Mr. Jacobson congratulated the Malibu High School seniors, many of whom are hearing back from the colleges to which they applied. Club Day was on March 12. The middle school dance was held on March 14; the DJ that performed will also be the DJ at prom. Coffee House was also held that evening, featuring many talented students. Masque will be on March 27-29, which will also feature several talented MHS students. ASB is working on finalizing amendments to its constitution. The spring pep rally is coming up. CSF students will be honored on April 3 at a breakfast, followed by a trip to Universal Studios.

Ms. Braun reported that seven SMMUSD PTA representatives are in Sacramento at the PTA Sac Safari, speaking with legislatures about educational issues. The council is engaged in emergency preparedness for two different scenarios: earthquakes and lockdowns. Gary Bradbury has been working with the PTA to determine what in-class supplies the schools have in case of a big earthquake or lockdown, and what needs to be procured. On Monday, registration for Summer Adventure will begin. Ast year, 867 students participated. This year, Summer Adventure will take place at four locations. The middle school offerings will be very engaging this year. Ms. Braun reported that while the PTA Council is happy to see the Ed Ahead

#### A. Asst. Supt., Educational Services – Dr. Terry Deloria (5)

Dr. Deloria reported that Cohort #1 attended the fourth day of PLC training this past Tuesday. At the end of the semester, teachers mat and came up with a plan and formed Student Success Teams to determine how to support students who had multiple Fs. Yesterday, Dr. Deloria and other staff attended a one-to-one computing symposium sponsored by Google and the Victor Elementary School District to hear how their district implemented the plan. Dr. Deloria reported that all of the districts present at the symposium have been grappling with Common Core, 21st Century Skills, and technology. Earlier in the month, Dr. Deloria and other staff attended an Equal Opportunities School (EOS) meeting, which was also sponsored by Google. The district will apply to participate in this program, which examines data to determine how a district can seek out students of color and other subgroups who should be in rigorous classes, but are not. On Tuesday, Dr. Deloria met with parents from Malibu Middle School regarding the new math curriculum. In honor of Cesar Chavez Day, Edison Language Academy is hosting a fundraiser special screening and Q&A session of the movie Cesar Chavez. Proceeds from the event will benefit Edison Language Academy, the dual language immersion program at Santa Monica High School and John Adams Middle School, and the Education Foundation.

C. Asst. Supt., Human Resources – Ms. Debra Moore Washington (5)

Ms. Washington reported that the district is still in negotiations with SEIU. There will be a joint communication issued before spring break to let the community know about the progress being made. The deadline for the applications for the McKinley Elementary School principalship has been extended to March 31. Interviews will be held in April after spring break. Ms. Washington reported that, starting tomorrow, there will be eight participants from SMC attending the United Black Student Unions of California conference in Culver City.

D. Superintendent – Ms. Sandra Lyon (5)

Ms. Lyon stated that the district is working on the environmental concerns daily; numerous people in the district are giving hours to this. Weekly updates have been issued to help keep staff and the community up to date. During March, the contract with Environ was approved, and Enviorn has begun reviewing historical documents, the properties themselves, and the work done to-date. All questions and comments can be submitted directly to Environ at SMMUSDEnvironmentalInput@environcorp.com. Environ will consider all input as they put together the investigation and work plans. Ms. Lyon said she is forwarding all input she receives directly to Environ. DTSC will be sending out a survey to all staff, parents, and the community to gather input. There will also be community input sessions; that information will be shared with the public once the dates are set. Ms. Lyon said the district continues to listen to the community and has asked, from the beginning, that testing occur for air, soil, and potential contaminants that have been identified in earlier testing. She reminded everyone that this process takes time; the district is working with Environ, the EPA, and DTSC. She said there must be a balance between moving forward in a timely manner and being thorough.

Plans will be coming to the board at a public meeting; once that date has been scheduled, it will be communicated to the community. Regarding how soil remediation and communication occurred, Ms. Lyon stated that board policy and procedure was followed, as it has been done throughout the state. She added that perhaps such practices need to be updated. Ms. Lyon reported that she conveved these concerns to a group of school agencies and associations last week in Sacramento. It was clear that this is not an SMMUSD issue, but a larger issue that the entire public education community needs to address. Ms. Lyon acknowledged the involvement level of the community, supporting the public's right to advocate for change. She asked the community to focus their efforts at the state and federal level, where those policies and regulations are set. She reminded everyone that the roll of public education is not to set health regulations and levels. As this process moves forward, Ms. Lyon said the district will continue to support teachers, staff, students, and the community. The district will work collaboratively and cooperatively with Environ and the regulatory agencies. Ms. Lyon said that while the issue continues to receive daily attention from the district, the technical work - testing, action plans, cleaning - is in the hands of the experts.

Description: Title I

Schools that receive Title I funding under ESEA/NCLB are subject to Program Improvement status when one or more criteria for Adequate Yearly Progress is missed for two consecutive years. When a school is in its second year or more of Program Improvement, the district must offer Supplemental Educational Services (SES) to eligible students. Eligible students are those who participate in the National School Lunch Program. SES is provided by vendors that have been approved by the State Board of Education to provide tutoring to students outside of the school day.

The district is required to set aside 20% of Title I funds to pay for SES and transportation costs associated with School Choice. Should the demand for SES and Choice exceed the 20% set aside, the district will give priority for SES to the lowest achieving eligible students.

Each vendor determines its hourly rate for services, the instructional materials used for tutoring, and the method of assessing and monitoring student progress. The state has set a maximum of \$646.50 per student for SES in our district for the 2013-14 school year.

Per ESEA/NCLB, families have the right to select the vendor of their choice. Families of eligible students at Edison, John Muir, McKinley, and Will Rogers Learning Community who did not participate in SES in the first round were notified of this second opportunity for SES through a packet of information that went home at the end of February. #### **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.10**

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve a De Minimis Settlement offer from the United States Environmental Protection Agency concerning Casmalia Disposal Site.

COMMENT:

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has been working to clean up the Casmalia Resources Hazardous Waste Management Facility in Santa Barbara County, California. The EPA is permitted to request parties responsible for the waste to pay for site cleanup. Santa Monica-Malibu Unified received a notice form the EPA regarding our disposal of a limited amount of waste at the site in question. The letter notified the District of potential liability for the costs of response actions at the site, and offered the District an opportunity to resolve its potential liability to the EPA under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA).

The EPA has already settled with the owner(s) of the site and most of the parties that sent the largest quantities of waste. The federal government also entered into a settlement with 52 major waste generators, collectively known as the Casmalia Steering Committee (CSC). The CSC has been performing work at the site since September 1996. Additional critical response actions remain to be funded. This work includes capping landfills and establishing and operating systems to collect, treat and dispose of contaminated subsurface and surface liquids. The monies from settlement with parties such as the District are being used to pay for this work. To date, EPA has settlement with approximately 1,500 potentially responsible parties that sent waste to the site.

The settlement offered by the EPA is called a de minimis settlement. The District is eligible for this type of settlement because the amount of waste we contributed was well below levels to qualify. Organizations that resolve their liability as a de minimis party are not typically required to perform site cleanup. Instead, EPA typically requires a de minimis party to enter into a settlement with the EPA, under which they pay their fair share of cleanup costs at a site. In exchange for the settlement dollars, the District receives assurance that we will not be sued by the EPA and protection from other claims.

The deadline for acceptance and payment of the settlement was March 14, 2014 in the amount \$3,257. Legal counsel was consulted and advised staff that it was in the District's best interest to approve and accept the terms as outlined by the EPA. In order to meet this deadline staff moved forward and communicated to the EPA of the District's acceptance. Payment is scheduled to arrive at the EPA, by wire transfer, on or before March 14th.

COMMENTS: During the Planning for the Measure BB projects it was established by the Board that the projects shall be designed to provide a healthy environment for students and staff. It was further established that the buildings shall be highly energy and water efficient to conserve natural and fiscal resources. To achieve these goals. on October 18, 2007, the Board adopted Resolution 07-07. Resolution 07-07 adopted the sustainability standards and principals of the Collaborative for High Performance Schools (CHPS) as a standard for design and execution of the Measure BB projects. Furthermore, the District set a goal to exceed the minimum CHPS points by 15% for all CHPS certified projects.

> CHPS is very similar to LEED in its building systems standards, credits, and procedures. However, CHPS also incorporates other standards and administrative processes tailored to educational spaces and implementation by school districts. Both CHPS and LEED require that buildings are properly commissioned. Proper commissioning is the most important process in insuring that the buildings meet the CHPS standards for efficient operation of building systems and maintaining healthy interior environments.

Commissioning has specific design phase tasks which includes multiple reviews of the design by the Commissioning Agent to verify proper system design and documentation. A detailed commissioning plan is also prepared during the design phase. Commissioning also has specific construction phase tasks which includes preconstruction coordination with contractors and field inspections during installation and oversight of the start-up and testing requirements, all of which are defined in the commissioning plan. The commissioning plan is incorporated into the construction documents to insure compliance of the contractor.

The Contract Amendment #10 for Parsons was to provide all of the design and project commissioning services for the Measure BB projects approved on March 15, 2012, for the amount of \$1,325,000. Contract Amendment #17 for Parsons on February 6, 2014, re-allocated commission to increase JAMS commissioning. Additional commissioning at Edison is required to cover the extended commissioning process. The multiple systems and refinements have caused additional testing and corrections.

The current Contract Amendment is for the allocation of funding only, no net additional service fee required. Reallocations are required as follows:

Edison Commissioning \$ 259,000.00 increased to \$ 304,000.00

Commissioning adjustments are periodically required to reflect the actual scope of work required by the commissioning process. No change in the construction scope or program occurs. This Amendment will be funded from the "Savings by Designs" rebate within the projects contingency.

### **EDUCATION FOR FOSTER YOUTH**

The Board of Education recognizes the district's obligation to ensure that foster youth have the opportunity to achieve state and district academic standards. The district shall provide such students with access to the academic resources, services, and extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to all district students.

The Board of Education recognizes that foster youth may face significant barriers to achieving academic success due to their family circumstances, disruption to their educational program, and their emotional, social, and other health needs. To enable such students to achieve state and district academic standards, the Superintendent or designee shall provide them with full access to the district's educational program and implement strategies identified as necessary for the improvement of the academic achievement of foster youth in the district's local control accountability plan (LCAP).

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that placement decisions for foster youth are based on the students' best interests as defined in law and administrative regulation. To that end, he/she shall designate a staff person as a the district liaison for foster youth to help facilitate the enrollment, placement, and transfer of foster youth.

The Superintendent or designee and district liaison shall ensure that all appropriate staff, including, but not limited to, each principal, school registrar, and attendance clerk, receive training regarding on the enrollment, placement, and rights of foster youth transfer of foster youth and other related rights.

The Board desires to provide foster youth with a safe, positive learning environment that is free from discrimination and harassment and that promotes students' self-esteem and academic achievement. The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies to build a foster youth's feeling of connectedness with his/her school, including, but not limited to, strategies that promote positive discipline and conflict resolution, the development of resiliency and interpersonal skills, and the involvement of foster parents, group home administrators, and/or other caretakers in school programs and activities.

To help ensure the maximum utilization of available funds and to support the educational needs of foster youth, the Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local agencies and officials including, but not limited to, the county placing agency, social services, probation officers, juvenile court officers, nonprofit organizations, and advocates. The Superintendent or designee shall explore the feasibility of entering into agreements with these groups to coordinate services and protect the rights of foster youth.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board on the educational outcomes of foster youth enrolled in the district including, but not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade level, and graduation rates.

At least annually and in accordance with the established timelines, the Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board on the outcomes for foster youth regarding the goals and specific actions identified in the LCAP, including, but not limited to, school attendance, student achievement test results, promotion and retention rates by grade level, graduation rates, and suspension/expulsion rates. As necessary, evaluation data shall be used to determine and recommend revisions to the LCAP for improving or increasing services for foster youth.

### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

DecisionInsite provides enrollment projections to the Board of Education at the beginning of each calendar year. District staff then apply staffing ratios to these projections and derive an FTE allocation for each school.

This year staffing will be based on the moderate vs. the conservative calculation, and will reflect the new staffing formula. By plugging these factors into the staffing calculator, the Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) is generated for each grade level at each school. These baseline FTEs are augmented by additional staffing the district provides to support programs such as AVID, STEM, department chairmanships and small school supplements.

At the board meeting, staff will present historical enrollment information and preliminary staffing data. The Human Resources Department will soon begin visits to each school site to obtain principals' projections on student enrollment. These numbers will be combined with previous-year trend data and DecisionInsite projections to populate the second edition of the staffing chart to be distributed to principals in April.

Ms. Leon-Vazquez urged staff to recruit new applicants in non-traditional methods. Ms. Washington listed the various non-traditional sources the district has reached out to for the various positions as well as for candidate pools.

### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.02

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider replacing AR 3543 – Transportation Safety and Emergencies.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends updating this regulation to reflect new law (AB 1536), which allows the use of voice-operated and hands-free electronic wireless

communications devices for text-based communications while driving a motor vehicle, including a school bus or student activity bus. The regulation has also been expanded to reflect existing law related to daily safety inspections of buses, bus driver's obligation to report accidents, and placement of fire extinguishers in

wheelchair school buses.

This AR will return as an information item on the April 3, 2014, agenda.

### TRANSPORTATION SAFETY AND EMERGENCIES

Each day, prior to driving a school bus, each school bus driver shall inspect the bus to ensure that it is in safe operating condition and equipped as required by law and that all equipment is in good working order. At the completion of each day's work, the driver shall prepare and sign a written report of the condition of the equipment listed in 13 CCR 1215, including any defect or deficiency discovered by or reported to him/her which would affect safe operation or result in mechanical breakdown of the bus, or indicating that no defect or deficiency was discovered or reported. Any defect or deficiency that would affect safe operation shall be repaired prior to operating the bus. (13 CCR 1215)

In the event of a school bus accident, the driver shall immediately notify the California Highway Patrol, the Superintendent or designee, and, if the bus is operated under contract, the driver's employer. The driver shall not leave the immediate vicinity of the bus to seek aid unless necessary and no student can be sent for help. (13 CCR 1219)

The Superintendent or designee shall review all investigations of bus incidents and accidents to develop preventative measures.

### **Passenger Restraint Systems**

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any school bus or student activity bus which is purchased or leased by the district is equipped with a combination pelvic and upper torso passenger restraint system at all designated seating positions if that bus: (Vehicle Code 27316, 27316.5; 13 CCR 1201)

- Is a Type 1 school bus manufactured on or after July 1, 2005 which is designed for carrying more than 16 passengers and the driver
- 2. Is a Type 2 school bus or student activity bus manufactured on or after July 1, 2004 which meets one of the following criteria:
  - a. Is designed for carrying 16 or fewer passengers and the driver
  - b. Has a manufacturer's vehicle weight rating of 10,000 pounds or less and is designed for carrying not more than 20 passengers and the driver

The Superintendent or designee shall prioritize the allocation of school buses purchased, leased, or contracted to ensure that elementary students receive first priority for new school buses equipped with passenger restraint systems whenever feasible.

When a school bus or student activity bus is equipped with a passenger restraint system, all passengers shall use the passenger restraint system. (5 CCR 14105)

Bus drivers shall be instructed regarding procedures to enforce the proper use of the passenger restraint system. Students who fail to follow instructions of the bus driver may be subject to discipline, including suspension of riding privileges, in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulations.

### **Fire Extinguishers**

Each school bus shall be equipped with at least one fire extinguisher located in the driver's compartment which meets the standards specified in law. In addition, a wheelchair school bus shall have an additional fire extinguisher placed at or near the wheelchair loading door or emergency exit. All fire extinguishers shall be regularly inspected and serviced in accordance with regulations adopted by the State Fire Marshal. (Education Code 39838; 13 CCR 1242; 19 CCR 574-575.3)

### **Electronic Communications Devices**

A person may not drive a schoolbus or transit vehicle while using a wireless or hands-free telephone, or similar device, except for a driver using a wireless telephone for work-related or emergency purposes, including but not limited to, an emergency call to a law enforcement agency, health care provider, fire department, or other emergency service agency or entity. (Vehicle Codes 23123, 23125)

A bus driver shall not drive while using an electronic wireless communications device to write, send, or read a text-based communication, including, but not limited to, text messages, instant messages, and email, unless the device is specifically designed and configured to allow voice-operated and hands-free operation and is used in that manner. This prohibition does not include reading, selecting, or entering a telephone number or name in an electronic wireless communications device for the purpose of making or receiving a telephone call. (Vehicle Code 23123.5)

### Safe Bus Operations

School buses and student activity buses shall not be operated whenever the number of passengers exceeds bus seating capacity, except when necessary in emergency situations which require that individuals be transported immediately to ensure their safety. (Education Code 39834)

School bus operations shall be limited when atmospheric conditions reduce visibility on the roadway to 200 feet or less during regular home-to-school transportation service. Bus drivers for school activity trips may discontinue bus operation whenever they determine that it is unsafe to continue operation because of reduced visibility. (Vehicle Code 34501.6)

### **Unauthorized Entry**

The Superintendent or designee may place a notice at bus entrances that warns against unauthorized entry. The driver or another school official may order any person to disembark if that person enters a bus without prior authorization. (Education Code 39842; 13 CCR 1256.5)

### <u>Transportation Safety Plan for Boarding and Exiting Buses</u>

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a transportation safety plan containing procedures for school personnel to follow to ensure the safe transport of students. The plan shall include all of the following: (Education Code 39831.3)

- 1. Procedures for determining if students in grades prekindergarten through 8 require an escort to cross a private road or highway at a bus stop pursuant to Vehicle Code 22112
- Procedures for all students in grades prekindergarten through 8 to follow as they board and exit the bus at their bus stops

3. Procedures for boarding and exiting a school bus at a school or other trip destination

A copy of the plan shall be kept at each school site and made available upon request to the California Highway Patrol. (Education Code 39831.3)

### **Parental Notifications**

The Superintendent or designee shall provide written safety information to the parents/guardians of all students in grades prekindergarten through 6 who have not previously been transported in a school bus or student activity bus. This information shall be provided upon registration and shall contain: (Education Code 39831.5)

- 1. A list of school bus stops near each student's home
- 2. General rules of conduct at school bus loading zones
- 3. Red light crossing instructions
- 4. A description of the school bus danger zone
- 5. Instructions for safety while walking to and from school bus stops

### **Student Instruction**

Students who are transported in a school bus or student activity bus shall receive instruction in school bus emergency procedures and passenger safety as follows: (Education Code 39831.5; 5 CCR 14102)

- Each year, all students who receive home-to-school transportation in a school bus shall be provided appropriate instruction in safe riding practices and emergency evacuation drills.
- 2. At least once each school year, all students in grades prekindergarten through 8 who receive home-to-school transportation shall receive safety instruction which includes, but is not limited to:
  - a. Proper loading and unloading procedures, including escorting by the driver
  - b. How to safely cross the street, highway, or private road
  - c. In school buses with passenger restraint systems, instruction in the use of such systems as specified in 5 CCR 14105, including, but not limited to, the proper fastening and release of the passenger restraint system, acceptable placement of passenger restraint systems on students, times at which the passenger restraint systems should be fastened and released, and acceptable placement of the passenger restraint systems when not in use
  - d. Proper passenger conduct
  - e. Bus evacuation procedures
  - f. Location of emergency equipment

As part of this instruction, students shall evacuate the school bus through emergency

<u>exit doors</u>. <u>Instruction also may include responsibilities of passengers seated next to an</u> emergency exit.

Each time the above instruction is given, the following information shall be documented:

- a. District name
- b. School name and location
- c. Date of instruction
- d. Names of supervising adults
- e. Number of students participating
- f. Grade levels of students
- g. Subjects covered in instruction
- h. Amount of time taken for instruction
- i. Bus driver's name
- j. Bus number
- k. Additional remarks

This documentation shall be kept on file at the district office or the school for one year and shall be available for inspection by the California Highway Patrol.

3. Before departing on a school activity trip, all students riding on a school bus or student activity bus shall receive safety instruction which includes, but is not limited to, the location of emergency exits and the location and use of emergency equipment. This instruction also may include responsibilities of passengers seated next to an emergency exit.

### Safety Equipment

Each school bus shall be equipped with at least one fire extinguisher located in the driver's compartment which meets the standards specified in law. (Education Code 39838; 13 CCR 1242)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any school bus which is purchased or leased by the district is equipped with a combination pelvic and upper torso passenger restraint system at all designated seating positions if that bus: (Vehicle Code 27316, 27316.5; 13 CCR 1201)

- 1. Is a Type 1 school bus designed for carrying more than 16 passengers and the driver and is manufactured on or after July 1, 2005
- 2. Is a Type 2 school bus or student activity bus designed for carrying 16 or fewer passengers and the driver, or designed for carrying 20 or fewer passengers and the driver and having a manufacturer's vehicle weight rating of 10,000 pounds or less, and is manufactured on or after July 1, 2004

When a school bus or student activity bus is equipped with a passenger restraint system, all

passengers shall use the passenger restraint system. (5 CCR 14105)

Bus drivers shall be informed of procedures to be followed to reasonably enforce proper use of the passenger restraint system.

### Safe Bus Operations

School buses and student activity buses shall not be operated whenever the number of passengers exceeds bus seating capacity, except when necessary in emergency situations which require that individuals be transported immediately to ensure their safety.

School bus operations shall be limited when atmospheric conditions reduce visibility on the roadway to 200 feet or less during regular home-to-school transportation service. Bus drivers for school activity trips shall have the authority to discontinue bus operation whenever they determine that it is unsafe to continue operation because of reduced visibility. (Vehicle Code 34501.6)

A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using a wireless telephone, except under the following conditions: (Vehicle Code 23123, 23125)

- 1. For emergency purposes, including, but not limited to, an emergency call to a law enforcement agency, health care provider, fire department, or other emergency service agency or entity
- 2. In the case of a school bus driver, for work-related purposes

A person shall not drive a motor vehicle while using an electronic wireless communications device to write, send, or read a text-based communication, including, but not limited to, text messages, instant messages, and email. This prohibition does not include reading, selecting, or entering a telephone number or name in an electronic wireless communications device for the purpose of making or receiving a telephone call. (Vehicle Code 23123.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall review all investigations of bus incidents and accidents to develop preventative measures.

The Superintendent or designee may place a notice at bus entrances that warns against unauthorized entry. The driver or another school official may order any person to disembark if that person enters a bus without prior authorization. (Education Code 39842; 13 CCR 1256.5)

Transportation Safety Plan for Boarding and Exiting Buses

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a transportation safety plan containing procedures for school personnel to follow to ensure the safe transport of students. The plan shall include all of the following: (Education Code 39831.3)

- 1. Procedures for determining if students in grades prekindergarten through 8 require an escort to cross a private road or highway at a bus stop pursuant to Vehicle Code 22112

### **Notifications**

This information shall be provided upon registration and shall contain: (Education Code 39831.5)

- 1. A list of school bus stops near each student's home
- 2. General rules of conduct at school bus loading zones
- 3. Red light crossing instructions
- 4. A description of the school bus danger zone
- 5. Instructions for safety while walking to and from school bus stops

### Student Instruction

All students who are transported in a school bus or student activity bus shall receive instruction in school bus emergency procedures and passenger safety. (Education Code 39831.5)

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider deleting BP 6161 – Equipment, Books, and Materials.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends deleting this policy deleted due to redundancy with BP 6161.1 – Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials.

The deletion of this BP will return as an action item on the April 3, 2014, agenda.

Instruction BP 6161

#### SELECTION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

The district recognizes the rights inherent in the First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States and supports the principles of intellectual freedom expressed in the Library Bill of Rights and in Access to Resources and Services in the School Library Media Program. It is the policy of the district to provide information and instructional materials in classrooms and library media centers in accordance with constitutional protection. The district supports a process for the systematic review of instructional materials through established procedures.

Legal responsibility for the operation of the district including the supervision of the selection of educational instructional materials rests with the Board of Education. The Board delegates the authority for the selection of instructional materials to the professional staff employed by the district. It is the responsibility of the professional staff to select and use instructional materials to implement the educational program of the school district. Instructional materials must serve both the breadth of the curriculum and the needs and interest of individual students by accommodating a wide range of abilities and respecting diverse points of view.

Educational suitability is the major criteria for the selection of instructional materials.

Professional staff are to use educational criteria and professional judgment rather than personal opinions, values, and beliefs in the selection of instructional materials.

#### Instructional materials should:

- Be selected according to their alignment with the state frameworks and the general educational goals of the district.
- Be appropriate for the age, interests, abilities, learning styles, social development, and maturity levels of the students.
- 3. Represent the diversity of religious, ethnic, political, and cultural values held in a pluralistic society.
- Illustrate the contributions made by various groups to our national heritage and the world.
- 5. Illustrate historical and contemporary forces in society to enable users to recognize and understand social, economic, personal, and political problems.
- 6. Provide various points of view about issues, including those considered to be controversial.

Certificated library media personnel and teachers should consider:

- Literary and artistic merit; technical quality; and physical condition appropriate to format and intended use.
- 2. Scope, arrangement, and organization, relevance of information, special features, and overall value to the collection.

- Selection of instructional materials for specific courses to be consistent with the
  educational goals of the district, the objectives of the course, and the characteristics of
  the students.
- 4. When selecting textbooks or materials for courses, it is imperative that administrators and faculty members avoid any appearance of a conflict of interest in assigning faculty-authored textbooks, supplemental books or instructional materials. While not expressly prohibited, the assignment of faculty-authored textbooks, supplemental books, or instructional materials should ensure that the teacher does not profit from this arrangement. Textbooks, supplemental books, tapes, software and other instructional materials authored by the course teacher may be assigned to be purchased by students or the district for a course taught by the author if the royalties arising from the purchase of the assigned materials are returned to the district, another educational institution, a charitable organization, or a not-for-profit foundation. A statement, signed by the author, outlining the approved disbursement of any royalties shall be retained on file by the district.

#### DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.04

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider revising BP and AR 7214 – General Obligation Bonds.

COMMENTS: CSBA recommends updating this regulation to clarify material related to bond elections and resolutions regarding the sale of bonds and to add new section on bond anticipation notes, which may be issued to finance a facilities project on an interim basis in anticipation of the sale of bonds that has been approved by the voters. The policy was also updated to reflect new law (AB 182), which requires greater transparency for the use of capital appreciation bonds and other bonds that allow for compounding of interest. The policy also reflects new law (SB 581), which requires that performance and financial audits be submitted to the citizens' oversight committee at the same time they are submitted to the district

and requires the board to respond to all findings, recommendations, and

The regulation has been updated to reflect new law (AB 1199), which authorizes members of a citizens' oversight committee to serve for three consecutive terms rather than two. The regulation has also been updated to delete the requirement for certain reports repealed pursuant to new law (AB 97).

Facilities BP 7214

#### **GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS**

The Board of Education desires to provide adequate facilities in order to enhance student learning and to help the district achieve its vision for educating district students. To that end, the Board may order an election on the question of whether bonds shall be issued for school facilities when, in the Board's judgment, it is advisable and in the best interest of district students.

The Board shall determine the appropriate size of the bond in accordance with law.

When any project to be funded by bonds will require state matching funds for any phase of the project, the ballot for the bond measure shall include a statement as specified in Education Code 15122.5, advising voters that, because the project is subject to approval of state matching funds, passage of the bond measure is not a guarantee that the project will be completed. (Education Code 15122.5)

# **Bonds Requiring 55 Percent Approval by Local Voters**

The Board may decide to pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by approval of 55 percent majority of the voters pursuant to Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and Article 16, Section 18(b) of the California Constitution. If two-thirds of the Board agree to such an election, the Board shall vote to adopt a resolution to incur bonded indebtedness if approved by a 55 percent majority of the voters. (Education Code 15266)

The bond election may only be ordered at a primary or general election, a statewide special election, or a regularly scheduled local election at which all of the electors of the school district are entitled to vote. (Education Code 15266)

Bonded indebtedness incurred by the district shall be used only for the following purposes: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and 1(b)(3)(A))

- 1. The construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities
- 2. The acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities

The proposition approved by the voters shall include the following accountability requirements: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3))

- 1. A requirement that proceeds from the sale of the bonds be used only for the purposes specified above, as detailed in California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3), and not for any other purposes including teacher and administrative salaries and other school operating expenses
- A list of specific school facility projects to be funded and certification that the Board has evaluated safety, class size reduction, and information technology needs in developing that list
- 3. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the funds have been expended only on the specific projects listed

4. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of those proceeds have been expended for the school facilities projects

If a district general obligation bond requiring a 55 percent majority is approved by the voters, the Board shall appoint an independent citizens' advisory oversight committee to inform the public concerning the expenditure of bond revenues as specific in Education Code 15278 and the accompanying administrative regulation. This committee shall be appointed within 60 days of the date that the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code 15274. (Education Code 15278)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the annual, independent performance and financial audits conducted pursuant to items #3 and #4 above are issued in accordance with the U.S. Comptroller General's Government Auditing Standards and submitted to the citizens' oversight committee at the same time they are submitted to him/her and no later than He/she shall submit the audits to the citizens' oversight committee by March 31 of each year. (Education Code 15286)

The Board shall provide the citizens' oversight committee with responses to all findings, recommendations, and concerns address in the performance and financial audits within three months of receiving the audits. (Education Code 15280)

The Board may disband the citizens' oversight committee when the committee has completed its review of the final performance and financial audits.

# **Bonds Requiring 66.67 Percent Approval by Local Voters**

The Board may decide to pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by approval of 66.67 percent majority of the voters pursuant to Education Code 15100 and Article 13A, Section 1(b)(2) of the California Constitution. If a majority of the Board agrees to such an election, or upon a petition of the majority of the qualified electors residing in the district, the Board shall adopt a resolution ordering an election on the question of whether to incur bonded indebtedness if approved by a 66.67 percent majority of the voters. (Education Code 15100)

The bond election may be ordered to occur on any Tuesday, except a Tuesday that is a state holiday or the day before or after a state holiday, is within 45 days before or after a statewide election unless conducted at the same time as the statewide election, or is an established election date pursuant to Elections Code 1000 or 1500. (Education Code 15101)

Bonds shall be sold to raise money for the following purposes: (Education Code 15100)

- 1. Purchasing school lots
- 2. Building or purchasing school buildings
- 3. Making alterations or additions to school building(s) other than as may be necessary for current maintenance, operation, or repairs
- 4. Repairing, restoring, or rebuilding any school building damaged, injured, or destroyed by fire or other public calamity
- 5. Supplying school buildings and grounds with furniture, equipment, or necessary apparatus of a permanent nature
- 6. Permanently improving school grounds

- 7. Refunding any outstanding valid indebtedness of the district, evidenced by bonds or state school building aid loans
- 8. Carrying out sewer or drain projects or purposes authorized in Education Code 17577
- 9. Purchasing school buses with a useful life of at least 20 years
- 10. Demolishing or razing any school building with the intent to replace it with another school building, whether in the same location or in any other location

Except for refunding any outstanding indebtedness, any of the purposes listed above may be united and voted upon as a single proposition by order of the Board and entered into the minutes. (Education Code <u>15100</u>)

#### **Certificate of Results**

If the certificate of election results received by the Board shows that the appropriate majority of the voters are in favor of issuing the bonds, the Board shall record that fact in its minutes. The Board shall then certify to the county board of supervisors all.

# **Resolution Regarding Sale of Bonds**

Following passage of the bond measure by the appropriate majority of voters, the Board shall pass a resolution to issue the sale of bonds. The resolution shall prescribe the total amount of bonds to be sold and may also prescribe the maximum acceptable interest rate, not to exceed eight percent, and the time(s) when the whole or any part of the principal of the bonds shall be payable, which shall not be more than 25 years from the date of the bonds. (Education Code 15140)

In passing the resolution, the Board shall consider each available funding instrument, including, but not limited to, the costs associated with each and their relative suitability for the project to be financed.

Prior to the sale of bonds, the Board shall adopt, as an agenda item at a public meeting, another resolution, available funding instruments, the costs and suitability of each, which includes all of the following items: (Education Code 15146)

- 1. Express approval of the method of sale
- 2. Statement of the reasons for the method of sale selected
- 3. Disclosure of the identity of the bond counsel, and the identities of the bond underwriter and the financial adviser if either or both are utilized for the sale, unless these individuals have not been selected at the time the resolution is adopted, in which case the Board shall disclose their identities at the public meeting occurring after they have been selected
- 4. Estimates of the costs associated with the bond issuance

When the sale involves bonds that allow for the compounding of interest, such as a capital appreciation bond (CAB), items #1-4 above and the financing term and time of maturity, repayment ratio, and the estimated change in the assessed value of taxable property within the district over the term of the bonds shall be included in the resolution to be adopted by the Board. The resolution shall be publicly noticed on at least two consecutive meeting agendas, first as an

information item and second as an action item. The agendas shall identify that bonds that allow for the compounding of interest are proposed. (Education Code 15146)

Prior to adopting a resolution for the sale of bonds that allow for the compounding of interest, the Board shall be presented with the following: (Education Code 15146)

- An analysis containing the total overall cost of the bonds that allow for the compounding of interest
- 2. A comparison to the overall cost of current interest bonds
- 3. The reason bonds that allow for the compounding of interest are being recommended
- 4. A copy of the disclosure made by the underwriter in compliance with Rule G-17 adopted by the federal Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board

After the sale, the Board shall be presented with the actual cost information and shall disclose that information at the Board's next scheduled meeting. The Board shall ensure that an itemized summary of the costs of the bond sale and all necessary information and reports regarding the sale are submitted to the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission. (Education Code 15146)

# **Bond Anticipation Notes**

Whenever the Board determines that it is in the best interest of the district, it may, by resolution, issue a bond anticipation note, on a negotiated or competitive-bid basis, to raise funds that shall be used only for a purpose authorized by a bond that has been approved by the voters of the district in accordance with law. (Education Code 15150)

Payment of principal and interest on any bond anticipation note shall be made at note maturity, not to exceed five years, from the proceeds derived from the sale of the bond in anticipation of which that note was originally issued or from any other source lawfully available for that purpose, including state grants. Interest payments may also be made from such sources. However, interest payments may be made periodically and prior to note maturity from an increased property tax if the following conditions are met: (Education Code 15150)

- 1. A resolution of the Board authorizes the property tax for that purpose.
- The principal amount of the bond anticipation note does not exceed the remaining principal amount of the authorized but unissued bonds.

A bond anticipation note may be issued only if the tax rate levied to pay interest on the note would not cause the district to exceed the tax rate limitation set forth in Education Code 15268 or 15270, as applicable.

#### **GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS**

#### **Election Notice**

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that election notice and ballot requirements are satisfied in accordance with Education Code 15120-15126 and 15272.

# **Citizens' Oversight Committee**

If a district general obligation bond requiring a 55 percent majority is approved by the voters, the Board shall appoint an independent citizens' advisory oversight committee. This committee shall be appointed within 60 days of the date that the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code 15274. (Education Code 15278)

The citizens' oversight committee shall consist of at least seven members including, but not limited to: (Education Code 15282)

- 1. One member active in a business organization representing the business community located within the district
- 2. One member active in a senior citizens organization
- 3. One member active in a bona fide taxpayers' organization
- 4. One member who is a parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the district
- 5. One member who is a parent/guardian of a child enrolled in the district and is active in a parent-teacher organization, such as the Parent Teacher Association or school site council

Members of the citizens' oversight committee shall be subject to the conflict of interest prohibitions regarding incompatibility of office pursuant to Government Code 1125-1129 and financial interest in contracts pursuant to Government Code 1090-1099. (Education Code 15282)

No employee, official, vendor, contractor, or consultant of the district shall be appointed to the citizens' oversight committee. (Education Code 15282)

Members of the citizens' oversight committee shall serve for no more than three consecutive terms of two year each. They shall serve without compensation. a term of two years without compensation and for no more than two consecutive terms. (Education Code 15282)

The purpose of the citizens' oversight committee shall be to inform the public concerning the expenditure of bond revenues. The committee shall actively review and report on the proper expenditure of taxpayers' money for school construction and shall convene to provide oversight for, but not limited to, the following: (Education Code 15278)

1. Ensuring that bond revenues are expended only for the purposes described in Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution including the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing

and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities

- 2. Ensuring that, as prohibited by Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3)(A) of the California Constitution, no funds are used for any teacher and administrative salaries or other school operating expenses
- 3. Ensuring that the annual, independent performance and financial audits required by Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3)(C) and (D) of the California Constitution are issued in accordance with the U.S. Comptroller General's Government Auditing Standards for performance and financial audits (Education Code 15286)

In furtherance of its purpose, the committee may engage in any of the following activities: (Education Code 15278)

- 1. Receiving and reviewing copies of the annual, independent performance audit required by Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3)(C) of the California Constitution
- 2. Receiving and reviewing copies of the annual, independent financial audit required by Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3)(D) of the California Constitution
- 3. Inspecting school facilities and grounds to ensure that bond revenues are expended in compliance with the requirements of Article 13(A), Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution
- 4. Receiving and reviewing copies of any deferred maintenance proposals or plans developed by the district, including any reports required by Education Code 17584.1
- 5. Reviewing efforts by the district to maximize bond revenues by implementing cost-saving measures including, but not limited to, the following:
  - a. Mechanisms designed to reduce the costs of professional fees
  - b. Mechanisms designed to reduce the costs of site preparation
  - c. Recommendations regarding the joint use of core facilities
  - d. Mechanisms designed to reduce costs by incorporating efficiencies in school site design
  - e. Recommendations regarding the use of cost-effective and efficient reusable facility plans

The Board district shall, without expending bond funds, provide the citizens' oversight committee with any necessary technical assistance and shall provide administrative assistance in furtherance of the committee's purpose and sufficient resources to publicize the committee's conclusions. (Education Code 15280)

All <u>The citizens'</u> oversight committee proceedings shall be open to the public and noticed in the same manner as proceedings of the Board. Committee meetings shall be subject to the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act. (Education Code 15280; Government Code 54952)

The oversight committee shall issue regular reports, at least once a year, on the results of its activities. Minutes of the proceedings and all documents received and reports issued shall be a

matter of public record and shall be made available on the district's web site. (Education Code 15280)

Members of the oversight committee shall be subject to prohibitions regarding incompatibility of office pursuant to Government Code 1125-1129 and financial interest in contracts pursuant to Government Code 1090-1098. (Education Code 15282)

The citizens' oversight committee may be disbanded following its review of the final performance and financial audits.

# Reports

Within 30 days after the end of each fiscal year, the Board shall submit to the County Superintendent of Schools a report concerning any bond election(s) containing the following information: (Education Code 15111)

- 1. The total amount of the bond issue, bonded indebtedness, or other indebtedness involved
- 2. The percentage of registered electors who voted at the election
- 3. The results of the election, with the percentage of votes cast for and against the proposition

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 13-18**

**WHEREAS** Cesar Estrada Chavez was born March 31, 1927, on a small farm near Yuma, Arizona, and was raised by migrant farm workers; and

**WHEREAS** Chavez left school after eighth grade to labor in the fields and vineyards to help support his family; and

WHEREAS After experiencing years of discrimination and unfair working conditions, Chavez joined the Community Service Organization in 1952, a prominent Latino civil rights group that organized Chicanos to vote, and battled racial and economic discrimination; and

WHEREAS In 1962, César Chávez resigned his position with the Community Services Organization to embark on a bold new undertaking to form a farmworkers' union. He was joined by Dolores Huerta, and together they became the architects of the National Farm Worker's Union, the forerunner to the present United Farm Workers (UFW); and

**WHEREAS** Chavez traveled to many California migrant farm communities organizing a strong nucleus of dedicated farm worker members; and

**WHEREAS** In 1965, César Chávez led a strike of California grape pickers to demand higher wages and urged all Americans to boycott table grapes as a show of support. The strike included a 340-mile march from Delano to Sacramento in 1966 in which thousands of farmworkers and supporters marched in solidarity; and

WHEREAS César Chávez preached nonviolence to the strikers even as they were physically abused by many of those opposed to the grape boycott. In 1968, he began a Ghandilike fast to call attention to the migrant workers' cause. His fast increased public awareness of the conditions under which farmworkers labored. In 1973, the UFW organized a strike for higher wages and better working conditions from lettuce growers, and, after many battles, an agreement was finally reached in 1977 that gave the UFW the sole right to organize farmworkers; and

WHEREAS Chavez and the organization he founded, the UFW, achieved the following:

- The first collective bargaining agreement between farm workers and growers in the continental United States; and
- The first union contracts requiring rest periods, clean drinking water, hand washing facilities, and protective clothing against pesticide exposure; and
- The first ban on pesticide spraying while workers were in the fields; and
- The first ban on DDT and other dangerous pesticides; and 2
- The first and only performing pension plan for retired farm workers; and
- The first union contracts regulating safety and sanitary conditions in farm labor camps and banning discrimination in employment and sexual harassment of female workers; and
- Abolished use of the infamous "short-handed hoe" that crippled generations of farm workers; and
- Extended to farm workers state coverage under unemployment, disability, and workers' compensation;

WHEREAS In the year 2000, the California Legislature enacted Senate Bill 984 (Chapter 213 of the Statutes of 2000) to create an annual state holiday on César Chávez's birthday. This holiday provides all Californians the opportunity to learn from and celebrate the legacy of this

great man; and

**WHEREAS** Cesar E. Chavez influenced and inspired millions of Americans of all nationalities to seek social justice and civil rights for the poor and disenfranchised in our society; and

<u>WHEREAS</u> in 1990, 300 Santa Monica High School students supported Cesar Chavez in a peaceful demonstration in front of the Loews Hotel to protest the use of harmful pesticides;

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education does hereby adopt this Resolution to honor a man, who devoted his life to improving the working conditions, safety, and dignity of so many, by recognizing March 31, 2013, as the anniversary of the birth of César Chávez. The Board calls upon all schools and justice-minded people of the community, to participate in appropriate observances to learn about, and remember honor the legacy of César Chávez as a symbol of hope and justice to all persons.

# **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.25**

It is recommended that the Board of Education enter into an agreement between Next Ed – Investing in Innovation (i3) Project Lead the Way (PLTW) and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (SMMUSD).

COMMENT:

This agreement provides SMMUSD Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School the opportunity to participate in the United States Department of Education's evaluation of Project Lead the Way (PLTW), funded by the Department of Education through 4 school years beginning August 2014 concluding June 2018 Investing in Innovation (i3) grant. The agreement between Next Ed – (i3), Project Lead the Way (PLTW) and Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District provides a STEM Engineering Pathway at Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School. In order to maintain fidelity in the evaluation, Investing in Innovation (i3) grant provides each participating school with a technology lab consisting of 30 workstations, one teacher workstation, applicable software and/or licensing, implementation setup, training, startup assistance and post-start-up support, training to all PLTW teachers, and initial and consistent updates on research data to SMMUSD and the United States Department of Education.

#### **Background**

According to the California Department of Education, STEM education is a sequence of courses or program of study that prepares students, including underrepresented groups:

- for successful employment, post-secondary education, or both that require different and more technically sophisticated skills including the application of mathematics and science skills and concepts, and
- to be competent, capable citizens in our technology-dependent, democratic society.

Taken separately, the four STEM subjects are defined by the National Research Council as:

- 1. *Science* is the study of the natural world, including the laws of nature associated with physics, chemistry, and biology and the treatment or application of facts, principles, concepts, or conventions associated with these disciplines.
- 2. *Technology* comprises the entire system of people and organizations, knowledge, processes, and devices that go into creating and operating technological artifacts, as well as the artifacts themselves.
- 3. *Engineering* is a body of knowledge about the design and creation of products and a process for solving problems. Engineering utilizes concepts in science and mathematics and technological tools.
- 4. *Mathematics* is the study of patterns and relationships among quantities, numbers, and shapes. Mathematics includes theoretical mathematics and applied mathematics.

#### STEM Education:

- Provides a challenging and rigorous program of study focusing on the application of STEM subjects.
- Offers courses and pathways for preparation in STEM fields and occupations.

- Bridges and connects in-school and out-of-school learning opportunities.
- Provides opportunities for student exploration of STEM related fields and careers, especially for underrepresented populations.
- Prepares students for successful post-secondary employment, education, or both.

# Career Technical Education (CTE):

The California Department of Education's Career Tech Consortia maintains that CTE can have a direct and profound impact on the real and immediate issues concerning our nation—workforce development, economic vitality, global competitiveness, student achievement, school reform, college-going rates and technical proficiency.

#### Project Lead the Way:

Project Lead the Way (PLTW) is a not-for-profit organization partnering with public schools, organizations in the private sectors, and higher education institutions to increase the number and quality of engineers, technologists, and biomedical professionals graduating from our educational system.

California Project Lead the Way works toward helping local schools provide students, especially underrepresented groups, with the opportunity to develop the knowledge, skills, and confidence required to pursue a career in science, mathematics, and engineering.

Pathways to Engineering – The High School Engineering Program is a four year sequence of courses which, when combined with traditional mathematics and science courses in high school, introduces students to the scope, rigor and discipline of engineering prior to entering college.

Thank you for your support of the evaluation (EVALUATION) of Project Lead the Way (PLTW) funded by the Department of Education through a 4 school-year beginning August, 2014 concluding June, 2018 Investing in Innovation (i3) grant.

The purpose of the EVALUATION is to validate the efficacy of a four-year PLTW engineering pathway program (PROGRAM). The EVALUATION will do so with an experimental design in which a subset of the students who want to participate in the PROGRAM will be placed in the PLTW pathway with a capacity that schools can accommodate using a fair, equitable, and objective randomized drawing process.

The EVALUATION will be conducted by an independent, third-party evaluation firm, Gargani + Company, Inc. (GCO). Material benefits (training, equipment, software, and other support for implementing the PLTW pathway program), as described further below, will be provided directly or indirectly by NextEd.

For the purposes of the EVALUATION, the above named school (SCHOOL) in the above named school district (DISTRICT) will begin implementing the PROGRAM at the start of the 2014/15 school year and end no sooner than the end of the 2017/18 school year (IMPLEMENTATION PERIOD).

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) covers the period starting from March, 2014 through December 31, 2018 (AGREEMENT PERIOD). Should the principal of the SCHOOL, superintendent of the DISTRICT, or other staff or board members change during the AGREEMENT PERIOD, the MOU will continue in full force. It may only be terminated upon mutual agreement of the parties or if required by law.

Based on information provided by the SCHOOL and DISTRICT to GCO, the SCHOOL was selected by GCO to participate in the EVALUATION. This MOU describes the responsibilities and material benefits of participation. By signing the MOU, you commit the SCHOOL and DISTRICT to meeting the responsibilities described below. Upon receipt of the signed MOU, GCO will enroll the SCHOOL in the evaluation and NextEd will begin providing material benefits as described in this document. During the AGREEMENT PERIOD, material benefits will be contingent on meeting the responsibilities.



#### **MATERIAL BENEFITS**

In order that the SCHOOL can implement the PROGRAM faithfully and well, NextEd will:

- 1. provide participating schools with a technology lab consisting of 30 workstations, one teacher workstation, applicable software and/or licensing\* (specific to participating cohort only), implementation setup, training, startup assistance and post-startup support; (\*Please see Benefit Matrix PLTW School Fee Stipend)
- 2. assist with the planning and implementation of PLTW engineering pathway program;
- 3. recommend steps required to successfully install new computer lab and assist in assembling setup information;
- 4. place and deliver a technology order (based upon individual school technology specifications);
- 5. provide DISTRICT a singular technology lead/support staff with a \$400.00 stipend per year;
- 6. work with school DISTRICT and site staff during installation and implementation to help minimize troubleshooting;
- 7. upon completed installation of technology, run testing simulations to determine proper implementation and effectiveness;
- 8. provide startup and post-startup support;
- 9. provide training to all PLTW Teachers and training for Student Testing as related to the research;
- 10. assist in planning, assembling data and purchasing supply order\*\* each year for PLTW engineering pathway; (\*\*Please see Benefit Matrix PLTW Engineering Pathway Supplies)
- 11. provide free telephone/electronic/in person technology support for four years of grant Cycle; and
- 12. Provide initial and consistent updates on research data to DISTRICT and US Dept. of Education.

# RESPONSIBILITIES

#### Evaluation

The EVALUATION requires collaborative involvement by the SCHOOL and/or DISTRICT, and its success depends on their cooperation with the protocols set forth by GCO. During the AGREEMENT PERIOD, it will be the responsibility of the SCHOOL, and as needed the DISTRICT, to:

- 1. work with GCO and NextEd in a collaborative fashion to implement the PROGRAM faithfully, follow the procedures of the EVALUATION as outlined by GCO, and take every reasonable measure to ensure the success of the evaluation;
- 2. assure that all EVALUATION activities are consistent with the policies of your SCHOOL and DISTRICT regarding research;
- 3. inform GCO and NextEd in an anticipatory and timely manner of deviations from faithful program implementation, deviations from evaluation procedures, or other potential problems that may adversely affect the EVALUATION;

### **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.26**

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the granting of elective credits for the following course to be offered at Santa Monica High School.

COMMENT: Santa Mo

Santa Monica High School staff is requesting the approval of the proposed physical education course in order to enhance the current physical education course offerings available to secondary students. This proposed course will provide opportunity to secondary students (not participating on the tennis team) in order to develop the skills to pursue a life-long participation in health, wellness, and sport. The credits granted for this course will count towards graduation. This course will not fulfill the required courses for admission to California's public

universities ("a-g" requirements).

**COURSE: PE TENNIS** 

**NUMBER OF CREDITS: 10 DURATION: Year** 

**DEPARTMENT:** Physical Education

**COURSE DESCRIPTION / OVERVIEW**: PE Tennis provides students the opportunity to develop foundational skills and knowledge of Tennis. The course is organized around the California Standards for High School Physical Education.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES / GOALS:** Students will develop competencies in and knowledge of tennis training, skills, strategies and practice techniques. This includes the ability to demonstrate competency in motor skills and movement patterns related to tennis such as:

- 1. forehand grip and stroke, forehand cues
- 2. backhand grip and stroke, backhand cues
- 3. serve, volley, short singles game
- 4. serve, volley, short doubles game

### **RECOMMENDATION NO. A.27**

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve the granting of elective credits for the following course to be offered at both Santa Monica High School and Malibu High School.

COMMENT: In support of STEM and CTE, staff is requesting approval of a Project Lead the

Way (PLTW) Engineering Pathway secondary course. This course of study will allow secondary students the opportunity to explore deeply, the college and career possibilities of engineering while developing appropriate and necessary skills and knowledge to be successful in college and STEM careers. The credits granted for this course will count towards graduation and required courses for

admission to California's public universities ("a-g requirements").

**COURSE:** Introduction to Engineering Design (PLTW)

**NUMBER OF CREDITS: 10 DURATION: Year** 

**DEPARTMENT: Science** 

**COURSE DESCRIPTION / OVERVIEW:** Introduction to Engineering Design (PLTW) introduces students to the scope, rigor and discipline of engineering prior to entering college. Introduction to Engineering Design provides students the opportunity to explore the college and career possibilities of STEM/engineering.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES / GOALS:** Students will develop competencies in and knowledge of the engineering design process including the characteristic set of practices and steps. This includes the ability to:

- Complete design projects utilizing all steps of a design process and find a solution that meets specific design requirements;
- 2. Utilize research tools and resources to gather and interpret information to develop an effective design brief;
- 3. Define and justify design problems; and be able to express the concerns, needs and desires of the primary stakeholders;
- 4. Explain design requirements and function claims using STEM principles and practices;
- 5. Construct a testable prototype of a problem solution;
- 6. Assess the development of an engineered product and discuss tis impact on society and the environment;
- 7. Identify and define technical drawing representations:
- 8. Utilize statistical analysis in order to inform, justify, and validate a design or process;
- 9. Analyze the performance of a design during testing and judge the solution as viable or non-viable with respect to meeting the design requirements;

- 10. Create three dimensional solid models of parts within CAD from sketches or dimensioned drawings using appropriate geometric and dimensional constraints;
- 11. Utilize computer aided drafting and design (CAD) software packages in order to facilitate virtual modeling or parts and assemblies as well as the creation of technical drawings.

### **INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01**

This is to inform the Board of Education that AR 6173.1 – Education for Foster Youth has been revised.

COMMENTS: CSBA is recommending this update to reflect new law (AB 97), which defines "foster youth" and requires districts to monitor the educational progress of foster youth. The regulation also reflects new law (AB 216), which requires districts to exempt from any district-adopted graduation requirements a foster youth who transfers into the district or between district high schools after completing the second year of high school, except under specified circumstances. The section on "Transfer of Coursework and Credits" has been updated to reflect California Child Welfare Council recommendations regarding the calculation of partial credits.

> The Board of Education discussed these changes on March 6, 2014. The corresponding policy can be found under Consent in this agenda.

Instruction AR 6173.1

### **EDUCATION FOR FOSTER YOUTH**

### **Definitions**

Foster youth means a child who has been subject to one of the following: (Education Code 48853.5)

- 1. Has been removed from his/her home pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 309 (temporary custody)
- 2. Is the subject of a petition filed under Welfare and Institutions Code 300 or 602 (jurisdiction of juvenile court)
- 3. Has been removed from his/her home and is the subject of a petition filed under Welfare and Institutions Code 300 or 602

Foster youth means a child who has been removed from his/her home pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 309, is the subject of a petition filed under Welfare and Institutions Code 300 or 602, or has been removed from his/her home and is the subject of a petition filed under Welfare and Institutions Code 300 or 602 or is a nonminor who is under the transition jurisdiction of a juvenile court, as described in Welfare and Institutions Code 450, and satisfies the criteria specified in Education Code 42238.01 (Education Code 42238.01, 48853.5)

Person holding the right to make educational decisions means a responsible adult appointed by a court pursuant to Welfare and Institutions Code 361 or 726.

School of origin means the school that the foster youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which he/she was last enrolled. If the school the foster youth attended when permanently housed is different from the school in which he/she was last enrolled, or if there is some other school that the foster youth attended within the preceding 15 months and with which the youth is connected, the district liaison shall <u>determine</u>, in consultation with and with the agreement of the foster youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the youth, <u>determine and</u> in the best <u>interest</u> <u>interests</u> of the foster youth, which school is the school of origin. (Education Code 48853.5)

Best interests means that, in making educational and school placement decisions for a foster youth, consideration is given to, among other factors, educational stability, the opportunity to be educated in the least restrictive educational setting necessary to achieve academic progress, and the foster youth's access to academic resources, services, and extracurricular and enrichment activities that are available to <u>all</u> district students. (Education Code 48850, 48853)

### **District Liaison**

The Superintendent or designee designates the following position as the district liaison for foster youth: (Education Code 48853.5)

Director Student Services 1651 16th Street Santa Monica, CA 90402 90404 (310) 450-8338 The district's liaison for foster youth shall:

- 1. Ensure and facilitate the proper educational placement, enrollment in school, and checkout from school of students in foster care. (Education Code 48853.5)
- Assist foster youth when transferring from one school to another or from one district to another in ensuring proper transfer of credits, records, and grades, including ensuring that records reflect full or partial credit for courses taken (Education Code 48645.5, 48853.5)
- 2. Ensure proper transfer of credits, records, and grades when students in foster care transfer from one school to another or from one district to another. (Education Code 48645.5, 48853.5)
  - When a student in foster care is enrolling in a district school, the liaison shall contact the school last attended by the student to obtain, within two business days, all academic and other records. When a foster youth is transferring to a new school, the liaison shall provide the student's records to the new school within two business days of receiving the new school's request. (Education Code 48853.5)
- 3. When required by law, notify the foster youth's attorney and the representative of the appropriate county child welfare agency when the foster youth is undergoing any expulsion or other disciplinary proceeding, including a manifestation determination prior to a change in the foster youth's placement, when he/she is a student with a disability. (Education Code 48853.5, 48911, 48915.5, 48918.1)
- 3. 4. As necessary, make appropriate referrals to ensure that students in foster care receive necessary special education services and services under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973.
- 4. <u>5.</u> <u>As necessary,</u> <u>€ensure that students in foster care receive appropriate school-based services, such as <u>supplemental instruction</u>, <u>counseling</u>, <u>or after-school programs counseling and health services</u>, <u>supplemental instruction</u>, <u>and after-school services</u>.</u>
- 5. <u>6.</u> Develop protocols and procedures so that district staff, including principals, school registrars, and attendance clerks, are aware of the requirements for the proper enrollment, placement, and transfer of foster youth.
- 6. 7. Collaborate with the county placing agency, social services, probation officers, juvenile court officers, nonprofit organizations, and advocates to help coordinate services for the district's foster youth.
- 7. 8. Monitor the educational progress of foster youth and provide reports to the Superintendent or designee and the Board of Education based on indicators identified in Board policy the district's local control accountability plan.

### **Enrollment**

A <u>foster youth student</u> placed in a licensed children's institution or foster family home <u>within the district</u> shall attend programs operated by the district unless one of the following circumstances applies: (Education Code 48853, 48853.5)

1. The student has an individualized education program requiring placement in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, or in another local educational agency.

- 2. The parent/guardian or other person holding the right to make educational decisions for the student determines that it is in the best interest of the student to be placed in another educational program and submits a written statement to the district indicating that determination and that he/she is aware of the followings:
  - <u>a.</u> The student has a right to attend a regular public school in the least restrictive environment.
  - <u>b.</u> <u>The alternate educational program is a special education program, if applicable.</u>
  - c. The decision to unilaterally remove the student from the district school and to place him/her in an alternate education program may not be financed by the district.
  - d. Any attempt to seek reimbursement for the alternate education program may be at the expense of the parent/guardian or other person holding the right to make educational decisions for the student.
- 3. The student is entitled to remain in his/her school of origin as defined above.
- <u>At the initial placement or any subsequent change in placement, the student exercises his/her right to continue in his/her school of origin as defined above.</u>
  - <u>a.</u> The student may continue in the school of origin for the duration of the court's jurisdiction.
  - <u>b.</u> If the court's jurisdiction over a grade K 8 student is terminated prior to the end of a school year, the student may continue in his/her school of origin for the remainder of the school year.
  - c. If the court's jurisdiction is terminated while the student is in high school, the student may continue in his/her school of origin until he/she graduates.
  - d. If the student is transitioning between school grade levels, he/she shall be allowed to continue in the district of origin in the same attendance area to provide him/her the benefit of matriculating with his/her peers in accordance with the established feeder patters of school districts. A student who is transitioning to a middle school or high school shall be allowed to enroll in the school designated for matriculation in another school district.
- 4. At the initial placement, or any subsequent change in placement of a foster youth, the district shall allow the student to continue his/her education in the school of origin for the duration of the academic school year. However, the district liaison may, in consultation with and with the agreement of the foster youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the youth, recommend that the youth's right to attend the school of origin be waived and he/she be enrolled in any school that students living in the attendance area in which the foster youth resides are eligible to attend. All decisions shall be made in accordance with the foster youth's best interest. (Education Code 48853.5)

The district liaison may, in consultation with and with agreement of the foster youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the youth, recommend that the youth's right to attend the school of origin be waived and he/she be enrolled in any school that students living the attendance area in which the foster youth resides are eligible to attend. All

<u>decisions shall be made in accordance with the foster youth's best interests. (Education Code 48853.5)</u>

Prior to making any recommendation to move a foster youth from his/her school of origin, the liaison shall provide the youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the youth with a written explanation of the basis for the recommendation and how this recommendation serves the youth's best interests. (Education Code 48853.5)

The role of the liaison shall be advisory with respect to placement decisions and determination of the school of origin. (Education Code 48853.5)

If the liaison, in consultation with the foster youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the foster youth, agree agrees that the best interests of the youth would be served by his/her transfer to a school other than the school of origin, the principal or designee of the new school shall immediately enroll the foster youth. The youth shall be immediately enrolled even if he/she: (Education Code 48853.5) has outstanding fees, fines, textbooks, or other items or monies due to the school last attended or is unable to produce records normally required for enrollment, such as previous academic or medical records, proof of residency, or clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms for enrollment. (Education Code 48853.5)

- 1. Has outstanding fees, fines, textbooks, or other items or monies due to the school last attended.
- 2. Does not have clothing normally required by the school, such as school uniforms.
- 3. Is unable to produce records normally required for enrollment, such as previous academic records, proof of residency, and medical records, including, but not limited to, immunization records or other documentation.

Within two business days of enrollment, the liaison shall contact the school last attended by the student to obtain all academic and other records. Upon receiving a request from a new school, the liaison for the school last attended shall provide all records within two business days of receiving the request. (Education Code 48853.5)

If a parent/guardian or foster youth or the person with the right to make educational decisions for a foster youth disagrees with the liaison's enrollment recommendation, he/she may appeal the decision to the Superintendent. The Superintendent shall make a determination within 30 calendar days of receipt of the appeal. Within 30 calendar days of receipt of the Superintendent's decision, the parent/guardian or foster youth may appeal that decision to the Board. The Board shall consider the issue at its next regularly scheduled meeting. The Board's decision shall be final.

If any dispute arises regarding the request of a foster youth to remain in the school of origin, the youth has the right to remain in the school of origin pending resolution of the dispute. (Education Code 48853.5)

### **Transportation**

The district shall not be responsible for providing transportation to and from the school of origin.

### Transfer of Coursework and Applicability of Graduation Requirements

### **Transfer of Coursework and Credits**

When a foster youth transfers into a district school, the district shall accept and issue full credit for any coursework that the foster youth has satisfactorily completed while attending another public school, a juvenile court school, or a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency and shall not require the foster youth to retake the course. (Education Code 51225.2)

If the foster youth did not complete the entire course, he/she shall be issued partial credit for the coursework completed and shall be required to take the portion of the course that he/she did not complete at his/her previous school. However, the district may require the foster youth to retake the portion of the course completed if, in consultation with the holder of educational rights for the foster youth, the district finds that the foster youth is reasonably abele able to complete the requirements in time to graduate from high school. Whenever partial credit is issued to a foster youth in any particular course, he/she shall be enrolled in the same or equivalent course, if applicable, so that he/she may continue and complete the entire course. (Education Code 51225.2)

Partial credits shall be awarded on the basis of 0.5 credits for every seven class periods attended per subject. If the school is on a block schedule, each block schedule class period shall be equal to two regular class periods per subject. Partial credits and grades earned by a student shall be included on the student's official transcript within two business days of the district's notification of the student's transfer, as required under Education Code 49069.5

In no event shall the district prevent a foster youth from taking or retaking a course to meet the eligibility requirements for admission \( \frac{to}{20} \) the California State University or the University of California. (Education Code 51225.2)

When a foster youth in grade 11 or 12 transfers into the district from another school district or transfers between high schools within the district, he/she shall be exempted from all coursework and other graduation requirements adopted by the Board that are in addition to the statewide coursework requirements specified in Education Code 51225.3 and the high school exit examination, unless the district makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the additional requirements in time to graduate from high school while he/she remains in foster care. (Education Code 51225.3, 60851)

District shall provide notice to foster youth or the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the student exempted from additional district requirements if failure to satisfy such local requirements will affect the pupil's ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution and shall provide information about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges. (Education Code 51225.3).

The Superintendent or designee shall notify any student who is granted an exemption and, as appropriate, the person holding the right to make educational decisions for the student if any of the requirements that are waived will affect the student's ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution and shall provide information about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges. (Education Code 51225.3)

### **Grades/Credits** Effect of Absences on Grades

Grades for a student in foster care shall not be lowered if the student is absent from school due to either of the following circumstances: (Education Code 49069.5)

- A decision by a court or placement agency to change the student's placement, in which
  case the student's grades and credits shall be calculated as of the date the student left
  school
- 2. A verified court appearance or related court-ordered activity

### **Applicability of Graduation Requirements**

To obtain a high school diploma, a foster youth shall pass the high school exit examination in English language and mathematics, complete all courses required by Education Code 51225.3, and fulfill any additional graduation requirements prescribed by the Board.

However, when a foster youth who has completed his/her second year of high school transfers into the district school from another district school or transfers between high schools within the district, he/she shall be exempted from all district-adopted coursework and other district-established graduation requirements, unless the district makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the additional requirements in time to graduate from high school by the end of his/her fourth year of high school. Within 30 calendar days of the foster youth's transfer, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the foster youth, the person holding the right to make educational decisions for him/her, and the foster youth's social worker of the availability of the exemption and whether the foster youth qualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1, 60851)

To determine whether a foster youth is in his/her third or fourth year of high school, the district shall use either the number of credits the foster youth has earned as of the date of the transfer or the length of his/her enrollment, whichever qualifies him/her for the exemption. (Education Code 51225.1)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify any foster youth who is granted an exemption and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for him/her how any requirements that are waived will affect the foster youth's ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution and shall provide information about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges. (Education Code 51225.1)

The district shall not require or request a foster youth to transfer schools in order to qualify for an exemption and no request for a transfer solely to qualify for an exemption shall be made by a foster youth or any person acting on behalf of a foster youth. (Education Code 51225.1)

<u>Upon making a finding that a foster youth is reasonably able to complete district graduation requirements within his/her fifth year of high school, the Superintendent or designee shall:</u> (Education Code 51225.1)

- 1. Inform the foster youth and the person holding the right to make educational decisions for him/her of the foster youth's option to remain in school for a fifth year to complete the district's graduation requirements and how that will affect his/her ability to gain admission to a postsecondary educational institution.
- <u>2. Provide information to the foster youth about transfer opportunities available through the California Community Colleges.</u>
- 3. Upon agreement with the foster youth or, if he/she is under 18 years of age, the person

holding the right to make educational decisions for him/her, permit the foster youth to stay in school for a fifth year to complete the district's graduation requirements.

### **Eligibility for Extracurricular Activities**

A foster youth who changes residences pursuant to a court order or decision of a child welfare worker shall be immediately deemed to meet all residency requirements for participation in interscholastic sports or other extracurricular activities. (Education Code 48850)
