Alternative Pathway to High School Diploma



#### **What It Means**

A student who has completed the minimum coursework (based on the alternate achievement standards) for a high school diploma and takes the California Alternative Assessment (CAA). These students may attend through their 22<sup>nd</sup> birthday even though they have received a diploma.

#### **Graduation Requirements**

Unlike a standard diploma, per Section 51225.31, a student must meet the minimum requirements to receive a diploma based on a standards-based curriculum. Students must take:

- Three courses in English
- Two courses in <u>mathematics</u>, including one year of Algebra I
- Two courses in <u>science</u>, including biological and physical sciences
- Three courses in <u>social studies</u>, including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics, and a one-semester course in economics
- One course in <u>visual or performing</u> <u>arts</u>, <u>world language</u>, or career technical education
- Two courses in <u>physical education</u>, unless exempted

### **Graduation Requirements**

To earn a diploma, a student typically must pass 4 years of grade level English, 3 years of math, 3 years of social studies, Biology and a physical science and other required classes. They must complete all class credits (220 total units) required by California.
