Malibu Boys' and Girls' Club Youth of the Year (Brianna Galeas) and Youth Ambassador for Wellness (Ariana Farrahi) (5)

Community and Public Relations Officer Gail Pinsker introduced Malibu HS senior Brianna Galeas, the 2017 Youth of the Year for the Boys' and Girls' Club in Malibu. Brianna has been a member of the club since she was in the sixth grade. She has earned more than 300 community service hours, is the current Leaders in Training president, and went on a 2015 trip to Hawaii with the organization to help rebuild a B&GC location destroyed by a storm. Ms. Pinsker named the other students who were considered in the final round: Wendy Chachagua, Josue Garcia, Ife Houzell, and Jeffery Navaro.

The Malibu Boys' and Girls' Club also award the newly established Youth Amasser for Wellness Award to Malibu HS senior Ariana Farrahi. As a result of losing her mother when she was in the eighth grade and not feeling like she received adequate or appropriate counseling services, Ariana is a strong believer that young adults who are struggling with loss, trauma, identity, etc., have access to therapeutic and counseling services, especially through the Boys and Girls Club. Ariana was a candidate for the Youth of the Year Award, and while she did not receive that award, she was named the Youth Ambassador for Wellness, a new honor the club established to recognize advocacy efforts.

Malibu Times Dolphin Award Recipients (Dillon Eisman, Ife Houzell, Cooper de Nicola, & Mike Mulligan) (10)

Community and Public Relations Officer Gail Pinsker introduced The Malibu Times Dolphin and Junior Dolphin Award winners:

- Dillon Eisman, a junior at Malibu High School, and one of our Student Board Members. Eisman has made a difference to both his school and his community by being junior class president as well as the founder of the high school's Gay-Straight Alliance (GSA) chapter, which started off with one member and has since grown to 45 members.
- o Ife Houzell, a member of the Boys & Girls Club, who was selected for SMART Girl training, which is a health, fitness, prevention/education and self-esteem enhancement program for girls. She also attended Leaders in Training, learning how to become a volunteer, mentor and/or role model to younger members; and went to summer camp for four years. Ife commutes one hour each way in order to attend MHS.
- Cooper deNicola, is a junior member of the Malibu Task Force on Homelessness, which focuses on raising the money needed by The People Concern (a social service agency based in Santa Monica) to address the needs of homeless individuals in Malibu. So far, they've raised \$300,000, and two full-time outreach workers began working in Malibu last fall.
- Mike Mulligan, who has 31 years of water polo coaching experience, 26 of them at Malibu HS. During his tenure at MHS, he has coached the Sharks to 18 league titles, three CIF runner-up finishes, and one CIF championship. He was also named the California Coaches Association (CCA) 2015-16 Coach of the Year.

XII. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda (the following rules apply to both general public comments as well as comments about a specific agenda item). The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during Public Comments, except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. Individual members of the public who submit a public speaking card prior to the Board hearing an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed three (3) minutes to address the Board on each agenda or nonagenda item, depending on the number of speakers. If there are ten or more speakers on an agenda or nonagenda item, the Board shall limit the allowed time to two (2) minutes per speaker. Individual speakers who submit a public speaking card after the Board begins to hear an agenda item or general public comments shall be allowed one (1) minute to address the Board. A public speaker may yield his/her time to another speaker, but must be present when his/her name is called. The donor would then give up his/her opportunity to speak. The public speaker who receives the donated minutes shall speak for no more than four (4) minutes maximum. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may ask that additional persons speak only if they have something new to add. Individuals represented by a common point of view may be asked to select one individual to speak for the group. The president may, at his/her discretion, allow five (5) minutes for those who are serving as a spokesperson for a group or organization.

These items are submitted by individual board members for information or discussion, as per Board Policy 9322.

XIV. REQUESTS BY MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC OR DISTRICT ADVISORY COMMITTEES TO ADDRESS THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

A member of the public may request that a matter within the jurisdiction of the board be placed on the agenda of a regular meeting, as per Board Policy 9322. The request shall be in writing and be submitted to the superintendent or designee with supporting documents and information, if any, at least <u>one week</u> before the scheduled meeting date. Items submitted less than a week before the scheduled meeting date may be postponed to a later meeting in order to allow sufficient time for consideration and research of the issue. The board president and superintendent shall decide whether a request is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the board. Items not within the subject matter jurisdiction of the board may not be placed on the agenda. In addition, the board president and superintendent shall determine if the item is merely a request for information or whether the issue is covered by an existing policy or administrative regulation before placing the item on the agenda.

It is recommended that the Board of Education adopt the Benchmark Advance ELA-ELD Program (K-5). The board discussed this item on March 2, 2017.

COMMENTS:

Beginning in February 2016, our elementary staff engaged in a yearlong English Language Arts (ELA)/English Language Development (ELD) program adoption process. In preparation for the adoption, Educational Services staff attended sessions to become well informed about the California Department of Education's (CDE) criteria for evaluating K-8 textbooks and instructional materials.

Based on the evaluation criteria described above, the CDE approved ELA-ELD programs and placed them within five categories: *Program 1* Basic ELA; *Program 2* Basic ELA/ELD; *Program 3* Basic Biliteracy; *Program 4* Intensive Intervention; and *Program 5* Specialized ELD. In consideration of the new ELA-ELD framework and our interest in meeting the language and literacy needs of our English Learners through core content and within their classrooms, we considered *Program Two* ELA-ELD instructional materials rather than considering separate ELA and ELD programs. Our district options included five *Program 2* ELA/ELD (K-5) publisher's materials.

An additional district priority in selecting from the list is that the program be available in Spanish to support our Dual-Immersion program. This narrowed our choices to three State-approved publisher's programs.

In March 2016, the three publishers provided an overview of their programs to our elementary ELA-ELD committee, comprised of teachers from every school site. Using an evaluation tool, our teachers further vetted the programs. For example, universal access strategies and materials for diverse student groups including English Learners, students with disabilities and advanced learners were identified and rated. Based on this further vetting, the selection was narrowed down to two ELA-ELD programs- Benchmark Advance and McGraw Hill Wonders.

In May, our literacy coaches recruited teachers across sites to pilot the two remaining programs. From August through December, 32 pilot teachers received program support from trainers and literacy coaches. Through the five-month pilot, we gained great insight into the strengths and challenges of each program.

In the final phase of the adoption process, the pilot teachers synthesized the strengths and challenges of each program and presented their findings to colleagues at their school sites. Once all teachers submitted their votes, one vote per site was submitted. As a result, it is recommended that the Board consider adopting Benchmark Advance ELA-ELD program for elementary.

UNIFIED SCHOOL DITSRICT (SMMUSD) AND CITY OF SANTA MONICA

REGARDING WATER USE AUDITS AND RETROFITS

RECOMMENDATION NO A.12

It is recommended that the Board of Education approve a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the City of Santa Monica to fund water use audits and retrofits as part of the city's Sustainable Water Master Plan.

COMMENTS: On September 13, 2016, the Santa Monica City Council authorized the City Manager to negotiate and execute a memorandum of understanding between the City of Santa Monica and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (SMMUSD) to fund water use audits and retrofits totaling \$300,00 for fiscal year 2016-17 for the initial water audits and retrofit phase of the project with two additional one-year renewal options to complete the prioritized retrofit recommendations totaling \$549,000 in an amount not to exceed \$848,000.

This is one of the key strategies to conserve water outlined in the city's Sustainable Water Master Plan (SWMP) and part of the city's drought response to reach and maintain a 20% water use reduction citywide. The estimated costs to audit the indoor plumbing fixtures and landscaping as well as potential retrofits were based on comparisons to City of Santa Monica facilities and landscapes. The analysis included in the SWMP was based on our school district saving, at minimum, approximately two million gallons of water each year.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

After securing funding from the City in the form of a MOU, SMMUSD will go through a bid process to select a vendor to perform indoor water-use audits and landscape audits on all outdoor irrigation covered by this project. SMMUSD will invoice the City for payment prior to the audits at each location. The selected vendor may also aid in identifying major issues, such as a leaks, and recommend appropriate and immediate actions for mitigation.


Upon completion of the audits, staff from SMMUSD and the City will meet to prioritize the projects that the audit recommends. Once the City approves the project list, SMMUSD can proceed with procuring equipment and/or service providers for installation in the project areas and move forward with the retrofit projects. SMMUSD will provide a report of completed projects. Finally, after all retrofit projects have been completed, the City will monitor water savings realized through this major retrofit program at SMMUSD facilities.

SMMUSD/City of Santa Monica Water Department staff responsibilities

- 1. The **City** appropriates a total of \$849,000 for the SMMUSD Audits and Retrofits Program with \$300,000 allocated in FY 2016-17 and \$549,000 in FY2017-18 upon City Council approval.
- 2. **City staff and SMMUSD** will develop a request for proposals for auditing services.
- 3. **City** will provide upfront funding based on cost estimates for **SMMUSD** to hire a vendor(s) to perform indoor water-use and irrigation audits at Santa

- Monica schools and administrative buildings. The selected landscape audit vendor should be a Certified Landscape Irrigation Auditor.
- 4. The audits shall be completed within 6-months of the award of work to the vendor(s).
- 5. Indoor water-use audits shall include the evaluation of water using fixtures and materials including flow rates, leaks, and performance. A detailed audit report of individual fixtures and materials, flow rates, leaks, performance, specific replacement equipment recommendations, potential water savings estimates, and a return on investment must be provided as part of the services.
- 6. The landscape audits should be based on the Irrigation Association Landscape Audit requirements. The vendor must provide a detailed report including an irrigation site map with locations of irrigation equipment, make and model of equipment, performance of equipment, specific replacement equipment recommendations, potential water savings estimates, and a return on investment must be provided as part of the services.
- 7. City may provide up front funding for leak repairs based on estimates of services to be provided.
- 8. **City** will provide funding for City approved water-saving retrofits based on the results of vendor's indoor water-use and landscape audits.
- 9. City and SMMUSD will prioritize the audit-recommended projects.
- 10. **City** approves the audit-recommended projects.
- 11. **SMMUSD** implements their procurement/approval process for equipment and installations.
- 12. **SMMUSD** provides cost estimates to the City for equipment purchasing and installation for pre-approved projects.
- 13. **City pays SMMUSD**, subject to appropriated amounts.
- 14. **City and SMMUSD** meet regularly to discuss project costs, timelines, and issues and resolve issues as quickly as possible.
- 15. **SMMUSD** provides a report at the completion of each project and a final report of all completed projects
- 16. **SMMUSD** shall reimburse the City for any services and/or projects that are not completed within 2-months of Program completion.
- 17. **City staff** provides a detailed report to Council within 3-months of Program completion.
- 18. **The City** tracks ongoing water savings and reports as requested.

IMPACT:

We anticipate that the water audit will provide more potential projects than this grant will cover. However, this will help us to set priorities and develop projects to meet become more sustainable.

This work, unlike most of our projects and funding, is based solely in Santa Monica. We will investigate doing a similar water audit for the Malibu sites. We will approach the Los Angeles County West Basin Water District to see if they have similar grants.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU"), entered into as of FEBWAW 23, 2017 ("Execution Date"), by and between the City of Santa Monica ("City") and the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District"), is made with reference to the following:

RECITALS:

- A. The City is a municipal corporation duly organized and validly existing under the laws of the State of California with the power to carry on its business as it is now being conducted under the statutes of the State of California and the Charter of the City.
- B. District is qualified to do business, and is doing business, in the State of California. The District represents it has the background, knowledge, experience and expertise necessary to perform the pilot project described in this MOU.
- C. The City and District now desire to enter into this memorandum of understanding with respect to an audit of both indoor and outdoor water devices and materials within the District's campuses and administrative facilities throughout Santa Monica and subsequent retrofit of said devices and materials.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed by and between the undersigned parties as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. Term. This MOU begins on the Execution Date and terminate one year thereafter ("Term"), unless sooner terminated in accordance with Section 14 or as extended by the City in its sole discretion.
 - 1.1. Options to Renew. Upon the expiration of the Term, the City shall have, at its sole and absolute discretion, two options to extend the Term by additional one year periods. The City will notify the District of the exercise of the option, if any, through written letter sent by the City Manager or his/her designee.
- 2. Project. The City and the District seek to perform a water audit on District property and, based on the results, replace existing water-related hardware and materials with more efficient hardware and materials to reduce the District's water consumption as more fully set forth in the proposal attached hereto as Exhibit A ("Project Scope").
- 3. Responsibilities.
 - 3.1 The District shall be responsible for all of the tasks set forth in the Project Scope, including, but not limited to: hiring a landscape auditor, invoicing City for any costs associated with the landscape audit, collaborating with City on prioritization of projects based on the landscape and interior audits, hiring installers to retrofit irrigation equipment and indoor water fixtures and water-

- related materials, invoicing City for the costs of these installations, and providing a report to the City after each project has been completed.
- 3.2 The District shall implement such tasks in accordance with applicable law.
- 3.3 From time to time, the parties may modify the Project Scope pursuant to written amendment executed by the parties.
- 3.4 The City, in its proprietary capacity through the Division of the Office of Sustainability and the Environment, shall have the right of approval of the location of retrofit projects, details regarding the retrofit projects, and other aspects of the Project Scope.
- 3.5 The City and District will mutually cooperate with each other in connection with the implementation of the Project.
- 4. Project Costs. The City has budgeted the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000) for the costs of the initial water audit and retrofit phase of the Project during the Term. The City and District agree that all invoicing and payments for this Project will be in accordance with Exhibit A (Project Scope).
 - 4.1 Option Periods. Subject to budgetary appropriation by the City Council, acting in its sole and absolute discretion, the City may fund up to Five Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$549,000) for additional costs of the Project as set forth in the Project Scope during the option periods.
 - 4.2 Total Amount Not-To-Exceed. For all of the costs of the Project during the Term and both option periods, the total amount of the Project costs shall not exceed the sum of Eight-Hundred Forty-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$849,000).
- 5. Notices. All notices, demands, requests or approvals to be given under this Agreement, must be in writing and will be deemed served when delivered personally, by email, or on the third business day after deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, registered or certified, addressed as follows:
 - 5.1 All notices, demands, requests or approvals to the City:

5.2 All notices, demands, requests or approvals to DISTRICT:

Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District 1651 16th Street Santa Monica, California 90404 Attention: Terance Venable, Manager of Building & Grounds, Purchasing Director Re: MOU for Water Audit and Retrofit

- 6. Independent Parties. Both parties to this Agreement will be acting in an independent capacity and not as agents, employees, partners, or joint venturers of one another. Neither the City nor its officers or employees will have any control over the conduct of District or any of District's agents, employees, or subconsultants, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement.
- 7. Integrated Contract. This Agreement represents the full and complete understanding of every kind or nature whatsoever between the parties. Any preliminary negotiations and agreements of any kind or nature are merged into this Agreement. No oral agreement or implied covenant may be held to vary the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement may be modified only by written agreement signed by City and District, and approved as to form by the City Attorney.
- 8. Insurance. Prior to commencing work or tasks set forth in this Agreement, District must procure, maintain and pay for insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damage to property that may arise from or in connection with the performance of such work or tasks by District or District's agents, representatives, employees or subconsultants for the duration of this Agreement. District must obtain insurance that, at a minimum, meets the requirements for insurance set forth in Exhibit B, Insurance Requirements and Verifications.
 - 8.1 Subcontractor Insurance. Prior to the commencement of any work by the District's subcontractor, the District shall submit the subcontractor's insurance to the City's Risk Manager for approval.

9. Defense and Indemnification.

9.1 Indemnification. As to District's actions and tasks under this Agreement, District agrees to defend, indemnify, protect, and hold harmless the City, its agents, officers, boards and commissions, and employees (collectively, "City") from and against any and all liability, claims, demands, damages, or costs, including but not limited to attorney's fees, or payments for injury to any person or property (collectively, "Losses") caused or claimed to be caused by the acts, errors and/or omissions of District, or District's employees, agents, officers, volunteers and subconsultants. District's responsibilities under this Section 10.1 include liability arising from, connected with, caused by, or claimed to be caused by the active or passive negligent acts or omissions of the City, which may be in combination with the acts or omissions of District, its employees, agents or officers, or subconsultants; provided, however, that District's duty to defend, indemnify, protect and hold harmless shall not include any Losses arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City. Notwithstanding District's obligation to defend City hereunder, City has

- the right to conduct its own defense and seek reimbursement for reasonable costs of defense from District, if City chooses to do so.
- 9.2 Enforcement Costs. District agrees to pay any and all costs the City incurs enforcing the indemnity, defense and hold harmless provisions set forth in Section 10.1.
- 10. Prohibition Against Transfers. District may not assign, hypothecate, or transfer this Agreement or any interest therein directly or indirectly, by operation of law or otherwise without the prior written consent of City. Any attempt to do so without the City's consent will be null and void, and any assignee, hypothecatee or transferee acquires no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.
- 11. Permits and Licenses. District, at its sole expense, must obtain and maintain during the term of this Agreement all required business and professional permits, licenses and certificates, and other regulatory approvals for the activities and tasks set forth in this MOU.
- 12. Waiver. A waiver of any breach of this Agreement may not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition of this Agreement.

13. Default and Termination.

- 13.1 If District fails or refuses to perform any of the provisions of this Agreement, and if the default is not cured within a period of five days after the City's written notice of default specifying the nature of the default, City may immediately terminate this Agreement by written notice to District.
- 13.2 The City and the District each have the option, at its sole discretion and without cause, of terminating this Agreement by giving ten days' written notice to the other.
- 14. Compliance with Law. District must comply with all laws of the State of California and the United States, and all ordinances, rules, and regulations enacted or issued by City.
- 15. Discrimination. District may not discriminate in the provision of services hereunder because of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, sexual orientation, marital status, AIDS or disability.
- 16. Nuisance. District may not maintain, commit, or permit the maintenance or commission of any nuisance in connection with the performance of services under this Agreement.

17. Records.

- 17.1 District must maintain complete and accurate records with respect to data, results, statistics, photographs, reports, costs, expenses, receipts and other such information required by the City in connection with the Project. District must keep the records, together with supporting documents, separate from other documents and records and maintain them for a period of three years after expiration of this Agreement.
- 17.2 District must maintain records in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of the Project and in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles with respect to the costs of the Project. District must clearly identify all records and make them readily accessible to the City. At the City's request, District must provide records in an electronic format and, if necessary, access to any proprietary software to view such electronic records.

18. Work Product; Reports.

- 18.1 Any work product prepared or caused to be prepared by District or any subconsultant for this Agreement will be jointly owned by both the City and District. No work product given to or prepared by District or any subconsultant pursuant to this Agreement may be made available to any individual or organization by District without prior written approval by City.
- 18.2 At the City's request, District must furnish reports concerning the status of the Tasks.
- 19. Standard of Care. District agrees that all actions and tasks, including services performed by any subconsultant, will be performed in a manner consistent with the level of care and skill ordinarily exercised by members of District's profession currently practicing in the same locality under similar conditions.

20. Subconsultants and Subcontractors.

- 20.1 If District proposes to engage any other subconsultant or subcontractor to perform any part of the Project Scope, District must submit a request for approval in writing, describing the scope of work to be subcontracted, the name of the proposed subconsultant and subcontractor. The City, in its sole discretion, may grant or deny the request.
- 20.2 District will be responsible for the quality of any subconsultant/subcontractor's work. Every subcontract or agreement of any kind entered into between District and any subconsultant/subcontractor (or between any subconsultant and others) must contain the following provision:

- 21. Governing Law. The laws of the State of California, without regard to any choice of law provisions, will govern this Agreement.
- 22. Venue and Jurisdiction. The City and District agree that the Services will take place in Los Angeles County. Any litigation arising out of this Agreement may only be brought in either the United States District Court, Central District of California, or the Superior Court of California, County of Los Angeles, West District, as appropriate. The parties agree that venue exists in either court, and each party expressly waives any right to transfer to another venue. The parties further agree that either court will have personal jurisdiction over the parties to this Agreement.
- 23. Survival of Provisions and Obligations. Any provision of this Agreement, which by its nature must be exercised after termination of this Agreement, will survive termination and remain effective for a reasonable time. Any obligation that accrued prior to termination of this Agreement will survive termination of this Agreement.
- 24. Exhibits. The following exhibits are incorporated by reference into this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.

OVERVIEW

Southern California has been in a state of unprecedented drought for several years now, which has increased the urgency for improved water conservation methods and programs. In addition, the City of Santa Monica (City), through its Sustainable Water Master Plan (SWMP), has established the goal of becoming water self-sufficient by the year 2020. In an effort to meet these goals and respond to the drought, the City has performed analysis on water use throughout Santa Monica and has identified specific businesses and organization that would receive the greatest benefit from updating their water conservation practices. The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District (SMMUSD) is one such entity. Subject to budgetary appropriation by the City Council, acting in its sole and absolute discretion, the City will make up to \$849,000 available to the SMMUSD to reduce water usage across many of their campuses and administrative buildings throughout the City of Santa Monica.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

After securing funding from the City in the form of a MOU, SMMUSD will go through a bid process to select a vendor to perform indoor water-use audits and landscape audits on all outdoor irrigation covered by this project. SMMUSD will invoice the City for payment prior to the audits at each location. The selected vendor may also aid in identifying major issues, such as a leaks, and recommend appropriate and immediate actions for mitigation.

Upon completion of the audits, staff from SMMUSD and the City will meet to prioritize the projects that the audit recommends. Once the City approves the project list, SMMUSD can proceed with procuring equipment and/or service providers for installation in the project areas and move forward with the retrofit projects. SMMUSD will provide a report of completed projects. Finally, after all retrofit projects have been completed, the City will monitor water savings realized through this major retrofit program at SMMUSD facilities.

TASKS

- 1. The City appropriates a total of \$849,000 for the SMMUSD Audits and Retrofits Program with \$300,000 allocated in FY 2016-17 and \$549,000 in FY2017-18 upon City Council approval.
- City staff and SMMUSD will develop a request for proposals for auditing services.
- 3. City will provide upfront funding based on cost estimates for SMMUSD to hire a vendor(s) to perform indoor water-use and irrigation audits at Santa Monica schools and administrative buildings. The selected landscape audit vendor should be a Certified Landscape Irrigation Auditor.
- 4. The audits shall be completed within 6-months of the award of work to the vendor(s).
- 5. Indoor water-use audits shall include the evaluation of water using fixtures and materials including flow rates, leaks, and performance. A detailed audit report of individual fixtures and materials, flow rates, leaks, performance, specific replacement equipment recommendations, potential water savings estimates, and a return on investment must be provided as part of the services.
- 6. The landscape audits should be based on the Irrigation Association Landscape Audit requirements. The vendor must provide a detailed report including an irrigation site map with locations of irrigation equipment, make and model of equipment, performance of equipment, specific replacement equipment recommendations, potential water savings estimates, and a return on investment must be provided as part of the services.
- City may provide up front funding for leak repairs based on estimates of services to be provided.
- City will provide funding for City approved water-saving retrofits based on the results of vendor's indoor water-use and landscape audits.
- 9. City and SMMUSD will prioritize the audit-recommended projects.
- 10. City approves the audit-recommended projects.
- 11. SMMUSD implements their procurement/approval process for equipment and installations.
- 12. SMMUSD provides cost estimates to the City for equipment purchasing and installation for pre-approved projects.
- 13. City pays SMMUSD, subject to appropriated amounts.
- 14. City and SMMUSD meet regularly to discuss project costs, timelines, and issues and resolve issues as quickly as possible.

- 15. SMMUSD provides a report at the completion of each project and a final report of all completed projects
- 16. SMMUSD shall reimburse the City for any services and/or projects that are not completed within 2-months of Program completion.
- 17. City staff provides a detailed report to Council within 3-months of Program completion.
- 18. The City tracks ongoing water savings and reports as requested

Estimated Timeline



MOU Insurance Requirements and Verifications

District and its sub-contractors shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property that may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the District, its agents, representatives, employees or sub-contractors.

Minimum Scope and Limits of Insurance

Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL): Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 01 covering CGL on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal and advertising injury, with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- 2. Automobile Liability: Insurance Services Office Form CA 00 01 covering Code 1 (any auto), or if District has no owned autos, Code 8 (hired) and Code 9 (non-owned), with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation: Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits and Employers' Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease (see footnote #1).

If the District and its sub-contractors maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City of Santa Monica requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the District. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City of Santa Monica.

Other Insurance Provisions

- 1. The insurance policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - a. Additional Insured Status (CGL): The City of Santa Monica, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as additional insureds on the CGL policy with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of District including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations. General liability coverage can be provided in the form of an endorsement to the District's insurance at least as broad as Insurance Services Office Form CG 20 10 11 85.

- b. Primary Coverage (CGL and Auto): For any claims related to this Agreement, the District's insurance shall be primary as respects the City of Santa Monica, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the City of Santa Monica, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be in excess of the District's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- c. Notice of Cancellation (all policies): Each insurance policy required herein shall state that coverage shall not be cancelled except after notice has been given to the City of Santa Monica.
- d. Waiver of Subrogation (all policies): District hereby grants to the City of Santa Monica a waiver of any right of subrogation which any insurer of said District may acquire against the City of Santa Monica by virtue of payment of any loss. District agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation, but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the City of Santa Monica has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.

The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City of Santa Monica for all work performed by the District, its employees, agents and sub-contractors.

Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City of Santa Monica. The City of Santa Monica may require the District to purchase coverage with a lower deductible or retention or provide satisfactory proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention.

Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise acceptable to the City of Santa Monica.

Verification of Coverage

District shall furnish the City of Santa Monica with original certificates and amendatory endorsements or copies of the applicable policy language providing the insurance coverage required herein. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the City of Santa Monica before work commences. However, failure to obtain required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the District's obligation to provide them. The City of Santa Monica reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including the endorsements required herein, at any time.

Failure to Maintain Insurance Coverage

If District, for any reason, fails to maintain insurance coverage which is required pursuant to this Agreement, the same shall be deemed a material breach of contract. The City of Santa Monica, at its sole option, may terminate this Agreement and obtain damages from the District resulting from said breach. Alternatively, the City of Santa Monica may purchase such coverage (but has no special obligation to do so), and without further notice to the District, the City may deduct from sums due to the District any premium costs advanced by the City for such insurance.

Sub-contractors

District shall require and verify that all sub-contractors maintain insurance meeting all the requirements stated herein. All exceptions must be approved in writing by the Risk Manager.

Footnotes

1: Workers' Compensation insurance coverage is not required if the District does not have employees. The District must, however, execute the City's Workers' Compensation Coverage Exemption Declaration Form.

The Preschool classroom standard includes the installation of a single projection system, audio enhancement speakers with teacher and student microphones and audio-visual controllers. WHEREAS, pursuant California Public Contract Code section 3400 ("PCC § 3400") and other applicable law, the District wishes to, in specific instances, list and/or designate in its bids or requests for proposals on its public works projects, specific material(s), product(s), thing(s), or service(s); and

WHEREAS, PCC § 3400(c)(2) provides that the District may specify particular material(s), product(s), thing(s), or service(s) in its specifications for bids in connection with the construction, alteration, or repair of public works upon a finding by the District Board that particular material(s), product(s), thing(s), or service(s) are listed for the purpose of matching "other products in use on a particular public improvement either completed or in the course of completion,"; and

WHEREAS, on the District's public works projects, the District desires to list the manufacturer in **Exhibit "A"** as the only acceptable material(s), product(s), thing(s), or service(s) for use on the District's construction projects, because those material(s), product(s), thing(s), or service(s) "match other product(s) in use on other District public improvement(s) either completed or in the course of completion" (PCC § 3400(c)(2)); and

WHEREAS, although PCC § 3400(c)(2) does not require the Board to make specific findings as to why it wishes to match other products in use, the District believes this action is desirable, among other reasons, because:

- The District currently uses Musco lights at three District sites: Malibu Middle/High School, John Adams Middle School, and Santa Monica High School.
- Two of these sites are on service agreements and are tied to a digital monitoring service/panel.
- The District has already incurred costs to train its employees to service and maintain Musco lights and system(s) throughout these three District campuses.
- The ongoing maintenance, repair, and other work that District staff and/or service providers will have to perform on the Musco lights will be simplified, more efficient, and less costly if those persons do not have to service different and varied product(s) and system(s).
- The warranties and guarantees for product(s) and system(s) will be easier to coordinate, track, and call upon in the years to come if they are with the same manufacturers / vendors of the particular product(s) or system(s).
- It would be beneficial for the entire District to reduce District costs by implementing uniform system(s) and installing uniform product(s) throughout the District, facilitating maintenance, engineering and overall reliability.

- The District anticipates future construction, alteration, modernization of existing school sites to, among other things, replace and/or upgrade lighting system(s) at those sites.
- It would be beneficial to the District to have and use uniform parts and materials throughout the system(s) in use at its sites.

Facility Improvement Projects staff seeks to update the Board of Education on the construction projects at Malibu High School as well as update and inform the board and community on the progress and next steps toward the replacement of the Middle School Building (E).

The Malibu High School (MHS) construction project:

- 1. MHS/Cabrillo Interim Housing Project Completed for students to begin the second semester on Jan. 10. 2017. The Project included the purchase, construction and installation of new Sustainable Modular Classrooms at MHS and Juan Cabrillo Elementary School (JCES) along with the infrastructure to operate the relocatables. All classroom use of Middle School Building, the Library, and Computer Lab was moved to interim housing in accordance with schedule mandated by the court.

- 2. New Parking Lot & Partial Building Demolition Project (Phase I & II) In the Consent Agenda, you awarded the contract to Angeles Contractor, Inc. to construct the Phase I & II work at MHS. The \$8.3 million contract was within the advertised bid range of \$8 10M. Phase I will include the construction of the new student parking lot E above the football field. It will begin over Spring Break and is scheduled to be completed during Winter Recess. The District will need to provide some temporary parking during construction. Phase II has many parts leading to abatement of the Library, Administration and Middle School Building E and partial demolition of the Library, Administration and tentative demolition of the Middle School Building E. Middle School Building (E):

The District is moving toward replacing the Middle School Building rather than modernization, as originally planned. The plans for the new GrowthPoint project to replace Building E are currently under review by the Division of the State Architect (DSA). In addition to the approval by DSA, the District must secure the entitlements prior to demolishing the existing building. The following items need to be secured:

1. Approvals

a. Addendum to Environmental Impact Report (EIR) – As part of the Measure BB project, the District completed an environmental review for the entire project which included the modernization of the Middle School Building with an expansion to twelve classroom. As we plan replace to the designed single story, double loaded building with 12 classrooms with the GrowthPoint two story, single loaded building, the Board will need to approve an addendum to the EIR.

An Addendum does not require public hearing or notice similar to an EIR. But, to be open and transparent with our neighbors, we scheduled this public presentation. We noticed the meeting, put out a press release and sent postcards to the neighbors inviting them to attend. We also put up story polls to illustrate the proposed changes to the structure.

The Addendum to the EIR is a Major Action item in this agenda.

- b. Approval in Concept by City of Malibu The Director of Planning will review the plan. As the proposed building is similar to in use to the approved modernization, there is not a need for the Conditional Use Permit to be amended. This approval in concept was requested by Coastal Commission staff.
- c. Amendment to Coastal Develop Permit (CDP) The final step will be the May 10-12 Coastal Commission meeting where we will seek an Amendment to our Coastal Development Permit.

If we can pass these steps, we will be able to abate the Middle School Building and begin demolition during the summer. If we miss this schedule, the demolition will need to either occur during the school year or we would need to return to the plan to modernize the building instead of replacing it.

2. Presentation of Middle School Building Replacement

- a. The Measure BB project planned to expand the Middle School Building from ten classrooms to twelve. Some upgrades and modernization were planned, but did not include window or door replacement. By the time the Measure BB project was ultimately approved by the Coastal Commission, the District determined that it needed to do a complete modernization of the Middle School Building, including windows and doors, to remove potential sources of PCBs. The Malibu Facility Advisory Committee recommended that the District look into a replacement rather than a modernization. They recommended a GrowthPoint structure. We did a study on costs and it was decided by the Board to move toward replacing the Middle School Building with a GrowthPoint structure provided it could be accomplished without delaying the court mandated schedule.
- b. As we contemplated a replacement, it offered an opportunity to change a known issue with the current Middle School Building layout. It is currently a single story building double loaded with classrooms opening up toward the quad and toward the hill away from the campus. The classrooms facing the hill feel as if they are closed off and provide difficulties with supervision. The direction from the site administrators led toward replacing the Middle School Building with a two-story, single loaded building where all classrooms opened toward the quad. While this would increase the height, the footprint would decrease, creating more quad space and the two-story building would complement the new Library/Admin

Building and the existing two story main building (Building D). There would be six classrooms on each floor with an elevator on the ocean side and restrooms on both sides.

- c. Because it is modular construction, made of shipping containers, the GrowthPoint building could be permitted and built/assembled in less time than traditional construction.

DISCUSSION ITEM NO. D.01

This discussion item will allow the Board of Education to learn more about the process related to the recommendation to adopt Secondary summer reading materials. The board will take action on this item on April 20, 2017.

COMMENTS: Assigning summer reading provides continuity for students and is used in our secondary schools as a launch text for classwork when students return in August. Strategies such as philosophical chairs may be incorporated in order for a central topic or question to be explored, similar to a debate, filled with student discourse and text dependent responses.

Each of our secondary schools maintain an English Language Arts (ELA) Professional Learning Community which includes 9-12 grade ELA teachers. During spring semester an Ad Hoc of the ELA PLC is created which is known as the Summer Reading (Advisory) Committee. The committee includes English language arts teachers as well as their school site's librarian. At Santa Monica High School, parents and students are invited to participate and are notified via announcements/newsletters and during PTSA meetings. Santa Monica High School also invites the librarians from the Santa Monica Public library. Similarly, at Malibu High School parents are invited as well as the librarian from the Malibu Public Library. The initial meeting winnows the nominations down and committee members then commit to reading the finalists (typically 2-3 novels). The ad hoc committee discusses the merits and challenges of the novels read. When selecting summer reading, our ELA teachers strive to select novels that will be accessible for independent reading as well as engaging, thought provoking and at times controversial.

An additional criteria for selection of summer reading materials for our secondary schools includes the *SMMUSD Standards for Social Content Rubric*, adapted from the California Department of Education's Standards for Social Content [(Ed Codes EC 50501, 60040(a) 60040(b), 60044(a)]. The standards are of particular interest to our district and include: a) Male and Females Roles; b) Ethnic and Cultural Groups; c) Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity; d) Older Persons and the Aging Process; e) People with Disabilities; and f) Religion. The rubric maintains a three part Likert scale. The Ad Hoc committee reviews the Standards for Social Content and then submits online a completed Social Content survey. Each novel along with signed paperwork requesting board approval is received in Educational Services for additional review, which may include discussion during a Curriculum Council meeting.

In accordance with the Board of Education policy, the selected summer reading materials listed below will be on public display for the next two weeks in the Educational Services Department at 1630-17th Street, Santa Monica, CA 90404.

Feed by M.T. Anderson for summer reading 2017 for all 11th and 12th grade students at Malibu High School. <u>Synopsis:</u> This novel focuses on a teenager in the future, living within a dystopian society. Themes that emerge include environmental decay, data mining, consumerism, and corporate power.

Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe, by B. A. Saenz for summer reading 2017 for all 9th and 10th grade students at Malibu High School. Synopsis: This novel focuses on two teenagers resulting in self-discovery and clarity as to who they truly want to become as adults.

The Martian by A. Weir for all 9th through 12th grade students at Santa Monica High School. <u>Synopsis</u>: This novel focuses on survival, the trials and tribulations and perseverance.

Highly Illogical Behavior by JC Whaley for all 9th through 12th grade students at Santa Monica High School. <u>Synopsis</u>: This novel focuses on mental health issues, teenage friendship and the need for human connections.

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.24

It is recommended that the Board of Education consider appointments to the following district advisory committees (DACs): Early Childcare and Development, Health & Safety, and Visual & Performing Arts. Given the small number of applicants to the other DACs (Intercultural Equity & Excellence and Special Education) by the February 24 deadline, those appointments have been postponed to the April 20, 2017, board meeting.

COMMENT:

The DACs have been in a state of hiatus since September 2, 2015 (<u>Item No. D.01</u>), while the board examined and revised the policy and regulation related to district advisory committees. Those revisions were made on November 16, 2016 (<u>Item Nos. A.22 and I.01</u>).

The superintendent's office sent out a <u>press release</u> on January 30, 2017, soliciting applications to serve on the various DACs. Staff, committee chairs, the PTA council were also asked to spread the word. Reminders were sent out the weeks of February 13 and 20 to PTA leadership and site principals, respectively, encouraging parents and employees to apply. Completed applications were due February 24. As per <u>AR 1220</u>, section F.4, the board liaisons assigned to the committees vetted the applications for recommendation to the whole board for approval.

The following charts show how many openings are on each DAC, the names of applicants recommended for approval by the board liaisons, and where members should be placed on the term expiration chart to maintain a balance of membership. (These rosters were confirmed with the DAC chairs.)

MALIBU MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING E PROJECT

RECOMMENDATION NO. A.25

It is recommended that the Board of Education ("Board") adopt Resolution No. 16-27 to approve the Environmental Impact Report ("EIR") Addendum and Amended Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP") for the option of replacing the Malibu Middle and High School ("MMHS") Building E and approve these changes to the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvement Project.

DISCUSSION:

The Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District ("District") developed and approved the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvement Project, which consisted of campus-wide renovations and improvements ("Original Project"). The Original Project included interior renovations of the single-story Building E, including the modernization of 10 classrooms and construction of two new classrooms. On February 2, 2012, the District certified the "Original EIR" and adopted the MMRP for the Original Project.

Due to community and City of Malibu's desire to replace Building E, the District revised the Original Project to include the option of replacing Building E at the same location with a new two-story classroom building containing the same number of classrooms, 12, as the Original Project ("Revised Project"). The Revised Project also includes two exterior stairs, and an entry with an elevator with associated exterior courtyards. The option to replace Building E would increase its height, but the overall building footprint would decrease. Once the Revised Project was developed, the District engaged Placeworks to conduct environmental review of the Revised Project under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA").

Section 15164(b) of the "CEQA Guidelines" (Title 14, Cal. Code of Regs., § 15000 et seq.) authorizes a lead agency to prepare an addendum to an EIR "if only minor technical changes or additions are necessary or none of the conditions described in Section 15162 calling for preparation of a subsequent EIR have occurred." Section 15162 does not require a subsequent EIR where the proposed changes would not create a new significant environmental impact or substantially increase the severity of a significant environmental impact disclosed in a previous EIR.

Here, Placeworks determined that the Revised Project would be a minor change that would not cause any new significant environmental impacts or substantially increase the severity of significant environmental impacts disclosed in the Original EIR. Thus, the Revised Project does not cause any of the conditions in CEQA Guidelines section 15162 calling for the preparation of a subsequent EIR and the appropriate environmental document as authorized by CEQA Guidelines section 15164(b) is an addendum. Accordingly, an EIR Addendum ("Addendum") and amended MMRP has been prepared. The Addendum describes the changed components of the Revised Project in detail, analyzes impact changes, and demonstrates that the Revised Project with the amended MMRP will not create any new significant environmental impacts or substantially increase the severity of those significant environmental impacts disclosed in the Original EIR.

The Addendum was transmitted to the Board earlier this week, as soon as it was available in its final form. Should the Board adopt the Resolution, the Revised Project will be approved and District staff will file a Notice of Determination with the Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse and submit an application for a Coastal Development Permit amendment with the Coastal Commission.

Due to the final version of the addendum not being ready for the board to review prior to the board meeting, staff recommended that the board discuss this item and hear public comments, if any, and postpone action to a special meeting scheduled for March 23, 2017.

The board members asked questions regarding the details of the amendment to the EIR.

WHEREAS, on February 2, 2012, the Santa-Monica Malibu Unified School District's ("District") Board of Education ("Board") adopted Resolution 11-06, that certified the Final Environmental Impact Report ("Original EIR") and approved a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP") and the Malibu Middle and High School Campus Improvement Project ("Original Project") consisting of campus-wide renovations and construction;

WHEREAS, the Original Project included interior renovations of the single-story Building E, including the modernization of 10 classrooms and construction of two new classrooms;

WHEREAS, due to the desires of the community and City of Malibu, the District added an option to the Original Project to replace Building E with a new two-story classroom building containing the same number of classrooms, 12, as the Original Project, and also includes two exterior stairs, and an entry with an elevator tower with associated exterior courtyards (the "Revised Project");

WHEREAS, the Revised Project will be located within the same location, but the height of Building E will increase;

WHEREAS, the District, as lead agency, caused to be prepared, pursuant to the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (Public Resources Code, § 21000 et seq. "CEQA") and the CEQA Guidelines (Title 14, Cal. Code of Regs., § 15000 et seq. the "CEQA Guidelines"), an EIR Addendum ("Addendum") and amended MMRP;

WHEREAS, the Addendum describes the changed components of the Revised Project, analyzes impact changes, and concludes that with the amended MMRP no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur and there would not be a substantial increase in the severity of significant environmental impacts disclosed in the Original EIR as a result of the Revised Project;

WHEREAS, since no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur and there would not be a substantial increase in the severity of significant impacts disclosed in the Original EIR as a result of the Revised Project, the preparation of a subsequent EIR is not required; and

WHEREAS, the Addendum and amended MMRP was prepared per and in accordance with CEQA and the CEQA Guidelines.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education ("Board") hereby finds as follows:

- 1. That the above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. That no new significant environmental impacts are anticipated to occur and there would not be a substantial increase in the severity of significant impacts disclosed in

the Original EIR as a result of the Revised Project, as disclosed in the Addendum and amended MMRP, and the Addendum is the appropriate subsequent environmental document for the Revised Project.

- 3. That the Board has reviewed and considered the Addendum and amended MMRP prior to deciding whether to approve the Addendum, amended MMRP, and Revised Project.
- 4. That the Addendum, its reference documents, amended MMRP, the staff report, this Resolution, and the whole of the record of proceedings wholly reflect the Board's independent judgment and analysis.
- 5. The requirements of CEQA have been fulfilled for the Revised Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby approves the Addendum and amended MMRP.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby approves the Revised Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Associate Superintendent, Janece L. Maez, is the custodian of the documents and other materials which constitute the record of proceedings upon which the Board's decision is based. The record of proceedings shall be maintained at the District's offices located at 1651 Sixteenth Street, Santa Monica, California 90404.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Associate Superintendent is authorized and directed to file a Notice of Determination with Los Angeles County Clerk and the State Clearinghouse within five days of the adopted Resolution.

RE: REVISION TO AR 6174 – EDUCATION FOR ENGLISH LEARNERS

INFORMATION ITEM NO. I.01

This is to inform the Board of Education that AR 6174 - Education For English Learners has been revised.

COMMENTS: The regulation specifies criteria used to determine when an English Learner is ready to be reclassified as fluent English proficient. A decision to reclassify requires district staff to determine that the English Learner is now able to progress on par with his/her English-only peer. For this reason, the fourth criteria will be revised to "...the student is performing at or near grade level."

The fourth criteria will be revised to "at grade level," removing "or near."

The following measures shall be used to determine whether an English language learner shall be reclassified as fluent English proficient: (Education Code 313; 5 CCR 11303)

- Assessment of English language proficiency using an objective assessment instrument, including, but not limited to, the state's English language proficiency assessment
- Participation of the student's classroom teacher and any other certificated staff with direct responsibility for teaching or placement decisions related to the student
- Parent/guardian opinion and consultation
 The Superintendent or designee shall provide the parent/guardian with
 notice and a description of the reclassification process, including notice of
 their right to participate in the process. Parent/guardian participation in
 the process shall be encouraged.
- 4. Student performance on an objective assessment of basic skills in English assessment that shows whether the student is performing at ernear grade level

The board discussed these changes at the March 2, 2017, board meeting.

Definitions

English learner, also known as a limited English proficient student, means a student who does not speak English or whose native language is not English and who is not currently able to perform ordinary classroom work in English. (Education Code 306)

Long-term English learner means an English learner who is enrolled in grades 6-12, has been enrolled in schools in the United States for more than six years, has remained at the same English language proficiency level for two or more consecutive years as determined by the California English Language Development Test (CELDT) or any successor test, and scores far below basic or below basic on the English language arts test of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CASPP). (Education Code 313.1)

English learner at risk of becoming a long-term English learner means an English learner who is enrolled in grades 5-11 in the United States for four years, scores at the intermediate level or below on the CELDT or any successor test, and scores in the fourth year at the below basic or far below basic level on the English language arts test of the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CASPP) (Education Code 313.1)

English language classroom means a classroom in which the language of instruction used by the teaching personnel is overwhelmingly the English language, and in which such teaching personnel possess a good knowledge of the English language. (Education Code 306)

English language mainstream classroom means a classroom in which the students either are native English language speakers or already have acquired reasonable fluency in English. (Education Code 306)

Structured English immersion means an English language acquisition process in which nearly all classroom instruction is in English but with the curriculum and presentation designed for students who are learning the language. (Education Code 306)

Bilingual education/native language instruction means a language acquisition process for students in which much or all instruction, textbooks, and teaching materials are in the student's native language. (Education Code 306)

Identification and Assessment

Upon enrollment in the district, each student's primary language shall be determined through use of a home language survey. (5 CCR 11307)

Any student who is identified as having a primary language other than English as determined by the home language survey, and who has not been previously identified as an English learner by a California public school or for whom there is no record of results from an administration of an English language proficiency test shall be assessed for English proficiency using the state's designated English language proficiency test. (Education Code 313, 52164.1; 5 CCR 11511)

Each year after a student is identified as an English learner and until he/she is redesignated as English proficient, the summative assessment shall be administered to the student during a four-month period after January 1 as determined by the California Department of Education. (Education Code 313)

The state assessment shall be administered in accordance with test publisher instructions and 5 CCR 11511-11516.7. Variations and accommodations in test administration may be provided pursuant to 5 CCR 11516-11516.7. Any student with a disability shall be allowed to take the assessment with those accommodations for testing that the student has regularly used during instruction and classroom assessment as delineated in the student's individualized education program (IEP) or Section 504 plan that are appropriate and necessary to address the student's individual needs. If he/she is unable to participate in the assessment or a portion of the assessment with such accommodations, he/she shall be administered an alternate assessment for English language proficiency as set forth in his/her IEP. (5 CCR 11516-11516.7)

Parental Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the following written notifications to parents/guardians of English learners:

- Assessment Notification: The district shall notify parents/guardians of their child's results on the state's English language proficiency assessment within 30 calendar days following receipt of the results from the test contractor. (Education Code 52164.1; 5 CCR 11511.5)
- 2. Placement Notification: At the beginning of each school year, parents/guardians shall be informed of the placement of their child in a structured English immersion program and shall be notified of an opportunity to apply for a parental exception waiver. (Education Code 310; 5 CCR 11309)
- 3. Title III Notifications: Each parent/guardian of a student participating in, or identified for participation in, a language instruction program supported by federal Title III funds shall receive notification of the assessment of his/her child's English proficiency. Such notice shall be provided not later than 30 calendar days after the beginning of the school year or, if the student is identified for program participation during the school year, within two weeks of the student's placement in the program. The notice shall include all of the following: (Education Code 440: 20 USC 7012)
 - a. The reason for the student's classification as English language learner
 - b. The level of English proficiency, how the level was assessed, and the status of the student's academic achievement
 - c. A description of the program for English language development instruction, including a description of all of the following:
 - (1) The manner in which the program will meet the educational strengths and needs of the student
 - (2) The manner in which the program will help the student develop his/her English proficiency and meet age-appropriate academic standards
 - (3) The specific exit requirements for the program, the expected rate of transition from the program into classrooms not tailored for English language learner students, and the expected rate of graduation from secondary school schools if applicable
 - (4) Where the student has been identified for special education, the manner in which the program meets the requirements of the student's IEP

- (5) Information regarding a parent/guardian's option to decline to allow the student to become enrolled in the program or to choose to allow the student to become enrolled in an alternative program
- (6) Information designed to assist a parent/guardian in selecting among available programs, if more than one program is offered
- 4. Annual Measurable Objectives Notification: If the district fails to make progress on the annual measurable achievement objectives for English learners established pursuant to 20 USC 6842, the Superintendent or designee shall, within 30 days after such failure occurs, send a notification regarding such failure to the parents/guardians of each student identified for participation in a language instruction educational program supported by Title III funds. (20 USC 7012)

Parental Exception Waivers

A parent/guardian may, by personally visiting the school, request that the district waive the requirements pertaining to the placement of a student in a structured English immersion program if one of the following circumstances exists: (Education Code 310-311)

- 1. The student already possesses sufficient English language skills, as measured by standardized tests of English vocabulary comprehension, reading and writing, in which the student scores at or above the state average for his/her grade level or at or above the fifth-grade average, whichever is lower.
- 2. The student is age 10 years or older, and it is the informed belief of the school principal and educational staff that an alternate course of study would be better suited to the student's rapid acquisition of basic English skills.
- 3. The student already has been placed, for a period of not less than 30 calendar days during that school year, in an English language classroom and it is subsequently the informed belief of the school principal and educational staff that the student has special physical, emotional, psychological or educational needs and that an alternate course of educational study would be better suited to the student's overall educational development.

Upon request for a waiver, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/ guardians with a full written description, and a spoken description upon request, of the intent and content of the structured English immersion program, any alternative courses of study and all educational opportunities offered by the district and available to the student, and the educational materials to be used in the different educational program choices. For a request for waiver pursuant to, item #3 above for students with special needs the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian that the student must be placed for a period of not less than 30 calendar days in an English language classroom and that the waiver that the Superintendent or designee must approve the waiver pursuant to Board of Education guidelines (Education Code 310, 311; 5 CCR 11309)

The principal and educational staff may recommend a waiver to a parent/guardian pursuant to item #2 or #3 above, for a student 10 years or older and a student with special needs. Parents/guardians shall be informed in writing of any recommendation for an alternative program made by the principal and staff and shall be given notice of their right to refuse to accept the recommendation. The notice shall include a full description of the recommended alternative program and the educational materials to be used for the alternative program as well as a description of all other programs available to the student. If the parent/guardian elects to

request the alternative program recommended by the principal and educational staff, the parent/guardian shall comply with district procedures and requirements otherwise applicable to a parental exception waiver, including Education Code 310. (Education Code 311; 5 CCR 11309)

When evaluating waiver requests pursuant to item #1 above, for students who already know English and other waiver requests for those students for whom standardized assessment data are not available, other equivalent assessment measures may be used. These equivalent measures may include district standards and assessments and teacher evaluations of such students.

Parent/guardian exception waivers pursuant to item #2 above, for students 10 years or older shall be granted by the Superintendent or designee if it is the informed belief of the principal and educational staff that an alternate course of educational study would be better suited to the student's rapid acquisition of basic English language skills. (Education Code 311)

Parent/guardian exception waivers pursuant to item #3 above, for students with special needs shall be granted by the Superintendent or designee if it is the informed belief of the principal and educational staff that, due to the student's special physical, emotional, psychological or educational needs, an alternate course of educational study would be better suited to the student's overall educational development. (Education Code 311)

The principal or designee shall act upon all parent/guardian exception waivers within 20 instructional days of submission to the principal. However, parental waiver requests pursuant to item #3 above for students with special needs, shall not be acted upon during the 30-day placement in an English language classroom. Such waivers shall be acted upon no later than 10 calendar days after the expiration of that 30-day English language classroom placement or within 20 instructional days of submission of the waiver to the principal, whichever is later. (5 CCR 11309)

All parent/guardian exception waivers shall be granted unless the principal and educational staff have determined that an alternative program offered at the school would not be better suited for the overall educational development of the student. (5 CCR 11309)

Individual schools in which 20 students or more of a given grade level receive a waiver shall offer an alternative class where the students are taught English and other subjects through bilingual education techniques or other generally recognized educational methodologies permitted by law. Otherwise, the students shall be allowed to transfer to a public school in which such a class is offered. (Education Code 310)

Students wishing to transfer shall be subject to the district's intradistrict and interdistrict attendance policies and administrative regulations. Students wishing to transfer to another district shall also be subject to the receiving district's interdistrict attendance policies and administrative regulations.

In cases where a parent/guardian exception waiver pursuant to item #2 or #3 above, the parent/guardian shall be informed in writing of the reason(s) for the denial and advised that he/she may appeal the decision to the Board if the Board authorizes such an appeal, or to the court. (5 CCR 11309)

Waiver requests shall be renewed annually by the parent/quardian. (Education Code 310)

Reclassification/Redesignation

The district shall continue to provide additional and appropriate educational services to English

language learners for the purposes of overcoming language barriers until the English language learners: (5 CCR 11302)

- 1. Demonstrate English language proficiency comparable to that of the district's average native English language speakers
- 2. Recoup any academic deficits which may have been incurred in other areas of the core curriculum as a result of language barriers

English language learners shall be reclassified as fluent English proficient when they are able to comprehend, speak, read and write English well enough to receive instruction in an English language mainstream classroom and make academic progress at a level substantially equivalent to that of students of the same age or grade whose primary language is English and who are in the regular course of study. (Education Code 52164.6)

The following measures shall be used to determine whether an English language learner shall be reclassified as fluent English proficient: (Education Code 313; 5 CCR 11303)

- 1. Assessment of English language proficiency using an objective assessment instrument, including, but not limited to, the state's English language proficiency assessment
- 2. Participation of the student's classroom teacher and any other certificated staff with direct responsibility for teaching or placement decisions related to the student
- 3. Parent/guardian opinion and consultation
 - The Superintendent or designee shall provide the parent/guardian with notice and a description of the reclassification process, including notice of their right to participate in the process. Parent/guardian participation in the process shall be encouraged.
- 4. Student performance on an objective assessment of basic skills in English assessment that shows whether the student is performing at or near grade level

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor the progress of reclassified students to ensure their correct classification and placement. (5 CCR 11304)

The Superintendent or designee shall monitor students for at least two years following their reclassification to determine whether the student needs any additional academic support to ensure his/her language and academic success.

Advisory Committees

At the district level when there are more than 50 English language learners in the district and at each school with more than 20 English language learners, parent/guardian advisory committees shall be maintained to serve the advisory functions specified in law. (5 CCR 11308)

Parents/guardians of English language learners shall constitute committee membership in at least the same percentage as their children represent of the total number of students in the school. (Education Code 52176)

The district's English language advisory committee shall advise the Board on at least the following tasks: (5 CCR 11308)

1. The development of a district master plan of education programs and services for English learners, taking into consideration the school site plans for English learners

- 2. The districtwide needs assessment on a school-by-school basis
- 3. Establishment of a district program, goals and objectives for programs and services for English learners
- 4. Development of a plan to ensure compliance with applicable teacher or aide requirements
- 5. Administration of the annual language census
- 6. Review of and comment on the district's reclassification procedures
- 7. Review of and comments on the written notification required to be sent to parents/guardians pursuant to 5 CCR 11300-11316

In order to assist advisory members in carrying out their responsibilities, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that committee members receive appropriate training and materials. This training shall be planned in full consultation with the members. (5 CCR 11308)

LCAP Advisory Committee

When there are at least 15 percent English learners in the district, with at least 50 students who are English learners, a district-level English learner parent advisory committee shall be established to review and comment on the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP) in accordance with BP 0460 - Local Control and Accountability Plan. The committee shall be composed of a majority of parents/guardians of English learners. (Education Code 52063; 5 CCR 15495)

The advisory committee established pursuant to 5 CCR 11308, as described in the section "Advisory Committee" above, could serve as the LCAP English learner advisory committee if its composition includes a majority of parents/guardians of English learners.
