


AMARI AND THE NIGHT BROTHERS BY: B.B. ALSTON


BORN BEHIND BARS BY: PADMA VENKATRAMAN

Then one day a new warden arrives and announces Kabir is too old to stay. He gets handed over to a long-lost "uncle" who unfortunately turns out to be a fraud, and intends to sell Kabir. So Kabir does the only thing he can--run away as fast as his legs will take him. How does a boy with nowhere to go and no connections make his way? Fortunately, he befriends Rani, another street kid, and she takes him under her wing.




DRESS CODED BY: CARRIE FIRESTONE


EVERYTHING SAD IS UNTRUE BY: DANIEL NAYERI

At the front of a middle school classroom in Oklahoma, a boy named Khosrou (whom everyone calls "Daniel") stands, trying to tell a story. His story. But no one believes a word he says. To them he is a dark-skinned, hairy-armed boy with a big butt whose lunch smells funny; who makes things up and talks about poop too much. But Khosrou's stories, stretching back years, and decades, and centuries, are beautiful, and terrifying, from the moment his family fled Iran in the middle of the night with the secret police moments behind them, back to the sad, cement refugee camps of Italy and further back to the fields near the river Aras, where rain-soaked flowers bled red like the yolk of sunset burst over everything, and further back still to the Jasmine-scented city of Isfahan. We bounce between a school bus of kids armed with paper clip missiles and spitballs to the heroines and heroes of Khosrou's family's past, who ate pastries that made people weep and cry "Akh, Tamar!" and touched carpets woven with precious gems. Like Scheherazade in a hostile classroom. Daniel weaves a tale to save his own life: to stake his claim to the truth. And it is (a true story). It is Daniel's.




FAST PITCH BY: NIC STONE


FINDING JUNIE KIM BY: ELLEN OH


HEALER OF THE WATER MONSTER BY: BRIAN YOUNG


THE INSIDERS BY: MARK OSHIRO


THE MAGIC FISH BY: TRUNG LE NGUYEN


OPHIE'S GHOSTS BY: JUSTINA IRELAND


PARADISE ON FIRE BY: JEWELL PARKER RHODES

Developing her courage and resiliency against the raging fire, it's up to Addy to lead her friends to safety. Not all are saved. But remembering her origins and grandmother's teachings, she's able to use street smarts, wilderness skills, and her spiritual intuition to survive.




A PLACE AT THE TABLE BY: SAADIA FARUQI & LAURA SHOVAN


RED, WHITE AND WHOLE BY: ROJANI LAROCCA


THE SHAPE OF THUNDER BY: JASMINE WARGA


A SOFT PLACE TO LAND BY: JANAE MARKS


STAND UP, YUMI CHUNG! BY: JESSICA KIM

The only problem is that the instructor and all the students think she's a girl named Kay Nakamura--and Yumi doesn't correct them. 
STARFISH BY: LISA FIPPS


SUPERMAN SMASHES THE KLAN BY: GENE LUEN YANG


VIOLETS ARE BLUE BY: BARBARA DEE


WHEN YOU TRAP A TIGER BY: TAE KELLER

YUSEF AZEEM IS NOT A HERO BY: SAADIA FARUQI








ACE OF SPADES BY: FARIDAH ÀBÍKÉ-ÍYÍMÍDÉ
