MISSION STATEMENT

Malibu High School strives to be a collaborative community that respects individuals, teaches critical thinking, fosters a passion for learning and sets high expectations for all.

Student Body

There are **380** students enrolled in Malibu High School for the **2024-2025** academic year. The current senior class totals **95** students. While most of the students come from the Malibu community, others come from Santa Monica, Los Angeles and Ventura Counties to attend the school. Approximately 73% of the students are Caucasian, 16% Latino, 3% Asian & Pacific Islander, 2% African American. Approximately 17% of the students are on the Free/Reduced Lunch program.

Faculty

The staff is comprised of 31 teachers, 2 administrators, 3 counselors, 1 school psychologist, 1 librarian and 1 school nurse. Five members of the faculty have doctorate degrees. Two teachers have earned the prestigious National Board Certification for teaching excellence.

Community

Located off the Pacific Ocean, Malibu High is the center of a community that commits time and resources to the success of the school. Malibu High has exceptional partnerships with the City of Malibu, the Malibu Foundation, Pepperdine University, Malibu Chamber of Commerce, and the Malibu Special Education Foundation. There is a Boys and Girls Club on campus that provides after school and youth development programs. The Shark Fund is the school's nonprofit umbrella fundraising organization, providing financial support to the PTSA, Athletic Booster Club, Arts Angels and specific capital campaigns.

Accreditation and Recognition

Malibu High School is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) for a six-year term. In 2023, Malibu High was ranked #93 in the state of California and #660 nationally by U.S News & World Report, based on college readiness, reading & math proficiency, reading & math performance, underserved student performance, college curriculum breadth and graduation rates. Our school district has been honored with the "Best Communities for Music Education" designation from the National Association of Music Merchants (NAMM) Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education.

Grading and Rank

The **grade point average is unweighted** as no extra points are given for Advanced Placement or Honors courses. GPA is determined by computing all grades, except for physical education, teacher assistant duties and special education. A cumulative grade point average is computed using a 4-point scale (A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, F=0; plus and minus grades are neutral).

In compliance with district policy, **class rank is not computed**, but a GPA percentage range is provided for colleges to determine approximate ranking.

Please be aware that due to the small size of Malibu High School and the wide offering of advanced level courses, many students face scheduling conflicts and are not able to enroll in all of the advanced courses they wish to take. Counselors take this into consideration as they evaluate the rigor of a student's curriculum.

Academic Program

The academic year is divided into two semesters of approximately 20 weeks. A school day is comprised of 6 classes, and students are on a block schedule every Wednesday and Thursday, with a support period (TUTORIAL) for every student. Malibu High offers three dual enrollment courses through Santa Monica College and two CTE Pathways. These courses are designed for students to learn through guided projects with real world application and possible connections to careers and industries.
