop and manage the budget for independent study
- 11. Obtain and maintain current information and skills required for the operation of an independent study strategy that meets established standards for the district's educational programs
- 12. Assure a smooth transition into and out of the independent study mode of instruction
- 13. Prepare and submit reports as required by the Board or Superintendent

Supervising Teachers

The principal may recommend and the independent study administrator shall approve the assignment of teachers to directly supervise independent study. The teacher may be the student's regular classroom teacher, particularly for elementary students.

The teacher supervising independent study shall:

- 1. Complete designated portions of the written independent study agreement and add additional information to the written agreement when appropriate
- 2. Supervise and approve coursework
- 3. Design all lesson plans and assignments
- 4. Assess all student work and determine and assign grades or other approved measures of achievement
- 5. Personally judge the time value of assigned work or work products completed and submitted by the student
- 6. Select and save with each agreement representative samples of the student's completed and evaluated assignments on not less than a monthly basis, preferably biweekly, and signed or initialed and dated in accordance with item #3 in the section on "Records" below
- 7. Sign and complete the agreement when the student has reached his/her objectives or the agreement is terminated
- 8. Maintain a daily or hourly attendance register in accordance with item #4 in the section on "Records" below
- 9. Maintain any other required records and files on a current basis

Records

For audit purposes, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain the following records. <u>These</u> records shall include, but not be limited to: (Education Code 51748; 5 CCR 11703)

- 1. A copy of the Board policy, administrative regulation, and other procedures related to independent study
- 2. A separate listing of the students and adult education students, by grade level, program and school, who have participated in independent study, identifying units of the curriculum attempted and units of the curriculum completed by students in grades K-8 and identifying course credits attempted by and awarded to students in grades 9-12 and in adult education, as specified in their written agreements
- 3. A file of all agreements, with representative samples of each student's or adult education student's work products bearing the supervising teacher's signed or initialed and dated notations indicating that he/she has personally evaluated the work or that he/she has personally reviewed the evaluations made by another certificated teacher
- 4. A daily or hourly attendance register, as appropriate to the program in which the students are participating, separate from classroom attendance records, and maintained on a current basis as time values of student or adult education work products are personally judged by a certificated teacher, and reviewed by the supervising teacher if they are two different persons

The Superintendent or designee also shall maintain a record of grades and other evaluations issued to each student for independent study assignments for three years excluding the current fiscal year.

Each school shall maintain records for the students at that school.

A written record of the findings of any evaluation conducted after the student has missed the number of assignments specified in Board policy shall be treated as a mandatory interim student record which shall be maintained for three years from the date of the evaluation. (Education Code 51747)

National Board Presentation January 13, 2011

Superintendent Cuneo, Members of the Board of Education, and Community members:

We are Susan Samarge-Powell, a part-time Teacher on Special Assignment in Human Resources under the direction of Debra Moore Washington, and Chi Kim, principal at Pt. Dume. Though Susan is no longer in charge of National Boards due to budget restrictions, we are here tonight with the great pleasure of introducing you to our newest National Board Certified Teachers in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District.

We would like to begin with a little refresher information regarding the National Board Certification process.

The National Boards for the Professional Teaching Standards is an independent, non-profit, nonpartisan and non-governmental organization governed by a board of directors, with the majority of its members being classroom teachers.

National Board Certification is a symbol of professional teaching excellence. It was created so that teachers, like professionals in other fields, can achieve distinction by demonstrating through a demanding performance assessment that they meet high and rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do.

Teachers must demonstrate their knowledge and skills through a series of performance-based assessments that include student work samples, videotapes and rigorous analysis of their classroom teaching and student learning. Written exercises probe the depth of their subject-matter knowledge and their understanding of how to teach those subjects to their students.

Teachers have explained that they are strengthened in their practice and the beneficiaries of their improvement are the students in their classrooms.

In a recent discussion about elevating the teaching profession, U.S. Secretary of Education Arne Duncan referred specifically to National Board Certified Teachers. He stated, "It's a tremendous amount of hard work but you are some of the best teachers in the country getting better. I think the example of being a life-long learner, of challenging yourself to continue to improve even when you are already so good, is an amazing example of our students".

Additionally, in the most rigorous and comprehensive study to date about National Board Certification, the non-partisan National Research Council found in it's 2008 congressionally mandated report that students taught by NBCT's make higher gains on achievement tests than students taught by other teachers.

Though support for this process varies nationally, in SMMUSD we offer support to our candidates by reimbursing them for all application fees, providing one-on-one support from current NBCTs, providing sub days while working on the process, and a monetary reimbursement for supplies when they complete the process.

When they achieve certification, the district offers a stipend for the ten years teachers are certified in return for service hours in the area of Professional Development for colleagues. Our NBCTs have multiple options from which to choose as they decide how to best support colleagues professionally. From serving as a BTSA Support Provider, to leading Academic conferences, the NBCTs are utilizing their talents to help colleagues grow professionally so that they too may support students to the best of their abilities.

This year we have quite a few of our NBCTs serving as BTSA Support Providers and we also have many of our NBCTs serving as Instructional Leadership Team members with work that is being done through Educational Services. And as we explain every year, we also offer site administrators the possibility of utilizing the talents of their NBCTs in various ways at the sites themselves. This year, more than ever before, site administrators are asking NBCTs to help them with professional development work they have described in their Site Improvement Plans.

We have prepared a chart that illustrates all the options being utilized this year by our National Board Certified Teachers which will be provided to you in the upcoming Friday packets.

The newest 9 National Board Members will soon join this elite group in providing professional development to the district. As we introduce them you will hear a bit about their intentions and how to support colleagues.

This year in California, 342 teachers achieved certification, for a total of 4,913, which helped make California fifth in the nation in the overall total of National Board Certified Teachers.

As exciting as that sounds, however, if you think about it, nationally NBCTs represent about 3 percent of the teaching population, in California, only about 1.5% of teachers are Nationally Board Certified, whereas in our district, including our 9 new NBCTs, SMMUSD now has a total of 67 of our 590 teachers who are now Nationally Board Certified, which is over 11% of our teaching population! You may also know that we have 3 administrators in our district who achieved certification when they were in the classroom. As I am proud to say each year, we are small, but mighty!

It gives me great pleasure to introduce you to our newest National Board Certified Teachers. As I call their names, I'm going to ask them to come up and greet our Superintendent and Board members – and pause for a photo moment!

Steve Cannell

Steve Cannell is currently a fourth grade teacher at Franklin Elementary School. He earned his certification in Middle Childhood generalist. Steve has been in education for 18 years, 16 of which have been for SMMUSD. Steve pursued certification as a professional challenge, and felt that working with an amazing mentor at Franklin and going through the process with colleagues was a highlight of the journey. Much like the teachers to follow, Steve found the time to complete the process well was a challenge as he still wanted to make sure he was giving his students 100%. He hopes to support other colleagues as they go through this process and would like to say that he feels the support SMMUSD provides candidates through this process really differentiates our district as a desirable place to be for future NBCTs who are currently employed or who are thinking of coming to SMMUSD. And as a personal side note, it was truly thanks to Steve that we brought the process to SMMUSD and researched and developed such a strong support program. So along with our congratulations go our thanks to Steve!

Sofia Cedillo

Sofia is currently a Kindergarten teacher at Will Rogers Learning Community. She began her teaching career her in SMMUSD and is now entering her 6th year of teaching. Sofia earned her certification in Generalist/Early Childhood and pursued certification because she strongly believes that an effective and accomplished teacher is one who is constantly learning and evolving in order to maximize student achievement. She felt that having to document, analyze, synthesize and justify her teaching methods validated her teaching practice and helped her feel empowered to positively impact the future of the children in SMMUSD. Additionally, she felt that having a support network from colleagues while on this journey was what helped her achieve her success. As part of her professional development back to the district, Sofia is going to a

member of the Instructional Leadership Team district-wide, and will facilitate Academic Conferences at her school site. Congratulations, Sofia!

Andrea Ware













































Implications for Title I Schools

 IF a Title I school were to miss AYP for two consecutive years, it would enter Year One of Program Improvement the following year. With AMO targets increasing sharply, essentially all of our Title I schools are at risk of Program Improvement by 2014.

Lincoln: Professional Development Focus Students Project

- Data analysis training
 - Compared CST and class grades data for last year's and current year's students
- Selection of five focus students
 - Every teacher chose five students, representative of the demographic groups at the school, with Basic, Below or Far Below scores in ELA or Math
 - Teachers keep their five students in mind when planning lessons and build in necessary scaffolds and accommodations that will benefit these students and all students in the class
 - Teachers periodically reflect on the changes in their practice and share their learning with colleagues during department, core and faculty meetings










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
Special Ed Coordinator Support



 - Arranging visits to observe teaching in other classrooms and schools








Challenges!

- Resources: Funding
 - Lack of reliable on-going funding streams
 - One time moneys often result in outside experts or hourly/part-time support that we cannot maintain
- Resources: Time
 - Continually subbing out teachers impacts students
 - Teacher Leaders may be "maxed out" as they play multiple roles in improvement efforts
- Resources: Personnel
 - One time funds and shortened timeline for spending make it difficult to put the right people in place
