A. Student Board Member Reports (15)

Brontë Burnette – Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Burnette reported on sports activities at Samohi. Boys' and girls' basketball played Culver City on Wednesday and is playing Beverly on Friday. The soccer team is also playing Beverly on

Friday. The regular season ends on February 9, and the championships start on February 10. The school is expecting great things from their sports team and knows they will do great. Cheer will be leaving for Nationals in Florida on Thursday February 9. Girls' water polo played Beverly Hills on Tuesday. The athletes are enjoying the new synthetic turf field. Commitment Day was on Wednesday, with Samohi senior athletes committing to their choice of college.

Ms. Burnette also reported that construction started a few weeks ago on the softball field. Sound walls were installed this week to keep the construction noise in the classrooms below 50. The major construction, which has not started yet, happens after 3:30pm. Traffic has increased around campus with the extra construction vehicles and no student parking. Evacuation and assembly zones have changed because the softball field is not available.

The Jazz Concert went well on January 24. Cafe Samo is on Friday at 7:00pm and Saturday at 3:30pm and 7:30pm. Spaghetti and Strings is on February 11 in the Cafeteria at 6:00pm. There was a Candyland-themed pep rally on Friday with a dance from ASB and a preview of South Pacific, the spring musical. Spirit Days that week were 1980s Tuesday, Athletic Wednesday, Intellectual Thursday, and Class Colors on Friday. Clubs are restarting for second semester. Junior Steering has a fundraiser this Thursday at the Slice Pizza Restaurant on Ocean Park from 5:00-9:00pm. Senior Gear has arrived and has been distributed. Senior period-byperiod meetings are on Friday to discuss spring semester fundraisers and prom. Freshman Steering made \$215 dollars in a Johnny Rockets fundraiser last Wednesday and Thursday. There is a laser tag fundraiser on February 10. Samohi hosted a dodge ball tournament last week at lunch. ASB and Samohi Solar Alliance are hosting a Jean Drive in association with American Eagle Outfitters to collect used jeans that benefit needy teens. There was a fire in the South Gym on Tuesday. Evacuations went well and all students and staff are safe.

Yasi Afsharnive – Malibu High School

Student Board Member Afsharnive reported that last week's Spirit Week, the theme of which was When I Close My Eyes, was a success. The boys' basketball team beat Bishop Diego. THe team is currently undefeated and hopes to win CIFs this year. Saturday was the semiformal dance at Café Habana. On February 12, the school is hosting an e-waste round up and asking people to drop off their old batteries and electronics. The school will be administering the CAHSEE next Tuesday and Wednesday. Backwards Day will be on February 8, and students will attend all their classes in reverse order. Coffee House will be on February 10 at 7:00pm in the library. Since the last House of Reps meeting, where student turn-out was low, ASB has discussed ways to increase attendance, including offering incentives and getting the word out earlier. The Boys' and Girls' Club named Makenzie Ksisks Youth of the Year.

Chynna Summers - Olympic High School

Student Board Member Summers reported that while students were enjoying a pupil free day on January 23, Malibu High School librarian Joe Dimercurio organized a meeting with the other school librarians to help start a library on the Olympic High School campus. This would be the first library on campus since the school opened in 1966. The librarians

organized the books that are currently on campus, while the school submitted an order for \$9,000 worth of new books. The funds will come from the Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation and a Barona Tribal Grant. Malibu High School even donated its allotment from this year's Education Foundation funds to Olympic High School to get the library off the ground.

This semester, the One Story Project will begin at Olympic High School. This is a project form the Santa Monica Library that exposes students to oral history interviewing and local history research, filming, and broadcasting from CityTV. The student-conducted interviews will be archived in the library.

Street Film Crew is a project on campus this semester that teaches students about a career in filming, editing, writing, and production, all leading to a chance to interview for a spot in the Promo Pathway program, a one-year program at SMC that includes internships and entry level positions at television networks.

Ms. Summers thanked the board members and senior cabinet who joined the school in its Food Truck Night fundraiser on January 26. The next event will be on February 23 from 6:00 to 9:00pm. On February 1, graphic novelist Scott Marcano spoke to students about his job, aspects of his career, and how students could get into the profession. Ms. Summers announced that many Olympic students are taking the SMC pledge class on college successfulness and career planning.

Kerry Hernandez – Point Dume Marine Science School PTSA President Ms. Heather Anderson delivered Ms. Pye's report. In cooperation with the district, CEPS, and the Santa Monica-Malibu Education Foundation, PTA Council hosted very successful, well-attended State of Our Schools events in both Santa Monica and Malibu this week.

The council's Communications Committee is hosting a seminar this week designed to help PTA units enhance and expand their websites. The committee's first SMMUSD Profile, featuring Dr. Maureen Bradford, Director of Assessment, Research, and Evaluation, was sent out today. The goal of the Profiles is to acquaint the community with some of the talented, professional staff members working for the district.

Ms. Anderson thanked the board for considering the appointment of the PTA Council President to the Parcel Tax Feasibility Committee. She announced that the individual PTAs and the PTA Council are in the process of assembling their slate of officers for next year. Council President Kelly Pye is stepping down, as is Council Treasurer, Kjersti Luneng, so there are very important positions to fill. Thankfully, in our community, there is no shortage of talented volunteers. Ms. Anderson completed her report by congratulating the SMMUSD students whose "Reflections" artwork came in first place at the 33rd PTA District level.

Superintendent Lyon reported that the Superintendent's Advisory Group held its first meeting, during which it set its calendar of meetings and organized into task committees. The next meeting will be on February 6 at the district office. Ms. Lyon thanked CEPS, the PTA Council, the Education Foundation, and Sarah Wahrenbrock for planning the State of Our Schools event, which was on January 30 in Malibu and January 31 and Santa Monica. She also commended the principals who presented at State of Our Schools. The ribbon cutting ceremony for the newly complete construction projects at Lincoln Middle School was yesterday. Twenty-two SMMUSD secondary teachers attended the AP U.S. history workshop provided by the College Board to discuss equity and access to AP programs as well as preparing the students for the exams. Ms. Lyon reported that she attended the annual Superintendent's Symposium in Monterey a couple of weeks ago, where she discussed educational issues with her peers. The second Dialogue on Race event will be this Saturday at 9:00am in the Samohi cafeteria. Ms. Lyon mentioned that staff is trying to move the regular board meeting on March 1 to Malibu because representatives from the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE) will be present to answer board member questions about Malibu becoming its own school district. If the meeting space in Malibu is not available on March 1, the meeting will remain in Santa Monica, the original location.

It is recommended that the Board of Education ("Board") adopt Resolution No. 11-06 to certify the Final Environmental Impact Report ("EIR"), make certain findings, adopt a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP") and Statement of Overriding Considerations, and approve the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements Project ("Proposed Project").

DISCUSSION:

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District") developed the Proposed Project to improve the Malibu Middle and High School ("MMHS") to meet current educational facility standards, maximize the learning environment for the school's student body, enhance student safety, and provide additional recreational opportunities for students and the community. Once the Proposed Project was developed, the District engaged Atkins to conduct an environmental review of the Proposed Project under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"). Atkins determined that the Proposed Project could potentially cause significant environmental impacts that could not be feasibly mitigated. As a result, Atkins proceeded to prepare an EIR that discloses the components of the Proposed Project; evaluates and analyzes the potential environmental impacts; presents feasible mitigation measures to reduce certain significant environmental impacts to less than significant; discloses that certain significant environmental impacts cannot be feasibly mitigated, but certain benefits of the Proposed Project have overriding considerations that outweigh the unavoidable significant impacts; and evaluates a reasonable range of alternatives.

On September 12, 2008, the District issued a Notice of Preparation of a Draft EIR and the Proposed Project's Initial Study for public review and comment. The comment period ended on October 27, 2008 (a total of 45 days). Thirty-two comment letters/emails were received that raised concerns with traffic, parking, biological resources, environmentally sensitive area, aesthetics (views), night lighting, and water quality. In addition, District staff held a public scoping meeting on September 24, 2008. Fifteen members of the public commented on the same topics as in the comment letters. Atkins and District staff considered all of these comments in preparing the Proposed Project's Draft EIR. Further, the District removed the athletic field lighting component from further consideration after the California Coastal Commission determined that such lighting was prohibited in the Local Coastal Program ("LCP").

On July 12, 2011, the District issued a Notice of Availability and the Proposed Project's Draft EIR for public review and comment. The Notice of Availability was published in the Malibu Surfside News; posted at the City of Malibu City Hall, the District website, and the Los Angeles County Clerk; and provided to all residences within 500 feet of the MMHS campus, as well as any individual, organization, or agency that had attended one of the several community meetings on the Proposed Project and provided their addresses. The Draft EIR was made available at District's office, the MMHS Library, the City of Malibu Planning Counter, the City of Malibu Public Library, District website, and the City of Malibu website. The comment period for the Draft EIR ended on September 13, 2011 (a total of 60 days). On July 28, 2011, District staff

and Atkins conducted a community presentation on the Proposed Project and the Draft EIR. Comment cards were received at the presentation.

Thirty comment letters and cards on the Draft EIR were received during the comment period from the six public agencies, two private organizations, and twenty-two individuals. Although numerous areas were commented on, the key issues concerned (1) the cumulative impacts from the California Coastal Commission's recent approval of the City of Malibu's LCP Amendment that would allow the use of lights at the main athletic field for eighteen evening football and other games; (2) moving the new 150-space parking lot; (3) construction worker parking along Morning View Drive; and (4) construction dust analysis and mitigation.

LCP Amendment. Although not technically a project since the LCP Amendment requires the District to obtain a new coastal development and conditional use permits from the City of Malibu, the Final EIR reports the California Coastal Commission's findings that there are no significant cumulative impacts to aesthetics and biological resources. Further, the Final EIR includes additional studies supporting these findings and that the Proposed Project would not create a cumulatively considerable impact on traffic since existing afternoon games would shift to evening games. The additional studies and analysis for the LCP Amendment required three months to complete and incorporate into the final EIR.

150-Space Parking Lot. Commenters suggested relocating the 150-Space Parking Lot to another location on the campus because of concerns with the lot interfering with views. As discussed in the Final EIR, the limitations of the campus topography, the need to keep the parking lot close to the developed portion of the campus and to provide emergency access to the athletic field all preclude relocating this lot. Further, the Draft EIR and as elaborated in the response to comments of the Final EIR, the view impact would be less than significant.

Construction Worker Parking. A number of comments focused on the concern that allowing construction workers to park along Morning View Drive would create significant traffic and safety impacts. The Final EIR revised the traffic mitigation measure to prohibit construction worker parking along Morning View Drive and the use of a shuttle and offsite parking for construction workers.

Dust Analysis. The South Coast Air Quality Management District commented that the dust analysis needed modification and suggested additional mitigation measures. Atkins performed the modified analysis that is included in the Final EIR that still comes to the same conclusion that even with the suggested mitigation measures, the impact would be still be significant. The suggested mitigation measures are included in the Final EIR.

On January 20, 2012, proposed responses to public agency comments were delivered to each respective agency.

None of the comments identified a new significant or cumulatively considerable environmental impact, an increase in the severity of a significant or cumulatively considerable environmental impact, a feasible alternative to the Proposed Project or mitigation measures considerably different from others previously analyzed that would clearly lessen a significant environmental impact, or a feasible way to mitigate the two unavoidable significant impacts that the Proposed Project may cause. Further, the new information contained in the Final EIR merely clarifies or amplifies and makes insignificant changes to the Draft EIR. Accordingly, the Draft EIR is adequate and need not be recirculated for additional public review and comment.

CEQA requires that the District make certain formal findings before it approves or carries out the Proposed Project. Atkins prepared proposed Findings, which are attached as Exhibit 1. Additionally, CEQA requires the District to approve of the MMRP to ensure that all significant and cumulatively considerable impacts are feasibly mitigated and that a program be adopted to

ensure that mitigation measures are properly implemented. Atkins prepared the proposed MMRP, which is included in Exhibit 1.

The Proposed Project would cause two unavoidable significant impacts: construction dust and sky glow from the lights at the 150-Space Parking Lot and access road. Since no feasible mitigation is available for these two significant impacts, CEQA requires that the District adopt a Statement of Overriding Considerations, which is included in Exhibit 1, explaining that certain economic, legal, social, technological, or other benefits of the Proposed Project outweigh the unavoidable significant environmental impacts, which make them nonetheless acceptable. The Proposed Project will provide many generations of students with safe and secure facilities that maximize their learning environment. This long-term social benefit outweighs these two unavoidable significant environmental impacts.

For the Final EIR, pursuant to CEQA, the Board must certify that: (1) the Final EIR has been completed in compliance with CEQA; (2) the Final EIR was presented to the Board and that the Board has reviewed and considered the information contained in the Final EIR prior to approving the Proposed Project; and (3) the Final EIR reflects the Board's independent judgment and analysis.

Should the Board adopt the Resolution, the Proposed Project will be approved and District staff will file a Notice of Determination with the Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse.

A Friday Memo accompanies this Item.

During approval of the agenda, the board agreed to pull this item from Consent.

Public Comments:

 Hans Laetz thanked the district for its efforts regarding the field lighting project. He emphasized the need for dark skies at night.

Ms. Maez read a statement into the record. It can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes. She explained the next steps, including the Coastal Commission permit and Environment Impact Report, which were moving forward simultaneously. Once all permits and approvals have been obtained, the district will put the project out to bid.

None of the comments identified a new significant or cumulatively considerable environmental impact, an increase in the severity of a significant or cumulatively considerable environmental impact, a feasible alternative to the Proposed Project or mitigation measure considerably different from others previously analyzed that would clearly lessen a significant environmental impact, or a feasible way to mitigate the

two unavoidable significant impacts that the Proposed Project may cause. Further, the new information contained in the Final EIR merely clarifies or amplifies and makes insignificant changes to the Draft EIR. Accordingly, the Draft EIR is adequate and need not be recirculated for additional public review and comment.

- 2. The proposed Findings attached in Exhibit 1 and prepared by Atkins are the findings of this Board.
- 3. The proposed Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP") included in Exhibit 1 contains feasible mitigation measures that will mitigate those identified significant or cumulatively considerable impacts to less than significant.
- 4. The Proposed Project would cause two unavoidable significant impacts: construction dust and sky glow. Since no feasible mitigation is available for these two significant impacts, the proposed Statement of Overriding Considerations included in Exhibit 1 and prepared by Atkins is the Board's Statement of Overriding Considerations. The Proposed Project will provide many generations of students with safe and secure facilities that maximize their learning environment and expand recreational opportunities. These long-term social benefits outweigh the unavoidable significant impacts of the Proposed Project.
- 5. A reasonable range of Proposed Project alternatives is evaluated in the Final EIR.
- 6. The Draft EIR, Final EIR, Responses to Comments, Findings, MMRP, Statement of Overriding Considerations, the Board Item, all other referenced documents, the whole of the record of proceedings, and this Resolution wholly reflect the Board's independent judgment and analysis.
- 7. The requirements of CEQA have been fulfilled for the Proposed Project.
- 8. The Assistant Superintendent, Janece L. Maez, is the custodian of the documents and other materials which constitute the record of proceedings upon which the Board's decision is based. The record of proceedings shall be maintained at the District's offices located at 1651 Sixteenth Street, Santa Monica, California 90404.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby certifies that:

- 1. The Proposed Project's Final EIR has been completed in compliance with CEQA;
- The Final EIR was presented to the Board and that the Board has reviewed and considered the information contained in the Final EIR prior to approving the Proposed Project; and

COMMENTS: In 2009, the City of Santa Monica Redevelopment Agency (RDA) budgeted \$57 million for the Civic Center Joint Use Project (CCJUP). To advance the CCJUP. the City in June 2010 budgeted \$1,084,423 to begin the first year of the required Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the Full Buildout (Scope 3: \$234 million). MOU #1 in the amount of \$1,084,000 and MOU#2 in the amount of \$56,000,000 were approved by the District and the City on January 24, 2011 and June 28, 2011 respectively.

> Construction Management (CM) services were anticipated, but not included in the original program management service agreement. Parson's forecast of May 6, 2010 included a program and construction management fee at \$27,740,063. A detailed explanation of this forecast and its components was presented at the Board Workshop on April 27, 2010 and included recommendation of the BBAC and BOC. It was previously noted that multiple Board items would be required for the Construction Management services.

> This Contract Amendment #9, for \$1,450,000 for Program Management services and \$1,250,000 for Construction Management services is in support of the overall programming, planning, and construction management services of the CCJUP buildings, athletic fields and site improvements planned at Santa Monica High School. The total contract amount will be \$27,892,931.

This mandated policy revision from CSBA more accurately reflects the assurances that districts must make to the CDE, including the provision of a drug-free workplace, notifications to employees about the district's policy, action that will be taken in the event an employee has violated the prohibition, and the requirement that employees abide by the policy and notify the district if convicted. Language regarding specific discipline that will be taken against an employee has been deleted, as this material is covered in other policies.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL-FREE WORKPLACE

The Board of Education believes that the maintenance of a drug- and alcohol-free workplace is essential to staff and student safety and to help ensure a productive and safe work and learning environment. An employee shall not unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, or use any controlled substance in the workplace. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 701)

Employees are prohibited from being under the influence of controlled substances or alcohol while on duty. For purposes of this policy, on duty means while an employee is on duty during both instructional and noninstructional time in the classroom or workplace, at extracurricular or cocurricular activities, or while transporting students or otherwise supervising them. Under the influence means that the employee's capabilities are adversely or negatively affected, impaired, or diminished to an extent that impacts the employee's ability to safely and effectively perform his/her job.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify employees of the district's prohibition against drug use and the actions that will be taken for violation of such prohibition. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 701)

In accordance with law and the district's collective bargaining agreements, the Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate disciplinary action, up to and including termination, against an employee for violating the terms of this policy and/or shall require the employee to satisfactorily participate in and complete a drug assistance or rehabilitation program approved by a federal, state, or local public health or law enforcement agency or other appropriate agency.

The Board of Education believes that the maintenance of drug- and alcohol-free workplaces is essential to school and district operations.

No employee shall unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, use or be under the influence of any alcoholic beverage, drug or controlled substance as defined in 21 USC 81 at any school district workplace. These prohibitions apply before, during and after school hours. A school district workplace is any place where school district work is performed, any schoolowned or school-approved vehicle used to transport students to and from school or school activities; any off-school sites when accommodating a school-sponsored or school-approved activity or function where students are under district jurisdiction; or during any period of time when an employee is supervising students on behalf of the district or otherwise engaged in district business.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify employees of these prohibitions. (Government Code <u>8355</u>; 41 USC 702)

An employee shall abide by the terms of this policy and notify the district, within five days, of any criminal drug or alcohol statute conviction which he/she receives for a violation occurring in the workplace. (41 USC 702)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the appropriate federal granting or contracting agencies within 10 days after receiving notification, from an employee or otherwise, of any conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace. (41 USC 701)

The Board may not employ or retain in employment persons convicted of a controlled substance offense as defined in Education Code <u>44011</u>. If any such conviction is reversed and the person

acquitted in a new trial or the charges dismissed, his/her employment is no longer prohibited. A plea or verdict of guilty, a finding of guilt by a court in a trial without a jury, or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere shall be deemed to be a conviction. (Education Code 44836, 45123)

A classified employee may be reemployed after conviction of such an offense if the Board determines, from the evidence presented, that the person has been rehabilitated for at least five years. (Education Code <u>45123</u>)

The Board may take appropriate disciplinary action, up to and including termination, or require the employee to satisfactorily participate in and complete a drug assistance or rehabilitation program approved by a federal, state or local health, law enforcement or other appropriate agency.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a drug- and alcohol-free awareness program to inform employees about: (Government Code 8355)

- The dangers of drug and alcohol abuse in the workplace
- The district policy of maintaining drug- and alcohol-free workplaces
- Any available drug and alcohol counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs
- 4. The penalties that may be imposed on employees for drug and alcohol abuse violations

DRUG AND ALCOHOL-FREE WORKPLACE

It is a violation of district policy and/or state law for any employee, while on duty and/or on district property, to possess, use, or be under the influence of any illegal drugs, illegal narcotics, marijuana or alcohol.

<u>Supervisors and managers have an obligation to monitor employees to ensure that district policy and state laws are enforced.</u>

The following procedures are a guide for supervisors and managers to effectively address suspected alcohol and/or drug use by district employees:

- If any supervisor or manager has reasonable suspicion to believe that an employee is inhibited in the proper and/or safe performance of his/her job because he or she is under the influence of either drugs or alcohol, the employee shall immediately be relieved of duty and the supervisor(s) or manager(s) shall immediately notify the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources for further direction. Reasonable suspicion is a belief based on objective fact sufficient to lead a supervisor(s) or manager(s) to suspect that staff is under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol. Observations that may lead to reasonable suspicion include, but are not limited to, the following: slurred speech, alcohol odor on breath, unsteady walking and movement, an accident involving district property, serious accident causing injury, physical or verbal altercation, unusual behavior, possession of alcohol and/or drugs, or failure to pass field sobriety test. Reasonable suspicion may also be based on reports from reliable witnesses.
- 2. When employees are relieved of duty, the appropriate supervisor or manager shall make certain that arrangements for their transportation home are made. Examples of appropriate transportation are: spouse or other family member, friend, or taxi. If the employee refuses transportation home and indicates he/she plans to drive his/her motor vehicle, the supervisor shall give the employee a direct order to accept the transportation. If the employee continues to refuse transportation, the supervisor is to document the refusal and contact law enforcement.
- 3. When employees are relieved of duty because of their inability to properly and/or safely perform the duties of their job as a result of probable alcohol or drug use, the absence shall be charged to accumulated sick leave, if available. If sick leave is not available, the absence shall be charged as leave without pay.
- 4. If any employee suspected of alcohol or drug use refuses to leave district property as directed or becomes abusive or combative, a Campus Security Officer shall be immediately called for assistance.
- If alcoholic beverages are found on district property and/or are being used on district property, the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources and/or law enforcement shall be notified immediately.
- 6. If illegal drugs, narcotics or marijuana are found on district property and/or are being used on district property, the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources and/or law enforcement shall be notified immediately.
- 7. The supervisor, appropriate manager, or the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, may require any employee suspected of using alcohol and/or drugs or of

having alcohol and/or drugs in their system during working hours or while performing any district function to submit to physical or psychological examination which may include a preliminary presumptive breathalyzer test administered by law enforcement and/or submit to a medical examination, including laboratory tests, conducted by a facility selected by the district.

8. Whenever these procedures are implemented, the supervisor(s) or manager(s) and any witnesses shall file a written report to the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources. The report shall describe the specific behavior/s exhibited by the employee that suggests there was reasonable suspicion that the employee was unable to properly and/or safely perform the duties of his/her job.

<u>Drug-Free Workplace Act; State Contractors and Grantees – GC 8355</u>

Every person or organization awarded a contract or a grant for the procurement of any property or services from any state agency shall certify to the contracting or granting agency that it will provide a drug-free workplace by doing all of the following:

- Publishing a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the person's or organization's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of the prohibitions.
- Establishing a drug-free awareness program to inform employees about all of the following:
 - a. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace.
 - b. The person's or organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace.
 - c. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employees assistance programs.
 - d. The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
- 3) Requiring that each employee engaged in the performance of the contract or grant be given a copy of the statement required and that, as a condition of employment on the contract or grant, the employee agrees to abide by the terms of the statement.

The Board of Education asked for an investigation into the request, made by Malibu citizens, for an advisory seat on the SMMUSD Board of Education. Legal counsel provided the district input regarding the issue of providing the residents of Malibu an advisory position to the Board, at the dais, such as we have with our Student Board Members. While there is no legal prohibition on the creation of an advisory position on the Board, there is also no specific statutory provision that authorizes the Board to create such a position such as there is with the student advisory position. (EC 35012)

To create such a position for the purpose of allowing Malibu residents an advisory role to the Board at the dais would arguably be engaging in a discriminatory act, according to the advice of counsel. Allowing Malibu, a specific segment of our community, to have a greater influence on elected officials opens the Board of Education to charges of discrimination. Our legal counsel asserts that allowing Malibu representation on the Board not provided to other arguably underrepresented groups could be seen as a circumvention of the intent of the legislation of the California Voting Rights Act (EC 14025-14032). Additionally, it could be seen as a violation of our own Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 1220, which states in part:

"Every effort shall be made to select committee members in a manner which ensures that the committee represents a cross section of qualified people throughout the district. A reasonable balance of males and females, socio-economic status, ethnic representation and geographic location shall be sought in the composition of each committee, except in those cases where a committee is established to address the needs of a particular segment of the school population or community, in which case additional criteria specific to the committee shall be approved by the Board. The selection process should also aim to obtain a mix of parents from all grade levels, staff members, and community members who could contribute to the committee. The Board shall review this balance before making final the appointments of committee members."

The AR says in part:

"Being aware that the schools belong to the people who created them by taxation and consent; ...all residents and taxpayers of the district attendance area, all parents of children enrolled in its schools, and school employees as stipulated in these guidelines shall be eligible for membership and participation, a prerequisite being solely an unselfish interest in public schools, the community and every child."

This Board Policy applies to District Advisory Committees; however, it could be relevant to a Board advisory position as well. If the Board created such a position, BP/AR 1220 should apply. Therefore, if the Board created an advisory position, limited only to Malibu residents, it would violate the requirements that all residents of the District are eligible and that such positions be filled in a manner that provides reasonable geographic, socioeconomic, and ethnic representation.

Due to the above reasons, legal counsel advises us that creating such a unique advisory position could result in unintended but serious legal complications and advises us to explore other options.

While creating an advisory position to the Board for Malibu is not recommended, it is important to be responsive to the needs of Malibu community members, who feel that the concerns unique to the geographic area of Malibu are not fully considered by the Board and district, particularly when there is no elected Board member from Malibu serving on the Board of Education.

I recommend that the Board consider the creation of a Malibu District Advisory Committee, subject to BP/AR 1220. This DAC would have a district liaison and Board liaison, who would meet monthly with committee members, allowing for regular, ongoing input from Malibu residents to district staff and Board members. All processes for soliciting committee members as delineated in BP/AR 1220 would be followed.

The board agreed to postpone this item until after the workshop with the Los Angeles County Office of Education on March 1, 2012.

The Board of Education continues to authorize a detailed study of enrollment projections by DecisionInsite, a private company specializing in this area. The board will hear a presentation on enrollment projections for the 2012-13 school year, which are based not only on enrollment in prior years, but on outside factors related to census data.

Staff will be using the projection data for staffing allocations for the 2012-2013 school year, and will soon begin sharing the enrollment projections and initial staffing recommendations with schools.

A full report, written by the DescisionInsite company, is available in the Superintendent's Office. District staff and Dr. Dean Waldfogel, Vice President of DecisionInsite, will be available for questions and discussion at the meeting.

The board requested more information on:

- The slight drop in high school enrollment over the past four years
- Projected dwelling units in Santa Monica and Malibu
- Ten-vear enrollment projections by school site

DecisionInsite will provide the correct slide showing students who are new to the district in grades 1-12. In order to determine why there is a discrepancy in the number of interdistict permit students in the district's data versus those in the presentation, DecisionInsite will provide the district with their list of permit students for comparison.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 5117 – Interdistrict Attendance. Revisions to AR 5117 (which do not require board approval) can be found in Information Item No. I.02.

It is recommend that the board consider a policy revision to clarify that students currently on an interdistrict permit do not have to annually renew an interdistrict permit. Staff is recommending that instead of submitting a permit renewal, continuing students annually submit a verification of continuing enrollment. Last year, the board revised this policy to comply with the new California law, AB 2444, which states that students who have obtained an interdistrict permit no longer need to reapply annually for a release from their resident school district.

It is also recommended that the Board of Education consider revising the current cut-off date of 2001-2002 (Section A), enabling SMMUSD students in good standing who were residents of Santa Monica or Malibu and subsequently move to another city, to be allowed to remain in the Santa Monica-Malibu School district as permit students.

In response to queries from board members and staff regarding the permit policy and the relationship to enrollment capacity, staff recommends that we raise the total number of new interdistrict permits that will be accepted and approved for the 2012-13 school year from 200 to 300 (Section E4). Staff recommends raising enrollment capacity over time by increasing the number of student permits granted at the kindergarten and 6th grade level and modifying the moratorium currently in place for secondary schools to open permits up to grades 7 through 11, with enrollment priority given to siblings of current permit students, children of Santa Monica City College and Santa Monica City employees, and international high school students on a case by case basis (Sections E1 and F3g).

Ms. Freedman clarified the process of verifying continuing enrollment. The board discussed what might be the appropriate size for the district, given enrollment and permit data history and the current budget situation. The board agreed that it would need to decide upon a total enrollment target number, determine how many permits would be required to reach that target number, and then reach out to potential permit families. The board requested the window of time during which LAUSD releases its students to other districts. This will return for further discussion.

Students BP 5117

Interdistrict Attendance

A. Although students generally must attend school in the district and school where their residence has been established, the Santa Monica-Malibu School District Board of Education recognizes justifiable reasons for interdistrict permits. Upon request, the Superintendent or designee may accept students from other districts and may allow students who live within the District to transfer to another school within the District or out of the District.

Beginning with the 2005-06 school year permits will be issued on a year-to-year basis. Parents must reapply to SMMUSD and be accepted for continued attendance each year. must submit verification of continuing enrollment annually. Students enrolled prior to the 2005-06 school year on a PERT or DERT permit will not be affected by this change.

Involuntary loss of housing resulting from: apartments being removed from the rental market (Ellis Act), buildings being red-tagged, or evictions to accommodate owner-occupancy should not interfere with a child completing his/her education in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. The permit office will require the applicant to obtain verification from the Rent Control Department or other appropriate legal agency. These students will be allowed to remain in their schools for the remainder of the year in which their housing has been lost. In addition, they will be allowed to remain in SMMUSD as permit students in subsequent years provided they meet all the conditions of students attending SMMUSD on permit, and they reapply annually. The Ellis Act allows California apartment owners to evict tenants if the landlords intend to withdraw their units from the rental market.

SMMUSD students in good standing who were residents of Santa Monica or Malibu during the 2001-2002 school year, and subsequently move to another city, will be allowed to remain in the Santa Monica-Malibu School district as permit students, upon receiving a permit from their district of residence and meeting all the conditions of students attending Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District on a permit.

- B. Permits of this type are to be initiated by the student's parent or guardian who attests to the fact or shows evidence that the permit would be in the student's best interests.
 Cancellation of the permit shall occur if certain provisions are not adhered to by the student or parent/guardian, or if overcrowding should occur at the school of acceptance.
- C. The Board is committed to providing a quality education for all District students legally enrolled and will provide fair and consistent treatment for students and parent/guardians regardless of their residence or permit status. All applications for a permit will be treated in a fair and consistent manner.
- D. Final approval of permits for all students, including students needing specialized programs, such as GATE, special education, ELL, etc., shall rest at the District and shall be contingent upon space, budget and staff availability. The District will not pay excess costs to provide specialized services to students on permit.
- E. Except for the conditions listed below, effective September 2002, there will be a moratorium on the receipt of all new interdistrict attendance permits for schools in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District. This moratorium shall continue through the 2014-15 school year with the following exceptions:

- 1. The District will accept applications for interdistrict permits to attend schools in the City of Santa Monica for grades K through 6 in order to stabilize the current number of interdistrict permit students in the District. Permits will be granted per the language of section D above. Regarding interdistrict permit applications for children of SMMUSD employees, please refer to section F2.
- 2. Requests for new interdistrict permits will be accepted for all schools in the City of Malibu. Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.
- 3. No permits will be granted to attend Olympic High School.
- 4. The total number of all new interdistrict permits that will be accepted and approved for the 2011-12 school year will not exceed 200 300 for the District. Permits will be granted per the language of section D. above.
- 5. All students currently attending on an interdistrict permit will be allowed to remain in the District until they leave or graduate, assuming that they <u>submit a</u> <u>verification of continuing enrollment annually reapply for a permit annually and comply with all the application requirements; and uphold appropriate standards of behavior, attendance, and academic effort. and that the conditions under which the current <u>intial</u> permit was granted have not changed. Interdistrict attendance permits for 11th and 12th graders may not be rescinded although 11th and 12th. graders must reapply for these permits annually.</u>
- 6. Guidelines previously applied to SMASH, Edison, including the immersion program through Grade 8, and our preschools will remain in effect.
- F. Requests for new permits will be received (granted) in the following order (Based on the timelines identified in Administrative Regulations 5117):
 - Intradistrict permits allowing children who are residents of the cities of Santa Monica and/or Malibu to attend a school other than their neighborhood school;
 - It is the intention of the District to provide same-school placement for all siblings in a family once an intradistrict permit has been granted, except in cases where students need a specialized program which is only available on another campus.
 - 2. Interdistrict permits for children of employees of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District [certificated, classified, management, full and part-time (a minimum of 15 hours per week)]:
 - It is the intention of the District to provide a seat in a District school (K-12) to all children of District employees who have requested a new interdistrict permit, with the understanding that Section D will be considered. Staff will do its best to accommodate requests for a specific school but will not guarantee requested placement. On-going permit holders are not affected and will continue in the home school being currently attended.
 - 3. If space, staffing and budget allow, interdistrict permits for:
 - a. Those students "in good standing" who have been attending school/s within SMMUSD as a resident of the District, for a minimum period of three complete school years, and subsequently relocate outside the boundaries of SMMUSD. Permits will be granted per the language of section D above.

- b. Siblings (of current interdistrict permit holders) who will be entering Kindergarten, 1st, 6th, or 9th Grade. If a permit is received (granted) there is no guarantee of same-school placement. On-going permit holders are not affected and will continue in the home school being currently attended.
- c. Children of employees of the cities of Malibu or Santa Monica.
- d. Children of full-time, permanent employees of Santa Monica College enrolling in grades K-8 for the 2011-12 school year.
- e. Children of alumni of Santa Monica High School, Malibu High School, or Olympic High School. Parent must attach a copy of graduation diploma to the permit application.
- f. Children of individuals working within the boundaries of SMMUSD.
- g. International High School students on a case-by-case basis.

RE: REVISION TO AR 1340 – ACCESS TO DISTRICT RECORDS

INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01

This item is to inform the Board of Education that a revision has been made to AR 1340 – Access to District Records.

The revision clarifies the process by which a member of the public can request a copy or inspection of any district record that is open to the public and not exempt from disclosure. Members of the public shall submit a completed "Request for Access to or Copies of District Records" form to the Superintendent or designee. These forms can be found online or at the district office. (Government Code Section 6253.4 states that public agencies "may adopt regulations stating the procedures to be followed when making its records available.")

ACCESS TO DISTRICT RECORDS

Definitions

Public records include any writing containing information relating to the conduct of the district's business prepared, owned, used, or retained by the district regardless of physical form or characteristics. (Government Code 6252)

Writing means any handwriting, typewriting, printing, photostating, photographing, transmitting by electronic mail or facsimile, and every other means of recording upon any tangible thing any form of communication or representation, including letters, words, pictures, sounds, or symbols or combinations thereof, and any record thereby created, regardless of the manner in which the record has been stored. (Government Code 6252)

A member of the public includes any person, except a member, agent, officer, or employee of the district acting within the scope of his/her office or employment. Board of Education members shall have the ability to access public records permitted by law in the administration of their duties. Notwithstanding, members of the Board are entitled to access to district public records on the same basis as any other person. (Government Code 6252, 6252.5)

Public Records

Records to which the public shall have access include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Proposed and approved budgets and annual audit of the district (Government Code 6252; Education Code 41020, 42103)
- 2. Statistical compilations (Government Code 6252)
- 3. Reports and memoranda (Government Code 6252)
- 4. Notices and bulletins (Government Code 6252)
- 5. Minutes of public meetings (Government Code 6252)
- 6. Meeting agendas (Government Code 6252, 54957.5)
- 7. Official communications between governmental branches (Government Code 6252)
- 8. School-based program plans (Education Code 52850)
- 9. Information and data relevant to the evaluation and modification of district plans
- 10. Initial proposals of exclusive employee representatives and of the district (Government Code <u>3547</u>)
- 11. Tort claims filed against the district and records pertaining to pending litigation which predate the filing of the litigation, unless protected by some other provision of law (Government Code 6254.25; Fairley v. Superior Court; 71 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 235 (1988))
- 12. Statements of economic interests required by the Conflict of Interest Code (Government Code <u>81008</u>)

13. Contracts of employment and settlement agreements (Government Code 53262)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any record containing personal information is redacted to ensure that such information, including, but not limited to, an employee's home address or social security number, is not disclosed to the public.

Confidential Records

Records to which the general public shall not have access include, but are not limited to:

- Preliminary drafts, notes, interdistrict or intradistrict memoranda which are not retained by the district in the ordinary course of business, provided that the public interest in withholding these records clearly outweighs the public interest in disclosure (Government Code 6254)
- 2. Records specifically prepared for litigation to which the district is a party or to respond to claims made against the district pursuant to the Tort Claims Act are confidential, until the pending litigation or claim has been finally adjudicated or otherwise settled, unless the records are protected by some other provision of law (Government Code 6254, 6254.25; Fairley v. Superior Court; 71 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 235 (1988))
- 3. Personnel records, medical records, student records, or similar materials, the disclosure of which would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy (Government Code 6254)

The home addresses and home telephone numbers of employees may be disclosed only as follows: (Government Code 6254.3)

- a. To an agent or a family member of the individual to whom the information pertains
- b. To an officer or employee of a state agency or another school district or county office of education when necessary for the performance of official duties
- c. To an employee organization pursuant to regulations and decisions of the Public Employment Relations Board, unless the employee performs law enforcement-related functions or requests in writing that the information not be disclosed
- d. To an agent or employee of a health benefit plan providing health services or administering claims for health services to district employees and their enrolled dependents, for the purpose of providing the health services or administering claims for employees and their enrolled dependents
- 4. Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data except as provided by law (Government Code 6254)
- 5. Without affecting the law of eminent domain, the contents of real estate appraisals or engineering or feasibility estimates and evaluations made for or by the district relative to the acquisition of property, or to prospective public supply and construction contracts, until all of the property has been acquired or all of the contract agreement obtained (Government Code 6254)
- 6. Information required from any taxpayer in connection with the collection of local taxes that is received in confidence and the disclosure of the information to other persons

would result in unfair competitive disadvantage to the person supplying the information (Government Code 6254)

- 7. Library circulation records kept for the purpose of identifying the borrower of items available in the library (Government Code 6254)
- 8. Records for which the disclosure is exempted or prohibited pursuant to state or federal law, including, but not limited to, provisions of the Evidence Code relating to privilege (Government Code 6254)
- Documents prepared by or for the district to assess its vulnerability to terrorist attack or other criminal acts intended to disrupt district operations and that are for distribution or consideration in closed session (Government Code 6254)
- 10. Recall petitions or petitions for the reorganization of school districts (Government Code 6253.5)
- 11. Minutes of Board meetings held in closed session (Government Code <u>54957.2</u>)
- 12. Computer software developed by the district (Government Code <u>6254.9</u>)
- 13. Written instructional textbooks or other materials which, when providing a copy, would infringe a copyright or would constitute an unreasonable burden on the operation of the district (65 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 186 (1981))
- 14. Records that contain individually identifiable health information, including records that may be exempt pursuant to physician-patient privilege, the Confidentiality of Medical Information Act, and the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (Government Code 6254, 6255)
- 15. Any other records listed as exempt from public disclosure in the California Public Records Act or other statutes
- 16. Records for which the district can demonstrate that, based on the particular facts of the case, the public interest served by not making the record public clearly outweighs the public interest served by disclosure of the record (Government Code 6255)

Inspection of Records and Requests for Copies

Every person may request a copy or inspection of any district record that is open to the public and not exempt from disclosure. (Government Code 6253)

Persons requesting a copy or inspection of any district record that is open to the public and not exempt from disclosure shall submit a completed "Request for Access to or Copies of District Records" form to the Superintendent or designee. The forms shall be available to members of the public online or at the district office.

Within 10 days of receiving any request to inspect or copy a district record, the Superintendent or designee shall determine whether the request seeks release of a disclosable public record in the district's possession. The Superintendent or designee shall promptly inform the person making the request of his/her determination and the reasons for the decision. (Government Code 6253)

In unusual circumstances, the Superintendent or designee may extend the 10-day limit for up to 14 days by providing written notice to the requester and setting forth the reasons for the

extension and the date on which a determination is expected to be made. Unusual circumstances include the following, but only to the extent reasonably necessary to properly process the request: (Government Code 6253)

- 1. The need to search for and collect the requested records from field facilities or other establishments that are separate from the office processing the request
- 2. The need to search for, collect, and appropriately examine a voluminous amount of separate and distinct records which are demanded in a single request
- 3. The need for consultation, which shall be conducted with all practicable speed, with another agency (e.g., a state agency or city) having a substantial interest in the determination of the request or among two or more components of the district (e.g., two different school sites) with substantial interest in the request
- 4. In the case of electronic records, the need to compile data, write programming language or a computer program, or construct a computer report to extract data

If the Superintendent or designee determines that the request seeks disclosable public records, the determination shall state the estimated date and time when the records will be made available. (Government Code 6253)

Public records are open to inspection at all times during district office hours. Any reasonably segregable portion of a record shall be made available for inspection by every person requesting the record after deletion of the portions that are exempted by law. (Government Code 6253)

Upon request for a copy that reasonably describes an identifiable record, an exact copy shall be promptly provided unless it is impracticable to do so. (Government Code 6253)

Copies shall be furnished at a cost of \$0.25 per page. Written requests to waive the fee shall be submitted to the Superintendent or designee. Computer data shall be provided in a form determined by the Superintendent.

If any person requests a public record be provided in an electronic format, the district shall make that record available in any electronic format in which it holds the information. The district shall provide a copy of the electronic record in the format requested as long as the requested format is one that has been used by the district to create copies for its own use or for use by other agencies. (Government Code 6253.9)

The cost of duplicating an electronic record shall be limited to the direct cost of producing a copy of the record in electronic format. However, the requester shall bear the cost of producing the copy of the electronic record, including the cost to construct the record and the cost of programming and computer services necessary to produce the copy, under the following circumstances: (Government Code 6253.9)

- 1. The electronic record is one that is produced only at otherwise regularly scheduled intervals
- 2. The request would require data compilation, extraction, or programming to produce the record

Assistance in Identifying Requested Records

If the Superintendent or designee denies a request for disclosable records, he/she shall assist the requester in making a focused and effective request that reasonably describes an identifiable record. To the extent reasonable under the circumstances, the Superintendent or designee shall do all of the following: (Government Code 6253.1)

1. Assist in identifying records and information responsive to the request or the purpose of the request, if specified

If, after making a reasonable effort to elicit additional clarifying information from the requester to help identify the record, the Superintendent or designee is still unable to identify the information, this requirement shall be deemed satisfied.

- 2. Describe the information technology and physical location in which the records exist
- 3. Provide suggestions for overcoming any practical basis for denying access to the records or information sought

Provisions of the Public Records Act shall not be construed so as to delay access for purposes of inspecting records open to the public. Any notification denying a request for public records shall state the name and title of each person responsible for the denial. (Government Code 6253)

INTERDISTRICT ATTENDANCE

Interdistrict Attendance Procedures (transfers between districts):

General Guidelines

- 1. The permit office is responsible for processing interdistrict permits.
- 2. The request for a permit is initiated by the parent at their child's district of residence.
- 3. The parents/guardians of the child must be informed that the acceptance of their child is contingent upon the parent/guardian and the child assuming full responsibility for:
 - a. Satisfactory attendance
 - b. Satisfactory behavior
 - c. Satisfactory academic effort
 - d. Any necessary documentation requested regarding and including child care, employment, doctor's recommendations and guardianship documentation.
 - e. Understanding that the receiving school has the right to rescind any prior approved interdistrict permit if the parent/guardian or student does not fulfill the responsibilities listed in 3.a & b above.
- 4. The interdistrict permit shall be valid for only the current school year.
- 54. It is the responsibility of each school to ensure that nonresident students accepted and registered without a valid permit be returned to the school of residence.

Conditions for Accepting Interdistrict Attendance Permits

The school site designee and the Superintendent or designee shall approve or deny applications for transfers. The acceptance of interdistrict permits for students from other school districts to attend classes within the district shall be subject to the following:

- 1. The student seeking <u>an initial interdistrict permit enrollment</u> in the district must submit an SMMUSD permit application and present a permit authorizing his/her release from the school district of residence.
- 2. A release from the school district of residence is required for the initial permit application only and not required for permit renewal.
- 3. The student must be eligible to attend elementary school, middle school, or senior high school classes maintained by the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District and there must be an existing opening in the class, grade level, and school to which the student seeking the interdistrict permit would be initially enrolled.
- 4. All students currently attending on an interdistrict permit will be allowed to remain in the District until they leave or graduate, assuming that they: reapply annually to annually submit a verification of continuing enrollment to SMMUSD to renew their permit and comply with all the SMMUSD application requirements; uphold appropriate standards of behavior, attendance, and academic effort. and that the conditions under which the current initial permit was granted have not changed.

5. Interdistrict attendance permits for 11th and 12th graders may not be rescinded although 11th and 12th graders. must reapply for these permits annually.

Conditions for Cancellation of Interdistrict Permits

The receiving school or district has the right to revoke any previously approved interdistrict permit for the following reasons:

- 1. Falsification or misrepresentation of information
- Enrollment fluctuation
- 3. Unsatisfactory behavior
- 4. Unsatisfactory attendance
- 5. Unsatisfactory academic effort/achievement
- 6. A change in childcare arrangements
- 7. Inappropriate guardianship documentation
- 8. Reason for the original issuance of the permit by the school district of residence is no longer valid
- 9. Student becomes eligible for a program or class other than the one to which he/she was admitted and there is no available space in the new program or class.
- 10. A parent requests a transfer to another district school instead of the school his/her child was admitted.

Appeal Procedures

- 1. Interdistrict transfer requests that are denied by the district at the school level may be appealed by the parent/guardian to the Superintendent or designee within two weeks from the day the request for acceptance of permit is denied.
- 2. The appeal is to be in writing and must provide all information and detail as to why the denial is being appealed.
- 3. The Superintendent or designee shall review the permit appeal based on Board policy and regulations, state law, and in consultation with school site(s), parents/guardians and the appropriate district staff as necessary.
- 4. If the permit continues to be denied, the parent/guardian may within 30 calendar days of the denial, appeal to the County Board of Education
- 5. There is no appeal process to the County Board for interdistrict permits that are revoked.

Annual Report

The Board will receive a report on permits by February 28 of each year.





As I went around the school this morning talking to the teachers to find out what was happening in each grade to tell you about tonight, for me it was a walk down memory lane. There are so many great things happening at Point Dume that I couldn't limit it to only two, so I thought I'd take you on a brief journey grade by grade.

Does anybody here know what next Wednesday, February 8th is??? Well if you ask any of our kindergarteners, they can tell you...It's the 100th day of school...Yes, in K it's all about the 100th day...They are having fun while learning numbers and place value, but all they really want to know is...will Zero The Hero show up???

A12 – MMHS CAMPUS IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT FINAL EIR

The proposed Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements Project is to provide a new 2-story building to replace the Library and Administration Buildings, interior renovation of Classroom Building E, renovation of the Middle and High School quads, a new dedicated dropoff and pick-up lane, a new lighted 150-space parking lot and access road, renovation of the two existing parking lots, synthetic turf for the athletic field, and improved waste water systems.

To evaluate the potential environmental impacts of the project, Atkins was commissioned to conduct the environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act. An Initial Study was completed which demonstrated a potential for the project to cause certain significant environmental impacts that could not be fully mitigated. In 2008, the Initial Study was published for a 45-day public review period. 32 comment letters and emails were received. The District decided to remove lighting of the athletic field from the Project.

Over the next few years, numerous investigations and assessments for impacts relating to views, lighting, biological, traffic, parking, dust, and noise were conducted, and Atkins prepared a Draft Environmental Impact Report, which is referred to in shorthand as an EIR. The Draft EIR was released on July 12, 2011 for a 60-day public comment period. 30 comment letters, emails, and cards were received. The State Clearinghouse commented that the District complied with the State Clearinghouse's review requirements.

The comments received on the Draft EIR were mainly on the cumulative impacts from the Coastal Commission's recent approval of the Local Coastal Program Amendment, concerns with the location and lighting of the proposed 150-space parking lot, the impact of construction worker parking along Morning View Drive, and the analysis and mitigation of construction dust.

Atkins prepared responses to the comments and made modifications to the EIR. After thoroughly analyzing the comments, Atkins determined that none of the modifications made in response to the comments would create a new potential environmental impact or exacerbate any of the unavoidable significant impacts after applying the mitigation measures presented in the Draft EIR, as well as the mitigation measures identified by the commenters. Further, Atkins determined that the responses and modifications to the Final EIR do not contain significant new information.

Accordingly, the Final EIR is correct, and no recirculation of the Draft EIR is required. Staff and the District's counsel recommend that this Board adopt the resolution to certify the Final EIR, adopt the findings, statement of overriding consideration, mitigation monitoring and reporting program and finally to approve Project.

Upon adoption of the resolution, staff will file a Notice of Determination on this Project with the Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse and proceed with the District's application for a Coastal Development Permit for the Project.
