A special meeting of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education was held on Saturday, February 9, 2013, in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA. The Board of Education called the meeting to order at 8:42 a.m.

II. BUDGET WORKSHOP

As the District receives information regarding the State budget, as it relates to the development of our budget, Staff will regularly update the Board. These updates will be scheduled at each regular meeting of the Board as well as at this budget workshop until the District budget is adopted in June. These updates may include: new statewide projections, proposed changes to the district budget, enrollment projections, staffing ratios, and other budget-related details.

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The presentation and budget priority survey results are attached.

Ms. Maez explained the details of the Governor's new school funding model, called the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), including the base grant, two supplemental grants, and the funding formula. Considering one of the two supplemental grants is based on the number of students participating in the Free and Reduced Meal Program, Dr. Escarce wondered if there were strategies to help ensure the more families take advantage of the program.

Ms. Maez projected an interactive Excel sheet to run budget scenarios. Ms. Lyon emphasized the need for each department and school site to examine its duties/programs, determine whether or not those duties/programs are effective or still required, how many people perform those duties or are involved in those programs, and where a 2% reduction can be made. The list of across-the-district reductions will be reviewed by all managers.

Dr. Deloria presented information on the budget priority workshops that staff and parents participated in during November 2012 and the subsequent surveys they completed. About 150-160 people attended the workshops in total, and about one third responded to the anonymous online survey. The results of the budget priority surveys will be shared with principals and managers during their conversations about the 2% across-the-district reductions.

Senior staff answered board member questions regarding whether or not Proposition 98 would be affected by the Governor's new school funding model; if the legislature was

considering lowering the passage threshold for parcel taxes from 2/3; the effects federal budget sequestration would have on local schools; employer contributions to PERS and STRS pensions; how outside funding for personnel would be affected by centralized fundraising; and how some departments' budgets encroach onto the district's general fund.

Ms. Maez summarized the next steps for budget planning for 2013-14. Ms. Lyon reported that Dr. Kelly would be coming forward at a future board meeting with the policy regarding interdistrict permit applications. Dr. Escarce requested that that discussion include an update on the two extra kindergarten classes that were added this year.

Mr. Allen commended staff, especially Ms. Maez, in pulling this comprehensive information together in a very short amount of time. Ms. Lyon also thanked Dr. Deloria and Ms. Washington for conducting the pathway budget priority meetings and compiling the survey information.

II. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Public Comments is the time when members of the audience may address the Board of Education on items not scheduled on the meeting's agenda. All speakers are limited to three (3) minutes. When there is a large number of speakers, the Board may reduce the allotted time to two (2) minutes per speaker. The Brown Act (Government Code) states that Board members may not engage in discussion of issues raised during "VIII. Public Comments" except to ask clarifying questions, make a brief announcement, make a brief report on his or her own activities, or to refer the matter to staff. This Public Comment section is limited to twenty (20) minutes. If the number of persons wishing to address the Board of Education exceeds the time limit, additional time will be provided in **Section XVI. CONTINUATION OF PUBLIC COMMENTS.**

V. ADJOURNMENT

It was moved by Mr. Patel, seconded by Dr. Escarce, and voted 5/0 (Ms. Lieberman and Mr. de la Torre were absent) to adjourn the special meeting at 11:17 a.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be on **Thursday, February 21, 2013**, at 5:30 p.m. in the District Administrative Offices: 1651 16th Street, Santa Monica, CA.

Governor's Proposed 2013-14 Budget

- **On January 17th staff presented information about the Governor's proposed 2013-14 State Budget**
- **The good news was that for the first time in five years, education funding is expected to go up on a per-student basis**
- **Staff also described how fragile the national and state economies were and how that could change the fiscal picture for schools in California**
- **An outline of the Governor's Local Control Funding Formula was also presented**

SMMUSD Revenue Assumptions

- District enrollment 11401
- State Funding
 - Revenue Limit funding at \$5,407.32/student ADA after a 22.272% **deficit**
 - Lottery Funds are projected to be \$155/ADA
 - Tier III Flexibility is \$4.4 million
- Federal Funding
 - No increases/reductions have been projected
- Local Funding
 - Measure R Parcel Tax is estimated at \$11.2 million
 - Prop Y is estimated at \$6.56 million
 - Cities of Santa Monica and Malibu contribute \$8.4 million
 - Lease revenue is estimated at \$2.3 million

Local Control Funding Formula

- Calculated by grade level K-3, 4-6, 7-8 and 9-12
- Begin with Base Grant amounts by grade level
- Add to the Base Grant a Differential Amount for K-3 and 9-12 (CSR and CTE)
- Add an additional 35% above the Base Grant for every student eligible for Free and Reduced, ELD and Foster Care (Unduplicated)
- Compare this entitlement to the current Revenue Limit Calculation plus CSR, EIA and Tier III
- The difference is funded at 10% in the 2013-14 fiscal year

Budget Reductions

- Staff has been asked to examine their individual site or department budgets and identify a minimum of 2% in ongoing reduction
- The total amount expected to be reduced will be approximately \$2.0 million
- Additionally, Senior Cabinet plans to conduct an operational efficiency study and identify additional reductions

Pathway Budget Meetings and Survey

- A webinar was presented by Superintendent Lyon and CFO Maez on November 2, 2012 to begin the 2013-14 Budget season
- Throughout November , Asst. Superintendents Deloria and Washington lead Budget Pathway meetings
- Participation included site administrators, teachers, classified staff and parents
- Each group was asked to develop priority lists to assist in the budget development
- A survey document was developed to gain additional input and rank the priorities identified during the meetings
- Asst. Superintendent Deloria will present the results of that survey

Next Steps

- Follow the legislative activity and monitor the progress of the Governor's budget
- Meet and work with site administrators and department to identify reductions
- Provide regular Board updates at BOE meetings
- Prepare and present a preliminary budget at the June 6th BOE meeting
- Conduct a public hearing prior the budget adoption at the June 26th BOE meeting
