A regular meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Thursday, April 19, 2012, in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. A. Student Board Member Reports (15)

Brontë Burnette – Santa Monica High School

Ms. Burnette reported that ASB has also been examining the racial incidents at Samohi; they do not yet know how to deal with them, but they offer their support to the school and district. the End of the World Rally, which had been postponed, was on March 21 and had tons of student involvement, sports, bands, and a pie in the face. Open House was on March 27; the Freshman Steering Committee hosted a bake sale making over \$650 and Seniors hosted food trucks Grilled Cheese Patrol and Calbi. ROP hosted food trucks after school on Tuesday for students. There was a Band Festival on March 27 throughout the day and into the night. On March 29, there was an Orchestra Festival with several schools competing. The Formal Wear Drive ended on March 30, with a large donation of different dresses that will be available to Samohi students. Club Day was on March 30 and went very well. The Cal Lit class trip occurred during the first weekend of spring break and was enjoyed by the students who went. During spring break, students in the Japanese 4 class went to Japan and enjoyed speaking the language in a natural setting. Orchestra students traveled to Washington, DC, from the April 9-14. On April 18 and 19, ASB will host a Meet the Candidates Rally, allowing students to get to know the ASB candidates and ask them questions. ASB elections will be on May 2. There was a groundbreaking ceremony on the New Innovation Building that will contain I House and science programs. Cheer tryouts are currently underway. Track and Field has back-to-back track meets on Thursday and Friday. AP test preparations are underway in all AP classes, including practice tests and extra prep time. CST testing begins next week. Teachers have been explaining to students the importance of a good CST test score. The weekend following CSTs, the Jazz Bands will be going to Reno, NV, to compete. There is a silent film showing on April 28 in Barnum Hall, complete with organ music. The For The Arts benefit concert is this Saturday at 7:00pm in Barnum Hall. Global Youth Service Day, or Samo Serves, is on April 20, during which students will conduct community service for the campus and city; there will be a pep rally during lunch. Racial Harmony will occur on Friday, April 20. Campus tours and informational sessions for incoming freshmen will be held on April 21. Senior Prom is scheduled for May 26 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel with the theme Starry Nights.

Yasi Afsharnive – Malibu High School

Ms. Afsharnive reported students had an incredible two weeks off, and now they're rested and ready for testing. She also reported that several weeks ago, the girls' select choir attended the Heritage Music Festival, where they won a Gold Rating – the highest award possible. On March 30, eighth graders and seniors took their class panoramic pictures. March 28 was the first annual Family Science Night, which was

coordinated by parents, teachers, and Pepperdine professors. College Night, which was on March 29, provided information on college life and college application process. Several weeks ago, the campus was lucky enough to have the band False Puppet perform during a lunch period. Yesterday was the freshmen field trip to the California Science Center. There was also a BBQ and music in the quad yesterday. ASB is busy planning Spirit Week as well as a promotional video that involves all the students. Cheerleaders will be competing in the Las Vegas Nationals this weekend. The Gay-Straight Alliance will be holding a moment of silence tomorrow.

Chynna Summers – Olympic High School

Ms. Summers reported that Olympic students attended a staged reading of *The Ballad of Emmett Till* at the Broad Stage on March 20. Ms. Summers said it was a wonderful and powerful performance, illustrating a significant time period in U.S. history. On March 29, Karen Koblitz, artist and department head of ceramics at USC, spoke to Olympic students about her work, sharing her smaller sculptures and pictures of her larger installations. Ms. Koblitz is the mother of Olympic student Gina and wife of Grant Elementary School Principal, Al Friedenbergl. During the first week of spring break, four Olympic students participated in the Park Studio program, part of the Santa Monica Museum of Art. They worked at the Watts Labor Community Action Committee site I nteh foundry, learning to work with glass. The students' work is included in a current exhibit at the museum. Terry Kamibayashi, Manager of Maintenance and Operations, and his staff have been helping the school prepare a classroom for the Santa Monica Boys and Girls Club to establish an after school program for the students. Today, there was a blood drive with the Red Cross, and the Westside Family Health Center brought a mobile clinic to serve students and the community.

D. PTA Council – Kelly McMahon Pye (10)

Ms. Pye reported that following spring break, the PTA Council Units are busy with end-of-year events and board elections. Ms. Pye thanked Dr. Chou, who is working with Jon Kean to plan for the Middle School Parent Forum, which will be at 9:00am on May 19. The Annual Honorary Service Awards breakfast will be on May 22 at Tiato in Santa Monica. In honor of Earth Day this Sunday, PTA has received a grant to host a Bike Rodeo at the Beach this weekend from 1:00-3:00pm. Participants will learn about bike safety. Summer Adventure registration is open and enrollments have been pouring in. Ms. Pye said she was proud to report that SMMUSD's PTA Council has exceeded the number of signatures it was dedicated to acquire to help place the Our Children, Our Future tax initiative on the November 2012 ballot.

Ms. Lathem's report can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes. Dr. Escarce asked how, if at all, LAUSD's change in interdistrict permit policy has affected student recruitment at Edison. Ms. Lathem commented that LAUSD has released many students who are siblings of students already on permits. The problem, she guessed, might be in the future with new release applications for Kindergarteners. Dr. Escarce asked about the campaign to recruit Spanish-speaking, resident and non-resident families to apply to Edison. He suggested reaching out to the unions at hotels and other local businesses. He also requested a report to the board next fall regarding the Immersion Program, including enrollment over time and other related data.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT (5)

The board agreed to move the Superintendent's report to before the other reports. Ms. Lyon summarized activities from the past year at Samohi in response to recent race issues. The school and community have been working together to improve the campus climate, teach tolerance, reduce acts of violence and hate, and provide a safe learning environment for all students. There have been meetings with parents and community leaders to address specific concerns and develop a plan for communication. The district is working with the police department regarding extra presence. This year, students have attended conferences and learning opportunities, outreach specialists have been working with students of color to improve student achievement, events like the Black Forum and Racial Harmony have occurred, cross groups of student leadership have been brought together to give students a voice and set expectations, and similar parent groups have met. Administrators received diversity training and participated in professional development regarding microaggressions. Teachers attended culturally-responsive training. There was also male violence prevention training. The district worked with a Department of Justice consultant to create a steering committee that developed the two Dialogue on Race events. Freshman Seminar curriculum has been revised to include lessons on microaggressions. E Services and teachers developed a process and criteria for evaluating the images of characters of color, women, and other historically oppressed people projected in books. They are in the process of developing ethnic studies classes. The board reconstituted the Intercultural DAC and is updating the hate motivated behavior policy. Before the end of the year, Samohi administration will be meeting with leaders from each of the different groups of students on campus to examine a united front moving forward. The campus is also considering the idea of teacher mentors for next year so target students will have a trusted adult they can go to. The district will be hiring a consultant to conduct a safety survey. Mr. de la Torre asked about protocol or a crisis response team in the event of escalated violence on the campus. He suggested examining what other school districts have done. The board asked the superintendent to provide the board with information regarding a protocol/system when there is violence on campus.

Ms. Lyon congratulated Harry Keiley for being elected as Vice Chair of CalSTRS. SMASH's Team Steelhead, which consists of seven SMASH students and two teachers, won first place in the QuikSCience competition for their project. The students even wrote the press release announcing their good news. Samohi student and cellist Niall Ferguson was featured in the LA Times as part of the Piatigorsky International Cello Festival. The SAG meeting will be on April 30 in the Webster library. The annual For The Arts benefit concert is this Saturday at 7:00pm in Barnum Hall. Ms. Lyon announced that the district is open negotiations with

SMMCTA. She read the district's negotiating core standards and the articles the district will open in negotiations. A handout listing this information can be found attached to Item No. I.05.



COMMENTS: On July 20, 2011, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education awarded Swinerton Builders the lease leaseback contract for the John Adams Middle School – Replacement of Classroom Building E, F & G, New Administration, Modernization and Site Improvements Project in the amount of \$11,728,854.

During the demolition and excavation work of the project, numerous unforeseen and concealed asbestos and lead abatement conditions have resulted in additional scope for the contractor. These asbestos and lead containing materials were not air borne and did not pose any health risk as they were encapsulated and were not disturbed.

These unforeseen and concealed abatement issues include abatement of TSI (asbestos) wrapped pipe within existing walls, asbestos containing vinyl tile flooring underneath existing non-hazardous vinyl tile floor, chalkboards with asbestos containing backing material behind existing white boards, underground asbestos wrapped abandoned piping, underground asbestos containing roofing material and lead containing ceramic tile underneath brick patio. The project scope also included remediation of contaminated soils. During the excavation work, additional contaminated soils were discovered which considerably increased the total amount of soils that required remediation and disposal.

These unforeseen conditions have resulted in additional scope for the project. The staff is currently reviewing and negotiating all proposed change orders for Board recommendation. The proposed change orders were concurred by the Change Order Review Unit, an independent consultant established to confirm the validity of all additional scope. Additionally, all abatement testing and inspection work is prescribed by the District's independent abatement inspection and testing agency with no affiliation to the Developer-Contractor.

To ensure that the subcontractor who performed the work is not financially impacted, staff recommends that 75% of the proposed costs be approved to Swinerton Builders so they can pay their subcontractor for the work performed. At the next Board meeting, staff will present the final costs and impacts to the Board of Education for approval.

COMMENT: Additional design services are required for the design of an enclosure and supply of a new above grade SCE designed and supplied 1500 KVA transformer for the Santa Monica High School Science & Technology Building and Site Improvements Project.

The existing transformer at the site is 750 kW and is estimated to be approximately 50 years old. The 975 kW peak existing capacity (SCE allows 130% of peak capacity) will not be enough to support the new Science & Technology Buildings whether or not the District proceeds with the photovoltaic system portion of the project, which is an alternate. Even if the District proceeds with the photovoltaic system, the current transformer will only have a 1.4 kW margin of additional capacity. Per M-E Engineers, a slight increase from this 1.4 kW margin would put the transformer over its capacity threshold, which results in the need for a new higher capacity 1500 kW transformer.

Additionally, the existing transformer will not be sufficient for the new Science & Technology buildings and the South Gym. It is therefore recommended to design for a new 1500 kW transformer and relocate the new transformer near 7th Street and Michigan Avenue in order to support the current BB project.

This Contract Amendment #17, for \$73,299 is for the enclosure design and supply of a 1500 kW transformer for the Santa Monica High School Science & Technology Building and Site Improvements Project. The revised contract total will be \$7,120,589.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.17

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the proposed Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities required by the City of Malibu as a condition of issuing a Coastal Development Permit for the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements Project.

DISCUSSION:

On February 2, 2012, the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted Resolution 11-06 to adopt a Final Environmental Impact Report and approve the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvements Project ("Project") to redevelop a portion of the school campus. Since the Project is located in the coastal zone, the District must obtain a Coastal Development Permit from the City of Malibu before the Project can be constructed. District staff submitted an "Application" for a Coastal Development Permit for the Project.

One of the Local Coastal Program's standard requirements for obtaining a Coastal Development Permit is to develop proposed drainage facilities that are set forth in a Water Quality Mitigation Plan ("WQMP"). The District has prepared and submitted a WQMP for the Project. In reviewing and processing the District's Application, the City of Malibu has developed certain conditions of approval for the Coastal Development Permit. One of those conditions is for the District to execute and record a Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities that incorporate the WQMP. The City of Malibu requires the Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities to provide it with contractual enforcement rights and to ensure that any subsequent property owner is bound to maintain the proposed drainage facilities.

The terms of the proposed Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities have a reasonable nexus and proportionality to the Project's water quality impacts and have been negotiated between the City of Malibu and counsel for both entities to their mutual satisfaction. All of the requirements in this covenant are also required by current state laws. Therefore, this covenant does not burden the District with additional duties or requirements.

Even though this Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities would be executed prior to issuance of the Coastal Development Permit, a provision therein requires the issuance of the Coastal Development Permit before the District is obligated to construct or maintain the drainage facilities.

In order to obtain a Coastal Development Permit for the Project, the District should provide the proposed Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities. If approved, the Superintendent shall execute the Covenant to Maintain Drainage Facilities and record it upon the City of Malibu's demand.

To facilitate public discussion, the Proposed Annual Plan shall be made available for public review ninety (90) calendar days prior to Board adoption of its annual budget.” The Plan is attached and has been available for public review on the District’s website and in the Office of the Superintendent since March 15, 2012.



No fewer than 30 calendar days before the Board acts on the annual budget for the subsequent fiscal year, the Proposed Annual Plan and the findings from the public hearing shall be reviewed by the Independent Citizens Oversight Committee which shall forward its recommendations to the Board.” It also states that “Members of the public may comment on the plans, reports, and conditions of the Funding Measure during the public comment period of any meeting of the Independent Citizens Oversight Committee or any meeting of the Board.”

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.26

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the granting of credits for the following courses to be offered at the high school level.

COMMENTS: Staff is requesting approval of the following 2 proposed classes to enhance current course offerings available to district high school students. The proposed courses will count towards: 1) units needed for graduation; 2) fulfillment of district-adopted graduation requirements; and 3) admission to California's public universities ("a-g requirements" – pending submission.)

COURSE: *AP World History*

NUMBER OF CREDITS: 10 **Duration:** Year Long Course

DEPARTMENT: Social Studies

COURSE OBJECTIVES/ GOALS: Participating students will:

- Acquire knowledge of facts, concepts, and theories pertaining to world history;
- Develop an understanding of typical patterns of behavior of peoples and nations and their consequences;
- Enhance skills needed to analyze and interpret data, including determining authors' point of view, bias and point of reference when examining first-hand sources;
- Increase their ability to provide cogent written analysis and interpretation of the subject matter of World History;
- Prepare to obtain a satisfactory score of three or higher on the Advanced Placement World History Exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/ OVERVIEW: The purpose of the AP World History Course is to develop a deep understanding of the evolution of global processes, contacts and interaction between different types of human societies. This understanding is advanced through focusing on a combination of selective factual knowledge and appropriate analytical skills development. The course highlights the nature of change in international frameworks, along with its causes and consequences. It builds on students' comprehension of the cultural, institutional, and technological precedents that along with geography influence how humans deal with change and continuity. The course is organized around specific themes, with consistent attention given to the contacts among societies that form the core of world history as a field of study.

Course material will be presented in several formats, including lecture/discussion, group presentations after specific readings, and map location presentations. Students will be encouraged to develop and utilize study guides, charts, and graphic organizers. First person accounts and primary source documents will be analyzed and discussed. Modern historical interpretations will be examined through the use of excerpts from other texts and readers. Additionally, "Cultural Days" will be incorporated into the curriculum. Art, poetry, and music will be used to provide an understanding of and appreciation for cultural diversity.

MATERIALS: Instructional materials that will be utilized include:

- Core and supplemental texts
- Historical documents

ASSESSMENT/ EVALUATION: Students' knowledge and skill development will be assessed through evaluating their performance on essays, multiple choice exams, and individual and group presentations. Students will be provided with extensive practice that supports the development of the ability to think critically and respond to essay questions. The framework for that practice is based on examples of Change Over Time, Document Based Question, and Compare and Contrast type essays. Students will have several experiences throughout the year to practice essay writing including essays that will be part of the weekly tests.

COURSE: *Mandarin Chinese 4*

NUMBER OF CREDITS: 10 **Duration:** Year Long Course

DEPARTMENT: Modern and Classical Languages

COURSE OBJECTIVES/ GOALS: Participating students will:

- Increase their Mandarin Chinese listening and speaking proficiency;
- Develop a deeper understanding of, and appreciation for the history, literature and culture of the Chinese people;
- Develop advanced level reading and writing skills.

COURSE DESCRIPTION/ OVERVIEW: Chinese is currently the most widely spoken language in the world. Providing district high school students with access to developing proficiency in Chinese will offer them an invaluable tool that is useful preparation for graduation and beyond. Students in this advanced language course refine all aspects of their language development, with particular emphasis placed on advanced vocabulary acquisition. This course focuses on linguistic and cultural concepts and skills that are beyond the early advanced level. It is designed for students who possess strong listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in Mandarin. The course content and structure will be in alignment with the California State Department of Education's World Language Content Standards and Foreign Language Framework. Units studied in this course include Chinese and Asian art, and the history and geography of China.

In the course, the instructor will utilize a variety of strategies and techniques to engage students in the acquisition of language, including:

- Presentations
- Required reading and writing assignments
- Varied structured opportunities for oral expression and interchange with others
- Art and music

The instructor will utilize a variety of grouping configurations to provide students with maximum opportunities to practice the language. These configurations include individual, pairs, large group and whole class. To support mastery, students will be required to speak in front of the class, use a voice recorder for speaking and listening, complete daily entries in Mandarin in a journal, and analyze readings, films, and articles.

MATERIALS: Instructional materials that will be used include:

- Core and supplemental texts
- CDs, and DVDs
- Newspapers and magazines written in Mandarin

ASSESSMENT/ EVALUATION: Evaluation of student mastery will include assessing each of the four domains of language, (listening, speaking, reading, and writing). Student progress in the area of writing will be evaluated through assessing writing products. Oral proficiency and listening comprehension will be assessed throughout each unit of study. Indicators of development that will be evaluated in this process include:

- Promptness of Response
- Fluency
- Use and ranges of vocabulary/ phrases
- Pronunciation/ Diction/ Tone
- Control of Grammatical structures
- Expression within speech (humor, fun, enthusiasm)

Students will also be given periodic written tests, and quizzes.

Dr. Escarce commented that given the AP World History course is open to tenth graders, it might be the first AP course for some students. He hopes their success in this course will encourage the students to take more AP courses in the future. He urged the high school administrators to try to create a diverse environment for the AP World History course. Ms. Burnette commented that the House Principals are advertising this and similar courses directly to students during Freshman Seminar. Dr. Escarce asked about the teachers who would be teaching this course. Dr. Chou said these teachers would be sent to training designed specifically for AP teachers. Ms. Lieberman asked what steps the district was taking to make students aware of the Chinese courses. Dr. Chou explained that the teachers go and speak directly to the eighth grade students about the Chinese courses.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.27

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 11-26 to approve the Mitigated Negative Declaration Addendum and approve the Malibu Middle and High School Athletic Field Lighting Project.

DISCUSSION:

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (“District”) developed the Malibu High School Football Lighting Project to use portable field lights at the Malibu Middle and High School main athletic field (“Athletic Field”) for night football practices and games. On July 1, 2009, the District adopted Resolution 08-49 to adopt the Mitigated Negative Declaration (“MND”) and a mitigation monitoring and reporting program and to approve the Malibu High School Football Lighting Project (“Approved Project”). However, upon application, the California Coastal Commission (“Commission”) denied to remove the field lighting restriction from the District’s existing Coastal Development Permit (“CDP”), citing that the Local Coastal Program (“LCP”) absolutely prohibited such lighting despite the permit restriction.

Thereafter, the City of Malibu pursued an “LCP Amendment” to allow night lighting of the Athletic Field. On October 5, 2011, the Commission approved the LCP Amendment and also removed the field lighting restriction from the District’s CDP.

The District then developed the Malibu Middle and High School Athletic Field Lighting Project (the “Revised Project”) consisting of four 70-foot tall field lights equipped with the best available visor technology to avoid spill light, glare, and sky glow. Once the Revised Project was developed, the District engaged Atkins to conduct an environmental review of the Revised Project under the California Environmental Quality Act (“CEQA”).

Section 15164(b) of the “CEQA Guidelines” (Title 14, Cal. Code of Regs., § 15000 et seq.) authorizes a lead agency to prepare an addendum to a negative declaration “if only minor technical changes or additions are necessary or none of the conditions described in Section 15162 calling for preparation of a subsequent EIR or negative declaration have occurred.” Section 15162 does not require a subsequent EIR or negative declaration where the proposed changes would not create a new significant environmental impact or substantially increase the severity of a significant environmental impact disclosed in a previous EIR.

Atkins, the districts consultant has determined that the Revised Project would have similar effects as the Approved Project and would not cause any new significant environmental impacts. Thus, the Revised Project does not cause any of the conditions in CEQA Guidelines section 15162 calling for the preparation of a subsequent EIR or negative declaration, and the appropriate environmental document as authorized by CEQA Guidelines section 15164(b) is an addendum. As a result, Atkins prepared an “Addendum” to the MND. The Addendum describes the changed components of the Revised Project in detail, analyzes impact changes, and demonstrates that the Revised Project will not create any new significant environmental impacts.

Should the Board adopt the Resolution, the Revised Project will be approved and District staff will file a Notice of Determination with the Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse and submit an application for a Coastal Development Permit and Conditional Use Permit to the City of Malibu. Upon the issuance of these permits, the Revised Project could be immediately implemented.

Ms. Maez and Mr. Sam summarized the project and answered board members' questions.

WHEREAS, on July 1, 2009, the Santa-Monica Malibu Unified School District's ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted Resolution 08-49 to adopt the Mitigated Negative Declaration ("MND") and a mitigation monitoring and reporting program and to approve the Malibu High School Football Lighting Project ("Approved Project") consisting of five (5) portable, fifty-three (53) feet high light standards with six (6) fixtures each using then best available visor technology;

WHEREAS, the District revised the Approved Project to four (4) permanent, seventy (70) feet high light standards with twelve (12) fixtures each using the best available visor technology and conforming the number of nights and time periods when the lights would be used to the City of Malibu Local Coastal Plan Amendment 1-11-A, adopted on October 5, 2011 by the California Coastal Commission;

WHEREAS, the District, as lead agency, caused to be prepared pursuant to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code, § 21000 et seq. "CEQA") and the CEQA Guidelines (Title 14, Cal. Code of Regs., § 15000 et seq. the "CEQA Guidelines") an MND Addendum (the "Addendum");

WHEREAS, the Addendum describes the changed components of the Revised Project, analyzes impact changes, and concludes that no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur as a result of the Revised Project;

WHEREAS, since no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur as a result of the Revised Project, the preparation of a subsequent Environmental Impact Report ("EIR") or subsequent MND or negative declaration is not required; and

WHEREAS, the Addendum was prepared pursuant to and in accordance with CEQA and the CEQA Guidelines.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education ("Board") hereby finds as follows:

1. That the above recitals are true and correct.
2. That no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur as a result of the Revised Project, as disclosed in the Addendum, and the Addendum is the appropriate subsequent environmental document for the Revised Project.
3. That the Board has reviewed and considered the Addendum and the information contained therein prior to deciding whether to approve the Addendum and Revised Project.
4. That the Addendum, its reference documents, the staff report, this Resolution, and the whole of the record of proceedings wholly reflect the Board's independent judgment and analysis.

5. The requirements of CEQA have been fulfilled for the Revised Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby approves the Addendum.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby approves the Revised Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Assistant Superintendent, Janece L. Maez, is the custodian of the documents and other materials which constitute the record of proceedings upon which the Board's decision is based. The record of proceedings shall be maintained at the District's offices located at 1651 Sixteenth Street, Santa Monica, California 90404.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Assistant Superintendent is authorized and directed to file a Notice of Determination with Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse within five days of the adopted Resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that District staff is directed to submit an application for a Coastal Development Permit and Conditional Use Permit from the City of Malibu for this Revised Project.



- Monitor the implementation of an inclusive curriculum, including ethnic studies and learning experiences designed to eliminate racism and discrimination.
- Work collaboratively with other advisory committees as appropriate.
- Report to the Board annually, and on any other occasion as necessary, on the scope of their work, and recommendations that are developed relative to their charge.

Focus Tasks:

- 1) Review current academic, disciplinary, attendance, and other relevant data relating to academic achievement of student subgroups

- 2) Review current programs aimed at improving achievement and closing the achievement gap as well as improving campus climates and understandings between and among student groups
- 3) Create and disseminate a climate survey to be used with students and parents to identify areas of success and areas for improvement

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.29

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution No. 11-27 – Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes for the fiscal year 2012-13. The Resolution sets a not-to-exceed amount of \$20 million. The actual amount will be determined at the time of issuance.

COMMENTS: Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (*TRANS*) are short-term financings used by school districts to manage temporary fiscal year cash flow shortfalls. Because of the serious cash difficulties at the State level, the District expects delayed receipt of State apportionments. The State has deferred payment of District entitlements for several years. These delays are also expected to create cash flow difficulties for SMMUSD. In the past, large reserve balances have allowed the District to operate without issuing *TRANS*. A *TRANS* issue will bridge the cash deficiencies during the 2012-13 fiscal year.

Note: The Resolution, which is many pages in length, has been forwarded to the Board of Education under separate cover and is available for public review in the Office of the Superintendent.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING THE BORROWING OF FUNDS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2012-13; THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF A 2012-13 TAX AND REVENUE ANTICIPATION NOTE THEREFORE AND PARTICIPATION IN THE CALIFORNIA EDUCATION NOTES PROGRAM

WHEREAS, school districts are authorized by Section 53850 to 53858, both inclusive, of the Government Code of the State of California (the “Act”) (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code) to borrow money by the issuance of temporary notes;

WHEREAS, the Governing Board (the “Legislative Body”) of the school district specified in Section 23 hereof (the “District”) has determined that a sum (the “Principal Amount”), not to exceed the Maximum Amount of Borrowing specified in Section 23 hereof, which Principal Amount is to be confirmed and set forth in the Pricing Confirmation (as defined in Section 4 hereof), is needed for the requirements of the District, to satisfy operating or capital obligations of the District, and that it is necessary that said Principal Amount be borrowed for such purpose at this time by the issuance of a note or notes therefore in anticipation of the receipt of taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other moneys of the District, as further described herein, for fiscal year ending June 30, 2013 (“Repayment Fiscal Year”);

WHEREAS, the District hereby determines to borrow, for the purposes set forth above, the Principal Amount by the issuance of the Note (defined herein), in one or more series, on either a tax-exempt or taxable basis, as hereinafter defined;

WHEREAS, because the District does not have fiscal accountability status pursuant to Section 85266 of the Education Code of the State of California, it requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to borrow, on the District’s behalf, the Principal Amount by the issuance of the Note;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53853 of the Act, if the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Note within the time period specified in said Section 53853, following receipt of this Resolution, and the Note is issued in conjunction with tax and revenue anticipation notes, in one or more series, of other Issuers (as hereinafter defined), the District may issue the Note in its name pursuant to the terms stated herein;

WHEREAS, it appears, and this Legislative Body hereby finds and determines, that the Principal Amount, when added to the interest payable thereon, shall not exceed eighty-five percent (85%) of the estimated amount of the uncollected Unrestricted Revenues (defined herein) available for the payment of the principal of the Note and the interest thereon;

WHEREAS, no money has heretofore been borrowed by or on behalf of the District through the issuance of tax and revenue anticipation notes or temporary notes in anticipation of the receipt of, or payable from or secured by, such Unrestricted Revenues;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53856 of the Act, any such Unrestricted Revenues can be pledged for the payment of the principal of the Note and the interest thereon (as hereinafter provided);

WHEREAS, the District has determined that it is in the best interests of the District to participate in the California Education Notes Program (the “Program”), whereby participating school districts, including the District (collectively, the “Issuers”) expect to simultaneously issue tax and revenue anticipation notes;

WHEREAS, the District desires to have its Note (defined herein) marketed together with some or all of the notes issued by the Issuers participating in the Program;

WHEREAS, Keygent LLC, as the independent financial advisor appointed in Section 21 hereof (the “Financial Advisor”), will structure one or more pools of notes or series of note participations (referred to herein as the “Note Participations”, the “Series” and/or the “Series of Note Participations”) distinguished by (i) whether and what type(s) of Credit Instrument (as hereinafter defined) secures notes comprising each Series of Note Participations, (ii) whether interest on the Series of Note Participations is a fixed rate of interest or a variable rate of interest swapped to a fixed rate, (iii) whether interest on the Series of Note Participations is includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes, or (iv) other factors, such as common ratings, all of which the District shall authorize the Financial Advisor to determine;

WHEREAS, the Program requires the Issuers participating in any particular Series to deposit their tax and revenue anticipation notes with a trustee, pursuant to a trust agreement (the “Trust Agreement”) among such Issuers, the District and the trustee bank to be named in the Purchase Agreement, as such term is defined herein (the “Trustee”);

WHEREAS, the Trust Agreement provides, among other things, that for the benefit of Owners of Note Participations, that the District shall provide notices of the occurrence of certain enumerated events, as further described herein;

WHEREAS, the Program requires the Trustee, pursuant to the Trust Agreement, to execute and deliver the Note Participations evidencing and representing proportionate, undivided interests in the payments of principal of and interest on the tax and revenue anticipation notes issued by the Issuers comprising such Series;

WHEREAS, the District desires to have the Trustee execute and deliver a Series of Note Participations which evidence and represent interests of the owners thereof in the Note and the Notes issued by other Issuers in such Series;

WHEREAS, as additional security for the owners of the Note Participations, all or a portion of the payments by all of the Issuers of their respective notes may or may not be secured either by an irrevocable letter (or letters) of credit or policy (or policies) of insurance or other credit instrument (or instruments) (collectively, the “Credit Instrument”) issued by the credit provider or credit providers designated in the Trust Agreement, as finally executed (collectively, the “Credit Provider”), which may be issued pursuant to a credit agreement or agreements or commitment letter or letters designated in the Trust Agreement (collectively, the “Credit Agreement”) between the Issuers and the respective Credit Provider;

WHEREAS, the net proceeds of the Note may be invested by the District in Permitted Investments (as defined in the Trust Agreement) or in any other investment permitted by the laws of the State of California, as now in effect and as hereafter amended, modified or supplemented from time to time;

WHEREAS, the Program requires that each participating Issuer approve the Trust Agreement and the alternative Credit Instruments, if any, in substantially the forms presented to the Legislative Body, or, in the case of the Credit Instruments, if any and if not presented, in a form which complies with such requirements and standards as may be determined by the Legislative Body, with the final form and type of Credit Instrument and corresponding Credit Agreement, if any, determined upon execution by the Authorized Representative of the Pricing Confirmation;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Program each participating Issuer will be responsible for its share of (a) the fees of the Trustee and the costs of issuing the applicable Series of Note Participations, and (b), if applicable, the fees of the Credit Provider, the Issuer's allocable share of all the Issuer's Reimbursement Obligations, if any (each as defined in the Trust Agreement);

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Program, the Note and the Notes issued by other Issuers participating in the same Series (all as evidenced and represented by a Series of Note Participations) will be offered for public sale or private placement through negotiation with an underwriter pursuant to the terms and provisions of a purchase agreement or comparable placement agent agreement, as applicable (collectively, the "Purchase Agreement") or sold on a competitive bid basis;

WHEREAS, it is necessary to engage the services of certain professionals to assist the District in its participation in the Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, this Legislative Body hereby finds, determines, declares and resolves as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. This Legislative Body hereby finds and determines that all the above recitals are true and correct.

Section 2. Authorization of Issuance. This Legislative Body hereby determines to borrow solely for the purpose of anticipating taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys of the District (including moneys deposited in inactive or term deposits but excepting certain moneys encumbered for a special purpose) generally available for the payment of current expenses and other obligations of the District (collectively, the "Unrestricted Revenues"), by the issuance of one or more series of taxable or tax-exempt note or notes in the aggregate Principal Amount under Sections 53850 *et seq.* of the Act, designated the District's "2012-13 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note," (the "Note") with an appropriate series designation if more than one note is issued, to be issued in the form of a fully registered note or notes at the Principal Amount thereof, to be dated the date of its delivery to the initial purchaser thereof, to mature (without option of prior redemption) not more than 13 months thereafter on a date indicated on the face thereof and determined in the Pricing Confirmation (the "Maturity Date"), and to bear interest,

payable on its Maturity Date (and if the Maturity Date is more than 12 months from the date of issuance, payable on the interim interest payment date set forth in the Pricing Confirmation) and computed upon the basis of a 360-day year consisting of twelve 30-day months, or a 365 or 366 day year, as the case may be, and actual days elapsed, at a rate or rates, if more than one Note is issued, not to exceed maximum interest rate per annum allowed by law, as determined in the Pricing Confirmation and indicated on the face of the Note (the "Note Rate"). If the Note as evidenced and represented by the Series of Note Participations is secured in whole or in part by a Credit Instrument or such Credit Instrument secures the Note in whole or in part and all principal of and interest on the Note is not paid in full at maturity or if payment of principal and/or interest on the Note is paid (in whole or in part) by a draw under, payment by or claim upon a Credit Instrument which draw or claim is not fully reimbursed on such date, such Note shall become a Defaulted Note (as defined in the Trust Agreement), and the unpaid portion thereof (including the interest component, if applicable, or the portion thereof with respect to which a Credit Instrument applies for which reimbursement on a draw, payment or claim has not been fully made) shall be deemed outstanding and shall continue to bear interest thereafter until paid at the Default Rate (as defined in the Trust Agreement). If the Note as evidenced and represented by the Series of Note Participations is unsecured in whole or in part and the Note is not fully paid at maturity, the unpaid portion thereof (or the portion thereof to which no Credit Instrument applies which is unpaid) shall be deemed outstanding and shall continue to bear interest thereafter until paid at the Default Rate. In each case set forth in the preceding two sentences, the obligation of the District with respect to such Defaulted Note or unpaid Note shall not be a debt or liability of the District prohibited by Article XVI, Section 18 of the California Constitution and the District shall not be liable thereon except to the extent of any lawfully available revenues, as provided in Section 8 hereof.

The percentage of the Note as evidenced and represented by the Series of Note Participations to which a Credit Instrument, if any, applies (the "Secured Percentage") shall be equal to the amount of the Credit Instrument divided by the aggregate amount of unpaid principal of and interest on notes (or portions thereof) of all Issuers of Notes comprising such Series of Note Participations, expressed as a percentage (but not greater than 100%) as of the maturity date. Both the principal of and interest on the Note shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America, but only upon surrender thereof, at the corporate trust office of the Trustee in Los Angeles, California.

Anything in this Resolution to the contrary notwithstanding, the Pricing Confirmation may specify that a portion of the authorized Principal Amount of the Note shall be issued as a separate series of taxable Note the interest on which is includable in the gross income of the holder thereof for federal income tax purposes (a "Taxable Note"). In such event, the Taxable Note shall be issued with an appropriate series designation and other terms reflecting such taxability of interest income, including without limitation, a taxable Note Rate and a taxable Default Rate; the terms of the Note, and other terms as appropriate, shall be deemed to include or refer to such Taxable Note; and the agreements, covenants and provisions set forth in this Resolution to be performed by or on behalf of the District shall be for the equal and proportionate benefit, security and protection of the holder of any Note without preference, priority or distinction as to security or otherwise of any Note over any other Note.

In the event the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Note within the time period specified in Section 53853 of the Act, following receipt of this Resolution, this Board hereby authorizes issuance of such Note, in the District's name, in one or more series, pursuant to the terms stated in this Section 2 and this Resolution. Except as provided in Section 19(B) hereof, the Note shall be issued in conjunction with the note or notes of one or more other Issuers as part of the Program and within the meaning of Section 53853 of the Act.

Section 3. Form of Note. The Note shall be issued in fully registered form without coupons and shall be substantially in the form and substance set forth in Exhibit A, as attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein, the blanks in said form to be filled in with appropriate words and figures to be inserted or determined at or prior to the execution and delivery of the Note.

Section 4. Sale of Note; Delegation. Unless sold competitively, the Note as evidenced and represented by the Note Participations shall be sold to the Underwriter (defined herein) or other purchaser pursuant to the terms and provisions of the Note Participation Purchase Agreement (the "Purchase Agreement"). The form of the Purchase Agreement, including the form of the Pricing Confirmation set forth as an exhibit thereto (the "Pricing Confirmation"), on file with the clerk or secretary of the Legislative Body, is hereby approved. The authorized representatives set forth in Section 23 hereof, or a designated deputy thereof (the "Authorized Representatives"), each alone, are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Purchase Agreement in substantially said form, with such changes thereto as such Authorized Representative shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by his or her execution and delivery thereof; *provided, however*, that the Note Rate shall not exceed the maximum rate allowed by law, and that the District's *pro rata* share of underwriter's discount on the Note, when added to the District's share of the costs of issuance of the Note Participations, shall not exceed 1.0% of the Principal Amount of the Note and the Principal Amount shall not exceed the Maximum Amount of Borrowing. Delivery of an executed copy of the Pricing Confirmation by fax or telecopy shall be deemed effective execution and delivery for all purposes.

Section 5. Program Approval. Except as provided in Section 19(B) hereof, the Note shall be combined with notes of other Issuers into a Series and shall be sold simultaneously with such other notes of that Series referred to in the Pricing Confirmation, and shall be evidenced and represented by the Note Participations which shall evidence and represent proportionate, undivided interests in the Note in the proportion that the face amount of the Note bears to the total aggregate face amount of the Note and the notes issued by other Issuers which the Series of Note Participations represent. Such Note Participations may be delivered in book-entry form.

The forms of Trust Agreement and alternative general types and forms of Credit Agreements, if any, presented to this meeting are hereby approved, and the Authorized Representatives, each alone, are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Trust Agreement and a Credit Agreement, if applicable, which shall be identified in the Pricing Confirmation, in substantially one or more of said forms (a substantially final form of Credit Agreement to be delivered to the Authorized Representative following the execution by such

Authorized Representative of the Pricing Confirmation), with such changes therein as said Authorized Representative shall require or approve, such approval of this Legislative Body and such Authorized Representative to be conclusively evidenced by the execution thereby of the Trust Agreement and the Credit Agreement, if any. A description of this undertaking shall be set forth in the Preliminary Official Statement defined herein, if any, and will also be set forth in the Final Official Statement defined herein, if any. The Authorized Representatives, each alone, are hereby authorized and directed to comply with and carry out all of the provisions of the Trust Agreement with respect to continuing disclosure; *provided however*, that failure of the District to comply with the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, as defined in Article 11 of the Trust Agreement, shall not be considered an Event of Default hereunder. Any Credit Agreement identified in the Pricing Confirmation but not at this time before the Legislative Body shall include reasonable and customary terms and provisions relating to fees, increased costs of the Credit Provider payable by the District, negative and affirmation covenants of the District and events of default.

To the extent necessary, the Legislative Body hereby approves the preparation of a preliminary official statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") and a final official statement (the "Final Official Statement") in connection with offering and sale of the Note Participations. The Financial Advisor and underwriter of the Note Participations (the "Underwriter") are hereby authorized and directed to cause to be mailed to prospective bidders or purchasers the Preliminary Official Statement in connection with the offering and sale of the Note Participations.

Any one of the Authorized Representatives of the District is hereby authorized and directed to provide the Financial Advisor and Underwriter with such information relating to the District as they shall reasonably request for inclusion in the Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement, if any. Upon inclusion of the information relating to the District therein, the Preliminary Official Statement, except for certain omissions permitted by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended (the "Rule"), is hereby deemed final within the meaning of the Rule; *provided* that no representation is made as to the information contained in the Preliminary Official Statement relating to the other Issuers or any Credit Provider. If, at any time prior to the end of the underwriting period, as defined in the Rule, any event occurs as a result of which the information contained in the Preliminary Official Statement relating to the District might include an untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state any material fact necessary to make the statements therein, in light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading, the District shall promptly notify the Underwriter. Any one of the Authorized Representatives of the District is hereby authorized and directed, at or after the time of the sale of any Series of Note Participations, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to execute a final Official Statement in substantially the form of the Preliminary Official Statement, with such additions thereto or changes therein as they may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery thereof.

The Trustee is authorized and directed to execute Note Participations on behalf of the District pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in the Trust Agreement, in the aggregate principal amount specified in the Trust Agreement, and substantially in the form and otherwise containing the provisions set forth in the form of the Note Participations contained in the Trust Agreement. When so executed, the Note Participations shall be delivered by the Trustee to the

purchaser upon payment of the purchase price thereof, pursuant to the terms of the Trust Agreement.

Subject to Section 8 hereof, the District hereby agrees that if the Note as evidenced and represented by the Series of Note Participations shall become a Defaulted Note, the unpaid portion (including the interest component, if applicable) thereof or the portion (including the interest component, if applicable) to which a Credit Instrument applies for which full reimbursement on a draw, payment or claim has not been made by the Maturity Date shall be deemed outstanding and shall not be deemed to be paid until (i) any Credit Provider providing a Credit Instrument with respect to the Series of Note Participations, and therefore, if applicable, all or a portion of the District's Note, if any, has been reimbursed for any drawings, payments or claims made under or from the Credit Instrument with respect to the Note, including interest accrued thereon, as provided therein and in the applicable Credit Agreement, and, (ii) the holders of the Series of the Note Participations which evidence and represent the Note are paid the full principal amount represented by the unsecured portion of the Note plus interest accrued thereon (calculated at the Default Rate) to the date of deposit of such aggregate required amount with the Trustee. For purposes of clause (ii) of the preceding sentence, holders of the Series of Note Participations will be deemed to have received such principal amount upon deposit of such moneys with the Trustee.

The District agrees to pay or cause to be paid, in addition to the amounts payable under the Note, any fees or expenses of the Trustee and, to the extent permitted by law, if the District's Note as evidenced and represented by the Series of Note Participations is secured in whole or in part by a Credit Instrument, any Reimbursement Obligations (to the extent not payable under the Note), (i) arising out of an "Event of Default" hereunder (or pursuant to Section 7 hereof) or (ii) arising out of any other event (other than an event arising solely as a result of, or otherwise attributable to a default by, any other Issuer). In the case described in (ii) above with respect to Reimbursement Obligations, the District shall owe only the percentage of such fees, expenses and Reimbursement Obligations equal to the ratio of the principal amount of its Note over the aggregate principal amounts of all notes, including the Note, of the Series of which the Note is a part, at the time of original issuance of such Series. Such additional amounts will be paid by the District within twenty-five (25) days of receipt by the District of a bill therefor from the Trustee.

For purposes hereof, "Reimbursement Obligations" shall mean, to the extent permitted by law, any obligations of the District to the Credit Provider under the Credit Instrument and/or Credit Agreement, if any, all indemnification to the Credit Provider by the District, and all other amounts due to the Credit Provider by the District under the Credit Instrument and the Credit Agreement, including obligations evidenced by Defaulted Notes and overdue interest, in each case becoming due prior to, or as a result of or after, and Event of Default hereunder.

Section 6. No Joint Obligation; Owners' Rights. Except as provided in Section 19(B) hereof, the Note shall be marketed and sold simultaneously with the notes of other Issuers and shall be aggregated and combined with notes of other Issuers participating in the Program into a Series of taxable or tax-exempt Note Participations evidencing and representing an interest in several, and not joint, obligations of each Issuer. The obligation of the District to Owners is a several and not a joint obligation and is strictly limited to the District's repayment

obligation under this Resolution and the Note, as evidenced and represented by such Series of Note Participations.

Owners of Note Participations, to the extent of their interest in the Note, shall be treated as owners of the Note and shall be entitled to all the rights and security thereof; including the right to enforce the obligations and covenants contained in this Resolution and the Note. The District hereby recognizes the right of the Owners acting directly or through the Trustee to enforce the obligations and covenants contained in the Note, this Resolution and the Trust Agreement. The District shall be directly obligated to each Owner for the principal and interest payments on the Note evidenced and represented by the Note Participations without any right of counterclaim or offset arising out of any act or failure to act on the part of the Trustee.

Section 7. Disposition of Proceeds of Note. The moneys received from the sale of the Note allocable to the District's share of the costs of issuance (which shall include any issuance fees in connection with a Credit Instrument applicable to the Note, if any) shall be deposited in the Costs of Issuance Fund held and invested by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement and expended on costs of issuance as provided in the Trust Agreement. The moneys received from the sale of the Note (net of the District's share of the costs of issuance) shall be deposited in the District's Proceeds Subaccount within the Proceeds Fund hereby authorized to be created pursuant to, and held and invested by the Trustee under, the Trust Agreement for the District and said moneys may be used and expended by the District for any purpose for which it is authorized to expend funds upon requisition from the Proceeds Subaccount as specified in the Trust Agreement. Amounts in the Proceeds Subaccount are hereby pledged to the payment of the Note.

The Trustee will not create subaccounts within the Proceeds Fund, but will keep records to account separately for proceeds of the Note Participations allocable to the District's Note on deposit in the Proceeds Fund which shall constitute the District's Proceeds Subaccount.

Section 8. Source of Payment. The principal amount of the Note, together with the interest thereon, shall be payable from Unrestricted Revenues lawfully available for payment of the Notes.

To the extent the Note matures during the fiscal year following the Repayment Fiscal Year, the Note shall be payable only from Unrestricted Revenues which are received in or accrued to the Repayment Fiscal Year. Included in such revenues are State apportionments which otherwise would be received between July 2012 through June 2013 but which, due to the deferral of such apportionments by the State, will not be received until after June 30, 2013 ("Deferred Revenues"). The Deferred Revenues are hereby determined to be accrued to the Repayment Fiscal Year and shall be lawfully available to pay the principal of and interest on the Note.

As security for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Note, the District hereby pledges the first Unrestricted Revenues received in the Repayment Months (as defined below) identified in the Pricing Confirmation, and in each such Repayment Month up to the amounts identified in the Pricing Confirmation (as hereinafter provided, the "Pledged Revenues"). The principal of the Note and the interest thereon shall constitute a first lien and

charge on the Pledged Revenues and, to the extent not so paid, shall be paid from any other moneys of the District lawfully available therefor (all as provided for in Sections 53856 and 53857 of the Act). The Noteholders, Owners and Credit Provider, if any, shall have a first lien and charge on such Pledged Revenues as herein provided which are received or held by the District.

In order to effect the pledge referenced in the preceding paragraph, the District hereby agrees and covenants to establish and maintain a special account within the District's general fund to be designated the "2012-13 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Payment Account" (the "Payment Account") and further agrees and covenants to maintain the Payment Account until the payment of the principal of the Note and the interest thereon. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the District elects to have Note proceeds invested in Permitted Investments to be held by the Trustee pursuant to the Pricing Confirmation, a subaccount of the Payment Account (the "Payment Subaccount") shall be established for the District under the Trust Agreement and proceeds credited to such account shall be pledged to the payment of the Note. The Trustee need not create a subaccount, but may keep a record to account separately for proceeds of the Note so held and invested by the Trustee which record shall constitute the District's Proceeds Subaccount.

The District agrees to transfer to and deposit in the Payment Account the first Pledged Revenues received in the months specified in the Pricing Confirmation as repayment months (each individual month a "Repayment Month" and collectively "Repayment Months") (and any amounts received thereafter) until the amount on deposit in the Payment Account, together with the amount, if any, on deposit in the Payment Subaccount, and taking into consideration anticipated investment earnings thereon to be received by the Maturity Date, is equal in the respective Repayment Months identified in the Pricing Confirmation to the percentage of the principal and interest due on the Note specified in the Pricing Confirmation. In making such transfer and deposit, the District shall not be required to physically segregate the amounts to be transferred to and deposited in the Payment Account from the District's other general fund moneys, but, notwithstanding any commingling of funds for investment or other purposes, the amounts required to be transferred to and deposited in the Payment Account shall nevertheless be subject to the lien and charge created herein. The District shall notify the Trustee of each required deposit to the Payment Account in accordance with the Trust Agreement.

Any one of the Authorized Representatives of the District is hereby authorized to approve the determination of the Repayment Months and percentages of the principal and interest due on the Note required to be on deposit in the Payment Account and/or the Payment Subaccount in each Repayment Month, all as specified in the Pricing Confirmation, by executing and delivering the Pricing Confirmation, such execution and delivery to be conclusive evidence of approval by this Legislative Body and such Authorized Representative. In the event on the day in each such Repayment Month that a deposit to the Payment Account is required to be made, the District has not received sufficient Unrestricted Revenues to permit the deposit into the Payment Account of the full amount of Pledged Revenues to be deposited in the Payment Account from said Unrestricted Revenues in said month, then the amount of any deficiency shall be satisfied and made up from any other moneys of the District lawfully available for the payment of the principal of the Note and the interest thereon, as and when such other moneys are received or are otherwise legally available.

To the extent the District's Note is payable from Deferred Revenues, the Pricing Confirmation may specify that the deposits into the Payment Account from such Deferred Revenues may be made during a month subsequent to the respective Repayment Month, but in no event later than one month prior to the Maturity Date of the District's Note.

Any moneys placed in the Payment Account or the Payment Subaccount shall be for the benefit of (i) the holder of the Note and the owner of the Note and (ii) (to the extent provided in the Trust Agreement) the Credit Provider, if any. The moneys in the Payment Account and the Payment Subaccount shall be applied only for the purposes for which such accounts are created until the principal of the Note and all interest thereon are paid or until provision has been made for the payment of the principal of the Note at maturity with interest to maturity (in accordance with the requirements for defeasance of the Note Participations as set forth in the Trust Agreement) and, if applicable, (to the extent provided in the Trust Agreement and, if applicable, the Credit Agreement) the payment of all Reimbursement Obligations owing to the Credit Provider.

The District hereby directs the Trustee to transfer on the Note Payment Deposit Date (as defined in the Trust Agreement), any moneys in the Payment Subaccount to the Note Participation Payment Fund (as defined in the Trust Agreement). In addition, on the Note Payment Deposit Date, the moneys in the Payment Account shall be transferred by the District to the Trustee, to the extent necessary (after crediting any transfer pursuant to the preceding sentence), to pay the principal of and/or interest on the Note, to make payments to a Swap Provider, if any, as defined in the Trust Agreement, pursuant to a Swap Agreement, if any, as defined in the Trust Agreement, or to reimburse the Credit Provider for payments made under or pursuant to the Credit Instrument. In the event that moneys in the Payment Account and/or the Payment Subaccount are insufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Note in full when due, such moneys shall be applied in the following priority: first to pay interest on the Note; second to pay principal of the Note; third to reimburse the Credit Provider for payment, if any, of interest with respect to the Note; fourth to reimburse the Credit Provider for payment, if any, of principal with respect to the Note; and fifth to pay any Reimbursement Obligations of the District. Any moneys remaining in or accruing to the Payment Account and/or the Payment Subaccount after the principal of the Note and the interest thereon and any Reimbursement Obligations, if applicable, have been paid, or provision for such payment has been made, shall be transferred to the general fund of the District, subject to any other disposition required by the Trust Agreement, or, if applicable, the Credit Agreement. Nothing herein shall be deemed to relieve the District from its obligation to pay its Note in full on the Maturity Date.

Moneys in the Proceeds Subaccount and in the Payment Subaccount shall be invested by the Trustee pursuant to the Trust Agreement as directed by the District in Permitted Investments as described in and under the terms of the Trust Agreement. Any such investment by the Trustee shall be for the account and risk of the District, and the District shall not be deemed to be relieved of any of its obligations with respect to the Note, or Reimbursement Obligations, if any, by reason of such investment of the moneys in its Proceeds Subaccount or the Payment Subaccount.

The District shall promptly file with the Trustee and the Credit Provider, if any, such financial reports at the times and in the forms required by the Trust Agreement. At the written

request of the Credit Provider, if any, the District shall, within ten (10) Business Days following the receipt of such written request, file such report or reports to evidence the transfer to and deposit in the Payment Account required by this Section 8 and provide such additional financial information as may be required by the Credit Provider, if any.

In the event either (A) the Principal Amount of the Note, together with the aggregate amount of all tax-exempt obligations (including any tax-exempt leases, but excluding private activity bonds), issued and reasonably expected to be issued by the District (and all subordinate entities of the District) during the calendar year in which the Note is issued, will, at the time of issuance of the Note (as indicated in the certificate of the District executed as of the date of issuance of the Note (the "District Certificate"), exceed fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000), or (B) the Principal Amount of the Note, together with the aggregate amount of all tax-exempt obligations not used to finance school construction (including any tax-exempt leases, but excluding private activity bonds), issued and reasonably expected to be issued by the District (and all subordinate entities of the District) during the calendar year in which the Note is issued, will, at the time of issuance of the Note (as indicated in the District Certificate), exceed five million dollars (\$5,000,000), the following paragraph will apply. In such case, the District shall be deemed a "Safe Harbor Issuer" with respect to the Note.

Amounts in the Proceeds Subaccount of the District and attributable to cash flow borrowing shall be withdrawn and expended by the District for any purpose for which the District is authorized to expend funds from the general fund of the District, but, with respect to general fund expenditures, only to the extent that on the date of any withdrawal no other funds are available for such purposes without legislation or judicial action or without a legislative, judicial or contractual requirement that such funds be reimbursed. If on no date that is within six months from the date of issuance of the Note, the balance in the related Proceeds Subaccount is low enough so that the amounts in the Proceeds Subaccount qualify for an exception from the rebate requirement (the "Rebate Requirements") of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), the District shall notify the Trustee in writing and, to the extent of its power and authority, comply with instructions from Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth, Special Counsel, supplied to it by the Trustee as the means of satisfying the Rebate Requirements.

Section 9. Execution of Note; Registration and Transfer. Any one of the Treasurer of the County (or comparable officer), or, in the absence of said officer, his or her duly appointed assistant, the Chairperson of the Board of Supervisors of the County or the Auditor (or comparable officer) of the County shall be authorized to execute the Note issued hereunder by manual or facsimile signature and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County or any Deputy Clerk shall be authorized to countersign the Note by manual or facsimile signature and to affix the seal of the County to the Note either manually or by facsimile impression thereof. In the event the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize issuance of the Note as referenced in Section 2 hereof, any one of the Authorized Representatives of the District or any other officer designated by the Legislative Body shall be authorized to execute the Note by manual or facsimile signature and the Secretary or Clerk of the Legislative Body of the District or any duly appointed assistant thereto shall be authorized to countersign the Note by manual or facsimile signature. Said officers of the District are hereby authorized to cause the blank spaces of the Note to be filled in as may be appropriate pursuant to the Pricing Confirmation. Said officers are hereby authorized and directed to cause the Trustee, as registrar

and authenticating agent, to accept delivery of the Note pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Purchase Agreement and Trust Agreement. In case any officer whose signature shall appear on any Note shall cease to be such officer before the delivery of such Note, such signature shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if such officer had remained in office until delivery. The Note need not bear the seal of the District, if any.

As long as the Note remains outstanding, the District shall maintain and keep at the principal corporate trust office of the Trustee, books for the registration and transfer of the Note. The Note shall initially be registered in the name of the Trustee as trustee under the Trust Agreement. Upon surrender of the Note for transfer at the office of the Trustee with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the Trustee, duly executed by the registered owner or its duly authorized attorney, and upon payment of any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such transfer, the County or the District, as applicable, shall execute and the Trustee shall authenticate and deliver, in the name of the designated transferee, a fully registered Note. For every transfer of the Note, the County, the District or the Trustee may make a charge sufficient to reimburse it for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to the transfer, which sum or sums shall be paid by the person making such transfer as a condition precedent to the exercise of the privilege of making such transfer.

Subject to Section 6 hereof, the County, the District and the Trustee and their respective successors may deem and treat the person in whose name the Note is registered as the absolute owner thereof for all purposes, and the County, the District and the Trustee and their respective successors shall not be affected by any notice to the contrary, and payment of or on account of the principal of such Note shall be made only to or upon the order of the registered owner thereof. All such payments shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon the Note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid.

The Note may, in accordance with its terms, be transferred upon the books required to be kept by the Trustee pursuant to the provisions hereof by the person in whose name it is registered, in person or by his duly authorized attorney, upon surrender of the Note for cancellation, accompanied by delivery of a written instrument of transfer duly executed in form approved by the Trustee.

The Trustee will keep or cause to be kept, at its principal corporate trust office, sufficient books for the registration and transfer of the Note, which shall be open to inspection by the County and the District during regular business hours. Upon presentation for such purpose, the Trustee shall, under such reasonable regulations as it may prescribe, register or transfer or cause to be registered or transferred, on such books, the Note as hereinbefore provided.

If any Note shall become mutilated, the County or the District, as applicable, at the expense of the registered owner of such Note, shall execute, and the Trustee shall thereupon authenticate and deliver a new Note of like tenor and number in exchange and substitution for the Note so mutilated, but only upon surrender to the Trustee of the Note so mutilated. Every mutilated Note so surrendered to the Trustee shall be cancelled by it and delivered to, or upon the order of the County or the District, as applicable. If any Note shall be lost, destroyed or stolen, evidence of such loss, destruction or theft may be submitted to the County, the District and the Trustee and, if such evidence be satisfactory to them and indemnity satisfactory to them shall be

given, the County or the District, as applicable, at the expense of the registered owner, shall execute, and the Trustee shall thereupon authenticate and deliver a new Note of like tenor and number in lieu of and in substitution for the Note so lost, destroyed or stolen (or if any such Note shall have matured (as of the latest maturity date indicated on the face thereof) or shall be about to mature (as of the latest maturity date indicated on the face thereof), instead of issuing a substitute Note, the Trustee may pay the same without surrender thereof). The Trustee may require payment of a sum not exceeding the actual cost of preparing each new Note issued pursuant to this paragraph and of the expenses which may be incurred by the County or the District applicable, and the Trustee in such preparation. Any Note issued under these provisions in lieu of any Note alleged to be lost, destroyed or stolen shall constitute an original additional contractual obligation on the part of the County (on behalf of the District) or on the part of the District, as applicable, whether or not the Note so alleged to be lost, destroyed or stolen be at any time enforceable by anyone, and shall be entitled to the benefits of this Resolution with all other Notes secured by this Resolution.

Section 10. Representations and Covenants of the District.

The District makes the following representations for the benefit of the holder of the note, the owners of the Note Participations and the Credit Provider, if any.

(A) The District is duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of California and has all necessary power and authority to (i) adopt this Resolution and perform its obligations thereunder, (ii) enter into and perform its obligations under the Purchase Agreement, and (iii) issue the Note and perform its obligations thereunder.

(B) Upon the issuance of the Note, the District shall have taken all action required to be taken by it to authorize the issuance and delivery of the Note and the performance of its obligations thereunder, and the District has full legal right, power and authority to issue and deliver the Note.

(C) The issuance of the Note, the adoption of the Resolution and the execution and delivery of the Purchase Agreement, Trust Agreement and Credit Agreement, if any, and compliance with the provisions hereof and thereof will not conflict with or violate any law, administrative regulation, court decree, resolution, charter, by-laws or other agreement to which the District is subject or by which it is bound.

(D) Except as may be required under blue sky or other securities laws of any state or Section 3(a)(2) of the Securities Act of 1933, there is no consent, approval, authorization or other order of, or filing with, or certification by, any regulatory authority having jurisdiction over the District required for the issuance and sale of the Note or the consummation by the District of the other transactions contemplated by this Resolution, except those the District shall obtain or perform prior to or upon the issuance of the Note.

(E) The District has (or will have prior to the issuance of the Note) duly, regularly and properly adopted a preliminary budget for the Repayment Fiscal Year setting forth expected revenues and expenditures and has complied with all statutory and regulatory requirements with respect to the adoption of such budget. The District hereby covenants that it

shall (i) duly, regularly and properly prepare and adopt its final budget for the Repayment Fiscal Year, (ii) provide to the Trustee, the Credit Provider, if any, the Financial Advisor, promptly upon adoption, copies of such final budget and of any subsequent revisions, modifications or amendments thereto and (iii) comply with all applicable laws pertaining to its budget.

(F) The sum of the principal amount of the District's Note plus the interest payable thereon, on the date of its issuance, will not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the estimated amounts of the District's uncollected Unrestricted Revenues legally available to pay principal of and interest on the Note.

(G) The District (i) has not defaulted within the past twenty (20) years, and is not currently in default, on any debt obligation and (ii), to the best knowledge of the District, has never defaulted on any debt obligation.

(H) The District's most recent audited financial statements present fairly the financial condition of the District as of the date thereof and the results of operation for the period covered thereby. Except as has been disclosed to the Financial Advisor, the Underwriter and the Credit Provider, if any, there has been no change in the financial condition of the District since the date of such audited financial statements that will in the reasonable opinion of the District materially impair its ability to perform its obligations under this Resolution and the Note. The District agrees to furnish to the Financial Advisor, the Underwriter, the Trustee and the Credit Provider, if any, promptly, from time to time, such information regarding the operations, financial condition and property of the District as such party may reasonably request.

(I) There is no action, suit, proceeding, inquiry or investigation, at law or in equity, before or by any court, arbitrator, governmental or other board, body or official, pending or, to the best knowledge of the District, threatened against or affecting the District questioning the validity of any proceeding taken or to be taken by the District in connection with the Note, the Purchase Agreement, the Trust Agreement, the Credit Agreement, if any, or this Resolution, or seeking to prohibit, restrain or enjoin the execution, delivery or performance by the District of any of the foregoing, or wherein an unfavorable decision, ruling or finding would have a materially adverse effect on the District's financial condition or results of operations or on the ability of the District to conduct its activities as presently conducted or as proposed or contemplated to be conducted, or would materially adversely affect the validity or enforceability of, or the authority or ability of the District to perform its obligations under, the Note, the Purchase Agreement, the Trust Agreement, the Credit Agreement, if any, or this Resolution.

(J) Upon issuance of the Note and execution of the Purchase Agreement, this Resolution, the Purchase Agreement and the Note will constitute legal, valid and binding agreements of the District, enforceable in accordance with their respective terms, except as such enforceability may be limited by bankruptcy or other laws affecting creditors' rights generally, the application of equitable principles if equitable remedies are sought, the exercise of judicial discretion in appropriate cases and the limitations on legal remedies against school districts, as applicable, in the State of California.

(K) The District and its appropriate officials have duly taken, or will take, all proceedings necessary to be taken by them, if any, for the levy, receipt, collection and

enforcement of the Pledged Revenues in accordance with law for carrying out the provisions of this Resolution and the Note.

(L) The District shall not incur any indebtedness secured by a pledge of its Pledged Revenues unless such pledge is subordinate in all respects to the pledge of Pledged Revenues hereunder.

(M) So long as the Credit Provider, if any, is not in payment default under the Credit Instrument, the District hereby agrees to pay all Reimbursement Obligations attributable to the District in accordance with provisions of the Credit Agreement, if any, and/or the Trust Agreement, as applicable. Prior to the Maturity Date, moneys in the District's Payment Account and/or Payment Subaccount shall not be used to make such payments. The District shall pay such amounts promptly upon receipt of notice from the Credit Provider that such amounts are due to it.

(N) So long as any Note Participations issued in connection with the Notes are Outstanding, or any Reimbursement Obligation is outstanding, the District will not create or suffer to be created any pledge of or lien on the Note other than the pledge and lien of the Trust Agreement.

(O) It is hereby covenanted and warranted by the District that it will not request the County Treasurer to make temporary transfers of funds in the custody of the County Treasurer to meet any obligations of the District during Fiscal Year 2012-13 pursuant to Article XVI, Section 6 of the Constitution of the State of California.

Section 11. Tax Covenants. (A) The District will not take any action or fail to take any action if such action or failure to take such action would adversely affect the exclusion from gross income of the interest payable on the Note under Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"). Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the District will not make any use of the proceeds of the Note or any other funds of the District which would cause the Note to be an "arbitrage bond" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Code, a "private activity bond" within the meaning of Section 141(a) of the Code, or an obligation the interest on which is subject to federal income taxation because it is "federally guaranteed" as provided in Section 149(b) of the Code. The District, with respect to the proceeds of the Note, will comply with all requirements of such sections of the Code and all regulations of the United States Department of the Treasury issued or applicable thereunder to the extent that such requirements are, at the time, applicable and in effect.

(B) In the event the District is deemed a Safe Harbor Issuer (as defined in Section 7), this paragraph (B) shall apply. The District covenants that it shall make all calculations in a reasonable and prudent fashion relating to any rebate of excess investment earnings on the proceeds of the Note due to the United States Treasury, shall segregate and set aside from lawfully available sources the amount such calculations may indicate may be required to be paid to the United States Treasury, and shall otherwise at all times do and perform all acts and things necessary and within its power and authority, including complying with the instructions of Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth, Special Counsel referred to in Section 8 hereof to assure compliance with the Rebate Requirements. If the balance of the Proceeds Subaccount

attributed to cash flow borrowing and treated for federal tax purposes as proceeds of the Note is not low enough to qualify amounts in the Proceeds Subaccount attributed to cash flow borrowing for an exception to the Rebate Requirements on at least one date within the six month period following the date of issuance of the Note (calculated in accordance with Section 8), the District will reasonably and prudently calculate the amount, if any, of investment profits which must be rebated to the United States and will immediately set aside, from lawfully available revenues, the amount of any such rebate in the Rebate Fund referred to in this Section 11(B). In addition, in such event, the District shall establish and maintain with the Trustee a fund separate from any other fund established and maintained hereunder and under the Trust Agreement designated as the “2012-13 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Note Rebate Fund” or such other name as the Trust Agreement may designate. There shall be deposited in such Rebate Fund such amounts as are required to be deposited therein in accordance with the written instructions from Bond Counsel pursuant to Section 8 hereof.

(C) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution to the contrary, upon the District’s failure to observe, or refusal to comply with, the covenants contained in this Section 11, no one other than the holders or former holders of the Note or Note Participation Owners, the Credit Provider(s), if any, or the Trustee on their behalf shall be entitled to exercise any right or remedy under this Resolution on the basis of the District’s failure to observe, or refusal to comply with, such covenants.

(D) The covenants contained in this Section 11 shall survive the payment of the Note.

(E) The provisions of this Section 11 shall not apply to a Taxable Note.

Section 12. Events of Default and Remedies.

If any of the following events occur, it is hereby defined as and declared to be and to constitute an “Event of Default”:

(a) Failure by the District to make or cause to be made the transfers and deposits to the Payment Account, or any other payment required to be paid hereunder, including payment of principal and interest on the Note, on or before the date on which such transfer, deposit or other payment is due and payable;

(b) Failure by the District to observe and perform any covenant, condition or agreement on its part to be observed or performed under this Resolution, for a period of fifteen (15) days after written notice, specifying such failure and requesting that it be remedied, is given to the District by the Trustee or the Credit Provider, if applicable, unless the Trustee and the Credit Provider shall agree in writing to an extension of such time prior to its expiration;

(c) Any warranty, representation or other statement by or on behalf of the District contained in this Resolution or the Purchase Agreement (including the Pricing Confirmation) or in any requisition or any financial report delivered by the District or in any instrument furnished in compliance with or in reference to

this Resolution or the Purchase Agreement or in connection with the Note, is false or misleading in any material respect;

(d) A petition is filed against the District under any bankruptcy, reorganization, arrangement, insolvency, readjustment of debt, dissolution or liquidation law of any jurisdiction, whether now or hereafter in effect and is not dismissed within 30 days after such filing, but the Trustee shall have the right to intervene in the proceedings prior to the expiration of such 30 days to protect its and the Owners' interests;

(e) The District files a petition in voluntary bankruptcy or seeking relief under any provision of any bankruptcy, reorganization, arrangement, insolvency, readjustment of debt, dissolution or liquidation law of any jurisdiction, whether now or hereafter in effect, or consents to the filing of any petition against it under such law; or

(f) The District admits insolvency or bankruptcy or is generally not paying its debts as such debts become due, or becomes insolvent or bankrupt or makes an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or a custodian (including without limitation a receiver, liquidator or trustee) of the District or any of its property is appointed by court order or takes possession thereof and such order remains in effect or such possession continues for more than 30 days, but the Trustee shall have the right to intervene in the proceedings prior to the expiration of such 30 days to protect its and the Owners' interests;

Whenever any Event of Default referred to in this Section 12 shall have happened and be continuing, the Trustee shall, in addition to any other remedies provided herein or by law or under the Trust Agreement, have the right, at its option without any further demand or notice, to take one or any combination of the following remedial steps:

(a) Without declaring the Note to be immediately due and payable, require the District to pay to the Trustee, as holder of the Note, an amount equal to the principal of the Note and interest thereon to maturity, plus all other amounts due hereunder, and upon notice to the District the same shall become immediately due and payable by the District without further notice or demand; and

(b) Take whatever other action at law or in equity (except for acceleration of payment on the Note) which may appear necessary or desirable to collect the amounts then due and thereafter to become due hereunder or to enforce any other of its rights hereunder.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the District's Note is secured in whole or in part by a Credit Instrument or if the Credit Provider is subrogated to rights under the District's Note, as long as the Credit Provider has not failed to comply with its payment obligations under the Credit Instrument, the Credit Provider shall have the right to direct the remedies upon any Event of Default hereunder, and the Credit Provider's prior consent shall be required to any remedial action proposed to be taken by the Trustee hereunder.

If the District has executed a Credit Instrument and if the Credit Provider is not reimbursed for any drawing, payment or claim, as applicable, used to pay principal of and interest on the Note due to a default in payment on the Note by the District, or if any principal of or interest on the Note remains unpaid after the Maturity Date, the Note shall be a Defaulted Note, the unpaid portion (including the interest component, if applicable) thereof or the portion (including the interest component, if applicable) to which a Credit Instrument applies for which reimbursement on a draw, payment or claim has not been made shall be deemed outstanding and shall bear interest at the Default Rate, as defined in the Trust Agreement, until the District's obligation on the Defaulted Note is paid in full or payment is duly provided for, all subject to Section 8 hereof.

Section 13. Trustee. The Trustee is hereby appointed as paying agent, registrar and authenticating agent for the Note. The District hereby directs and authorizes the payment by the Trustee of the interest on and principal of the Note when such become due and payable, from the Payment Account held by the Trustee in the name of the District in the manner set forth herein. The District hereby covenants to deposit funds in such account at the time and in the amount specified herein to provide sufficient moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the Note on the day on which it matures. Payment of the Note shall be in accordance with the terms of the Note and this Resolution.

The District hereby agrees to maintain as paying agent, registrar and authenticating agent of the Note, the Trustee under the Trust Agreement.

Section 14. Approval of Actions. The aforementioned Authorized Representatives of the District are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Note and cause the Trustee to authenticate and accept delivery of the Note, pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Resolution and the Trust Agreement. All actions heretofore taken by the officers and agents of the District or this Legislative Body with respect to the sale and issuance of the Note and participation in the Program are hereby approved, confirmed and ratified and the Authorized Representatives and agents of the District are hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the District, to do any and all things and take any and all actions and execute any and all certificates, agreements and other documents which they, or any of them, may deem necessary or advisable in order to consummate the lawful issuance and delivery of the Note in accordance with, and related transactions contemplated by, this Resolution. The Authorized Representatives of the District referred to above in Section 4 hereof are hereby designated as "Authorized District Representatives" under the Trust Agreement.

In the event that the Note or a portion thereof is secured by a Credit Instrument, any one of the Authorized Representatives of the District is hereby authorized and directed to provide the Credit Provider, with any and all information relating to the District as such Credit Provider may reasonably request.

Section 15. Proceedings Constitute Contract. The provisions of the Note and of this Resolution shall constitute a contract between the District and the registered owner of the Note and the Credit Provider, if any, and such provisions shall be enforceable by mandamus or any other appropriate suit, action or proceeding at law or in equity in any court of competent

jurisdiction, and shall be irrevocable. The Credit Provider, if any, is a third party beneficiary of the provisions of this Resolution and the Note.

Section 16. Limited Liability. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein or in the Note or in any other document mentioned herein, the District shall not have any liability hereunder or by reason hereof or in connection with the transactions contemplated hereby except to the extent payable from moneys available therefor as set forth in Section 8 hereof.

Section 17. Amendments. (A) At any time or from time to time, the District may adopt one or more Supplemental Resolutions with the written consent of the Credit Provider, if any, but without the necessity for consent of the owner of the Note for any one or more of the following purposes:

(a) to add to the covenants and agreements of the District in this Resolution, other covenants and agreements to be observed by the District which are not contrary to or inconsistent with this Resolution as theretofore in effect;

(b) to add to the limitations and restrictions in this Resolution, other limitations and restrictions to be observed by the District which are not contrary to or inconsistent with this Resolution as theretofore in effect;

(c) to confirm, as further assurance, any pledge under, and the subjection to any lien or pledge created or to be created by, this Resolution, of any monies, securities or funds, or to establish any additional funds or accounts to be held under this Resolution;

(d) to cure any ambiguity, supply any omission, or cure or correct any defect or inconsistent provision in this Resolution; or

(e) to amend or supplement this Resolution in any other respect;

provided, however, that any such Supplemental Resolution does not adversely affect the interests of the owner of the Note or of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes.

Any modifications or amendment of this Resolution and of the rights and obligations of the District and of the owner of the Note or of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes may be made by a Supplemental Resolution, with the written consents of the Authority and the Credit Provider, if any, and with the written consent of the owners of at least a majority in principal amount of the Note and of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes outstanding at the time such consent is given; provided, however, that if such modification or amendment will, by its terms, not take effect so long as the Note or any or of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes remain outstanding, the consent of the owners of such Note or of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes shall not be required. No such modification or amendment shall permit a change in the maturity of the Note or a reduction of the principal amount thereof or an extension of the time of any payment thereon or a reduction of the rate of

interest thereon, or a change in the date or amounts of the pledge set forth in this Resolution, without the consent of the owners of such Note or the owners of all of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes, or shall reduce the percentage of the Note or the owners of all of the Note Participations executed and delivered in connection with the Notes, the consent of the owners of which is required to effect any such modification or amendment, or shall change or modify any of the rights or obligations of the Trustee without its written assent thereto.

(B) Notwithstanding any other provisions herein, the provisions of this Resolution as they relate to the terms of the Notes may be amended by the Purchase Agreement.

Section 18. Severability. In the event any provision of this Resolution shall be held invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such holding shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision hereof.

Section 19. Request to Borrow; Transmittal of Resolution.

(A) Following its adoption by the Board, signed copies of this resolution shall be transmitted by the secretary or clerk of the Legislative Body to the treasurer of the county (the "County") in which the District is located, to the County's board of supervisors (the "County Board"), and to the County's superintendent of schools. Transmittal of this resolution to the County Board shall constitute a request by the Legislative Body for borrowing and for the issuance of the Note by the County Board. This resolution is based on the assumption that the County Board will fail to authorize, by resolution, the issuance of the Note within 45 calendar days of its receipt hereof or that the County Board will notify the District that it will not authorize the issuance of the Note within such 45-day period. If within such 45-day period the County Board authorizes, by resolution, issuance of the Note, then, notwithstanding this resolution, the Notes shall be issued in the name of the District by the County Board pursuant to such resolution of the County Board.

(B) Adoption of this resolution is based on the assumption that the Note shall be issued in conjunction with the note or notes of one or more other school districts, as described in Section 53853(b) of the Act. However, and notwithstanding any other provision herein, if District elects not to, or is otherwise unable to, issue its Note in conjunction with the note or notes of such other school districts, transmittal of this Resolution shall constitute a request for borrowing and for the issuance, on a stand-alone basis, of the Note by the County Board. In such instance, and notwithstanding this resolution, the Notes shall be issued in the name of the District by the County Board pursuant to a resolution thereof.

Section 20. Limited Liability and Indemnification. (a) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein or in the Note or in any other document mentioned herein or related to the Note or to any Series of Note Participations to which the Note may be assigned, the District shall not have any liability hereunder or by reason hereof or in connection with the transactions contemplated hereby except to the extent payable from moneys available therefor as set forth herein and (b) the District shall indemnify and hold harmless, to the extent permitted by law, the County and its officers and employees ("Indemnified Parties"), against any and all losses, claims, damages or liabilities, joint or several, to which such Indemnified Parties

may become subject because of action or inaction related to the adoption of a resolution by the County Board of Supervisors providing for the issuance and sale of the Notes, or related to the proceedings for sale, award, issuance and delivery of the Notes in accordance therewith and herewith. The District shall also reimburse any such Indemnified Parties for any legal or other expenses incurred in connection with investigating or defending any such claims or actions.

Section 21. Appointment of Professionals. The law firm of Stradling Yocca Carlson & Rauth is hereby appointed as Special Counsel and Disclosure Counsel for the Program. The District acknowledges that Special Counsel regularly performs legal services for many private and public entities in connection with a wide variety of matters, and that Special Counsel has represented, is representing or may in the future represent other public entities, underwriters, trustees, rating agencies, insurers, credit enhancement providers, lenders, financial and other consultants who may have a role or interest in the proposed financing or that may be involved with or adverse to District in this or some other matter. Given the special, limited role of Special Counsel described above the District acknowledges that no conflict of interest exists or would exist, waives any conflict of interest that might appear to exist, and consents to any and all such relationships.

Keygent LLC is hereby appointed as Financial Advisor for the Program. Stone & Younger LLC is hereby appointed as the Underwriter for the Program.

Section 22. Form 8038-G; Continuing Disclosure. (A) Any Authorized Officer is hereby authorized to execute and deliver any Information Return for Tax-Exempt Governmental Obligations, Form 8038-G of the Internal Revenue Service (“Form 8038-G”), in connection with the issuance of the Note and the related Series of Note Participations. To the extent permitted by law, the Authority, the Trustee, the Underwriter and Special Counsel are each hereby authorized to execute and deliver any Form 8038-G for and on behalf of the District in connection with the issuance of the Note and the related Series of Note Participations, as directed by an Authorized Officer of the District.

(B) The District covenants, for the sole benefit of the Owners of the Series of Note Participations which evidence and represent the Note (and, to the extent specified in this Section 22, the beneficial owners thereof), that the District shall provide, through the Trustee acting as dissemination agent (the “Dissemination Agent”) to the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board, with respect to the District’s outstanding Note, notice of any of the following (each, a “Listed Event”) in a timely manner, not in excess of 10 business days after the occurrence thereof:

(1) (i) principal and interest payment delinquencies on the Note and the related Series of Note Participations; (ii) tender offers, (iii) defeasances; (iv) rating changes; (v) adverse tax opinions, the issuance by the IRS of proposed or final determinations of taxability, or Notices of Proposed Issue (IRS 5701-TEB), (vi) unscheduled draws on debt service reserves reflecting financing difficulties; (vii) unscheduled draws on the credit enhancement reflecting financial difficulties; (viii) substitution of credit or liquidity providers, or their failure to perform; and (ix) bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership or similar event (within the meaning of the Rule) of the District.

(C) The District covenants, for the sole benefit of the Owners of the Series of Note Participations which evidence and represent the Note (and, to the extent specified in this Section 22, the beneficial owners thereof), that the District shall provide in a timely manner, through the Trustee acting as the Dissemination Agent to the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board, with respect to the District's outstanding Note, notice of any of the following Listed Events, if material:

(1) (i) non-payment related defaults; (ii) modifications to rights of Owners and beneficial owners of the Series of Note Participations which evidence and represent the Note; (iii) optional, contingent or unscheduled bond calls; (iv) unless described under Section 22(B)(1)(v) hereof, events affecting the tax-exempt status of the Note and the related Series of Note Participations; (v) release, substitution or sale of property securing repayment of the Note, (vi) the consummation of a merger, consolidation, or acquisition involving the District or the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the District, other than in the ordinary course of business, the entry into a definitive agreement to undertake such an action or the termination of a definitive agreement relating to any such actions, other than pursuant to its terms; (vii) appointment of a successor or additional Trustee or the change of name of such Trustee.

Whenever the District obtains knowledge of the occurrence of a Listed Event under Section 22(C)(1) hereof, the District shall as soon as possible determine if such event would be material under applicable federal securities laws. The Authority and the Dissemination Agent shall have no responsibility for such determination and shall be entitled to conclusively rely upon the District's determination.

If the District determines that knowledge of the occurrence of a Listed Event under Section 22(C)(1) hereof would be material under applicable federal securities laws, or upon the occurrence of any Listed Event under Section 22(B)(1) hereof, the District shall promptly provide the Authority and the Dissemination Agent with a notice of such occurrence in a timely manner not in excess of 10 business days after the occurrence of the event, which the Dissemination Agent agrees to file with the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board.

(D) In the event of a failure of the District to comply with any provision of this section, any Owner or beneficial owner of the related Series of Note Participations may take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking mandate or specific performance by court order, to cause the District to comply with its obligations under this section. A default under this section shall not be deemed an Event of Default under Section 12 hereof, and the sole remedy under this section in the event of any failure of the District to comply with this section shall be an action to compel performance.

(E) For the purposes of this section, a "beneficial owner" shall mean any person which has the power, directly or indirectly, to make investment decisions concerning ownership of any Note Participations of the Series which evidences and represents the Notes (including persons holding Note Participations through nominees, depositories or other intermediaries).

(F) The District's obligations under this section shall terminate upon the legal defeasance, prior redemption or payment in full of its Note. If such termination occurs prior to the final maturity of the related Note Participations, the District shall give notice of such termination in the same manner as for a Listed Event under subsection (B)(1)(iii) of this section.

(G) The Dissemination Agent shall not be responsible in any manner for the content of any notice or report prepared by the District pursuant to this section. In no event shall the Dissemination Agent be responsible for preparing any notice or report or for filing any notice or report which it has not received in a timely manner and in a format suitable for reporting. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to prevent the District from disseminating any other information, using the means of dissemination set forth in this section or any other means of communication, or including any other notice of occurrence of a Listed Event, in addition to that which is required by this section. If the District chooses to include any information in any notice of occurrence of a Listed Event in addition to that which is specifically required by this section, the District shall have no obligation under this section to update such information or include it in any future notice of occurrence of a Listed Event.

(H) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Resolution, the District with the consent of the Dissemination Agent and notice to the Authority may amend this section, and any provision of this section may be waived, provided that the following conditions are satisfied:

(1) If the amendment or waiver relates to the provisions of subsections (B) or (C) of this section, it may only be made in connection with a change in circumstance that arises from a change in legal requirements, change in law, or change in the identity, nature or status of an obligated person with respect to the Note and the related Note Participations, or the type of business conducted;

(2) The undertaking, as amended or taking into account such waiver, would in the opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel, have complied with the requirements of the Rule at the time of the original issuance of the Note and the related Note Participations, after taking into account any amendments or interpretations of the Rule, as well as any change in circumstances; and

(3) The amendment or waiver either (i) is approved by the Owners or beneficial owners of the Note Participations of the Series which evidences and represents the Note in the same manner as provided in the Trust Agreement for amendments to the Trust Agreement with the consent of Owners or beneficial owners, or (ii) does not, in the opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel, materially impair the interests of the Owners or beneficial owners of the related Note Participations. In the event of any amendment or waiver of a provision of this section, notice of such change shall be given in the same manner as for a Listed Event under subsection (B) of this section, and shall include, as applicable, a narrative explanation of the reason for the amendment or waiver; provided, however, the District shall be responsible for preparing such narrative explanation.

(I) The Dissemination Agent shall have only such duties as are specifically set forth in this section. The Dissemination Agent shall not be liable for the exercise of any of its

rights hereunder or for the performance of any of its obligations hereunder or for anything whatsoever hereunder, except only for its own willful misconduct or negligence. Absent such negligence or willful misconduct, the Dissemination Agent shall not be liable for an error of judgment. No provision hereof shall require the Dissemination Agent to expend or risk its own funds or otherwise incur any financial or other liability or risk in the performance of any of its obligations hereunder, or in the exercise of any of its rights hereunder, if such funds or adequate indemnity against such risk or liability is not reasonably assured to it. The District hereunder agrees to compensate the Dissemination Agent for its reasonable fees in connection with its services hereunder, but only from the District's share of the costs of issuance deposited in the Costs of Issuance Fund held and invested by the Trustee under the Trust Agreement.

(J) This section shall inure solely to the benefit of the District, the Dissemination Agent, the Underwriter and the Owners and beneficial owners from time to time of the Note Participations, and shall create no rights in any other person or entity.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt Resolution 11-28 – In Support of the Middle Class Scholarship Act Proposed by Speaker John A. Perez of the California State Assembly.

COMMENTS: According to Assembly Speaker, John A. Perez, the Middle Class Scholarship Act could cut fees at California state colleges by up to two-thirds for students whose family income is under \$150,000 and who are not eligible for financial aid grants. The Speaker's legislation, AB 1500 and AB 1501, funds the Middle Class Scholarship by closing a tax loophole that lets out-of-state corporations take \$1 billion out of California every year. If passed, the Middle Class Scholarship could save CSU students roughly \$4,000 a year and UC students \$8,200 a year. Community colleges would get \$150 million to increase affordability for their students.

WHEREAS, California has long promised and provided affordable higher education for students willing to work hard, a promise that helped spur innovation and prosperity for decades; and

WHEREAS, the promise of affordable higher education is in jeopardy because of enormous fee increases at the University of California, California State University and California Community Colleges; and

WHEREAS, Student fees at the California State University have increased by 191 percent since 2003-04, from \$2,046 to \$5,970; and student fees at the University of California have increased by 145 percent since 2003-04, from \$4,984 to \$12,192; and

WHEREAS, Financial Aid Programs have expanded to mitigate the impacts of the fee increases for lower income families; and

WHEREAS, Middle Class Families, who make too much to qualify for financial aid programs but too little to afford the high fee levels, are forced to rely on staggering levels of student loans or give up on the dream of higher education; and

WHEREAS, Corporate tax law changes in 2009 provided \$1 billion in annual tax breaks to out-of-state corporations to the competitive disadvantage of California businesses; and

WHEREAS, John Pérez, Speaker of the Assembly, has introduced the Middle Class Scholarship Act – revenue neutral legislation that slashes student fees for Middle Class Families by two-thirds and pays for the scholarships by pulling back the \$1 billion tax benefit provided to out-of-state corporations; and

WHEREAS, The Middle Class Scholarship will be available to California students from families earning less than \$150,000 per year; and

WHEREAS, The Middle Class Scholarship Act will save 42,000 University of California students nearly \$8,200 per year, or \$33,000 over a four year period; will save 150,000 California State University students \$4,000 per year, or \$16,000 over a four year period; and will provide \$150 million to community colleges to improve affordability; and

WHEREAS, The Middle Class Scholarship Act will provide immediate economic benefit by returning tens of thousands of dollars to middle income families and dramatically reducing the massive student loan debt that middle income families currently must rely on; and



WHEREAS, The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District's Board of Education cares deeply about affordability and access to public higher education in California;



DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

COMMENTS: Based on the IDEA (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) reauthorization and the California State Department of Education’s Response to Instruction and Intervention Rtl² framework, Response to Intervention (Rtl) is a strategy for supporting student success. At the core of Rtl is the developing of a systematic approach to assessing student need and providing timely and appropriate intervention based on the assessments and progress monitoring at set intervals. By implementing Rtl, the district will require resources in both human and fiscal to provide direct instruction and intervention services as well as support to parents.

Literacy Coordinator Liz Cochran, Principal Gonzalez-Castillo, Principal Richardson, and Principal Orum’s presentation can be found under Attachments at the end of these minutes.

Mr. Patel asked about engaging parents in the process. Ms. Cochran explained the different levels of parent engagement built into the Rtl framework. Dr. Escarce would like to see Rtl as part of the core budget. Ms. Leon-Vazquez said that Rtl would be an area where she would like to see districtwide fundraising directed. Ms. Lyon commented that the principals will be weighing in regarding what they feel is most needed at their sites; that information will be shared with the Superintendent’s Advisory Group examining districtwide fundraising. She also summarized the timeline moving forward with Rtl, explaining that implementing an Rtl framework districtwide would affect the 2013-14 budget more than next year’s. If Rtl will be included in the 2013-14 budget, Dr. Escarce would like this presentation brought forward to the board earlier next spring semester.

RE: LINKED LEARNING: COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

COMMENTS: College today means much more than just pursuing a four-year degree at a college or university. Being “college ready” means being prepared for any postsecondary education or training experiences. Being college ready means that a high school graduate has the English and mathematics knowledge and skills necessary to qualify for and succeed in entry-level, credit-bearing college courses without the need for remedial coursework.

Career is not just a job; it provides a family-sustaining wage and pathways to advancement, requiring postsecondary training or education. Being “career ready” means that a high school graduate has the necessary knowledge and skills to qualify for and succeed in postsecondary education and job training for his/her chosen career.

Linked Learning is a framework that prepares students for postsecondary education and career; connects academics to real-world applications; leads students to the full range of postsecondary opportunities; and improves student achievement.

This presentation begins the dialogue in the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District regarding how we should prepare our students for college and career readiness utilizing the resources we have in our schools and communities.

Mr. Patel asked if costs associated with this framework would be included in the budget planning process for next year. Ms. Lyon said it would. Mr. de la Torre suggested that the district work with the City of Santa Monica to tap into the growing career markets. He suggested reexamining the Samohi house system to focus them around themes – true small schools within a larger campus. Mr. Mechur was concerned with the pathway courses replacing other academic subjects. Dr. Chou indicated that pathway courses are only offered to juniors and seniors as electives. Ms. Leon-Vazquez emphasized the need to include career technical education in the curriculum in order to prepare our students for jobs in this century. Dr. Escarce asked the long-term goal of the program. Dr. Chou said the initial year would be smaller, with growth and expansion occurring with each year and a longer-range plan will be developed.

RE: NOVEMBER 2012 TAX INCREASE BALLOT INITIATIVES

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

Signatures are currently being collected for two ballot initiatives that have great potential impact on California's public education budget: the California Sales and Income Tax Increase Initiative (#12-0009) and the California State Income Tax Increase to Support Public Education Initiative (#11-0088, #11-0100). While there are other tax measures for which signatures are being collected (A Tax on Oil Initiative; An effort to collect more Income Taxes from Out-of-State Businesses), these are the two that are most directed toward raising revenues that will be directed to public education. Without the passage of a ballot measure, Governor Brown has been clear that schools will face an estimated \$370 per ADA cut.

California Sales and Income Tax Increase Initiative (#12-0009) (AKA: the Governor's proposal)

This initiative has been approved for circulation in California as an initiated constitutional amendment. To earn a spot on the state's ballot, sponsors of the initiative must collect 807,615 signatures. The measure is a merger of two previously competing initiatives: the "Millionaire's Tax" and Jerry Brown's Tax Increase Initiative.

It will:

- Raise California's sales tax to 7.5% from 7.25%. (Under the Brown Tax Hike, the sales tax would have increased to 7.75%)
- Increase the state income tax on those whose income exceeds \$250,000. This increased tax will be in effect for 7 years.

Those making \$1 million or more, who are currently taxed at a marginal rate of 10.3%, would instead pay 13.3% under this proposal. This would be the highest personal income tax in the country.

Official summary:

"Increases personal income tax on annual earnings over \$250,000 for seven years. Increases sales and use tax by ¼ cent for four years. Allocates temporary tax revenues 89 percent to K-12 schools and 11 percent to community colleges. Bars use of funds for administrative costs, but provides local school governing boards discretion to decide, in open meetings and subject to annual audit, how funds are to be spent. Guarantees funding for public safety services realigned from state to local governments."

Fiscal impact estimate:

"Increased state revenues over the next seven fiscal years. Estimates of the revenue increases vary – from \$6.8 billion to \$9 billion for 2012-13 and from \$5.4 billion to \$7.6 billion, on average, in the following five fiscal years, with lesser amounts in 2018-19. These revenues would be available to (1) pay for the state's school and community college funding requirements, as increased by this measure, and (2) address the state's budgetary problem by paying for other spending commitments. Limitation on the state's ability to make changes to the programs and revenues shifted to local governments in 2011, resulting in a more stable fiscal situation for local governments."

California State Income Tax Increase to Support Public Education Initiative (#11-0088, #11-0100) (AKA: the Our Children, Our Future Act or the Munger Act)

This initiative has been approved for circulation in California as an initiated state statute. To earn a spot on the state's 2012 ballot, sponsors of the initiative must collect 504,760 signatures. Its sponsors refer to the measure as the "Our Children, Our Future: Local Schools and Early Education Investment Act."

Two versions of the initiative were submitted, and they differ in some respects. However, in general, if enacted, the initiative will:

- Increase state income tax rates for most Californians, resulting in increased revenues to the state of about \$10 billion a year.
- The state income tax increase would end after 12 years, unless voters reauthorize it.
- Earmark most of the new revenue of \$10 billion for public school districts and early childhood development programs.

Official summary:

"Increases personal income tax rates for annual earnings over \$7,316 with a sliding scale that increases the tax rate from .4% for lowest individual earners to 2.2% for individuals earning over \$2.5 million. Tax increase ends after twelve years. Allocates new revenues 85% to K-12 schools and 15% to preschools and child care. Provides K-12 funds on school-specific, per-pupil basis, subject to local control. Requires local education budgeting to be school-specific. Requires oversight, audits, and public input. Prohibits state from directing or using new funds."

Fiscal impact estimate:

"Increased state personal income tax revenues beginning in 2013 and ending in 2024. Estimates of the revenue increases vary from \$10 billion to \$11 billion per year initially, tending to increase over time. The revenues would be dedicated to K-12 education (85 percent of the funds) and early care and education programs (15 percent) and would supplement existing funding for these programs. In years with stronger growth in state personal income tax revenues, some of the revenues raised by this measure—several hundred million dollars per year—would be used to pay education debt service costs, resulting in state savings."

Commentary & Polling

There is concern, among those who generally support a tax increase, that if there are multiple tax increase proposals on the November 6, 2012, ballot, they might all fail. Whereas, these tacticians believe, if only one tax increase initiative is on the ballot, it stands a better chance of passing. Opinions from strategists:

- Steve Glazer, who is working for the Jerry Brown tax hike: "When voters are offered choices among competing [tax] measures, it depresses the support for each of them. The likely result will be all of them failing."
- Darrell Steinberg, the President Pro Tem of the California State Senate: "The real problem is that if you have multiple measures on the ballot, you dramatically increase the likelihood that they will all fail. That's not an acceptable outcome."
- Harold Meyerson, an op-ed columnist for the Washington Post: "...a look back at state history reveals numerous episodes in which Californians essentially championing the same cause have put rival measures on the same ballot, only to create a sea of voter confusion that doomed the proposals on election day."

According to a recent poll conducted by the LA Times, 64% percent of those surveyed said they supported **the Governor's proposal**, while a third of respondents opposed the measure. 32% of those surveyed said they supported the **“Our Children, Our Future” proposal**, while 64% said they opposed it.

The board agreed to postpone this item until a future board meeting.

3. Produce revisions to the Special Education Parent Handbook (2009) based on changes in relevant law, District updates and feedback from community members.
 - a. For publication as an updated Handbook hardcopy, create new sections in the following areas:
 - i. Preschool Program
 - ii. Post-Secondary Transition Program
 - iii. Preschool/Elementary/Middle School/High School/Post-Secondary transition process including IEP Individual Transition Plans (ITPs).
 - b. For updates to the website Handbook publication, collaborate quarterly with District staff to identify changes in law and other relevant information.

1. To advise the Board of Education on the Special Education budget, collaborate with District's Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and Financial Oversight Committee (FOC) utilizing the newly created Special Education specific reporting format.
 - a. To refine the internal system such that the financial reporting system relates back to the instructional needs of Special Education students.
 - b. Internal financing reporting instrument that serves as a management tool to ensure cost effective education of each and every Special Education student.

2. To advise the Board of Education in the District's Special Education instructional technology needs, working in collaboration with the District, CFO, Director of Purchasing, Warehouse from Business and Fiscal Services, and Department of Special Education, including analysis of educational, financial and equity impact.

3. Review, analyze, and report to Board of Education upon the needs of Special Education instructional programs in Reading and Mathematics, and analyze strategies appropriate to the effective education of students with autism.

Accomplishments to date in meeting the charges (since date of our last report):

- Hold monthly meetings on first Tuesday of the month (unless under special circumstances).
- Maureen Bradford, presented the 2010-2011 AYP Test Scores of Students with Disabilities.
- Ben Conway, children's rights attorney with the Public Defense Council at March 6, 2012 meeting to discuss lapse of AB3632 and how California school districts are now responsible for funding and services provided to students with mental health disabilities.
- April meeting will be on the third Tuesday of the month due to spring break. It will be held at Point Dume elementary school. This will be our site visit for the 2011-2012 school year.
- The Financial Committee has been changed from an ad hoc to a standing committee to address annual budget issues as well as budget coding to provide transparency and ease of understanding in regards to budget reporting of special education student expenditures.
- SEDAC has formed a new ad hoc committee reviewing SE within the district that will help produce a report to the Board. This function is part of the Joint Land Use Agreement between the SMMUSD and the City and is part of an annual report to the City about the state of special education.
- Transition ad hoc continues to work on post-secondary transition plans for all students with IEPs that can be added to the parent handbook and exist as a stand-alone piece for parents and students in our school district, as well as the SELPA. Information will cover the various pathways students can take once they leave the district and the resources that exist for them. The areas covered are independent living, work, vocational training, and/or two-four year college.

Review and revise article to increase operational efficiency of school and district.

Article XI Evaluation

Develop an authentic, thorough evaluation process that informs teacher practice, recognizes exceptional teaching and improves instruction.

Article XXII Substitutes

Review and revise article to address interests of substitute teachers and management.

Article XXIII Salary

Consider fair and sustainable total compensation adjustments to address economic challenges and uncertainties faced by district.

Article XXIV Additional Compensation

Identify key interests and review how current contract language addresses them.

Article XXV Health & Welfare Benefits

Examine the district’s current health care model. Determine means to provide a high-quality program at sustainable cost.

Edison Language Academy PTSA Board Presentation – 4/19/12


Here are one or two great things about my school and one or two things that need improvement: The main great thing about Edison is the language immersion program. I think a lot of people don't realize that Edison is the foundation of a K-12 language immersion program and one of only 11 or 12 such programs in the entire country.

Studies show that learning in 2 languages from a young age increases academic performance and Edison's test scores are really excellent across the board, so we know that it is working for kids of both languages. But learning in two languages does more than teach language skills and raise test scores. It teaches kids to be open to other ways of expression and to hold two thoughts in their minds at the same time, it teaches them about other cultures, and how to put themselves empathetically in the shoes of another. I don't know if there is a more effective way to teach kids how to be better citizens of the world.

I think of the SMMUSD Immersion program as one continuous program that spans 3 schools rather than 3 separate schools and that's what I want to talk about because I think the program could use some shoring up.

- At Edison, we need to make sure that admissions policies continue to allow for the important language balance that needs to be maintained in order for the program to be sustainable. It's also imperative that ALL staff at Edison be bilingual. Since the demographics have shifted in Santa Monica, and rent control laws have changed and then later because of the the new permit regulations imposed by LAUSD, recruitment has become more important in order to reach Spanish speaking families who live and/or work in the district, so we have to be able to do that in more innovative ways.
- The immersion program also needs strong support at the secondary level. Obviously there are a lot of competing priorities and it's easy for this to get lost in the shuffle. One thing that other similar programs have done is to partner with the Ministry of Education from Spain for ex., something they approached us about some time ago and we decided not to do. We could also become part of the International Bacclaureate program.

I think it should be part of the long term strategy of this district to beef up the JAMS and SAMOHI immersion programs. Without the continued strong support this board has shown over the past 25 years, it is in danger of being diluted and of eventually going gently into the night. We can't let that happen through complacency. We need to keep thinking of ways to strengthen the immersion program at all 3 schools and make this unique program a high priority in the district.





Tier 2 Intervention

- Provide intensive, systematic instruction on up to three foundational reading skills in small groups to students who score below the benchmark score on universal screening.
- Typically, these groups meet between three and five times a week, for 20 to 40 minutes.
- **It can happen in the classroom.**




Data Analysis & Intervention Decisions

- Start with AIMS & SRI cut scores to form intervention groups. Triangulate that data with other assessment data, observations, and student work.
- Conduct data analysis meetings to determine if students are responding to the interventions.
- Focus on the concept of **acceleration** rather than **remediation**. The goal is to move students out of tiers 2 and 3.






- We will continue to expand our RTI efforts to include:
 - K-5 math
 - middle and high school reading & math



A National Imperative

“I ask that every American commit to at least one year or more of higher education or career training. This can be community college or a four-year school; vocational training or an apprenticeship. But whatever the training may be, every American will need to get more than a high school diploma.”

What is Linked Learning?

- Multiple pathways to achieving success
- A school to career perspective
- Making connections with real life situations
- Providing students with rigorous and relevant coursework
- Building Relationships
- Incorporating California Common Core Anchor Standards for College and Career Readiness
- Aligning efforts with District’s Strategic Plan
- Infusing the community’s Cradle to Career emphasis in our work.



What Does the Research Say?

“Students who follow a multi-year program of study in an industry-themed pathway that combines rigorous academics with demanding career technical education, and engage directly with the world of adult work, achieve better than their counterparts.”

(David Stern, Career Academy Support Network (CASN), UC Berkeley's Graduate School of Education, 2011)



What Does the Research Say?

□ Linked Learning can:

- Generate higher academic achievement;
- Lead to increased college attendance rates, higher earning potential after graduation, and greater civic engagement.

(Jeannie Oakes, formerly of UCLA; and evidence from *California Partnership Academies; One Model of Linked Learning Pathways*, 2008)



What Does the Research Say?

- 92% of high school teachers believe their students are ready for college and careers; only 26% of postsecondary instructors agree. (ACT's 2009 National Curriculum Survey)
- A study of the California Partnership Academies 2009-2010 shows that 95% of seniors attending the academies go on to graduate, compared with 85% of students statewide; 57% of academies graduates fulfilled the courses required for UC/CSU admissions, compared to 36% of graduates statewide. (UC Berkeley's CASN Report)



In Short,

Students, who can see a connection between what they're learning and their goals for the future, perform better.



How Does Linked Learning Work?

Students in Linked Learning Programs:

- Follow a pathway, a comprehensive program of study, that connects learning in the classroom with real-world applications outside of school.
- Are provided instruction that integrates rigorous academic instruction with a demanding technical curriculum and field-based learning – all set in the context of one of California's 15 major industry sectors.

Students pursue a pathway from grades 9 to 12, and graduate prepared for the full range of post-secondary options.

The Linked Learning approach challenges and inspires students to learn, and creates well-rounded, highly skilled individuals who have a strong foundation to support lifelong success.

Linked Learning Coursework

Categories of Courses

Cornerstone: *the most basic element*

The core academic subjects complement traditional learning through project-based learning that links to real world applications and meet UC/CSU admission requirements

Keystone: *sequenced elective courses within a career pathway with support*

Career and technical education courses; partnership academies; service learning; externships for teachers

Capstone: *the crowning point*

Regional Occupation Programs; career pathways; internship; apprenticeship; mentorships; work experience

The National Picture

- In the next decade:
 - About 80% of the jobs in the US will require postsecondary education or training.
 - Forty-five percent of jobs will be in “middle skill” occupations that require at least some postsecondary education and training.
 - Thirty three percent will be in high skilled occupations for which a bachelors degree or more is required.
 - Only 22% of future job openings will be “low skills”, and accessible to those with a high school diploma or less. (Dept. of Labor Statistics)
- Higher levels of education lead to elevated wages, a more equitable distribution of income and substantial gains in productivity.
- Nearly 93% of African Americans say college is part of their future plan, less than 57% enroll immediately following graduation. (College Board)
- Nearly 91% of Latinos say college is part of their future plan, less than 63% enroll immediately following graduation. (College Board)



SMMUSD Data

- About 86% of our high school students graduate from our high schools. Of those students:
 - Approximately 64% attend 4-year colleges and universities;
 - About 30% attend SMC
 - Nearly one third of our students who enroll at SMC do not place in college level English and/or math courses.
- Approximately 25% of the high school juniors who took the Early Assessment Program (EAP) items as part of the California Standards Tests (CST) were rated as college ready.
- Our achievement gaps persist with fewer students of color, low socio-economic status, English learners, and students with disabilities achieving proficiency when compared to their white, Asian and non-low income peers.



Why Linked Learning for SMMUSD?

- To ensure students are prepared with 21st Century Skills as creative and critical thinkers, effective collaborators and communicators.
- To address the District's Strategic Plan goals: Promote Excellence, Strengthen Talent at Every Level and Nurture Collaborative Partnerships
- To implement aspects of the California Career Technical Education Model Curriculum Standards (2005)
- To implement the common core state standards and the enhanced teacher and principal evaluation efforts
- To meet the challenge of SSPI Torlakson's Career Readiness Initiative (2012)

Why Linked Learning for SMMUSD?

- It addresses the fundamental challenges facing California's system of high school education including:
 - Traditional academic courses are not relevant to the lives and aspirations of many students.
 - Traditional vocational education often lacks the academic and technical rigor required for success in postsecondary education and high-skilled careers.
 - Certain students have been channeled into vocational programs as they are deemed not college material.

What Have We Done to Date?

- Rigorous core academic programs for all students
- Career days, guest/parent speakers, career fairs in elementary and secondary schools
- STEM focus at Rogers Learning Community, Science Magnet at JAMS, and the budding work of STEM efforts at McKinley Elementary School
- Electives to meet student interests - career exploration, VAPA (non career/technical), SPARK, Valued Youth, Design Engineering
- Collaboration with Santa Monica College with articulated ROP coursework in Automotive Technology, Careers in Education, and Photography

And...

- ROP Programs in other areas such as graphic design, digital design, small business – Project ECHO, virtual business enterprise, floral design, technical theater, computer applications, marketing, and career internships
- An afterschool mentoring program in A.C.E. (architectural, construction, engineering)
- Courses such as graphic design, digital design, Project ECHO, virtual business, film studies, photography, and dance are UC approved “a-g” courses
- Counselor Days at SMC, twice a year, to learn about new and emerging careers in the community and coursework offered at SMC
- City’s newly developed Summer Santa Monica Youth Technology Program, including workshops and internships

What Are We Proposing?

- In 2012, two new career pathways: 1) Computer Studies and 2) Promo Pathway that can be collaborated with Santa Monica College and surrounding four-year institutions of higher education
- In 2013, three more career pathways: 1) Pre-engineering, 2) Environmental Studies, and 3) Allied Health
- Collaboration with Santa Monica College Career and Technical Education Programs to provide more opportunities to explore emerging careers (e.g. promo pathway, logistics, sustainable works, allied health)
- Service Learning Experiences
- Partnering with outside sources to support career choices (e.g. Heal the Bay, National Geographic, HMC Designing Futures Foundation workshops, Johns Hopkins University Engineering Innovation Project to begin in 2013, internships, apprenticeship – Promo pathway partners, Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu, Chambers of Commerce, local businesses)

Computer Studies – a Networking Pathway (Beginning 2012)

A pilot program in networking of computers/technology via the Cisco Networking Certification Program.

GRADE 11	GRADE 12
Students take the Information Technology (IT) Essentials course (equivalent to an A+ certification program)	Students take the networking course that leads to completion of requirements for Cisco Certified Entry Networking Technician (CCENT) status. This certification needed for entry-level network technicians and the Cisco Certified Network Associate (CCNA) for security specialists.

Cisco certification, an industry recognized designation, can lead to a career with a starting salary of \$40,000 or more

What Does It Cost?

- **Year 1** (enrollment of 20 students) – IT Essentials
 - An instructor (estimated at \$12,000)
 - Related training cost (estimated at \$3,000)
 - Lab set up (estimated at \$800/student = \$16,000)
- **Year 2** (enrollment of 20 students) – Cisco's Networking, plus IT Essentials (20 new students)
 - An instructor (estimated at \$24,000)
 - Lab set up – one time (estimated at \$35,000)

Proposed Funding

- Grant funding for instructionally related cost (ROP teacher salary and benefits, certification training for teacher, instructional materials)
- District funding for student stations and support materials – one time set up

Instructor	\$15,000	\$24,000 (grant)
Labs	\$16,000	\$35,000 (District)

Collaboration Partners:

- **Corporate:** Cisco, Sigmanet, GST, and local tech companies
- **Private:** Foundations, internships, job placement
- **Public:** Collaboration with SMC's computer studies/computer science programs, advanced certification, and AA degree; Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu



Promo Pathway (Beginning 2012)

"Preditors" (promo writer, producer & editor) are responsible for the creation of promotional "spots" (like a commercial) for broadcast, cable and local television networks to encourage viewers to watch.

These "spots" are created in a variety of lengths and typically are created to promote a specific program, channel or initiative, and can range from as short as 10 seconds to 90 seconds in length.

Businesses in this arena are looking for diverse young adults to bring fresh exciting ideas to television promotion.


One-year program, with an internship that would lead to a career earning \$55,000 + a year.



What Does It Cost?

- Pre-collegiate: Pre-Promo Pathway currently being offered at Virginia Avenue Park and Olympic High School for high school age students
- The cost of the pre-Promo Pathway course is being supported by the South Bay Center for Community Development
- SMC coursework is offered as part of students' advanced certification

A Pilot Pre-Engineering Pathway Program (To Be Developed for 2013)



- Promote the Johns Hopkins University's Engineering Innovation Project in collaboration with SMC.
- Provide SMMUSD teachers with training to develop the pre-engineering pathway coursework.
- Offer juniors and seniors elective courses in engineering and robotics.
- Funding through application to state Career Readiness Initiative or other local funding.
- Collaborate with SMC and CSUN to build pathway coursework.

A Pilot Program in Environmental Studies (To be developed for 2013)

- Courses in Marine Biology, Environmental Science, AP Environmental Science are currently offered.
- Solidify partnerships with Heal the Bay, National Geographic, Annenberg Learning, HMC Architects.
- Develop internship opportunities with partners including the cities of Santa Monica and Malibu.
- Collaborate with City of Santa Monica Sustainable Work and articulation with Environmental Studies Program at SMC.



A Pilot Program in Allied Health (To Be Developed for 2013)


- Provide students with coursework in Allied Health (all other areas outside of medicine, dentistry, nursing, and pharmacy)
- Currently, approved Biotechnology course
- Develop additional coursework to be submitted and approved by the Board of Education and UC Regents
- Collaborate with SMC's programs
- Develop partnerships with local hospitals, and health care businesses
- Develop opportunities for internships



What is Service Learning...

"A teaching and learning strategy that integrates meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities. Through service-learning, young people, from kindergarteners to college students, use what they learn in the classroom to solve real-life problems. They not only learn the practical applications of their studies, they become actively contributing citizens and community members through the service they perform."

Service Learning Experiences

Service Learning enables students to:

- ❖ Learn and apply academic, social and personal skills.
- ❖ Improve the community.
- ❖ Continue individual growth.
- ❖ Develop lifelong commitments to public service and learning.
- ❖ Explore careers while conducting service experiences.
- ❖ Develop their voices through their community involvement.

What Have We Done in this Area?

- A committee of Samohi teachers have begun their work in learning and implementing Service Learning experiences for two years.
- Presentations were made to the Santa Monica Chamber of Commerce and the City of Santa Monica to solicit support and engagement.
- Pilot projects were implemented summer of 2011 with Connect for Success students
- Implementation of Services Learning Experiences in 9th – 12th grade classes in various subjects.
- Approximately 30 teachers across the district have integrated Service Learning and will participate in the Global Youth Service Day, on Friday, April 20, 2012.

What Does It Cost?

- Teachers preparation time (\$45/hour) and conference/workshop attendance (est. \$20,000)
- One coordinator (est. \$60,000)
 - ❖ To manage the various projects developed by teachers and students,
 - ❖ To make contacts with local businesses and other entities to provide internship and mentorship opportunities for our students and externship for our teachers
 - ❖ To provide workshops, assistance, and tracking of students in completing the projects

Some Final Thoughts,

- The District has several programs in place to support students in different aspects of their college and career readiness preparation. But the programs are not sufficient to reach *ALL* students.
- Review of the research indicates that students in partnership academies or career pathways are more successful in high school. This is particularly true for underrepresented students.
- Staff is requesting the board's support to implement Linked Learning strategies through the proposed pilot pathway programs that are articulated, cohesive, and aligned with industry sector pathways and community needs.
- The proposed pathways are the beginning of the District's efforts to implement the Linked Learning Initiative for students
- The District has many partners who will support such implementation.
