#### Brontë Burnette – Santa Monica High School

Student Board Member Burnette reported that this week has been exciting, with AP tests completing and a power outage yesterday. Prom tickets are on sale and culminating ceremonies and banquets have begun. Starting this week, Menchies will be on campus selling ice cream every Thursday until the end of the year. A UC workshop will be on campus this weekend. Next week, there will be a book drive benefiting the library and other organizations. The UCLA blood drive is on Tuesday, May 22 from 8:00am to 1:00pm. The orchestra Pops Concert is also on May 22, while the choir concert will be on June 8. Bike It!/Walk It! Day will be on the May 23. Student Board Member Arsharnive report that AP tests have finally ended. Tomorrow night is the long-awaited prom at the Greystone Manor in West Hollywood. On June 3, the high school will have their first annual film festival, where students will showcase their work and compete for prizes. Last Friday was the 2<sup>nd</sup> Bike It!/Walk It!/Pool It! Day. May 9 was teacher appreciation day. The choir participated in the Music in the Parks Choral Festival, where they won five first place awards and numerous notable mentions. Tonight, incoming AP students and parents are attending an information meeting to learn about the expectations and challenges of AP courses. ASB's Pennies for Patients Drive recently ended and was quite successful. Next Monday, ASB will be holding elections for student leader positions. The results will be available on Thursday.

Chynna Summers – Olympic High School

Student Board Member Summers report that Olympic students went to John Muir for "Peer Partners in Environmental Education" on May 9. They presented lessons to classrooms and interacted with the younger student body. On May 10, SMPD Captain Dan Salerno, a successful graduate of Olympic High, was a guest speaker in Criminal Justice Class. He discussed the procedure when law enforcement stops someone. On May 11, 15, and 16, SRO/School Resource Officer, Carlos Jaen presented on the Juvenile Justice system as part of a PBS Frontline segment. Jonathan Mooney, poet and inspirational speaker, spoke before the whole school on May 15. He shared his challenges as a student growing up and how he overcame being labeled "less than satisfactory." On May 16, famous recording engineer "Tommy D" came to Guitar Class to record Olympic student Franklin Stevenson. Every Tuesday, the Education Foundation funds Robert Gilliam to conduct dance classes with Olympic students. The Food Truck Night fundraiser is now every Thursday.

*Ms.* Summers introduced the student board member for next year, Sean Azouley. *Mr.* Azouley said it was an honor to serve.

#### B. SMMCTA Update – Harry Keiley (5) – no report

C. S.E.I.U. Update – Ms. Keryl Cartee-McNeely (5)

Ms. Cartee-McNeely reported that SEIU continues efforts to fight for a fair economy for all working families. The international convention will focus on rebuilding a fair economy across the nation. SEIU sent members to Sacramento to participate in a week-long campaign, speaking directly to legislators and sharing their personal stories of the work and services they provide to students on a daily basis. SEIU (Local 99) will keep the pressure on Sacramento to ensure child care services remain intact in SMMUSD and throughout the state. SEIU has elected its Executive Board, which seats July 1, 2012. Ms. Cartee-McNeely was re-elected to the Executive Board for the next three years. SEIU has met with district leadership regarding the Interest-Based Bargaining techniques for upcoming negotiations. On June 12. SEIU reps will attend a meeting with the Superintendent and others to discuss the next steps for an independent analysis of an SMUSD and MUSD. While SEIU believes it is important to explore a Malibu Unification, it does not think this is the right time. The union has met with senior staff regarding classified lavoffs and feels the lavoffs are based on student enrollment. not taking into account the specific student needs at individual school sites. SEIU will continue to negotiate the impact of the ten FTE reductions listed under Item No. A.29. Ma.Cartee-McNeely thanked the board for adopting a resolution tonight recognizing the Week of the Classified Employee. She also thanked Mr. Allen and Mr. Mechur for participating in the SEIU Classified Employees' Recognition Luncheon on May 12.

She commended the Samohi house principals, dean, and other staff who arranged for early dismissal of students, communication with parents, and the continuation of standardized tests on naturally-lit parts of campus. Ms. Lyon said she attended the eighth grade exit interviews at MMS and was impressed with the students. She congratulated Ms. Silvestri, a teacher at Samohi, who was elected as one of twenty-five National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Scholars to attend the Summer Institute of African American Political History: From Reconstruction to the Present in Chicago. Ms. Lyon also congratulated five Samohi students who will be receiving their Eagle Scout rank on June 3. She summarized what Boy Scouts must accomplish prior to earing the rank of Eagle Scout. Ms. Lyon announced that Dr. Gates and Chynna Summers from Olympic High School were featured in the Lookout News. The third District Leadership Team meeting was held this week. Next week is Week of the Classified Employee, and thanks to the Food and Nutrition Services Department, cookies will be delivered to all the sites for support staff to enjoy. COMMENTS: Division of the State Architect (DSA) Testing and Special Inspection Services are required by code to ensure that school facilities are built from the DSA-approved plans and specifications. District staff requested a proposal from MTGL, Inc. to provide additional Testing and Special Inspection Services for the McKinley Elementary School Entry & Main Office Reconfiguration Project, DSA Application No. 03-113674.

The original proposal for services (CA #6, for \$5,650) was based on a preliminary project schedule, specifications and a mandatory site walk that projected about 50 hours for special testing and inspections. Once the contract for construction was awarded, the construction duration required construction in two phases to allow for early occupancy of the main office. These resulted in additional 50 hours for inspection. In addition, during the project construction, multiple unforeseen conditions required additional inspections. These resulted in additional 166 hours. Of the 166 hours, 72.50 hours will be back-charged to the general contractor for cancelled inspections due to uncompleted work.

Approval of Contract Amendment #10 in the amount of \$21,240.00 would result in a total contract amount of \$276,034. This is for a total addition of 216 hours to the inspection.

COMMENTS: An increase of \$150,000 in the project budget for the McKinley Elementary School Entry and Main Office Reconfiguration Project is needed to accommodate several unforeseen construction impacts and documents and related professional fees associated to the additional scope.

COMMENTS: Converse is providing Geotechnical Observation and Testing Services for the John Adams Middle School - Replacement of Classroom Buildings E, F & G, New Administration, Modernization and Site Improvements Project (Package 2B). Contract amendment #9 was approved on April 6, 2011 for an amount for \$17,171.00 for this scope. This contract award was based on preliminary construction schedule. Construction contract was awarded in July 20, 2011 for the project. Following this award, contractor provided District with detailed construction schedule that indicated specifically the schedule for soil sampling and testing as it relates to the various grading activities and installation of earth tubes. This extended schedule has resulted in additional hours for testing.

> Furthermore, during the course of the excavation and grading activities, additional contaminated soils were discovered which considerably increased the total amount of soils that required inspection, testing, remediation and disposal. Additionally soil moisture at various locations on site was excessively high and this required several attempts at re-compaction to establish a firm bottom. These unforeseen conditions have resulted in additional scope for the project which necessitated additional soils observation, inspection and testing.

> These additional testing has resulted in a total add of \$59,583.00. Of this amount, \$40,998 is for unforeseen conditions. As this scope was not part of original project scope, these funds will be drawn upon by adjustments to program reserve. A budget adjustment for the project will be presented to the Board of Education at a later Board meeting once all costs including change orders to the contractor for unforeseen underground conditions are reviewed and negotiated. To ensure prompt payment to the consultant and to allow no interruption to required testing, we recommend that the Board of Education approve this amendment. The revised contract total will be \$199,555.

COMMENTS: Senate Bill 293 (Chapter 700, Statutes of 2011) added Section 7201 to the Public Contract Code stating that the contract payment retention amount withheld by any public agency from the contractor shall not exceed five (5) percent. Districts may retain an amount greater than five (5) percent by defining that the project is substantially complex.

Defining a project as substantially complex requires approval from the Board of Education.

The Lincoln Middle School Classroom Building C, Modernization and Site Improvements Project is an approximately 33,000 square feet, two-story building that will house the new library, chorus room, six standard classrooms, and two science labs. The project scope also includes upgrades to existing fire alarm system campus wide and site improvements at main entry, courtyard, and parking areas. The construction is a combination of poured in place concrete, footings, structural steel, and concrete over high shear decking. The exterior skin is a combination of cement plaster, perforated aluminum panels, metal wall panels, and aluminum curtain wall system. Additionally, the new two-story construction is adjacent to existing two-story classroom building and also ties into existing buildings. The majority of the construction will happen when the school site is occupied.

# **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.28**

It is recommended that the Board of Education revise BP 5145.9 and adopt AR and Exhibit 5145.9 – Hate Motivated Behavior and Administrative Regulations

<u>COMMENTS</u>: The Hate Motivated Behavior policy has been revised and updated to include a definition of Hate Motivated Behavior and to establish administrative regulations for this policy. The policy revisions and AR were developed in conjunction with district staff, Health and Safety District Advisory Ad Hoc Committee members, members of the community, and SMMUSD Risk Manager.

These changes came forward for board discussion on March 15 (Item No. D.02).

The Administrative Regulations specifies the types of conduct that would constitute hate motivated and how hate motivated behavior should be determined by staff. It also specifies the following:

- How a student subjected or witnessing this behavior should report to staff
- Elements of an investigation
- Notification of the parents and guardian
- Disciplinary Measures
- Support for Students
- Training of staff and students
- Reporting to District Office and Risk Manager
- District Record Keeping
- Reporting to the Board of Education on a quarterly basis
- Consequences for staff have been removed and will be considered for a staff-related policy

#### Public Comments:

• Reuben Branfman, Trudie Goodwin, Gina Frazier, Janet McKeithen, and Sherri Walker addressed the board regarding this item.

Ms. Freedman said the section regarding employees would be addressed in the Complaints Against Employees process and the Sexual Harassment Policy. Ms. Washington explained the process for investigating a complaint against an employee as well as staff training on appropriate vs. inappropriate behavior. Mr. Patel suggested postponing this item until additional language could be discussed when the alleged aggressor is an adult. Dr. Escarce suggested adding language about the creation of a hostile environment. Ms. Lyon said staff and administrators will work on further revisions to this BP and AR. She emphasized the need for policies to be in alignment and warned against cumbersome policies that can lead to administrators missing a step in the process. This item was postponed.

# HATE-MOTIVATED BEHAVIOR

The Board of Education affirms the right of every student to be protected from hate-motivated behavior. It is the intent of the Board to promote harmonious relationships that enable students to gain a true understanding of the civil rights and social responsibilities of people in our society. Behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of his/her race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, gender, sexual orientation, physical/mental attributes, religious beliefs or practices shall not be tolerated.

## **Definition of Hate Motivated Behavior**

Hate motivated behavior is an act, or attempted act, motivated by hostility toward a victim's actual or perceived race, ethnicity, national origin, immigrant status, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, age, disability, or any physical or cultural characteristics.(California Ed. Code Section 200.3 and section 422.55 of the California Penal Code.)

Hate-motivated incidents include those actions that are motivated by bias, but do not meet the necessary elements required to prove a crime. This may include such behavior as non-threatening name-calling, using racial slurs or disseminating racist leaflets.

Any student who feels that he/she is a victim of hate-motivated behavior shall immediately contact the principal or designee. If the student believes that the situation has not been remedied by the principal or designee, he/she may file a complaint in accordance with district complaint procedures.

Staff who receive notice of hate-motivated behavior or personally observe such behavior shall <u>immediately</u> notify the principal, Superintendent or designee, and law enforcement, as appropriate. Students demonstrating hate-motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

In addition, the district shall provide counseling and appropriate <u>sensitivity</u> <u>anti-bias</u> training and diversity education for students exhibiting hate-motivated behavior. The district shall also provide counseling, guidance and support, as necessary, to those students who are the victims of hate-motivated behavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff receive appropriate training to recognize hate-motivated behavior and methods for handling such behavior in appropriate ways.

The district shall provide age-appropriate instruction to help promote understanding of and respect for human rights.

Each school will adopt a Student Code of Conduct to be followed by every student at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities.

At the beginning of each school year, students and staff shall receive a copy of the district's policy on hate-motivated behavior. <u>Additionally, Principals or designee shall visit each student's classroom at the beginning of each school year to discuss consequences of violating this policy.</u>

The district shall develop and implement guidelines designed to raise the awareness and sensitivity of teachers, administrators, and school employees to potentially prejudicial and discriminatory behavior and to encourage the participation of these groups in these programs.

Each teacher shall create and foster an environment that encourages pupils to realize their full potential and that is free from discriminatory attitudes, practices, events, or activities, in order to prevent acts of hate-motivated behavior.

# HATE MOTIVATED BEHAVIOR

The Board of Education is committed to maintaining an educational environment that is free from harassment and discrimination of any kind.

## **Definition of Hate Motivated Behavior**

Hate motivated behavior is an act, or attempted act, motivated by hostility toward a victim's actual or perceived race, ethnicity, national origin, immigrant status, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, age, disability, or any physical or cultural characteristics.(California Ed. Code Section 200.3 and section 422.55 of the California Penal Code.)

Hate-motivated incidents include those actions that are motivated by bias, but do not meet the necessary elements required to prove a crime.

Types of conduct which are prohibited in the district and which may constitute hate motivated behavior targeted toward a victim's actual or perceived race, ethnicity, national origin, immigrant status, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, age, disability, or any physical or cultural characteristics include, but are not limited to:

- 1. <u>Graffiti containing offensive language</u>
- 2. <u>Threatening or intimidating conduct</u>
- 3. Jokes, teasing, rumors or name calling
- 4. <u>Slurs, negative stereotyping, and other hostile acts</u>
- 5. <u>Graphic material containing comments or stereotypes which is posted or circulated and</u> which is aimed at degrading the target
- 6. <u>A physical act of aggression or assault</u>
- 7. <u>Threatening phone calls, hate mail, cyber or other electronic communication</u>
- 8. <u>Vandalism or destruction of religious symbols or images</u>
- 9. Other kinds of aggressive conduct such as theft or damage to property.

The determination of hate motivated behavior should be made when the behavior is judged by a reasonable person of the same protected group as the target to be sufficiently severe or pervasive to have a negative impact on the student's academic environment.

#### Investigation of Complaints Regarding Hate Motivated Behavior by Another Student

- 1. Notice and Receipt of Complaint: Any student, parent/guardian, or staff who believes a student has been subjected to hate motivated behavior or who has witnessed hate motivated behavior shall report to the school principal or designee immediately. Reports may be either oral or written. The school shall assist the student in the writing of the complaint if necessary.
- 2. <u>Initiation of Investigation: Principal or designee shall initiate an investigation of an</u> <u>allegation of hate motivated behavior within five school days of receiving notice of the</u> <u>incident, regardless of whether an informal or formal complaint has been filed.</u>

The investigation at the school site shall include interviewing:

- <u>The student who is complaining</u>
- <u>The person accused of harassment</u>
- Anyone who witnessed the conduct complained of
- Anyone mentioned as having related information

Factors to consider may include, but not limited to the following:

- Nature and scope of the incident
- Impact on the target
- Impact on members of the target's group
- Age of the target
- Age of the perpetrator
- <u>Context in which the incident occurred</u>

The complainant or the target shall not be required or asked to meet with the alleged harasser or person suspected of hate motivated behavior. Principal or designee shall activate the school Threat Assessment Team to determine the level of threat posed to the target and need for safety supports. The school shall notify the parents/guardians of the following: the target/s, the student/s who made the report and the alleged perpetrator/s of the incident.

3. <u>Reporting: The Principal or designee shall file an Incident Report to be submitted to the Risk Manager.</u>

The principal or designee shall give the Director of Student Services a written report of the complaint and investigation. If the Principal or designee determines that hate motivated behavior has occurred, this report shall describe the actions taken to end the behavior including appropriate disciplinary action, addressing the effects of the behavior on the target, and preventing retaliation or further incidents.

# **Disciplinary Measures**

Any student who engages in hate motivated behavior toward anyone at school or at a schoolsponsored or school-related activity is in violation of this policy and shall be subject to disciplinary action.

Students in grades 4-12 who engage in hate motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline including, but not limited to requiring a behavior contract, counseling, community service, suspension, expulsion, transfer to another school, transfer to an alternative program, or denial of participation in extracurricular or co-curricular activities in accordance with Board Policy and administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate. Any employee who engages in hate motivated behavior is in violation of this policy and shall be subject to disciplinary measures including but not limited to suspension, transfer to alternative job location, participation in counseling program, termination of employment.

# Support for Students

The Superintendent or designee shall take appropriate actions to provide support for students who have been subjected to or witnessed an act of hate motivated behavior.

- 1. <u>The Principal or designee will make it clear to the affected student(s) and the</u> parents/guardians that any form of retaliation or mistreatment of a student who complained will not be tolerated.
- 2. In instances where there were substantiated findings that a student was subjected to hate motivated behavior by a district employee or volunteer, the district will offer, and upon the request of the parent/guardian, will assist the student in receiving counseling intervention support.
- 3. <u>The principal or designee shall also assist the target in receiving counseling</u> <u>intervention support and advise the target and the parent/guardian of any other</u> <u>resources and supports that may be available.</u>

# Information and Training

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all staff receive training and all district students receive age-appropriate instruction and information on following regarding hate motivated behavior as follows:

- 1. Acts and behavior which constitute hate motivated behavior;
- 2. <u>Encouragement for those subject to, and witnesses of, hate motivated behavior to report</u> incidents immediately, and assurance that they will be protected from retaliation.
- 3. <u>Name(s) or title(s) of the person(s) to whom hate motivated behavior should be reported.</u>

# **Notifications**

A copy of the district's hate motivated behavior policy and regulation shall:

- 1. <u>Be summarized in the notifications that are sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year (Education Code 48980; 5 CCR 4917)</u>
- 2. <u>Appear in any school or district publication that sets forth the school's or district's</u> <u>comprehensive rules, regulations, procedures, and standards of conduct (Education</u> <u>Code 231.5)</u>
- 3. <u>Be summarized in the student handbook</u>
- 4. <u>Be provided to employees and employee organizations</u>

# <u>Record Keeping</u>

All reports will be forwarded to the Director of Student Services for record keeping. **Records** shall be maintained in Student Services for five years.

Each quarter (October, January, April, and June), the Superintendent shall inform the public via an Information Item in the Board Agenda regarding the number of reported student hate motivated behavior incidents for the prior quarter, with total number of reported cases by sites with those found to be violations of the policy and their respective resolutions.

## RE: CLASSIFIED LAYOFFS / REDUCTION IN HOURS

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.29**

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the Classified Layoffs/Reduction in Hours indicated below, and instruct staff to proceed with lay-off procedures.

COMMENT: At the February 18, 2012, Budget Study Session, the Board of Education first received staff recommendations for reductions in both certificated and classified staffing. As a result, the district has already implemented reductions in certificated and administrative staffing.

The district is now focused on reductions in the classified work force due to lack of funds. The process for considering this layoff begins with notice to SEIU followed by Board action to reduce classified staffing.

Per Article 30.1.1. of the collective bargaining agreement, staff presented 45-day notice of possible reductions in Classified FTEs to SEIU-Local 99 on March 29, 2012. Within the 45-day period, discussions were held with members of the SEIU executive board. Following approval by the Board of Education, impacted employees will receive 45-day notice of Layoff/Reduction in Hours and the option to exercise displacement (bumping) rights, if available.

#### RE: RECOMMENDATION FROM BOARD SUBCOMMITTEE OF APPOINTMENTS TO FILL VACANCIES ON THE FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE (FOC)

#### **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.30**

After conducting a thorough application review and interview process, the Board subcommittee unanimously recommends that the Board of Education approve the appointments of Daniel McGee, Cynthia Torres, and David Vukadinovich to fill vacancies on the Financial Oversight Committee (FOC).

COMMENT: At the March 1, 2012, Board meeting, the Board voted to appoint a subcommittee comprised of Jose Escarce, Laurie Lieberman, and Nimish Patel (the current board liaisons to the FOC) to conduct interviews and make recommendations to the Board with respect to the three seats on the FOC wherein the terms of seated members expired on December 31, 2011. This recommendation represents the outcome of the subcommittee's process.

Prior to appointment of the Board subcommittee, the FOC's ad hoc Nominating Subcommittee had independently reviewed and ranked the twelve applications that had been received in response to the District's press release notifying the public of the impending vacancies. The FOC subcommittee had recommended re-appointment of the three sitting FOC members who were seeking reappointment.

Subsequent to appointment of the Board subcommittee, Joan Chu Reese, one of the applicants for re-appointment to the FOC, submitted her resignation and withdrew her application, which the Board subcommittee deeply regrets. The Board subcommittee interviewed five applicants, two of whom are sitting members of the FOC (since Ms. Chu Reese had withdrawn). The Board subcommittee is unanimous in its recommendation that the Board appoint Daniel McGee, Cynthia Torres, and David Vukadinovich to terms ending December 31, 2014.

#### RE: MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES UPDATE

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

Staff will update the Board of Education regarding changes in the provision of mental health services to students with IEPs in the absence of AB 3632. As of June 30, 2012, the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (LACDMH) will no longer be providing these services. Staff will explain how the Tri-City SELPA will be providing mental health services beginning July 1, 2012.

### BACKGROUND:

In 1984, the California State Legislature passed AB 3632 mandating that county Departments of Mental Health (DMH) work with school districts to provide services to students with IEPs who require mental health services. Specifically, AB 3632 provides for:

- Case management of students placed in residential treatment centers
- Payment of residential and therapeutic treatment cost of residentially placed students
- Provision of outpatient mental health services to students and their families
- Attendance at IEP meetings for students eligible for DMH services

In October 2010, outgoing Governor Schwarzenegger eliminated both the mandate and the funding for AB 3632. In November 2010, the California Department of Education approved the release to County Offices of Education \$76 million of federal funds for the short-term continuation of AB 3632 services. These funds were exhausted in mid-January 2011. Los Angeles County DMH agreed to continue to provide and pay for services through January 2011. Since school districts are "payers of last resort" for educational services, SMMUSD was required to begin paying for IEP-based mental health services effective February 1, 2011.

On June 30, 2011, Assembly Bill 114, Statute 2011, was signed into law. Under AB 114, several sections of Chapters 26.5 of the California Government Code were amended or rendered inoperative, thereby ending the state mandate on county mental health agencies to provide mental health services to students with disabilities. LACDMH received an increase in funds for 2011-12 to provide mental health services during this transitional school year. The Tri-City SELPA also received additional funds to provide these services. On October 6, 2012, the SMMUSD Board of Education approved a Memorandum of Understanding with LACDMH stating that DMH funding would be used until it was completely expended. Meanwhile, the Tri-City SELPA would develop and fund a program to provide the services when LACDMH no longer has funding.

Dr. Escarce asked about students who require mental health services, but are not covered under the new model. Dr. Woolverton said the SELPA will be able to provide information about agencies to families who need these services. Dr. Woolverton summarized the SELPA staffing plan. Mr. Mechur asked about funding under the new plan. Dr. Jeanne Davis from the SELPA spoke with Assemblywoman Brownley regarding the plan, which funds based on ADA, and stressed the need to also consider funding on a needs basis.

Ms. Lyon said the superintendents on the SELPA Advisory Council meet monthly to oversee the SELPA and are working with the directors to plan for the change in service, which will involve the creation of a day treatment center that serves SELPA students.

#### RE: AVID PROGRAM UPDATE

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

This report presents information about the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) programs in SMMUSD schools. In SMMUSD, AVID is currently offered at John Adams and Lincoln Middle Schools and Santa Monica High School.

COMMENT: AVID is a highly regarded secondary college-preparatory program created for low-income, underserved students. It is designed to prepare first generation college-going students for eligibility for admission to a four-year university. It is estimated that the program reaches more than 250,000 students in approximately 3,500 U.S. schools in 45 states. AVID is also implemented in Canada, and 15 other countries.

## RE: UPDATE ON SERVICES FOR ENGLISH LEARNERS / MASTER PLAN

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.03

This report presents information about the District's programs and services for English Learners (EL) in grades K-12. It also includes an update on the District's Master Plan for English Learners.

COMMENTS: There are currently 1,032 SMMUSD students in grades K-12 classified as English Learners. In compliance with state and federal statutes, this is a significant subgroup that requires specific programs and services to meet their academic and linguistic needs. According to CA Ed Code:

> EL 12: Each English learner receives a program of instruction in English Language Development in order to develop proficiency in English as rapidly and effectively as possible.

EL 13: Academic instruction for English learners is designed and implemented to ensure that they meet the district's content and performance standards for their respective grade levels in a reasonable amount of time.

The programs and services that SMMUSD has designed and implemented are intended to provide English Learners with the core and supplementary supports needed and to fulfill the state mandates.

Dr. Escarce asked about reading support for students who do not qualify for EL services but still require intervention. Ms. Diaz replied that there were literacy support classes in place. She also answered questions about supports for students at different levels of English verbal and literacy skills. Dr. Escarce asked how long the students profiled in the graduation cohort had been in the district. Ms. Diaz said she would look into how the students are profiled and their identity.

RE: CONSIDER REPLACING BP 5111 – ADMISSION

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider replacing BP 5111 – Admission.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this policy update to make the timeline for students to enroll in the school in their attendance area consistent with the timeline for intradistrict open enrollment established pursuant to BP/AR 5116.1 – Intradistrict Open Enrollment. The policy also reflects new federal guidance clarifying that districts may not adopt enrollment procedures based on the actual or perceived citizenship or immigration status of students or their parents/guardians.

The revised policy is attached. (Changes to the administrative regulation can be found under Item No. I.01.)

To improve the organization of the policy language, Dr. Escarce suggested moving the fourth paragraph to follow the first. This item will return for action at the June 7, 2012, meeting.

## ADMISSION

The Governing Board encourages the enrollment and appropriate placement of all school-aged children in school. The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of students entering a district school at any grade level about admission requirements and shall assist them with enrollment procedures.

The Superintendent or designee shall verify the student's age, residency, and any other admission criteria specified in law and in Board policies and administrative regulations.

All resident students who are enrolling either in the school in their attendance area or in another district school shall be subject to the timelines established by the Board in BP/AR 5116.1 - Intradistrict Open Enrollment. Nonresident students may apply for interdistrict attendance in accordance with the timelines specified in applicable Board policies and administrative regulations.

The Superintendent or designee may admit to the ninth grade only those students who have graduated from eighth grade or who are recommended in writing by their eighth-grade principal as capable of profiting from high school instruction.

The Board of Education believes that all children should have the opportunity to receive educational services. Staff shall encourage parents/guardians to enroll all school-aged children in school.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures that provide for verification of all entrance requirements specified in law and in Board policies and regulations.

RE: CONSIDER REVISING BP 5131 – CONDUCT

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.05

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 5131 – Conduct.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this policy update to reflect new law (AB 9), which requires policy prohibiting discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on specified characteristics and new law (AB 1156), which encourages the inclusion of bullying prevention strategies in comprehensive safety plans. Material on prevention and intervention of bullying and cyberbullying will be included in a new BP 5131.2 – Bullying. The policy also expands item #5 to clarify that the district is not responsible for students' personal belongings brought on campus or to a school activity, and adds referral to student success team or counseling services as possible consequences for violation of school rules.

The revised policy is attached.

*Ms.* Freedman explained that this policy change was part of adopting a new policy regarding bullying (Item No. D.06), which districts must adopt by July 1, 2012. The board expressed concern about having several procedures associated with various conduct-related policies. Ms. Lyon explained that this is the reason these conduct-related policies refer to the sexual harassment administrative regulation, which is federally mandated and standardized. Staff will provide the AR regarding sexual harassment as backup information when this policy and the bullying policy return for action. The board asked staff to compare the section on cellular devices to the student use of technology policy for continuity.

This item will return for action at the June 7, 2012, meeting.

## CONDUCT

The Board of Education believes that all students have the right to be educated in a positive learning environment free from disruptions. Students shall be expected to exhibit appropriate conduct that does not infringe upon the rights of others or interfere with the school program while on school grounds, while going to or coming from school, while at school activities, and while on district transportation.

Conduct is considered appropriate when students are diligent in study, careful with school property, courteous, and respectful toward their teachers, other staff, students, and volunteers.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school site develops standards of conduct and discipline consistent with district policies and administrative regulations. Students and parents/guardians shall be notified of district and school rules related to conduct.

Prohibited student conduct includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Conduct that endangers students, staff, or others <u>including</u>, <u>but not limited to</u>, <u>physical</u> <u>violence</u>, <u>possession of a firearm or other weapon</u>, <u>and terrorist threats</u>
- 2. Conduct that disrupts the orderly classroom or school environment
- 3. <u>Discrimination</u>, Hharassment, intimidation, or bullying of students or staff, such as bullying, including sexual harassment, hate motivated behavior, cyberbullying, intimidation, hazing or initiation activity, ridicule, extortion, or any other verbal, written, or physical conduct that causes or threatens to cause violence, bodily harm, or emotional suffering, or substantial disruption. in accordance with the section entitled "Bullying/Cyberbullying" below

"Cyberbullying" includes the transmission of communications, posting of harassing messages, direct threats, social cruelty, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social networking sites, or other digital technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation or friendships.

- 4. <u>Willful defiance of staff's authority</u>
- 4 <u>5</u>. Damage to or theft of property belonging to students, staff, or the district

The district shall not be responsible for students' personal belongings which are brought on campus or to a school activity and are lost, stolen, or damaged.

5. Possession or use of a laser pointer, unless used for a valid instructional or other schoolrelated purpose, including employment

Prior to bringing a laser pointer on school premises <u>for a valid instructional or school-</u> <u>related purpose</u>, students shall first obtain permission from the principal or designee. The principal or designee shall determine whether the requested use of the laser pointer is for a valid instructional or other school-related purpose.

#### 6. Use of profane, vulgar, or abusive language

- 7. Plagiarism or dishonesty in school work or on tests
- 8. Inappropriate attire
- 9. Tardiness or unexcused absence from school
- 10. Failure to remain on school premises in accordance with school rules
- 11. Possession, use, or being under the influence of tobacco, alcohol, or other prohibited drugs drug in violation of school rules

Employees are expected to provide appropriate supervision to enforce standards of conduct and, if they observe or receive a report of a violation of these standards, to immediately intervene or call for assistance. If an employee believes a matter has not been resolved, he/she shall refer the matter to his/her supervisor or administrator for further investigation.

When a school official suspects that a search of a student or his/her belongings will turn up evidence of the student's violation of the law or school rules, such a search shall be conducted in accordance with BP/AR 5145.12 - Search and Seizure.

When a student uses any prohibited device, or uses a permitted device in any unethical or illegal activity, a district employee may confiscate the device. The employee shall store the item in a secure manner until an appropriate time.

Students who violate district or school rules and regulations may be subject to discipline including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion, transfer to alternative programs, <u>referral to a student success team or counseling services</u>, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

Students also may be subject to discipline for any off-campus conduct during nonschool hours which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or district property, or substantially disrupts the educational program of the district or any other district in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation.

## Possession/Use of Cellular Phones and Other Mobile Communications Devices

The Board recognizes that beepers, pagers, cellular phones and other electronic signaling devices have become commonplace in our community and that many families have come to rely on these devices as a means of communication.

Nevertheless, with two exceptions Education Code specifically prohibits the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device that operates through the transmission or receipt of radio waves, including, but not limited to, paging and signaling equipment, by pupils of the school while the pupils are on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of school district employees. The exceptions to this provision, which would allow students to possess and use such devices on campus, are cases in which a student or students have:

- 1. Prior consent of the principal or his/her designee, or
- 2. Written documentation by a licensed physician or surgeon who has determined that student possession and use of an electronic signaling device is essential for the health of the pupil and where use of such device is limited for purposes related to the health of

the student.

3. Written and/or verbal confirmation from the site Superintendent or designee that a state of emergency exists.

While electronic signaling devices of all types may be useful for communication purposes, the Board also recognizes the potential for distraction that these devices may cause in the classroom, on campus and at school activities. The Superintendent shall therefore establish procedures whereby the possession of electronic signaling devices in grades 9 through 12 is permitted, but use of such devices is restricted only to non-school hours. Under no circumstances shall the possession and/or use of any electronic signaling device be permitted on any school bus or at any time, if such possession and/or use is disruptive to the educational process.

Students who do possess an electronic signaling device under the terms of this policy, must either keep their device turned off while on school campus and during school activities.

The district and/or staff shall not be responsible or liable for the theft or loss of any electronic signaling device.

Students in grades K through 8 are not permitted to possess and/or use any electronic signaling device while on school campus unless the students meets one or both of the exceptions listed in the Education Code.

Students shall not use mobile communications devices, even in hands-free mode, while driving on school grounds or to or from a school-related activity.

A student who violates this policy may be prohibited from possessing a mobile communications device at school or school-related events and/or may be subject to further discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

#### **Bullying/Cyberbullying**

The Board desires to prevent bullying by establishing a positive, collaborative school climate and clear rules for student conduct.

The district may provide students instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes communication, social skills, and assertiveness skills and educates students about appropriate online behavior and strategies to prevent and respond to bullying and cyberbullying. This instruction may involve parents/guardians, staff, and community members.

School staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies. Parents/guardians and students also may be provided with similar information.

Students may submit a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying to a teacher or administrator and may also request that their name be kept in confidence. The Superintendent or designee may establish other processes for students to submit anonymous reports of bullying. Complaints of bullying or harassment shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

When a student is suspected of or reported to be using electronic or digital communications to engage in cyberbullying against other students or staff or to threaten district property, the investigation shall include documentation of the activity, identification of the source, and a determination of the impact or potential impact on school activity or school attendance. Students

shall be encouraged to save and print any messages sent to them that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated.

Any student who engages in cyberbullying using district-owned equipment, on school premises, or off-campus in a manner that impacts a school activity or school attendance shall be subject to discipline in accordance with district policies and regulations. If the student is using a social networking site or service that has terms of use that prohibit posting of harmful material, the Superintendent or designee also may file a complaint with the Internet site or service to have the material removed. (Board Policy 5131.2 – Bullying)

RE: CONSIDER REVISING BP 5131.2 – BULLYING

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.06

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP 5131.2 – Bullying.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this new policy to reflect new law (AB 9), which requires a policy prohibiting discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying based on specified characteristics, new law (AB 1156), which encourages the inclusion of bullying prevention strategies in comprehensive safety plans, and new law (AB 746), which expands the definition of bullying committed by means of an electronic act to include posting of messages on social media networks. The policy also expands topics for related student education, adds strategies for supervision and security, and adds language re: reporting of incidents. This new policy contains material formerly in BP 5131 – Conduct regarding strategies for prevention and intervention of bullying.

The new policy is attached.

## **BULLYING**

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student learning and school attendance and desires to provide safe school environments that protect students from physical and emotional harm. District employees shall establish student safety as a high priority and shall not tolerate bullying of any student.

No student or group of students shall, through physical, written, verbal, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel.

<u>Cyberbullying includes the transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other</u> harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

Strategies for bullying prevention and intervention shall be developed with involvement of key stakeholders in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation governing the development of comprehensive safety plans and shall be incorporated into such plans.

## **Bullying Prevention**

To the extent possible, district and school strategies shall focus on prevention of bullying by establishing clear rules for student conduct and strategies to establish a positive, collaborative school climate. Students shall be informed, through student handbooks and other appropriate means, of district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for perpetrators of bullying.

The district may provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes effective communication and conflict resolution skills, social skills, character/values education, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

School staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies.

Based on an assessment of bullying incidents at school, the Superintendent or designee may increase supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, cafeterias.

## **Intervention**

Students are encouraged to notify school staff when they are being bullied or suspect that another student is being victimized. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall develop means for students to report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously.

School staff who witness bullying shall immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so. (Education Code 234.1)

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of victims and perpetrators. He/she also may involve school counselors, mental health counselors, and/or law enforcement.

## **Complaints and Investigation**

<u>Students may submit to a teacher or administrator a verbal or written complaint of conduct they</u> consider to be bullying. Complaints of bullying shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

When a student is reported to be engaging in bullying off campus, the Superintendent or designee shall investigate and document the activity and shall identify specific facts or circumstances that explain the impact or potential impact on school activity, school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages sent to them that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated.

If the student is using a social networking site or service that has terms of use that prohibit posting of harmful material, the Superintendent or designee also may file a complaint with the Internet site or service to have the material removed.

## **Discipline**

Any student who engages in bullying on school premises, or off campus in a manner that causes or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline, which may include suspension or expulsion, in accordance with district policies and regulations.

## RE: POTENTIAL CHANGES TO BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING STRUCTURE AND TIMING

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.08

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising its regular meeting structure to improve upon discussion/presentation timing. If approved, these changes could go into effect July 1, 2012. The superintendent's office would conduct an extensive outreach campaign to inform district staff and the community of these changes.

In the **current structure**, a regular Board of Education meeting begins in closed session at 4:30pm, and then moves to open session at 6:00pm. Discussion items and presentations are the last items to come before the board, requiring non-senior cabinet staff as well as parents/ students involved in a presentation to stay late into the evening. Additionally, board members are often asked to consider/analyze information that is core to the district's mission at late hours.

In order to allow board members to hear presentations at an earlier hour, and also to allow nonsenior cabinet staff an opportunity to go home at a reasonable time and prepare for the next work day, new board meeting structure and timing scenarios have been developed for review and input by board members.

In **Proposed Structure 1**, each meeting would begin in open session with roll call, the Pledge of Allegiance, approval of the agenda and previous meeting minutes, and then there would be a study session. Study session items would not require board action and could include, for example, the following topics:

- Annual Reports/Updates (e.g. Enrollment and Staffing [following the beginning weeks of school], Health Services, Student Achievement Data, Intensive Intervention Summer School, AVID Program, Head Start Training/Presentation, Response to Invention Framework, etc.)
- Measure BB Project Updates
- Budget Planning Discussions

Study sessions could also include items on which the board would eventually take action, but which require discussion prior to board action. Such items could include:

- Policy Updates
- Measure BB Project Updates
- Budget Planning Discussions

**Proposed Structure 2** is identical to Proposal Structure 1, except the order of Major Items and Discussion Items has flipped. This proposed structure would further ensure that discussion items and presentations are heard by the Board of Education at a reasonable hour.

**INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01** 

This is to inform the Board of Education that a revision has been made to AR 5111 – Admission.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this regulation update to reflect new law (SB 1381, 2010), which revises the age criterion for admission into kindergarten or first grade, moving up the birthdate that triggers enrollment eligibility one month each year between 2012-13 and 2014-15. Material regarding prekindergarten summer program deleted since the program was eliminated pursuant to SB 1381.

The revised regulation is attached. (Suggested changes to the policy can be found under Item No. D.04.)

The words, "...and board policy," from the second full paragraph shall be removed.

## ADMISSION

## Age of Admittance to Grades K-1

A child shall be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten or first grade, at the beginning of the school year or at a later time in the same year, if the child has his/her fifth or sixth birthday, respectively, on or before one of the following dates: (Education Code 48000, 48010)

- 1. December 2 of the 2011-12 school year
- 2. November 1 of the 2012-13 school year
- 3. October 1 of the 2013-14 school year

4. September 1 of the 2014-15 school year and each school year thereafter

Any child who will have his/her fifth birthday between the date listed above for the applicable school year and December 2 shall be offered a transitional kindergarten program in accordance with law and board policy. (Education Code 48000)

## **Documentation of Age/Grade**

Evidence of the child's age may include: (Education Code 48002)

- 1. A certified copy of a birth certificate or a statement by the local registrar or county recorder certifying the date of birth
- 2. A duly attested baptism certificate
- 3. Passport

When none of the foregoing is obtainable, the parent/guardian may provide any other appropriate means of proving the age of the child. (Education Code 48002)

A student enrolling in a district school at any other grade level shall present records from his/her previous school district documenting his/her age and current grade level.

#### Age of Admission

Proof of age shall be required of all enrolling students. The legal evidences of age, in order of desirability, are a birth certificate, baptismal certificate, passport, immigration certificate, Bible record, or affidavit from the parent/guardian.

A child who will reach the age of five on or before December 2 of the school year shall be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten at the beginning of that school year or at any later time in the same year. (Education Code 48000)

A child who will reach the age of five on or before December 2 of the school year shall be eligible for enrollment in the district pre-kindergarten summer program. (Education Code 48000)

A child who will have reached the age of six years on or before December 2 of the current school year shall be eligible for enrollment in the first grade. (Education Code 48010)

#### Roosevelt Elementary School PTA Board Presentation – 5/17/12 Submitted by Gerda Newbold, PTSA President

Roosevelt Elementary School has many things of which to be proud and to appreciate. One of the most important is the quality and commitment of our teachers.

The professional development of teachers has long been an important piece of Roosevelt's culture. Roosevelt has sent a couple teachers to Columbia Teacher's college for at least the past 6 years to be trained in Readers and Writers Workshop. Since then, our focus on professional learning has continued to grow. Last summer and again this summer we are sending 7 to 8 teachers to a weeklong training in NY. We are able to do this through a donation from Roosevelt's PTA and because our teachers have been able to find places to stay with friends or family. Teachers are also willing to supplement their airfare and to pay their way once they are in New York. Our teachers are using their vacation time and some of their own resources to learn to be better teachers. This commitment and this willingness to go the extra mile is consistently felt by students and parents at Roosevelt every day and in every classroom.

Roosevelt parents, teachers and administrators identify where improvement is needed and push towards making changes to accomplish our goals. A couple of years ago a group of parents, several in their first year at Roosevelt, felt that our science curriculum and Science Fair were not robust and many children were not participating. Through these parents' efforts, collaborating with teachers, providing scientific demonstrations after school, and during assemblies, they have changed the conversation at school around science. We now have about 200 children doing scientific experiments at home and sharing the their results at our Science Fair.

Our size is our biggest challenge. Roosevelt has about 825 students. The large number of students is felt by everyone everywhere, but particularly on our playground at lunch and recess. There aren't enough seats at the lunch tables, there are long lines at the tetherball courts and handball courts and the apparatus is swarming with children. Children complain of waiting in line for their entire recess and never getting a turn to play. The social dynamics are also tricky when there are so many children. It is difficult for adults to monitor negative interactions between children and children sometimes feel that there is no one to "help" them.


It is also difficult to create a sense of community for families when there are so many of us. It's difficult to keep parents informed about school events and to make all parents feel welcome. It is easy for parents to put their heads down, drop off and pick up without participating at the school. However, we know that children do better when their parents are engaged in their school communities and so we continue to work to create a cohesive community. We do this through weekly email updates of our calendar, educational seminars geared towards parents, Coffees with the Principal and low cost school community events like our Back to School Picnic, popcorn Fridays and our read-a-thon where volunteer parents, teachers and administrators, go out in teams of 3 or 4 to "catch" children in the act of reading in their homes. Many years we visit up to 500 children at home. It is a tremendous experience for both the volunteers that go out and for those at home being visited and it brings us all closer together.



    - Students are removed from the cohort when the student is appropriately given an exit code as he/she enrolls in another CA school


