This spellbinding novel by the author of The Crossover and Booked will take you on an unforgettable adventure that will open your eyes and break your heart.




#### Iveliz Explains it All by Andrea Beatriz Arango

She's going to make a new friend, help her abuela Mimi get settled after moving from Puerto Rico, and she is not going to get into any more trouble at school...


Except is that what happens? Of course not.

#### Thirst by Varsha Bajaj




#### Simon Sort of Says by Erin Bow


### Falling Short by Ernesto Cisneros


But will their friendship and support for each other be enough to keep the two boys from falling short?





#### Huda F Are You? by Huda Fahmy


Huda and her family just moved to Dearborn,

#### Good Different by Meg Eden Kuyatt



Selah's friends pull away from her, her school threatens expulsion, and her comfortable, familiar world starts to crumble.




### Show Me a Sign by Ann Clare LeZotte

#### Mexikid by Pedro Martin



could have "presentable", "good hair".






# Hidden Truths by Elly Swartz

# Hoops by Matt Tavares






As millions of people back on Earth follow his progress, will Res have the determination, courage—and resilience—to succeed... and survive?


Told from several perspectives, readers see
